4th. It is observed that seven villages, as entered in the margin,\* are

at present excluded from this Settlement, on account of the reservoirs which have been formed in them, not having yet come into operation.

The demand upon these estates should be fixed, so as to correspond with the rest of District, as soon as they are in a condition to permit of this being done.

5th. The other points which require the orders of Government, will now be noticed, in the order in which they appear in your report.

6th. The deduction of 2318 beegahs from the malgoozaree area of the Para. 12. District on account of rent-free holdings of various descriptions, is approved and sanctioned.

7th. The several arrangements mentioned by you in the paragraphs noted in the margin, whereby part of the proceeds of certain villages 13—20. has been assigned to independent Chiefs and others, have been long in force either under the orders of Government, or of former Residents. The Lieutenant-Governor does not consider it necessary to interfere with any of them.

8th. The explanation submitted by you with regard to Thakoor Paras. 21—25. Bhopal Singh's claim on the Qusbeh of Beawr, is clear and

satisfactory. It is evident that the Thakoor was never able to establish his ancestral right to the Qusbeh, which you observe, "had been in a state of ruin and dense jungle for two centuries, preceding the reduction of the country by British Arms." The arguments adduced by you against his claim to twelve wells in Bhoom are also conclusive and sufficient. His third claim, viz. to the profits of the estate for four years, from 1827 to 1831, is fully met by his having enjoyed the produce of the land cultivated by his household, free of payment from 1831 to the present year, besides that the cancelment of his lease in 1827 arose from his own misconduct. The Lieutenant-Governor therefore does not consider that Neem Deo, the son of Bhopal Singh, has any claims of right against the Government, but he concurs in your proposal that the rent of the land still held by him in the (Qusbeh four hundred and seventy-four beegahs and ten biswahs) be fixed at Rs. 233 during the life-time of Neem Deo, and at Rs. 374 after his decease.

9th. The Lieutenant-Governor acknowledges the weight of your observation, that the punctual realization of the revenue now fixed must remain to a certain degree dependant on the seasons, and that much will depend, whenever a deficiency of rain occurs, on the diligence of the Superintendent, in making personal enquiry as to the extent of the evil. It is satisfactory at the same time to consider that the reservoirs, which you have been instrumental in forming, will not only diminish the frequency of injurious droughts, but that they will also afford a sure criterion, in addition to the pluviometers, of estimating the real character of the season as it affects every estate.

10th. The existing arrangement, whereby the charge of the works for irrigation is entrusted to the Tehseeldars, may remain in force so long as it works favorably. If you should hereafter see occasion to alter your opinion as to the advantage of appointing a separate officer for this duty, you are at liberty to revive the proposal.

11th. The Lieutenant-Governor approves of the mode in which you propose to recover half the expense of raising works for irrigation in certain villages from the Chiefs of Mussooda and Khurwa.

12th. His Honor will expect a future report upon the preparation of the Khewut papers for Mairwara, as well as for Ajmeer, as soon as the work is completed.



13th. It is not fully known to what previous orders you refer, in mentioning "the usual annual donation," for aiding small agricultural works in Ajmeer Mairwara. There is no objection to your making occasional advances of tuccavee, not exceeding in all the above annual amount, to such estates as may require it, and as will make a good use of it, but provision should at the same time be made for the early re-payment of sums thus advanced.

14th. In conclusion, I am desirous to convey to you the Lieutenant-Governor's sense of the zeal with which you have entered on the duty now reported, and of the diligence with which you have completed it. His Honor trusts that your exertions will produce lasting benefit, both to the Government and the people.

SIR,

I had the honor to announce in my letter No. 255, under date 19th ultimo, the despatch of the documents of the Mairwara Settlement, which are required to be submitted to Government. They consist of an English translation of the Vernacular Khewut, with various Tabular Statements, prepared in strict conformity with the regulations on this head, and embrace all the minute particulars of each separate Mouzah. The Oordoo Bundobust Misuls of five Villages, comprised in six volumes, have been submitted for inspection: the Misuls of all the Villages having been prepared in accordance with those now forwarded.

2nd. The arrangements in respect to the manipulation of the Khewut in Mairwara correspond so closely, and in most respects are so analogous to the system observed in Ajmeer, that their detail, where the correspondence is complete, will merely be a repetition of the course pursued in that District. The object of explanation might have been answered by transmitting a copy of my letter No. 153, under date 19th May last; but as the Settlement of Mairwara has been a distinct measure, it has been deemed desirable to give it a separate report; the deviation or difference from the Ajmeer process receiving due note.

3rd. My Mairwara Settlement Report No. 278, under date 27th September 1850, was so full in all local matters requiring notice, that few points call for observation, and then only where local requirements have demanded a deviation from the usual course.

4th. All disputes as to the proprietary right of land have been settled, as far as was practicable, personally by the Deputy Collector on the spot. In such cases where the parties have not been satisfied with this officer's decision, they have been referred for final adjustment to the Superintendent. Thus all claims were adjudicated previously to apportioning the rates and the amount to be paid by each individual, whose name is borne on the Khewut.

5th. With exception to one small Mouzah, Choura Neemree, Pergunnah Beawr, which was located for the security of the high road, and not in expectation of agricultural profits, and which is a Zemindaree Mehal, all the towns and villages of the District being two-hundred and twenty-eight Uslee and eighty-four Dakhilee are imperfect Putteedaree Mouzahs; where each individual proprietor holds his separate lands; a small portion only of the area remaining undivided. The old inhabitants of the District, Mairs and Mairats, as well as the new settlers, who came on the location of new villages and hamlets have been inserted, without distinction, as Biswahdars; both enjoying the same privileges as to the mortgage or sale of their holdings: since previous to the subjugation of the District, a large portion of the land was waste, and was only made remunerative through the pecuniary aid of the Government and the exertions of the people.

6th. In order to test the accuracy as to the quantity of land held by each Assamee, all the Biswahdars were from time to time assembled before the Deputy Collector, and on this question being satisfactorily determined, they were required to elect from amongst their own brother villagers, a punchayet, which was to arbitrate in fixing the begehree rates of assessment, in view to the apportionment of each assamee's respective jumma. In determining the rates to be assigned to each section of land, they had to consider the nature of the soil, its productiveness and its means of irrigation. Lands possessing a good soil, and having the advantage of uninterrupted irrigation from a well, were classed at the highest or first rate: other lands of inferior quality and only commanding water during seasons of plenty were classed as Chahee land of the second, third and fourth sorts, in reference to local circumstances. As far as it has been practicable to carry out this plan, the land has been equitably rated according to its means of production. In like manner, in respect to Tulabee and Abee land, the same course has been adhered to. Buranee lands, where they have been divided, have

been classed according to their respective qualities. The highest and lowest rates per beegah in the District are as follows:—

In some instances, where from the inferiority of the soil, or from other causes, a deviation from the above course was deemed desirable, the assessment has been regulated according to local wants. Another mode observed in some mouzahs has been to assess the Qubzawar land lightly; the deficiency of jumma being met, partly with, and partly without reference to rates, from the Shamlat lands tilled by the shareholders. As the lands remain undivided, and each assamee's share is undetermined, all the shareholders are bound to arrange for their due tillage: the condition being that any deficiency arising out of neglect of tillage, or decrease of produce, may be met by bach'h from each shareholder rateably, according to the amount of his Khewut. A further course differs from the foregoing in this respect, that in place of being tilled by the shareholders, the lands are cultivated by the hereditary cultivators, and the jumma, instead of remaining unapportioned, has been determined for each man, under condition that in case of the death or absence of any of these cultivators, any deficiency in the fixed quota will be made up by all the Biswahdars, by bach'h levied in proportion to their respective Khewut shares. In some mouzahs, the Moroosee cultivators also till the Qubzawar land in subordination to their respective proprietors. The assessment has therefore been made with the hereditary cultivators; the Biswahdars being held responsible for the payment of the sum fixed. The jumma fixed on the Moroosee cultivators has been assessed on the same principle as characterizes that of the Biswahdars; they receiving no malikana



compensation from the aforesaid cultivators in any village. The Hulsura mode of assessment has not been observed in Mairwara. Large portions of cultivated land in front of tulaos which had hitherto remained undivided have, as far as was practicable, been partitioned, and the rent fixed thereon has been regulated as with respect to Qubzawar land. But still parcels of land of this nature have in several mouzahs remained undistributed. The jumma assigned on this land, partly with and partly without reference to rates, has been apportioned in the ratio of the respective Khewut share of each assamee, and the quota of each has been duly inserted opposite to his name, in the column of remarks of the Vernacular Khewut. The land in question, which is now common to the whole village, can be divided, whenever required, either by the shareholders themselves, or through the aid of a Government Ameen, in the same proportions which have regulated the allotment of the jumma. Again, in some instances, the revenue of land appertaining to absent assamees has been inserted in the name of its present holders; the absentees being allowed to regain possession of their tenures, on engaging to pay their assigned share of revenue on their return. Lands of this description have in several other mouzahs been included under the head "Shamlat." The jumma of Qusbeh Dewair has been settled at Rs. 3,350. Of this sum Rs. 500 will be annually contributed, according to ancient usage, by the Thakoors of that place, from the proceeds which accrue to them from fees levied on the transit of cattle, merchandise and travellers, through the pass under their protection. The lands of the deserted hamlet of Deopoor, in Dewair, are tilled by the Zemindars of the parent village; consequently the sum fixed for that Muzreh, Rs. 50, has been included in the Khewut of Dewair. Whilst determining the jumma of the District, the revenue of Dochla and Barea Jugga, hamlets of Jalea 1st, was fixed to the extent of Rs. 330 and Rs. 300 respectively, making a total of Rs. 630; but at the time of preparing the Khewut, objections were raised by the Zemindars of Barea Jugga against the sum assigned to them, in consequence of the comparative unproductiveness of their land, and its limited extent. It was therefore determined, with the consent of the Biswahdars of both the hamlets, to make a slight difference in the amount of their jummas; the total, Rs. 630, remaining as formerly fixed, in this manner

The revenue of Chang, including its hamlets, Ramgurh and Jugmalpoora, was fixed at Rs. 1,451. Ramgurh having been held Kham, Rs. 350 on account of its jumma have been deducted, and the Khewut made for the balance Rs. 1,101. The Khewut of Myrean and Nya Nuggur has been made as stated in the sixteenth paragraph of my letter No. 278, under date 27th September 1850, to the address of Mr. Secretary Thornton, both in favor of the Government and their respective Ex-Resaldars, in proportion to the assigned shares of each. The sums fixed for the latter are only receivable by them during their life-time. The cultivated lands have alone been assessed, with exception to three or four villages, where a portion of the uncultivated has been included in the Khewut. The usual share of one-third of the produce paid by all the Zemindars during Kham management has been maintained. The Putels and others, who were entitled to certain remissions in the share alluded to, have had the same indulgence continued to them; the Begehree rates being reduced in proportion to the several abatements current in each village, which are a quarter and Sarei Teeja, or three and a half. The amount of each individual's share has been duly made known to him, and his signature obtained.

7th. The following Sewaee items of revenue have been appropriated for the benefit of the Biswahdars of the Mouzah; three items, viz. Gao Shoomaree, Kholree and Chand Sulamee not obtaining in this District.

*First.*—Wild indigo, which grows only in a few Mouzahs, and is sold as a whole by the proprietors for a few rupees, when the favorable state of the season gives promise it will ripen.

*Second.*—The proceeds arising out of the sale of jungle wood, and the manure of Bunjara bullocks, or the like that is common to the whole community, form a part of the Miscellaneous funds.

*Third.*—The revenue derived from Shamlat, cultivated and uncultivated land excluded from the Khewut assessment, as also the amount sale of indigenous produce, as grass, kans, motha, khus, &c. form a component portion of this fund. The arrangement in reference to the tillage of these lands will be made every year through the Lumberdars, who will grant at the commencement of each year, fresh agreements to the cultivators, whether Khewutdars or Pahee Kashts. The Shamlat lands can be divided at the pleasure of the people, in proportion to their respective Khewut shares, either by themselves or through an Ameen.

8th. The Shamlat items of receipt above indicated will be entered according to their respective dates, in the Putwaree's accounts, under the direction of the Lumberdars; for they are the rights of the proprietors paying the Government demand, and are to be apportioned rateably, according to the Khewut shares, in this manner:—At the close of each harvest, the village expenses are to be defrayed from this income, and should any balance remain, it has been left optional with the Lumberdars either to distribute the surplus in proportion to the Khewut shares, or to give assamees credit to that extent in payment of their Khewut account.

9th. The expected future profits of the village may thus be briefly noticed. Individually, each assamee is at liberty to increase the productiveness of his land, by converting Buranee into Chahee, or Bunjur into Buranee land, provided the said land be registered in his name, and in that case the profit is his own gain. In like manner, in respect to the whole community, Buranee land is given to such as desire to construct a naree, build a stone-dike wall, or sink a well thereon; the remissions being somewhat more favorable than those allowed during Kham management, as fully detailed in the Iqrarnamēh of each village. Bunjur, in permanently being turned into Buranee, is also a source of profit. Indeed, the only advantage anticipated is by augmenting the productiveness of the soil, and to induce people to expend capital on such improvements, the rates of assessment during the currency of the present Settlement have been extremely light.

10th. It may be remarked that in the Tabular Statistical Statements of Villages, many of the houses and wells have been denoted under the head of Kucha, in contra-distinction to those built of lime masonry; yet, from the nature of the country, this expression is not altogether correct: inasmuch as the houses are built of dry stone, with tiled roofs; while all the wells, unprotected by lime masonry, are sunk in the rock, having the superficial surface defended by a dry stone wall.

11th. The Putels, who are the hereditary functionaries of villages, have been denominated Lumberdars. Their number is determined by no fixed rule. They vary according to the extent of population; small villages holding one, while large towns have as many as twenty-five. Their duties embrace the superintendence of the interests of their respective towns and villages, with attendance at the office of the Tehseeldar. The Government demands are paid through the village Officers. Their own

lands have been assessed as with respect to Biswahdars, with this difference that in return for their services, their khewut shares have been rated on more favorable terms of one-fourth and Sarie Teeja of the produce, in place of one-third, the ryot's share. They are further entitled to small perquisites on the occasion of births, deaths and marriages. The brothers of the Putels, whose lands are undivided, and who prepare food at the same hearth, enjoy the remissions granted to their relations; but when the land has been partitioned, and their families prepare their bread at different hearths, their share is the common one of one-third the produce.

12th. The salary of Putwarees, or village accountants, is fixed on all the villages of the district, at six pie per rupee on the Government demand, or Rs. 3-2-0 per cent., except in Qusbeh Beawr, where it is three pie. The Vernacular Settlement Misls have been duly given off to them in Hindee. They have been provided with new buhees, and are now being instructed in the preparation of the Huftganeh and other systems of accounts.

13th. The Bulahee is a village servant, whose duty it is to cause the attendance of the Zemindars at the Tehseel Cutcherry, for the payment of the Government dues. He is employed in working the Jureeb, when the measurement of land is required. Reports village incidents or waradats to the Thanadar, and gives information to the Tehseel, of matters relating to the filling of the tulaos, or of occasional accidents that may happen to them. His salary is fixed at two dumrees per rupee on the Government demand. This servant is only removable by the Superintendent, on full cause assigned.

14th. The bach'h on account of Mulba Khurch, or village expenses, will be made rateably every harvest, on each proprietor, according to the Khewut shares. It is fixed at five per cent. on the jumma, but in case the sum thus realized from small villages, whose jumma is also small, be found insufficient, the bach'h may slightly exceed the assigned rate, and decreased in like manner in the larger towns and villages, where the jumma is considerable, and the sum which would thus be collected, be beyond immediate wants. The disbursements include several items, such as the salaries of the Putwarees and Bulahees; maintenance of the Lumberdars, while employed on duty away from their village; stationery expenses on account of Putwarees; the amount of fine levied on the whole Mouzah by the Foujdaree Courts; the tulbana and other miscellaneous expenses. Should the balance alone be due from a few assamees, they will personally



be held responsible for this, the tulbana charge; otherwise it will devolve on the whole muhal. These accounts will be duly entered in the Putwarees' books, and examined from time to time by the Deputy Collector and the Superintendent.

15th. Adverting to the pristine position of the Mairs before their conquest, and to the full ability they possess to guard their own villages from theft or depredation, all protective arrangements have been left in their own hands, where the communities are essentially Mairs and Mairats. This measure is further in consonance to their own wishes. In some few places, where the class of Mahajuns is extensive, such as Nya Nuggur, Qusbeh Beawr and Bursawara, chowkeedars are maintained at the expense of the people. The Bhoomeah, or Rural Police system, as prevalent in Ajmeer, does not obtain in Mairwara. In respect to the protection of Commerce and travellers through the mountain passes of Peeplee, Kachablee, Chapulean, Téetree Ghata, Dewair, Bursawara and Chang, small rates, according to ancient usage, are paid by those concerned for the security thus afforded; it being an understood rule that compensation be given for any loss of property within their boundary limits, arising out of carelessness on the part of the Zemindars. It has been considered unnecessary to make any separate allusion to this custom in the Khewut documents. To provide for the full security of the extensive droves of Bunjara salt bullocks passing from Puchhudra in Marwar, to Meywar and other countries in that direction across the hilly portion of the District, it has been deemed prudent to purchase the good offices of eight villages, viz. Bhaelan, Jâk, Sheopoor, Rajor, Umurpoora, Subulpoora, Seindra and Dholea, by paying them each Rs. 30 annually from the custom transit duties levied on salt. The compact between ourselves and these villages is that any cattle missing shall be searched for by them, and that all culpable loss be defrayed from their annual allowance. The system has been in force about seventeen years, and has yielded general satisfaction.

16th. Before bringing this report to a close, it is necessary to observe that the Village of Theekurwas Chota, in the Todgurh Pergunnah, has not been submitted to the process of the Khewut system. For several consecutive years, this village has been suffering from extreme drought, which forced the main portion of the cultivators to seek their livelihood in towns and villages in Meywar, as tillers of the soil, or as armed servants in the employ of wealthy Mahajuns. The rains during the present season did

not set in until the last week in July; thereby unavoidably detaining the return of the people, who, in the mean time, had sown the Khureef in the places of their temporary abode in Meywar. During my annual tour in Mairwara in the ensuing month of January, an endeavour will be made with the now absent proprietors of the land either to arrange through their brethren for the regular payment of their Khewut, or to sell their holdings. On the completion of some satisfactory arrangement, the circumstance will receive due notice. In the mean time we possess no alternative beyond holding the village under kham management.

17th. The subjects detailed above appear to include all questions deserving of distinct notice as differing in a slight degree from the engagements usual in Settlement arrangements in the Provinces. Every matter is however fully described in the village Iqrarnameh, which is a faithful record of the rights of the people.

SIR,

2nd. The accounts now submitted for 1850-51, are for the first year of the Settlement, whose duration has been fixed for a term of twenty years. As already observed in relation to the Ajmeer Annual Revenue Statement, our Settlement has been completed, under the full understanding that the rain should be in such sufficiency as to fill our tulaos, when each Mouzah would be required to pay its quota of rent without abatement. During indifferent seasons, when large portions of the land remain uncultivated, owing to the paucity of the rain, our demands must be so far diminished as to be made to correspond with the reduced produce: thus lightening the burthens of the people according to local requirements. The necessity for adhering to this course has been fully discussed in my Settlement Reports on both Districts; whereby no further observations on this point would seem required at this juncture. That the first year of our Settlement should prove so unpropitious as to call for a partial relaxation in our demands, might argue unfavorably as to the efficiency of the arrangement; rendering its currency during the ensuing nineteen years, a matter of question. Experience has however taught us that in a tract of country like Mairwara, where there is marked irregularity in the seasons, it is a rare circumstance to find good rains prevail throughout its whole length during any single year. Indeed, the chances are that each successive year will call for the adoption of the sliding scale principle. That the first year of its currency should call for the exercise of this rule is rather a favorable feature; inasmuch as it has shown the people that our promise of remissions in time of need has been faithfully fulfilled; thereby indicating our deliberate intention to consult their welfare and prosperity in all matters relating to revenue affairs.

3rd. The remissions sanctioned in your letter No. 2008, under date the 3rd June last, amounting to Rs. 15,372, have been duly entered on the returns opposite the villages which shared in this concession. The balance of the revenue has been realized in full. Specific sanction was formerly accorded for the sums necessary for the repair of roads, and for maintaining our works of irrigation in a state of complete serviceableness. Now these sums are drawn from the people, and form a component portion of the revenue. Hence the amount thus recovered has been entered on the returns.

4th. The rains of 1851 were more favorable than those of the foregoing year, yet their benefits have not been generally dispersed. In the



Ajmeer District, the villages from Khurwa to Ajmeer and westward, are in a high state of prosperity from the seasonable and ample supply of rain. To the north of Ajmeer and in the Pergunnah of Ramsur, the supply was less heavy, and in some villages scarcely sufficient for the requirements of the cultivation. The Pergunnahs of Mussooda, Bhinae and Kekree, are suffering more or less from a deficiency of rain: none having fallen after the month of July; whereby much injury has accrued to the til, bajra and jowar crops, which are solely dependent on a seasonable supply of rain. This is the third consecutive year that scarcity has prevailed in these Pergunnahs; yet through the agency of agricultural works of irrigation, the people have not forsaken their homes. The Khalsa town of Kekree, from the elevation of its land, and from being almost wholly dependent on supplies of rain, has sustained injury in its Khurreef crop, requiring a small abatement in its jumma. The kists of the Istumrardars have been paid up in full. A few other Khalsa Villages may claim slight remissions, but they promise to be less in amount than those sanctioned during June last.

5th. In Mairwara, the rain has been more general. From Khurwa to Dewair, with a few exceptions, there has been an ample abundance. Beyond the latter town the supply has been partial. Upon the whole, the appearance of this District is highly satisfactory. The industry of the people continues unabated, and prosperity and contentment are the natural consequences. Every man's mind appears bent on improving his condition through an increase of cultivation, to effect which small works are yearly constructed in each village, or new land prepared by walling in spaces, and providing the new field with soil brought from a distance. Only remissions to a small extent will be required this year to be given to those villages, which from a deficiency of rain, or from injury sustained by their tulaos, have much land uncultivated.

6th. The amount recovered from the Ajmeer Khalsa Villages extends only to Rs. 1,819, a sum too limited for the extension of new lines of road. The means at our disposal have admitted of the repair of the roads from the verge of the District towards Nya Nuggur to Nusseerabad, and also viâ Ajmeer to the Kishengurh Boundary; occupying a distance of about sixty miles; add to this the metalling the road from the new gate of the town, Ajmeer, to the Ghoogra Ghatta.

7th. In Mairwara, independently of keeping the roads leading to Khurwa, to Marwar and Meywar over their Passes, in a state of efficient repair, the road from Nya Nuggur over the Pakhurea Pass, as noticed in my letter No. 2 of the 3rd instant, is being made extremely easy for the passage of carriages. The route from Nya Nuggur to the Pergunnah of Bhaelan is being put into traversable order by carts, while the approaches to Todgurh and Dewair are being made easy for the transit of bullocks, camels, and horses. The work thus sketched, will require all the available funds; Rs. 1,912 per annum for its completion.

8th. A hope was indulged that the few first years of our Settlement would have been marked by moderate and seasonable rain; whereby the contributions to the Tulao Funds might in part have been employed in building rear retaining walls to the bunds and making other necessary useful improvements; allowing of the balance accumulating for unlooked-for contingencies. But this hope has been dissipated for a time, through one unprecedently heavy fall of rain during July in Pergunnah Beawr, and at some places in the Ajmeer District, which, besides causing much anxiety at the time, has required considerable aid from our funds. The subjoined Abstract shows the quantity of rain measured at the principal stations in the Districts:—

The fall which caused extensive injury to public and private works happened on the 21st July last, the quantity measuring six inches in about as many hours. Several bunds which had withstood the action of the seasons during a dozen years were overtopped, and in several instances a portion of the outfall masonry was bodily removed, through the force of the water raised two or three feet above the usual elevation on the overflowing of the tulaos. Such heavy and continuous rain had not been experienced since the reduction of Mairwara, as was instanced in the floods overflowing a por-

tion of the Cantonment of Beawr. The works both in Ajmeer and in this District were repaired at once, permanently, in most places, and all, with exception to the purvurish tulao, were replenished by subsequent showers. To guard against like contingencies, the outfalls are being extended in all practicable places. I am happy to have the ability to add that this contingency will be met from our Tulao Funds, without seeking specific aid from the Government.

9th. In respect to the well-working of the Settlement, there is every prospect expectation will be realized. Some slight alterations in the Ajmeer Khewut are called for in a few villages, and will be made without delay. In both Districts, the Settlement has roused the energies of the people to advance their own interests. This perhaps is more remarkable in Mairwara, where the industry of the mass of the people is not to be surpassed, or indeed, equalled in any country. With moderately good seasons aided by occasional partial remissions when actually required, and a continuance of the industry which is now so prevalent, the Settlement will work well, while prosperity and contentment will be the lot of the people.

SIR,

Having completed my tour through the Mairwara District, I have the honor to offer such brief observations for the information of the Honorable the Lieutenant-Governor North Western Provinces, as seem deserving of notice.

2nd. The inhabitants of Mairwara are essentially an agricultural people: their livelihood depending on the cultivation of the soil. Hence their prosperity is mainly regulated by the favorableness of the seasons. The periodical rains of the past year were so late in their commencement, as to cause much anxiety in the minds of all classes. The month of June passed almost without a shower, and July had nearly run its course before apprehension was removed. But after the rain commenced, the supply was so copious and continuous during five weeks as to replenish the whole of our numerous reservoirs, and to give full assurance of plenty. Owing to the lateness at which the labors of the Zemindars commenced, Indian-corn, the chief produce of the Khurreef, could only be sown in small quantities. Of til and jowar, in the higher lands, the return was good. The chief attention of the people was therefore turned towards the Rubbee, which during the present season is more extensive and more luxuriant than on any previous occasion, which has fallen under my observation. According to the Settlement documents, the District held

The crops this year are estimated to exceed the above total by upwards of 20,000 beegahs. This increase may be traced to several causes; the augmentation of new Zemindaree works and wells which the prospect of gain, through the settlement, has stimulated the people to undertake; to the bringing into cultivation much land to the front of the tulaos, and which, owing to the insufficiency or short duration of former rains, had not been completely submerged; and to the preparation of new land by cutting away and removing kunkur and stones from the rocky ground adjoining the land under culture, and on either side, as far as opportunity served, of the smaller vallies. In this manner is the greater portion of the excess to be accounted for: while at the larger works, the presence of an ample command of water has admitted of more than ordinary irrigation. At the same time that the rain has been ample and continuous, it has moreover been general in both Districts; no single village, as too frequently happens, being excluded from the benefits vouchsafed by Providence. It is true the outturn of the Khurreef has, in many villages, been very much restricted owing to the reasons above assigned, to which may be added the rotting of the crops in the more hilly portion of the tract from the percolation of water from the hills; still the extended return of the Rubbee will far outweigh the loss from the autumn harvest, leaving a large profit to the people. Indeed, it may be safely assumed, that should the Rubbee progress to maturity without encountering any of the usual vicissitudes of the season, its produce will more than supply the annual revenue; leaving the Khurreef as the profit of the people.

3rd. I have much gratification in stating that the Settlement is working satisfactorily, and that it is very agreeable to the people. Each man now knows the extent of his immediate contribution to the state, and that beyond that specific sum, he personally reaps the advantage of his own labors. It possesses, moreover, some indirect advantages in requiring the constant attendance of the people at their own villages for the culture of their own holdings; for the payment of the rent of absentees, except during a year of drought, falls on the whole Mouzah. Again, the settlement acts as a check against immorality or a breach of the laws; for all offenders, besides suffering punishment, have to pay their quota of rent, either directly through the sale of their property, through their friends, or by the village community. Hence, the nature of the settlement compact discourages absence and crime on the part of the assamees: for when either

occurs, the whole society has to bear the burthen in the liquidation of the absentee's rent.

4th. Three intelligent Ameens are now engaged in imparting to the Putwarees the knowledge of preparing the Village Huftganeh documents. In the course of the ensuing three months, it is expected all will have been fully instructed. Although only a few had these papers ready, yet the accounts of each Putwaree were daily examined before the Heads of Villages, throughout my tour. This measure, as observed with reference to Ajmeer, proved acceptable to the people. The village expenses are light and reasonable, and, setting aside the pay of the Putwaree and Bulahee, are of an inconsiderable amount. On the subject of village expense, the people are sensibly alive to their own interests. Hence undue charges do not receive admittance in the accounts.

5th. With a few exceptions, the tulaos are in a high state of serviceableness. Slight repairs were made to the works at the time the necessity arose during the rains. Extensive injuries could not be rectified at the moment, owing to the absence of the requisite materials. The principal damage has been confined to some masonry weirs in the neighborhood of Todgurh, and where an exemption from injury was expected, as they had withstood the effect of the torrents during at least a dozen years. The reason is the unusually heavy rain which fell during several continuous days, and which is attested by the annexed extract from the Register. The works too being partially constructed of lime mortar and partially of dry stone, were insufficiently strong to withstand the accumulated force of an overwhelming torrent. They are now in the course of repair with the best lime mortar; the masonry being made strong enough to sustain the greatest probable pressure. The expense will be borne by the Tulao Fund.

6th. In the matter of roads, progress is palpable. The lines leading from Nya Nuggur towards Ajmeer and Marwar, and over the Ghattas leading into Meywar and the eastern Pergunnahs of Ajmeer are in excellent order. The communications from Bhaelan to Todgurh, and thence to Meywar, and to the southward which were confined to pathways, and alike difficult to ascend by man or unloaded animal, have now been converted into good serviceable roads, suitable for the passage of wheeled-carriages lightly loaded. The same remark applies to the ascent to Dewair. Other lines, where most required by commerce, are progressing, as far as our restricted means allow.



7th. A brief notice of Educational progress may not be out of place. In 1847, after His Honor had visited the District, authority was given for the Establishment of one Persian and eight Hindee Schools. This number is at present maintained. The intention which was entertained of imparting a knowledge of reading and writing to the children of the Mairs is in the course of satisfactory fulfilment. Here, as in other matters, the force of example is exerting its influence, and a general desire for the extension of education is being manifested. In the course of my tour, the boys of the several Schools supported by the people, were brought up for examination in the same manner as those belonging to the Government Schools. They received due encouragement, and all were presented with books, as far as my stock in hand admitted. A supply to the extent of Rs. 50 in value is now *en route* to me from Agra, and on its arrival will be distributed. The Schools thus supported by the people are held in the places indicated in the margin.\*

the Village. The bestowal of this situation on the Mairs, while it tends to elevate their character and add to their respectability, will act as an incentive to others to study. Nor will this change be distasteful to the Muhajuns, who now find ample occupation in attending to their more legitimate pursuits of trade and *borgut*. The Schools have already provided several Putwarees, who read off the accounts with the fluency of an educated Muhajun, to the great satisfaction and admiration of the elders, whose pristine occupation had made them more familiar with plundering and cattle-lifting than with literary attainments.

8th. As an extensive trade in wool has lately sprung up at the town of Nya Nuggur, the villagers have been recommended to keep flocks of sheep. Independently of the direct profit accruing from this branch of farming, which is calculated to give an annual return of from 14 to 16 annas a head in the sale of the wool, manure and milk from ewes, the country is admirably adapted for the maintenance of flocks, through the browsing offered in the hills, at all seasons of the year. During drought or scanty rains, cows,



buffaloes, and bullocks, must be provided with forage, or in failure thereof, the cattle must be driven to a distance where fodder is available. But with sheep, the supply of forage is unfailing; at the same time that the increase of manure conduces to the fertility of the soil and heaviness of the crops, while the owners enjoy the benefit of the milk, and are not forced to leave the country. Moreover the project, while involving only the prime cost of stock, will lead to confirmed habits of thriftiness and wealth, at the same time it affords some occupation to the people without trenching on their more urgent duties as cultivators. A few villages have adopted the plan, which, after the public manner in which it has been recommended, may be allowed to make its own way.

9th. The above remarks embrace all the points which seem to call for notice. I have from year to year, through an unusually long period, had the honor to report on the steadily progressive improvement of the District and the people; yet on no former occasion has the aspect of the country been so satisfactory as at the present time. The untiring industry of the people has effected what the fondest hopes could hardly expect, and agricultural prosperity may be considered as having almost reached the culminating point.

SIR,

Revenue Department. I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 39, dated the 21st ultimo, communicating remarks connected with the revenue administration and condition of the District of Mairwara.

2nd. The Lieutenant-Governor has perused with much satisfaction your report of the prosperity now prevailing in Mairwara. The state of things which you describe would be most gratifying to any philanthropist; but to yourself the gratification must be greatly enhanced by the conviction that the happiness and growing wealth which you see around you, are the creation of your own energy and public spirit. This, no doubt, constitutes in itself a higher reward than it is in the power of any Government to bestow.

3rd. I am desired to take this opportunity of informing you, that it is the Lieutenant-Governor's intention to print the Reports and other important documents regarding the Settlement of Ajmeer and Mairwara, which have been brought on the records of the Government during the last five or six years. This will prove a useful and interesting Appendix to the Memoir which you have already published containing the earlier history of these Provinces.
