The remaining land was acres 10,52,284, assessed at Rupees 17,29,154. The lands taken up afresh during the year were acres 40,673, assessed at Rupees 52,182. The fresh land taken up in the previous year was acres 79,612, assessed at Rupees 99,932. The total holdings of the Ryots during the Fusly amounts to acres 10,92,957, assessed at Rupees 17,81,336, of which acres 6,432, assessed at Rupees 33,350 constitute the item "waste remitted."

Of this remission, which is, Rupees 4,648 above that granted for waste during the preceding Fusly. Rupees 33,317 appertain to Nunjah lands left waste for want

- 24. The increase, viz., Rupees 6,548, in the Inam Jodi is owing to an increased amount of quit-rent imposed by the Commission.
- 25. The increase, viz., Rupees 2,741, in the revenue from hill villages is owing to an increase found in the area of several coffee estates on the Shervaroy Hills. The lands were reexamined, and the boundary disputes settled by Mr. Beaumont, the Deputy Superintendent, Revenue Survey and myself, and the proprietors of the estates have received Puttahs according to the new areas.
- 26: The revenue derived from palmyra trees having been transferred to "Local Funds," as explained in my letter to the Board of the 20th June last, No. 86; there appears nothing under the head "Rent on palmyra trees" for the Fusly under report. This revenue for Fusly 1273 amounted to Rupess 19,904.

Average Assessment per acre.

- 29. From the foregoing Statement it will be seen that the balance of Land Revenue under all sources was, at the end of the Fusly, three per cent., and at the end of July one per cent. of the total demand.
- 30. The balance at the close of the year against Mutas was Rupees 15,993. This, at the end of July, was reduced to Rupees 2,492. A part of this amount appertains to lands taken up in Mutas for Railway and other public purposes. The further information called for by the Board, on my application for permanently deducting this amount from the Peishcush, will be submitted very shortly.
- 31. The balance under the Shrotriem Jodigi was at the end of July Rupees 4,594. The Agraharums against which this balance is due have been placed under attachment, and under the old Hukumnamah rule, which the Board wish me to follow, one full year has to elapse before the attached Agraharums could be brought to sale. In the meanwhile, though the establishment entertained for the management of the Agraharums is supposed to collect rents, there is really nothing to collect; for, generally the shareholders receive almost all their rents before the Agraharum falls in arrears, and withhold the Government dres till the very last moment, owing to some fued or other among themselves, and after that it is generally paid off by some one of the wealthy shareholders who does not wish to see the estate sequestered by Government.
- 32. The balance under the head Ryotwary was, at the end of the Fasli, Rupees 25,942, and at the end of July, Rupees 12,150, most of this balance is due on lands for the distraint and sale, of which measures have been adopted. The outstanding Miscellaneous Land Revenue has also to be recovered by the employment of coercive measures.

The sum, viz., Rupees 48-13-4, entered under the head "Permanently settled" is the amount referred to in the Board's Official Memorandum, da ted 4th February last, No. 85.

39. The amount entered under the head "Land Revenue" refers chiefly to lands which were distrained and sold; but the proceeds of which were not sufficient to cover the full amount due. It also includes the Sookavassi remissions on the lands belonging to Brahmins under the Cavery channels. The collection of this amount, which was included in the demand, was suspended pending the Orders of the Board on the complaint made by the Brahmins. The Board

having since ordered the continuance of these remissions, the uncollected amount is included in the irrecoverable balance.

- 40. The amount under the head "Miscellaneous Revenue" refers to the Shervaroy Hills. Puttahs were made, through a mistake, for certain lands before Cowles expired and the same included in the demand. They are, therefore, now shown as irrecoverable.
- All the arrears now recommended for remission were very carefully scrubinized in my office, and their collection has been ascertained to be hopeless beyond doubt.
- With reference to paragraph 17 of the Board's Proceedings, under date the 5th June last, No. 3,239, I beg to state that the arrears up to Fasli 1270 in this District was, at the end of July last, Rupees 872-13-4. This extends over two Fuslis, viz., 1269 and 1276. The amount for Fasli 1269 is only Rupees 44-2-0, and the whole of this being irrecoverable is included under that head. The amount for Fusly 1270 is Rupees 828-11-4. Of this, only Rupees 26-8-10 is r coverable. The recovery of this is delayed in consequence of a boundary dispute which will very shortly be settled. The remaining, viz., Rupees 802-26, is irrecoverable. Rupees 650 of this amount is the Sookavassi remission, and Rupees 34-15-8 appertains to lands which were sold, but the sale proceeds of which did not cover the full demand.

Coercive Process.

44. In 744 cases, or 199 cases above the hand a server past year, coercive measures

were employed for the recovery of revenue arrears. The amount collected by that process was Rupees 904. The actual sum in arrears was Rupees 7,742.

45. In most of the cases the lands sold were bought in by Government at a nominal price. for no land of any real value is ever allowed to go to auction.

Charges.

THOUSETTENOPT.

46. The charges incurred during the year were Rupees 2,10,171, or Rupees 3,485 above

the charges for last year. The increase is chiefly in three items :- I., Salary of Collectors, &c. . . this is owing to the deputation allowance drawn by the Officers acting for the Collector and for the Head Assistant Collector during the year; II., Huzur and, District establishment, this is owing to the augmentation of the pay of the Collectors and Sub-Collector's Serishtadars; alli., Law charges, this is owing to the amount of loss paid to the Muttahdar of Tadavully in pursuance of the Civil Court's Decree in Original Suit No. 11 of 1861.

Income Tax

47. The enclosed Statement shows the Demand, Collection, and Balance of Income tax

for Fusly 1274. The demand for the year amounted to Rupees 27,162-10-3, including stoppages from the pay of public servants and the collection to Rupees 21,910-3-10. Remissions to the amount of Rupees 1,447-7-4 have lately been sanctioned by Government.

Village and Taluk accounts.

48. The Village and Taluk Accounts of the different Taluks were examined by the

Officers who conducted the Settlement. The accounts have been found to be kept correctly and in due form with a very few exceptions. It has been a rule in this District to assemble all the Curnums at the examination of the accounts, and to point out to them any discrepancies which may be found in them. Fines were inflicted on those whose accounts were in arrears, or were not correctly prepared. This system has been found to be useful, and has tended to the more correct and punctual preparation of the accounts.

General Account Department.

49. This branch of my office has been working steadily and satisfactorily. The accounts are kept in correct form, and the periodical Returns are rendered with due despatch. Work in this Department has of late been increasing, and I intend immediately applying for additional aid for the preparation of accounts connected with the Military Pension Department and the Local Funds.

My Assistant, Mr. Hughesdon, is rapidly improving himself in the knowledge of Tamil and general business. Deputy Collectors Mr. Leggatt and T. Cornelius Pillay have discharged their duties satisfactorily. The Tahsildars of my division have generally given me satisfaction, as well as all my other subordinates, and I have received as usual the greatest assistance from my Serishtadar David Paul Pillay.

Variations in the number and tenure of villages, and remarks on Puttahs.

3. The number and tenure of villages remain the same as last year. The total number of Puttahs exceeds the total of last year by

3,437. This excess chiefly consists of separate Puttahs issued this year for Miscellaneous items under the Orders of the Board, communicated in their Proceedings, dated 31st August 1864, No. 5,631. The number of Land Revenue Puttahs alone, exclusive of those issued for Miscellaneous items, was 60,973, of which 45,075, or seventy-four per cent. remained unrenewed, so that the number of renewed Puttahs was 15,898.

Season.

4. The season was favorable to the dry crops, but not to the wet; the rain falling too The account of the average fall is separately given.

late and at too great intervals for the latter.
Sanitary state.

The sanitary state of the Sub-division was good during the year under report. Cholera,

fever and small-pox made their appearance as usual in some parts of the District, but were followed by no great mortality. Cleanliness is gaining ground in Cusbah towns. The town of Qossoor was particularly healthy, a result to be attributed to the operations of the Sanitary Association.

6. Cattle suffered from diseases of various kinds, and their loss, I regret to say, was great.

Vaccination

7. The Vaccine operations were unsatisfactory; but having been since placed on a fresh basis, no special remark is called for.

Prices of grain.

8. Prices of grain continue to rise. They are ten per cent, higher than last year. The

general cause is too patent to require pointing out at my hands, it being merely an indication of the increased development of the country. Locally, I may add that the extension of the rail to Bangalore has served to increase the drain on all the articles of food, meat as well as grain.

Ryots' holding?.

9. The annexed Memorandum will show

that in the year under report there has been an increase of holdings to the extent of Acres 3,069, assessed at Rupees 2,240. This is the natural result of high prices.

- 24. The last item explains itself. The grounds for it were submitted in the correspondence above quoted.
- 25. A separate Memorandum showing the Demand, Collection, and Balance of Miscellaneous items is forwarded as usual.

Forest.

26. There is a decrease of Rupees 1,359, which was predicted in my last Report.

Stamps.

27. There is a decrease in this item also to the extent of Rupees 1,977. The reason for

this see as to me to be the restriction imposed on the jurisdiction of the local Judicial Officers to entertain suits above a certain limit, which restriction, though subsequently removed, had the effect, for the time, of discouraging litigation. Demand, Collection, and Balance of all sources of Current 28. The particulars under this head are Revenue. shown in Statement No. 11. Of the total demand Rupees 6,41,100, the collection to the end of July amounted to Rupees 6,33,081, leaving a balance of Rupees 8,018. This sum is less than the balance of last year by Rupees 1,095, and of this amount the main part has, I believe, been since collected.

Demand, Collection, and Balance of all sources of Arrears.

29. The particulars are given in Statement No. 13. At the close of the Fusly (1273) the outstanding arrears amounted to Rupees 27,490. Of this, the collections and the remissions within the Fusly amounted to Rupees 25,229, and the subsequent collections to the end of July to Rupees 200, making a total of Rupees 25,428. This being deducted from the total amount of old arrears, there is a balance left of Rupees 2,061, of which the doubtful and the recoverable

amount to Rupees 1,486; so that the sum requiring sanction as irrecoverable is Rupees 575. This sum consists for the most part of the irrecoverable arrears of Income Tax amounting to

Rupees 343, the remission of which has been recommended in my letters noted in the margin, and the remainder is chiefly to be traced to lands sold in satisfaction of arrears not realizing the amounts due thereon.

Coercive Process.

30. Coercive measures were resorted to in but few cases. Though the amount for the

recovery of which processes were issued exceeded Rupees 3,180, property to a much smaller amount was attached, and still less sold; so that the value of property really sold was only Rupees 311.

31. A Memorandum showing the sums realized on account of interest under each head of revenue is forwarded, as directed in the Board's Proceedings, dated 30th June 1864, No. 4,031.

Village and Taluk Accounts.

32. They were examined in the same way as in last year, and were found to be cor-

rectly kept in the two Taluks of which I conducted the Settlement, viz., Oossoor and Dharam-pury. The same remark applies to the village Accounts.

33. A list of lands acquired by public servants accompanies.

# SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

## SOUTH CANARA.

- 1. I have the honor to submit the Annual Report on the Revenue Settlement of this District for Fusly 1274, (A. D. 1864-65,) accompanied by the usual Statements.\*
- I. PLACES AT WHICH THE SETTLEMENT WAS MADE.

2. The Settlement of the District was commenced on the 6th of January 1865, and was completed on the 12th April, the day I assumed

charge of the District. The Taluks of Udipi and Uppinangadi were settled by the late Collector, Mr. Morris, between the 13th of February and 20th March: those of Cassergode and Kundapur by the Deputy Collector, Mr. Ball, between the 6th of January and 12th of April. The Settlement of the Mangalore Taluk was made by the Head Assistant Collector, Mr. Webster, between the 30th of March and 6th of April. The several places at which the Settlement was respectively made are given in Statement No. 1.

## II. PUTTAHS.

3. The total number of Puttahs for the year was 37,114. Of these, 1,576 Puttahs were

issued partly for Hosagame land newly taken up for cultivation, and partly in substitution or renewal of those that had been lost or mislaid by the Ryots. The number of Puttahs in which alterations were required in consequence of changes made in the Jummahbundy, or in consequence of permanent remissions ordered to be excluded from the accounts in Board's Miscellaneous Circular, No. LXXIV of 1864, having to be struck off in each Puttah (which could not be done last year owing to the late date at which the said Circular was received) was 1266; while the number of Puttahs in which no alteration at all was necessary was 34,272.

III. SEASON.

4. The rain-fall during the Fusly is shown in the following Statement, and exhibits a de-

crease of Inches 37.97 below the quantity which fell in the preceding year.

The monsoon was favorable at the time of the cultivation of the first Rice crop; but subsequently, and as the crops grew up, the rain was insufficient and partial, and later on in the season the supply was altogether inadequate. Hence the crops did not altogether thrive, and the out-turn was on the whole considerably below the average; on the Byle and Majal lands, the crops may, however, be said to have yielded fairly, but those on the Bettu, or dry lands, suffered from the very beginning from want of rain, and the loss on these may be said to be greater by half than what was experienced in last year.

5. The second and third Rice crops likewise suffered from the insufficiency of rain, and the yield from these was small. The garden crops, such as cocoanut, areca, pepper, &c., likewise suffered partially from the unfavorable season, and the produce of these was consequently somewhat deficient.

IV. SANITARY CONDITION.

6. The public health was by no means good. Cholera and Small-pox were unusually

prevalent, and the former disease was, during the months of October and November, very severe in the Taluks of Mangalore and Cassergode.

7. Amongst cattle there was also much sickness, and the marginal Statement shows an increase of 623 deaths over those which occurred in the preceding year, and which was

considered a very unhealthy one for cattle. In the Uppinangadi and Mangalore Taluks the cattle suffered chiefly from the prevalence of murrain, and which disease is said to have been introduced from above the Ghauts. Besides the mortality from murrain, there was also some loss from want of sufficient pasture, caused by the insufficient fall of rain during the year amongst other causes; there can be no doubt that the mortality amongst cattle during the past two seasons has had a considerable effect in raising the prices, and in this way the Ryots have suffered considerable losses.

No. LXVI of 1865, I abstain from offering any observations on the operations of the Vaccine Department. As already observed however, Small-pox has been unusually prevalent, and it is earnestly to be hoped that the re-modelling of the Department, which has lately taken place, may conduce much to the spread of Vaccination. I am glad to be able to state that the people seem really, to be becoming alive to the value of the operation, and since the former vaccinators were abolished I have had two applications from two different Taluks, urgently requesting that vaccinators might be sent.

9. The wholesale prices of all agricultural products are shown in the subjoined Statement:—

The exports of Rice (the principal staple of this District) during the year under report were considerably smaller than in the preceding year, as will be seen hereafter. Nevertheless, its price has not fallen, but on the contrary has slightly increased over that which obtained in the preceding Fasli. The Rice, as it is, is however attributable partly to the partial failure of the rice crops, and partly also owing to a smaller quantity of grain having been imported from above the Ghats consequent on the prevalence of Cholera and Small-pox in the District. It may also, in some measure, be attributed to the Ryots having, as usual, held back from the market a portion of their produce in expectation of realizing higher prices during the next season. Compared with the standard commutation rates of the District, the increase in the prices of Rice which obtained during the Fusly, amounts to 220 per cent.; while contrasted with the

average prices of the ten years immediately preceding Fusly 1273, the increase is still seventy-three per cent. It is thus evident that during the last twelve years thelprices received by the Ryots have been uninterruptedly remunerative, and the condition of the agricultural classes has been, therefore, prosperous. The increase in the rate of wages, caused by the demand for labour in the Coffee Estates above the Ghauts, and also the great rise which has taken place in the price of agricultural stock, have, to a certain extent, reduced these profits; but on the whole, the state of the agricultural, as also of the labouring classes, may be said to be satisfactory.

10. The subjoined Statement shows the retail prices of the principal articles of agricultural produce during the Fusly, and does not appear to call for remark.

From this it will be seen that the export trade in Rice again shows a very large falling off to the extent of 2,20,999 Indian Maunds, this is to be attributed in a great measure to the ports, which were formerly supplied with that commodity from this District, now receiving their supplies from Bengal and other places by means of the numerous steamers now sailing regularly between Calcutta and Bombay; but I have been given to understand that the decrease has beeen also caused, and to a considerable extent, by the frauds resorted to by the merchants and shippers at this port, and who not only give short measure, but strive to make up the deficiency in quantity by wetting the heaps of Rice. The markets in Malabar, formerly supplied from this District, it is also understood, now derive a portion of their supply by rail from the eastward.

Compared with the quantity exported last year, the exports for the year under report show a net decrease of Cwts. 18,672. The decrease, however, is not attributable to any real falling off in the trade, but to the Coffee Plantations above the Ghats having generally yielded a scanty crop during the last season, and partly to a portion of the produce of the Mysore country, which hitherto used to be brought to this port for shipment, having probably found its way to Magras by the Bangaloge Railway.

### VI. PERMANENT REMISSIONS.

13. In addition to the large amount struck off under this head in the last year's accounts,

in accordance with the Board's instructions contained in their Miscellaneous Circular, No. LXXIV., dated 13th July 1864, a further sum of Rupees 44-8-10 was remitted this year, being the assessment on certain lands taken up by Government for public purposes, and already paid for under the Government sanction, dated 14th July 1860, No. 1,164, Revenue Department, and Board's Proceedings, dated 30th August 1864, No. 5,609, respectively.

The increase in the cultivation is also due to the Ryots having cultivated some more Kumery this year on account of "Shamil," availing themselves of the infulgence granted to them in Board's Proceedings, dated 21st July 1863, No. 4,495. The decrease in the Jummahbundy is owing to further deductions having been allowed to the Ryots in the year under report on account of "Kumeri Shamil," in addition to the usual deductions allowed on account of "Kumeri Shist." The cases in which Kumeri crops were confiscated and sold were very few and call for no remark.

The decrease in the extent of land actually liable to assessment, notwithstanding that there is an increase in the gross cultivation, is owing to a large extent of land having been exempted from assessment as Kumak land than was done in the previous year. The decrease in this item is attributable to deficient produce, and also to the sale proceeds of the trees growing on hills, &c., being credited to Forest Revenue under the present system.

(6) Item No 24.—Land cultivated, but not included in the Settlement.

During the year under report, 277 Durkhasts, representing an assessment of Rupees 913-13-5, were received and disposed of, and the amount was at once included in the Jummahbundy. Independently of this, out of the last year's Shevey Jumma, Rupees 294-7-6 were

transferred to Land Revenue, leaving a balance of Rupces 2,936-10-10, to which Rupces 1,705-5-8, the assessment of land newly taken up during the year, being added, the total Shevoy Jumma for the Fusly amounts to Rupces 4,6-2-0-6, which, compared with the similar amount for the previous year, gives an increase of Rupces 1,310-14-2, as shown in the margin. This would seem to show that the Ryots having received very high prices for their agricultural produce for the last twelve years are now well able to bear the necessary expenses required in extending their cultivation. Hence the numerous applications for new land.

(7.) Item No. 2.-Exce s collections over the Demand.

The increase under this head is owing to a portion of the produce of a certain Estate in the Udipi Taluk, which was hitherto held in deposit in consequence of the proprietary right of the said Estate being in dispute, having been credited in favor of Government in this

Fusly, in payment of the assessment due thereon, the proprietary right of the said estate having ultimately been determined to be vested in Government.

The decrease in this item is owing to the collections from this source having been discontinued during the Fusly, under the Orders of Government.

16. There is, on the whole, a net decrease of Rupees 1,509 in the collections, on account of Forest Revenue in the year under report, which is chiefly attributable to the falling off in items Nos. 2 and 6. The decrease in Item No. 2 is owing to some timber and bamboos having been felled by the Forest Department and sold on account of Government, under which head (item No. 1) there is an increase of Rupees 1,370. There is at present in store a large quantity of timber felled by the Department, and had it been sold during the year under report, the collections under the above item would have been much higher. As there is a considerable quantity of private timber in store in the market, there is no great demand for Government timber, and unless the private stock is exhausted, the early disposal of the former cannot be expected. The increase in item No. 4 is attributable to a part of the amount of the rent for 1865 having been paid in advance in the year under report. The decrease appearing under item No. 6,

comprises the amount of loss sustained by the re-sale of the Catechu Farm, and which was ordered by the Board, in their Proceedings of the 8th July 1865, No. 3,854, to be remitted to the former contractor.

The imports of Jaggery from above the Ghats were however somewhat larger, and there is therefore an increase in the exports by sea of that

article. There was no difference in the prices of Jaggery; but in the retail sales it was sold at 50 Rupees per Candy in this year against Rupees 48, the rate which prevailed in the previous Fasi.

The decrease of Rupees 1,411, which appears in the aggregate in the above Statement, appertains chiefly to Miscellaneous Items, as under Ryotwar Revenue, it will be seen there is an increase of Rupees 4,442. The circumstances which have caused a decrease of Rupees 5,854 in Miscellaneous Items have already been explained above in connection with each item. With regard to the increase in Ryotwar Revenue, it is composed chiefly of the following sums: Rupees 1,848, the assessment of Wurgs which have paid higher rates of assessment during the year, according to the stipulations of the cowle, and of others which have been newly included in the Jumahbundy; Rupees 1,018, the assessment of some lands which were hitherto included in items Nose 3 and 9 of "temporary remissions," and which was this year brought to account, the lands having been brought under cultivation; and Rupees 1,454, the assessment on lands hitherto considered as deficient in extent, and which have now been found on inquiry to be capable of bearing the assessment.

Although there is a decrease in the sales, to the extent of Rupees 27,703, as compared with the preceding year, yet the sales are nearly equal to those of Fusly 1272. The decrease of Rupees 5,818 in inland sales is owing partly to there having been no salt in store in the Cassergode Taluk, and also to the prevalence of murrain above the Ghats; it may also in some measure be attributed to the falling off in the coffee crop. As regards the decrease in Home consumption, which amounts to Rupees 21,885, it must be borne in mind that for some months of the year there was no salt in store in some of the depots of the Cassergode Taluk, in consequence of which the people were obliged to resort to the neighbouring District of Malabar, from which cause alone there was a decrease of Rupees 9,624 in the sales of that Taluk, while in the remaining parts of the District also there was a considerable decrease in the sales, owing to the prevalence of Cholera and Small-pox in the District, in consequence of which the people did not resort to the Cotaurs to buy salt in the usual numbers. Under the head of Miscellaneous items also there is a decrease of Rupees 569-10-11, which is owing to a smaller quantity of salt having been sent to the inland depots at Buntwal and Pane-Mangalore, and consequently to a smaller amount of wastage, &c., having occurred.

The net decrease of Rupees 12,086 under this head is owing chiefly to the falling off in the exports of Rice, in consequence of the markets to which this produce was usually taken having been supplied with the article from Bengal and Salem at a cheaper rate, and to there having consequently been a decrease in the export duty.

The increase of Rupees 3,141, which appears under Sundry articles, is owing to the duty of three per cont. charged on exports of Coffee since April last. After deducting the decrease in the Import duty on French Wines, as also in some other articles imported from Ceylon, there is a net increase of Rupees 3,141 under sundry articles, as shown above.

22. The amount of arrears at the beginning of the Fusly was Rupees 4,411. Of this, Rupees 3,985-4-6 were collected within the year, and Rupees 298-10-3 remitted under the Orders of Government, dated 17th May 1865, No. 1,005, communicated with the Board's Proceedings, dated 15th June, No. 66, leaving a balance of Rupees 127-4-3, of which Rupees 21-8-1 are recoverable, and will be shortly collected. The remainder, Rupees 105-12-2, being irrecoverable, I request the sanction of Government for writing off, and for the reasons given below:—

Rupees 33 5 6. This is the amount of ground-rent charged in three cases in the Udipi

Taluk for Fusly 1273, in two of which the tax has been found to be
excessive, and in which also the parties have been taxed for a portion of
ground not actually in their occupation. The excess charge, as well as the
portion of assessment on unoccupied land in these cases is, therefore, recommended for remission. In the other case, the building on which the tax was
imposed has been abandoned by the occupant, and has since become a ruin.

Rupees 19 2 2. Is the assessment due on seven pieces of ground purchased from the owner, for the Military Cantonment at Bolur, in the Mangalore Taluk. This land was in the possession of Government until its sale by public auction, under the Order of Government, dated 16th August 1862, No. 1,741. The assessment on these grounds has been totally remitted during the Jummahbundy of the present Fusly, and sanction is therefore only asked for that of Fusly 1273.

Rupees 48 12 0. Is the assessment due on a certain Inam land in the Mangalore Taluk for Fusly 1273, and which was hitherto paid by the party holding the Inam out of the Inam allowance received by him from Government. The party having died lately, and the matter of the said Inam having been referred to the Inam Commissioner for disposal, there are no means available at present for collecting the Government assessment. Recommendation was, therefore, made in last year's Report for striking off the assessment of Fuslis 1267 to 1272, and, in accordance with the sanction accorded by Government in their Proceedings of 12th May 1865, No. 1,005, Rupees 257-8-0 have been struck off in the accounts of the present year. Similar sanction is now requested for the assessment of Fasli 1273. The amount of the allowance attached to the above Inam is in deposit since the demise of the late incumbent, and, in case it is decided that the Inam should be continued to the present claimants, the whole amount due on the land can be collected hereafter.

R upces 0 10 6. This is ground tax due for Fusly 1273 by a certain individual in the Mangalore
Taluk, who has been, by an oversight, twice charged with the sum during the
Jummahbundy.

XVI. WASTAGE OF SALT.

23. There is a decrease in the wastage of Salt, in the year under report, of Indian Maunds 2,508-31-60, or a per centage of 169 on the quantity stored, viz., Indian Maunds 3,89,813 against 207 on 4,38,280 Indian Maunds, the quantity stored in the previous

year. This satisfactory result is owing to the excellent supervision of the Department by the Deputy Collector, Mr. Ball, and to the practice instituted by him of charging the value of all undue wastage in the Coturs to the salt servants, and to the Contractors if the same occurs in the transit of the salt. Under the head of "Salaries of Collector" there is an increase of Rupees 17,130 last year, the Acting Collector, Mr. Morris, was in receipt of Deputation Allowance only, and Rupees 4,023 was, therefore, only charged to the

grant and the prescribed services not having been performed for a period of twelve years. Sanction is, therefore, requested with reference to the Board's Circular Order, dated 7th December 1854, for permanently deducting this amount from the total amount payable on account of the Tusdiks of this District.

XXI. EXAMINATION OF TALUK AND VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.

28. These accounts were examined during the Jummahbundy by Mr. Morris and Mr.

Webster, and a number of them have, since I joined the District, been examined by the Scrishtadar. They have, I believe, been found on the whole to be well kept; but from the specimens I have seen, there is much room for improvement, particularly in the orthography.

- 29. In the Huzur, the accounts are generally kept with great care and accuracy, and I can safely add my testimony to that given by Mr. Morris last year, as to the indefatigable zeal and attention paid by Mr. Fernandez, the Deputy Collector, to his important duties. The amount of work now thrown on that Officer, and the great addition lately made thereto by the Registration and Currency Departments, renders his Office any thing but a sinecure.
- XXII. CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATE OFFICERS. 30. My connection with the District being but recent, I purposely forbear from making any remarks on the conduct of the other subordinate Officers.

## SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

## MALABAR.

1. I have the honor to submit the Annual Report on the Settlement of the Land and Sundry Sources of Revenue of this District for Fasli 1274, A. D. 1864-65, accompanied by the usual Statements Nos. 1 to 19.

Villages at which the Settlement was made.

2. Statement No. I shows the Officers by whom, and the places at which, the Settlement

was made. The several Taluks were settled within their respective limits.

Variation in the number and tenure of Villages, with remarks on the number of Puttahs not renewed,

 No changes have taken place in the number or tenure of villages.

The total number of Puttals amounts to 2,08,337. Of these, only 4,373 were renewed in consequence of alterations in actual holdings arising from sales and lands newly taken up, &c.

Season and Sanitary State of the District.

4. The season was not propiticus for agricultural operations. The south-west mon-

agricultural operations. The south-west monsoon commenced about the end of May. The total quantity of rain was over the average, and exceeded that of the previous year by about five inches, as will be seen by the appended Statement; but the falls of rain though abundant during the earlier period of the monsoon were so deficient later in the season that in some portions of the District there was actual drought. This affected the second or Magarom crop reaped in January, which yielded only about half the average return:—

5. During several months of the year under report cholera, raged to an alarming extent throughout the District. It was prevalent during the months of August, September, and October 1864; but its ravages in April, May, and June 1865 were terrible, and these were not confined to, or even as might have been expected more marked in, the crowded lanes and streets of towns. The inhabitants of the scattered separate cottages, with apparently every advantage of air and situation, suffered as severely as those of the cities.

Large quantities of medicines were distributed, and it is hoped that many cures were affected; yet the mortality, according to our somewhat imperfect returns, bears a proportion of seventy-eighty per cent. to the number of persons attacked with the disease. Small-pox prevailed to a less extent than in the previous year; but cases of fever and diarrhoea were numerous, especially in south-west Wynaad and the tracts in the northern Taluks bordering the hill ranges.

In south-east Wynaad there was much less fever than in the previous year :-

The rise in the price of first sort, and the fall in that of second sort Paddy, are chiefly attributable to short produce with respect to the one, and injury to the quality of the grain with respect to the other, occasioned by the drought above-mentioned in paragraph 4.

Ryots' Holdings.

7. One thousand two hundred and nine

Acres of land newly taken up, bearing an assessment of Rupees 2,485, have been included in the Ryots' holdings this year. No lands were relinquished.

Actual Cultivation.

8. The assessed cultivation of this District consists of Punjah (dry) Nunjah (wet) and Bagayet (garden)!

Waste charged and remitted.

11. During the past year, 1,209 Acres of waste land were assessed to a revenue of ...

Rupees 2,485. On the other hand, Rupees 1,314 were remitted on account of lands not brought under the plough from causes beyond the control of the holders.

12. The extent of waste lands taken up on Kowle for wet cultivation was 564 Acres, and for gardens 922 Acres. 164 Kowles were issued for the former, and 143 for the latter.

The revenue hereafter derivable from rice lands may be estimated at about 909 Rupees; but the amount of assessment on gardens carnot under the present system be computed until the trees come into bearing.

Particulars of Remissions.

13. Statement No. 4 exhibits the remissions granted on account of cultivation and gardens, amounting to Rupees 16,279 against Rupees 9,224 in the preceding year. This increase · is solely owing to the unfavorable character of the season after the cessation of the south-east monsoon having called for larger remissions than were necessary in Fusly 1273.

Extent of land cultivated with Special Products, as Sugarcane, Cotton, and Indigo.

14. The cultivation of special products is only carried on to a very small extent in backyards of dwellings, &c., and is not taxed.

The experiments in Cotton-sowing have not generally proved successful; but this is reported on separately.

Abstract Statement showing the general result of Land Revenue Settlement.

15. The general result of the Land Revenue Settlement, as compared with that of the

preceding year, exhibits a net increase of Rupees 32,261 as below :-

Sundry Sources of Revenue,

16. The revenue derived from Sundry Sources, amounted, it will be seen by Statement

No. 10, to Rupees 15,60,887, being a net increase of Rupees 1,14,708 as contrasted with that of Fusly 1273. The causes of variations under each head are as follows :-

Abkarri.

17. In this "item there has been an advance of Rupees 23,751, arising from the farms

generally having realized better rents. Nearly one-half of this increase is due to the farm of Wynaad having fetched the high sum of Rupees 27,510 against. Rupees 16,080 of the previous year owing to increased competition.

& The excess of Rupees 66,066 in this branch of revenue is chiefly ascribable to enhanced sales induced by the introduction of the discount system authorized by the Board in their Proceedings of the 6th September 1863, No. 5,580.

19. The salt purchased exceeded that of the previous year by 39,622 Indian Maunds.

Of the quantity purchased, 1,33,079 Indian Maunds were received from, and the price of the same adjusted at, Madras under the Board's Orders noted, the transit charges alone being debited in my accounts.

The remaining 3,71,730 Indian Maunds were obtained on contract from Bombay at prices averaging Rupees 58-1-0 per grace.

The per centage which the charges (Rupres 3,31,484) bear to the gross collections (Rupees 7.82.731) is 42 Rupees.

20. This head exhibits a deficit of Ru-Sea Customs. pees 17,252, solely due to a falling off in the exportation of cocoanut oil occasioned by low quotations for this article in the European markets.

The total charges bear a proportion of sixteen per cent. to the gross collections.

Frontier Duty.

The increase of Rupees 832 in this . item is attributable to a larger quantity of liquor having been imported from the French Settlement of Mahé than in the previous year.

22. Under this head there has been an Stamps. increase of Rupees 38,699, arising from enhanced sales, caused partly by increased litigation, partly by extending mercantile transactions, and partly by the introduction of the discount system, which, though in force for only three months of the year under notice promises, satisfactory results.

The per centage which the charges bear to the gross collection is five per cent.

Income Tax.

23. The increase of Rupees 2,606 under this head is mainly owing to fresh assessments imposed during the year.

By enclosure No. 18 it will be seen that the demand at the commencement of the year amounted to Rupees 1,04,139 inclusive of arrears. Of this sum, Rupees 82,626 were collected during the year, and Rupees 438 written off as remission, under the Board's sanction, dated 21st June and 15th December 1864, leaving Rupees Nos. 3,828 and 8,042 respectively. 21,075 outstanding at the close of the year. Of this sum, Rupees 3,478 were realized up to 31st July 1865.

Coercive process was employed in the collection of the tax in two cases only for the recovery of arrears amounting to Rupees 49.

24. On the whole, the result of the Re-Abstract showing the Revenue from both Land and Sunvenue Administration of this District for Fusly dry Sources in comparison with the preceding Fusly. 1274 as compared with that for 1273, is an increase of Rupees 1,46,964 as shown below.

It will appear from this Statement that the outstanding balance at the end of the year under report was reduced by subsequent collections to Rupees 50,688. Of this, Rupees 20,134 are on account of Coffee Tax remaining uncollected, owing mainly to temporary absence of the planters; Rupees 17,235 on account of Income Tax; Rupees 5,000 stand against the Rajah of Cannanore, whose last instalment of Peshkush will according to Treaty become due only in September, and Rupees 8,319 are outstanding against sundry Ryots, principally of the Ponani Taluk, who were prevented from paying their revenue duly, owing to losses sustained by failure of crops.

Stringent orders have been issued for the early collection of these balances.

I may observe, that out of Rupees 1,448-0-10, recommended for remission on account of arrears of Land Revenue, Rupees 1,374 are over-assessments on certain Coffee Estates in Wynaad, the extents of which were on a re-survey found to be less than those ascertained by the first survey, according to which the original assessments were fixed.

The amount standing against "Abkarry" is the balance due by the renter of Wynaad, and I recommend its remission in consideration of the actual loss sustained by the renter during the term\* of his lease by the closing up of the shops at Nedduvattam and Pykara on the transfer of that locality to Coimbatore in Fusly 1271.

Extent to which Coercive Process was employed in the collection of revenue.

28. It was not found necessary to resort to compulsory measures for the recovery of revenue, except in the two cases noticed under the head "Income Tax" in paragraph 23.

Charges. 29. Statement No. 14 exhibits the revenue charges incurred during the year under review. They amounted to Rupees 6,69,558, and were Rupees 1,38,061 in excess of those of Fusly 1273. This is chiefly owing to the charges attending the transit of salt from Madras in both Fuslies 1273 and 1274 having been adjusted in the latter year's account.

The per centage which the total charges bear to the gross collections (Rupees 34,22,202) is 20 Rupees.

Working of the new System of Village and Taluk Accounts.

So far as they are applicable to and have been introduced in this District, were examined during the Jummahbundy, and found to Calicut, Ernad, Wallavanaad, Palghat, Ponani, Cochin, and Wynaad.

30. The Village and Taluk accounts, so far as they are applicable to and have been kept satisfactorily in the Taluks noted.

In the Taluks forming the Sub-division some of the Village accounts are reported not to be kept as required. The Sub-Collector has been requested to issue such orders as will ensure all the accounts being duly written up, and to make examples of such of the village servants as are remiss in performing this duty.

The new forms of accounts to be kept in the English department of my Office, received with

not yet been introduced, pending the receipt of the revised forms of the Treasury account with which the former should be made to correspond.

- 8. Sickness and mortality prevailed to a frightful extent. Cholera this year having taken the place of small-pox last year. Nearly two thousand persons succumbed to this dreadful scourge during the Fusly under review, and is still, I regret to say, sweeping away hundreds. The victims of fever have also been very numerous.
- 9. I have supplied medicines through the Zillah Surgeon to all the Taluks, and much relief has been afforded thereby; but demands for more are very pressing and numerous, and as such large quantities as are required cannot be supplied from the stores at the command of the Zillah Surgeon, application to Government for a special supply of fever and cholera medicines has been made.
  - 10. I consider it advisable that supplies of these medicines should be indented for yearly by the Taluk Magistrates for distribution at cost price, and that printed directions as to the use of them should be supplied with them.
  - 11. The annexed Statement shows the numbers of persons attacked, and of those who died of Cholera and Small-pox only:—

- 12. The new Vaccine Department will, it is to be hoped, be able to check effectually the ravages of Small-pox.
- 13. The price of grain has risen very high. Paddy was sold in Fusly 1273 at Rupees 230.9-11 per garce, but rose during the Fusly under review to Rupees 244-6-10.
  - 14. No lands were given up during the year.
  - 15. The items, waste charged, and remitted, are so small as not to need any comment.
  - 16. No Indigo is grown in this Sub-division.
- 17. The experiments with cotton have not been successful. The varieties of seeds received from Madras were distributed among different Ryots, and though the plants, where the seeds germinated, graw luxuriantly, the out-turn was insignificant and bad in quality. A small piece of ground attached to the Cutcheri was sown with varieties, which all grew well, but just as the bolls were beginning to ripen, they were attacked by an insect which eat into the centre, and entirely spoilt the cotton.
  - 18. The Sugar-cane cultivation in these Taluks is so small as to call for no comment.
  - 19. The following is the result of the Settlement of the Land Revenue for Fusly 1274 :-

There is a difference of Rupees 22-4-1 between the amount above shown and that shown as the total demand in the Goshpara accounts sent to the Huzur. The item is the demand for the current Fusly as Shistom on the Kotta Stalom, and has been struck out under the instructions conveyed in the Collector's letter, No. 1,901 of the 29th June 1865.

25. There are three items, Rupees 74-2-0, Rupees 4-11-7, and Rupees 30-8-6, which have been credited in the Taluk accounts, and which require explanation. The first is the amount of two years' assessment or certain land in the Tiruparangotur Amshom, which was ordered to be made good by the Menon of that Amshom as a punishment for his great carelessness in omitting to have the lands assessed to revenue in Fuslies 1272 and 1273. The second is Sevoy Jummah, of which the particulars are given below:—

and the last is interest on arrears.

- 26. Of the total demand of Fusly 1274, there is an outstanding balance of Rupees 5,003-8-11, which has not been collected, of which Rupees 5,000-0-11 due by Ali Raja will be collected as usual in August or September, and Rupees 3-8-0 due by Mrs. West for quit-rent of a bungalow at Cannanore, which is being collected by the Collector of Coimbatore. The sum of Hapees 15-14-10 is the old balance of Shistom for Fusly 1273 on the Kottastaloom, permission to strike out this item has been asked for.
- 27. The charges of administration amounted to Rupees 73,733-13, being about twelve and a quarter per cent. on the revenue.
- 28. No landed property was acquired by any of the public servants in the Sub-division during the year under review.
- 29. With regard to the Village and Taluk accounts, I consider that there is room for improvement. I carefully examined all the accounts kept, and find that as regards the Amshoms only four accounts are kept, Nos. 3, 10, 11, and 12. The first of these is a dead letter; for as long as the Menons can make up their monthly remittances to send to the Taluk, they do not take the trouble of collecting from each Puttahdar only the amount of kist strictly due by him for each month. Very few Puttahdars pay as many kists as are supposed to be collected. The majority prefer to pay in one, two, or four lump sums. This saves the Menon much walking about and the tax-payers repeated calls for small instalments. In Cherrakal there are seven kists, but in Kottayam and Karumbranad there are eight of different proportions. By reducing this number to four equal ones, to be collected in December, January, February, and March, much Telief would be afforded to the Amshom officials, and the change would be generally approved of.
  - 30. Accounts Nos. 10, 11, and 12 are correctly kept.
- 31. There are several other accounts, which according to the Manual should be submitted from the villages monthly, but such is not the practice. Accounts Nos. 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19 are sent in annually at the end of the Fusly to the Taluks, and 21 and 22 quinquennially

- 32. On every hand I heard bitter complaints of the insufficiency of the paper the Amshom officials, particularly of the peons whose case is well worthy of consideration.
- 33. The Acting Sub-division Serishtadar has been of much assistance to me in spite of his ignorance of English—the knowledge of which language I consider should be a sine quantum in a Sub-division Serishtadar.
  - 34, The Sub-division Tahsildars have all given me general satisfaction.
