SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

G A N J A M.

1. I have the honor to submit my Report on the settlement of Land and Sundry Sources of Revenue in this District, for Fasli 1270 (1860-61), together with the usual Statements as per accompanying list of packet.

I. SETTLEMENT.—2. Of the Taluqs in the principal Division, Gumsur and the two Divisions of Poobacondah and Moherry of the Berhampur Taluq, were settled by myself at the four stations of Russelcondah, Poorooshottapur, Chetterpur and Berhampur; the Division which constituted the old Taluq of Itchapur was settled by Captain Lane at Itchapur. Mr. Hooper settled the Wadada Taluq in the Sub-division at the five stations of Cotabomaly, Julmoor, Nagarekatakam, Byree and Chicacole.

II. VARIATIONS IN THE NUMBER AND TENURES OF VILLAGES.—3. The marginal table shows the tenures of villages during Fasli 1270, compared with those of the past Fasli, and the causes of changes are given below.

RYOTWAR.—4. Of the 734 villages which remained under this head during Fasli 1269, seven were rented out (3 for one Fasli and 4 for more than one Fasli), the Ryots having refused to take them on fair terms. Eleven villages have, however, reverted to this head, viz., 3 from Joint Rents, 3 from Annual Rents and 5 from Rents for more than one year; thus raising the number of villages to 738.

JOINT RENTS.—5. In last Fasli there were 426 villages under this head; of these 3 reverted to Ryotwar, 11 to Rents for more than one year, and 2 to Annual Rents. Twelve villages have, however, been added, viz., 9 from the head of Annual Rents and 3 from Rents for more than one year. The number of villages under this head during the Fasli under review is, therefore, reduced to 422.

ANNUAL RENTS.—6. The number of villages which remained under this head in last Fasli is 26; of these 3 reverted to Ryotwar, 9 to Joint Rents, and 1 to Rents for more than one year. Five villages were, however, added to this head, viz., 3 from Ryotwar and 2 from Joint Rents; thus reducing the number of villages under this head to 18.

RENTS FOR MORE THAN ONE YEAR.—7. In Fasli 1269 there were 42 villages under this head; of these 5 reverted to Ryotwar and 3 to Joint Rents. Sixteen villages have, however, been transferred to it, viz., 4 from Ryotwar, 11 from Joint Rents and 1 from Annual Rents; thus raising the number of villages under this head to 50.

INAM VILLAGES.—8. In Fasli 1269 the number of villages under this head was 236, which included, as has hitherto been the practice, 14 villages in Surda in which there are at present no Government Ryots, the Samustanam Paiks who reside in them cultivating only their inam lands. In the Fasli under notice they have been transferred to the head Jeroyeti (depopulated), to which they properly belong; thus reducing the number to 222.

SETTLEMENT REPORT OF

DEPOPULATED VILLAGES.—9. The above-mentioned 14 villages having been transferred to this head; there is an increase under this head as compared with the Fasli 1269.

10. With reference to the Board's Circular, dated the 24th July last, No. 3,946, I have to observe that the original statement of monthly cultivation is rendered by village Curnums to the Tahasildars, except in the Gumsur Taluq and Moherry Division of Berhampur. The majority of the Curnums of these Taluqs are incompetent, their emoluments are very trifling. Instances of negligence are visited, however, with severe punishments, and much land has of late been brought to account, and several Curnums who were found to have connived at the concealment of land, have been dismissed as a warning to others. Many of the villages in Gumsur and Moherry have now been measured by their Curnums for the first time, the remaining villages are still under measurement. In 18,905 Ryotwar Pattas, there were no alterations; 2,258 were altered in consequence of changes in the Ryots' holdings, such as relinquishments and additions, &c.; 3,089 fresh Pattas were granted for lands newly taken up and for holdings in villages newly brought under Ryotwar.

III. SEASON.—11. The season has been remarkable for its adverse nature. The Coast Taluqs especially suffered much from want of water, the fall of rain having been unusually scanty. The only heavy fall in this District during the entire Fasli occurred in September and a considerable portion of the young paddy plants perished; except in lands under river channels, the transplantation which was comparatively small, took place very late in the season. The paddy crop was also injured by locusts. The season was nevertheless peculiarly favorable to some species of dry grain and oil-seed and the revenue was punctually paid up, though not in most cases with that ease to which the Ryots have been accustomed for the last few years. Notwithstanding severe losses by the Ryots, remissions were not granted, except in two villages of the Sub-division. I thought it unfair that Government should be called upon to bear the loss of the first bad season succeeding many prosperous years in one of the lightest assessed Districts of the Presidency, and the justice of this decision was on the whole admitted by the Ryots.

12. Cholera and small-pox prevailed with some virulence. There were 4,834 cases, of which 1,757 proved fatal. Cattle also suffered from murrain, though not to any great extent.

18. The cist of 859 acres of lands taken upon progressive cowle during the Fasli under review, was Rupees 1,377 including 151 acres which were omitted in the accounts of the preceding Fasli; while that taken in the preceding year was 3,948 acres,

subject to a cist of 6,102 Rupees. The season was discouraging to speculators in land. The Ryots of certain villages in Gumsur having agreed to increase their rent in the event of their being allowed to include in the Joint Rents 56 acres of land taken on progressive cowle in the previous year; these lands were deducted from the cowle grants; 8 acres of land were abandoned owing to the inability of the ryots to bring them under cultivation.

VI. ACTUAL CULTIVATION.—19. The actual cultivation during the Fasli under notice is shown in the following Statement:—

VII. WASTE CHARGED AND REMITTED.—20. A sum of Rupees 378 was remitted on account of entire fields consisting of 117 acres of land left waste in the villages of Cottakola and Alikam in Chicacole Taluq for want of water, and the amount of waste charged was Rupees 14,767 on acres 8,302; of which a portion was kept for pasturage.

VIII. REMISSIONS.—21. A remission of 8,623 Rupees was granted. Of which Rupees 8,428 are nominal, being on account of Cowle remission, and Rupees 195 on account of Sari or usual remission granted to individuals not belonging to the agricultural class.

IX. SUNDRY ITEMS.—22. There is a total decrease of Rupees 61,650 under the head Joint Rents, in consequence of its having been included in Ryotwar.

23. The net increase of Rupees 160 under the head Cuttoobady on Inams, is the result of Cuttoobadies paid by Samastanam Paiks in Gumsur, which have been hitherto shown through an oversight under Shotrium on Inam villages, viz., 173 Rupees having been now brought to this head, as well as Rupees 5 in Wadada, and of a decrease of Rupees 18 in Cuttoobady of certain lapsed Inams in Berhampur, which were incorporated with Jeroyeti.

24. The decrease of Rupees 25 in Quit-rent in Gumsur, is in consequence of the rent having been redeemed under the Freehold rules by the proprietors of the Aska Sugar works.

25. The increase of Rupee 1-8-0 in Government plantation is owing to an enhanced offer made for Orange gardens in Gumsur Taluq.

26. The decrease of Rupees 4-12-0 in Chayroots arises from the absence of an offer in Berhampur Taluq.

27. The increase of 5-14-0 in small farms of Gumsur is the result of an enhanced offer.

X. SPECIAL PRODUCTS.—28. The increase in the extent of land cultivated with Sugar-cane has occurred chiefly in the Zemindary estates.

29. The decrease in Cotton cultivation is attributable to the preference shown by the Ryots for other products.

30. The Zemindars of this District do not render their returns of special products regularly, nor can these returns be considered as trust worthy. I therefore propose with the Board's permission to confine these returns for the future to Government Taluqs.

XI. LAND REVENUE SETTLEMENT.—31. The following is an abstract Statement showing the general results of Land Revenue Settlement in comparison with the preceding Fasli:—

32. The increase of 5,000 Rupees in Permanent Settlement is due to the addition of 5,000 Rupees to the Peshcush of Hautghur estate under orders of the Government, dated 21st February 1860, No. 274.

33. The cause of decrease in Shotriam, Jodi, &c., has been explained in paragraph 23 of this report.

34. The increase in Rents for more than one year is in consequence of eight more villages having been added to this head during the Fasli under review.

35. The decrease in Annual Rents is owing to eight villages having been transferred to other heads.

36. The increase in Ryotwar arises chiefly from four villages having been added to this head during the Fasli under review; from waste lands brought under cultivation, from the discovery of concealed cultivation, from certain lapsed Inams having been incorporated with Jeroyeti, and from cowle lands having been brought up to full assessment, &c.

37. With reference to paragraph 6 of the Board's Circular Proceedings, Miscellaneous No. 2,695, dated the 28th May last, I beg to annex a Memorandum marked A, showing the difference between the Jumabundy Statements and the Quarterly Abstracts rendered to the Accountant General for Fasli 1268. It will be found that the amounts entered in the Jumabundy statements are quite correct, no alterations are therefore required in them. The sum of Rupees 79,065-3-1 shown in column 2 as a discrepancy has so appeared, owing to the revenue derived from jointly rented villages having been included in the revenue derived from Rents in the Abstracts rendered to the Accountant General, and the difference of Rupees 78,522-3-1 in column 3 is referable to the same cause, but a sum of Rupees 543 belonging to the head Rents was carried to the head of

Rents for more than one year in the Returns submitted to the Accountant General, as shown in column 4; the total of these two sums constituting the difference of Rupees 79,065-3-1 shown in column 2.

XII. SUNDRY SOURCES OF REVENUE, ABKARRY.—38. There is a decrease of Rupees 1,714 in Abkarry, which is chiefly due to the withdrawal of the Regiment stationed at Russelcondah, and to the closing of two licensed shops.

MOTURPHA.—39. The decrease of Rupees 630 in Moturpha is chiefly attributable to some of the Moturpha Ryots having been subjected to Income Tax.

SALT.—40. The increase in the balance of Salt on hand at the close of the Fasli under notice, over that of the preceding year is 1,96,360 maunds, and the decrease in the quantity stored is 1,99,581 maunds, which is due to 4,99,569 maunds of Salt manufactured during Fasli 1268 having been stored in Fasli 1269; whereas, during the Fasli under review, only 1,02,393 maunds of the preceding year were stored.

41. In the quantity manufactured during the Fasli under report, there is an increase of 2,61,999 maunds as shown in the margin. This is attributable to the peculiar nature of the season.

42. There is an increase in both the Home and Inland sales as particularized in the margin, which is due to the increased facilities afforded to traders; 8,400 maunds were also sold for exportation by sea to Calcutta on Private Trade.

43. The increase in wastage is due in part to the Salt of Ganjam cotaurs of Fasli 1267 having been sold during the Fasli under notice, and to some of the Salt heaps of Nowpada and Wommervelly having sustained damage during the storm of December 1859.

44. The excess of Rupees 98,887 in the sales as compared with the preceding Fasli, is partly owing to the increased sales and partly to the enhancement in the price.

SEA CUSTOMS.—45. The increase of Rupees 28,157 in this source of Revenue is attributable in part to the extension of trade and to the alterations in the rates of duties under Act X of 1860.

STAMPS.—46. The large increase in the sale of Stamps is attributable to Act XXXVI of 1860, and the expected operation of the new limitation of Suits' Act.

47. With reference to paragraph 9 of the Board's Circular Proceedings, No. 3,140, dated the 17th June last, I beg to state that the discrepancy between the Jummabundy Statement No. 10,

and the Demand, Collection and Balance Statement for June 1860, on account of the demand of Extra Revenue, is due to the exclusion from the latter Return of the items enumerated in the annexed Memorandum marked B. In the accounts rendered to the Accountant General, some other items, such as penalties for not using Stamps and Pauper stamp duty have not been included under the head in question. Similar discrepancies exist in the accounts rendered for Fasli 1268; but during the Fasli under notice a perfect correspondence has been secured between all the accounts rendered from this office.

49. The increase under the head "Permanently settled" is partly owing to more punctual payments, and partly to the collection of heavy balances which remained at the close of the preceding Fasli, as well as to the cause given in paragraph 32.

50. The increase in "Not permanently settled" is referrible to the reasons assigned in paragraphs 33 to 36.

51. The causes of variations under the heads of Abkarry, Moturpha, Salt, Sea Customs and Stamps have been given in paragraphs 38 and 39, and 44 to 46.

XIV. SEVOY JUMMA.—52. There is a net increase of Rupees 849 which is the result of a gross increase of Rupees 6,035, and of a gross decrease of Rupees 5,186 under the head "Sevoy Jumma." The gross increase is chiefly due to the surplus proceeds realized from the sale of the produce of the Inam lands attached to the office of Curnum of the Arsavelly village in Wadada (which had hitherto been kept under the head of Deposits) having been now brought to the credit of this head during the Fasli under review, under the orders of the Board of Revenue, dated the 17th December 1859, No. 5,275. It shows also receipts of certain zufted Inams in Gumsur and Berhampur Taluqs, also to the credit to this head of the balance of the amount realized from the sale of the Polaky estate which the late proprietor refused to receive; to the sale of certain pieces of lands under Freehold rules and to the increased penalties levied under the operation of Act XXXVI of 1861. The decrease is because certain items, such as sale of the produce of Jeroyeti land under dispute between a village of Wadada Taluq and the Kurkavalsa estate; also of confiscated Rum (which items were credited in the previous Fasli), did not recur during the Fasli under notice. There was also a falling off in the amount of commission on private estates in consequence of increased expenditure in Purla Kimedya estate. A smaller extent of excess cultivation has also been discovered subsequent to the settlement, besides which Refunds of charges and Ferry rents which do not properly belong to this head have been excluded from it.

53. The decrease in the Interest Account arises from the more punctual payments.

XV. DEMAND, COLLECTION AND BALANCE OF CURRENT REVENUE.—54. The Demand, Collection and Balance of each Source of Current Revenue are tabulated below:—

55. The balance of Rupees 14,853 remaining uncollected under all the heads but Income Tax at the close of the Fasli, has been reduced up to the end of July to Rupees 8,178. This balance is in part due to the unfavorable nature of the season and partly to the disagreements between the Ryots and the renter of Polaky. Measures have, however, been adopted for the recovery of the entire balance during the first kists of the current Fasli.

56. The assessed demand on Incomes up to the close of Fasli under review is Rs. 38,834-14-9, and the collections during the above period amounted to Rupees 34,902-7-1, leaving a balance of Rupees 3,932-7-8. In the month of July, however, a further sum of Rupees 10,547-7-1 has been assessed, and Rupees 11,158-4-3 have been collected, leaving a balance of 3,321-10-6 uncollected at the close of July last.

58. Of the balance of Rupees 3,750 remaining uncollected at the close of the Fasli under report, Rupees 315 have been recommended for remission, and of the remainder a greater portion is due against the Moheri Taluq owing to the carelessness of the late Tahsildar.

59. With reference to paragraphs 10 and 11 of the Board's Proceedings dated the 22nd May last, No. 2,610, I have only to state that I would have inquired into the particulars of these old balances, but the unfavorable nature of the season determined me to defer doing so, as any such inquiry at the last settlement would have ended in the recommendation for remission of the greater part if not the whole. If the ensuing season be favorable as it promises to be, a greater portion of it will be collected, and as to the remainder recommendation for writing off the accounts will be made in my report for the current Fasli.

XVII. RECOMMENDATION FOR REMISSION OF IRRECOVERABLE ARREARS.—60. Subjoined is a table showing the particulars of the sum now recommended for remission.

61. The balance due against the Berhampur Taluq, viz., Rupees 47-2-8 is on account of the Ferry rent of the Ganjam river for Fasli 1269. This Ferry was rented out for Rupees 355½ and the Renter only paid Rupees 283-3-4 within the close of the Fasli, leaving a balance of 72-4-8; of which Rupees 25-2-0 were recovered by the sale of his dwelling house and the remainder is irrecoverable, the defaulter possessing no other property whatever.

62. The balance against the Wadada Taluq on account of Jeroyeti, Cuttoobady and Moturpha, viz., Rupees 267-12-8, arises from the poverty of certain Jeroyeti Ryots from certain Jeroyeti holdings having been taken up for roads or washed away by floods. A Cuttoobady Inam land was also taken up for roads. Death, desertion and poverty of certain Moturpha Ryots accounts for the remainder.

63. Under the above explanation, I trust the Board will be pleased to obtain the sanction of Government for writing off the accounts the above sum of Rupees 314-15-4.

XVIII. COERCIVE PROCESS.—64. Coercive process in the collection of revenue was employed in

Gumsur to a somewhat greater extent than is usual in this District, owing to the adverse nature of the season as shown in the margin; and I apprehend that putta lands must be sold in a few cases.

XIX. CHARGES.—65. The increase in Collectors' salary, &c., is due chiefly to the disbursement to the Acting Principal Assistant Collector of the deputation allowance, in

addition to the charge of salary to the confirmed Principal Assistant now Acting for the Collector of the Kistna District.

66. That in the Huzur and District establishments is due to the revision of the Huzur establishment under the orders of Government, dated the 11th April 1860, No. 555, and to the disbursement during the Fasli under notice of arrears of pay of some of the officers.

67. The decrease in Saderward and Extra Revenue Charges not chargeable to any particular Source of Revenue, is owing in the former case to the entire charges of the year not having been disbursed within the close of the Fasli under review; and in the latter to the short period during which the Collector was on circuit, as well as to the diminished amount of rewards paid for the destruction of wild beasts.

68. The increase in Tent Allowance and Medical Revenue Charges, arises in the first instance from the arrears of the previous year having been charged during the Fasli under notice, as well as from the disbursement of increased pay to one of the Dressers who was promoted to the first class.

69. The causes for the variations in the several items under the head of Salt, have been given in the column of Remarks of Statement No. 17.

70. The excess in the commission to Stamp Vendors is in consequence of the increased sales of Stamps under the operation of Act XXXVI of 1860.

71. The total increase under the head of Income Tax Establishment and Extra Charges, results from there having been no such establishment during the preceding year; and that under Refunds, is chiefly due to the collections made by me from the Wards under the management of the Court, and from the local proprietors of the Aska Sugar Works having been refunded to them under the orders of the Board, dated the 26th February 1861, No. 1,040, in consequence of the assessment on, and collections from, them having been made by the Court of Wards and by the Income Tax Commissioners respectively.

72. With reference to the remarks given in the report for the variations in the several items of receipts and disbursements, I beg to suggest the desirability of showing them in the column of Remarks of the Statements to which they refer; allusion of course being made in the report itself.

XX. VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.—73. The new system of village accounts is in full operation excepting in some of the villages of Gumsir and Moheri, as has been already reported in the Settlement Report of Fasli 1269.

XXI. LANDS ACQUIRED BY PUBLIC SERVANTS.—74. No lands have been acquired by public servants during the Fasli under report.

SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

VIZAGAPATAM.

1. I have the honor to submit the usual Annual Report on the Land and Extra Sources of Revenue of this District for Fasli 1270 (A. D. 1860-61), together with seventeen accounts in illustration of the details.

2. The Government Taluqs in this District have hitherto been three in number, viz., (1) Golgondah, (2) Survasiddy, and (3) Palcondah. The two former have, under instructions* from Mr. Pelly, been merged into one Taluq under the denomination of the "Nursipatam Taluq," Golgondah and Survasiddy being considered Sub-divisions. Palcondah continues to be rented to Messrs. Arbuthnot and Co. In this report, therefore, one estate only is treated of as belonging to Government.

I. VILLAGES AT WHICH THE SETTLEMENT WAS MADE.—3. The following table exhibits the particular villages at which the Settlement for Fasli 1270 was made in the Nursipatam Taluq :—

The marginal statement shows the number of Puttahs issued in the Nursipatam Taluq during the last two Faslis, showing a decrease of fifteen on the whole; this is owing chiefly to the Ryotwar villages, referred to in the preceding paragraph, having been transferred to rent. With reference to the Board's Miscellaneous Circular, No. 3,946, dated 24th July, paragraph 1, I have to state that the Monthly Cultivation Form No. 1 has been in vogue in the Nursipatam Taluq since October 1859, and has hitherto been found to be a sufficient check against fraud.

6. Regarding the introduction of permanent Puttahs, I have to report that the whole of the Puttahs issued last year were of the permanent form sent with the Board's Circular Proceedings of the 23rd May 1860, No. 2,494; for the future, those Puttahs which are required to be changed will alone be renewed. No report of the Ryots having demurred to receive permanent Puttahs have as yet reached me; but I have reason to believe that the permanent Puttah system is much appreciated by the Puttahdars themselves.

III. SEASON AND SANATORY STATE OF THE DISTRICT.—7. The season was a very disastrous one particularly to the Survasiddy Sub-division. The north-east monsoon completely failed, and the consequence was, that the paddy crops particularly suffered. The amount of remission granted, as also the cause for that remission, will be found under the proper head.

To Board 7th December 1860,
No. 1,276. 8. In the Sub-division of Golgondah the failure of the monsoon was not felt, as the tanks there are chiefly supplied by hill streams.

9. During the year the total rain-fall in the District has been only 26 inches, or is nearly a third below that of the preceding year.

10. The District, usually a healthy one, has been this year quite the contrary. Cholera has been bad during the last two months, particularly in the town of Vizagapatam where as many as 557 people died of this dreadful disease. Every means were adopted to furnish the people here and in the District with "Cholera pills" made up at the Civil Dispensary; but without some persons to watch the effects of the medicine, it is simple working in the dark. It would be a good thing if Government, instead of withdrawing as they lately did their patronage from Dispensaries, would establish small Dispensaries throughout the District, to be supervised by pensioned Apothecaries; these Apothecaries could also do much to spread vaccination. Small pox is as much or even more to be dreaded than cholera. I beg to refer you to an abstract report from the Civil Surgeon of the District, to show the Board that the present machinery is quite unsuited, from the utter want of supervision, to carry out effectually the intentions of Government.

ABSTRACT REPORT upon Vaccination from July 1858 to June 1861, with reference to Proceedings of Board of Revenue, dated 22nd May 1861, No. 2,610.

"From 1st July 1858 to 30th June 1859, 7,952 successful, and 43 unsuccessful cases of vaccination are reported; only five out of the twelve Vaccinators reported unsuccessful cases.

"From 1st July 1859 to 30th June 1860, 8,003 successful, and 81 unsuccessful cases are reported; only six Vaccinators out of twelve having reported unsuccessful cases.

"From 1st July 1860, to 30th June 1861, 9,557 successful, and 136 unsuccessful cases are reported; all the Vaccinators having reported a few unsuccessful cases.

"There can be no doubt that these returns are not correct; almost a year and half ago while at Chicacole, I inquired into the matter and was informed by the Vaccinators that the Police refused to report their unsuccessful cases; but this does not appear to be the case in this District, as a few such cases from time to time have been reported by all the Vaccinators. I believe it is the duty of a Vaccinator to bring all the children he vaccinates before the Head of Police of the village when the operations are performed, who then signs the Vaccinator's returns if he finds them correct. It is very probable either that the parents of the children who were not successfully vaccinated have refused to bring them before the Police, or that the Vaccinator himself or the Head of Police have not thought them worth the trouble of looking after. I do not think that the fact of such a small number of unsuccessful cases being reported proves that the reports of successful cases are exaggerated. The Vaccinators may think it a disgrace to report a considerable want of success; but I do not believe the returns are to be depended upon, as neither the Police nor the Vaccinators are to be trusted when left to themselves in the matter as they are. The only remedy is more frequent supervision."

11. While on this subject, I beg leave to add an Extract from a report from Dr. Donaldson at Vizianagrum, showing the want felt there for something like a Dispensary since the closing of the Station Hospital, and beg the Board will advocate some measures being adopted there for the relief called for.

EXTRACT.

"In reply to your letter, No. 225, I have the honor to inform you that before the Station Hospital was shut up, I not only admitted all wounded persons into it who applied for relief as were sent to the Hospital by the Head of Police, but I encouraged all sick persons in the neighbourhood and those requiring any operation performed, to apply for aid. Many who would not go on to Vizagapatam* came at that time and received

treatment from me. As the Dresser was removed some months ago, I applied through Dr. Cooper for another Dresser, and requested that an allowance might be granted to the Surgeon in charge of the station here, who often had as many patients from the neighbouring towns and villages as are usually present in a Civil Dispensary. No answer to this application was received, and during my absence at Waltair, the supply of medicines, stationery, &c., to the Station Hospital were withdrawn, the Dresser was not sent back and the Hospital was shut up. I was sorry to have to refuse the case you refer to, but I had no place for him in my Regimental Hospital, and as there is no supply of medicines for such cases, the supply in the Regimental Hospital being granted for Sepoys and those in the service of Government, I am virtually excluded from affording that aid to the Native sick which I before readily accorded, and am still most willing to accord. In the instance referred to, believing that eight hours in a Dooly would do the man no harm, I thought it best, and the safest course for the patient, to send him to the Civil Hospital where he would have all his wants supplied.

"As there is a large population in this neighbourhood anxious to avail themselves of medical aid, I shall feel much obliged if you will refer the question to Government, and as, if a Dresser and a supply of medicines are again allowed, a very considerable amount of extra labor will be thrown upon the Surgeon in charge, I beg that you will at the same time recommend that such an allowance as is given for charge of a Civil Dispensary may be granted here also."

12. The Rajah of Bobily keeps a pensioned Apothecary at Bobily and has a Dispensary there, but Bobily being in an out-of-the-way part of the country, his Hospital affords but little relief.

13. The Rajah of Vizianagrum also keeps a Dresser at Vizianagrum, but chiefly to attend upon his own people.

IV. PRICES OF GRAIN.—14. The following table shows the average prices of the last five years, per Sicca Garce, of the principal grains with the exception of "Varagalu;" there is a considerable increase in the price of every sort of other grain:—

V. RYOTS HOLDINGS.—15. Lands bearing a sist of Rupees 9,319-13-7 were thrown up by former holders, but other Ryots came forward at once and took them all up, but to the amount of Rupees 341-0-5 sist. Fresh lands, also bearing a sist of Rupees 2,940-15-3, hitherto uncultivated, were also taken up during the year.

VI. ACTUAL CULTIVATION.—16. The actual cultivation of land in the Nursipatam Taluq was acres 17,301, being 115 acres less than that of Fasli 1269. There is, however, an increase in the sist amounting to Rupees 694-6-1, as will be seen from the Statement annexed:—

17. The increase above shown is owing to Ryots holding certain lands on reduced sists known as “Nugad Maf,” being required to pay the full sist or to relinquish their lands.

18. The practice of “Nugad Maf” prevails to a great extent in the Nursipatam Taluq, and the sum thus annually lost is Rupees 8,135-5-3. I purpose instituting a strict inquiry into all the remaining items, and hope to bring a good portion of them to account.

VII. WASTE CHARGED AND REMITTED.—19. Enclosure C. of Statement No. 3 will give the particulars of the lands so charged, but no remission on this account was either asked or allowed.

VIII. PARTICULARS OF REMISSION.—20. In paragraph 6, I have stated the utter failure of the north-east monsoon, by which the Paddy crops of Survasiddy particularly suffered. My then Principal Assistant Mr. Dalyell was in charge of the Sub-division, and after a personal investigation found it absolutely necessary to grant a remission of Rupees 9,769-8-0 upon a gross demand of Rupees 1,23,287, being a little more than 8 per cent. Shortly after Mr. Dalyell's settlement, I was myself on duty in the neighbourhood of Survasiddy; from inquiries then made, I am satisfied that the remissions allowed were necessary. The amount may be considered large, but the Taluq is very apt to suffer from drought, and greater remissions have often been demanded there. I therefore trust the Board will approve of what has been done. In addition to foregoing remissions, remission in two other cases were granted, in the case of fees to Kurnums, amounting to Rupees 187-7-6. Particulars of the whole remission amounting to Rupees 9,956 will be found in Statement No. 4.

IX. SUNDRY ITEMS.—21. There is a net decrease of Rupees 454 under this head; this is owing to the indiscriminate destruction of jungles being no longer allowed under the Rules of the 27th November 1860. Cultivation called “Kondapollu” and “Pullapollu” hitherto only carried on on the sides

of hills and continued in one place for only three or four years to the great destruction of jungles, and consequently the water supply is now put a stop to, and the decrease is owing to the tax hitherto so collected not being so any longer. The receipts from the tax on firewood during the year has been only Rupees 8-2-0. Great benefits will, however, doubtless arise to the country in general from the observance of the said rules, and I would not therefore in any way hereafter relax the Rules.

26. The chief part of the above increase* is in Salt, the sale has been somewhat greater than usual, but the rate per maund having been also raised, the increase is thereby partially accounted for. The increase in Stamps is Rupees 10,235, owing to the new Stamp laws being more stringent. The Sea Customs' decrease is large, Rupees 7,758, owing, as I have already stated in my Administration Report,† to the new Customs laws and Export tariff, in which several articles formerly charged with duty at their market value, are now either free or valued at much below their real cost.

SUBMITTING REPORT AND ACCOUNTS.—1. I have the honor to submit the usual Report on the Settlement of the District for Fasli 1270 (A. D. 1860-61,) with the detailed Statements in the forms now in use.

NEW ARRANGEMENT OF TALUQS.—2. From the beginning of the Fasli the accounts have, under the instructions of Mr. Pelly contained in his letter of the 5th June 1860, been kept with reference to the new territorial arrangement of the district, that is, in 9 instead of 17 taluqs and 4 divisions, as shown below :—

3. With the exception of the Kapavaram taluq which was absorbed, the remaining taluqs were, except as regards the accounts submitted to the controlling authorities, continued till the close of the Fasli, as distinct taluqs pending the introduction of the new Police system. The divisions of Cocanada, Pithapur, Coringa and Tuni, which could not be conveniently incorporated in any of the new taluqs, are still separately exhibited.

OFFICERS BY WHOM THE SETTLEMENT WAS MADE.—4. The settlement of two* of the three taluqs now composing the Sub-division was made by Mr. G. VansAgnew, that of the third† by Mr. R. E. Master who succeeded the former gentleman on his being compelled by the state of his health to proceed to England. The Acting Head Assistant Collector Mr. Horsley,‡ and the Deputy Collector Y. Chidambar Rao,§ made respectively the settlement of the taluqs which now form their charge. The settlement of the two remaining taluqs of Amalapur

and Ramachendrapur devolved on myself. No report is submitted from the Sub-Collector as that officer was called away on other duty early in May, and has only just|| rejoined.

5. The Muhtarafa settlement of the Coringa, Pittapur, Cocanada and Tuni divisions was made by myself. As in the previous year new Pattas were only given to parties, either newly assessed, or where some change had taken place in the amount of the tax. The district being still under joint rents, the observations with regard to permanent land revenue Pattas contained in the Board's Circular of the 24th July last do not apply.

VARIATION IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES.—6. * Four villages, till last year rented to single individuals, were in the year under report brought under joint rent. The increase in the number of villages is owing to a small hill-village which had hitherto paid no revenue, being this year included.

SEASON AND CROPS.—7. The season commenced favorably, and agricultural operations were carried on briskly throughout the district. The rains, however, in the months of July and August were deficient, and the rice cultivation in the upper taluqs was impeded in consequence. The early dry crops too suffered to some extent from want of rain. Under the irrigation from the annicut, the cultivation went on with the usual regularity. In one or two taluqs only was there any complaint of a deficiency in the supply of water. In September we had heavy rains, of great service generally, and especially to the wet lands in the upper taluqs. There was some rain in October but, except some heavy showers in March, none in the subsequent months. The yield of the early dry crops was generally good, though the first crop of gingily oil seed was somewhat damaged before it came to maturity by the heavy rain. The out-turn of the principal rice crop in the Delta taluqs and under the Yeleru river, which irrigates a part of the Peddapur taluq, as well as in other parts of the district, was on the whole decidedly good. In the Nagaram section of the Narsapur taluq the sugar-cane suffered from unseasonable winds, elsewhere the produce was very fair. The cultivation of tobacco, cotton, and the later dry crops generally was carried on to the full extent, but the yield was in some parts disappointing from want of any rain during the growing season. The cultivation of the summer rice and gingily seed crops under the annicut channels was carried on to an unusually large extent, and thanks to the exertions of the officers of the Department Public Works to secure the first named crop a sufficient supply of water, the whole was, with very trifling exceptions, brought to maturity.

RAIN-FALL.—8. The fall of rain in each month from May 1860 to April 1861, taking the average of the whole district, is shown in the margin. The total fall is about 3 inches below that of the previous year.

SANITARY CONDITION OF THE DISTRICT.—9. The district suffered a good deal from cholera. The disease appeared in June 1860, but ceased after a time. It broke out again in May and raged with considerable virulence up to the close of the Fasli. The total deaths reported amount to 4,378, or 2,863 in excess of the previous year. Small pox was prevalent in parts for several months. The

PRICES.—11. There was an increase in the price of all the principal products. The rise in that of paddy and gingily oil seed is owing to the increased demand for exportation by sea.

RYOTS' HOLDINGS.—12. The extent of land newly taken up amounted, according to the existing accounts, to 47,285 acres, bearing an assessment of 1,68,186 Rupees. Deducting the extent relinquished, the net increase is 9,737 acres, with an assessment of 41,927 Rupees. The total extent of land under occupation in the year under report being 5,59,010 acres, assessed at 17,58,340 Rupees.

20. The increase of 39,836 Rupees in the amount of Peshkash has arisen under the circumstances noted in the margin. The large increase of 2,39,848 in the rents for one year is partly in consequence of the rents of certain villages having been enhanced with reference to their improved condition, but is principally in the amount of water-tax on Government and proprietary, &c. estates, and in the new quit-rent on Inams.

NEW SURVEY AND SETTLEMENT.—21. The Board are aware that Government have sanctioned the introduction of the new assessment of the taluqs composing the Western Delta pro-

posed by the Director of Revenue Settlement. Mr. Master, who holds the office of Sub-Collector as well as that of Officiating Deputy Director of Revenue Settlement, has just returned, and the final arrangements necessary for superseding the existing joint rent system by the new settlement will immediately be carried out. The Deputy Director has submitted his report on the other taluqs of the district, and as the officers of the Survey Department have been making good progress, there is every hope of the joint rent system being soon a thing of the past as regards the whole district.

MUHTARAF.—23. The decrease in the Muhtarafa is owing to the exemption from the tax of parties assessed to the Income tax. In cases where the Muhtarafa was higher than the Income tax, only the amount of the last named tax was struck off from the demand on the individual.

SALT.—24. The details of the salt transactions are given in the accompanying Statements Nos. 3, 4, 5, and 6. The quantity in store at the beginning of the Fasli was 3,62,553½ Indian maunds, 5,40,955½ were received during the year, being a total Indian maunds 9,03,509. The sales, &c., within the Fasli amounted to Indian maunds 4,07,376, leaving according to the accounts Indian maunds 4,96,133 in store at the close of the year, inclusive of wastage which amounted to

* Rupees 12,000. 9,545 Indian maunds. The price of the Salt* supplied to the District Engineer for the dépôt at Manikdeokunta not having yet been received, the salt so supplied is included in the balance of Indian maunds 4,96,132-24. The actual quantity in store, deducting the above and wastage, was 4,74,587-24 Indian maunds.

25. I request the sanction of the Board for writing off the wastage in the accounts, with reference to the remarks given in Statement No. 4.

26. The past season was but an indifferent one in this District for making salt, but according to the estimates 4,44,549 Indian maunds were manufactured. Of this 72,000 Indian maunds were received into store within the Fasli, the storing of the remainder is in progress. It will be seen that there is an ample supply of salt on hand.

Statement No. 5. 27. As shown in the comparative Abstract on the back of Statement No. 5, there is an increase of 23,757 Indian maunds in the Home sales. This is owing partly to increased demand, and partly to the sales in the tract transferred from the late Masulipatam district, having for the entire Fasli been included under this head in the year under report, while the sales for half the year only were so included in the preceding Fasli. The same cause operated to decrease the amount of sales for Inland consumption. The decrease under the head of exportation by sea is in consequence of the limited demand for exportation to Calcutta. Of the increase in the collections of the branch of Revenue under notice, a sum of nearly 13,000 Rupees is attributable to the additions recently made to the selling price of the article for Home and Inland consumption.

SEA CUSTOMS.—28. There is an increase of 49,859 Rupees in the Sea Customs, owing chiefly to the large quantity of gingily oil seed, rice and Bengal gram exported to Bourbon, Mauritius and France.

FRONTIER CUSTOMS.—29. The increase of 8,513 Rupees in the Land Custom duty, is chiefly in consequence of a large quantity of piece goods and gingily oil seed being, as in the previous year, taken to Yanam for shipment principally to France.

STAMPS.—30. The increase of 47,139 Rupees in the Stamp Revenue is mainly owing to the operation of the new law, Act XXXVI of 1860. In April and early in May the sales were greatly enhanced in consequence of the near approach of the period of limitation laid down in Act XIV of 1859.

TOTAL DEMAND OF LAND AND SUNDRY SOURCES OF REVENUE.—31. The total demand for the year under report on account of all sources, including Extra Revenue and Income Tax, was 41,45,901 Rupees, being an increase of 5,16,502 Rupees above the preceding year.

The three first causes require no detailed remarks. The sum of Rupees 6,942-6-9, under "Permanently settled" is outstanding on the estates noted in the margin. bank, or bandacut, but the work is still suspended under the operations of the restrictive orders. It would have, I believe, been finished before these orders came out, had it not been for the very great difficulty experienced in obtaining labour in the scantily populated and unhealthy part of the district in which the work is situated. Under these circumstances, I beg to recommend that the balances outstanding on this account may be written off.

41. The sum of Rupees 11,944-4-5 under the head of not permanently settled, includes the water-tax imposed in Fasli 1269 (A. D. 1859-60), on certain lands on which a second crop had been raised, but which did not come to maturity, the necessary examinations had not been made in time to strike the assessment out of the demand; also the difference in the amount imposed at the Jamabandi on certain Agraharums in the Sub-division according to the rate in force in other parts

The increase in the collection of arrears during the year under report arises from there having been larger arrears outstanding at the commencement of the Fasli. The large increase in the current collections is partly owing to the increase in the amount levied for the use of water supplied at the cost of the State, partly to an enhancement of the rents from the improved condition of certain villages, partly from the realization of the quit-rent imposed by the Inam Commission, and lastly to the imposition of the Income Tax.

47. Under the head of Sundry Sources there is an increase of 1,61,558 Rupees in the collections, both current and arrears, which is principally the result of augmentation in the Revenue in Salt, Sea Customs and Stamps.

CHARGES.—48. The net increase of 47,964 Rupees in the first item, is chiefly owing to the salaries of the Magistracy and Police establishments in the year under report, deducting only one-fifth from the total charges of the establishment, having been included with reference to the order of Government, dated 15th August 1860, No. 1,025. Hitherto the salaries of the Huzur and District Revenue establishments only

were included under the head of Charges, and from this one-third of the salaries of the Collector and Tahsildars alone were deducted. Police establishments not being included under the head of Charges.

49. The increase of 2,45,282 Rupees in the Extra Charges is the result of a gross increase of 2,52,803 Rupees, and a gross decrease of 7,521 Rupees. The former is principally in consequence of the large sum of Rupees 2,20,156 having been paid in the year under review to the Nedadavole Zemindar on account of the mesne profits of the estates lately restored to him under the orders of Government, dated 3rd April 1861, No. 724. salt was purchased* in the Fasli under report, while none was paid for in the previous year. The gross decrease of 7,521 Rupees is principally in the items noted in the margin. The Law charges were increased in Fasli 1269 (A. D. 1859-60) by the payment made to the Plaintiff Appellant Wuppalapati Jogi Jagannadharaz in Suit No. 89 of 1856, Sudder Court's file, as explained in paragraph 44 of my report for last year. The decrease under Extra Revenue Charges is principally owing to there having been no disbursement in Fasli 1270 (A. D. 1860-61,) of the salaries of Captain Stoddard and his establishment under this head as in the preceding year. The absence of the Sub-Collector on other duty during some part of the year, and only one Deputy Collector having been entitled to the allowance, are the principal causes of the decrease under the head of Tent Allowance.

WORKING OF THE NEW SYSTEM OF THE VILLAGE AND TALUQ ACCOUNTS.—50. The new system of village accounts has, for some time, been in operation in this district. Of the total number* 976. of villages the accounts of 612 were examined during the past year under the supervision of the officers making the settlement. The accounts of 172 villages were found free from error. In those of the remaining villages defects, more or less serious, were discovered, and measures were adopted for their correction. I trust a very great improvement will be apparent this season. Opportunity was taken to examine the taluq accounts, and it was found they had been kept with tolerable accuracy, and with attention to the instructions contained in the Manual.

These lands have not been obtained either by gift or purchase, but have all been inherited by the present holders. The rules laid down in the Board's Circular, dated 28th August 1849, have been strictly attended to.

COSTS AWARDED AND RECOVERED.—52. With reference to Board's Proceedings, dated 30th October 1855, a Statement marked A, showing the costs awarded to Government by the Civil Courts, the amount collected and the balance still due is submitted. I may mention that the balance of 431 Rupees given in Statement B, forwarded with my report for Fasli 1267 (A. D. 1857-58) was not recovered, because the Suit No. 89 of 1856, then pending before the Sudr Court, was decided in favor of the Appellant. In Faslis 1268 (A. D. 1858-59) and 1269 (1859-60) no Suits were decided and therefore no Statement was sent.

CONDUCT OF THE SUBORDINATE OFFICERS.—53. I have much pleasure in acknowledging the efficient aid I have received from the officers who have been associated with me in the administration of the District during the year under report. Ill health compelled the Sub-Collector, Mr. G. VansAgnew, to leave the district in February. He was succeeded by Mr. R. E. Master, the value of whose services is so well known to the Board as to render any eulogium from me supererogatory. Mr. W. D. Horsley, the Acting Head Assistant, has performed the duties entrusted to him with much care and attention. With Yerragunta Chidambarrao, who has lately been promoted to a Deputy Collector of the 2nd class, I have generally had reason to be satisfied, and it is due to Kadambari Jagannadham, the Deputy Collector in charge of the Treasury and Department of Accounts, that I should specially acknowledge the great assistance he has afforded me, both in his own peculiar duties, and as Assessor under Act XXXII of 1860, of the important taluq of Cocanada.

4. Pattabs in the new form were issued this year for the first time. They were only issued to new Ryots, and in cases where any alteration required to be made in the holding of the Ryots. Ryots, in whose holdings no alterations were required, were allowed to retain their former years' Pattabs. and July the rains were very scanty. In August and September they were rather good. In October there were heavy falls of rain in certain places, but they were partial; and in November there was an entire failure of rain.

Poonasa.—The Poonasa crops suffered from the want of rain in July, and, although they were somewhat revived by the later falls, the yield did not average more than half or three-quarters of a good crop.

Dry.—The out-turn of jonna, black paddy, cotton, &c., was very uneven; in some Taluqs the crops were good; in others they were injured by unseasonable falls of heavy rain; and again in others they withered from want of sufficient moisture: so various was the season in different quarters.

Wet.—With regard to wet crops cultivated under tanks fed by rain-water, the season was very unfavorable. As a general rule, these tanks did not receive a supply of water, until it was too late to commence wet cultivation. In some parts, the lands under them were left waste; and where cultivation was attempted, the crops were generally bad. The fields, under some tanks, which were cultivated with pidapanari, indigo, tobacco, &c., yielded a pretty good out-turn.

In the Delta Taluqs, however, the wet cultivation was extensive; the supply of water from the Kistna was good, and the crops promised very well; but just as the paddy was coming into ear, the supply from the channels fell off; and this, added to the failure of the later rains in November, caused very serious damage.

Garden.—The garden crops, such as tobacco, chillies, and turmeric, yielded a good return.

The Chay-root was extensively cultivated in the villages bordering on the coast, but suffered from want of seasonable rains. The dry crops also, cultivated in the same villages, yielded but a scanty return.

Pyra Crops.—The failure of the north-east monsoon had an unfavorable effect on the Pyra cultivation, the extent of which was, on that account, limited; the out-turn of the lands was however fair.

The season on the whole was certainly unfavorable. The rains were unseasonable, having been quite insufficient for the wants of the country, at the commencement and close of the year.

The annicut channels afforded a good supply of water until towards the close of the season, when, as above shown, it fell short of the demand. The benefits of the irrigation works were, however, strongly felt early in the season; as with their aid, the people were enabled to raise a plentiful supply of young paddy with which to plant their fields, when the rains fell later in the year. Without the supply of water thus afforded, it would in all probability, have been a year of great scarcity.

FRESHES.—7. The freshes in the Kistna were very low, never having exceeded 31 feet. The tanks in the Divi Taluq, the majority of which do not receive water, until the river attains a depth of 33 feet, were therefore entirely unsupplied, and three-fourths of the wet land of that Taluq were left uncultivated.

RATES OF HIRE.—8. The rate of hire, paid to agricultural labourers, continued the same as in the previous year, viz., 2 Annas and 8 Pice; and much difficulty was felt at times in procuring coolies even at that rate.

SANITARY CONDITION.—9. The year was very unfavorable also in a sanitary point of view. Cholera prevailed to a dreadful extent, and many people died. In the village of Mangalagiri alone, in the months of July and August, it carried off 200 persons. It prevailed chiefly on the lines of high road, but was not confined to them; it made its appearance amongst the

European Troops in the Fort in October, and caused ten or twelve deaths amongst them; and the District was never entirely free from it throughout the whole year.

10. The Small-pox, however, was less prevalent than in former years. Every attention was paid to the Vaccination Establishment. The number* of persons vaccinated is entered in the margin. The returns were carefully examined in the Taluqs.

11. Exertions have been made to reduce the size of the prickly-pear hedges in the Town and in the District generally, and with considerable success, so far as Masulipatam itself is concerned.

TIRVAJASTI.—20. Under the orders of the Board of Revenue dated 20th October 1860, the new rules for water-rate were enforced in the year. All paddy, white or black, whether transplanted or broad-cast, which was cultivated up to last year in dry lands, was charged 3 Rupees per acre; the lands cultivated with paddy newly in this year, were charged at $1\frac{1}{2}$ Rupees per acre; and all dry crops watered were also charged at the latter rate. These rates were applied to all Inam.

But where the Amaracam rates of the dry lands converted to wet, fixed by the Ryots in the Joint-rent villages were low, such addition was made to the rent as would raise the charge on every acre of irrigated land to its proper sist, including the water-rate due upon it. The khats for the ensuing year were also increased.

22. In this year, the Inam, as well as Zemindary lands entered in the old wet ayacat were charged as follows: The average of wet cultivation in the years previous to the construction of the Anicut, was deducted from the area of the old wet lands irrigated in this year, and the remainder was charged at Rupees 1-8 per acre as having been formerly only "Imperfectly irrigated."

REMISSIONS.—25. The marginal statement will show the amount of Hungama and Mamul remissions given in the last year, as compared with Fasli 1269. It will be observed that there is a net decrease of Rupees 47,673. The decrease in the Cowle remissions is attributable to no lands having been given during the year on Taragati sists, and to a smaller amount than in last year having been deducted on this account. The remissions granted for partial Banjar, &c., were greater, and the unavoidable causes for the same have been already explained above.

26. The remission given for "Channel lands" was not for land taken up for channels, but for land which turned saline, and unfit for cultivation by the percolation of water from adjacent channels.

27. No remissions were made this year for "Chaturbhagam" and "Tribhagam" Agraharamdars from the joint-rents of certain villages, the Inam Commissioner having ordered lands to be allotted in their stead.

28. The remissions given for partial wet Banjar, and loss of produce or Shavy in wet lands, are noted in the margin. The largest was for Divi Taluq, and the cause of it was, as explained above, almost entire failure of the freshes, on which the tanks in that Taluq solely depend.

SUNDRY ITEMS.—29. Statement No. 4 which is herewith sent will give the required explanation of the Sundry items.

The particulars of the increase and decrease regarding the same are stated hereunder:—

I. *Kattubadi Inams*.—It will be observed that there is a decrease of Rupees 907 in the quit-rent of Inam lands. This was owing to certain Inams, on which the quit-rent had been in arrears for many years, having been resumed; of this 726 Rupees belonged to Juggiahpetta Taluq, and the rest to other Taluqs.

II. *Bád Inams*.—There is an increase of Rupees 316 on account of Bád Inam lands. It has been usual to collect at Rupees 5 per Rupees 100 of the Dowle, on account of Bád Inamdars in the villages of the Bhitlerjalli Purganah in the Kaikalur Taluq. In the year under review there was an increase in the extent of cultivation. Hence the increase in this item.

III. *Water-rate on Inams*.—There is an increase of Rupees 7,746 in the amount of water-rate on Inam lands cultivated under the influence of the Kistna channels. Up to last year, the dry lands converted into wet, and the dry lands in which the dry crops received water, only, were assessed with water-rate; but under the Orders of Government, the wet Inam lands formerly "imperfectly irrigated," also were charged at the rate of Rupees 1-8 per acre. Hence the increase in this item.

IV. *Fruit Trees*.—It will be seen that there is a decrease of Rupees 2,578 in the tax on Fruit trees and Palmyra Moturpha. The palmyra trees within the holdings of the Ryots, were this year made over to them; and the item of Soap-nuts in the Bapatla and Repalli Taluqs, which was, up to last year, included under this head, was transferred to a separate head, as in the late Masulipatam District. Hence the decrease.

V. *Spontaneous Chayroot*.—It will be observed that there is an increase of Rupees 6,868 in the sist of spontaneous chayroot. This is owing to this product having been rented out in some villages this year, which last year were left unrented, owing to the unfavorable nature of the season.

VI. *Soap-nuts*.—The increase of Rupees 1,902, in the item of Soap-nuts, is attributable to an increase of Rupees 640, due to increased produce in the jungles of the Kaikalur Division, and

to the transfer of this item in Repalli and Bapatla from the head "Fruit trees," to that of "Soap-nuts," in the year under report.

VII. *Grazing tax on Hills and Jungles.*—There is an increase of Rupees 939, in the rent of Hills and Jungles, of which Rupees 600 are due to increased sales of mangrove-wood, and Rupees 300 to Poolari in the Colair Lake.

VIII. *Water-rate in Zemindary Estates.*—The amount of water-rate in Zemindary Estates in

IX. *Quit-rent on Inams.*—The increase was owing to the settlement of all the remaining Taluqs in the year under review. A few of the Inam Registers were still due when the demand was fixed. Hence it was not complete.

X. *Inam Commutation.*—There is a decrease of Rupees 3,238 in the Inam commutation

money, owing to no Inams having been enfranchised in the year under report, by the payment of twenty years' quit-rent.

XI. *Sugar-cane.*—No sugar-cane was cultivated in this District.

XII. *Cotton.*—The cotton cultivation was not so extensive as in the previous year, from want of seasonable rains. In some places the crop was injured by the attack of locusts.

XIII. *Indigo.*—In the year under report, the indigo cultivation was very small, compared with that of the last year, as shown in the margin, owing to want of seasonable rains; and the leaf was pronounced to be of very inferior quality.

31. The decrease of Rupees 2,708 in the Peishcush of the Zemindary Estates is attributable to the reduction in the Peishcush of the Davarakota Estate under the Orders of Government, dated 8th October 1860.

32. The amount of Shrotrium Jodi, &c., exhibits an increase of Rupees 1,120, which is owing to the Mandapad village having been granted as Agraharam by the Inam Commissioner, and charged with quit-rent; whereas it was under joint rent in last year, and to the increase in the water cess in this and other villages.

33. The increase of Rupees 582 and 750 in the rent amount of villages, rented out wholly for one year, and more than one year, is owing to a rise in the rent of certain villages.

REDUCTION OF SIST.—36. In the year under report, the rates of sist on the sandy tracts in the Coast villages of the late Guntoor District, were reduced from Rupees 2½, 2 and 1½, to Rupees 1 per acre, under the Orders of Government, dated 7th October 1860, No. 1,975.
