Andaman Colonisation scheme - Volunteer convicts - Conditions of transfer.

I am directed to address the Government of India on the subject of the condition regarding the age of convicts who are accepted for transfer to the Andamans. In paragraph/of Mr. Sloan's letter No. F. 67/34-Jails, dated 18th March 1935, the Government of India prescribed a condition that prisoners who volunteer to the Andamans should be between the ages of 20 to 40. This condition was modified in paragraph 2 of Mr. Talukdar's letter No. 86/38-Jails, dated 20th May 1939. Under the terms of this letter, volunteer convicts should be between the ages of 20 and 45, provided that their age by the date of release does not exceed 55 years. The modification of the condition regarding age was ordered by the Government of India in order to attract more prisoners to the Andamans. While under the old condition convicts who were sentenced to transportation for life and who were not more than 40 years could be sent to the Andamans, the effect of the new condition is that life convicts who are not more than 35 years can alone be sent and others cannot be sent as their age at the time of the release will exceed 55 years.

2. The Inspector-General of Prisons has brought to the

Corepp 20-22 inter file) notice of this Government the case of a convict sentenced to transportation for life, who has volunteered to go to the Andamans. The convict is 38 years old, and the unexpired 19 portion of his sentence is about 18 years and 3 months. SA copy of his nominal roll is enclosed. The convict would have been eligible to go to the Andamans under the old condition, but he cannot be sent there under the new condition, as his age by the date of release will exceed 55 years. It is not clear whether this effect of the new condition, in the case of "life convicts", is desired or intentional. I am to bring to the notice of the Government of India the specific case of this prisoner, and to enquire whether his request for transfer to the Andamans may be complied with, and how similar applications that may be received in future should be disposed of.

3. In this connection, I am to invite reference to paragraph 2 of the Home Department letter No.F.129/26-Jails, dated 15th March 1926 and paragraph 3(6) of the Home Department letter No.F.150/32-Jails, dated 4th November 1932; under which volunteer convicts who are considered by the Chief Commissioner to be suitable for retention in the Settlement, should be granted one-third remission of their sentences. I am to enquire whether for the purpose of calculation of the age of a volunteer convict at the time of release, the full period of the sunexpired sentence less one-third remission may be taken into account. If this is done in the case of the prisoner referred to in pagraph 2 above, he will become due for release after about 13 years, and his age by the date of release will be about 51 years.
