The decrease in Sugar-cane cultivation was owing to the falling off in the demand for sugar.

The large increase in the cotton cultivation is chiefly due to the demand for exportation and to its remunerative price. Cotton was extensively cultivated this year than it has been during the last five years.

The increase in Indigo cultivation is not a matter of any importance, as the crop on the whole was only raised on a small extent of land.

The Ryots believe the leaf of the Indigo plant to be poisonous. They say, much of their cattle has been destroyed by eating this leaf, and they therefore are prejudiced against it, and will not cultivate the plant extensively.

The decrease under quit-rent and Shrotriem of Agraharums was caused by the quit-rent of some preceding years having been demanded in the accounts of last year with reference to the supplemental Registers then received from the Inam Commissioner.

The increase under Shist in Ryotwar was in consequence of new lands having been taken up this year for cultivation, and also of the increase of Chellanirnayam, or gradual imposition of assessment.

The increase under water tax in Ryotwar was owing to the increased cultivation by means of anicut irrigation, and also to the increase of Chellanirnayam.

The cause of increase under Miscellaneous will be explained in the following paragraph.

The decrease under water tax on Inams in Government Taluks was the result of correcting erroneous entries of wet lands to dry.

The increase under water tax on Zeroyati and Inams in Zemindary and proprietary estates was owing to the extended cultivation of lands under anicut irrigation.

The amount of Rupees 28,488 temporarily agreed to be paid as water tax by the Zemindar of Nidadavole and Baharazally estates is included in the sum of Rupees 73,689. The accounts required in order to determine the amount of water tax to be added permanently to the Peshkush

payable by the Zemindar have not yet been prepared pending the answer to a reference dated as per margin.

Of the whole amount of balance outstanding, viz., Rupees 95,937, Rupees 50,110 being water tax charged on usual wet Inams, and Rupees 800 being assessment on Zeroyati lands given in exchange for Inams occupied by chan-

nels, &c., making in all a total of Rupees 50,910 was held in abeyance pending the disposal of Inamdars' claims to treat their lands as usual wet, and the preparation of the required information regarding the extent, &c., of Zeroyati lands given in exchange for Inams taken up by the Public Works respectively, and the remainder, viz., 45,027, was actually due on the 10th ultimo, some of this balance seems to have been since collected, and for the realization of the remainder strict orders have been already issued to the Tahsildars.

The amount of Rupees 21,579, classed as recoverable, will soon be collected, and that of Rupees 26,876, classed as doubtful, will be inquired into more fully at the time of the next Jummah-bundy and reported upon.

Of the amount of Rupees 579, classed as irrecoverable, Rupees 18 and Rupees 147 entered under the heads of "By death" and "by Desertion" respectively, are hopeless; some of the ryots against whom the balance stands in the accounts having died, and others having left their villages and gone no one knows where, leaving no heirs, nor property, and the remainder, viz., Rupees 410, entered under the head "By other causes" is also hopeless. Rupees 73 being the assessment on land washed away by the Godavery, and also taken up by the Public Works. Rupees 9 being the assessment on land deducted according to the errata lists furnished by the Settlement Department, and Rupees 328 being the sum added to the demand of Fuslies 1272 and 1273 over the correct demand by mistake which is held in abeyance. I, therefore, recommend that the sanction of Government may be obtained for writing off the accounts the total sum of Rupees 575, entered under the head "Irrecoverable."

The amount of Rupees 14,129, entered in column 10 of the Statement, under the head "Irrecoverable," was the sum recommended for sanction to be written off the accounts by Mr. Chase in his Settlement Report for Fusly 1273. The information called for in the subject in your Memorandum No. 101, dated 19th instant, will be furnished as soon as possible.

Resort to Coercive Process.

18. The amount collected by coercive means this year was Rupees 2,882, out of an aggregate arrear Rupees 12,167.

Examination of Accounts.

19. The accounts kept according to the Village Manual were examined and found to

be generally correct. The discrepancies found were pointed but to the Kurmums for their future guidance.

The Taluk accounts were examined by Mr. Chase himself, according to the Standing Circular No. 5 of 1864, and he appears to have made no remarks on them, as they were all found to be kept correctly in form.

Conduct of Subordinate Officers.

20. Mr. Chase stated to me that he was satisfied with the conduct of the subordinate Officers in the Sub-division.

The former yielded on the whole a good return, but the latter suffered from blight. The wet crops in the upland Taluks almost perished for want of rain. The cyclone of 1st November damiged the greater part of the dry crops in the Taluks of Bapetla, Repalli, Guntoor, Bunder, and Gudiwadah. In those pations of these Taluks not affected by the inundation of the sea, the torrents of rain that tell proved beneficial to the wet crops. I can hardly think the registered fall of rain for November, Inches 2 and Cents 93, can be correct. The gauge, I am informed, was blown over, and the amount seems to have been entered at a guess. I was at the time at Narsapur as Sub-Collector. My gauge was blown over; but the one at the Tahaildar's office showed a fall exceeding four inches on the night of the 1st November; and judging from what I have heard of the cyclone, and seen of its effects, I am inclined to believe that the fall of rain here must have exceeded that of forty-two miles further north.

8. These inundated lands were also unfit for Pyra or late crops. In the inundated villages of the Coast Taluks, Variga, Bengal-gram, Lamp-oil seed, Horse-gram, Tobacco, Black and red gram were preyed upon by grabs when young. The Sarva and Dalwa paddy crops in the Colair lake yielded but a small return.

Wages.

9. The cyclone influenced the rise of the hire of labor. The town of Masulipatam and

many villages having been nearly destroyed, there was a great demand for labour to re-construct what had been destroyed. A Carpenter, contented with four Annas per diem before the cyclone, now is hardly satisfied with ten or twelve Annas. In the same proportion all other labourers have increased their demands, and as their numbers have decreased, and the demand for labour has increased, they are almost certain to get what they ask for their labour. Agricultural labour is, as usual, generally paid for in grain and other agricultural produce.

Sanitary condition.

10. Cholera and small-pox have been prevalent in some villages, and in some cases

proved fatal. Fever and guinea worm also appeared for a few months in the hilly taluks. The town of Masulipatam has been peculiarly free this year from cholera and small-pox. It was feared that the deaths caused by the cyclone, and the hasty disposal of several thousands of corpses, that during the hot months the town would have been visited by some epidemic. But contrary to expectation, I believe, the sanitary state of the town to be better than it has been any time this last ten or twelve years. Sanitary measures have been strictly attended to, and with the most beneficial effects.

11. The loss of cattle has been very great. Many were washed away during the cyclone, and many having no pasturage afterwards, died from sheer starvation.

- 42. There being a large quantity of salt in store at Chinna Ganjam, no dittum was made there. The decrease in the production of salt, below the dittum, in the other Cotaurs, is due to unseasonable rains, which proved injurious to the salt production.
- 43. The large decrease in the sales at Buntoomilly and Mangenapudy is owing to most part of the salt in store having been washed away by the storm of November 1st.

Stamps.

45. The increase in the sales of stamps is satisfactory. I fear, however, that the enact-

ment is constantly evaded especially in the case of Hoondies. They are extensively used in commercial transactions, but the sale of stamped Hoondee papers is nil. The Court of Small Causes at Masulipatam contributes largely to this increase.

47. The causes for the decrease in the demand have already been explained above.

The collections have decreased proportionately with the demand. The collection made on account of the total demand of the District in the year under report, amounts to Rupees 38,01,876. There was a balance of Rupees 1,33,740 at the close of the year, of which Rupees 90,895 have since been collected up to the end of August 1865. The remaining Rupees 42,845 will be collected as early as practicable.

Coercive measures employed in collecting revenue.

49. A greater part of the revenue was collected easily on account of the high prices of

grain. In thirty-four villages, personal property to the value of Rupees 1,756-1-5, belonging to ninety individuals, was attached for arrears amounting to Rupees 2,641-3-4. Out of which, property valued at Rupees 124-6-9 only was sold within the year.

- 51. The decrease in the collections is caused by the large remissions rendered necessary by the storm in November.
- 52. In charges, an increase was caused, because the collector's salary, during his absence on leave in Fusly 1273, was debited to this year, because some salaries were increased, and additional Gumastahs appointed, and because of repairs made to some salt platforms injured by the inundation in November, &c. But as there was a decrease in the amount of salt stored owing to the effects of the cyclone, and as the salaries of the salt establishment were reduced according to the new scale, and as the wages of Village Naikwadies, &c., which were charged up to Fusly 1273 under the head "Extra Charges, Land Revenue," were paid in this year from Local Funds, there was a net decrease of Rupees 23,201.

Village Accounts.

53. Under the orders published in the District Gazette, agreeably to the Board's in-

structions, dated 18th January 1864, the Village accounts were examined by the Revenue Inspectors, and also by the Taluk servants, when occasion, called them to visit any villages. These accounts, as well as the Taluk accounts, were examined during the time of the settlement of each Taluk by an Accountant deputed, from the Huzur for the purpose, and by the Settlement Officer himself, in accordance with the orders of the Board, dated 18th January 1864. All the accounts prepared before the settlement were properly kept. The general Account Department is in an efficient state and the accounts are properly kept.

Lands acquired by Public servants.

54. None of the Huzur or the Taluk servants acquired new lands during the year under review. Sub-Division Report,

55. The Settlement Report of the Subdivision is herewith submitted.

Conduct of subordinate servants.

56. Having only taken charge of this District after the settlement had been com-

pleted, I am of course unable to offer any remarks concerning the conduct of the subordinate officers during the Fusly of which this is the report.

ber last, regarding the storm of 1st November 1864. The increase in the number of Puttahs was caused by giving fresh Puttahs to the Ryots whose old Puttahs were destroyed by the late storm, and from the fact that stranger Ryots took up lands to a greater extent than usual.

The Season

6. The quantity of rain that fell during the current year is somewhat above that of

the last year. Although the storm of 1st November destroyed cholum and other crops, yet the prices of grain having risen, the condition of the merchants is improving, and the Ryots have also paid their shists without resort being had to coercive measures.

- 8. The early crops, Sazza, Gidda Jonna, Mokka Jonna and Korra gave a very good return; but the dry crops, viz, Zilama, Velavadam and Badama, as also other crops such as red-gram, and in part the later crops of Magani, and the whole of the Pedda Jonna crops have been destroyed by the storm of 1st November. Bengal gram, black gram, lamp-oil seed, and Variga crops being destroyed by the insects gave only a scanty out-turn. Cotton crops also yielded a scanty produce from the above cause; Indigo and garden crops yielded well.
- 9. The hire of coolies in Guntoor is from two to four Annas each per diem as in last year, and in the villages it is paid in grain.
- 10. In certain villages of the Sub-division, fever and ague prevailed to a small extent, and in others some have died from cholera, and many suffered from small-pox.
 - 11. From want of rain, the cattle have suffered heavily.

A remission of two Annas in the Rupee on the whole dry crops destroyed by the late storm, inclusive of Cholum crop of the village of Atmakur, in which there was an extensive wet cultivation, and at four Annas in the Rupee on the dry Shist of all the Seri villages in which Cholum alone was sown, and at two Annas in the Rupee on the other dry crops in the said villages, was granted. The remission allowed with reference to the said Orders relates only to dry crops. In but a single village was remission granted upon Magani lands, viz., Mutlur, which had no means of irrigation. The first dry rate Shist on the lands in question has been levied. Exclusive of the remission granted for the Taluk of Guntur, the remainder, Rupees 76,145-12-3, belongs to the other three Taluks of the Sub-division.

- 20. The remission granted on dry and garden lands was the result of the destruction of crops by the late storm of 1st November 1864. There was a decrease in the wet remission above that of the last Fusly.
- 21. The cause of the decrease in the usual Vandras is explained below. Certain Vandra lands were relinquished by certain men; some had let out their Vandra lands to sub-tenants, in which case the Vandra was disallowed at the settlement, and some claimants of Vandra have (since) died. By carrying to account such items, the decrease has arisen.
- 22. Increase to the salaries of certain village Munsiffs having been made during the settlement, an increase of Rupees 198-15-2 resulted in this head of salaries to the Munsiffs, and Vandra to Curnums.

 * The Settlement of the Taluk of Rajapeta, examined the Taluk and certain Village accounts, and I have myself examined the accounts of Guntur Taluk settled, by me; there were found certain small and unimportant omissions, to correct which the necessary orders on the subject have been issued to the Taluk. I will address you more fully on the subject hereafter, with reference to paragraph 18 of the Board's Miscellaneous Circular, No. LXVI.
- 38. No registrations of lands acquired by Public servants of the Sub-division have been made during the year under report.
- 39. Conduct of Public Servants.—Having only joined the District in March last, I had scarcely time before the close of the Fusly to form any opinion of the character of my subordinates. During the Settlement of the Guntur Taluk, I received most efficient help from the Tahsildar of Guntur, and I feel I can, with justice, endorse the high opinion that my predecessor entertained for him. I have every reason to believe that my Serishtadar, Kadapa Kristnaravu, keeps his own Department in good order, and has prepared the accounts connected with the Settlement in a very satisfactory manner.
- 40. I do not consider this is the place to say any thing on the conduct of the other Cutcherry servants, except that I have every reason to be satisfied with their work hitherto.

The reduction will be about 50,000 Rupees.

3rd.—As the accounts now stand we have a net increase in the area of acres 53,552, and in the assessment of Rupees 1,03,089, as compared with the holdings of Fusly 1273; and deducting the remission involved on lands the revision of which could not be carried out at the Jummahbundy, there would still be an increase of about the same amount as that shown as the probable reduction under the head of wells.

4th.—In page 851 of the District Gazette dated 10th December 1864, the extent of land formally relinquished by Ryots is shown at 18,272 acres, bearing an assessment of Rupees 34,300. Deducting from this the land taken up by the same and other Ryots, and adding the extent struck off at the Jummahbundy, there is a net relinquishment of acres 14,224, assessed at Rupees 26,846, as shown in the annexed Statement; and as a set off against this we have as similarly shown 66,710 acres, valued at Rupees 1,31,515 newly taken up giving the net increase at acres 52,486 assessed at Rupees 1,04,669.

1st.—The Board will thus observe that notwithstanding the adverse character of the season, 5,92,453 acres of land was cultivated during the year under report, showing a net increase of 44,469 acres as compared with the results of the preceding year. The corresponding increase in the assessment, including the second crop and additional assessment, is given at Rupees 79,854. Deducting from this the remission involved on garden lands, the assessment on which from the circumstances already stated has been entered in the accounts at the rates hitherto fixed, and which will be duly modified hereafter, there would still be an increase of upwards of 20,000 Rupees.

Waste charged and remitted.

10. The total extent of land left waste during the year under report is 1,01,70% acres,

assessed at Rupees 2,33,382, or little more than 14 per cent. on the holdings, yiz., 6,91,155 acres, assessed at Rupees 16,34,925, the proportion of the waste to the occupation in Fusly 1273 being 14 per cent. The following Statement shows the particulars of waste charged and remitted:

by me in Fusly 1274, the accounts having been prepared according to the demarcation, I remarked the fallow to the extent of Rupees 247 as a special case, as it would be unfair to charge for land not formally taken up. While the remaining sum of Rupees 145 was remitted by the Deputy Collector in Chiramana,

where four Ryots cultivated 23½ gorrus newly, leaving 104% gorrus within the demarcation limits fallow—the assessment due on the portions thus left waste being Rupees 532.

3rd.—The sum of Rupees 1,601, on 812 acres of dry-land in the Ongole Taluk, was remitted under the circumstances stated in my letter of the 21st May 1865, No. 172, paragraph 6.

4th.—The following Statement shows how the rice lands left waste have been dealt with as contrasted with the total area:—

5th.—From the foregoing statement it will be seen that the remission granted was 16 per cent., while the amount charged was only 2 per cent. upon the whole. Of Rupees 1,30,485, the total sum remitted on rice lands, more than a third, viz., Rupees 51,454, appertains to the Nellore

Taluk, where the per centage was however only 15 per cent. In Kandukur, the revenue from the rice lands in occupation at the ordinary rates of assessment being 67,548 Rupees, the remission granted (Rupees 24,182) amounts to 36 per cent. In tike manner the amount of remission compared with the occupation was comparatively heavy in the Taluks of Rapur, Kavali, and Kanigiri, and the state of the tanks rendered this necessary.

6th.—As regards the waste charged, the Board will observe that it ranges from 1 to 2 per cent. with the exception of the Kanigiri and Gudur Taluks. In the former Taluk, the total amount charged out of a holding valued at Rupees 3,016 was only 76 Rupees of which 5 Rupees were charged in Sannichenupalli where no cultivation was made at all, although the tank received a supply; and the remainder (Rupees 71) is the dry rate at 2½ Rupees charged under the Sankavaram tank, which has been relained under "wet" pending final Orders.

7th.—Of Rupees 4,801 charged in the Guduru Taluk, Rupees 2,909 appertant to the Anikut villages; whilst in the Nellore Taluk Rupees 5,506 were charged for the same reason, and thus the aggregate charge made for waste under the Anikut was Rupees 8,415, or more than a molecy of the total sum for the whole District (16,571 Rupees.)

8th.—Remission was also granted on garden lands registered under tanks when the supply was inadequate, and the remission thus granted shows an increase of Rupees 15,558 as compared with Fusly 1273—an increase the season necessitated:—

1st.—The details as regards Rupees 25,688 being the remission on portions of fields left waste have been already adverted to.

Withered Crops.

2nd—. The requisite information not being ready at the Jummahbundy for the settlement

of claims for remission on account of Shavi, and the Taluk demand Statement closed as soon as the settlement was concluded with reference to paragraph 3 of the Board's Miscellaneous Circular, No. LXXIX, Board No. 4,512, dated 19th July 1864, already referred to, no entry appears under "withered crops": but I may add that the total amount of remissions, found necessary under this head since the Jummahbundy has been Rupees 3,926-5-10, and sanction will be requested to write

 it off as laid down in paragraph 5 of the above Circular. This remission was allowed only in three Taluks as shown in the margin, the decrease being Rupees 12,354 as compared with the corresponding item (Rupees 16,280) in Fusly 1273.

Discretionary Remission.

3rd.—As regards 'this item we have only two Rupees remitted under the following cir-

cumstances. Rangasamudram is a Surva Inam village in the Kavali Taluk, and in Manulolupadu, a village in the same. Taluk held at the ordinary rates of assessment, a field is said to be irrigated

from the tank of the Inam village, and a sum of Rupees two deducted annually from the puttah of its holder who is understood to pay the same to the Inamdar for the water given. This remission will be made the subject of immediate inquiry.

"Remission of Shrotriems."

4th.—Rupees 147 shown in the last report under this head relates to the four villages of the Kanigiri Taluk referred to in Clause 1, paragraph 3 of this report, as having been since enfranchised by the Inam Department. Hence this item is left blank for the year under report.

"Cowle Remission" — "Munsiff's Salary"

5th.—The small sum of Rupees eleven remitted under the terms of a Progressive Cowle in Dharmavaram in the Kavali Taluk, and Rupees 48 remitted as usual by assignment on puttah demand as salary to the Village Munsiff of Tammavaram and its three hamlets, annexed to the Ongole Taluk from the late Guntur District, calls for no special remarks.

Lands taken up in lieu of Fillage Service Inams.

6th.—Rupees 343 were remitted during the year under report as the assessment payable on land taken up in lieu of service Inams, showing a decrease of Rupees 133 as compared with the corresponding item of remission in Fusly 1273. When such lands are left waste for want of water, remission is granted in common with other lands. But the item in question being strictly a deduction from the assessment of land actually cultivated, there is a fluctuation in what is apparently a fixed item. The principle and the mode in which the Village servants who have either no Inams, or whose Inams are no longer available for cultivation, should, in my opinion, be remunerated for the future, have been submitted for the Board's consideration in my Report dated 11th September 1865, No. 211.

Sundry Items.

12. Under the instructions conveyed in Miscellaneous Circular, No. XCIV, Board,

No. 5,631, dated 31st August 1864, the head "Sundry Items" under "Ryotwar" has been dispensed with; all receipts previously credited to it being transferred to "Land Revenue Miscellaneous," which will be duly noticed in its proper place. Suffice it to state here that the decrease of Rupees 2,18,009 under this head is only nominal.

3rd.—Statement No. 9 shows in detail the component items comprised under "Miscellaneous" for Fusly 1274, as well as the items credited in Fusly 1273 under the same head and "Sundry Items." The decrease of Rupees 2,18,009 under "Sundry Items" being, as already observed, nominal, it follows that the increase of Rupees 2,16,664 shown under "Miscellaneous" is equally fictitious, and the fair mode of comparing the results of the two years is to contrast the receipts credited to "Land Revenue Miscellaneous" in Fusly 1274 to the amount credited in the previous year under the same head plus "Ryotwar Sundry." Thus compared there is upon the whole a real decrease of Rupees 1,345 as shown in the Statement:—

2. From the circumstances already stated the increase of Rupees 74,590 under this head is nominal, the actual result being a decrease of Rupees 2,540 as detailed in the margin, which is owing to the quit-rent on rice Inam lands being remitted for want of water. The

manner in which this remission was allowed, I had occasion to report to the Board in my letter dated 12th September 1865, No. 213.

2nd.—"Land cultivated but not included in the Jumhead for Fusly 1274, only Rupees 10,213 is the
assessment of land not included in the Jummahbundy, the remainder, Rupees 5,455, being the
quit-rent of former years on Inams recently settled by the lnam Department with retrospective
effect. But the sum of Rupees 2,770, entered in the column headed "Last Fusly," is purely
the assessment of land not included in the Jummahbundy, the quit-rent of former years on Inams

The increase in the assessment of Rupees 7,443 is owing to the circumstance, already referred to, of having closed the Taluk demand soon after the Jummahbundy, while the increase of Rupees 3,482 is attributable to the large number of cases settled by the Inam Commissioner. It seems necessary to explain that the two items are mixed for Fusly 1274 in view to making the entry tally with the monthly Statements of collections of Miscellaneous Items according to the new form in which no special provision is made for exhibiting such quit-rents separately—the similar quit-rent for Fusly 1273, exhibited under "other items," being shown as Item No. 27 in colamn headed "last Fusly" in the Statement now submitted.

3rd .- Concealed Cultivation.

III. The decrease of Rupees 1,388 under this head is owing to a large extent of conceal-

ment in Brahmmadevam in the Gudur Taluk having been brought to account in Fusly 1273.

for Fusly 1274 having been sold after the expiration of that year could not be credited in the accounts. Honey was sold for Rupees 29, and wax for Rupees 8, and the amount thus collected was credited in the accounts of August.

10th.—Chunam Shell Rent. 11tk.—Ratan Rent. 13th.—Rent of Soap-nut.

12th.—Rent on Palmyra. 14th.— Do, on Fruit Trees IX. No variation under Items Nos. 10 and 13, and the decrease of Rupees 32 under No. 11 is too small to need any explanation.

X. In Fusly 1273 the receipts which should have been credited under No. 12 were inadvertantly carried to account under No. 14.

During the year under report the credits having been made under the appropriate heads, there is an increase of Rupees 660 under the former, and a decrease of Rupees 616 under the latter items.

15th.—Reut of Roots for dyeing Cloths.

XI. The revenue from Cheyroot during the year under report is shown at Rupees 1,385

falling short of the corresponding item in Fusly 1273 by Rupees 1,990. The Cheyroot contractor of the Sriharikota Division, whose lease will expire with the end of the current Fusly (1275), declined to take possession of the quantity collected for Fuslies 1272 and 1273, even after the requisite remission was ordered to be granted, and steps having been taken to enforce the terms of the lease, he came forward a few months ago. The quantity collected for the above years was duly weighed and made over to him, and the amount due by him for the said period collected in due course. It appears that the quantity of Cheyroot collected for Fusly 1274 is not taken possession of by the contractor. The Tabsildar has given him due notice. As the actual amount payable has to be determined after weighing it in presence of the contractor, the procrastination on his part has been the cause of delay in determining the demand. The Tabsildar's attention has been already directed to the matter on the 7th July last, by Takid No. 113, Miscellaneous. I am sending further instructions to allow no further delay, and the amount when collected will be credited in the Current Accounts under the proper head.

16th.-Rent of Medicinal Roots.

XII. This item was rented for Rupees 245, showing an increase of Rupees 97, and calls for no special remarks.

17th .- Produce of Fisheries.

XIII. This item is left blank having been transferred to "District Road Fund,"

with reference to the Board's Standing Circular, No. LVII, Board No. 4,958, dated 4th August 1864.

18th .- Cultivation without Permission.

19th -Water Tax on Zemindary and Inam, &c., Lands.

XIV. The increase of Rupees 1,211 under this head has chiefly occurred in the Taluks of Nellore, Kavali, and Atmakur, where such cultivation was largely made.

XV. The small increase of Rupees 166 under this head is fallacious. In Fusly 1273

the water tax charged on Zemindary lands and entire Inam villages was credited to "Miscellaneous;" while the tax levied on Sundry Inams was carried to account under "Ryotwar Sundry;" and in Fusly 1274 both descriptions of the tax having been credited to "Miscellaneous," there is a decrease of Rupees 5,639 as shown below so far as the entry in the accounts is concerned. It must be remembered that even this does not represent a correct state of things. The Board having taken exception to my charging water rate at 3 Rupees the acte in Fusly 1273, no charge was made by me in Fusly 1274 pending the final instructions on the subject, the fields

usually charged at the adjoining rates being however dealt with as heretofore. The rate at which water tax should be charged was fixed by Government in their Order, dated 10th June 1865, No. 1,271, communicated with the Board's Proceedings of the 17th idem, No. 3,308; the question as to the area liable to be charged being disposed of by Government Order, dated 11th August 1865, No. 1,871, communicated with the Board's Proceedings, dated 18th idem No. 5,207. On receipt of these Orders, instructions have been sent to Tahsildars to prepare the requisite accounts directing them at the same time to modify the charge at the Jummahbundy with reference to the recent Orders in view to securing uniformity. When the actual amount is determined it will be collected and credited in due course.

XVII. Like the three last items the increase of Rupees 394 under this head is also

nominal; but on comparing it with the corresponding item credited to Ryotwary Sundry in Fusly 1273, a decrease of Rupees 10 is observable, which is owing to the Russums levied from the "Sarva Inam" village of Pandluru in the Rapur Taluk, having been discontinued under the circumstances stated in paragraph 15 of my report on Russums, dated 9th June 1865, No. 110.

XVIII. The increase under these items

is also nominal, the actual fluctuation being

shown in the following Statement. The eighth portion of the Sribarikota jungle rented in Fusly 1274 being more extensive than the seventh portion rented in Fusly 1273 accounts for the increase of Rupees 3,473, while item No. 25 fell off for want of competition. The increase under Stalakarnam Russums is attributed to extended cultivation.

fees for licenses issued under the new Abkarry Laws for the sale of liquor, other Toddies, &c., and of Rupees 2 levied as penalty for the illicit transit of liquor.

Income Tax.

2nd.—There is a decrease of Rupees 3,502 under this item, which is the result of opera-

tions in accordance to the present state of the law tending in that direction.

Sea Customs.

3rd.—As will be seen from paragraph 11 of the enclosed report from the Acting Deputy Collector no dutiable articles were exported during the year under report—the receipts amounting to 79* Rupees shown under this head consisting partly of the Customs of Fusly 1273 carried to account in Fusly 1274, and

partly of "Miscellaneous" shown in Statement No. 9.

4th.—The Salt revenue exhibits an increase of Rupees 1,66,555, of which nearly the

I. The quantity of Salt manufactured was about six and a quarter lacs of Maunds. There was at the beginning of the year fifteen and three-quarter lacs of Maunds in store. Deducting sales, &c., the quantity in store at the end of the year is thirteen and half lacs. In paragraph 4 of the Deputy Collector's report, the out-turn of Salt during the year is shown as exceeding the out-turn of the previous year by two and three-quarter lacs of Maunds, which is partly attributable to the liberality of Government in increasing the rates from Rupees 7-15-0 to 10 Rupees per Garce.

5th.—The increase of Rupees 2,778 under this head shows that the Stamp revenue is progressing.

Road Fund

17. As proposed in paragraph 12 of my letter, dated 5th September 1865, No. 209, I will now give the details of the Fund.

1st.—As the Board are aware the road cess at two per cent. is charged in this District on the assessment of all rice lands as revised in 1857-58, and on well lands on which assessment was

 reduced. Thus calculated, the total demand on account of the two per cent. Road Fund was in Fusly 1274 Rupees 12,722-14-0 against Rupees 11,747-8-9 for the previous year.

2nd.—The collections during the Official year 1864-65 amount to Rupees 10,768-10-0. Adding the collections subsequently made, we have Rupees 20,301-12-4 collected, leaving however a balance of Rupees 842-5-7 still to be realized on account of the demand for Fusly 1274.

Details of Doubtful Arrears.

22. Of Rupees 89-8-10 shown as "Doubtful" under "Ryotwar," Rupees 64-15-2 con-

stitute the assessment on certain land in the village of Chiramana formerly attached to the late Udayagiri Jaghire and now comprised in the Taluk of Atmakur. It appears that the land in question was enjoyed as Inam by Kattubadies, and the assessment remitted every year. In June 1864, I inquired into the matter personally, and finding that the question was under the consideration of the Inam Commissioner, I issued a Takid dated 17th idem, No. 158, suspending the collection of the assessment pending the decision of the Inam Department. No Registers have been as yet received for this or other Inams of the Jaghire, and the amount is shown under Doubtful," as its collection or remission will depend on the settlement of the Inam Commissioner. The remaining sum of Rupees 24-9-8, as also the Doubtful arrears of "Miscellaneous,"
