Officer starting a new Settlement to first of all carefully examine every Patwari in the District in writing, reading, and arithmetic up to compound division. It is simply incredible how ignorant some Patwaris are, and to try and teach these men to use a plane table is labour and time utterly lost. An examination of this kind would weed out at once all the utterly incompetents, and save an immense amount of trouble. A distinct ruling or principle is also needed to regulate the exemption of Patwaris from learning measurements. Length of service should be the main point considered. If only age is looked at, the Patwaris will all grow old at once.

"In addition to the instruction of the Rawalpindi Patwaris, the Kanungos have also been made over to the Settlement Department, and endeavours are being made to impart to them some knowledge of Settlement work. Two Kanungos have been got rid of, and I am told that two or three more cannot be taught, but as yet they are under instruction. A few of the Kanungos will probably be of some little assistance.

"The Shahpur Patwaris are also being instructed in measurements. Teachers have been appointed and the work is progressing slowly but satisfactorily. I can see that my estimate that three months' tuition would be sufficient, will be considerably exceeded. Pass certificates have been granted to eight. They seem a willing, intelligent lot of men.

"I have been engaged during the last week in appointing two Girdawars in each Tahsil except Murree. Each Superintendent sent me the four best Patwaris he had, and after hearing them read, asking them questions concerning their work, and examining them in writing, I selected the two best educated men. Each Girdawar will be put in charge of from 3 to 4 Patwaris and work as a Munsarin. The training they receive during Settlement ought to be of great value to them after the completion of Settlement operations. They will be paid from the Patwari fund."

"Field maps of 117 villages have also been prepared during the year. These have been prepared exclusively by Patwaris. A considerable amount of work has been done in preparing preliminary statements as shown in the statement below :—

"I understand a preliminary Statement to mean the Chitta-tasdiq and Fard Badr papers, which are prepared by the Munsarim and given to the Patwari before the field measurement of a village is commenced, and as the Chitta-tasdiq and 'Fard Badr' of 747 villages has been prepared, I have entered them in stage No. 2. I was particularly pleased with the extreme care with which several Munsarims had prepared these statements in villages that had been measured or where measurements were in progress. At first I thought they could not be correctly prepared until after the Khasra had been completed, but after I had learnt the mode of preparation the difficulties vanished. An intelligent Munsarim with the village pedigree table corrected up to date and a copy of the last annual papers, can prepare the "chitta-tasdiq" and "Fard Badr" almost without the Patwari's help; and with the Patwari's assistance the papers are prepared quickly and almost without an error. In Kahuta, Gujar Khan, and Rawalpindi the Munsarims whose village boundary maps had not been enlarged, and where the field map consequently could not be commenced at once, have been employed in completing the "chitta-tasdiq" work of their circles, so that once measurements commence they will have nothing to do but inspect, and hard enough work too."

21. Beside the above work, two valuable and extensive sets of crop experiments (Rabi and Kharif) were made and reported. I think I may say that no other work noticed. Crop experiments and reports are so valuable as those received from Mr. Steedman. A rough survey (girdawari) of the area under crop at each harvest was also made. And some progress was made during the cold season in the demarcation of the Forest Reserves of the Murree and Kabuta Tahsils. The work of the year has been very much up-hill. But the boundary demarcation has been completed; and it may be hoped that the Patwaris have been so far taught and disciplined, that the field measurements will now progress with rapidity. Mr. Steedman's management of the Settlement has so far been very successful.

AMBALLA PATWARI TRAINING SCHOOLS.

22. Three schools for the instruction of the Patwaris of the Amballa district were sanctioned in the Secretary, Government Panjáb's No. 495, dated 28th April, 1881. Mr. Walker, the Settlement Officer of Ludhiana, has been in charge, and he has furnished an instructive report of the past year's progress. Work was started in the 2nd quarter of the year; and by its close 60 Patwari candidates, residents of the district, had been trained. 60 Patwaris were then summoned to the schools, the candidates taking their place. These Patwaris were trained by February; and at the close of the year a second batch of the same number were under training. Meantime a third or 2 Tahsils of the District has been placed under Settlement, but in the other 4 Tahsils the work is still going on. And we may be confident that when at the close of the year now opening the Ludhiana establishment commences the Settlement of these 4 Tahsils, a very great improvement in the Patwari agency will have been established. The Kanungos are also being instructed. By the close of the year some 140 Patwaris and 60 candidates had been instructed, the total number of Patwaris in the district being 445. Besides the Settlement Officer has taken up 170 cases of inefficient Patwaris; some of whom were minors appointed contrary to rule, and others Hindi-writing Patwaris appointed since 1876; and in most cases has enforced the standing orders which had been overlooked; at the same time modifying his action where possible and suitable by extension of time or by substitution of relations. We still have a great deal of difficulty before us, before we can hope to make the Amballa Patwari agency efficient. There are old men who ought to be removed with the consideration that is due to their long service (and on this point, so far as concerns the Ludhiana district, proposals have been submitted for the Financial Commissioner's orders); and there are a number of unintelligent Hindi writers whom we cannot hope to teach. Still during the year the number of Hindi-writing Patwaris has decreased from 310 to 258, and that of Urdu writers has increased from 135 to 186; on the whole our difficulties are less than we anticipated, and the best men among the agency, Hindi writers not excepted, have responded to our efforts to teach them. The Patwaris are all thoroughly examined as to physical efficiency, and also in reading, writing, and mensuration before being sent out to survey: their instruction in these matters being completed, so far as necessary, before they are required to map in the field. The work which they are required to do, is exactly the same as they would be required to do, if Settlement operations were in progress; and the maps and papers prepared by them will be utilised as soon as the district is put under Settlement. Mr. Walker has taken great interest in the work with much success. I spent a few days in the tract in the middle of March.

SIMLA SETTLEMENT.

23. The Settlement of the Simla District was commenced in May of the year under report. The Patwari agency was very weak, there being only 5 Measurements and attestation. Patwaris in the whole district, and the annual papers had hitherto been kept in the roughest way. Consequently, I have been obliged to work with Amins. The measurement and attestation of the lower part of the Simla district, viz., the 2 Kalka villages, the Shiwa Ilacqua and Pargannah Bharauli, aggregating 16,000 acres and 2,400 holdings, was completed by the end of the year. Also during the 2nd and 3rd quarters of the year a little work was done in Kotkhai, in order to teach the Patwaris of that part of the district. I believe the Bharauli work to be fairly good; but the Superintendent has not managed it well. If the weather is favorable, I have some hopes of completing the Settlement of this district, or at least of the greatest portion of it during the year now opening. But I am not sure how far the rains may not hinder the work; and very little can be done usefully in the 4th quarter, when the snow falls. The plan of operations is to work with a small staff of officials, finishing one Ilacqua before commencing another.

24. I trust it will be apparent from the extracts which I have given from the reports of Settlement Officers, that we are now really making Settlements almost entirely by the Patwari agency. Settlement Officers proceed in doing this, only by moving about in camp continuously, both themselves and the Tahsil Superintendents. I append a statement of the number of days spent in camp by each officer down to the grade of Superintendent, in the same form as the statement given in para 26 of my last report:—

Appendix A. 16.

I am increasingly convinced of the extremely laborious and responsible character of the work of Settlement Officers, their native Extra Assistants, and Tahsil Superintendents. Settlement duties impose on all these officers personal exertions and severe responsibility of such a character, as no officer, either European or native, can discharge successfully for more than a limited number of years. And I am anxious that the Superintendents especially should, after each had done his fair and full share of this arduous work, be transferred to the ordinary line of the Revenue administration, in which their detailed knowledge of the agricultural communities of the Revenue assessment and Patwari agency must necessarily be very valuable. Every English officer feels the necessity for a change of this nature, after a certain number of years of Settlement work; and our Tahsil Superintendents feel the strain of unbroken Settlement duties in the same way.

25. I visited the interior of the Simla District in June last. The latter part of October and beginning of November (29 days) were spent by me in Sirsa. I then spent 19th days in the Rawalpindi District, and a month (18th December to 20th January) in the Hoshiarpur District. Assessment work then delayed me at Jalandhar for a month. From 22nd February to 24th March, I marched through the Ludhiana and Amballa Districts. The only district in which I made no tour was Jalandhar.

26. Of the Final Reports pending in my office at the close of last year only that of the Mooltan Settlement has been forwarded during the year under report. There are consequently three still pending disposal; viz., those of the Jhang, Muzaffargarh and Jhelum Districts. I have been practically prevented from forwarding the Jhelum Report by 2 circumstances; viz., that the Forest Settlement was incomplete; and that the Government's order on the assessment and Patwari agency were only issued in February last. The Jhang and Muzaffargarh reports were sent to the printer in August last; but the autumn sickness hindered the printing work; and though I hope to receive them complete in a few days, to the present moment neither of them have yet reached me. * I will endeavor to forward all three reports, before next camping season commences.

My case-work has again increased slightly. I decided 157 civil appeals; and 217 Revenue appeals; and there were pending at the close of the year, 57 of the first, and 41 of the second class of cases.

27. Of the crop girdawari work referred to at the close of my last year's report, the reports of the Settlement officers of each district contain some notice; of which the following is an abstract.

In Jalandhar a Kharif crop girdawari was made according to the old papers. This Rabi a girdawari is being made according to the new papers. Until the Settlement Officer comes to write the Assessment reports, he cannot say what the value of these girdawaris will be; but he says they ought to be useful. In Hoshiarpur the crop areas of 2 harvests together were this year recorded at one time. Time occupied in two Tahsils between 15 and 20 days, and in the other two Tahsils about 1 month. The Settlement Officer writes that in every way it is advisable to have crop areas recorded every year. In Ludhiana crop girdawaris were made for 2 harvests at same time. Time taken about 12 days. It is necessary to have the girdawari in December, as sowings go on into that month. By this arrangement there was no great interruption of the regular work. In Rawalpindi a rough girdawari of the area under crop at each harvest was made and results tabulated and filed in Settlement Officer's office. In Sirsa the crops of 5 harvests have now been observed, and the time occupied was about ten days on the average each harvest. Returns of the crops sown for each harvest have been obtained; which are for all practical purposes trustworthy and without which Settlement Officer would have been working altogether in the dark in making out the estimates for assessments. Besides this the knowledge of the agriculture of the district has been increased, and the Patwaris kept acquainted with the condition of their villages.

The results of this continuous observation of the crops prove of the greatest value in every Assessment report that is now submitted.

28. In conclusion I subjoin a table of the principal data of each Settlement now in progress, in the same form as the table at the end of my last year's report :—

I have the honor to submit the Annual Report of the Civil business transacted by this office for the past official year (1881-82). I also submit the usual Appendices A. and B.*

2. Mr. C. H. Spitta, Barrister-at Law, held charge of the duties of Government Advocate from 1st April to 23rd October 1881. On the 24th October I rejoined from a furlough to Europe, and held charge during the remaining portion of the year under report.

3. Appendix A. gives the usual detailed abstract of cases and questions referred to this office for opinion during the year, and the usual comparative tabular statement of references during the last 5 years is hereto subjoined.

The number of references during 1881-82 is thus 86 in excess of the average of the previous 5 years.

4. This appendix gives particulars of the original Civil Suits, to which Government was a party, conducted during the year. Fourteen such cases were conducted, and a brief statement of each is here given.

5. The particular facts connected with this case are given in para 11 of last year's Report. The preliminary issue fixed by Mr. Justice Plowden as to whether the trust created by the will of Muhammad Tukkee was a trust for charitable purposes within the meaning of Section 539, Civil Procedure Code, was found in favour of defendants, and the suit was therefore dismissed with costs. Mr. Justice Plowden disposed of the case in an elaborate judgment which left little room for doubt that, as the Code of Civil Procedure then stood, the suit did not fall within the scope of Section 539, and an appeal was not considered advisable. The judgment is published as No. 50 of the *Punjab Record* for 1882.

Appendix B. 2.

6. This was a suit for damages for alleged breach of contract by the officers of the Punjab Northern State Railway in connection with the supply of bricks to that Railway. The damages were laid at Rs. 1,23,717, and after a trial extending over 7 days, the Plaintiff's suit was dismissed with costs.

7. This was a suit against the Defendant, a Commissariat Agent, for an account, the claim being set down approximately at 2 lacs. The particulars of the claim will be found in para 14 of last year's Report. It was found impossible to get the evidence on commission or otherwise of almost the whole of the witnesses, and a full report of the case was submitted by me to the Military Department, under whose instructions the case had been instituted, recommending that it should be withdrawn. This was sanctioned, and the suit was accordingly withdrawn on 31st January, with liberty to bring a fresh suit should the required evidence be subsequently procurable, the defendant agreeing to receive half costs only.

8. In this case the Plaintiff, who was the Proprietor of the *Caledonian Press*, Mooltan, preferred a claim for Rs. 6,739-14-0 for printing done for and paper supplied to the Indus Valley State Railway. The suit was dismissed with costs by the Judicial Assistant of Mooltan.

9. This suit was instituted in the Court of the Judicial Assistant of Lahore against the Punjab Northern State Railway, for the balance of the value of 10,000 brick cubes and other profits on a contract entered into with the Plaintiff.

The facts, briefly stated, were that Plaintiff agreed to supply at a fixed price 10,000 cubes of a prescribed quality. He made some, but they were so inferior that only a few could be accepted, and the rest were rejected. Plea accordingly, and issue joined thereon. The Court erroneously threw the burden of proof on the defence, but, this notwithstanding, the Plaintiff's case was demonstrated to be without foundation, and was dismissed with costs.

10. This was a claim for a declaration of proprietary rights in a parcel of land near the Canal at Mooltan. The suit failed on a technical ground, but it is possible the Plaintiff may bring a fresh suit when the whole question of proprietorship in the banks of the Inundation Canals in the Mooltan District will have to be considered.

11. This was an action on a contract against the I. V. State Railway. The sum claimed was Rs. 19,809-13-11.

Issues were settled as follows :

1. Has valid notice of action been given by the Plaintiff.
2. Was there a contract express or implied to pay Plaintiff at the rates claimed by him, and was Defendant estopped from quoting the rates.
3. If not, at what rate is the Plaintiff entitled to be paid.
4. Is Plaintiff entitled to interest.

Having returned from furlough on the 24th October, I proceeded to Multan on the 25th, fortunately arriving the day before that fixed for final disposal of this case. I expected of course to find the evidence required ready : but, on the contrary, the Railway authorities professed themselves quite unable to furnish any proof on the most material points previously alleged by them, and at the last moment, thanks entirely to the good will of the plaintiff, I was enabled to compromise the case on terms which were approved by the Financial Commissioner, allowing to the plaintiff a sum only about Rs. 125 in excess of what a strict examination of his claims showed to be justly due to him, and one which, so far as it related to costs, certainly fell far short of his actual legal expenses.

This suit was in the Engineer-in-Chief's Department, not that of the Manager. My experience of Government suits furnishes no parallel to this one in the rashness of assertion and seeming indifference to the fate of the case displayed by the Department concerned : and had not a successful compromise rendered such a course needless, I should have felt it my duty to report to the Financial Commissioner the circumstances which would have assuredly led to a heavy decree being passed against the Government.

This was a regular suit against the President, Umballa Cantonment Committee, under Sec. 283 of Act X of 1877, for the value of property attached and sold by the Committee in execution of a decree gained by them against another person. It was heard by the Sub-Judge of Saharanpore, and was thrown out with costs for want of due notice under Sec. 424 of Act X of 1877. I should here state that this case arose out of several suits brought, without authority, by the Committee of Umballa Cantonment on behalf of Government. The Government rules regarding suits by or against the Secretary of State are from time to time overlooked, and great inconvenience results. This report contains references made on more than one occasion entirely in consequence of these illegal proceedings of this Committee: and the vexatious and protracted litigation in the suit of *Narain Das v. Secretary of State (Jullundur)*, referred to elsewhere is another outcome of the same system.

13. This was a suit in the Court of the Judicial Assistant, Gujranwala, against the P. N. State Railway for the sum of Rs. 8,550-2-8 on account of ballast said to have been supplied. Notice had not been given as required by Sec. 424, C. P. Code, and the suit was dismissed with costs on this ground.

14. This suit, which was previously brought in *forma pauperis* in 1879, and was finally thrown out in appeal in February 1880, as barred by limitation,* was re-instituted under cloak of a fresh claim, viz., "for the value of trees" standing on the ground resumed, and a sum of Rs. 2,083 was fixed by the plaintiff as their value at the time of resumption.

I may here observe that the claim for compensation as originally brought showed an item of Rs. 238 as the value of all the trees on the ground, 800 in number. The suit was tried by Major Lawrence, Judicial Assistant, Jullundur.

The pleas were various—1st, Limitation; 2ndly, that the grant was void *ab initio*; 3rdly, that it was personal to the grantee; 4thly, that the grant had been forfeited by violation of its terms; 5thly, that no compensation was claimable under the Bengal Military Regulations; and 6thly, that the sum claimed was excessive.

Issue was joined on all of these pleas, and estoppel was replied generally, in addition. Issues accordingly. The trial of the 6th Issue was by agreement postponed pending decision of the others. Evidence was recorded and the case was argued. After taking time to consider its judgment, the Court dismissed the suit on all the issues with costs.

It is satisfactory to be able to point, after a struggle lasting for several years, to a decision on the merits.

15. This was a suit to recover Rs. 579-7-0 on account of alleged excess freight charges on six consignments of wheat conveyed by rail from Mooltan to Sukkur. The suit was first brought against the S. P. & D. Railway Company, and a decree passed against them by a Native Extra Assistant Commissioner. The Company appealed on the ground that the contract was not with them but with the Indus Valley State Railway, and the Additional Commissioner, instead of dismissing the suit as against the Company, remanded the case with directions to join the Secretary of State as a defendant. The plaintiff's suit against Government failed for want of jurisdiction, and was dismissed with costs by the Judicial Assistant of Lahore.

16. This suit was for Rs. 500 damages for seizure of certain wood and charcoal by Mr. Elliot, Deputy Conservator of Forests, Rawalpindi, in his official capacity.

It was formerly instituted against the Secretary of State, but was thrown out.

It was then filed against Mr. Elliott personally. I advised that (*inter alia*) it was barred by time, Article 2 of the Schedule of Act XV, 1877, being applicable. This view was taken by the two first courts. On appeal to the Chief Court, Mr. Justice Rattigan disagreed. Mr. Justice Smyth held that no opinion could be arrived at on the point pending an elucidation of the facts of the case. It was therefore sent back for trial *de novo*.

Appendix B. 4.

For the defence it was pleaded,—

- (1).—That the claim was barred by time.
- (2).—That the defendant was not personally liable.
- (3).—That his action was justifiable under powers vested in him by the Hazara Forest Regulation, 1873.
- (4).—That it was justifiable under powers legally vested in him.
- (5).—That the damages were excessive.

Issue joined on these pleas and issues accordingly.

The case was tried by Mr. Troward, Judicial Assistant. Judgment was reserved. On 7th February Mr. Troward delivered his decision. He rejected the whole of the above defences, and decreed the sum of Rs. 26-10-8 with costs. I need only here point out that an appeal has been sanctioned, in which the errors into which, in spite of a careful and in many respects an able judgment, the court has fallen, will be set right. Of the ultimate dismissal of the suit there is no doubt: and in my opinion it is eminently one justifying a prosecution of the plaintiff for false evidence,—which Mr. Troward has found as a fact that he committed.

Mr. Elliot has been persecuted by this audacious and dishonest person, Ganesh Das, for more than three years: and if an application should be made by him to Government for my services with a view to his prosecution under Sec. 193, Indian Penal Code, I am of opinion that his request might properly be granted.

17. This was a suit for the value of a bale of Silk consigned by the Indus Valley State Railway to Amritsar, which was stolen *en route*. It was pleaded that **Muhammad Ibrahim Secretary of State** *versus* the Secretary of State was not liable, the value of the silk not having been declared at the time of delivery to the Railway. Also that the amount claimed was excessive. The plaintiff replied that it was not necessary to declare more than the nature of the article. Issue joined: also as to value. The case came on for issues on 9th February in Extra Assistant Commissioner's Court at Amritsar. By order of the court the trial of Issue 2nd was postponed pending a decision of the first issue of law.

The case was tried on the first issue. It was dismissed: but the court, sympathizing with the undoubted misfortune of the plaintiff, in whose case there was no reason to suspect a deliberate attempt to cheat the Indus Valley State Railway out of the extra insurance rate—refused Government its costs. I would here point out that in my opinion the court distinctly erred. Where a question of law is new or reasonably uncertain, and on the merits the claim (as here) is well founded, the court, if compelled on the question of law to dismiss the suit, may well refuse the defendant his costs. But where (as here) the legal point has been decided and published over and over again, not a tittle of doubt remaining upon it, and the suit is therefore due either to ignorance on the part of the plaintiff's legal adviser, or to a dishonest design to make its institution the fulcrum for pressure on the defendant to agree to some compromise, in my opinion it is the bounden duty of the court to mark its disapprobation by observing the general rule and making costs follow the result, leaving to the plaintiff such remedy, if any, against his evil counsellor as the law allows. Government can with impunity bear the loss of the costs: but if in lieu of Government the defendant had been a private individual, and the circumstances the same, an obvious injustice would have been done.

18. This was another suit against the Indus Valley State Railway, on account of *munj* **Chundu Mal** *versus* supplied for rafting sleepers. The amount of the claim was Rs. 708-8-0. **Secretary of State.**

The facts of the case are briefly these:—In September 1880, Major Sparks, Executive Engineer Indus Valley State Railway, was deputed by the Engineer-in-Chief, Kandahar State Railway, to Phillour, for the purpose of buying sleepers for the latter railway, then under construction. One of his subordinates, Fazldad Khan, appears to have without authority agreed with Chandu Mal for the purchase of 300 maunds of *munj*, to be delivered not later than 27th September 1880. Chandu Mal failed to deliver it on the date agreed upon, but some *munj* consigned by him to Fazldad Khan's name, arrived at Phillour on 3rd October. In order to get delivery he induced Fazldad Khan to sign the Railway note, and further got him to agree

to take over the munj, not under the expired agreement but independently of it, to use what he required and to return the rest. Fazldad Khan took a memo from him signed in Hindi to this effect. Subsequently, however, Chundu Mal repudiated this memo, and sued Fazldad Khan personally for the value of this munj. Losing his case on the plea that Fazldad Khan had acted as a known agent, Chundu Mul next sued Fazldad Khan jointly with the Secretary of State : and after the court had declined to hear an Assistant Engineer sent to represent the Indus Valley State Railway, the Government Advocate was directed to take up the defence. As against Fazldad Khan the suit was at once dismissed as *res judicata* with costs. As against the Secretary of State, the case was still pending at the close of 1881-82, and the result will be submitted in next year's report.

Appendix B.
Part II. Civil Appeals.

19. There were 10 civil appeal cases during the year under report. Of each in their order.

20. This was an appeal to the Chief Court from the order of the Commissioner of Rawalpindi rejecting plaintiff's appeal. The suit was brought by the Punjab Northern State Railway against Mr. Cooke without reference to the Financial Commissioner, and was for Rs. 10,000, forfeited by Mr. Cooke under a contract with the Punjab Northern State Railway. Mr. Cooke pleaded *inter alia* a set-off of Rs. 5,668-8-0, but this was erroneously disallowed by both the lower courts. There being no doubt of the validity of this set-off—which indeed the Punjab Northern State Railway authorities themselves admitted, an offer was made to Mr. Cooke by the Financial Commissioner's orders to allow him this set-off, and costs in proportion, he dropping his other grounds of appeal. This was ultimately arranged, and the Chief Court passed a decree by consent with costs as above, in a consolidated form. So far, therefore, as Mr. Cooke's claim was resisted in appeal, he failed, as he had failed before, on the merits. This suit is another instance of the inconvenience so commonly resulting from a disregard of the rules relating to Government suits. Had the proper course been taken, much litigation would have been avoided, and the costs which in bare justice were ultimately allowed to the defendant on his set-off, would have been saved.

21. This was a claim for Rs. 792-12-0 being the balance due for value of wood alleged to have been supplied to the Indus Valley State Railway. The Judicial Assistant, Mooltan, dismissed the suit, on the ground that plaintiff had accepted a previous payment in full of all demands, and having granted a receipt to that effect was estopped from bringing any further claim. On appeal by the Plaintiff, the Commissioner of Mooltan, in the absence of the appellant and his Pleader, went into the merits of the case instead of dismissing the appeal for default. The Plaintiff then preferred a special, or "second" appeal to the Chief Court, and it was at this stage that the aid of this office was asked for. The Chief Court remanded the case in order that the Commissioner might determine whether the appellant was or was not actually present when the appeal was heard in his court, and if not, to pass an order dismissing the appeal for default.

Ganesh Das versus Mr. Elliott, Deputy Conservator of Forests. (2 cases).

22. The facts of this case are given in para 16 of this Report. The Chief Court remanded the case in order to elucidate the facts.

23. This was an application under Sec. 622, Act X of 1877, to the Chief Court to revise the order of the Judicial Assistant, Umballa, in the long-protracted Raenwala suit which has been running on since the year 1875. The application was groundless, and was rejected with costs without the other side being called upon to oppose it. This ends the litigation in a case, trifling in amount, but of hidden importance. In it was virtually involved the large question of the rights of Government to the bank of the Western Jumna canal, and it is a matter for satisfaction that, although not technically, yet virtually, it may, by the issue of this suit, be said to have been established against all the world.

24. This was an appeal in the court of the Commissioner of Delhi from an order of the Judicial Assistant of Delhi dismissing the Plaintiff's suit. The Government Advocate was only called upon to appear for the first time at the appeal stage. The circumstances under which the suit was brought were briefly

these :—A nominal rent was assessed on the parcel of land in dispute and other similar lands in the city of Delhi, which are known and recorded as Taul lands, or late the property of the King of Delhi. This assertion of the right of Government was contested by the Plaintiff. The Plaintiff's main contention was that he had been in adverse possession for more than 17 years, but the Commissioner, holding that the 60 years' rule applied, dismissed the Plaintiff's appeal with costs. This was understood to be a test case.

25. This appeal was heard by the Commissioner Rawalpindi on 9th January. For the facts of the case I may refer to para 6 of this Report. The appeal was dismissed with costs. The Plaintiff has now preferred a second appeal to the Chief Court.

26. This was an appeal to the Chief Court to set aside the order of the Judge awarding Rs. 1,719 compensation for certain land taken up under Act X of 1870 at Delhi.

The Judge's procedure was indisputably irregular and illegal, and this was admitted at the hearing. The only question for argument was as to costs of the appeal. It was contended by the Appellant that an appeal lay on the ground that the Judge had disagreed with both the assessors. For the Government it was replied that this was not so, the award of one assessor having been withdrawn and a second substituted by him, in conformity with which latter the Judge gave his decree : and that therefore as a fact he did not in the end disagree with both assessors, although he had no power to require either assessor to reconsider his award. On this ground it was argued that the case should be sent back under Sec. 622 for proceedings *de novo*, and that the costs of the appeal should be disallowed, the appellant having mistaken his procedure (see No 48, *Punjab Record* 1878, Civil).

The court ordered as suggested, and allowed costs under Sec. 622 only. The case will therefore go back on the merits.

27. This was a proceeding in the Chief Court in connection with the transfer of a case from the Delhi to the Jullundhur Commissioner's Court, and need not be referred to in detail.

28. This was an appeal in the court of the Commissioner Mooltan from the decision of the Judicial Assistant, Multan, dismissing the Plaintiff's claim for Rs. 792-12-0, the claim being one brought against the Indus Valley State Railway for brushwood supplied for embanking purposes.

On the day fixed for hearing the appellant was not present in person or by pleader : but instead of dismissing the appeal in default the Commissioner tried and dismissed it on the merits. From this order the Plaintiff appealed to the Chief Court, by which the case was remanded to the Commissioner, with orders to ascertain whether on the day of his former decision the appellant was present or not : and if not, to now dismiss the appeal in default.

On the day fixed for hearing at Montgomery, evidence was produced to prove that the appellant had been absent : but the Commissioner was pleased to grant an adjournment at appellant's request, to enable him to rebut this evidence. This he ultimately failed to do, and on 16th March the appeal was dismissed, conformably to the Chief Court's order, in default. An application for rehearing was subsequently filed, and was refused by the Commissioner.

29. The following progress has been made in execution of decrees :—

(1). *Partab Singh*.—The instalment due by Partab Singh has been recovered and credited to Government in the Umballa treasury.

(2). *Bansi Lall*.—The whole of the costs decreed against Bansi Lall during the long course of litigation carried on by him, has been recovered and credited to Government.

(1). *Mr. G. P. Paul*.—Execution proceedings were taken out against Mr. Paul, and his arrest was applied for. He sought refuge in the Insolvent Court.

(4). *Mr. Cooke*.—The Rs. 3,807-7-4 decreed against Mr. Cooke, were duly realised.

- (5). *Mr. Collins.* The costs decreed against Mr. Collins, Rs 1,246-3-0, were recovered and credited.
- (6). *Hazur Bakhsh and Devi Dyal.*—The costs due by these men are still unpaid. Execution proceedings are pending.
- (7). *Wazir Ali.*—The costs in this case have not yet been recovered.
- (8). *Radha Ram.*—The costs in this case are also still outstanding.
- (9). *Kalka Das.*—The costs decreed in this case have been realised and credited.
- (10). *Narain Das.*—The Deputy Commissioner reports that this man, who is merely a nominal Plaintiff and nothing more, is a pauper, and that there is no prospect of recovering the costs. The Financial Commissioner has directed that they be abandoned.

30. The instalments in repayment of the loan of Rs 48,000, made to the family of the late Diwan Pundit Munphool, C.S.I., have, I am glad to say, been regularly paid.

31. I regret the delay which has taken place in the submission of this Report. I can only plead that the work has continued so to increase, that it is at times impossible to keep pace with it.

32. The services rendered during the past year by Mr. Sinclair, more than sustain the high character which he has steadily established for industry and ability, and have been invaluable to me.
