MAP OF THE PUNJAB

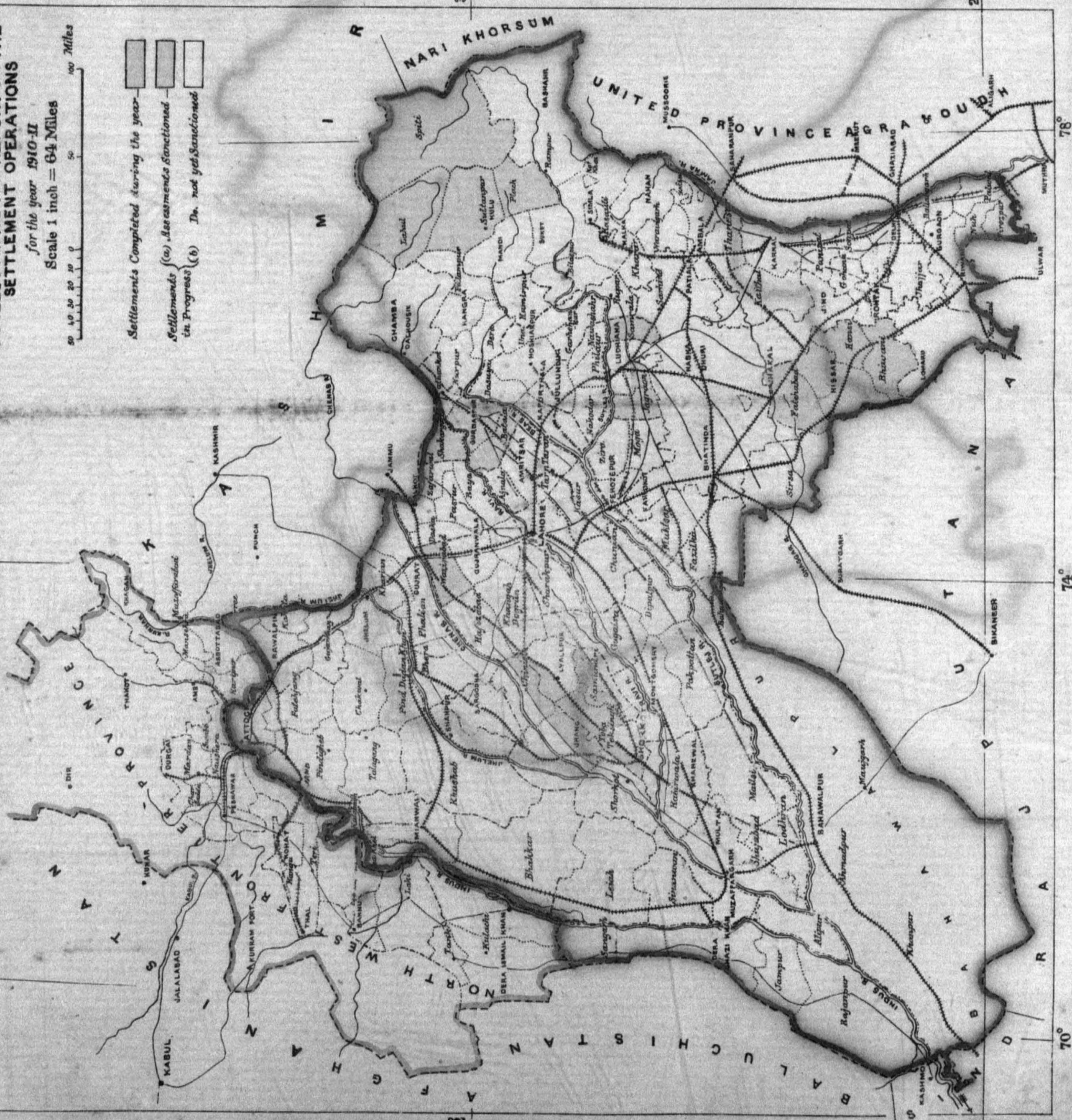

REPORT

OF THE

PUNJAB

FOR THE

AGRICULTURAL YEAR ENDING THE 30TH SEPTEMBER 1912.

1. The year 1911-12 marks the end of a quinquennial period, and the figures in statement I have accordingly been brought up to date. No new districts have been formed during the period. The Leiah tahsil was transferred from Mianwali to Muzaffargarh and the Sharakpur tahsil from Lahore to Gujranwala. The Mianwali district was transferred from the Multan to the Rawalpindi division, Montgomery from Lahore to Multan, and a much needed relief thereby given to the Commissioner of Lahore.

General.
Statement I.

Settlements during the last five years have been unusually important, and the districts that have been subjected to re-assessment are Hissar, Rohtak, Gurgaon, Delhi, Karnal, Kangra (including Kulu), Hoshiarpur, Ludhiana, Ferozepore, Gurdaspur, Amritsar, Sialkot, Gujranwala, Lyallpur and part of Shahpur. More than half the province has thus been under settlement during the past five years. The total cultivated area of the province stands much where it did five years ago. The actual figures show a decrease of 4 per cent. The largest decrease is under *sailab* which shows a falling-off of 695,000 acres, nearly balanced by an increase of 565,000 acres of *barani* cultivation. Pure *chahi* shows a decrease of 201,000 acres corresponding to a decrease of 5,942 in the number of masonry wells in use. The decrease in wells is partly due to increased irrigation from canals, but principally to the prosperity of the seasons, wells in the Punjab being in many localities maintained as a reserve supply in case of failure of the rains. The increase in *barani* cultivation also indicates a period of good rainfall and prosperity.

The total assessment of land revenue has risen by 48½ lakhs since 1906-07, of which 40 are fluctuating revenue. In 1906-07 the incidence of the land revenue demand per acre of cultivation was Re. 1-0-2 per acre. It is now Rs. 1-3-0.

2. (a) *Kharif* 1911.—Drought during April and May made the *kharif* sowings 36 per cent. below normal. The monsoon arrived early, but after the first burst in June there was no rain till late in August. The rains ended in September, and of the small *kharif* crops sown 31 per cent. failed.

General summary of agricultural conditions.

(b) *Rabi* 1912.—Welcome rain, however, was received on the 26th of October and again in November, and unusually large areas were sown for the *rabi* harvest. Good rain fell also in January, but little from then till April, and of the area sown, which was 13 per cent. above the average, 14 per cent. failed to mature. The harvest was, however, a good 18-anna crop and, though below expectation in some districts, created a record in Delhi and Rawalpindi.

(c) *General result*.—From the point of view of Government the excellence of the *rabi* made up for the failure of the *kharif*, though there was considerable shortage of fodder crops. The total matured area of the year was 2,000,000 acres below the normal.

(d) *Irrigation*.—The feature of the year's irrigation is the large increase as compared with the previous year of 400,000 acres in well cultivation and of 570,000 acres watered from canals, due to the shortage of rain first in July and August and afterwards in February and March.

(e) *Prices*.—Prices rose considerably with the exception of cotton which, however, fell but little below the record price it reached in the previous year. Wheat touched Rs. 3-13-0 per maund in April, and was never lower than Rs. 3-2-9, while the cheapest grain varied from Rs. 2-3-6 to Rs. 2-10-6.

3. The fixed land revenue demand of the Province stands at Rs. 2,13,73,969, an increase of Rs. 47,616 only over last year's figures. Increases due to re-assessment occurred in Hissar and Ludhiana, partly counterbalanced in Hissar by the substitution of a fluctuating assessment in parts of the Fatehabad tahsil. Other additions and deductions are normal. Of the current demand 97.2 per cent. was recovered, a remarkable result considering the extensive failure of the kharif, and due to the balance being redressed by a bumper rabi. The outstanding balance of the current demand is Rs. 5,95,391, of which Rs. 5,10,856 are under suspension and Rs. 5,465 recoverable arrears not under suspension. The irrecoverable balance is Rs. 77,919, of which Rs. 21,274 were remitted on account of calamities of season.

At the close of last year the outstanding balance was Rs. 5,79,430, of which Rs. 3,86,345 were classed as recoverable and Rs. 1,93,085 as undetermined or irrecoverable. Of these sums, in the year under report, Rs. 1,80,353 were struck off, while Rs. 2,12,050 were recovered, and Rs. 1,90,206 remain as balance. The increase in the balance of Rs. 3,179 is due to refunds.

Collections of the current demand were over 90 per cent. in all districts except Jhelum and Shahpur. This high percentage of collections is due, as observed above, to the splendid rabi of 1912 which enabled district officers to collect a large proportion of the revenue suspended in the kharif. The suspensions of that harvest amounted to 13½ lakhs (principally in the Delhi and Rawalpindi divisions and in the Gurdaspur, Sialkot and Gujranwala districts of Lahore), and the suspended revenue which was collected in the rabi was upwards of 10½ lakhs. There is reason to suppose that the tendency in allowing suspensions was to err on the side of liberality, for a scrutiny of the monthly collection statements sometimes brought to light payments considerably in excess of the demand as reduced in consequence of suspensions. In the Rawalpindi division, for instance, revenue-payers had paid in by the end of July half a lakh more than they were required to pay, i.e., about 30 per cent. of their arrears.

4. Owing to the scanty monsoon there were fewer large floods than usual and consequently fewer changes in the course of the big rivers. Last year 43,376 acres were removed from assessment owing to river action. This year the figure is 29,648 acres only, which corresponds almost exactly with the area newly assessed owing to alluvion during the year. The nett decrease in the fixed land revenue demand from this cause is Rs. 12,442 only.

The big rivers are again responsible for nearly all the changes, the action of chos and minor streams being comparatively unimportant. The largest loss of revenue, Rs. 5,759, is reported from Lahore, and is due entirely to the action of the Ravi. Nett increases of assessment are shewn by Gurgaon, Delhi, Jullundur, Sialkot, Gujranwala, Attock and Dera Ghazi Khan.

5. The amount of land revenue temporarily off the fixed land revenue roll was Rs. 92,000, of which Rs. 42,000 is due to the revision of assessment in Gurdaspur. The amount of land revenue permanently off the fixed land revenue roll rose from 71 lakhs to 87 lakhs. The important increases are entirely due to reassessment in the Canal Colonies, Lyallpur showing an increase of 10 lakhs, Shahpur 6 lakhs, and Jhang 1 lakh. Land revenue assessed by the Deputy Commissioner on canal-irrigated land

shows decreases of Rs. 73,000 in Multan and of Rs. 12,000 in Dera Ghazi Khan. In Multan the canals began to flow late and closed early. The largest decrease of irrigation is on the Lower Sutlej series.

In last year's report the Financial Commissioner expressed his intention of examining the general working of fluctuating assessments. The results of this examination show that in Jhang the Settlement Officer's estimate has been gradually worked up to and has been in 1911-12 exceeded by 14 per cent., showing that the development anticipated by Mr. Abbott has now been fully attained. In Mianwali the Settlement Officer's estimate was reached for the first time last year, while the average collections since settlement have been Rs. 43,000 below it. In 1911-12 the collections were Rs. 34,000 below the estimate. It is explained that the failure of the rains in Mianwali and Isa Khel tahsils caused crop failure in the kharif to the extent of 39 per cent., which the Commissioner considers fair. In Muzaffargarh the Settlement Officer's estimate has been exceeded for the last two years, while the average demand since settlement falls short of the estimate by Rs. 25,000. In Dera Ghazi Khan the average demand since Settlement coincides with the Settlement Officer's estimate. In Multan the Settlement Officer's estimate was ten lakhs. This figure has been exceeded in the last two years, but the average since settlement is $9\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs, the shortage being in the Shujabad tahsil and in the Sidhnai Colony. The Financial Commissioner has called for further figures and is investigating the cause of this. In Montgomery, which was cited last year, the Settlement Officer's estimate was Rs. 60,000. The highest amount realised since settlement is Rs. 38,000 in 1910-11. In 1911-12 the demand was Rs. 23,000. Here, as observed last year, the Settlement Officer's estimate appears to have been based on a series of exceptionally good years.

The most notable divergence from the estimate occurred in Hissar, where the demand was Rs. 12,000 against an estimate of Rs. 59,000. The scanty floods in the Ghaggar, Rangoi and Joya streams account for this difference.

In last year's review the Lieutenant-Governor attributed the poor collections of fluctuating revenue to improper working of the rules and inadequate supervision on the part of Collectors. Though the Financial Commissioner's enquiries are not yet complete, he is inclined to think that on the whole the results are not unsatisfactory; but it is essential to the proper working of a fluctuating system that the district officer should himself take an interest in it and by examining its operation from harvest to harvest should secure that the revenue due to Government is obtained, or, if that is prevented by defects of system, should take measures to remedy the defects.

6. The demand which stood last year at less than 25 lakhs rose in the year under report to nearly 70 lakhs, of which 69 were collected. This enormous increase is due to the sale of proprietary rights in the Chenab Colony, from which a sum of 61 lakhs was realised. There is a large uncollected balance in Delhi (Rs. 43,000), due to the failure of certain purchasers of Government land to fulfil their engagements. The large balance in Shahpur is due, as before, to the Jalpana estate. The largest decrease is under the head "Sale of Town-sites," whose receipts fell from Rs. 3,20,000 to *nil*. Recovery of cost of assessment from assignees fell from nearly one lakh to practically nothing. Receipts from *tirni* show a falling off of Rs. 9,000, mainly in Montgomery, where the failure of the winter rains produced a grass famine.

Other land revenue.

7. The total land revenue assigned, including the emoluments of zaildars and inamdars, amounted to rather less than $29\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs, a slight decrease on last year's figures. The percentage of land revenue assigned to the total land revenue of the province was 9.2 or .3 less than last year. Two military reward grants, each amounting to Rs. 600 per annum, were sanctioned in the Kangra district, and seven new grants aggregating Rs. 67 were made in the

Ludhiana district. The jagir of Abdul Satar Shah in the Mianwali district was forfeited for a period of three years under the Frontier Crimes Regulations.

8. Coercive processes against lambardars issued in 3,386 cases as against 4,683 last year. The amount of land revenue involved was over eight lakhs of rupees, of which 97 per cent.

Coercive processes.

was recovered. Coercive processes issued at the request of lambardars were 8,176 as against 9,589 last year. The amount involved was 2 lakhs, of which 81 per cent. was recovered. The decrease in the number of processes issued is considerable and satisfactory. Warrants of imprisonment were issued against two lambardars only, but were executed in both cases. Processes of distress against the movable property of lambardars were issued in 44 cases in Amritsar (none being executed) and 42 in Shahpur. In the case of six lambardars only in the province were sales of movable property necessitated. It is generally found that the issue of a warrant is sufficient to ensure payment without its execution.

In Ambala, Amritsar and Montgomery the policy of confiscating *pachotra* is producing a marked improvement in the punctuality of payments. In Kangra the number of non-residents and in Lahore the general lawlessness of the Manjha are given as reasons for unpunctual payments to lambardars. Lambardars appear to be backward in their payments in Gujrat, Karnal, Mianwali and Ludhiana, while the lambardars themselves are most in need of Government aid in Amritsar, Gurdaspur, Muzaffargarh, Kangra, Lahore and Mianwali.

9. As usual the processes issued were served by the tahsil chaprasis in most districts. Special establishment was, however, employed for short periods in 13 districts. The receipts from *talbana* amounted to Rs. 20,326 as against Rs. 18,485 in the previous year.

Process-serving establishment.

10. The districts under settlement during the year were Kangra, Hoshiarpur, Ludhiana, Ferozepore, Gujranwala, Gurdaspur, Amritsar, Sialkot, Shahpur and part of Lyallpur.

Progress made in remeasurements, revision of records, etc.

Statements XII, XII A and XIII.

Revision of records as a preliminary to settlement was in progress in Lahore and Gujrat. As reported last year the reassessment of Kulu is in charge of the Sub-Divisional Officer while the Settlement Officer of Kangra has the Dehra and Hamirpur tahsils of that district *plus* the Una tahsil of Hoshiarpur to re-assess. In Lyallpur the area watered by the Lower Chenab Canal is under settlement.

Kulu.—The records were practically complete by the end of the year and the assessments announced in Kulu proper. The remaining announcements were to be made shortly after the close of the year, and the Settlement Officer is now winding up the settlement.

Kangra.—In last year's report the difficulties experienced in the Dehra-Hamirpur settlement were noticed. In the year under report they were accentuated by the illness and eventual departure on leave of the Settlement Officer. Before he left, however, Mr. Connolly had succeeded in getting the work well under way. Additions to the staff were sanctioned and the record work is now complete for about two-thirds of the estates concerned. Orders were passed on the preliminary report, and village inspections are well in hand. The Commissioner believes that the settlement will be completed by the end of 1913 in Una and in the course of 1914 in the other two tahsils.

Hoshiarpur.—Measurement work is finished in the Hoshiarpur and Dasuya tahsils and was to be finished in Garhshankar shortly after the end of the year. Record work has not kept pace with measurements, but will be finished in February 1913. The Hoshiarpur assessment report was completed, and village inspections in Dasuya are nearing completion. The assessment report of Dasuya is now in the press.

Ludhiana.—The Ludhiana settlement was concluded in December 1911.

Ferozepore.—Measurements were finished in Moga and nearly finished in Ferozepore. They are making good progress in Muktsar and Zira. It was

found necessary to subject the maps in Fazilka to a more complete revision than had in the forecast been anticipated to be necessary and in some estates to remeasure. The Moga assessment report was received, and that of Ferozepore was written before the close of the year, and the former has been submitted to Government.

Gurdaspur.—Assessments in the remaining tahsils—Shakargarh and Pathankot—were announced and distributed, and the settlement concluded at the end of the year.

Amritsar.—The new maps and records have been completed in Amritsar and Tara Taran, and the work is in full swing in Ajnala. The assessment reports for the first two tahsils were sent up and orders passed on them. Ajnala alone remains to complete the settlement.

Sialkot.—Work was in progress during the year in Daska, Raya and Pasrur tahsils. Half of Raya and two-fifths of Daska have been resurveyed, while *killabandi* is in progress in that part of Pasrur which is to be irrigated by the Upper Chenab Canal. Fair progress has been made, and the Settlement Officer hopes to finish in the scheduled time. The prospect of canal irrigation involved very heavy partition work in Pasrur.

Gujranwala.—Field work was practically finished during the year—final attestation remaining in some 200 estates. The assessment report of Wazirabad was disposed of last year and those of the other two tahsils, Gujranwala and Sharakpur, during the summer of 1912. Announcements have been delayed as *killabandi* brought to light important changes in soil classification which involved recasting the village assessments.

Shahpur.—Record work was completed in Shahpur for all the villages in the year's programme and a few more. Final attestation has not kept pace with field work, but was to be completed for these villages early in the current year. Orders were passed on Mr. Rudkin's assessment report of the Lower Jhelum Canal area and the settlement of that area concluded.

Lyallpur.—The assessment report of the Gugera Branch II Circle, was submitted and orders passed on it during the year.

Lahore.—Map correction and revision of records in preparation for the settlement were in progress during the year in Lahore and Gujrat. In Lahore two-fifths of the records were brought up to date by the abbreviated system of map correction which is here under trial.

Gujrat.—In Gujrat the work has been in progress for two years and is now complete.

11. Government orders were received during the year on the final settlement reports of Karnal, Delhi and Ludhiana. Those of Hissar and Gurdaspur were sent to Government after the close of the year.

12. In Kulu the settlement will take 3 months less than the sanctioned period, and will cost 22 per cent. less than the estimate. The sanctioned enhancements will be taken and the cost of settlement recovered in $2\frac{1}{2}$ years. In Hoshiarpur the settlement should be completed by the end of 1913, and the total cost will not be more, and will probably be less, than the estimate. The other current settlements are not sufficiently advanced to permit of an accurate forecast of results or cost, but all bid fair to be completed within time, except Dehra-Hamirpur and Gujranwala. The case of Dehra-Hamirpur has been discussed in paragraph 10.

In Gujranwala the estimate of time was 3 years and of cost 4 lakhs. The settlement will take $3\frac{3}{4}$ years, and cost rather more than $4\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs. The revision of maps and records here took the form of *killabandi*, which cannot be hurried, but it is to be regretted that the duration has so much exceeded the estimate.

In Lyallpur the Gugera Branch II assessment is estimated to bring in Rs. 14,71,784, an increase of 109 per cent. In the Lower Jhelum Colony

the re-assessment is estimated at Rs. 13,45,562, an increase of over 200 per cent. It is again to be noted that re-assessment in these colony areas costs practically nothing beyond the pay of the Settlement Officer, as no revision of records is required.

13. The resettlement of Lahore and Gujrat was sanctioned during the year, and the settlements began in October and November 1912, respectively.

Proposed future settlement operations.

The Jullundur forecast was dealt with during the year and the settlement has been sanctioned by the Local Government and will begin in October 1913. A new scheme of settlement operations was prepared during the year and sanctioned by Government. Under this scheme the remaining tahsils of Kangra are due for resettlement in 1913, but work will not be commenced till establishment is available from the Dehra-Hamirpur settlement. It is hoped, however, that with the experience there gained, and with help from the Survey Department, it will be possible to push measurements through quickly in the remaining tahsils. Simla and Montgomery are due for resettlement in 1914, and the Simla forecast will be sent for this year. As to Montgomery the Colonization Officer, Lower Bari Doab Canal, will probably have to undertake part at least of the settlement.

14. At the close of the year under report the Kulu settlement was nearly finished, seven settlements were in full swing, and two just beginning.

Settlement staff.

The completion of the Lower Bari Doab survey set free a considerable staff, but even so, great difficulty has been found in getting trained kanungos, especially in Sialkot. Settlement Officers are reducing their staff wherever possible as field work progresses. In Kangra and Amritsar it has been found impossible for one Tahsildar to cope with the final attestation work of a whole tahsil, and the attestation of certain Naib Tahsildars has been accepted as final. The Commissioner of Jullundur reports that the amalgamation of the lists of District and Settlement Naib Tahsildars, which was effected two years ago, has made transfers more frequent than they were formerly, because all Naib Tahsildars are required to serve for a time in the settlement line and the reversion of men at the close of a settlement makes it necessary to find places for them elsewhere. It will necessarily take some time to get the new system into smooth working order, but as it involves the principle that every Naib Tahsildar should be employed as such throughout at least one settlement (a period of two or three years), it ought not to entail an inordinate number of transfers.

15. The riverain detachment of the Survey Department continued its work of traversing and laying down base lines during the year: 332'95

Surveys.

linear miles of main traverse and 1,911'26 linear miles of minor traverse were run; 8,541 theodolite stations were fixed along the banks of the rivers Sutlej, Ravi, Chenab and Jhelum in the districts of Hoshiarpur, Ambala, Ferozepore, Lahore, Montgomery, Sialkot, Gujrat, Shahpur and Jhelum; and 492 corners of 164 squares were marked with permanent mark-stones on both banks of the Sutlej and the Jhelum, to serve as bases for the future demarcation of boundaries in the beds of the rivers. One thousand nine hundred and ninety-seven plotted and 485 boundary "musavis" (settlement mapping sheets) of 328 villages were completed, and 30 four-inch sheets were traced and supplied to the Settlement Officers of Hoshiarpur, Una, Ferozepore, Sialkot and Shahpur. Besides these, 129 miscellaneous traces were prepared, and all the traverse stations laid out during the season were plotted on 28 four-inch sheets.

Of the four-inch compilation of riverain boundary sheets, 20 sheets were plotted and compiled, 23 sheets finally completed, 10 sheets typed and 371 villages were reduced by pentagraph to the scale 4 inches = 1 mile.

The rectangular survey of the area to be commanded by the Lower Bari Doab Canal was carried over the remaining tract. The settlement staff continued joining the detachment till late in December 1911, and consequently a

considerable time was spent in training the hands. As after May 1912 it became very difficult to work during the day time on account of excessive heat, scarcity of water and duststorms, the field operations were temporarily stopped in the middle of June 1912, and restarted on 1st September 1912. In all 55,000 rectangles were demarcated. Nearly 40 per cent. of the work was tested by the Naib Tahsildars, Tahsildars and the Survey Officers; and 15 per cent. was checked with theodolite traverse. Four thousand seven hundred and eighty-two linear miles of traverse were done and 13,788 theodolite stations were fixed. The whole of the demarcation was finished by December 1912.

The total expenditure on the riverain work from 1st October 1911 to 30th September 1912, excluding the pay of the *khalasis*, was Rs. 24,969, and that of the Lower Bari Doab work was Rs. 2,00,981 or annas 2·34 per acre.

The Upper Chenab rectangular survey was practically completed last year, and that on the Upper Jhelum Canal has now been finished.

The topographical survey parties surveyed 7,373 square miles on the 1-inch scale and a small portion on the 1½-inch scale in Gujranwala, Sialkot, Lahore, Amritsar, Ferozepore, Hoshiarpur and Jullundur and in Kapurthala State. Thirty-seven 1-inch standard sheets relating to the Punjab were published during the year.

16. No important alterations in district boundaries were made during the year.

Boundaries.

Several boundary disputes are in progress between the Ambala district and the Native States with which it marches. Some have been settled, and every effort is being made to settle the remainder at an early date. The Settlement Officer of Dehra-Hamirpur is settling boundary disputes between the Ambala and Hoshiarpur districts. Similar disputes between Ferozepore and Jullundur and Ferozepore and Lahore are under disposal. Fresh boundary questions in Mianwali are engaging the attention of the Deputy Commissioner.

17. The periodical revision of revenue records in the course of settlement operations usually calls for an increase of record room space. In Lud-

hiana and Sialkot new record rooms have been built, but in the latter district accommodation still appears to be deficient and a re-arrangement of the space is being considered. The new record room at Dera Ghazi Khan has been completed, and the records are now being stored. The Commissioner notes that under the circumstances in that district work in connection with the records has been extremely well done. In Hissar allotment for a new building has been sanctioned, and the work will shortly be taken in hand. It is hoped that the new room in Gurdaspur will be completed by the end of March 1913. More accommodation is required in Hoshiarpur, Amritsar and Gurdaspur, and proposals will shortly be submitted.

Damage to records by insects is reported from Ambala and Gujranwala. In the latter district a mixture of methylated spirit, corrosive sublimate and carbolic acid recommended by the Imperial Entomologist is being experimented on.

The Government of India are being asked for an assignment to cover the loss to provincial revenues caused by fees for inspection of records being now taken in stamps. The proposal to realize copying fees in stamps has been dropped. Draft rules for the amalgamation of the Copying Agency with the Copying Department and the regulation of this branch of district administration have been submitted to Government. It is proposed to work the new rules experimentally in two selected districts before their general introduction.

18. The remission by money order of sums due to Government is reported by every district except Simla.

Other matters.

The amounts so remitted varied from two and-a-quarter of lakhs in Lahore to Rs. 3,672 in Kangra. The total sum remitted by money order amounted to nineteen and-a-half lakhs against fourteen lakhs remitted last year. The system is certainly growing into popularity,

especially where communications are bad and distances great, as for example in the Una tahsil of Hoshiarpur. On a reference from the Financial Commissioners the Postmaster-General expressed his inability to recommend any reduction in the money order fee, owing to the increasing cost of transport.

The use of currency notes for remittance of land revenue continues in Lyallpur and Gujranwala, and has been sanctioned tentatively in Rohtak, but it gathers little favour. In the Amritsar and Jhelum reports mention is made of the practice, of which the adoption was authorised generally by Sir James Wilson in 1908, of requiring the tahsil revenue accountant to attend at the sadr treasury for a fortnight twice a year when payments are heaviest. The arrangement is a good one and saves trouble to the lambardars, and the extent to which it has been adopted in other districts should be mentioned in next year's district reports. In Jullundur and Ludhiana rosters have been prepared by zails, and lambardars are required to pay their instalments in batches of convenient size to obviate the usual rush during the last few days of the period of payment.

19. Suits against occupancy tenants for enhancement of rent show a

decrease from 1,813 to 1,666. In 1,314 cases enhancements were decreed. The most notable decrease is in Hissar, where

only 87 cases were instituted as compared with 708 in the preceding year,—an abnormally large number, due to the announcement of the new assessment. Institutions were heavy in Hoshiarpur (479), Jullundur (466) and Gurdaspur (255). In Hoshiarpur and Jullundur the Commissioner attributes the activity of landlords in this behalf partly to the settlements which are in progress in one district and in prospect in the other, but partly also to the general rise in agricultural values. In Hoshiarpur Mr. Fagan adds that occupancy status is generally disputed. The Deputy Commissioners of Rohtak, Lahore and Jhang notice the strong position of tenants in general which is largely due to plague and partly to the extension of irrigation. From Attock it is reported that landlords in the Chhach are discontented with the low rents paid by their occupancy tenants. In one case a landlord who sued was found to be paying more to Government for land revenue and cesses than he received as rent. The expense of litigation apparently deters these landlords from bringing suits for enhancement in considerable numbers.

Suits for reduction of rent were brought by 54 occupancy tenants in the province as against 14 last year.

20. Suits to eject occupancy tenants continue to be few in number and unimportant.

Ejectments.

Applications to eject tenants-at-will have fallen from 11,293 to 10,145, ejectments ordered from 6,270 to 5,974, and ejectments actually made from 5,251 to 4,404. A noticeable decrease in actual ejectments—948 to 597—is in Hissar, where the Deputy Commissioner attributes it to the conclusion of settlement. In Delhi applications fell from 918 to 543, probably owing to the same cause. Large increases in notices issued are reported from Hoshiarpur, where the Commissioner observes that ejectment proceedings will naturally tend to increase, as proprietary holdings are small and the pressure of population on cultivated area grows more and more acute in spite of plague. Applications increased in Ferozepore, principally in the Fazilka tahsil, and here the Deputy Commissioner attributes the litigation to a desire on the part of landlords to prevent their tenants obtaining a higher status by long and undisputed possession. In Lahore notices rose from 1,005 to 1,919 owing to the impending settlement. In Montgomery and Jullundur tenants are said to be hard to find. In Dera Ghazi Khan 610 notices resulted in only 14 ejectments. The Deputy Commissioner observes that in most cases these notices are issued to recover rent in the cheapest manner.

Suits by tenants to contest their liability to ejectment resulted in the tenants' favour in 661 cases as against 977 last year. The Deputy Commissioner of Ambala reports that an astonishing number of tenants fail to realise

that length of tenure is no bar to ejectment. In Hoshiarpur tenants were successful in 82 cases out of 234 in contesting liability to ejectment, while in Lahore 15 tenants established their claims to occupancy rights.

21. Nine jagirs were notified during the year under Punjab Act IV of 1900, — one in the Kangra district and 8 in the Lahore district.

Descent of Jagirs Act.

The declarations of a rule of integral descent were based on written instruments.

The approximate value of the jagirs thus notified was Rs. 12,450. The total number of jagirs gazetted under the Act is now 139, valued at nearly 8 lakhs of rupees. In view of the number of families to which are thus applicable the statutory provisions requiring the approval of Government to each succession, some measure of delegation seems desirable. Such delegation might take the form of empowering Commissioners to approve successions, except in cases in which a departure from the rule of primogeniture is proposed.

22. The comparative failure of the monsoon led to a largely increased demand for water in the kharif harvest, which was especially marked in the districts watered by the Western Jumna, Sirhind and Upper Bari Doab Canals. The canals were in practically every case able to meet the demand. The Commissioner of Jullundur comments on the immense boon conferred by the Sirhind Canal, which has since last settlement entirely revolutionised agricultural and economic conditions. The security afforded against a serious failure of the crops is brought out this year equally clearly in respect of the Western Jumna Canal. In the rabi harvest abundant rain secured the crops in the Delhi and Jullundur divisions, and the Deputy Commissioner of Rohtak remarks that canal-water went abegging.

Northern India Canal and Drainage Act.

There are complaints of faulty distribution on the Upper Bari Doab Canal, while from Gujranwala come complaints that rotational closures in March and April leave the crops so long without water that they wither. A similar complaint of lack of water in the spring has been made in Jhang. These complaints are receiving attention.

The Upper Chenab Canal was opened during the year and irrigated land in Sialkot and Gujranwala for kharif 1912.

The rules for adapting the *nahri parta* system to increases and decreases of irrigation, which were introduced at the recent settlements of Gurgaon, Rohtak, Karnal, Delhi and Hissar were in operation during the year and are favourably reported on. A perfect set of rules for the system has not yet been devised, but various drafts have been tentatively sanctioned and their comparative merits will be further examined in connection with the settlements of Ferozepore, Amritsar and Lahore.

Progress has been made with the scheme for prevention of damage by percolation near Indri on the Western Jumna Canal, which was noticed last year, and various expedients are being tested. The only extension of importance on the major canals is the Niaz Beg extension of the Upper Bari Doab Canal which was completed during the year.

The working of the inundation canals varied from district to district. In Montgomery the Upper Sutlej Canals ran well and the Ravi canals badly. In Multan the Chenab canals ran well at first and badly later on. In Shahpur and Muzaffargarh the canals did well; in Dera Ghazi Khan they did badly. On the Lower Sutlej Canals the local authorities regard a *kharaba* percentage of 40 in the kharif as an improvement, which the figures for the last few years show it to be, though it is high as judged by experience on other inundation canals. Arrangements are under consideration for more effective co-operation between Revenue and Canal officials in *kharaba* inspections on these canals. Various protests were received during the year against the remodelling of the Upper Sutlej Canals in Multan. In Muzaffargarh the Deputy Commissioner reported last year that an inundation canal had for the first time been kept running throughout the year. It now appears that this was no new thing, but the Deputy Commissioner is opposed to it on principle as tending to increase

water-logging. This may be the case locally as on the Maggasan and Maggi Canals where the whole commanded area is water-logged, and it is desirable to take steps radically to reduce the total irrigation. But where water-logging is non-existent or is confined to a small area, there does not seem to be reason to suppose that it is likely to be induced or increased by the canal being kept open during the cold weather.

In Dera Ghazi Khan the schedule of water rates has been revised and raised with effect from kharif 1913.

23. No new canals were notified during the year under the Minor Canals Act.

Minor Canals Act.

24. The area matured by the Gurgaon bunds has largely increased and the income slightly, while the cost of establishment shows a satisfactory decrease. The Delhi bunds and the Sarusti Canal in Karnal also worked with satisfactory results. Investigations into the working of the Shah Nahr in Hoshiarpur resulted in a definite scheme for improvement and realignment and for a regulator, head and escape. These improvements are now being carried out. The Grey Canals in Ferozepore show a decrease in area watered from 111,737 to 102,781 acres. A full report on this system is still awaited. In Mianwali the Nammal dam is under construction by the Public Works Department. In Montgomery the remodelling of the Gharak and Gharkana Canals is under consideration. The receipts credited to Government from the Kitchin Canals rose from Rs. 12,998 to Rs. 20,270. In Dipalpur a short lead of half a mile from the Sutlej to a natural depression has resulted in the irrigation of 10,000 acres, and a detailed survey is now being made with a view to further developments.

Working of minor canals and irrigation works.

25. The large area, 17,698 acres, acquired for public purposes marks the expansion of Railway and Irrigation works and includes land required for new Delhi. Land for the Jullundur Doab Railway and the Hissar-Jakhial and Sarai Kala-Hawelian lines was acquired during the year, while the canals of the triple project account for more than half the total area taken up under the Act.

Land Acquisition Act.

The figures showing the number of years' purchase of the land revenue represented by the price of the land acquired have been in most cases carefully reported by the Deputy Commissioners, and the result goes to confirm the remarks in paragraph 25 of last year's report regarding the increasing value of agricultural land in the Punjab and the enormous prices paid for urban and suburban sites.

26. Loans amounting to rather over 2 lakhs were advanced under the Land Improvement Loans Act, and nearly 6 lakhs under the Agriculturists' Loans Act. Nearly 17 lakhs under both Acts were outstanding from previous years, making a total of 25 lakhs. Five-and-a-half lakhs were due for collection during the year, of which some Rs. 5,30,000 were collected. The outstanding balance at the close of the year was rather over 19½ lakhs, more than half a lakh of which was suspended by competent authority and some Rs. 29,000 were overdue. Interest due for collection amounted to Rs. 1,23,000, all of which was recovered with the exception of some Rs. 3,300. The loan operations during the year gave a profit to the Local Government of rather over half a lakh.

Loans Acts.

Statements Nos. XVII, XVIII, XIX, XX, XXI and XXII.

Under the Land Improvement Loans Acts, the Multan division took nearly ¾ of a lakh, the Ferozepore district more than half a lakh, and the Attock district Rs. 15,500. With regard to Ferozepore the Commissioner thinks that the granting of loans may have been pushed too far. The Deputy Commissioner of Hoshiarpur considers that the establishment of co-operative credit societies is diminishing the necessity for takkavi. The amount of loans under this Act still out is large in the following districts :—Gurgaon 1½ lakhs, Attock over 2 lakhs, Multan nearly 3¼ lakhs and Muzaffargarh rather over one lakh. The

reports of Deputy Commissioners show that the improvements for which the loans are granted receive on the whole a thorough inspection.

Progress has been made in the preparation of district reports dealing with the advisability of well-boring operations and the necessity for takkavi.

Only about Rs. 64,000 out of the 6 lakhs distributed as loans under the Agriculturists' Loans Act for cattle and seed were required in the Delhi and Jullundur divisions. The scarcity of fodder was acute in Sialkot, Gujranwala and Montgomery and in all districts of the Rawalpindi division except Rawalpindi. The Commissioner of that division remarks that a very large proportion of the money advanced was for the purchase of fodder, and it is satisfactory that so small a proportion of the demand had to be suspended.

27. The necessity of associating the Financial Commissioner with important questions of forest administration has recently been emphasised by Government, and the old procedure

has been restored to by which cases of first importance are either referred to him for opinion or sent through him to Government by the Conservator. In pursuance of this policy, the Financial Commissioner was consulted as to the punitive measures to be taken in Rawalpindi to stop forest fires. The subject has been fully dealt with in the Forest Report, and it is only necessary to say here that the measures taken had the full support of the Financial Commissioners.

The experiment introduced by Mr. Kitchin of associating non-officials with the management of *guzara* forests in Murree and Kahuta has been officially recognized by Government, and revised rules were sent up during the year, and were notified shortly after its close. The system appears to be working well, though the Deputy Commissioner reports that one of the three non-officials appointed is in arrears with his work.

The question of forest conservancy in Kangra continued to engage the attention of the Financial Commissioner and district officials in consultation with the Forest Department, and a definite scheme for checking the deterioration of the forest by reducing excessive grazing was worked out during the year, and has since been submitted for the orders of Government.

The management by the Deputy Commissioner of the Shahpur Kandi forests in Gurdaspur continues satisfactory. In Dera Ghazi Khan it was decided to bring all the forests under the control of the Deputy Commissioner with a Forest Ranger deputed to assist him.

Scarcity of fodder rendered it necessary to give free grazing in Government forests in various districts, and consequently the receipts from grazing fees have fallen off.

28. There is little to record as to the management of State lands by Deputy Commissioners during the year. The management of the rakhs in Attock is reported to be in an

Government lands

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unsatisfactory condition. The staff is inadequate and the rakhs are very scattered. The Deputy Commissioner is investigating the matter, which will probably come to the notice of Government during the current year. Small leases for cultivation were sanctioned in Dera Ghazi Khan, Multan and Mianwali.

Very large remissions in the *tirni* demand of Montgomery were necessitated by the failure of the rains, which produced a fodder famine. There was no grass in the Bar and the Government rakhs which normally support large herds were deserted.

29. The small sums that have been allotted in recent years for prevention of damage in Ambala due to torrent action have not been spent, and it has

been realised that action on a larger scale is necessary. The co-operation of the Native States of Patiala and Nalagarh has accordingly been invited and
