

✓ Ayub tells Abdullah *leader- 1.6.64*

Indo-Pak federation as solution of Kashmir ruled out

RAWALPINDI, May 31 (PTI)—President Ayub Khan of Pakistan today ruled out the idea of a confederation or a federation between India and Pakistan as a solution of the Kashmir dispute.

He declared that Pakistan would never accept the idea of a confederation or a federation between the two countries as such a step would ultimately undo Pakistan.

President Ayub, who was inaugurating the divisional Muslim League Conference, said that he had conveyed to Sheikh Abdullah this view during their recent talks.

He had, however, also told the Sheikh that Pakistan desired friendly relations with India and would go to any length to attain that object.

President Ayub said a ⁴⁶confederation stipulated the setting up of a common centre. But

once it was formed, however limited its scope 'it goes on assuming more and more powers'.

Even if it was confined to defence, foreign affairs and communications, all the residuary subjects could easily be made to come under these three subjects, he added.

EFFECT ON INDIA

President Ayub said that the proposal of a confederation would prove equally dangerous to India. South India, Nagaland, the Sikhs and other regions would also press to be recognised as independent units for the purpose and this might open the gates of disintegration of India, he added.

President Ayub said that Pakistan was keen to have friendly relations with all its neighbours as could be seen from her border agreements with Iran, Burma and China.

With India too, Pakistan had demarcated its borders in the west and the east. If some points still remained to be settled it was because of the inability of the Government of India to honour agreements arrived at earlier, he added.

AIM OF PAKISTAN

President Ayub said that the Kashmir issue could also be settled peacefully. Whenever India decided on friendly relations with Pakistan, it would not fail to find reciprocity from this side, he added.

He did not disclose any further details of his talks or any proposals he discussed with Sheikh Abdullah.

He, however, said Sheikh Abdullah was a man of strong character, who had been undergoing untold suffering. He was determined to ensure the same freedom for the people of Kashmir as was enjoyed by the people of India and Pakistan.

President Ayub said that it was the aim of Pakistan to secure the liberation of Kashmir.

LUCKNOW, May 31 (NAF-)—Generation of additional power by 2,000,000 kilowatts at estimated cost of Rs. 3,500,000 is proposed by the end of the fourth plan. Disclosing this to NAFEN, a spokesman of the U.P. Power Ministry said dozens of new schemes are envisaged. Plans are also under way to expand some of the existing hydel and thermal power projects.

The State will have an installed capacity of 1000,000 kilowatts by the end of the third
