# REPORT

## ON THE

# LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION

## OF THE

# PUNJAB

FOR THE

***Agricultural year ending the 30th September 1915.***

1. The agricultural conditions on the whole were unusually favourable for both harvests. The monsoon which set in early was favourably distributed and more than usually ample. Hail and cold did some damage to the autumn crop while it was ripening, but the result of the harvest was considerably above normal. Favourable conditions in autumn and the influence of the war led to a very large extension of the area under rabi crops. The sown area exceeded the normal by 13 per cent. and, in spite of the winter rains holding off till February and March, the matured area was 21 per cent. above the average. Unseasonable storms in March and early April affected the wheat outturn, which was probably not in excess of the average. As a whole, however, the year measured by the sown and matured areas represents the high water mark reached in the Province. Climatic and economic conditions favoured the growth of rabi at the expense of kharif crops, the rabi area being 4,300,000 acres above normal, and the kharif only 82,000 acres in excess. The course of prices was not entirely favourable to the zamindar. The average price of wheat was Rs. 3-8-0 per maund compared with Rs. 3-2-0 in the previous year, but cotton which was most affected by the consequences of the war fell from an average of Rs. 6-11-0 to Rs. 4-4-0.

2. The total demand for the year on account of fixed land revenue was Rs. 2,17,04,451 or Rs. 4,84,911 in excess of the demand of the preceding year. Re-assessments introduced by the Settlement Officers of Ferozepore, Lahore, Amritsar and Sialkot accounted for an increase of Rs. 2,92,997 and deferred enhancements in Rohtak, Gurgaon and Karnal swelled the demand by Rs. 1,45,262. The balance on alluvion and diluvion assessments was an increase in the demand of Rs. 25,556. From the total demand Rs. 2,14,84,964 were put down for collection and were collected with the exception of Rs. 31,726. This balance left for recovery at the end of the year is accounted for chiefly by the outstandings in the Khushab Tahsil of Shahpur where collections were delayed in consequence of the late receipt of orders on the assessment proposals. The demand not ordered for collection was made up of Rs. 1,30,491 undetermined or irrecoverable balances, and Rs. 88,996 which remained under suspension at the end of the year. A sum of Rs. 42,445 was remitted from the demand of the year. In the favourable conditions of the year the necessity for suspension or remission of the demand was less frequent than usual. The amount placed under suspension during the year was only Rs. 1,41,957. The average amount of suspension is about 5 lakhs. Heavy hail-storms and the failure of the monsoon in the latter part of August and the beginning of September necessitated the suspension of Rs. 47,070 in Gurgaon, and Rs. 36,865 were suspended in Gurdaspur.

chiefly in villages in which heavy floods in the Beas and the Ravi did damage to houses, crops, live-stock and other property. Remissions were due to hailstorms in Gurgaon, Lahore, Amritsar and Attock and floods in Gurdaspur, Amritsar and Karnal. The collections on account of previous years amounted to Rs. 7,54,129. Sums under suspension amounting to Rs. 51,037 were remitted chiefly in Hissar, Gurgaon, Rohtak, Jhelum and Attock. The recoverable balance on account of previous years not under suspension is only Rs. 318. The total amount under suspension has fallen to Rs. 3,78,020, a level only once reached during the last ten years. The account is clear in ten districts and practically clear in six more. The total outstanding balance at the beginning of the year was Rs. 12,15,200 and at the close Rs. 5,92,620.

3. The balance of alluvion and diluvion was a loss of assessable area but a small gain in the amount assessed. The area washed away or rendered unfit for cultivation was 42,692 acres, and on 36,687 acres the assessment was reduced on account of deterioration. On the other hand 38,953 acres alluviated were brought under assessment and the demand was enhanced on 34,303 acres benefited by river action. The abnormal autumn floods led to some vicissitudes of fortune. Karnal was a considerable loser from the Jumna. The Beas washed away a good deal of land from the Nurpur Tahsil of Kangra but added land to Hoshiarpur. Amritsar was a loser but Lahore a large gainer. As regards the Ravi, the Commissioner of Lahore notes that "the abnormal floods of kharif 1914 deposited on a balance a much greater quantity of silt than sand in Gurdaspur, Sialkot and Gujranwala." There was neither gain nor loss from the action of minor streams but chos were on the whole maleficent.

4. As in the preceding year the amount of land revenue temporarily excluded from the rent-roll was swollen by the accounts procedure adopted in Sialkot where the whole of the new demand imposed in the year (upwards of Rs. 4,20,000) was treated as excluded from the fixed land revenue roll. The correct procedure is to treat only the amount of enhancement as temporarily excluded from the roll and this action is taken only when the new assessment is introduced from the rabi harvest. The total amount excluded, Rs. 7,31,082, was almost entirely due to general re-assessments of the fixed demand introduced after the roll of the year had been sanctioned. These included the re-assessment of the Charkhri and Bangar Circles of Wazirabad which had been deferred pending the opening of the Nokhar Branch of the Upper Chenab Canal. The demand on account of true fluctuating land revenue amounted to over Rs. 128 lakhs or more than Rs. 10 lakhs in excess of the demand of last year. The assessment of the preceding year was equalled or exceeded in every district except Shahpur, Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan. In Shahpur the decrease of Rs. 20,000 which was confined to the demand assessed by the Irrigation Department is ascribed to the damage done by hail. Floods, hailstorms and the silting-up of the head of the Puran and Suleman Canals caused a decrease of Rs. 34,000 in the demand in Muzaffargarh and the estimated normal demand was not reached. In Dera Ghazi Khan also there was a defect from the average assessment. The river floods were abundant but the heads of some of the canals were eroded and irrigation suffered in consequence. The very large increase in the demand in all other districts was in the main due to three causes, re-assessment, the extension of canal irrigation and an unusually favourable season. Fifty-eight villages on the fringe of the Lyallpur District were assessed and enhanced water advantage rates were introduced in Ferozepore and Lahore. The extension of canal irrigation from the Upper Chenab Canal in Sialkot and Gujranwala and from the Lower Bari Doab Canal in Montgomery and Multan swelled the fluctuating collections. The increase was over Rs. 2 lakhs in Montgomery and Rs. 3 lakhs in Multan. In spite of a very large increase in the area and the demand assessed by the Irrigation Department there is in both districts a large increase



in the demand assessed by the Deputy Commissioner. The assessment of the Shujabad Tahsil and the Sidhnai Circle has, for the first time within recent years, reached and exceeded the Settlement Officer's estimate. This is satisfactory but the Commissioner has not yet reported the result of his promised enquiry into the causes of the deficiency in the past. In Mianwali, where there were no disturbing changes, the demand was Rs. 4,17,647. The average is slightly over Rs. 3 lakhs. In Hissar, where the estimated normal is Rs. 59,000, collections exceeded Rs. 99,000. The year was one of unusual prosperity in the villages under fluctuating assessment. Heavy floods came down the Ghaggar and the Rangoi Canal ran well.

The demand was everywhere collected with ease. The recoverable demand left uncollected at the close of the year was trifling in amount. The balance at the close of last year was Rs. 31,525. Remissions have been allowed to the extent of Rs. 7,726 and Rs. 22,116 have been collected. The balance which accrued on account of both the current and previous years was a little over Rs. 20,000. The system of fluctuating assessment continues to be generally popular, except in Dera Ghazi Khan and Ferozepore. As the Deputy Commissioner of the former district remarks, however, a system of wholly fixed assessment would not be suited to the local circumstances and in Ferozepore at the recent re-assessment the fluctuating assessment was, as observed last year, maintained for good reasons in the small area on which it is in force. In that connection the Financial Commissioner expressed the opinion that there is on each of the Punjab rivers a point at which it becomes necessary as the more favourable conditions of the submontane tracts are left behind to pass from a fixed to a fluctuating assessment.

5. The demand on account of other land revenue was Rs. 42,12,398, or about Rs. 7 lakhs less than in the preceding year. The proceeds from the sale of waste lands (principally in the

Lower Bari Doab) and town sites, recovery of the cost of settlement from assignees and the grant of single harvest leases show considerable improvement but the gain is much more than counterbalanced by the drop in collections on account of the sale of Government estates. The natural diminution in sales of proprietary rights to colonists on the Lower Chenab Canal is the explanation of the diminution of receipts in Lahore, Gujranwala, Lyallpur and Jhang. Recoveries under this head amounted to only Rs. 6½ lakhs compared with recoveries of Rs. 22 lakhs in the preceding year. The improved collections in Gurgaon reflect the success which has attended Mr. Estcourt's efforts to complete the sale of crown lands in Ballabgarh. The decrease of half a lakh under other items is mainly due to a decrease in the demand on account of mutation fees. This head of revenue is likely to be less remunerative in the future as the number of settlements in progress is curtailed. The present decrease is almost entirely due to diminished receipts in Lyallpur ascribed to the smaller number of acquisitions of proprietary rights. Tirni receipts have maintained practically their former level. In Montgomery the extension of irrigation has curtailed the grazing grounds and it has been found necessary to revise the tirni arrangements with a resulting loss of income. In other districts, however, the favourable season led to a corresponding improvement in collections. Temporary cultivation has largely increased in consequence of the extension of irrigation from the Lower Bari Doab Canal and there has been a great rise in the demand on account of single harvest leases in Montgomery and Multan. The growth of collections on account of talbana is confined to the Multan Division and is due to the efforts made there to ensure punctuality in the payment of Government dues.

The balance of other land revenue at the beginning of the year was Rs. 62,515, of which Rs. 37,805 were collected, and Rs. 21,125 remitted. The balance at the close of the year was Rs. 62,531. Half of this amount is due from the Jalpana estate in Shahpur. The Court of Wards is making arrangements for gradually meeting the arrears. In Montgomery a considerable sum on account of the sale proceeds of grass and trees is still outstanding.

6. No large lapses occurred during the year under report and the only fresh grants of importance were two military reward grants in Gujrat and Rawalpindi. Assignees shared in the increase in collections due to re-assessment and successful harvests and the total of revenue assigned rose from Rs. 30,78,734 to Rs. 31,80,255. But the percentage of total revenue assigned fell from 8.3 per cent. to 8.2 per cent. Revision of assignments in connection with settlement operations was completed in Raya, Daska, Gujrat, Kasur, Dera-Hamirpur and Fazilka Tahsils and the portions of Bhera and Shahpur under settlement. Registers are reported to be in good condition.

7. Coercive processes for the collection of land revenue rose from 12,497 in 1913-14 to 17,952 and the amount of arrears for the realization of which they issued from Rs. 9,67,427 to Rs. 14,50,217, of which 93.4 per cent. was recovered. The collections made after issue of process amounted to 3 per cent. of the total collections made. The Multan Division is again responsible for more than half the total processes whether against or at the instance of lambardars and out of the total of Rs. 13½ lakhs collected in this way over 7½ lakhs were collected in this division. In consequence of the remarks made in paragraph 4 of His Honour's remarks on last year's report the Financial Commissioner made enquiries into the use of coercive processes in Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan. In both districts the necessity for processes is ascribed to the dilatory habits of the lambardars and revenue payers, not to inability to pay, and the large increase in issues in recent years is due to special efforts to insist on punctuality. Mr. Diack accepts this explanation which accords with the reports received from the rest of the province. The Deputy Commissioner of Shahpur suggests that too few processes are issued, the Tahsildar taking a pride in keeping down their number and the lambardars being left to pay from their own pockets the amounts due from defaulters who can but will not pay. The Commissioner agrees with the Deputy Commissioner and is of opinion that "the prompt issue of a large number of processes after one or two harvests would probably induce punctuality." The experience of Attock where the number of processes reached a minimum supports this view. A portion of the increase is no doubt due to the larger demand for collection during the year and there were also special causes such as the disturbances in Jhang to which the increase in that district is partly ascribed. The main explanation, however is the increased attention paid to punctuality in payment.

Practically the only processes employed were writs of demand, warrants of arrest, and warrants for the distress or sale of moveable property. Writs of demand accounted for 69 per cent. of the processes. Processes executed amounted to 2,819. Arrests were made in 2,304 cases, chiefly in Lahore, Gurdaspur, Gujranwala, Jhang, Multan and Muzaffargarh. The Commissioner of Lahore explains that "Lahore Tahsil in previous years has distinguished itself for slackness in paying in revenue, and pressure has been put on of late to stop this bad habit." In Multan also there is a history of past dilatoriness which is being corrected.

8. The permanent tahsil establishment were again able to overtake the service of almost all the coercive processes. In 14 districts no additional establishment was required. In the remaining districts temporary servers were entertained for short periods at a total cost of about Rs. 950.

Process-serving establishment.

9. At the beginning of the year ten settlements were in progress. At its close measurements and record work remained to be done in four and from only three were assessment reports due. The Dera Hamirpur settlement in which there was still a little record work to be done and the Ferozepore settlement where the demand of Fazilka was announced

and distributed were completed early in the year. The Settlement Officers of Sialkot, Lahore and Shahpur completed the records of their districts. In each the introduction of the new assessment in one tahsil is all that is left to be done. In Gujrat the field measurements in the Jhelum riverain were completed and those of the Chenab riverain begun. There is little measurement of this kind remaining, but the necessity for a special quadrennial attestation of the jamabandis has added to the work of the settlement. Killabandi work was delayed by plague and in other ways, and was not complete at the end of the year. Killabandi operations were completed in Sialkot. Good progress was made with record work in Jullundur and Simla. In the former measurements have been completed and record work has been practically finished in Jullundur and Nakodar Tahsils and good progress was made in the rest of the district. Field survey has been overtaken throughout the Sutlej riverain. The work in Kangra has been delayed by various mishaps and the necessity of changing Settlement Officers which Mr. Boughiey's ill-health and departure on leave occasioned caused some disorganization and consequently retarded the progress of the work. The Financial Commissioner has recently considered the best means of accelerating the rate of outturn chiefly by improved methods and will address Government as regards the probable duration of operations when the necessary materials are at his disposal. Throughout Kangra the record of rights in trees in undemarcated protected forests is still incomplete as the final decision of Government on certain questions has not yet been obtained. The tahsils for which assessment reports were submitted were Palampur, Jullundur, Nakodar, Lahore, Zafarwal, Phalia and Khushab. Reports were also submitted for the Bharauli ilaka of Simla, Simla town lands, Lahore town lands and the Saidwala tract transferred from Montgomery to Lyallpur. The new demand was announced in Jullundur, Chunian, Fazilka, Zafarwal, Kharian and Khushab and its distribution completed in most of these tahsils.

10. Final settlement reports for Lyallpur, Ferozepore, Una Tahsil, and the rest of Hoshiarpur were submitted to the Financial Commissioners and have now been reviewed by them. The orders of Government on the reports of Amritsar and Gujranwala were received. The settlement of the Leiah Thal was confirmed for twenty years as in the case of the adjoining tracts in Bhakkar.

11. It was explained in last year's report that it had been found necessary to revise the schedules and estimates for the Sialkot, Lahore and Shahpur settlements and it was said that the forecast for Gujrat was likely to be exceeded. In both Sialkot and Shahpur the revised estimates are being worked up to as regards duration and cost, although the unavoidable delay in disposing of Mr. Leigh's first assessment report makes it impossible to frame accurate estimates. In Sialkot the Settlement Officer hopes to be able to keep the expenditure below the estimate. Extensions up to the end of March have been sanctioned in both Gujrat and Lahore. It is unlikely that the former settlement will finish during the current financial year as orders on the Phalia Assessment Report have been delayed. Similarly the Settlement Officer of Lahore is unlikely to receive orders on the urban assessment in time to enable operations to be concluded according to the existing sanction. In each of these settlements the cost will exceed the estimate of the forecast report by over half-a-lakh. The duration and cost of Kangra settlement will form the subject of a separate reference to Government. The estimate of the forecast report under both heads is likely to be considerably exceeded. Good progress at a normal cost is being made in Simla. The settlement of Jullundur will be completed within the time expected, and the estimate of cost should be little if at all exceeded. Of the settlements concluded during the year that of Ferozepore was completed before the expected date at practically the expected cost, but in Dera-Hamirpur unforeseen difficulties led to a longer duration of operations and to an excess of a lakh in the cost. As re-

gards results the settlements current during the year will much surpass the estimates. The forecast reports expect a total enhancement of about Rs. 20 lakhs. An increase of about Rs. 25 lakhs is now considered likely. The forecast of Ferozepore was exceeded by about Rs.  $2\frac{1}{2}$  lakhs. In Lahore the increase will be about a lakh more than was expected when the settlement began. The results in Shahpur will be  $\frac{3}{4}$ ths of a lakh better than the forecast and in Gujrat half-a-lakh. In the other settlements the results will probably be according to expectations.

12. Sanction was received during the year to the inception of the settlement of Ambala which accordingly began in October 1915. The forecast report of Dera Ghazi Khan was called for and is now under the consideration of the Financial Commissioner. The scheme of operations printed in Appendix V to the Settlement Manual has been revised for another quinquennium. It is expected that in each of the two years 1916-17 and 1917-18 one new settlement will be begun and three current settlements will be closed. In connection with the partition of common lands in the Bhakkar Thal proposals have been made for a rectangular survey in that tract preparatory to killabandi.

13. The only settlement begun during the year was that of Simla and the congestion of establishment consequently continued. The settlement of Ambala was undertaken at the end of the year, but there is still a plethora of trained men. All sub. *pro tem.* kanungos have been brought under reduction and eleven permanent men have been retired. During the next ten years the number of naib tahsildars likely to be employed in settlements will be much less than at present. The Financial Commissioners have therefore taken steps to reduce by 40 the 100 appointments added to the divisional lists in 1910 when the settlement and executive staffs were amalgamated. In addition 10 *quasi*-permanent appointments of tahsildar have been brought under reduction.

14. The Punjab Riverain Detachment of the Survey Department was employed on field work in the riverains of the Sutlej and the Chenab and in Kangra and Simla. The work on the Sutlej consisted in providing a traverse for the field measurements in the Bet villages of Phillaur and Nawashahr. On the Chenab similar materials were supplied for the Bet villages of Phalia. This riverain work which cost Rs. 22,865 comprised 1,278 linear and 231 square miles of traverse. In Kangra the special traverse of the Kangra Tahsil was completed and work in Nurpur was begun. The cost for 3,464 linear and 494 square miles of traverse was Rs. 58,610 or Rs. 118·6 per square mile. The cost is somewhat more than last year on account of the cost of grain compensation to the subordinate establishment. The cost in Simla where the ground is more difficult and more points are required is higher. In all 1,106 linear and 53 square miles were traversed at a cost of Rs. 8,992 or Rs. 169·7 per square mile. Topographical survey operations were continued in Hissar, Rohtak and Gurgaon.

15. There was no important alteration in district boundaries during the year. The most important boundary work was that undertaken by Mr. Jacob and Mr. Oppenheim on the Jumna in connection with the provincial boundary with the United Provinces. The special officers were able to secure agreement to a permanent boundary of proprietary right on half the length of boundary and have made proposals for legislation for compulsory demarcation of a boundary in the remaining cases. The principle of a compulsory determination of a fixed boundary has been accepted by the Punjab Government and is now under the consideration of the Government of the United Provinces. The dispute between certain villages of Gurgaon and Alwar is still un-settled. Questions regarding the boundary between Jammu and the Gurdaspur and Sialkot Districts which were open to doubt or dispute were settled by agreement between the Settlement Commissioner of Kashmir and the local officers.



16. A revised Standing Order was issued dealing with record rooms and embodying the recommendations of the Clerical Establishments Committee.

Record rooms.

Several district reports refer to the saving of labour that has resulted. At the same time the forms used in connection with record rooms have been standardized, a process which should result in considerable saving of expenditure. A good deal has been done of recent years to improve the record rooms of the Province, and though some works for which administrative sanction has been obtained have had to be postponed owing to the war, the complaints of serious congestion are few.

The prosecution of the Head Copyist of Mianwali referred to in last year's report has ended in a conviction. A muharrir of the same district was convicted for the fraudulent removal of a notarial stamp.

Sanction to the introduction of the new copying rules has not yet been received. They continue to work well in Sialkot and Jhelum.

17. Rupees 19½ lakhs were paid in through the Post Office on account of land revenue in twenty-five districts.

Other matters.

Only Rs. 3,360 were remitted in currency notes. In Rohtak the experiment of making this latter method of remittance available has not proved successful and its discontinuance has been recommended. Gurgaon, Karnal, Gujranwala, Montgomery, Jhang and Muzaffargarh are the districts in which the use of money-orders for the payment of land revenue is most general. In Rawalpindi Division an experiment in the collection of land revenue on dates fixed for each village on a regular roster is in progress. It is part of the experiment that a lambarदार shall not be forbidden to pay in whole or part in advance of the date fixed for his village. The suitability of revising the orders now in force under section 63 of the Land Revenue Act to which reference was made in last year's report will be considered when the results of the experiment are known. During the year the Financial Commissioner accepted a suggestion made by the Clerical Establishment Committee that revenue courts should be permitted to serve processes by post. The financial stringency, however, has made it necessary to defer the introduction of this method of service.

18. The volume of litigation for the adjustment of the rents of occupancy tenants was less considerable than in any year since 1906. Of 1,308 suits for enhancement 1,090 were successful. There were only 8 suits for reduction. Almost

a third of the cases were tried in Gujrat where the crop of petitions was due to the announcement of the new demand in Gujrat and Kharian Tahsils. The number of suits in Hoshiarpur has declined with the completion of settlement operations, and in Jullundur also institutions which increased enormously when settlement began are less numerous. In Gurdaspur and Amritsar litigation of this kind has reached its normal level. The increases in Hissar and Rohtak are due to special causes. In Rohtak the figures represent almost entirely the disputes of one village. More than half the Hissar cases are from two villages.

19. Litigation for the ejectment of tenants with rights of occupancy was even more scanty than in previous years. Proceedings against or by tenants-at-will were normal in amount. Applications for the service of notice fell from 13,417 to 11,920 and the notices issued from 30,019 to 26,971, but the ejectments made rose from 5,671 to 6,099.

The statistics of proceedings of the various kinds are very closely parallel to those for the year ending in September 1910, in which the agricultural conditions strongly resembled those of the year under report. Proceedings are comparatively rare in the Rawalpindi and Multan Divisions, and even in the districts where recourse to the courts is more frequent the relations between landlords and tenants are cordial.

20. Only one jagir, that of Rehlu in Kangra, was notified during the year. The Financial Commissioner has arranged to include in the volume of Rules under the Land Acts, which is about to be published, a complete list with appropriate details of the notifications which have issued under this Act. This will provide a record of the progress made under the Act and will keep the subject before the Deputy Commissioners in the districts where there is still scope for action.

Descent of Jagirs Act.

21. Irrigation from canals managed under Act VIII of 1873 was generally satisfactory. Irrigated areas increased in Hissar and Gurgaon but a large decrease took place in Karnal on account of a short supply in the kharif and a weak demand in the rabi. Good rains led to a reduction in Ludhiana and Ferozepore. The Commissioner notes as regards the Sirhind Canal generally that there seems to have been a considerable failure of jowar, charri and maize owing to disease and also excessive rainfall. The net result of adjustments of fixed assessments by the application of the nahri parta rules was a decrease of Rs. 2,373. Irrigation from the Upper Chenab Canal was extended through the Raya branch in Sialkot, Gujranwala and the trans-Ravi portion of Lahore and through the Nokhar branch in Wazirabad and Gujranwala Tahsils. The orders restricting irrigation from this canal in Sialkot to the waste and severed well lands are unpopular and the cause of difficulties in practice. There are also problems connected with communications which are affected by the revision of district boundaries. Difficulties of assessment arising from the mingling of canal and flood waters were settled by the local officers. The supply in Shahpur from the Lower Jhelum Canal is described as sufficient though not abundant and in Lyallpur the tightening up of the supply from the Lower Chenab Canal is said to have been carried out skilfully. In Jhang, however, there have been numerous complaints of shortage of water on both canals. The distributary of the Lower Chenab Canal which had been selected for the experiment of a fixed assessment of land revenue and occupiers' rates has been found to be unsuitable for the purpose and the experiment has therefore been postponed. There has been a large extension of irrigation from the Lower Bari Doab Canal in Multan chiefly for temporary cultivation. Inundation canals generally did very well. Both the Upper and the Lower Sutlej systems showed irrigated areas much in excess of the normal. The results on the Sidhnai in spite of floods and closures to avoid silting-up the canal were satisfactory. The Chenab Inundation Canals in Multan in both harvests matured areas above the average and in Muzaffargarh with a supply which though below normal remained steady the irrigated areas of last year have been exceeded. In the last named district the Financial Commissioner's proposals to enhance the occupiers' rates for rice have been accepted. An enquiry is being made into the practice which has arisen of classifying crop failure according to its supposed origin. The information collected in this way is of doubtful accuracy or value and the abandonment or simplification of the present practice is probably advisable. The Indus canals in Dera Ghazi Khan ran precariously but rain came to the assistance of the crops sown with canal water.

Canals under departmental management.

22. The season was not favourable to the Gurgaon bands and the area matured with their aid, namely, 6,002 acres, though much in excess of the area of the previous year, was far below that of a good year. The total demand of Rs. 6,635 included Rs. 6,162 on account of water-rates. The normal income from water-rates was estimated by the Settlement Officer to be Rs. 5,300. Rs. 10,826 were spent on repairs and maintenance and more would have been spent if more had been available. Owing to unprecedentedly heavy floods in the Ghaggar the Rangoi Canal in Hissar irrigated a large area. Similarly the Sarusti Canal in Karnal, fed by water from the hill streams which ran full in autumn and spring, had a successful year. The irrigated area rose from 11,859 acres to 22,015 acres and the receipts on account of water-rates from Rs. 16,249 to Rs. 37,724. Establishment and contingencies cost Rs. 7,083 and Rs. 10,573 were spent on maintenance and improvements. Other

works for the employment of the waters of hill streams in Karnal have not been so successful. The Shah Nahr in Hoshiarpur started the year 1914 with a new masonry regulator. Its construction, however, proved to have been defective and soon after it had been completed it was considerably damaged by the summer floods of 1914. Measures for its repair before the flood season of 1916 are being taken. The areas irrigated and matured during the year under report remained practically the same as in the preceding year. The income from water-rates amounted to Rs. 30,921 and the expenditure to Rs. 28,127. The new schedule of rates was notified during the year. The main items of expenditure were Rs. 10,902 on clearing and repairs and Rs. 9,237 paid to share-holders. The financial position of the canal is very strong. The Grey Canals in Ferozepore had a very successful year. The irrigated area rose from 136,641 acres to 183,532 acres, the demand on account of water-rates from Rs. 1,58,644 to Rs. 2,16,136 and the water advantage assessment from Rs. 62,397 to Rs. 83,172. The canal fund had an opening balance of Rs. 55,301 and a closing balance of Rs. 86,351. Rs. 40,500 were spent on improvements and Rs. 6,860 on the payment of interest and deduction of debt. The zamindars have now agreed to the revised schedule of water-rates and with the help of Government and the district board the financial position and the efficiency of the canals will be much improved. The Nammal Canal in Mianwali watered 4,130 acres in the kharif and 9,928 acres in the rabi. The receipt from water-rates amounted to Rs. 22,589. Certain serious defects in the system of distributaries resulting in the failure to provide irrigation to those entitled to receive it were discovered and an officer of the Irrigation Department was specially deputed to put this right. A better system has now been introduced and a minor has been constructed for the neglected area. The minor canals and works in Montgomery have all done an abnormally large amount of irrigation. The Kitchin Canals, with the Mehdi Khan Canal which was notified under the Act during the year, flooded 47,686 acres and matured 34,181 acres compared with 20,232 and 11,162 acres, respectively, in the preceding year. The demand on account of water-rates was Rs. 38,521. Expenditure amounting to Rs. 41,070, which included a grant of Rs. 10,000 made by Government was undertaken on the maintenance and improvement of these canals. The Ravi canals, the Garak and the Garkana, also were unusually successful. They are said, however, to be badly in need of improvement, and the advantages which extended irrigation would afford are considered to justify the necessary expenditure. Any proposals which the local officers may make should take into consideration the prior claims of the Sidhnai. It seems very unlikely that there is any room for the extension of seasonal irrigation from the Ravi.

23. Seven thousand and seventeen acres were acquired for public purposes. Of this area 2,581 acres were

acquired for railways, chiefly the Jind-Panipat Railway in Karnal, the Jullundur Doab Branch Railway in Hoshiarpur and Jullundur, the Sialkot Narowal Railway in Sialkot and the Chakwal-Mandra-Bhaun Railway in Jhelum and Rawalpindi. The compensation for land only (excluding trees and buildings and the 15 per cent. addition for compulsory acquisition) averaged Rs. 198 per acre. For canals 3,723 acres were acquired at an average rate of Rs. 82. The difference of the rates is noticed by the Deputy Commissioner of Sialkot where considerable areas were acquired at average rates of Rs. 154 and Rs. 62, respectively, and accounted for by the fact that the canal land acquired is generally high and of small value, while the railways seek the most densely populated areas. The Deputy Commissioner of Sialkot is also of opinion that the tendency is to underestimate the value of purely agricultural land and to overestimate that of suburban land. Acquisition for canals was chiefly in Sialkot, Gujranwala, Gujrat, Montgomery and Multan for the canals of the triple project. 657 acres were acquired for miscellaneous purposes. The chief item was the expropriation of rightholders in the municipal forest at Dharmasala with the object of preserving the hill side which was in a dangerous condition. Altogether Rs. 11,57,657 were paid in compensation for land, the average price being Rs. 165, as compared with Rs. 161 last year.

24. In Rawalpindi and Attock Districts a few embankments were constructed with public money and in Mianwali loans were taken for preparing water-courses and culverts on the Nammal Canal. Otherwise the sinking and repair of wells were the objects for which loans were required. The conditions of the year were favourable and the credit of the people high. Consequently the demand for takavi under Act XIX fell off and only Rs. 1,88,880 were advanced, or about half the amount of the previous year. Ferozepore district took over Rs. 70,000, and the Commissioner notes that the special attention paid to takavi work has led to a substantial increase of wells in that district, a result to which the introduction of the iron Persian wheel and the rise of water level in the tract affected by the Sirhind Canal have largely contributed. No loans at all were given in Hoshiarpur, Lyallpur and Jhang, and only trifling sums were advanced in Ambala, Hissar, Rohtak, Lahore and Shahpur. The only districts which required as much as Rs. 10,000 were Ferozepore, Multan, Sialkot, Gurgaon, Mianwali and Attock. The Commissioner of Jullundur remarks that "a good deal more might be done in the way of advances if tahsildars interested themselves in pushing them." It is possible however that districts do not make more use of takavi because with the improvement in credit due to higher prices and the extension of credit societies land-owners no longer to any considerable extent find it hard to raise loans for improvements in the open market. If loans are available readily in the open market there is less necessity for pushing takavi. The system is generally described as popular. The opportunity of obtaining loans is well-known. Advances are stated to be applied to the objects for which they were given, and the works undertaken with their aid are with few exceptions duly inspected. Public money was expended on the construction or repair of 439 wells, and private funds were used in 3,414 cases. The rate of land improvement of this kind was somewhat less than in the two preceding years, but exceeded the normal of earlier years. Remissions of land revenue were granted for 1,384 wells fallen out of use, 1,253 being in Multan. Protective leases were granted for 3,477 wells. Of these 2,309 were in Lahore or Sialkot which are under settlement, and practically all the rest in the districts of the south-west, whose land revenue system provides for the re-assessment during the currency of settlement of well lands not protected by certificate. The balances at the beginning of the year were Rs. 15,65,472 on account of principal and Rs. 4,213 on account of interest. Rs. 93,518 interest fell due during the year. Collections on account of principal amounted to Rs. 2,26,582, and on account of interest to Rs. 88,824. Remissions of principal or interest were insignificant. Balances of principal and interest overdue at the end of the year were, however, Rs. 19,222 and Rs. 8,335, chiefly owing to dilatoriness in payment in Multan. The financial gain to the provincial Government was Rs. 33,869, or practically the same as last year.

25. As in the case of loans for land improvement the requirements of districts under Act XII of 1884 varied enormously. No advances were made in Hissar, Rohtak, Hoshiarpur, Jullundur and Ferozepore, and in Ambala, Shahpur, Jhelum, Rawalpindi and Jhang the amount loaned was trifling. Gurgaon, Amritsar, Gurdaspur, Montgomery, Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan were the only considerable borrowers. Advances were almost always required for the purchase of bullocks although in Gurgaon, Montgomery and Muzaffargarh seed also had to be provided with borrowed money. In Gurdaspur the borrowers were chiefly the inhabitants of villages damaged by floods in the Beas. In Montgomery the demand by colonists is said to be endless. The demand in Muzaffargarh which in the previous year was Rs. 11,665 and in the past has been on an average about Rs. 40,000 rose to over Rs. 80,000. Bullocks and seed were purchased. The whole amount advanced throughout the province was Rs. 2,64,227 or almost the same as in the preceding year. Rs. 3,76,985 on account of principal were collected, and Rs. 24,954 on account of interest. The balance of



principal at the beginning of the year was Rs. 4,97,626, and at the end Rs. 3,83,689. The large balance of principal overdue at the end of the year, Rs. 24,823, accrued chiefly in Gujranwala, Multan, Muzaffargarh and Dera Ghazi Khan, where collections were delayed. The provincial result of the loan operations under this act was a gain of Rs. 7,637.

26. No forest settlement of importance was undertaken during the year. The selection of forests in Kangra for regenerative closures and for transfer to district management to which reference was made in last year's report was continued by an officer of the Forest Department on special duty and proposals were made by him after the close of the year. In connection with the transfer of the Dera Ghazi Khan rakhs from the Forest Department to the Deputy Commissioner a scheme for their future management was called for in 1912 and was prepared in 1913 by the Deputy Commissioner with the assistance of a Forest Ranger. It was forwarded by the Commissioner to the Conservator of Forests during the year under report, and has now reached the Financial Commissioner and is under his consideration. Approval has been given to schemes for the browsing of the 55th and 56th Camel Corps in Multan and Montgomery and the 57th Corps in Multan. The Deputy Commissioner of Shahpur was authorised to secure the acceptance by right-holders of a scheme for the browsing of the 53rd Corps in the hill rakhs of that district. In Jhelum the proposals made by the Forest Department for meeting the requirements of the 52nd Corps were adversely criticised by the Deputy Commissioner and are now being re-examined in the light of the pronouncements made in the past by Government regarding the lines on which the Jhelum forests should be administered. It has not been possible to make much progress with the allied scheme of providing grazing for camels on the line of march. The management of the Shahpur Kandi forests continues to be satisfactory. The income was Rs. 2,890 and the expenditure Rs. 2,512. More than Rs. 1,100 of the profit made was put into the Pahari Co-operative Bank which is promising very well. The new system for the management of the Pindigheb rakhs in Attock was brought into force, leases for grazing and cultivation being given.

Reference has been made in paragraph 5 to the effect of the extension of irrigation on tirni-paying lands. The area of unclassified forests and Government waste lands under the control of the Deputy Commissioner has fallen by about 340,000 acres, the area held by Government tenants showing a corresponding increase. The largest decrease in the waste took place in Montgomery and amounted to 238,000 acres. The decreases in Lyallpur and Gujranwala are due to sales and allotments of lands commanded by the Upper Chenab Canal, but that in Shahpur where the areas of the Khushab rakhs have been recalculated is merely statistical. In Montgomery the Financial Commissioner has sanctioned arrangements by which all camels in the Ravi tahsils, whether native or foreign, will be treated as "naubaramad," the right to collect tirni at the authorised rates being leased to local contractors. This system will permit the gradual extinction of the camel tirni demand concurrently with the colonization of the waste. The system of assessments fixed for a period will continue in the Sutlej tahsils, but is unsuited to a tract which is being rapidly colonised. The system of annual contracts for cattle grazing already provides for automatic adjustment of the demand. In Multan the Lower Bari Doab Canal area has been formed into two new chaks for tirni purposes in which the contracts will be auctioned annually. Elsewhere the present system will continue. The area of Government land cultivated by lessees rose from 151,839 acres in the previous year to 213,430 chiefly on account of the extensive grant of single harvest leases on the Lower Bari Doab Canal in Multan, but partly also on account of favourable climatic conditions. Two applications for the grant of land for cultivation with the aid of tube wells were received, but no practical test of the usefulness of these in lands available for lease has yet been made.

NOTE.—The return for Shahpur in last year's report was wrong. The correct figure is 15,280 not 1,418.

27. Section 4 of the Chos Act has now been applied to 22 hill villages of Ambala District. Proposals for further restrictions under section 5 were also submitted to Government, but action has been postponed during the present financial stringency. A record of rights in respect of the notified areas was prepared, a tahsildar on special duty being employed for the purpose. Proceedings were also taken to estimate and award compensation for the restrictions imposed under section 4. In Hoshiarpur proposals for the extension of the areas to which section 5 applies were made. Orders on them have been postponed on technical and financial grounds. The sowings on the Siwaliks made during the rains of 1914 have turned out only partially successful partly on account of the break in the monsoon in August 1914, and partly on account of the inadequacy of the monsoon of 1915. Sowings were repeated throughout the notified area. The Commissioner, Mr. Fagan, passed across the range in October 1915, and was struck with the improved appearance presented by the western slope.

28. In paragraph 27 of last year's report the Financial Commissioner noticed the necessity for re-examining the returns of total cultivated area received from certain districts, and he promised to have the causes of the most marked variations investigated. For two districts the returns were found to be erroneous and were corrected; in the others the variations are attributed either to statistical inaccuracies or to vicissitudes of season during the year 1913-14. The correct provincial figures will be inserted in last year's report by an addendum slip. The compilation of the present returns has brought to light a discrepancy of nearly 500,000 acres of cultivated land in the previous returns from Shahpur, and it is therefore necessary to exclude that district from consideration in calculating the increase in cultivation. In the remaining districts of the province the total increase in cultivated area brought on record amounted to 111,279 acres. The increase is general. The same proportion of the cultivated area, namely, 11½ per cent., as in the preceding year, is under mortgage. The proportion held by mortgagees of non-agricultural tribes has fallen slightly and is now 5 per cent.

29. The main feature of the transfer statistics of the year is the decrease in the area affected by mortgages and redemptions. The area in which the proprietary rights were sold rose from 121,809 acres in the preceding year to 133,933 acres in the year under report, but the latter figure is inflated by the inclusion of over 17,000 acres sold from the Skinner estate in Hissar, and normal sales have fallen. Mortgages of proprietary right were created on 225,668 acres and extinguished on 239,644 acres, the corresponding figures last year having been 245,631 and 282,290, respectively. Transactions of all kinds have been less important than before in the Ambala Division, the Jullundur Division (except Hoshiarpur), and the districts of Gurdaspur, Multan and Muzaffargarh. There has been a large increase of transactions of all kinds in Lahore and Sialkot in which settlement operations are being concluded, and an appreciable increase in Gujranwala, Montgomery and Lyallpur.

Different explanations of the variations are given in different districts. The decrease in mortgages and redemptions in Kangra is ascribed to the inability of military men on active service to return and invest their savings in land as they used each year to do. This, however, leaves unexplained the rise in sales and the firmness of transfer values. In Ludhiana and Ferozepore redemptions which were abnormally numerous in the preceding year following on the introduction of the Redemption of Mortgages Act regained their usual level. The general conclusion appears to be that the year was not much, if at all, better than an average year. The total areas sold were below normal, and those mortgaged not in excess of normal, the only unusual feature being the comparatively small areas redeemed. That may to some extent be explained in the way suggested in the Kangra report, but it is also possible that



some of the money which might have been applied in redemption of mortgage has been diverted to other objects, such as the acquisition of colony lands. The process of reducing the area under mortgage continued, though the rate of release was less than in any year during the last decade.

30. It was pointed out in paragraph 29 of last year's report that the real selling value of cultivated land was obscured by the magnitude of the sums spent in acquiring land in the suburbs of Lahore. Over a crore was spent on the purchase of 3,335 acres of which 2,204 were cultivated. As desired by Government in paragraph 12 of His Honour's remarks on that report the figures for Lahore have been re-verified and no necessity for correction has been discovered. During the year now under report, there has been, as the Commissioner of Lahore remarks, a cessation of speculation in the city, and the sum spent was under Rs. 29 lakhs although the area sold increased to 4,955 acres (including 3,637 cultivated). In other municipal areas also, notably Sialkot and Amritsar, smaller areas than in the recent past have been alienated. The all-round sale price of land has therefore fallen from Rs. 249 per acre cultivated to Rs. 180. The rate is much in excess of any rate prevailing before 1913. Practically every district in which the calculations are not affected by urban speculation reports a rise in the value of land, and it is clear that the appreciation of the value of land devoted to agriculture has continued unchecked. This conclusion is borne out by the increase in the consideration for which land is mortgaged. The average mortgage money per acre cultivated was Rs. 130 in the year under report and Rs. 124 in the preceding year. This rise has taken place in spite of the tendency which the growth of mortgages for limited periods to non-agriculturists has, as is noticed in the Lyallpur report, to reduce the rate of consideration.

31. The year was an uneventful one so far as the Land Alienation Act was concerned. The only new tribes notified were the Biloches of Ferozepore and the Sainis of Gujranwala. The Financial Commissioner found it necessary to issue instructions for the guidance of Deputy Commissioners in making references under section 21 A (1) of the Act to Civil Courts of appellate jurisdiction. At the same time enquiry was made as to the extent to which in the past action had been necessary for the revision of a decree or order of a Civil Court contrary to the provisions of the Act, and it was found that such occasions have been exceedingly rare. No new methods of evading the Act have been discovered. *Benami* transactions and misdescription of caste or tribe are the commonest expedients. The former is reported to be infrequently resorted to in several districts and appears to be commonest in Sialkot and Rawalpindi. Claims to membership of agricultural tribes cause a great deal of work in Sialkot, but generally the amount of work thrown on the district establishment by the Act is not considerable. In Lyallpur almost half the temporary alienations have been in favour of non-agriculturists and in forms permitted by the Act, and the same was the case in Jhang. It is a fair inference that evasion of the Act is generally either impracticable or unprofitable. The results of the alienations reported during the year were on the whole favourable to the agricultural tribes. They bought 8,498 more acres than they sold, and redeemed 20,039 acres more than the area redeemed from them, but pledged 28,270 more acres than they took on mortgage. The area redeemed by them exceeded by 5,881 acres the area on which they created new mortgages. As has already been observed this rate of release is less than in any year during the last decade.

32. The volume of case work disposed of by Revenue Officers was practically the same as in the preceding year as was also the number of pending cases. A considerable increase occurred in those under the Land Revenue Act, corresponding to the increased issue of coercive processes, and a large decrease took place in miscellaneous cases and in cases under the Land Alienation Act. Nearly half the total cases under

Act XIII of 1900 were decided in Jullundur and Gujrat, which are under settlement, and in Rawalpindi. In Shahpur and Dera Ghazi Khan partition work is heavy, and in the former district a special staff was entertained for its disposal. In Montgomery the number of miscellaneous cases is swollen by the increase in the grant of single harvest leases, but a general cause of diminution in the disposal of cases of this kind is the smaller use made of the Loans Acts. The great increase in miscellaneous cases in Muzaffargarh, however, is attributed to more numerous demands for *takavi*. Cases under the Redemption of Mortgages Act were numerous in Amritsar, and special reference is made in Rohtak to the popularity of the Act. Revenue judicial business instituted, decided and pending in courts of appeal and revision remained unaltered, but a large decrease took place in revenue executive appeals. The pending file increased and is considerable in Rawalpindi Division but has fallen to a low level in other courts.

**Tour of Commissioners.**

33. The returns of touring done by Commissioners refer to the year ending 31st March 1915 :—

*Ambala*—Lieutenant-Colonel C. M. Dallas, C.S.I., was Commissioner for the whole year and spent 108 days on tour.

*Jullundur*.—The Hon'ble Mr. P. J. Fagan held charge for 309 days and spent 56 days on tour. Mr. T. Millar, was in charge for 4 days and then the Hon'ble Mr. H. J. Maynard, C.S.I., was Commissioner for the remaining 52 days of the year, of which he spent 25 days on tour.

*Lahore*.—Mr. H. A. Casson, C.S.I., was Commissioner throughout the year, spending 70 days on tour.

*Rawalpindi*.—Lieutenant-Colonel F. Popham Young, C.I.E., held charge for the whole year, of which he spent 116 days on tour.

*Multan*.—Mr. C. J. Hallifax was Commissioner throughout the year and remained 111 days on tour.
