My dear Sardar Patel.

I am in receipt of your letter No.705-DPM/50 dated the 12th instant.

I am really sorry that the newspaper accounts of my speech in Bombay should have been misunderstood as amounting to lack of appreciation for the generous treatment meted out to my Community by the Congress Party in the Constituent Assembly. I addressed the meeting for an hour and a half. The few paragraphs published in the press could, therefore, give no idea of the purport of the whole speech. The first, and the much longer, part of my address was devoted to bringing home to the Anglo-Indians not only the generous but what I described as the "uniquely generous " treatment accorded them by the Congress Party. In emphasising this fact, which I have done in literally hundreds of speeches, I have never failed to pay a special tribute to you for your invaluable help. In the Bombay speech, also, I emphasised that but for your assistance the safeguards would not have been secured and that the Community owed you an irreparable debt of gratitude and appreciation.

It would pain me considerably to feel that, after your assistance to me, you should, think that I could forget the debt that the Community and I owe you.

Mich I spoke I devoted about ten minutes of my speech to criticism of Tandon's election. Rightly or wrongly, I feel that Tandon has, in more than one speech, made his views clear and which leave no room for doubt that he, at least, would like to see India a religious State. One or two of the

Frank Anthony's Fears On Minorities' Future

MR. FRANK ANTHONY, leader of the Anglo-Indians, on Friday, said that the ideal of secular democracy is yet to be realised in India and if the present political trends were unchecked. If envisage an inevitable resurgence of communalism in India."

He told a gathering Anglo-Indians that "the present increasingly power-drunk, arrogant and intolerant communal policies will make mino-rities fight for their very existence."

Mr. Frank Anthony. M.P., was addressing the general body meeting of the Bombay branch of the Anglo-Indian Association at the Green's Hotel.

He called upon the minorities in India to be "on the vanguard in the fight for secular democracy".

According to him the ideal of secular democracy was only "put on paper and still remains a distant objective".

On the contrary, he found "reactionary elements growing in strength in the country": On the

The election of Mr. Purshottamdas Tandon as the Congress President "is far from reassuring". Recent trends in the Congress Party, itself "underlined the fact that it is shedding secularism and is becoming more and more a militant-Hindu organisation", he said.

He described these trends as "tragedy of the first order".

He told the meeting that some of the Indian States were growing "more and more reactionary, and communal. The linguistic policies of Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh are intolerant and even fanatical".

OFFICIAL POLICIES

"More and more more policies are being officially adopted and persons returned to power who have made no secret of their belief that Indian culture is Hindu culture. Unless an Indian is assimilated into Hinduism he cannot live with equality" he added.

In the midst of these trends, Mr. Anthony thought, that the minorities were mistaken in their faith. He could not give to them "an unqualified assurance that Anglo-Indians will be treated fairly".

He, however, admitted that Anglo-indians had been generally treated well and unique safeguards had been granted "for most of our vital needs". The Anglo-Indians, now had a "very definite place in the new India".

"India is the only country where Anglo-Indians are respected and their qualities valued" he added. He asked the members of his community to realise that they were Indians first and last and they would have to continue to live in India.

In spite of all that, he feared that mimorities were growing apprehensive about their future.

"If any one believed that minorities will submit tamely to be wiped out of existence, he is reckoning without his bosts" he said, because according to him a communal tendency as in Pakistan was growing in India and minorities "are being treated as if they are here on sufferance".



I write to you on an urgest matter of very considerable importance to the Amyle-Indian Community. I have been informed that the Madrus Government is contemplating reducing the level of grants, to what were known as Suropean Schools, to the same basis as grants made to other Schools.

The peculiar position of Anglo-Indian education, which includes the Schools hitherto referred to as Suropean, was placed before the Advisory Committee of the Constituent Assembly, and also before the Constituent Assembly, and also before the Constituent the Constituent Assembly has accepted the provision that the present grants made by the Control and Provincial Governments to Anglo-Indian education are to remain unaffected for a period of three years. First let me disabuse your mind of the impression that my Secretary had anything to do with the refusal of an appointment to you. You can have no idea of how busy I have been during the last three or four days. I have not had a moment to spare from 5-30 a.m. to 10 p.m. The only time I had for interviews was between 5-30 to 6-30 a.m., and that I knew would not suit you. When I am a little more free, I shall certainly give you some time.

Regarding your election from C.P., surely the position has altered since the discussions to which you refer were held. As I wrote to you in my last letter, the addition of the status of a Legislature to the Constituent Assembly, with the consequential disqualification of some Members, and the need for selecting our own party men from a new angle raises various difficulties which preclude any definite commitment. Nevertheless, I shall see what I can do, though I cannot make any definite promise.

As regards Bengal, the Viceroy is fully posted with the various factors affecting the situation and the matter is actively under his consideration.

Thank you for your letter of the 23rd instant. I feel I ought to explain the position to you. During my recent visit to Calcutta I got all the Anglo-Indian M.L.As. to vote with the Congress. One of the ways in which I was able to secure this was to promise that they could return one of their number to the Constituent Assembly. It would be impossible for me now to break faith with them.

I had every reason to expect that the seat vacated by Gibbon would be filled by another representative of my Community. When the rules concerning the Constituent Assembly were being framed, a Sikh member and myself had raised the question as to the representation of the minorities in the event of a bye-election and suggested that specific phraseology should be used to ensure that in the event of a representative of a minority community vacating his seat a member and representative of the same community be returned. The point was made, however, that we should not press for this as we could leave it to the good sense of the Congress Party. On that we were completely reassured and did not press the metter further. If Congress now deprives us of the seat which they were good enough to give us from the C.P., it will mean that I shall be kept out of the Constituent Assembly. I thought that as my home was in the C.P., it would be most appropriate for me, and particularly in view of my promise to the Bengal M.L.As. to seek election, from that Province. which I had hoped would be automatic.

I have tried, without success, to get an appointment with you during the past two days. I wanted to see you, not about a seat in the Constituent Assembly, but about what I regard as a very urgent question, namely, the position in Bengal. I have

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just returned from there and it was brought to my notice, and since my return I have received further information, that members of my Community are being threatened with reprisals because the Anglo-Indian M.L.As. had voted with the Congress on the 20th instant. The Association's Civic Defence Union is capable of resisting organised attack but I am apprehensive lest the women and children are suddenly, and individually, attacked. This would be comparatively easy as it happens that members of my Community live predominantly in the Muslim localities. am seeing the Viceroy about this in an effort to urge the need-for-some administrative change. While no trouble may arise, I feel that with a purely communal ministry in the saddle and administering an area which it is now certain they will not control, attempts may be made to promote disorder and organised attacks might even be connived at. Under the circumstances, I feel that even a Section 93 Administration, until matters are sorted out, will be better than leaving things as they stand at present. I wanted to discuss this whole matter with you before seeing the Viceroy but unfortunately your Secretary thought it best not to give me an appointment.
