REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Letter from the Commissioner in Sind, No. 786, dated 27th February 1888—Submitting the Annual Report on the Revenue Administration of the Province of Sind for the year 1886-87.

RESOLUTION.—The inundation of the river Indus for 1887 was on the whole excellent; and its waters attained a height at Bakkár, which they had not before reached except in the year 1882. At the same time their fall was somewhat early, affecting injuriously the later rabi crops, which were also damaged in some districts by frosts in January and February. A fine tract of rabi land at the mouth of the Dadwah in Hyderabad was swept away, as also a considerable portion of the village of Thutt, which a few years ago was 7 or 8 miles from the banks of the river. Erosion at the mouth of the Ghár Canal in Shikárpur again interfered with its utility, and occasioned loss of revenue through contraction of the irrigated area, and the necessity for remissions. The mouth of the Begári Canal in the Upper Sind Frontier District silted up towards the close of the season owing to the unfavourable set of the river, which cut off the water-supply from late-sown crops at a very critical time.

2. An increase of 88 is shown in the total number of villages (3,546) recorded in the province. Government villages were 94 more than in 1885-86, and alienated 6 less. The increase in the case of the former was due to changes recorded during survey operations, and to the transfer of the 6 alienated villages above referred to to the head of Government villages, in two instances on account of previous improper classification and accretion, and in the remaining four of accretion of alluvial land in excess of the percentage to which the alienees were entitled, as a result of which the villages ceased to be classed as alienated under the orders in force. Immigration, consequent upon the opening of the Upper Sind Frontier canals, and the gradual abandonment of their nomadic habits by a part of the population are alleged as reasons for a considerable increase recorded in the number of hamlets.

3. The expenditure upon irrigation works not debitable to capital, during the year 1885-86 was Rs. 15,77,000, or Rs. 24,659 less than in the year preceding. The decrease occurred solely in the Hyderabad District, the figures for all the other districts being slightly higher than in 1884-85. The expenditure upon establishments gave signs of rapid growth, rising from 14.9 to 17.5 per cent. of the total outlay. This growth is apparent in the figures for all five districts, but is most marked in the case of the Kashmor Bund in the Upper Sind Frontier, where expenses under this head rose from Rs. 5,435 to Rs. 9,656, and in the Shikárpur and Ghár division where the increase was from Rs. 56,248 to Rs. 77,138.

4. The gross canal revenue for 1886-87, with the remissions granted and the net revenue for collection, are shown in the following table as compared with the figures for 1885-86 :—

The increase of net revenue for collection was thus Rs. 1,85,093-4-9; but the actual collections fell off by Rs. 1,48,472-14-10, owing to a decrease in recoveries made on account of outstanding balances of former years. After the deduction of irrecoverable balances written off, that still outstanding at the close of the year was Rs. 1,45,352-13-3, of which sum Rs. 99,906-8-7 belonged to the year 1886-87 and Rs. 45,446-4-8 to former years.

5. To the revenue derived from lands irrigated by canals has to be added that of lands irrigated by the Indus, by wells, and by rainfall. The demands from such lands (including village-cess and miscellaneous items) amounted to a sum of Rs. 16,16,295-10-9, which, added to the figure of the gross revenue given in paragraph 4, affords an aggregate of Rs. 59,13,145-12-5. It is to be observed that although the total number of wells available for purposes of cultivation was 14,035, or 511 more than in 1885-86, only 8,097 or 197 more were actually utilized. The area fertilized by this form of irrigation was at the same time returned as of a lesser extent.

6. In the following table will be found a comparison of the figures for the last two years, showing for the whole province the gross revenue before making any deductions on account of alienations or otherwise, the net revenue for collection after such deductions had been made, and the extent to which realizations were effected during the two periods :—

The gross revenue thus received an augmentation of Rs. 4,19,211-5-3, which was shared in by all the districts except that of the Upper Sind Frontier. In this district the contraction of the area under rabi crops, owing to the failure of the Begári Canal, alluded to in paragraph 1, was accompanied by a corresponding contraction of revenue. The causes of increase in the other districts were (1) the extension of cultivation, especially in Thar and Párkar; and (2) in Hyderabad the introduction of revised rates into two talúkas. But a large part of the increase (Rs. 1,80,919-10-0) in Hyderabad and Karáchi is merely nominal, being the result of the application of the system of measurement of the entire culturable areas in the possession of jágírdárs, without any allowance on account of probable fallows. This sum though appearing in the gross revenue has to be deducted under "alienations" and does not affect the net results of the year.

7. For the reason given in the last paragraph, the total on account of alienations shows a considerable though nominal increase of Rs. 1,23,308-6-4, which entirely vanishes, however, when the above sum is disposed of, and gives place to a decrease of Rs. 57,611-3-8, chiefly attributable to corrections of areas of jágírs during survey operations. At the same time there was an increase of Rs. 6,702-9-0 in the revenue of land remitted under special agreement, in consequence of arrangements made for the maintenance of the Karowah Canal sanctioned in Government Resolution No. 8671 of the 26th October 1885.

8. The remissions granted (Rs. 1,70,409-3-1) were Rs. 31,428-1-9 less than in 1885-86. The causes of the majority of these will have been gathered from the description of the season given in paragraph 1. The largest amount of remissions was granted in Shikárpur, where they amounted to Rs. 98,641-5-0, while in the Upper Sind Frontier and Karáchi they were Rs. 26,856-10-1 and Rs. 30,327-9-0 respectively. In Thar and Párkar only the insignificant sum of Rs. 43-4-0 had to be remitted.

9. Of the net revenue remaining for collection after the deduction of remissions, which was Rs. 55,69,483-9-4, all but Rs. 1,01,923-8-5 was brought to account during the year, together with Rs. 1,08,776-13-11 of balances due from former years. The amount outstanding at its close was thus Rs. 18,522-6-4.

less than that with which it commenced, a result fairly creditable to the Collectors and their subordinates. Of the total outstanding balances, Rs. 1,26,626-2-6 were set down as recoverable, of which sum Rs. 21,556-13-3 were recovered after the close of the financial year, but prior to the submission of the report: postponements were granted upon sufficient cause shown in the case of sums amounting to Rs. 63,651-6-5: Rs. 24,222-1-3 were due from estates under management: Rs. 2,691-10-0 though entered in the accounts were not actually due for payment up to the close of the year; while the process of the recovery of the remaining Rs. 14,504-10-3 was being actively pushed on. A sum of Rs. 8,189-4-0 of the balance is entered as "doubtful and disputed": of which Rs. 7,870-5-0 are due from Mazari Chiefs residing on the frontier of the Dera Ghazi Khan District in the Punjab, who refuse payment pending the settlement of the terms upon which they are to be allowed to hold lands on the frontier. The matter is under consideration in the Political Department.

10. The amount of pressure used for the recovery of revenue was moderate. Distrainments and sales of moveable and immoveable property were rather more general than in 1885-86, but on the other hand the cases of forfeiture and sale of occupancy land fell by more than 50 per cent., while in more than half the cases of land sold it was returned to the defaulter. It is gratifying to note that the revenue in Thar and Parkar was recovered without any kind of pressure, and that in only 16 cases were notices even issued in that district.

11. The advances made under the Land Improvement Act, and under the Takavi rules are shown in the following table:—

All sums due, or in arrears, under the former head were recovered within the year; while under the latter there was an outstanding balance for collection of Rs. 19,310-4-0, which is, however, reported to be wholly recoverable.

12. The average incidence of revenue per acre all over the province was Re. 0-8-4 if regard be had to the total acreage of cultivable land, or Rs. 1-4-9 if only that actually occupied be taken into account. In Hyderabad and Karachi the averages recorded were higher than those given in 1885-86, a consequence no doubt of the survey operations in those districts. In Shikarpur they were slightly lower; while in the Upper Sind Frontier District the average was higher, if taken upon the total cultivable area, but lower in proportion to that occupied. For Thar and Parkar no averages are given, the extent of the arable land being unknown.

13. While the culturable area of the province is shown as 81,41,348 acres 2 gunthás in 1886-87 as against 7,777,525 acres 33 gunthás in the previous year, the percentage of the unoccupied portion to the whole fell from 53.50 to 52.89 per cent. This increase in area seems to have been due partly to the action of the survey newly introduced into parts of some districts, under which land previously classed as waste was converted into numbers, and partly to the fact that in Karachi the unoccupied culturable land of two talukas had up to last year been excluded (presumably in error) from the returns under this head. 34,477 acres of land were set apart this year for special purposes, as contrasted with only 2,960 in 1885-86. This was the result of the creation in Shikarpur of forest reserves to the extent of 33,251 acres.

The item of 'Sáyar' revenue was as usual small, only Rs. 541-12-8, as compared with Rs. 376-11-4 in the preceding year. Adding this sum, and Rs. 56,617-8-0 on account of hakabo credited to the Irrigation Department, to the total collections on account of land revenue and village cess given above at paragraph 6, an aggregate of Rs. 56,33,496-3-6 is obtained as the sum total of collections made during the year. This figure does not, however, tally with that given by the Commissioner in paragraph 60 of his report, which is Rs. 56,38,359-9-0, and probably includes Rs. 11,669-0-10 written off as irrecoverable, as shown in column 48 of Appendix No. 1. The addition of this sum, however, to that of Rs. 56,33,496-3-6 brings it to more than Rs. 6,000 above Mr. Pritchard's total, and the only explanation of this seems to be that some portion of the hakabo due was not recovered during the year. This is, however, nowhere stated, and the Commissioner should be requested to report whether it is a correct view of the case. The cost of collection of revenue increased by Rs. 44,932-15-3 in the aggregate, and Re 0-3-3 in percentage, owing to additions to establishment, the exact need for which is not explained.
