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READ—

The annual report on the land revenue administration of the Punjab for the year ending 30th September 1910, forwarded with letter No. 168, dated 27th February 1911, from the Senior Secretary to the Financial Commissioners, Punjab.

REMARKS.—The year 1909-10 was one of the most prosperous of recent times. The monsoon broke early, and rain was well and evenly distributed until the middle of September. The later rainfall was deficient in the Rawalpindi division, but elsewhere it minimised the effects of the comparatively dry winter which followed. Both harvests were accordingly good, the kharif being estimated at 21 per cent. above the quinquennial average, while the area sown in the rabi was 19 per cent. above the normal. The matured percentage of the rabi crop was 89, and the outturn was 14 per cent. above the normal. All the staple crops, except jowar and maize, did well. Wheat showed a yield 19 per cent. above normal and the yield of gram is returned at the surprising figure of 99 per cent. above normal. The total matured area of the Province was 25½ million acres, which is 16 per cent. above the average of the past five years.

Prices fell slowly, but were between 21 and 30 per cent. above what were the normal figures before 1906. It is interesting to notice that so many of the land-owning class held up their wheat stocks for the high prices which followed on the failure of the crop in North America.

2. The current land revenue demand was accordingly collected almost in its entirety. Drought in the sandy tracts of Jhelum and Shahpur and floods in Sialkot necessitated some suspensions, amounting in all to Rs. 73,000. The collections of outstanding arrears were satisfactory. At the close of the previous year the arrears stood at Rs. 38½ lakhs. Of this Rs. 23 lakhs were collected during the past year, Rs. 7½ lakhs were remitted, and Rs. 7½ lakhs remain suspended. The heavy arrears in the Delhi division have been nearly wiped out. The Lieutenant-Governor notes with satisfaction that these large collections have been made with the greatest ease and with increased punctuality, and His Honour is pleased to endorse the commendation which the Financial Commissioners bestow on district officers in this behalf.

3. The amendment of the statement of coercive processes (No. XV) which was promised in last year's report has been carried out, and the further improvement now suggested will distinguish between processes issued and those actually executed. The fact that resort to compulsion is so rare is further evidence of the lightness of our assessments, if indeed such evidence were needed in view of the statistics of incidence, which show that the land revenue falls on the cultivated area of the Province at the rate of Re. 1-1-8 per acre, and on the population at the rate of Re. 1-8-4 per head.

4. The fluctuating land revenue demand increased by a lakh of rupees and stood at Rs. 54 lakhs, of which only Rs. 15,000 remained uncollected. In deference to the wishes of the revenue-payers, fluctuating assessments have been replaced by fixed assessments in Karnal and Rohtak. The Lieutenant-Governor attaches great importance to the elasticity of our revenue system and notes with pleasure the readiness of the revenue authorities to meet the reasonable wishes of the people, both as to the form of the assessment and the method of realisation. The increasing popularity of remittance by money order, and the suggestion that local banks should pay in the land revenue on behalf of the lambardar, are signs of the times and evidence of material and mental progress.

5. The increase of nearly one lakh in revenue assignments is due mainly to revisions of assessment. The consolidation of *jagirs* by the acceptance of the rule of integral descent proceeds slowly, and many large assignees do not seem yet to have realised the advantages the rule secures.

The demand for miscellaneous revenue presents few features of interest, but steps should now be taken to recover the Jalpana arrears.

Advances under the Loans Acts were naturally small in a year of prosperity, while the recovery of large arrears was satisfactorily effected. The Lieutenant-Governor agrees that as co-operative credit advances Government aid should be withdrawn.

6. Three survey parties were at work in the Punjab during the year and good progress appears to have been made. It is especially important, now that fixed boundaries have been laid along the Punjab rivers, to have reliable data from which to relay any boundary that may temporarily disappear. These data can best be supplied by the Survey Department, but it is desirable that some estimate should be framed of the time that will be taken in carrying out this riverain survey and of the expense of the process. His Honour is glad to learn that the supply of accurate district maps, which has long been a serious want, is now engaging the attention of the Survey Department.

In district boundaries the principal alteration during the year was the transfer of the Sharakpur tahsil from Lahore to Gujranwala. The Lahore district is still left with an area of 2817 square miles and a population of 1,034,696 persons which includes 228,318 persons in the Lahore city, civil station and cantonment. Even with a fully organised outpost at Kasur it may be difficult for the Deputy Commissioner of the head-quarters station of the Province to control efficiently so large an area and population.

7. In a Province so prone to litigation, the continued state of peace between landlord and tenant is gratifying. The total number of revenue cases has fallen off from 186,000 to 176,000—the lowest figure since 1904-05. This no doubt has enabled the pending files of appellate courts to be reduced to reasonable proportions, and His Honour is glad to notice that the congestion which was apparent in Rawalpindi has been removed. The appointment of a second Financial Commissioner should enable the highest revenue court of the Province to keep pace with its appellate work. The revenue work of district officers has been greatly simplified by the abolition of the old Land Revenue and Tenancy Act rules and the Revenue Circulars. With the new Standing Orders and the three volumes of Land Acts and Manuals, the revenue officer has now an adequate digest of authority. Fair progress is reported in the provision of better accommodation for the storage of records, and the work of destruction of obsolete records is up to date in all but a few districts. It is hoped that the issue of new rules for the copying department and the copying agency will not be further postponed.

8. Although the irrigated area decreased owing to the abundant rain, the major canals—with the exception of one division of the Lower Jhelum Canal—have worked well during the year, and the great Triple Project is showing good progress towards completion. The condition of the minor canals can hardly be called satisfactory. There was a decrease in irrigation, and consequently in income, from the Gurgaon bunds, the Grey Canals in Ferozepore, and the Shahnahr in Hoshiarpur. On the other hand, action has been, or is being, taken to improve their working, and better results may be anticipated. The construction by the Deputy Commissioner of Montgomery of two new inundation canals to replace the Kitchin bund is, as the Commissioner says, a notable achievement, and His Honour's acknowledgments

are due to Mr. Irving. The allotment of sums of money to Deputy Commissioners for expenditure on protective or productive embankments is a move in the right direction, and promises good results. The experiment to be undertaken on the Maili Cho will be watched with interest, and may be fraught with important consequences, as the question of the amendment of the law and of further experiments in reclamation must depend largely on the experience gained with this torrent.

Experiments and investigations on the subject of well boring have shown that the artesian principle is understood in the sub-montane tracts, though it is doubtful if there is great scope for Government enterprise in this direction.

9. Fresh light has been thrown on the important subject of land-ownership and land-transfers by the preparation of the new statement No. III. The figures show that 62 per cent. of the mortgagees of land in the Province holding 53 per cent. of the area mortgaged are themselves members of agricultural tribes, while in the heavily mortgaged district of Gurdaspur three-fourths of the mortgages are held by agricultural tribes. As the Financial Commissioner remarks, a large mortgaged area does not necessarily indicate a lack of prosperity, nor does the omission to redeem a mortgage invariably connote inability to do so. During the year under report the total area redeemed from

mortgage was 415,000 acres and the area mortgaged was 310,000 acres. For these areas the money paid was 2 crores and $2\frac{1}{2}$ crores respectively. Better testimony of the increased value of land could hardly be desired. In this behalf however the revised figures of the last nine years deserve to be quoted, and the average sale price of an acre of cultivated land from 1901-02 to 1909-10 is given in the margin.

10. Under the Land Alienation Act slight alterations have been made to the schedule, so as to include the Tagas in Gurgaon, and to notify as separate groups various Brahman communities. The Financial Commissioners think it may be necessary to split up existing district groups into smaller groups, in order to protect the weaker members against land-grabbing at the hands of their agricultural brethren. The Lieutenant-Governor would assent to such a proposal with great reluctance, and trusts that the necessity may not arise. It is only natural that as the Act becomes better known, endeavours to evade it should become more common and more ingenious. It is clear, however, that Deputy Commissioners are on the look out for instances of evasion, and the Lieutenant-Governor is confident that so long as the working of the Act receives the attention which the present Financial Commissioners have bestowed on it, the benefits of its main provisions will be secured to those for whose protection it was framed. A more serious feature in the situation however is the fact that the net excess area alienated by agricultural tribes is returned as 15,066 acres. This disquieting result is brought out by the revised form of the statement (No. V), which now shows not only the persons redeeming land but also the persons from whom it has been redeemed. The figures have not been explained by the Financial Commissioners, but the Lieutenant-Governor would be glad if they could offer some explanation. No doubt the figures for mortgages and redemptions are not mutually exclusive, but if it is the case that the agricultural tribes are losing land even to the extent of 15,000 acres yearly, the position would appear to call for investigation.

11. This is perhaps the last revenue report in the compilation of which the Hon'ble Mr. Douie will take a part. The Lieutenant-Governor therefore seizes this opportunity to express to him the acknowledgments of the Punjab Government for the numerous improvements which during his long service as a

revenue officer and latterly as Settlement and Financial Commissioner he has effected in our revenue system. Not the least of these has been the compilation of the Settlement Manual, the Land Administration Manual and the revision of the Financial Commissioners' Circulars in the form of Standing Orders, a work which has greatly simplified the task of all those who have to make themselves acquainted with our necessarily intricate revenue administration.

ORDER.—Ordered that the above remarks be printed and circulated with the report; that they be published in the *Punjab Gazette*; communicated to the Financial Commissioners, Punjab, and forwarded to the Government of India, Department of Revenue and Agriculture, with the usual number of spare copies.

Ordered also that a copy of the report and of the above review be forwarded to the Surveyor-General of India with reference to paragraph 6.

REPORT

ON THE

LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION

OF THE

PUNJAB

FOR THE

AGRICULTURAL YEAR, 1ST OCTOBER 1909 TO 30TH SEPTEMBER 1910.

1. The proposal to reconstitute the second appointment of Financial Commissioner, which was abolished in 1897, and to abolish the appointments of the Settlement Commissioner, then created, and of the Excise Commissioner, received the sanction of the Secretary of State in August last. The new arrangements, however, did not actually come into force until after the close of the year under report.

Introductory.

2. (a) A week of very wet weather in the latter part of April greatly assisted cotton sowings in the Delhi division and to a lesser degree sugarcane and cotton sowings in the Central Punjab. The monsoon was an early one, general rainfall being reported by the 3rd week of June: well distributed rain was obtained until the middle of September, this being a normal date for the cessation of the monsoon fall. Throughout the province with a few local exceptions the monsoon was one of the best of recent years. The later rainfall was very deficient in Attock and Mianwali and parts of the Shahpur and Jhelam districts. The sown area was 11,947,321 acres, about 3 per cent. below normal and 16 per cent. of the crops sown failed. Taking area and yield together the crop is estimated as 21 per cent. above the quinquennial average which however is below what may be considered normal.

General summary of agricultural conditions.
Kharif, 1909.

(b) The winter rainfall was considerably in defect throughout most of the province but the later monsoon fall made less rain necessary and, except in the tracts which were deprived of the later monsoon, the conditions were very favourable. The sown area amounted to 17,700,729 acres which is estimated to be 19 per cent. above normal. The percentage returned as matured was 89. The yields were in general excellent and the crop was a bumper one, 14 per cent. above normal.

Rabi, 1910.

(c) The total matured area of the year was 25,724,729 acres, which is 16 per cent. above the average of the last five years. Outturns were distinctly satisfactory, except in the case of *jowar* and *maize* which suffered from the abundant rainfall. The all important wheat crop is returned with a yield 19 per cent. above normal, *toria* did excellently, and the yield of gram for the province is given as 99 per cent. above normal.

General results of both harvests.

(d) The favourable character of the rainfall in both harvests occasioned some fall in the irrigated area, which amounted to 34 per cent. of the total area sown.

Irrigation.

(e) The prices of food grains have gradually fallen but sold at harvest time at rates between 21 and 30 per cent. above the average of a normal year preceding 1906-07. A feature of this year's prices was that agriculturists were able to hold up the bulk of the wheat surplus of 1910 for

Prices.

higher rates, which followed upon the failure of the North American crop, and large profits were made. The failure of American and Egyptian cotton occasioned an unprecedented rise in the price of cotton, while *gur* declined very slightly in price.

3. Statement No. III was sanctioned by Government upon the abolition of the report on the Land Alienation Act. It provides information not otherwise available, which is derived from Statement 6 of the Agricultural Statistics. It will be seen that the total area shown is some four million acres less than that in Statement I. This is due apparently to the exclusion in Kangra, Gujrat, Attock, and Montgomery of large areas of Government forest and waste areas, and in Lahore and Lyallpur of areas held by Government tenants in colony areas. Owing to the omission to ask for orders on the subject the practice in both respects has not been uniform and the necessary orders will now issue. The variations in Mianwali and Muzaffargarh are due to the transfer of the Leiah tahsil from the former to the latter district. All districts have not shown separately the area of *shamilat*, village *abadi* and Government property.

The statement shows that, leaving out of account village *shamilat*, approximately three and a half million proprietors distributed over three million holdings own an average of 12 acres each of which $7\frac{1}{4}$ are cultivated and on which the revenue assessment is Rs. 7-10-0. Approximately one-seventh of the revenue is paid by persons who do not belong to scheduled agricultural tribes. $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the total cultivated area of the province as shown in this statement (or approximately $3\frac{1}{2}$ million acres) are held on usufructuary mortgage, under more than a million mortgages; each mortgage includes an average of 4 acres of land, including 3 acres cultivated assessed at Rs. 3-6-0. Sixty-two per cent. of the mortgagees paying 58 per cent. of the revenue of the mortgaged land are members of scheduled tribes. The only districts in which more than 20 per cent. of the cultivated area is mortgaged are Sialkot and Gurdaspur. A large mortgaged area does not necessarily indicate lack of prosperity, and in Gurdaspur three-fourths of the mortgages are held by members of scheduled agricultural tribes. The above figures may be taken as fairly accurate though the provincial percentage is to some extent increased by the omission from the statement of the colony areas which are of course unmortgaged. The result shows a slight increase in the cultivated area mortgaged and in the percentage of that area to total cultivated over the figure shown against "ownership" in columns 22 and 23 of Statement III of last year, with which alone comparison can now be made. This is probably due to greater accuracy in the preparation of the figures.

4. *Gifts and Exchanges*.—The number of gifts and exchanges has again increased, though the area exchanged is less than in the previous year. In Lahore the transfers by several mahants at Nankana Sahib of land standing in their own names to that of the shrines in their charge have been treated as gifts. In Montgomery owners have been making alienations in favour of their sons in order to multiply holdings in the hope of getting land on the Lower Bari Doab Canal. A similar process has been noticed elsewhere. The exchanges are to a large extent transactions with a view to consolidate holdings, but the exchanges of right of occupancy are mainly Colony "tabadals" or "killabandi" transfers.

Mortgages.—The orders referred to last year, under which the practice of recording mutations of fictitious redemption and remortgage in certain cases was discontinued, have not reduced the total number of transactions, as was anticipated, and there is a slight total increase under both heads, though the district variations are considerable. Many Deputy Commissioners point out that in consequence of the rise in the value of land many mortgages are being redeemed with the object of remortgaging a smaller area for the amount of the debt. The extent to which this is possible is obvious from the fact that the total area hypothecated was mortgaged at Rs. 81 per acre whereas the debt on the land redeemed was Rs. 48-1-0 per acre only. Moreover, as pointed out by the Deputy Commissioner, Jhang, many of the new mortgages are for periods of less than 20 years.

Sales.—It has been necessary to exclude from the sale statement an additional area of 60,704 acres part of land sold in Muzaffargarh in 1895 but only recently brought on to the record in circumstances explained last year. With this alteration the statement shows that almost exactly the same area was sold as in the previous year for a price greater by over Rs. 12 lakhs and amounting to Rs. 116 per acre cultivated.

An obvious deduction, as to the lightness of the land revenue demand in the province as a whole can be drawn from the multiple of the land revenue at which land sells in the Punjab. For ownership only the districts shewing the highest results (exclusive of Simla and Lyallpur) are—

Of course all data of this sort are affected by the high prices obtained for land near towns: but the effect of such sales on figures deduced from the sale price of over 2½ lakhs of acres cannot be very great. Subject to the above, data of this kind furnish a good test of the comparative pitch of the assessments in different tracts and next year a column will be added to Statement IV to shew at a glance what the multiple is in each district.

5. Owing to an alteration in Revenue register No. 5 it has been necessary to recalculate columns 1-9 of Statement VI and 1-6 of Statement VII and to show figures for "ownership" rights transferred only, exclusive of transactions in talukdari and occupancy rights. The change however is in itself desirable. The tendencies disclosed by the new figures do not differ from those previously observed.

On the figures of the present year the owner of a cultivated acre of proprietary land can now obtain Rs. 121 an acre for his right or Rs. 132 for every rupee of land revenue that he pays upon it.

The mortgage abstract discloses that for the last 6 years there has been a sustained excess of the cultivated area redeemed over that mortgaged. It is anomalous that the cultivated area under mortgage should show an increase when redemptions continue to exceed mortgages. The Financial Commissioner can only suppose that the present figures for cultivation are more accurate as regards area than those previously reported.

6. (a) The fixed land revenue roll of the province is now Rs. 2,08,66,993: an increase of Rs. 3,20,070 over the previous year's figure. Re-assessments in the Delhi division account for a net increase of 3½ lakhs and progressive assessments for a further Rs. 12,000. The heavy dilution of the previous year, however, occasioned a reduction of some Rs. 35,000 and further substitutions of fluctuating for fixed assessments in Gujranwala reduced the roll of that district by over Rs. 10,000. Small sums shown as transferred from Montgomery and Jhang are not shown as increases in Lyallpur and Shahpur for the reason that on transfer the estates in question were placed under fluctuating assessment.

(b) Ninety-nine per cent. of the current demand has been recovered. The uncollected balance is shown as Rs. 1,90,422 but of this some Rs. 1,06,000 is irrecoverable or "undetermined" and will be remitted. This irrecoverable balance is made up of amounts remitted on account of floods and dilution, and also includes some Rs. 25,000 in Shahpur on account of fixed assessments which have been superseded by fluctuation in the Bhera Chenab Assessment Circle. The "undetermined" balance is chiefly occasioned by reductions of the demand on re-assessment in the case of individual villages in Karnal where the new assessments, though imposed during the year, have not yet been adjusted on the fixed land revenue roll.

The recoverable balance of the current demand amounts to Rs. 84,000 of which Rs. 73,000 are under suspension. Floods necessitated suspensions in several districts, notably Sialkot, but the bulk of the suspensions given were on account of drought in the Mohar and Thal tracts in Shahpur and Jhelam which have been suffering for some seasons from unfavourable conditions.

(c). The recoverable balance outstanding at the close of the previous year was Rs. 38½ lakhs, practically the whole of which was under suspension. Of this Rs. 23 lakhs have been collected, Rs. 7¼ lakhs are still under suspension and about Rs. 7¼ lakhs have been remitted. The collection of suspended arrears in all the plains districts of the Delhi division has been particularly heavy, aggregating Rs. 18 lakhs. In the Gurgaon district alone the recoveries amounted to Rs. 7,38,000 or 59 per cent. of the annual demand. Comparatively speaking, the recovery of Rs. 1,48,000 in Gurdaspur and of Rs. 1,31,000 in Sialkot is equally satisfactory. The care with which these arrears have been collected reflects great credit on district officers generally.

The remissions have been given principally in the districts of Gurgaon, Rohtak, Karnal and Delhi, where the introduction of the new demand necessitated a review of the situation.

(d). The total collections of fixed land revenue on the roll aggregated Rs. 2,29,94,908 or 12 per cent. in excess of the current demand. The collections have been made, practically everywhere, with the greatest ease and with increased punctuality. The total outstandings have been reduced to Rs. 17½ lakhs and, what is more important, the recoverable balance, which two years ago stood at Rs. 56 lakhs, has now been reduced from Rs. 38½ lakhs reported last year to under Rs. 8¼ lakhs. The suspended arrears in the Delhi division now amount to Rs. 6¼ lakhs only and, except in the Delhi district, are not excessive, though attention is still required. On the other hand, the suspensions in Jhelam and to a lesser extent in Shahpur are now serious.

7. Dilluvion inquiries into the changes in fixed assessment occasioned by the action of the main rivers and torrents were held in 23 districts. In Statement No. XIII a distinction has been made this year between the changes due in each district to the rivers and to the torrents. As a result of the inquiries a sum of Rs. 29,847 was added to, and Rs. 50,129 deducted from, the demand. The nett *khalsa* amount which will be deducted from the fixed land revenue roll of the province next year is Rs. 18,920. Practically every district shows a loss, gains being returned only on the Jamna in Gurgaon, the Jhelam in Gujrat, and the torrents in Jalandhar, Shahpur and Dera Ghazi Khan.

New rules were introduced during the year in Gurgaon and are reported to have worked satisfactorily.

8. Excluding an item Rs. 1¼ lakhs in Karnal which represents the current year's demand from the increased fixed assessments imposed on resettlement but not yet brought on the roll, the demand for fluctuating land revenue temporarily off the roll is normal at about Rs. 50,000.

Small additional areas have been placed under permanent fluctuating assessments in Gurgaon, Delhi, Gujranwala, and Shahpur but on the other hand, in Karnal and Rohtak the previous fluctuating assessments have been abolished on resettlement because of the unpopularity of the system. On certain sections of the Chenab Canal the *malikana* rates have been enhanced under the conditions and the land revenue rates in the Sohag Para Colony have been slightly increased during the year, but elsewhere there has been no change. It is important to be able to compare the actual results of fluctuating assessments with the estimates framed by Settlement Officers and an addition has been made to the annual demand statements with this object. In Mianwali the rule that patwaris should in the first instance estimate the *kharaba* has now been altered, and in future the kanungo will make the estimate in this district, the patwari merely marking the field as one to be looked at for that purpose.

The current year's demand for permanent fluctuating land revenue is Rs. 54 lakhs, or Rs. one lakh in excess of the previous year's figures. The chief increases occur in Gurgaon, Mianwali and Lyallpur and have been explained above. Of this demand only Rs. 15,674 remained uncollected at the close of the year. The sum of Rs. 42,400 was outstanding at the close of the previous year. This has now been reduced to Rs. 7,334 by the collection of Rs. 28,499 and by the remission apparently of Rs. 6,567, the only considerable outstanding being now in Montgomery where, however, the previous balance has been greatly reduced. The total amount outstanding inclusive of previous year's arrears is Rs. 23,008.

9. The demand on account of other land revenue amounted to Rs. 19,36,221, of which Rs. 18,90,872 were collected. The greater part of

the balance outstanding is due in Shahpur district where some difficulty appears to have been encountered in getting in nazrana demands. Rupees 9,60,000 were derived from the sale of Government estates in the Chenab and Sidbnaï Colonies and of Crown lands in the Delhi and Muzaffargarh districts. The orders for the sale of the Muzaffargarh land were only recently given, but Rs. 17,000 have already been collected. Rupees 2,39,000 were obtained from nazrana and sale of waste land, almost entirely in the Jhelam and Chunian Colonies. Sale of town sites account for Rs. 1½ lakhs, principally consisting of recoveries of balances due from Jaranwala in Lyallpur, the site of which was auctioned in the previous year. Tirni receipts (Rs. 1½ lakhs) are about normal, but the income from single harvest leases is lower than in the previous year, owing to shorter receipts in Multan and Montgomery. Under the head "Other items," the income was practically Rs. 2½ lakhs. This income will be greatly reduced if the imposition of rents on sites in villages in the Chenab Colony is discontinued, as is now proposed.

The balance outstanding of the previous year was Rs. 1,27,290. Of this Rs. 39,251 only have been recovered. Rupees 3,702 have been remitted and Rs. 84,337 are still outstanding. Of this balance Rs. 71,800 are due from the Jalpana estate, of which mention has been made in previous reports. Nothing apparently has been paid off during the year, but the estate has now cleared off the unsecured debts due to money-lenders, and should now begin to pay the nazrana due to Government. The total amount outstanding at the close of the year including both arrears and current demand amounted to Rs. 1,29,686.

10. The total amount of assigned land revenue has increased by nearly a lakh of rupees over last year's figures and now stands at Rs. 29,41,357.

Land Revenue Assignments. Statement XIV.
Most of this increase is due to settlement operations, which in the Karnal District alone are responsible for an enhancement of Rs. 58,000 in the assignments. The Deputy Commissioner of Sialkot alludes to the numbers of petty *m'afis* with which the registers are burdened. As districts come under settlement the registers are being lightened by the operation of the procedure described in paragraph 570 of the Settlement Manual.

11. The improvements in Statement XV promised in paragraph 12 of last year's report have been carried out and the return now deals with

land revenue arrears only. Processes of any description against lambardars were only resorted to in 3,837 cases for the collection of Rs. 7,86,370 of revenue, and of these practically half were "writs," a process which can hardly be said to be "coercive." On the application of lambardars 9,237 processes for the collection of Rs. 3,80,713 were issued. The great majority of the 2,897 writs for arrest probably fulfilled their object without the defaulting headman being actually detained at the tahsil. Serious cases of coercive processes may be considered to be those falling under the heads of imprisonment, 4 cases, sale of moveable property, 91 cases, transfers and farms, 4 cases, and attachment of immoveable property, 5 cases. In Rohtak and Gurgaon, from which 64 of the sales are returned, the figures seem to relate to orders for sale of moveables. It is explained by the Deputy Commissioner of Gurgaon, that, while there were 46 warrants for sale, in only 10 cases did sale finally take place. Arrangements will be made to obtain information in future as to the processes which are not only issued but also executed.

In Hissar the fewness of the processes is explained by a local order, now cancelled, that a reference should be made to the Deputy Commissioner before any process could be issued. In one of the Jhelam tahsils it was found to be the practice to include, in the amounts to be recovered for lambardars, interest on the outstanding amounts and writing fees, also malba. Steps were taken by the Financial Commissioner to make the prohibition of this practice generally known.

12. The actual income from process fees for the financial year 1909-10, was Rs. 14,534 and the actual expenditure Rs. 1,667. The fee was raised with the sanction of the Government of India from 12 annas to one rupee per service in all cases where the demand involved is more than Rs. 5: by Financial Commissioner's Notification No. 105, dated 9th May 1910. The increase took effect after the close of the financial year to which the above figures relate. Processes are now practically invariably served by the ordinary establishment, and Deputy Commissioners seldom find it necessary to supplement that establishment by temporary men.

13. The departmental topographical survey parties working in the Punjab were Nos. 12, 14, and 18. No. 12 Party was at work in the canal irrigated area of Jhang, Lyallpur and Shahpur; No. 14 in Rawalpindi, Jhelam, Gujrat and Shahpur; and No. 18, which has now been transferred to the United Provinces, in Attock, Mianwali and Shahpur. Except in the broken and intricate area of the Salt Range, where a 2" survey was carried out, the survey was on the 1" scale.

The cost of the riverain detachment of No. 18 Party is borne by the Punjab Government. Mr. Douie wishes to acknowledge the cordial co-operation of Mr. Maya Das Puri the officer in charge, in the work of surveying riverain villages. With the help of the marks set up by this party it will in future be a simple matter to relay a fixed riverain boundary between two estates or districts which has become obliterated. The cadastral survey of riverain villages is, moreover, now based on traverse points laid down by scientific agency. It seems desirable to obtain from the officer in charge an annual note on the work done, and the Financial Commissioner will take the necessary action to obtain one. The laying down of 25 acre rectangles in the area to be irrigated by the Lower Bari Doab Canal, where base rectangles were laid some years ago by the Survey Department, has been very recently begun.

An investigation into the standard district maps of the province was made during the year and a list published with Financial Commissioner's Circular Memo. No. 7, dated 8th September 1910. An unsatisfactory state of things was revealed as many districts have no suitable map, and in more than one case maps specially ordered for the use of district officers from the Survey Department have not been supplied to Deputy Commissioners and are not now obtainable. The attention of the department has been drawn to the matter.

14. The principal changes in boundaries effected during the year have been the transfer of Sharakpur tahsil from the Lahore to the Gujranwala district and the re-arrangement of the Rohtak, Gohana, and Jhajjar tahsils of Rohtak in consequence of the abolition of the Sampla tahsil. A few additional villages have been transferred from Montgomery to Lyallpur bringing down the boundary of the latter district to the Deg stream.

The Deputy Commissioner of Mianwali reports that the boundary case between his district and Dera Ismail Khan has been settled but that the boundary with Kohat is still under dispute.

Mr. Douie met the Hon'ble Mr. Baillie in March and discussed the proposed fixed boundary on the Jamna between the Punjab and the United Provinces. A draft bill was prepared and forwarded to the United Provinces Government, but the Financial Commissioner has now been informed that the scheme has been rejected.
