

15. The accommodation required for new settlement records has been provided in Hissar, Delhi and Karnal.
Record Rooms.

A new record room is under construction in Sialkot, and proposals for increased accommodation in Gurdaspur, Amritsar and Ludhiana are under consideration. The new record room at Gujranwala is reported to be too small to receive the records transferred from the Sharakpur tahsil.

The destruction of old records has been satisfactorily carried out. Arrears are reported large in Karnal, Ludhiana, Amritsar and Multan.

The new rules for the copying department and the copying agency have been delayed by a question affecting the financial aspect of the scheme. The working of the copying agency is generally satisfactory.

16. The Financial Commissioner has recently been asked to suggest an amendment of the Land Revenue Act, making it possible to draw up records-of-rights for towns which are not assessed to land revenue, and to report in what other respects the Act needs revision. In the recommendations made Mr. Douie has taken the opportunity to include certain changes rendered desirable by the appointment of the 2nd Financial Commissioner, and other amendments in partition procedure and in the provisions as to the management of lands held in common which seem to him to be required.

17. *Facilities for the payment of land revenue.*—The popularity of the money-order for the payment of small sums due to Government is well established.
Other matters.

The Deputy Commissioner of Attock suggests that it should be made one of the patwari's duties to assist lambardars by filling in the money-order form. The report on the permission given in Lyallpur, Shahpur and Gujranwala districts to remit land revenue in whole currency notes, which was required by Punjab Government letter No. 27, dated 12th January 1910, was due after the year under notice and the subject has not been dealt with by the Deputy Commissioners of the districts in question in their annual reports.

The Deputy Commissioner, Lyallpur, reported emphatically during the year against the proposal referred to last year to allow the local banks to pay in land revenue for lambardars. Mr. Maynard, however, was in favour of giving a trial to a system under which the lambardar would send in by registered letter an *arz-irsal* and cheque on an approved bank for the sum due. Mr. Meredith ordered further enquiries to be made this cold weather and was prepared to make a recommendation to Government if any general desire was shewn for the facility suggested.

Dates of instalments.—In Multan, Jhang and Muzaffargarh one instalment only has now been fixed for kharif payments (January 5th). In Karnal single instalments have been ordered but the date for two assessment circles is different from that adopted for the others. The object is to mitigate the inconvenience caused to headmen and the tahsil staff when very large payments are made on a single date. In Amritsar, with the same object, separate dates are fixed under local orders for each zail. In the Ballabgarh tahsil of the Delhi district the date of payment of the kharif instalment has been changed from the 15th December to the 15th January, and in the Delhi civil division the date of the kharif instalment of canal revenue has been changed from 15th to 30th January. In Mianwali two instalments—15th December and 15th January—have been fixed for the kharif instalment and one—the 15th July—for the rabi.

Publications.—The old Land Revenue and Tenancy Act rules and the Revenue Circulars were cancelled with effect from April 1st, 1910, from which date the new rules and Standing Orders came into effect. A translation of the Land Administration Manual is in the press and the translation of the Standing Orders is being taken in hand. On the suggestion of the Commissioner of Jalandhar forms of decree have been authorized for use in certain common classes of rent suits and the forms will shortly be issued. It is hoped that the forms will lead to greater preciseness in the terms of the decrees passed.

18. The total number of decided suits for the enhancement or reduction of cash rents of occupancy tenants, Statement XVI, shows practically no variation from that of the previous year. The only special features of the figures returned are the increase in litigation in Rohtak and Gurgaon due to the settlements recently completed and the smallness of the reduction in Hoshiarpur, where it was thought that most of the cases arising had been cleared off. More than one Deputy Commissioner deplores the want of provision in the Tenancy Act enabling the Settlement Officer to alter executively a lump sum rent originally fixed with reference to a revenue demand which has been altered on re-assessment. It appears, however, that the required adjustment, even in Rohtak and Attock where there has been most difficulty, is usually made by consent of the parties.

19. (a) Decrees for ejectment were passed in eight cases only, of which seven were in Attock. The number of notices of ejectment served under section 44 (i) rose to 121, the increase being practically confined to districts about to come under resettlement. How unimportant this class of work is may be judged from the fact that ejectment of occupancy tenants was made in 14 cases only in the whole province.

(b) Proceedings against tenants-at-will have been far more numerous than in the preceding year. This is ascribed in part to the continuance of favourable seasons and the increase in prices which enable landlords to deal more firmly with recalcitrant tenants. Settlement proceedings usually lead to activity among landlords against tenants-at-will, both in the direction of obtaining a judicial decision that the tenant has no occupancy right and, after the new revenues have been announced, of securing higher rents from the tenant by a threat of ejectment.

20. Declarations of a rule of integral descent were notified during the year in the case of four jagirs, two in the Ludhiana and two in the Gurdaspur district. In all cases the declarations were based on written instruments. The approximate value of the jagirs with which the notifications were concerned was Rs. 4,450 in Ludhiana, and Rs. 5,650 in Gurdaspur. Up to date 128 jagirs, valued at Rs. 7,80,000, have been gazetted under the Act. Further action is being taken by district officers, and several cases are under consideration.

21. Owing to the favourable rainfall the general report is that supplies in the canals were sufficient during the year. The Deputy Commissioner of Hissar, however, complains of lack of water and expresses a hope that, if extensions of the Western Jamna Canal are carried out, the needs of the villages which at present receive an inadequate supply will be considered first of all. Obviously the proper policy to pursue, should more water become available, is that indicated by Mr. Watson. The Deputy Commissioner of Jhang reports that efforts have now been made with success to supply the proprietary villages at the tail of the Lower Chenab Canal: he draws attention to the unsatisfactory condition of irrigation in the 3rd Division of the Lower Jhelam Canal, where it is stated that there are general complaints of rotten banks, constant breaches, and intermittent supplies. The Deputy Commissioner of Multan gives a satisfactory account of the working of the departmental inundation canals in his district, but adds that "there is a general desire for the restoration of the chher system as people think that clearances were done better and in time."

Minor Canals Act (Punjab Act III of 1905).

22. By notifications issued during the year—

(1) Revised schedules of water rates have been prescribed for—

(a) The Sarusti Canal.

(b) The Grey Canals.

(c) The Kiran Canal.

(2) The Delhi bands and Najafgarh drain have been included in Schedule I; water rates have been prescribed and rules issued.

- (3) The Puran stream in Karnal District has been included in Schedule II.
- (4) "Chher" has been abolished in the proprietary villages on the Kitchin Canals and the water rates already levied in Government estates have been extended to private estates also.
- (5) The liabilities specified in section 52 (i) (a) of the Act have been held to apply to the Gurgaon bands.

23. The transfer of the Rangoi Canal from departmental management to that of the Deputy Commissioner, which has been held in abeyance for some years, pending the Settlement Officer's proposals, will now be carried out.

Recently, on a reference by the Commissioner of Jullundur, the Financial Commissioner has recommended that service on canals notified under the Minor Canals Act should be exempted from the rule requiring a minimum pensionable service of ten years in order to permit of young and active men being transferred to this class of work, and it is understood that the Government of India have been addressed.

The enhanced schedule of water-rates for the Gurgaon bands came into force at the beginning of the year, but the management of these embankment was not taken over by Government until the 1st April 1910. The matured area irrigated fell to 5,825 acres, owing to poor winter rainfall, and the water-rate demand to Rs. 7,647. It appears that the increase in water-rates has led to a tendency to refuse to take water. The District Board is now concerned only to recover arrears of demands due for the period of its management. For the six months of Government control the demand due, including a small income from trees and grass, but excluding fees to lampardars for collection of the demand, amounted to Rs. 7,172, of which Rs. 6,715 were collected. The demand is well above the estimate of Rs. 6,000 per annum furnished in Financial Commissioner's letter No. 147-S., dated 21st June 1909. The balance outstanding is less than usual. The above figures do not include the initial grant by Government of Rs. 5,000, nor the annual grant of Rs. 6,000. The expenditure reported amounts to Rs. 3,184 mainly on establishment. It is too soon yet to form any opinion on the new arrangements so recently introduced.

The Delhi bands remain under the District Board and the Najafgarh drain under the Deputy Commissioner. The new water-rates came into force in Khariif 1910.

The Sarusti Canal, which is managed by the District Board, has been more successful than in the two preceding years: the matured area, 16,610 acres, is 50 per cent. higher than the figures of the previous year: and the water-rate demand, the new schedule for which came into force in Rabi 1910, amounted to Rs. 29,038. The actual receipts were Rs. 27,255 and expenses Rs. 38,960, resulting in a nett loss to the District Board of Rs. 11,705. Of this expenditure, however, Rs. 14,213 represented repayment of instalments of the loan taken for the construction of the canal. The District Board has under consideration a proposal to abolish the canal patwari staff and to entrust the canal work to the revenue patwaris, thus reducing expenditure.

Part of the Sarusti steam and the Puran Ghagar will shortly be included in schedule I. The notifications, schedules of water-rates and rules are now under the Financial Commissioner's consideration. Meanwhile the small additional staff sanctioned by Government has been employed in directing the spontaneous efforts of the people. Major Buck, however, reports that the ardour of the people has cooled down considerably since he first submitted his proposals.

Irrigation on the Shahnahr has further shrunk during the year to 14,286 acres, from which, however, Government has derived the substantial sum of Rs. 21,175 in land revenue. The canal account again shows a surplus:

the receipts having been Rs. 22,792 and expenditure Rs. 17,197. The accumulated surplus is now Rs. 58,886. Mr. McGregor, Assistant Engineer, was deputed during the year at the expense of the canal fund to advise on the best method of utilising the surplus to effect improvements. His report has been received and is still under consideration.

The condition of the Grey canals still causes anxiety. The irrigated area has decreased from 188,163 to 178,482 acres and the decrease in the sown area is 38,487 acres. Remodelling is going on in the Mamdot parts of the system, where the Mamdot estate is spending a large sum under the supervision of an Engineer paid from the Mamdot Fund.

The receipts on the Kiran Canal, which is managed by the District Board amounted to Rs. 610 and expenditure to Rs. 173. The enhanced water-rates will increase the income in future and the District Board is taking up the question of improving the irrigation.

Owing to a change in the river the Kitchin Band ceased to hold up water and two new inundation canals, the "Kitchin canals", have been dug to assist the villages which depended on the band. These canals will be able to irrigate some 56,000 acres of land and actually irrigated last year, while under construction, some 27,000 acres. The work was carried out without any cash outlay by Government and, as remarked by Mr. Maynard, the Commissioner, has been a very notable achievement for which the credit is due to the Deputy Commissioner Mr. Irving. It has now been decided to give up the old "chher" system which obtained in proprietary villages and water-rates will in future be charged throughout.

The other small canals in the Montgomery District have done satisfactorily during the year and call for no comment.

Minor improvements were made in tahsil Isakhel. The Deputy Commissioner brings to notice the work of M. Sher Ali Khan, Offg. Tahsildar, owing to whose energetic supervision the year's results in this tahsil were satisfactory. In Mianwali the irrigation from cuts from the river was very successful, the matured area rising to 49,000 acres. Owing to the poorness of the 1909 monsoon the hill torrent irrigation was less satisfactory, but 13,905 acres of crops were recorded as matured.

No work was necessary in the Bhakkar tahsil and the special establishment worked in Mianwali and Isakhel only.

24. The area of land acquired for public purposes was 8,763 acres. Of this 3,911 acres were required for railway construction and extensions in various parts of the Province, the chief projects being the Digana-Hissar, the Patti-Kasur, the Sutlej Valley, Chichoki-Shorkot, and Kalabagh-Bannu lines, and the doubling of the N.-W. Ry., main line in the Ambala and Ludhiana districts. For the new works on the Upper Chenab and Upper Jhelum Canals and for extensions of existing canals 2,481 acres were acquired. Other objects for which land was taken up under the Act were Grass Farms in Sialkot and Delhi, the new town at Churatta in the Dera Ghazi Khan District, and court-houses and residences for civil officers in Jallandhar and Dharmasala.

Statement No. XVIII now shows the number of years' purchase of the land revenue represented by the price of land acquired which is subject to assessment. Unfortunately this additional information, as reported by Deputy Commissioners, is of little assistance in comparing the rate of compensation awarded in different districts. With one or two exceptions no care has been taken to exclude from the compensation the price paid for buildings or trees. Unless this is done the calculation is meaningless. Detailed instructions will be issued for the preparation of next year's report. The Deputy Commissioner of Lahore notes the importance of land acquisition proceedings in his district. The area

required for extensions of the railway works at Lahore Junction and Badami Bagh, amounted to 843 acres, the cost of acquisition amounting to some Rs. 800 per acre. These cases are now pending in the civil court and a special Divisional Judge has been sanctioned to work off the arrears. The Deputy Commissioner suggests that a more summary procedure is desirable. Recent land acquisition proceedings in Lahore should furnish material for a discussion of land values in the environs of that city, which would serve as a guide for officers acquiring land in urban areas elsewhere. The Deputy Commissioner has been asked to submit such a report on the conclusion of the proceedings now pending. It is noticeable that references to the civil court are rarely made in cases where land is acquired for canals. In the Sialkot district 135 acres were acquired for the Upper Chenab Canal without a single objection to the Collector's award. On the other hand, acquisition for a railway or a market appears to stimulate references to the civil court. Nor is the result of these references discouraging to those objecting to the Collector's award. The Deputy Commissioner of Hissar, for instance, reports that compensation for land acquired for the remote Dabwali market was raised by the civil court from Rs. 160 to 640 per acre, a rate which compares favourably with compensation given for land in the vicinity of Ambala city and Kalka town.

25. Owing to favourable seasons the amount advanced under Act XIX Loans Acts. Statements XVIII, XIX, XX, XXI, XXII, of 1883 (Land Improvements Loans) and XXIII. was smaller than that in any of the five preceding years with the exception of 1905-06, while advances under Act XII of 1884 (Agriculturists Loans Act) fell below the figure for any of these years. Good harvests afforded an excellent opportunity for clearing accounts, and recoveries both of principal and interest were satisfactory, as the following figures indicate:—

Rupees 6,599 on account of interest have been remitted during the year in the Hissar district. Under Act XII of 1884 suspensions of principal due were large only in the Hissar district, (Rs. 17,478). Realizations in the Lahore district were very satisfactory.

The present state of the loan account throughout the province is an appropriate opportunity for the introduction of the greatly simplified system of accounts contained in the new Loans Circular which issued in September last. If revenue accountants are adequately instructed in the use of the new system when the work is comparatively light much confusion will be avoided in times of scarcity and heavy advances.

The total of the advances during the year under Act XIX of 1883 amounted to Rs. 1,52,639. Over Rs. 20,000 were advanced in Gurgaon and Multan for masonry wells, while loans amounting to over Rs. 10,000 were made in Montgomery for wells and water-courses, in Muzaffargarh for wells, and in Attock for wells and dams. In the last district 17 new wells and 39 dams were completed during the year under report. The Commissioner of Rawalpindi remarks, "the distribution of takavi loans is a most important branch of revenue administration in the Attock district. It is, I think, being conducted with very satisfactory results." Twenty-four new dams were also constructed with the aid of loans

from Government in the Rawalpindi district. Works appear to have been regularly inspected, and care to have been taken that the loans are applied to the objects for which they are granted. Three hundred and sixty new wells were completed from takavi advances, the largest numbers being reported from Gurgaon (32), Jalandhar (24), Ludhiana (86), Sialkot (22), Multan (57), Muzaffargarh (35). The number of wells sunk without the help of a Government loan was, according to Statement XX, 8,320. Of these 1,159 were in the single district of Ludhiana, from which, as pointed out in paragraph 26 of last year's report, no new wells had been returned for ten years. Apparently very many wells have now been credited to the year under report, which were actually constructed at an earlier date.

Advances amounting to Rs. 1,78,520 were made during the year under Act XII of 1884. Loans amounting to over Rs. 30,000 were distributed in Muzaffargarh and Mianwali, over Rs. 20,000, in Montgomery, and over Rs. 10,000 in Amritsar (chiefly in the Ajnala tahsil), Gurdaspur, Sialkot, Multan, and Dera Ghazi Khan. On the other hand Rs. 4,380 sufficed for the whole of the Delhi division. The Commissioner of Lahore notes the high prices of plough cattle in the Gurdaspur and Sialkot districts, which is attributed, and with reason, to the hide and bone trade. The *zamindars* are said to prefer selling for a few rupees animals which have become weak or lame rather than as formerly to attempt to nurse them to health again. The Deputy Commissioner of Gurdaspur considers that the amounts lent for the purchase of plough bullocks should be greatly increased. As appears from paragraph 38 of the last report on Co-operative Credit Societies, 25 per cent. of the amounts advanced by village banks is for the purchase of seed and bullocks, and Mr. Douie hopes that where the Co-operative Credit system takes firm root the banks may become able in ordinary years to relieve Government of the necessity of using Act XII of 1884 to any large extent. The Commissioner of Multan considers that systematic attempts should be made to verify the proper application of loans granted under this Act in view of the large advances made in the Multan division.

Statement No. XX shows that Government has gained Rs. 98,236 in the operations under both acts. The result for the past six years has been a net gain of Rs. 93,969 under Act XIX of 1883 and a net loss of Rs. 79,652 under Act XII of 1884. The figures in Statement XX are supplied by the Accountant General. They differ widely from those given in Statement XXI.

26. There is no further progress to report on the forest settlement of the Lahore *rakhs* referred to in last year's report nor on the reservation of the areas required for irrigated plantations on the canals of the Triple Project, except that the proceedings in one of the *rakhs* selected on the Upper Chenab Canal have been practically completed. The notification is delayed till the boundaries of the *rakh* with adjoining villages has been rectified.

The revised rules for cutting wood in protected forests in Rawalpindi were sanctioned and issued during the year. The Deputy Commissioner reports that the new rules introduced last year for the management of the Government owned trees on private and common lands in the hill tracts of this district have so far worked admirably and given a genuine relief to the people. The Commissioner states that his impression is that in Murree and Kahuta the people are generally content with the management of the protected forests and *guzaras*. The policy initiated last year of associating men of distinction and influence in the management and protection of Government trees has been quite successful, and an attempt will be made to find more men of suitable class to entrust with the necessary authority.

27. The report of the special officer deputed to enquire into the Crown lands in and around Delhi city has not yet been received by the Financial Commissioner. The Settlement Officer, however, has reported on the action taken by him to sell to the tenants agricultural lands in that district not in the immediate neighbourhood of the city. The instalments fixed are being paid up and before long this property, which has always given considerable trouble, will have been finally disposed of. In Muzaffargarh in a similar case the sale of the Government land at the price offered is proceeding steadily.

Forest Act (VII of 1878).

Government lands. Statement XXIV.

Two rakhs in Dera Ghazi Khan, previously unclassed forests under the management of the Forest Department, have been transferred to the Deputy Commissioner and thrown open to cultivating leases. A considerable increase in establishment was sanctioned for the management of the rakhs in the charge of the Deputy Commissioner of Montgomery, where the demand for wood has risen, owing to the opening up of the country by the Sutlej Valley Railway. The extra outlay will be more than covered by the additional receipts. Thus in the year under report the total income from the rakhs from all sources exceeded that of the previous year by Rs. 41,018.

28. A committee to consider the subject of arresting the denudation of the Punjab hill tracts met at Rawalpindi in March 1910 and submitted its recommendations to Government. The committee's proposals for the amendment of the Act and for the constitution of a land improvement committee entrusted with the expenditure of a lakh of rupees yearly were negatived.

A small sum of money was placed at the disposal of the Deputy Commissioner of Hoshiarpur for expenditure on reclamation work in the beds of chos. The construction of two embankments at a cost of Rs. 662 seems a meagre result. In the plains an attempt at action under Section 8 of the Act is to be undertaken on the Mahli Cho. It is anticipated that at first about Rs. 10,000 per annum only will be required.

It has been found unnecessary to take any action under the Act in Karnal and Ambala, but Rs. 2,000 have been placed at the disposal of the Deputy Commissioner of the latter district for expenditure on small protective works, rewards, and small grants-in-aid.

29. The only alteration in district groups of agricultural tribes was the notification of the Gurgaon Tagas. The notifications constituting as separate groups, the Gaur Brahmans in the Delhi division, the Una Brahmans in Hoshiarpur, the Rawalpindi Brahmans, and the Jhelum Muhial Brahmans and Gadhiok Kanungos referred to last year, were published during the year. Similar action has also been taken in the case of the agricultural divisions of the Kangra Brahmans and of the Kakezais in Jhelam. The Deputy Commissioner of Rohtak reports that some dissatisfaction is felt by the Gaur Brahmans of his district, owing to the impossibility of alienating, without sanction, to Jats; and the Deputy Commissioner of Hoshiarpur reports that the Brahmans of Una are not altogether satisfied with the action taken.

Continual applications for notification are presented. Action has been refused in many cases, as for example those of the Bedis of Gurdaspur, the Kalals of Ambala, the Sadikis of Karnal, the Datt Brahmans of Gurdaspur, the Gadhioks of Chakwal town and the Babla Bhatias of Multan. Government has been asked to affirm once more the refusal to notify the Shekh Ansaris of Jalandhar whose case has again been re-opened. Several Deputy Commissioners refer to the land-grabbing carried on by many members of agricultural tribes. It may ultimately be necessary in some classes to split up existing district groups into smaller groups.

30. Standing Order No. 1 now deals with orders under the Land Alienation Act, but the special mutation procedure is included in Standing Order No. 23. The Act itself with the notifications issued under it has been printed in the volume of Land Administration Acts. The separate Alienation Hand Book has in consequence become obsolete.

The Deputy Commissioners of Ambala and Gujrat bring to notice a matter which had also come to the Financial Commissioner's notice when on tour in Gujranwala. It appears to be a general custom to enter the holder of an illegal mortgage, in whose name mutation has been refused, as a tenant-at-will. Orders have now issued that his name must not appear in the jamabandi at all unless he himself cultivates the land, in which case he will be entered as a tenant-at-will under the owner of the land.

31. A good deal of attention has been paid to *benami* transactions in the district reports. In some districts these transactions are not uncommon. The Deputy Commissioner of Ambala writes:—

“*Benami* transactions are becoming numerous in the district especially in the Ambala, Jagadhri, and Naraingarh tahsils.

The names of the zamindars are entered in the revenue papers, yet the actual landlords are the Banias who take produce or realize rents from the tenants. And as the Bania takes a bond from the nominal vendee or mortgagee which he keeps hanging over his head like the sword of Damocles, the latter is powerless to do anything. It has not been possible to collect accurate statistics of such transactions, because a large number of the members of the subordinate revenue agency being of the same class, sympathises with the Banias but in the Naraingarh tahsil alone, there were 54 such transactions of sale for Rs. 9,000 involving an area of about 150 acres, and 19 of mortgage for Rs. 3,175 for an area about 50 acres during the year under report. The above figures are only a fraction of the evil that is being wrought. Though the Banias are not in cultivating possession of such lands yet they have managed to get themselves entered as tenants-at-will at revenue rates. Such fictitious tenants were ordered to be struck off by the Director of Land Records, and his orders are being carried out as cases come to light.”

The order referred to in paragraph 30 should do something to check this abuse. Mutation should always be refused when the transferee shown in the deed is known not to be the real mortgagee. And there should be no hesitation in reviewing the mutation order at any time when the unreal nature of the transaction comes to light. Any wilful winking at fictitious mortgages by revenue subordinates or officers attesting mutations should be severely dealt with. Mr. Douie doubts whether such transactions will ever be numerous enough to seriously interfere, with the working of the Act, if care is taken that no sort of recognition of them in our records is permitted.

32. Statement V shews that agricultural tribes have gained 5,844 acres on sale transactions. They have lost ground in 6 districts only during the year. The chief changes are, in acres Hissar+2,310, Ferozepore+1,074, Lahore—952, Sialkot—887, Shahpur+1,041, Montgomery+1,135.

The excess of area mortgaged *by*, over that mortgaged *to*, agricultural tribes is given as 24,829 acres. The figures for the last four years shew a continuous rise in this excess which is not by any means counterbalanced by the excess of area redeemed *by*, from that redeemed *from*, agricultural tribes.

Complete figures for redemptions have not hitherto been obtained, as in previous reports returns for the persons redeeming have alone been obtained without regard to the persons with whom the land was previously mortgaged. The figures show that the area redeemed *by* agricultural tribes exceeded that redeemed *from* them by 4,919 acres only and was actually less in eleven districts. The nett result from sales and mortgages is as follows,—

33. Except in Delhi judicial appellate work was heavier in all divisions and particularly in Rawalpindi. There was, however, a considerable reduction in the Financial Commissioner's Court. Disposals have kept pace with the increase in institutions. Executive appeals shew a considerable reduction, though in the offices of the Settlement Commissioner and Financial Commissioner there was some increase. The pending file has now been reduced to reasonable proportions, the mass of outstanding cases in Rawalpindi having been worked off during the year. In only 16 per cent. of cases were executive appeals successful. Judicial revision cases in the Financial Commissioner's court were far fewer than in the previous year, but executive revision cases were somewhat

greater in number. In the former 6 per cent. and in the latter 5 per cent. of the cases obtained any measure of success. The fact that the chance of success is minute has little or no effect in cooling the ardour of litigants.

The total number of revenue cases disposed of in district courts and offices has again fallen and is now returned at 176,604, the pending file moreover has been reduced from 19,794 to 17,863. The largest number of outstanding cases is shewn by Hoshiarpur, but comparatively speaking, the number of cases pending is largest in Gujrat, Shahpur, Jhelam, and Dera Ghazi Khan, where it amounts to more than two months' work. The chief decrease is shewn under miscellaneous Revenue Officer's cases, mainly accounted for by the Lahore figures. There appears to have been some change in classification in this district, as Revenue Officer's cases under the Land Revenue Act shew a corresponding increase. Under this latter head, however, Karnal shows a very large decrease which is explained as being due to the completion of the settlement. A large increase in work is shewn under the Land Alienation Act, chiefly caused by the high figures returned from Rawalpindi. The Deputy Commissioner explains that the increase is mainly due to the number of applications for leave to sell to artisans under Financial Commissioner's circular letter No. 14 of 25th March 1909. The constitution of additional groups in various districts also increases the number of cases in which sanction to sell has to be obtained. The state of the work is generally reported to be satisfactory, but the Commissioner of Rawalpindi complains of the character of the partition work in Shahpur. It is too much to hope that this is the only district in which partition work, which is one of the best tests of the quality of a tahsildar or Extra Assistant Commissioner as a revenue officer, is not satisfactory. Mr. Douie, when Commissioner of Rawalpindi, issued instructions pointing out how the defects which came to notice in cases belonging to that division could be prevented.

Delhi.—The Hon'ble Mr. A. Meredith, was Commissioner for the whole year and spent 71 days on tour.

Jullundur.—The Hon'ble Lieut.-Colonel H. S. P. Davies was Commissioner for the whole year and spent 110 days on tour.

Lahore.—The Hon'ble Lieut.-Colonel C. C. Parsons was Commissioner for the whole year and spent 121 days on tour.

Rawalpindi.—The Hon'ble Mr. J. M. Douie, C.S.I., held charge for 117 days and spent 13 days on tour; Mr. C. J. Hallifax for 183 days and spent 31 days on tour; Mr. P. J. Fagan for 65 days and spent 16 days on tour; Mr. Hallifax was in charge during the first four months of the cold weather, but the fact that he was also carrying out the duties of the office of Excise Commissioner probably interfered with his touring.

Multan.—Mr. P. J. Fagan held charge for 221 days and spent 52 days on tour; Mr. J. J. Maynard for 144 days of which he spent 82 days on tour.

Settlement.—The Hon'ble Mr. A. H. Diack, C.V.O., was Settlement Commissioner for the whole year and spent 142 days on tour.
