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#### PROCEEDINGS OF THE MADRAS GOVERNMENT.

Read the following letter from the Secretary to the Board of Revenue : -

Submitting Annual Report on the settlement and collections of the Revenues of this Presidency for the past Fasli 1271 (Here enter 4th February 1863, No. 706.) with explanatory Statements.

#### No. 281. ORDER THEREON, 30th April 1863, No. 744.

- 1. In this letter the Board of Revenue report on their administration of the several branches of Revenue under their management in Fasli 1271 (A.D. 1861-62).
- 2. The Government will, in the first place, notice the general result of the year, which they remark was not altogether a favorable one.
- 3. The actual receipts from all sources amounted to the unprecedentedly large sum of Rupees 6,01,55,422 or £6,015,542, being Rupees 26,82,442 in excess of the similar receipts of the preceding year.
- 4. Part of this increased Revenue is of course owing to the additional taxes imposed since 1857-58 in consequence of the Bengal Mutiny. The amount to be attributed to this cause can be easily estimated with sufficient accuracy for practical purposes.
- 5. Going back as far as 1840-41 the highest amount collected in any year up to 1856-57 was Rupees 4,80,64,000. In 1856-57, the year immediately preceding the mutinies, the Revenue rose to Rupees 5,01,23,687, compared with which the Revenue of last year (1861-62) shows an increase of a million sterling.
  - 6. The portion of this increase consequent on additional taxation may be thus estimated :-

- 7. From the above estimate, however, some deduction has to be made for the increase of Revenue, which would certainly have occurred if the additional taxes had not been imposed, for prior to their imposition every source of Revenue was steadily on the increase. Making a very moderate allowance on this account the Revenue actually received in 1861-62 exceeded that realized in 1856-57 from the same sources by at least forty lacs of Rupees or £400,000.
- 8. Large as the Revenue of Fasli 1271 was, it was collected with remarkable ease, the value of property sold for non-payment being under £2,150 or 035 per cent.

10. The Government will now notice those parts of the Board's report which require their orders. The early submission of this report is satisfactory; but the Government regret the absence of the spinguennial returns by which it should have been accompanied. The Board cose to make these returns the subject of a separate report as some of the District returns

have not been received, and some of those received are found to be incorrect. The Government do not approve of this omission from the Report of statistical returns which cannot but throw light on the results of the year, and the submission of several reports where one would suffice, has other objections.

- 11. The system of not issuing a fresh Puttah except in cases in which material afterations have taken place, has been more extensively introduced in all the Districts except Trichinopoly, where the existing Revenue system precludes its adoption. In Fasli 1271 sixty-one per cent. of the Puttahs were not renewed, while in the previous year the proportion did not exceed fifty-one per cent. The Government observe that in Madras the change was not introduced as extensively as was expected. The Acting Collector's attention should be drawn to the subject.
- 12. Fasli 1271 is reported to have been on the whole a more favorable season than the previous year. The District of Coimbatore suffered severely from drought, so much indeed as to render necessary large remissions and the employment of the people on Public Works specially undertaken to afford them relief. The table of the average rain-fall in each District (given in paragraph 5) must, to be of the least use, be trustworthy, but the Board are of opinion that it cannot be relied upon as they apprehend that in many cases sufficient care is not bestowed in the management of the guages and the preparation of the returns.

The Government have dealt with this subject in their orders marginally noted, and they expect that in future years the Registers of rain-fall will be sufficiently accurate and reliable for all practical purposes.
- 13. The sanitary condition of the Presidency in Fasli 1271 was somewhat more favorable than in Fasli 1270, but deaths from Cholera were numerous in some of the Districts. The loss of cattle in the Godavery and Coimbatore was also heavy. The Board in paragraph 7 of their Proceedings allude to the returns of vaccination, but are not disposed to place much confidence in them. The Government have lately had this subject under their consideration, and a re-organization of the Department will soon be carried out. The returns, such as they are, show a total of 1,97,960 children vaccinated, and the proportion to the population is lamentably small.
- 14. Prices, very high in Fasli 1270, rose still more in the year under report. The rise though gradual has been very great. The average price of second sort paddy for the

ten years from Fasli, 1261 to 1270 was Rupees 105 per Garce, while in Fasli 1270 it rose to 140 Rupees, and in Fasli 1271 to 150 Rupees. The prices of the dry grains which form the staple food for the lower classes have also largely risen as shown in the margin. So high a range of prices, while most profitable to the agricultural community may have pressed with some severity on that portion of the laboring classes who are paid in money and may thus have stimulated emigration to Ceylon as remarked by the Board. Wages, however, are known to have been high, and employment abundant; it is more likely therefore that such

emigration is owing to the more remunerative return for labor afforded in a congenial climate close at hand, than to actual want at home. In many respects the emigration to Ceylon resembles the annual emigration of Irish labourers into England during harvest, and doubtless both Madras and Ceylon profit by the mutual interchange of labor and capital. Emigration to distant fields of labor is as yet, too trifling to excite apprehension.

15. The Government wish the Board to make careful enquiries into the rate of wages for agricultural labor prevailing in the Provinces with a view to ascertain how far the encountries of past years and keep pace with the enhanced price of food, and how far the old system.

in the Revenue accounts. These receipts are to be invested in public securities, but this neither requires nor warrants their omission from the Board's accounts, as the manner in which money is disposed of after realization cannot affect its being brought to account.

- 29. In Statement 16 the Government observe a large increase in the item "Land cultivated and not included in the Jummabundy," and request an explanation of it. Several of the items in the Statement as "Unclaimed Inams," "Inam Estates which have reverted to Government," &c., might apparently be merged in the Government land roll.
- The Board in paragraph 27 of their Proceedings explain the causes which have kept down the sale of Salt in certain Districts. The interval which has elapsed since the price was raised is too brief to allow of any satisfactory judgment being yet formed. The first effect of an enhancement of price is of course to lessen purchases until the surplus stock in the hands of the dealers is exhausted, and time must be allowed for these stocks to be consumed before any reliable opinion can be arrived at, as to the real effect on consumption of the enhanced price. The sales appear now to be recovering, but the fact that notwith standing the improved circumstances of the people as evinced by the increase of cultivation; the extension of trade and the greater consumption of luxuries; the demand for Salt, an absolute necessary of life, has been even temporarily checked, is suggestive, and indicates the necessity of closely watching the operation of the recent addition to the price. Taking the monopoly profit, or in other words, the Salt Tax, at Rupees 1 Annas 6 per Indian Maund of 82° lbs., and the rate of consumption at 18lbs. yearly. which is generally believed to be a liberal allowance, the Salt Tax per head is only 5 Annas per annum, a sum which at the present rate of wages can only be felt where the expense of carriage to the consumer adds greatly to the cost of the article. The Board's price lists show that a Garce of Salt costing Rupees 180 on the coast sells for more than 400 Rupees in Bellary. It is clear therefore that an increased Salt Revenue must be expected from improvement of the communications, i. e., the cheapening of the cost of transit, and not from increase of taxation.
- 31. Sanction is granted for writing off the wastage of the year amounting to Indian Maunds 2,27,916-4-0. The proportion of wastage to the contents of the heaps is high in some Districts. The Board explain that in Madura the heavy "wastage" (8.85 per cent.) is owing to a considerable quantity of Salt having been destroyed by floods. The proportion (8) in the Kistna

by floods. The proportion (8) in the Kistna District is nearly as large, and that in the Districts noted in the margin is also high. The Government are aware that the rate of wastage depends a good deal on the manner in which

Salt is received into store. Formerly it was the custom in many Districts to store in each heap more than the regulated quantity in order to cover loss by wastage, the rate of which was then apparently very small. This practice has very properly been forbidden, and possibly the higher rate of wastage now commented upon may be partly owing to this change of system. The time during which Salt lies in store, the size of the crystals, and the state in which the Salt is when stored, all affect the wastage. The attention of the Collectors should be steadily directed to the

subject, so as to reduce the bond fide wastage to a minimum. In three Districts the "gain by measurement" which is in fact over-storage is large, and seems to indicate carelessness in the receipt of the Salt.

32. Under the head "Salt charges" there is a decrease of 6,00,000 of Rupees on the whole, but this is owing to the smaller quantity manufactured in the year. The "charges" in fact include the purchase of the stock as well as the ordinary expenses of collecting the Revenue. The total charges average 13 per cent. on the Revenue, but the whole expense even of the revised and strengthened Establishment proposed by Mr. Pelly, including the preventive service, is under  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. The Board are requested in future to exhibit the charges of collection separately from those for purchasing or providing Salt. The Statement as now framed is calcuted to give an erroneous impression of the cost of realizing this branch of Revenue.

Note, -Of this balance, the sum of Rupees 63 lacs is the total of the Kists falling due in the last mouth of the Fash, and therefore not collected till after the close of the year,

33. The entire demand under all heads account of the Revenue of the year amounted to Rupees 6,11,20,995 against Rupees 5,80,30,402 in Fasli 1270. The greater portion of it, viz., Rupees 5,71,27,082 was collected within the Fasli, leaving a balance of Rupees 39,93,913\* or 61 per cent. at its close. Subsequently, however, and up to 30th Novem-

ber 1862, Rupees 35,15,219 of the last mentioned sum were collected, and the comparatively small balance of Bupees 4,78,694 or less than 3 per cent. of the gross demand remained outstanding. This result is highly gratifying. The backward state of the collections in the Madras District is not satisfactory. The balance at the close of the Faşli was 25 per cent.

of the demand. In no other District was the proportion so high, though in the Districts noted in the margin it was large. but in these the subsequent collections were good. The Board will draw the particular attention of the Acting Collector to this subject.

- 34. The realization of the Revenue of the Neilgherry Talook as exhibited in the table given in paragraph 39 of the Board's Proceedings is extremely unsatisfactory. The sum (Rupees 8.952) due by the Burghers and other hill tribes for land held by them was (with the exception of only 3 Rupees) collected within the Fasli, while no less than 58 per cent. of the sum due by Europeans and East Indians, remained unrealized. Of the Quit-rent due on house property, viz., Rupees 3,238 only 10 Rupees were collected. The Government are surprised at this result after the orders given in paragraph 19 of their Proceedings dated 1st September 1862, No. 1,857. The Board will instruct the Collector to put the law in force, forthwith, against all defaulters.
- 35. The arrears of former years amounted at the commencement of 1861-62 to Rupees 37,73,709, of which Rupees 30,28,340 were collected and Rupees 67,614 written off during the year. The balance Rupees 6,77,755 was reduced to Rupees 4,97,862 by the end of November 1862. Of this sum Rupees 2,56,542 are stated to be probably recoverable, and the remainder Rupees 2,41,319-14-7 to be irrecoverable from various causes. Under the explanation given by the Board the Government grant sanction for writing off the accounts the latter cum, viz., two lacs forty-one thousand three hundred and nineteen, Annas fourteen and Pice seven. The Government attach much importance to the prompt settlement of arrears, and request the Board to urge upon all Collectors the necessity of preventing the accumulation of balances.
- 36. The entire collections in Fasli 1271 under all heads including current and arrears amounted as already stated to. Rupees 6,01,55,422 against Rupees 5,74,72,980 in Fasli 1270. The increase was Rupees 26,82,442. The charges of the year amounted to Rupees 56,94,820 or 9.46 per cent. on the collections, while in Fasli 1270 they were Rupees 71,06,252 or 12.3 per cent. The charges of collection were only 6:18 in Fasli 1271 and this includes the performance of all magisterial duties.
- 37. The Board have as already stated omitted the Income Tax and Stamp collections in the Town of Madras from their returns. Including them the aggregate Revenue of this Presidency in Fasli 1271 was Rupees 6,10,31,862 as shewn below

SIR.

- 1. I am directed by the Board of Revenue to submit their Annual Report on the Settlement and Collection of the Revenues of this Presidency for the past Fasli 1271 (A. D. 1861-62), with the usual explanatory Statements as per accompanying list. The Quinquennial Returns, which are due in this year, are not however now submitted, as several of the District Returns have not been received, and some of those already received are defective in important respects. But the transmission of the Quinquennial Returns may conveniently be deferred, and form the subject of a separate report, which shall be sent as soon as the Returns are complete.
- 2. The Taluks settled on Ryotwar principles are the same as in the preceding Fash. The variations in the number of villages are caused chiefly by the interchange of villages between Madras and North Arcot, and by a large number of Shrotriem villages having reverted to Ryotwar tenure and generally by the transfer of villages from Renting to the Ryotwary system and vice versa.
- 3. The system of permanent Puttahs, or more properly speaking the plan of not issuing a new Puttah every year when no material change has taken place was during the settlement under report, very generally introduced in every District except Trichinopoly, in which District it is incompatible with the popular character of the assessment, which at present is not fixed on the land but varies every year with the crop grown. As soon however as the new settlement rates are brought into operation, the system will be fully introduced into this District also. In Madras the proportion of Puttahs not renewed to the total number is very small, and it appears from the Collector's letter that the new system will be introduced more extensively in the ensuing year. The Board concur with the Collector that the reasons assigned by the Ryots for not producing the old Puttahs are frivolous. Of a total of 20,22,526 Puttahs, only 7,83,400, or 38 per cent. were renewed or granted afresh in the year. The rest were old Puttahs which remained either altogether unchanged, or were modified by a few additional entries.
- 4. Season. The season, though a decided improvement on that which preceded it, was not altogether favorable. The copious fall of the early rains gave a great impetus to every description of culvation which advanced under promising circumstances, but the deficiency of the later rains was very detrimental to agricultural interests, and serious fears were entertained in some Districts for the safety of the crops on the ground, which, but for a providential fall of rain in January, would have perished and entailed heavy losses. In several Districts the north-east monsoon almost entirely failed. The Eastern Coast Districts except Nellore and Madras had an abundant supply of rain, and in consequence the crops were generally good, but in the Godavery and also in the Kistna District they suffered much from floods in the Godavery river. In Madura the season was however unfavorable. The inland provinces of Kurnool, Salem and Trichinopoly enjoyed a tolerably good season. In Nellore, the principal division is reported to have experienced a worse season than in Fash 1270, and in Madras the rains of both monsoons proved so scanty that there were no freshes in the rivers. In Bellary the supply of water to the tanks was much less than in the previous year, and in Cuddapah the rains failed extensively. In North Arcot the rains of the southwest monsoon were above the average but partial, and those of the north-east monsoon were almost a total failure. Throughout the province of Coimbatore, a universal drought prevailed, even the els went dry, and it became necessary to grant remission of assessment for all lands not sown, and a general remission of 10 per cent. and in one Taluk 15 per cent. for loss of crop on lands sown. Under the influence of this badeseason and the pressure of high prices, the distress of the people was general in this District, and was aggravated by the cessation of Railway works. Some relief was afforded by Government placing at the disposal of the Collector a sum of Rupees 21,052 to be pended in the repair of the cross roads of the District. On the Western Coast,

the rain-fall was plentiful for the cultivation of the first crop, but a deficiency of the after rains was somewhat unfavorable for the second.

5. 'The Statement in the margin shows the average quantity of rain in each District as compared with Fasli 1270. This Statement is compiled from the monthly Returns of rain-fall received in the Board's Office, and is for the period from April to March during the season of cultivation. It differs from the recults noticed by the Collectors in their reports, which refer to a different period. The Board do not however rely on the accuracy of these Returns, and they apprehend that in many cases sufficient care is not bestowed on their preparation. For instance, the aggregate of the Returns from the Vizagapatam District gives a fall of rain of no less than 115 inches, which is probably the result of inaccu-

rate calculations. The quantity 28½ inches mentioned in the Collector's report is probably correct, and has been accordingly adopted. The attention of Collectors will be directed to the more careful preparation of these Returns.

in a large number of cases. The Collector of Kurnool notices the malignant and fatal character of the disease among the masses employed on the irrigation works. In the Godavery and Coimbatore Districts there were heavy losses of cattle, in the former from epidemic disease, and in the latter from want of pasture.

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to distinguish successful and unsuccessful cases.

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8. PRICES—STATEMENT No. 2 AND ITS ENCLOSURE A.—Prices of agricultural produce rose above the high prices of Fashi 1270, generally from 7 to 9 per cent. Compared with the average of the ten preceding years, the increase shown is much larger, viz., 28 to 46 per cent, as will be observed from the annexed abstract:—

III. Under the pressure of such high prices, the poorer classes of the people found great relief in employment on the Railway Irrigation Company's works; notwithstanding however the great demand for labour created by these works, and the large sums of money expended in wage s, the motives to Emigration continued to operate, the number of people who emigrated to Ceylon can be Southern Districts of Madura and Tinnevelly having amounted to apwards of 54,000, but this robably is only a temporary emigration.

aided by the favorable character of the season at its beginning, induced the Ryots to take up new lands very extensively; Acres\* 10,47,454, assessed at Rupees 18,00,089 were newly occupied. On the other hand, Acres 6,20,275, assessed at Rupees 11,182,31 were relinquished. The net increase in the area under occupancy was thus Acres 4,27,179, with an assessment of Rupees 6,81,858.

Note.—The West Coast Districts are as usual excluded from the above abstract, as owing to the peculiar nature of their tenure; the extent of land under occupancy is not known.

11. In the above occupancy Acres 3,67,249, consisting of whole survey fields, were left unsown from causes beyond the Ryots' control, and the assessment Rupees 8,67,555 on this area was consequently remitted. This amount is less than the similar remission in Fasli 1270 by Rupees 2,59,637, indicating that the local officers continue to enforce the rule requiring the Ryot to pay the assessment of his entire holding under ordinary circumstances, which is still more apparent from the fact that a larger amount was charged in this year for waste than in the preceding year. In the year under report the waste charged was Rupees 19,23,958 against Rupees 18,82,598 in the preceding Fasli 1270. The sum is large, but under existing circumstances it would no doubt be easily paid by the Ryots.

10. The actual cultivation including "waste charged," the several items of deductions and the additions, are given in the following abstract in comparison with Fasli 1270, the net settlement showing an excess in favor of the year under report of Rupees 14,50,400.

• II. The net increase in the area under cultivation (not including the extent in Canara and Malabar, the area in which Districts is not known) amounts to upwards of  $7\frac{1}{2}$  lacs of Acres with an assessment of more than  $12\frac{1}{2}$  lacs of Rupees, besides  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lac in the two Districts referred to; the Board consider this as very gratifying. A better season, the enhanced prices obtainable for every description of agricultural produce, and the encouragement given to agricultural enterprise by reductions from time to time of the assessment in several Districts, have all contributed to this favourable result.

III. The increase in the cultivation of unirrigated lands is general in every District except Coimbatore, in which there is a decrease of 34,741 Acres. In irrigated and garden land the increase of cultivation, as also that of the second crop assessment is with a few exceptions bound in every District. The additional assessment for Tirva Jasty or the rate charged to dry lands watered with Government water shows a decrease of 35,227 Rupees, being the result of a decrease of 61,080 in six Districts, and an increase of 25,853 Rupees in other Districts.

11. The deductions from the gross assessment are shown in detail in Statements 6 to 8. They amounted to Rupees 34,92,816, or Rupees 1,59,804 less than the amount of remission granted in Fasli 1270. • They are classed under the usual heads as follows:—

II. It was not necessary to allow remissions for loss of crops to the same extent as in last year, and the deductions for land held on Cowle was also less in consequence of the falling in of the favorable terms; hence the decrease under the head of Occasional remissions. In Coimbatore where the season was very adverse and crops perished to a great extent, a sum of Rupees 1,21,319 was remitted, the excess over Fashi 1270 being Rupees 40,290 in that District. The method adopted by the Collector for giving this relief as noticed above (paragraph 4) was judicious.

III. Of the increase amounting to Rupees 1,57,969 in the Teerwa Cummee Remissions, a sum of Rupees 1,57,322 constitutes the difference between the old and revised rates of assessment, which latter were introduced into the Chellumbrum and late Munnargudy Taluks of South Arcot, during the Fasli under report.

IV. The decrease in the second head of Remissions, mentioned in the above abstract, is small and requires no remark. Under this head are included the general remission of 25 and 33 per cent. granted in 1824, on the Survey assessment of the lands of the Ceded Districts, which were usually exhibited every year in the accounts. As no advantage was gained by its retention in the accounts, the Board directed the permanent exclusion of the remission from the accounts in Cuddapah and other Districts, and the entry of the net assessment alone as the basis of the settlement. This course however has not yet been adopted in the Taluks transferred to Kurnool from the Ceded Districts, and in some other Districts.

The third head of remission consisting of deductions from the Beriz for remnneration to village officers and others amounted to Rupees 7,51,594, or Rupees 57,199 in excess of Fashi 1270. As the amount of remission under this head varies with the revenue, the increase in the year under report is in proportion to the higher amount of the Settlement It occurs principally in South Arcot and Madras where this mode of remunerating village officers chiefly prevails. 12. STATEMENT No. 9-The Sundry Items as additions to the Ryotwar land Revenue amount-

1. Collections on account of Cochrane's Canal.

2. Forest Revenue, 3. Thanika Jasty. 4. Amindiyi Coir, ed to Rupees 21,56,314, showing a decrease of Rupees 1,70,668 below Fasli 1270. The tems noted in the margin, which hitherto were included under Sundry Items, have been transferred to other heads of account

in accordance with the new Budget classification, and the figures for Fasli 1270 entered for comparison having been revised on the same principle, the variation appearing in the Return are all real. The item "Collections on account of Cochrane's canal" is included under Land Revenue, Miscellaneous, for the first ten months of the Fasli, the receipts for the remaining two months having been taken to the credit of Public Works. This item will cease to appear in the Revenue accounts from Fasli 1272. Of the remaining items, "Thaniki Jasty" is included in the Miscellaneous and the other two items under Sayer.

II. Of the decrease of Rupess 1,70,666 referred to above, the largest portion is in the Jody or quit-rent on Inams. ... Rupees 60,576 Water tax on Inams, Agraharums, &c., irrigated by the Godavery and Kistna anicuts. , 56,568 Of the decrease in the first item, Rupees 57,185 is in the Godavery District, and is due to the accumulated amount of quit-rent newly imposed by the Inam Commissioner having been brought to account in Fasli 1270, and thus found an extraordinary receipt. The decrease in the second item is owing to the anicut water having been made use of to a less extent than in the preceding Fasli in the Godavery District, in consequence of excessive rains, and heavy and long continued freshes having prevented the cultivation of the lands.

13. STATEMENT No. 10.—The Revenue from Amany villages amounted to Rupees 38,204, the decrease below Fasli 1270 is chiefly accounted for by certain villages in Tanjore having reverted to rents during the year.

14. Statement No. 11.—Regarding the special products, the decrease in the Cotton cultivation alone requires remark. The Districts in which Cotton is grown most extensively are the Kistna, Bellary, Kurnool, Madura, Tinnevelly and Coimbatore. In the Kistna, Madura and Coimbatore Districts, there has been a falling off in the Cotton cultivation, and in the other three Districts a somewhat larger area has been occupied with this staple. In the Godavery District though the cultivation is not over a great area, the falling off in the present year is remarkable, there being only 7,815 Acres against 12,657 in the year preceding. The great demand for Cotton in the English market had not, in the year under review, the expected effect of inducing the Ryots to extend the usual area of land for its cultivation. This may be partly owing to the large profits accruing from the production of Cereals, partly from the uncertainty of the Cotton market, and partly to the apathy of the fact that the greater profits derived from Cotton chiefly fall to the broker, not to the cultivator.

15. Statement No. 12.—The average assessment per acre of the different descriptions of land included in the settlement is as usual shown in Statement No. 12.

16. The foregoing remarks relate to the settlement of Ryotwar Land Revenue; the results of the settlement of the entire Land Revenue are shown in the subjoined abstract in comparison with Fasli 1270.

- II. The transfer to the Nellore District of a portion of the Peishcush of the Venkatagiri Zemindari, previously paid into the Cumbum Treasury, and that of the proprietary Estate of Avagalavode from Madras to North Arcot, account for the variations in the Peishcush demand of those Districts; but do not affect the total result.
- 18. The increase under the head Quit-rent consists chiefly of the quit-rent imposed by the Inam Commissioner in the Districts of Cuddapab, Bellary and Kurnool. The net decrease under rents is the result of a large decrease in South Arcot, in consequence of the Jaghire of Kollumallay in that District, having been during the year under report transferred to Ryotwar, and of an increase in the rental of the Palconda and Hoonjaram Estates in Vizagapatam on the renewal of the lease from Rupees 1,10,908 to Rupees 1,20,000.
- 19. The items of Ryotwar and Amani have been already explained. The particulars of "Miscellaneous items" newly introduced this year under the head of Land Revenue, to comprise the items hitherto credited to Extra Revenue and Interest Account, are shown in Statement No. 16. There is a large decrease of Rupees 32,000 in the item of Coomery and Huckle cultivation in Canara, owing to the recent orders restricting the cultivation within narrow limits. The head "Sayer" includes such items as "Forest Revenue," "Produce of Forests," "Ameendevi Coir," and the like, which under the old classification were credited to Sundry Items of Ryotwar Land Revenue. The particulars of these items are shown in Statement No. 16A. Certain items which properly belong to Sayer are still exhibited by some Collectors under Sundry Items of Ryotwar Land Revenue, and this will be rectified from next year's accounts. The items under Sayer amount to Rupees 5,66,773, and a large portion of the decrease as compared with Fasli 1270 occurs in the items of Forest revenue in North Canara, and Pearl Fishery in Tinnevelly. In the former case it is owing to the whole value of timber sold not having been realized and brought to account within the Fasli, and in the latter to the fishery not having been so successful as in the preceding year.
- 20. The changes referred to above have been rendered necessary by the new Budget classification which came into operation on the 1st May 1862. However well adapted for the closing of the Official year's accounts, the time at which the change was introduced was extremely inconvenient and productive of much confusion in the accounts closed for the Fasli year, as in the last two months, viz., May and June, a distinct arrangement had to be adopted from that which

prevailed in the first ten months of the Fasli. To avoid the confusion which will result by adopting in the accounts of one year these two different arrangements, the Board have thought proper to introduce the new classification for the whole Fasli, and in comparing the figures in their Returns with those in the Accountant General's, some slight calculations may be necessary to trace the agreement between the two sets of accounts. The figures for Fasli 1270 entered in the present Returns for comparison have also been altered so as to suit the new arrangement, and thus avoid those nominal variations which would otherwise result by transfers of items from one head to another. Hence differences will be found throughout the present Returns between the figures for Fasli 1270 entered in the present accounts, and those in the report for that year. In consequence of frequent changes in the system of accounts, the Returns received from some of the Collectors were so imperfect that much difficulty has been experienced in the compilation of the general Statements.

- 21. The redemption of quit-rent on Inams forms one of the items under Land Revenue in certain Districts, but it has been lately ordered that this item should be carried to the credit of "Public Debt," and it will therefore hereafter cease to appear in the revenue accounts.
- 22. The result of the Settlement of the Sundry Sources of Revenue as compared with Fasli 1270, was as follows:-

- 23. ABKARRY.—The Abkarry Revenue is rented out in the provinces, and the increase is owing to the higher offers for the farms on the renewal of the leases. This increase in the Abkarry farms is finally counterbalanced by a falling off in the Revenue of the Town of Madras, which is under the immediate management of the Collector to the extent of a little more than one lac of Rupees, the cause of which is stated to be the departure of Regiments, decrease of workmen employed on the Railway, and high price of provisions which left little to the poorer classes to spend in drink.
- 24. The separate item of "Miscellaneous or Interest on arrears of Revenue, and Refunds of Charges" is now in conformity with the new classification taken to the credit of "Miscellaneous" under each major head of Revenue, and is so shown at ove.
- 25. INCOME TAX.—The Income tax has yielded an increase of Revenue of 4,61,146 Rupees in excess of last year, which is owing in part to the inclusion of some assessments for Fasli 1270, in the settlement of the year under report.
- Arts, Trades and Dealings" into which the Moturpha merged baving been itself abolished in March 1862, accounts for the large decrease of 9,72,854 Rupees under this head. The small amount of 44,528 Rupees brought to account appertains to a portion of the Fasli, in which the tax had been collected in some Districts before the receipt of orders for its abolition.

27. The salt transactions are embodied in Statements 14 and 15; the following is an abstract of them:—

II. The quantity manufactured and brought into store during the year was much less than in Fasli 1270, owing to the large supply left on hand by the previous year's manufacture. The

Salt sold amounted to Indian Maunds 65,51,624, or Indian Maunds 3,27,989 less than the sales of Fasli 1270. The decrease occurs principally in the Districts entered in the margin in Salt sold for Inland consumption.

III. The Collector of Nellore remarks that the decrease occurred in the sales for distant markets, and that there is an increase in the quantity sold for Home consumption on the Coast, and he concludes that reserve stores have been tapped, and Salt from other Districts may have been imported more freely. The Board are inclined to think that the increase in the Coast sales indicates that smuggling on the coast has been somewhat checked, and that the decrease in the Inland consumption is owing probably to the Districts adjoining Nellore and parts of that District itself receiving portions of their supplies from the Madras Cotaurs by Rail.

IV. The Collector of the Kistna District considers that the falling off in the sales to Bringaries is attributable to the increase in price. The Board cannot altogether concur in this opinion. The salt taken by the Bringaries from the Northern Districts is for supply to the Nagpore country, and the falling off in the quantity purchased by them is probably the result of the heavy transit duty collected on all Salt crossing that frontier, as noticed by the Collector of Ganjam in addition to the monopoly price. There seems no reason yet to believe that the enhancement of the monopoly price has had the effect of limiting consumption, for the sales of the Madras Cotaurs have increased by about 2 lacs of Indian Maunds. There can be no doubt that the facilities and economical means of transit afforded by the Rail for the conveyance of Salt into the interior, have contributed to this favorable result, for it is evident that the Salt thus conveyed is able to compete successfully in the Salem and Coimbatore markets with Salt brought by means of ordinary carriage from much shorter distances. The quantity carried by the Rail from the Madras Cotaurs amounted to Indian Maunds 6,72,000 during the Fasli under report in the previous Fasli the quantity was 5,77,000 Indian Maunds.

V. The Sollector of Tanjore reports that the Salt traders of that District have also availed themselves to a considerable extent of the Negapatam line of Rail for the conveyance of Salt.

- 28. The wastage amounting to Indian Maunds 1,97,933 sanctioned in paragraph 15 of the Order of Government, dated 1st September 1862, No. 1,857, was not written off the accounts of the year under feport owing to the receipt of that sanction by the Collectors subsequently to the close of the Fasli. It has been written off therefore in the accounts for October last, and will consequently appear in the accounts of the current Fasli 1272. It is now included in the balance shown in the above abstract. Deducting this item as well as Indian Maunds 2,27,916-4-0, wastage of Fasli 1271 which is also included in it, the quantity of Salt actually remaining on hand at the close of the Fasli under report, is reduced to Indian Maunds 1,14,61,204, which is nearly enough for two years' ordinary consumption.
- II. The wastage of Fasli 1271 referred to above is 4.48 per cent. on the quantity originally stored which though slightly in excess of Fasli 1270, shows much improvement in some Districts especially in Nellore where the percentage has been reduced from 7.56 to 3.98 in the year under report. In Madura however the proportion of the wastage is very large in consequence of a considerable quantity of Saltamounting to no less than Indian Maunds 13,000 having been destroyed by floods. The sanction of Government is requested for writing off the accounts, the wastage in question amounting to Indian Maunds 2,27,916-4-0, which is distributed among the Districts in the proportion shown in Enclosure A to Statement No. 14.
- 29. Notwithstanding that there has been a falling off in the Salt sales as above shown, the Revenue has increased considerably in consequence of the enhancement of the celling price to Rupees 1-8-0 per Indian Maund. The increased rate came into force at the latter end of June 1861, and was in operation during the whole of the Fasli under report, while in the year preceding the price was only Rupees 1-2-0 per Indian Maund till April 1861, when it was raised to Rupees 1-6-0.
- 30. The gross revenue including Miscellaneous Items has thus amounted to Rupees 87,06,096, from which the charges Rupees 11,27,896 being deducted, the net revenue Rupees 75,78,200 exceeds that of Fasli 1270 by Rupees 20,02,063.

II. The charges are less than in the previous year in every District, except Ganjam and Tanjore, in which there is an increase amounting to Rupees 65,149, occasioned by a portion of the Coodivarum due for Salt manufactured in Fash 1270 having been paid in the year under report. The decrease is large in Madras, South Canara and Malabar, and is due in the first mentioned District, almost entirely to the much smaller quantity of Salt manufactured during the Fash for which Coodivarum was paid, in consequence of the large store left on hand from the previous year's manufacture. Owing to the same cause, viz., the large quantity in store, less Salt was purchased in South Canara and Malabar and in the latter District at more favorable rates than in Fash 1270. In the remaining Districts also, the decrease is seen chiefly in the item of Coodivarum, owing partly to smaller manufacture and partly to the discontinuance of the practice of adjusting in the current year the arrears of Coodivarum due for the previous Fashs. The guarding of the Salt pans in some Districts devolved on the new Police during a portion of the year, and this enabled the Collectors to dispense with some of the temporary establishment which caused a further decrease in the Salt charges. The cost of the new Police should properly have been included in the charges, and instructions will be issued to the Collectors to do this in future years.

32. The Revenue from Sea Customs was 19,87,773 Rupees which amount was 4,77,195 Rupees less than in the year preceding. The decrease in this item of Revenue occurs chiefly in the Districts noted in the margin. In the Godavery and Tanjore Districts, the

decrease is caused by the diminished exportation of rice and grain to the Mauritius, Boarbon and Ceylon, and also by the reduced importation of Railway stores into the latter District. In Madras the decrease is attributed to the reduction in the rate of duty on Twist, and in Ganjam it is stated to be the result of the slackness of trade to the English market. The fluctuations in the remaining Districts are not considerable and do not therefore call for special notice.

- 33. Land Customs.—There is a decrease in the Revenue derived from Land Customs of 31,030 Rupees which occurs principally in the Godavery and Tanjore Districts, in our trade with the French Settlements of Yanam and Karrical, and seems chiefly to have been in consequence of no encouragement, as before was the case, being held out by the French Government to induce merchants to ship Gingily-oil seed through the French ports.
- 34. The Stamp Revenue exhibits a satisfactory increase amounting to Rupees 8,97,137. There is an increase in every District, except South Arcot, which is the result of the operation of Act XXXVI of 1860, which was in force during only nine months of the preceding Fasli 1270, and of the new law for the limitation of Suits. The new system of remunerating Stamp Vendors in proportion to the sales which was introduced in December 1861, is reported also to have in some

degree stimulated the sales. The increase is large, especially in the marginally named Districts. In Malabar the Revenue is nearly double what it was in Fasli 1270. The apparent falling off in South Arcot is attributed by the Collector to the unusually large sales in the pre-

ceding year with which the present year is compared.

35. Collections of Current Ravenue, Statement No. 18.—Of the entire current demand, Rupees 6,11,20,995 on account of Land and Sundry sources of Revenue, a sum of Ru-

pees 5,71,27,082 was collected within the Fasli, leaving a balance at its close of Rupees 39,93,913, or a little more than 65 per cent. of the demand. Collections subsequent to the close of the Fasli have largely reduced the above balance which, on the 30th November last, amounted to only Rupees 4,78,694, or less than 5th per cent. of the gross demand. The balance under the several heads of revenue with the percentage in each item is given in the margin.

II. The balances under the first head are for the most part confined to three. District. In Madura one defaulting Estate has been placed under attachment and orders have been issued for the realization of the amounts due by the other Estates. Of the balances in Salem Rupees 9,395 is the sum annually debited in the accounts on account of the resumed Moturpha of the Moottahs, and credi-

ted to their Peishcush. In the past year no payment was made to the Moottadars apparently from want of sanction, when that is done the Peishcush

Board's Proceedings, dated 23rd September 1862, No. 6,380. account will be credited with the amount and the balance reduced. Application has recent-

ly been made to Government for reducing the amount of Peishcush once for all, to avoid this annual adjustment. The balance in the Godavery District is due chiefly by the Estates of Tengalmudi, Billumulli and Byanagudem, owing in the first case to a claim under inquiry to remission on account of loss sustained by certain Tanks in the Estate having been cut through in forming the Ellore Canal; and in the case of the other two Estates to a claim for remission in consequence of a bund across a hill stream not having been repaired.

III. The claims of these three Estates were brought to the notice of Government in paragraph 44 of the Board's Settlement. Report for Fasli 1270, while recommending the remission of the arrears due by them for Fasli 1269, but sanction was deferred, and further information called for by Government in regard to the nature of the claims. The Collector has been requested to furnish full particulars, and pending the receipt of a reply and final disposal of the claims, the balance due by the Estates for the year under report and for the two previous Faslis, must remain unsettled. As regards the Estates of Byanagudem and Bullumulli, the Collector reports that the District Engineer has made arrangements for the repair of the bund referred to during the current year. The Collector will again be called upon to expedite his reply to the Board's reference.

for water tax of 10,764 Rupees against the Nidadavole Estate, the justice of which claim is disputed by the Zemindar, but he has consented to pay such sum as the higher authorities think fair. The Collector expects to realize a considerable portion of the rest of the balances. In the Madras District the balance is stated to be the result of the late adverse season, and the increasing indigence of the people. The Board consider that this explanation is far from satisfactory, for it is observed that in this District the Collector gave large remissions for waste and for Shavi, so that the actual demand on the Ryot was it may generally be said for crops harvested, and with the prevailing very high prices of agricultural produce, the revenue should have been realized with much greater punctuality. At the close of the Fasli in this Distinct the balance was 25 per cent. of the demand. The balances in the other Districts on account of Land Revenue need no special notice.

37. Of the Abkarry balance amounting to Rupees 37,789, the larger portion, viz., Rupees 21,721 is due in North Arcot. But deducting Rupees 10,095, being the amount of remission to which the renter of that District is entitled under the orders of Government passed in the Military Department, the balance to be recovered is only Rupees 11,626, for the prompt realization of which measures have been already adopted.

II. It will be seen that the quit-rent on house properties situated on the hills has been left entirely uncollected with the exception of 10 Rupees only. The Collector having brought to the notice of the Board the nature of the difficulties he experienced in the collection of the Revenue from Europeans, received instructions as to the course he should adopt, and he hopes to recover the balances speedily by following the course pointed out. He will be required to submit a special report of the progress made in pursuance of the Board's orders in the realization of the above balances, and of any arrears of previous years which may have been outstanding.

40. Collection of Arrears, Statements Nos. 19 and 20.—Of the arrears of previous years amounting under all heads to Rupees 37,73,709, a sum of Rupees 30,28,340 was collected during the year, and Rupees 67,614 were remitted under Orders of Government, leaving a balance at the close of the Fasli of Rupees 6,77,755, which was further reduced by subsequent collections and remissions up to November last to Rupees 4,97,862; of this Rupees 2,56,542 are classed by the Collectors as recoverable or doubtful of recovery, and Rupees 2,41,310-14-7 are irrecoverable for reasons explained below. The irrecoverable arrears appertain to the following heads:—

41. Of the arrears under the first head, Rupees 1,246-6-6 in the Godavery District are due by the Bommur Estate, the proprietors of which claimed remission on account of loss sustained by an embankment thrown annually across the mouth of the Bommur drainage channel, to prevent the flooding by the Godavery during the freshes. A bridge and sluice having been recently exected, the embankment has been rendered unnecessary from the commencement of the year

under report, and no remission will consequently be necessary hereafter; but out of the arrears of Peishkush due by the proprietor for the previous Faslis, the Collector recommends, after full and careful inquiry, that the sum of Rupees 1,246-6-6 should be remitted for the losses above referred to. The still remaining sum of Rupees 43-5-10 due by the same proprietor will be realized. The small arrears of Rupees 69-11-1 in the Kistna District are due by the proprietor of Davarapalli Estate, in which in consequence of certain lands having been made over te an Inamdar, the Peishkush was reduced under Order of Government dated 7th February 1862, No. 223, from the beginning of the Fasli 1270. The usual Peishkush having however been brought to demand, the proprietor is entitled to the remission of the sum of Rupees 69-11-1 due to him as compensation.

42. The irrecoverable balances under the head "Not permanently settled," are chiefly in the three Districts entered in the margin. The arrears in the Godavery District are of old date, extending as far back as Fasli 1265. Mr.

Purvis reports that they have been carefully investigated by him, and having been found to be due by deceased, departed, and poor Ryots, their recovery is hopeless. The nature of the large arrears recommended for remission in the Kistna District has been already fully explained in paragraph 48 of the

Board's Settlement Report for Fasli 1270. Deducting from the arrears therein referred to, which amount to Rupees 1,15,728-7-4,\* the sum of Rupees 678-7-0 since collected, there remain Rupees 1,15,050-0-4, for the remission of which sanction is now recommended. The Board have received from the Inam Commissioner a reply† to their call on the subject of these arrears, forwarding a Statement of particulars for the first item.

For the other item no Statement has yet been received from the Commissioner, but as the particulars are given in the Collector's Statement, and as it appears that no formal sanction has been obtained by the Inam Commissioner for the amount, the Board have thought proper to include the whole amount with the irrecoverable balances, recommended by them for remission. The

Collector of Tanjore reports; that the arrears recommended by him for sanction accumulated during a succession of bad seasons, and that their collection by coercive process would tend to exhaust the means of the

landholders, and interfere in a great measure with the recovery of the subsequent arrears and also of the current demand. Under this explanation, the Board consider that the retention of the arrears any longer in the accounts is inexpedient. It appears from the Collector's letter dated 11th November 1862, that out of the sum of Rupees 9,132, forming a portion of the arrears sanctioned to be remitted in the Order of Government dated 22nd July 1859, on condition of the Mirassidars accepting the new Motafysul Settlement, there remains only Rupees 1,351 to be written off the accounts, which the Collector promises to do as soon as the remaining Olungu villages are converted into Motafysul. In the remaining Districts, the irrecoverable balances are small, they have been carefully inquired into by the local officers at the settlement of the Fashi under report, and are declared to be beyond recovery.

- 43. The irrecoverable balances under the other heads of Abkarry and Income Tax are trifling. Those under Moturpha occur chiefly in Bellary, Kufnool, and Madras, and being due by poor Ryots, it has been found impracticable to collect them. The fotal irrecoverable arrears under all heads amount to Rupees 2,41,319-14-7 as above shown, and the sanction of Government is requested for writing them off the accounts.
- 44. Adverting to the remarks of Government in paragraph 21 of their Order dated 1st September 1862, No. 1,857, on the subject of old arrears, the Board beg to subjoin a Statement Ind 16340 Dated 4.1. 10

showing the progress made in their disposal during the Fasli under report. The Statement is as usual confined to the arrears of Land Revenue "Not permanently settled" under which the major portion of the entire arrears is found to exist:—

II. It will be seen that of the entire arrears above shown amounting to Rupees 4,57,767 outstanding on the 30th November last, a sum of Rupees 1,43,900 is due for Fash 1270. With the exception of a small portion ascertained to be irrecoverable and included in the amount recommended for remission in the preceding paragraphs, the rest of the arrears due for that Fash will, it is expected, be for the most part shortly realized. The balances due for the previous years are scattered in small sums over the different Districts, and only in the Godavery, Kistna and Tinnevelly Districts are they of very old date. The old arrears of the Kistna District are included in the sum of Rupees 1,15,050 recommended for remission in paragraph 42, and when the sanction of Government is accorded, they will be written off, and the accounts cleared. The balance in Tinnevelly extends over many Fashs, and the Collector is taking steps for its collection, but the progress is very slow. The report from the Collector of the Godavery District is altogether silent on the subject of the old arrears due for Fashs prior to Fash 1257. His attention will be again drawn to the necessity of adopting speedy measures for the early settlement of these arrears.

45. If from the total arrears entered in the foregoing abstract, the sum of Rupees 2,31,443, which is irrecoverable, and for the remission of which sanction has been already requested, be deducted, the arrears remaining for future disposal are only Rupees 2,26,324. The Collectors expect to realize the greater portion of these arrears, and when these are finally disposed of, the future accumulation of large balances such as have been commented upon by Government during late years will be carefully avoided, as in almost every District, the current demand of each Fasli is now paid with much greater punctuality than formerly. It is however to be regretted that several Collectors have not yet adopted prompt measures for the disposal of some arrears extending to remote periods, notwithstanding that it has been pointed out to them that all arrears appertaining to an earlier period, than the last five years should be cleared off in the accounts.

46. RECEIPTS UNDER ALL HAEDS, STATEMENT No. 21.—The collections under all heads, both current and arrears amounted to Rupees 6,01,55,422 during the Fasli under report, or Rupees 26,82,442 in excess of the collections of Fasli 1270, as will be seen from the subjoined abstract of Statement No. 21:—

- II. The increase in the amount of current collections is the result of the larger demand settled for the Fasli under report. The demand on account of arrears outstanding at the beginning of the Fasli was less by Rupees 12,288 than the arrears outstanding at the commencement of Fasli 1270, but the amount realized shows an excess of Rupees 4,24,993 in favor of the year under report, a result due mainly to the active measures adopted by the local officers for the collection of the old arrears in pursuance of the repeated orders of Government and the Board on the subject.
- 47. Statement No. 22.—Notwithstanding that the revenue realized was largely in excess of Fasli 1270, it is gratifying to observe that there was even less necessity for coercive measures than in the year preceding. Notices were issued against 21,676 defaulters by whom an aggregate arrear of Rupees 2,03,518 was due. Property to the estimated value of Rupees 1,59,856 was attached, of which it was found necessary to sell property of the actual value of only Rupees 21,337.
- 48. STATEMENT No. 23.—The charges of the year as compared with Fasli 1270 are shown in the annexed abstract:—

- II. The decrease under the first head is the result partly of the amalgamation of Taluks and the introduction of the new scale of Establishments in several Districts during the year under report and partly of the discontinuance of the practice of adjusting in one year the accumulated charges of previous years. Of the decrease in the Extra charges, a sum of Rupees 6,01,288 is under the head of Salt the causes of which have been already explained. Of the remainder Rupees 5,68,607 the greater part is a decrease of charges in Madras and the Godavery Districts, due in the former to the lower rate at which Columbo arrack was purchased as compared with the price at which it has for some years past been supplied by the Commissariat, and to the less quantity of Palmira jaggery purchased in consequence of the large stock on hand of the previous year. The decrease in the Godavery District is accounted for by the circumstance that in Fasli 1270 a sum of Rupees 2,20,259 was paid to the Nedadavole Zemindar for the mesne profits of his Estate restored under the orders of Government dated 3rd April 1861, No. 724, while in the Fasli under report no such payment occurred.
- 49. In compliance with the wishes of Government expressed in their Orders dated 22nd April 1861 and 21st July 1860, the Board beg to forward herewith two Statements, Nos. 24 and 25, showing the receipts and charges for the year under report and for a series of former years. These Statements will continue to be furnished with every future year's report.
- 50. The Board have taken much pains to meet the wishes of Government for the despatch of their report at an early date, and notwithstanding the great pressure of work in their Off in

the preparation of the Budgef Estimates at the time when the compilation of the Revenue Settlement Report has also to be undertaken, the present report is submitted at an earlier period than usual, which they trust will be satisfactory to Government.

51. In conclusion, the Board have much satisfaction in bringing to the notice of Government, the very favorable terms in which the Collectors generally notice the conduct of their subordinates.


