Sir,

I am directed to invite a reference to Mr. Butler's letter No. 793 dated the 24th. October 1911, regarding the advice slip system for watching and reporting the movements of foreign suspects. It is intimated that the majority of the reports received from local Governments and Administrations indicate that the trial of the system has not proved to be a success and that the Government of India accordingly do not press for its continuance.

2. In reply, I am to say that in this province surveillance under the system was maintained in 8 or 9 cases in all, but this was in respect of persons who were first brought under surveillance by the police of other Governments. There have been no cases in which surveillance under the scheme has been initiated by the Police of this province, and as there are very few travellers, if any, to whom the system could appropriately be applied, the Lieutenant Governor in Council has directed its discontinuance in Bengal.
