Statement No. 9.

60. This Statement shows the Collection of all sources of Revenue current and arrears, as The decrease in the Collection of arrears is due

The balance remaining in store at the close of the year was Indian Maunds 12,92,010. There was neither export nor import of salt by sea during the year.

Statement No. 11.

78. In 465 heaps of salt sold by retail, which when stored contained 5,51,652 Indian

Maunds, there was found a decrease or wastage of 32,033 Indian Maunds, for writing off which, sanction is requested, being about 53 per cent.

79. A Statement in the form which accompanied the Board's Circular Memorandum, No. 689, dated 30th June last, showing the Talookwar particulars of the demand and collections of lands and other sources of revenue, is herewith submitted.

Village Accounts,

80. In all the talooks of the district, the Settling Officers personally examined the accounts

and noticed errors and marked carelessness by fine and dismissal. In some talooks, printed forms were not supplied for all Village Accounts and as the District Press is heavily worked and has a very insufficient supply of type, I have availed myself of the Board's orders to send the forms to be printed in the Penitentiary Press.

Lands acquired by Public Servants.

81. A Statement giving full information on this subject, is herewith submitted.

The officers in this district have all been

repeatedly changed in the course of the past year, which is disadvantageous for the interests of the district. During the former part of the year the duties of Sherishtadar were conducted by Turga Narsingam with much credit to himself. Subsequently, the permanent incumbent of the post, Dinavahi Parushothamaya Garu, who had been acting as Treasury Deputy Collector for about a year and a half, returned to the office of Sherishtadar. This officer's merits have been frequently brought to the notice of the Board. His duties are most efficiently discharged, and I trust he may before long be confirmed as a Deputy Collector, for which advancement he has been repeatedly recommended.

- B. The season opened prosperously, attended with timely and favorable falls of rain in the beginning, by which Gidda, Jonna in the Guntoor and Krosoor Talooks, and early crops such as Sujja, Korra, &c., in the Division, generally gave a good yield; but the dry Paddy crops (Vellavadam) in the Guntoor and Krosoor Talooks suffered from the subsequent scanty fall of rain. As regards the Bapatla Talook, it is to be observed that the dry paddy crops raised in some parts were lost in consequence of flooding by the surplus water of other villages; the Jonna crop raised in the villages bordering on the Kistna river generally gave a good yield, in other parts failure of rains caused some loss. From the same cause the later crops also suffered except in some low grounds where standing water was available.
- 7. The wet paddy crops raised in the Guntoor and Krosoor Talooks dependant on tank irrigation suffered to some extent, as the supply of water received into the tanks was insufficient for the cultivation, and in some coast villages of Bapatla Talook the wet Paddy crop suffered partly from failure of rains and partly through being flooded by the surplus water from the low ground known as "vada."
- 8. This year the freshes in the Kistna were unusually high, and in consequence, some villages in Guntoor and Krosoor Talooks were inundated, fortunately unattended with loss of life, although a few houses were swept away. As a set off to this injury, the villages have benefitted by the deposit of alluvial soil left by the freshes.
- 9. The public health suffered from small-pox and fever, while murrain and other diseases prevailed amongst live stock.
- 10. Statement No. 2 will show that the prices of grains in the year under review do not exhibit any marked difference from that of last year except in Paddy and Cholum, the price of the former rose in sequence of a large exportation, while that of Cholum fell.

11. From the marginal Statement, it appears that there is an increase in cultivation of Acres 997-22, and a decrease of Rupees 21,906-7-0 in the assessment. This result is due to the relinquishment of a considerable extent of wet land and to the taking up of a much larger extent of dry land than in the preceding year. Of the Acres 15,890-23 entered as relinquished, Acres 2,597-26 were properly transfers, the absolute relinquishments amounting to Acres 13,292-37, assessed at Rupees 47,104-3-0 to balance which, there were taken up Acres 18,139-7, assessed at Rupees 38,178-1-8. Thus the total Land Revenue demand for the current Fusly was (Enclosure A), Rupees 11,86,967-8-3.

it will be seen that Cotton is cultivated chiefly in the Krosoor and Guntoor Talooks, and to a small extent in Bapatla Talook; the total area occupied under this product was Acres 77,285-8, assessed at Rs. 1,24,532-11-3, or an increase of Acres 2,475-8 in land, and of Rupees 3,929-11-3 in the assessment on the figures of the preceding year. This is attributable to the increased demand for this article.

- 25. Of the unadjusted balance classed as doubtful, a portion appertains to Inams requiring settlement by the Inam Commissioner. As regards the remainder, measures will be taken for its speedy disposal. Rupees 1,679-14-7 were ordered to be collected and Rupees 8,145-8-6 have been recommended to be written off as irrecoverable.
- 26. The accounts of a selected number of the villages in the three talooks of the Sub-Division were examined, among which, those of the village of Ipurupollum were found to be defective, indeed almost all the accounts both for the fusly under review and for the one before were not prepared by the Curnums, owing to dissensions among them; after inquiry into the manner of preparing the

accounts, my predecessor to make an example, dismissed the three Curnums of that village from office: at the same time peremptory instructions were issued for the future guidance of Curnums.

I. Rupees 63,206-13-1 were recommended for remission on account of Shavi in the last Jummahbandy Report. Rupees 224-8-5 have since been collected, the requisite sanction to write it off not having been as yet received, the remainder, viz., Rupees 62,981-5-8, is entered in the above memorandum as irrecoverable.

17th.—In the village of Inukurte, in the Rapur Talook, a tank was made over to the ryots under the ruined Tank Rules. In Fusly 1277 the land was left waste as the tank was not repaired, and the assessment was charged. The ryots having given up the tank, the amount charged in 1277, viz., Rupees 78-2-0, is entered as irrecoverable.

18th.—Certain Garden lands in Marupur, in the Rapur Talook, having been transferred to the head of Dry. sanction is requested to write off the difference between Dry and Garden rates, amounting to Rupees 12-9-3.

19th — This is a fixed amount; added to the Pullery-tax in certain villages, carried to account by mistake, although the Pullery-tax has been abolished.

20th.—Parts of certain fields in Kottapalle and Tatiparte, in the Atmakur Talook, having been struck off the puttah as unfit for cultivation, the assessment thereon, amounting to Rupees 79-12-11, is recommended for remission,

21st.—This is the assessment entered on land struck off the puttah as being tank bed, in the village of Panchedu, in the Nellore Talook.

22nd—The sum of Rupees 3-8-5, due by certain ryots of Padarte, in the Ongole Talook, is recommended for remission on the ground that the Puttahdars have absconded, leaving the land waste.

2. The grounds upon which my recommendation to write off the irrecoverable arrears of Land Revenue having been thus explained, I beg to annex a memorandum showing the Fasliwar details thereof.

owing to the pay of the Ongole Tahsildar not having been disbursed during the greater portion of Fusly 1277, while the increase under the Salt Establishment is attributable to the entertainment of a special establishment for guarding spontaneous salt in the Pulicat Lake, and the vacancy of Salt Superintendentship of Gogulapalli in 1277.

The large decrease of Rupees 7,402, under the head of "Purchase of Salt and Manufacturer's share," is accounted for by the Deputy Collector as resulting from the bulk of the salt having been stored in June and July.

Working of the new system of Village Accounts.

28. The Village Accounts have been duly prepared in the prescribed forms.

Land acquired by public servants.

29. Revur Ramakistnamma, who was appointed Gumastah of the Rapur Talook in Fusly

1278, holds 4.15 acres of Inam land in the village of Allur, in the Nellore Talook, acquired by his ancestors. The Officiating Inam Commissioner has, with his letter dated 10th August 1869, No. 376, furnished a list showing the public servants in his Office holding lands in this district.

Season.

5. In consequence of the almost complete failure of the north-east monsoon, the past

fusly cannot be said to have been a favorable one, though the abundant supply of rain brought

by the south-west monsoon in the early part of the fusly, and the circumstances of the previous year, kept down the prices of grain of all kinds. In consequence of the want of rain in the months of December, January and February, the dry crops that had been put down in October and November gave a very deficient yield, while the wet crops were almost entirely lost throughout the Sub-Division. The latter, however, are not cultivated to any very great extent in these parts. As regards the south-west monsoon, a reference to the accompanying Table shows that the fall of rain in Fusly 1278 was about half as much again as that in Fusly 1277, while the rain brought by the north-east monsoon during 1278, was but a third of that which fell during the northeast monsoon in 1277. Altogether the rain fall of 1278 seems to be in proportion to that of 1277 as 5 to 6. In the Kandukur Talook taken alone, the difference was as 3 to 4.

8. It will be seen from the following abstract that there was an increase of Acres 9,085

in extent, and Rupees 12,558 in assessment on Ryots' holdings. The increase is solely on dry lands in the Ongole Talook and is in consequence of the ryots having taken up for pasturage on Tarum assessment, a quantity of land formerly held by them on Pullary. On the other hand, there has been a decrease in nunjah holdings in all the talooks owing to relinquishments in consequence of the failure of the latter rains. In the Kanigiri and Kandukur Talooks, there is also a decrease in punjah holdings, but not so large, I think, as to call for explanation.

No remission has been given for dry waste; this generally consists of land reserved for pasturage. As regards partial waste on wet lands, I had adopted 10 acres as the minimum extent for which remission on part waste would be granted, thus acting on Mr. Boswell's letter, No. 592, dated 27th February 1868, but subsequently on the receipt of Mr. Dyke's letter, No. 397, dated 27th February

. 1869, informing me that he had taken 4 acres as his standard, I conformed to Mr. Dyke's instructions. This, however, I could do only in respect of the Ongole and Kanigiri Talooks, for the settlement of the Kandukur Talook had now been almost completed on the principles laid down by the late Acting Collector, but as it appeared to me that the circumstances of five villages of the Kandukur Talook already settled were such as particularly to call for the measure of relief proposed by Mr. Dykes, I recommended to you in my letter dated 3rd July, No. 247, that remission be granted accordingly. In your docket dated 8th July 1869, No. 1,348, you sanctioned the additional remission thus recommended. The increase in the amount of remission on waste as compared with that of last year is entirely due to the failure of the north-east monsoon. The usual remission of Rupees 48 was made on account of the salary of the Moonsiff of Timmanapalem and other villages in conformity with the custom of the Kistna District, for which these villages were transferred. Remission of Rupees 16,131 has been granted for perished crops (shavi) this year. The increase under this head is chiefly in the Kandukur Talook. In the Ongole Talook, a further sum of Rupees 2,954 (including russums and road fund) has to be remitted. This was not entered in the accounts, as delay took place in the receipt of particulars, owing to the absence of the Tahsildar on lease.

Cultivation of special products.

11. The Sugar-cane cultivation which is still confined to the Kanigiri Talook has slightly

decreased. The annexed Statement shows the cultivation of Cotton which is also on a reduced scale this year, in consequence, I am told, of a fall in prices. Indigo cultivation has considerably increased; there is, I am informed, a larger demand than before.

The increase under ryotwar is confined to Ongole Talook only, as stated in paragraph 8 of this report. The decrease in Kandukur and Kanigiri Talook is owing almost entirely to the remission on wet lands given in the Kandukur Talook. The increase under Land Revenue miscellaneous arises from the following items:—

- (1.) Sale of trees on waste lands Rupees 5,589.
- (2.) Rent from pasture lands, let out at auction (instead of on Pullary), Rupees 1,547.
- (3.) Dowl Izafa, Rupees 1,079 and (4) sundry items Rupees 713. The total increase is Rupees 8,928. There is a decrease under the same head which is due to the excess\* in minor

Inams not being charged, this amounts to Rupees 1,232; Balarao Russums, Rupees 606 and other sundry items. The total decrease

the same period having been brought to account this year. The decrease in the Ongole and Kanigiri Talooks for Fusly 1278, chiefly areses from the Road Fund on Inam lands for Fusly 1276 having been brought to account in Fusly 1277.

Demand, Collection and Balance of revenue.

13. The subjoined Statement shows the Demand, Collection and Balance of revenue for

Fusly 1278. The outstanding balance on Ryotwary holdings on 31st July is in excess of that on the same date last year. The increased occupation of land in the Ongole Talook, as well as the comparatively low prices of grains, seem to be the cause. From the balance, a deduction has to be made for remission granted on account of withered crops subsequently to the close of the Jummahbundy. This amounts to Rupees 2,954, and I request sanction to write it off. Orders have been issued to the Tahsildars to take the necessary steps for the speedy collection of the remainder Rupees 258, arrears on Abkarry due by the late renters will be recovered from the money deposited by them, and Rupees 648 arrears on License-tax will be recovered from the defaulters according to the provisions of the Act.

Inspection of Rain-gauges.

21. As directed in the Board's Proceedings, No. 5,642, dated 4th August 1869, I have

occasionally inspected the Rain gauges at the various stations. I regret to say that I have generally found them to be kept with little regard to accuracy in the record of results, and I am inclined to believe that they are, for any scientific purpose, utterly unreliable. For a Jummahbundy Report, where absolute exactness in these matters is not necessary, and where the general account of the rain-fall is as a rule tested by the writer's own observations, the registers are useful enough, for in the long run, errors in excess or defect may be left to rectify each other. However, I am now calling particular attention to this subject, whenever I am out on circuit, and as improved gauges have been lately supplied, I hope the Returns will be correctly prepared in future. But I have little confidence that this will be so, for in accounts of this kind, absolute dependence must be placed on the persons keeping them, and though we might be willing to trust an officer in the position of Tahsildar, the Tahsildar is frequently absent from his Head-quarters when the charge necessarily devolves upon one of his subordinates, who in his turn, deputes a peon to the work.

Absence of Sub-Collector from Sub-Division.

22. I have during the year been absent from the Sub-division on some half dozen occa-

sions. On each of such occasions my visit has invariably been to Nellore on duty, and has never exceeded 3 or 4 days, except when I went in for the Nellore Cattle Show and to take charge of the district during Mr. Dyke's absence at Madras; on the former occasion, I was in Nellore for a fortnight, on the latter, for nearly a month.

Reports on boundary marks,

23. The report from the Ongole Talook has not yet been received notwithstanding

several reminders. It will be submitted hereafter, with the reports from the other talooks.

## SETTLEMENT REPORT

#### BELLARY.

I HAVE the honor to submit my Report on the Settlement of the Revenue of this District Submission of Annual Jummahbundy Report and State. for Fusly 1278, (1868-69,) with the usual Statements.

Places where the settlement was made. 2. Statement No. I shows the places at which, and the names of the officers by whom, the settlement was effected, and the period occupied in the same. The settlement was made at two or more places within the limits of each talook, except in the case of Dhurmaveram and Madakserah in the Sub-division, where, owing to the sickness of the Sheristadar of the former talook and the death of the Tahsildar of the latter talook, it was found convenient to carry it out at the Cusbah stations. The settlement was commenced in November 1868, and completed in May 1869.

Variations in the number and tenure of the Villages.

3. The variations in the number and tenure of the villages are exhibited in subjoined abstract :-

The decrease of the two villages under the head of Shrotriem is in the talook of Madakserah, and is owing to their having been enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner and transferred to the head "Kayem Jody" under which appears a corresponding increase.

4. The total number of puttahs in the district is 1,36,620, which is in excess of the number held in the preceding Fusly by 119; 92,698 fresh puttahs were issued and 8,482 old puttahs modified, leaving 35,440 puttahs unaltered. The enhanced is ue of puttahs is due to the substitution of the new form for the old-Vide Board's Circular Memorandum, dated 3rd

December 1866, No. 1,206. The new receipt books will, I am of opinion, save many a ryot paying his kist twice over, and the introduction of a more durable form of puttah is likewise a great improvement.

Season-

5. The year was more favorable to the district than any in the last decade. Copious and

seasonable rain fell during the year, and the rivers, tanks, and wells generally received a full supply of water. The exceptions occurred principally in the Sub-division, and will be noticed below under the head of Waste remitted. Both the Mungary (early) and Hingary (late) crops gave a good return and compensated the ryots for the loss they sustained in the two preceding years. The following abstract shows an increase of six inches and two-tenths over the rain-fall of Fusly 1277:—

Sanitary condition.

6. Against two deaths from cholera in Fusly 1277 the returns of the year under review

show that 1,488 persons succumbed to this malady. There were fewer cases of fever, but the number of deaths from this cause was no less than 8,845, being in excess of last year's returns by

1,012, as will be seen from the subjoined statement. I think that the prevalence of this disease in this district and its fatal effects ought specially to engage the attention of the Sanitary Commissioner. All classes suffer from it, and hardly any locality is wholly free from it:—

7. The cattle disease, especially that form of it known as "Moosararogam," was very fatal in its effects during the year. Of 3,770 head of cattle attacked no less than 2,199 died. Medicines supplied by Mr. Thacker were widely distributed, and no pains were spared to instruct the ryots in the use of the remedies and the treatment of their animals; but I am inclined to think that in many instances these instructions were neglected, and without some special measures, such as were recommended by me in a separate report being adopted, I am certain that the benevolent intentions of Government have not a chance of being carried out, so ignorant are the ryots of the Ceded Districts, and if not blind to their own interests in many instances so careless of them.

Prices of Grain.

Holdings.

- 8. Owing to the favorable season the prices of grain fell very much indeed, as will be seen from Statement No. 2.
- 9. Statement No. 3 shows the Ryots' holdings, cultivation, and the net beriz of the

Fusly. Enclosure A. of the Statement shows the holdings at the commencement of the Fusly and the subsequent alterations, the waste remitted and charged, and the extent of actual cultivation, exhibiting a net increase over Fusly 1277 of Acres 30,129, and a net decrease in the assessment of Rupees 8,561, or about \$\frac{2}{3}\$ths per cent. on the assessment of Fusly 1277; this is attributable to the land newly taken up bearing a lighter assessment than that relinquished. This, in my opinion, is owing not to the land given up being too highly assessed, but rather to an imperfect classification of the soil, a defect which will be remedied when the operations of the Settlement Department are extended to this district. In the wet lands there was a net decrease of 1,357 Acres, assessed at Rs. 5,106.

10. Under the head Lands relinquished there is a net increase of 20,255 Acres, assessed at Rupees 14,449, in dry land, and a net decrease of 568 Acres, assessed at Rupees 3,591, in the wet lands as shown in the marginal statement. In the talook of Dhurmaveram of the Sub-division a reduction of well land assessment, to the extent of Rupees 33-3-0, was made under the sanction of Government, conveyed in their Order, No. 581, of 6th April 1864, embodied in Board's Proceedings, No. 2,247, of the 13th idem. These cases were disposed of by the Acting Sub-Col-

11. The extent of lands left waste and charged during the year under report was Acres 1,47,618,\* bearing an assessment of Rupees 73,178-5-0. The extent on which the demand was remitted was Acres 12,510,† assessed at Rs. 52,650-4-4.‡ The proportion of the waste to the holdings is about 6 per cent. This remission under the rules of the 1st November 1865, Standing Circular, No. 137, was granted because

of the failure of water supply in some of the tanks situate for the most part in the Sub-division talooks. The remission on account of dry cultivation, amounting to Rupees 93, was granted because, although the lands had not legally passed from the possession of the Puttahdars, there was no hope of realizing the demand; some of the ryots having absconded and others being so reduced in circumstances as to render some indulgence necessary, and for this the sanction of the Board is requested.

12. The amount of waste (wet and dry) charged was Rupees 73,178, or 29,271 more than in the previous Fusly. This charge was made because no sufficient grounds were shown for foregoing the demand of the State.

Actual cultivation. 13. The actual cultivation, exclusive of waste charged and remitted, was, including both wet

and dry, 23,07,734 Acres, assessed at Rupees 19,44,412, which is in excess of the previous year's demand by Rupees 43,805.

14. Enclosure B. in Statement No. 3 exhibits the cultivation of sugar-cane, cotton, and indigo showing an extended area of cultivation under indigo, amounting to 4,263 Acres; cotton fell off to the extent of 79,162 Acres and sugar-cane cultivation shows a decrease of 1,444 Acres. These fluctuations do not admit of any special explanation, and may I think be attributed to the ever-varying state of the market.

Progressive, etc., Cowles.

15. Enclosure C. in Statement No. 3 comprises the items of Progressive, Payamaly, and Kayem cowles showing a net beriz of Rupees 534, or 370 Rupees less than in the previous year. This is attributable to most of the lands having been charged with full rates on the expiry of the cowle leases.

Cultivation:

16. As directedin clause 4, paragraph 4

of the Board's Circular Memorandum, No. 787,
dated 14th August 1866, a comparative statement of cultivation and settlement in the form
therein rescribed is appended below showing a net increase in cultivation of 30,129 Acres, with a

Miscellaneous Items.

19. The Statement No. 4 includes the particulars of remission of all kinds, amounting to Rupees 12,150-11-4. In last year this account shows a remission of Rupees 79,700-8-3, of which Rupees 60,831 and 10,265 were granted in consequence of failure of crops and on lands let on cowle which have been fully charged this year; hence the decrease under this head.

20. Statement No. 5 shows the Demand, etc., on account of Miscellaneous items under

Land Revenue, corresponding with the entries contained in the Demand, Collection, and Balance Statement for June last. A separate Memorandum, explanatory of the nature and particulars of settlement of each item of the statement, accompanies the report.

21. Statement No. 6 shows the Demand, Collection, and Balance of Shrotriem Jody villages enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner. There is an increase in the demand of Rupees 631 over that of the previous year. This is attributable to the enfranchisement during the year of two villages in the Madakserah Talook. There are neither Zemindaries nor Mootahs in this district.

 Of the total balance of Rupees 6,467-8-5 shown in column 6 of the statement Rupees 2,168-12-3 have been since collected, reducing the balance to Rupees 4,298-12-2 at the end of July which will shortly be collected.

22. Statement No. 7 exhibits all sources of Revenue; there is a net decrease of Rupees 2,27,000 below last year, as shown in the following comparative abstract. This, it will be observed, is owing to the falling off in the Abkarry sales. The contract for 1278 was only for one year, and the sale following immediately upon the bad years 1276 and 1277 the bidding was by no means spirited. The decrease, however, is merely nominal, as most of the contractors for the previous years failed and the farms were resold at great loss to Government:—

23. The increase of Rupees 1,73,641, nearly eight per cent on last year's demand of Land Revenue, is chiefly under Ryotwar, and is owing to a larger extent of wet land having been cultivated in consequence of a better water supply. The large decrease under the item of Abkarry has been explained; the falling off of the demand under License Tax is accounted for as follows:—Under Act XXI. of 1867 the rates were higher than under Act IX. of 1868. Under the former Act incomes above Rupees 200 and less than Rupees 500 were liable, whilst under the latter no incomes below Rupees 500 were so. In 1867 all Government servants were assessed rateably, whereas in 1868 a special rate of one per cent. was fixed on official incomes. The decrease under the item of Salt is, it is believed, due to an increased importation of sea salt into the district. The increase in the revenue from Stamps does not seem to call for any special remark.

Comparative collections.

24: As required in paragraph 9 of the Board's Circular Memorandum above referred to a comparative abstract of collections in the prescribed Form B. is given below, exhibiting a net increase of Rupees 2,10,268 over the last year. This is partly due to the increase in the Land Revenue beriz, and to the more punctual collections of kists and arrears as compared with last year:—

The balance due under Land Revenue is made up of the arrears for eight Fuslies. Of this amount Rupees 6,654 are due in the Raidrug Talook for Fusly 1277, and it is known that Mr. Wedderburn, under the special sanction conveyed in the Board's Proceedings, intended to have granted large remissions in this talook, but was prevented doing so owing to the Tahsildar then in charge of the talook having failed to hold any azmaish. Hence the large balance of arrears against this talook, which would certainly not have appeared in the accounts had my predecessor been in a position to grant the remissions specially sanctioned in consequence of the previous disastrous years. The matter not having been disposed of at the settlement of the year in which the balance accrued the only alternative is to include the amount in the list of the irrecoverable balances which has now been done.

30. As directed in paragraph 8 of the Board's Proceedings, dated 7th June 1869, No. 4,345, I have the honor to append an abstract statement showing Fuslywar particulars of arrears remaining unadjusted at the close of the Fusly.

34. I regret to state that the manner in which the Talook and Village accounts are kept is by no means satisfactory. In one village, in the Kudlighi Talook, I found the daily collections account blank for the whole year. In the Hospett Talook, in Statement No. 5, Appendix C., which I examined in April, the balance was not once shown since the settlement. In Alur frauds carried on for a series of years showed that the entries in the cash Chittah had never been verified by the Sheristadar, who had signed his name as a matter of form merely to each day's account, owing to which

the Nagady Goomastah and Shroff succeeded in appropriating some Rupees 3,000 and odd at different times before they were found out. I have done my best to remedy this state of things, and on my departure from the district I doubt not that it will engage the attention of my successor. The early issue of the new Manual is much to be desired, as many of the forms in the old one have been superseded.

I HAVE the honor to forward the Settlement Report for the five Talooks of the Sub-division for Fusly 1278, (1868-69). The settlement was conducted by the late Acting Sub-Collector Mr. Sharp.

2. The subjoined statement shows the stations where Jummahbundy was conducted, the dates on which it was commenced and ended, the number of villages in each talook, and the number of puttahs distributed:—

The settlement was conducted at Cusbah Dhurmaveram only on account of the sickness of the Talook Sheristadar, which rendered it necessary for the Tahsildar to remain at head quarters. Mr. Sharp had previously made arrangements for distributing puttahs at Pairoor and Caliandroog. The necessity of meeting an officer of the Mysore Revenue Survey for the settlement of boundary disputes was the reason why settlement was made in only two places in the Hindoopoor and Pengondah Talooks. The death of the Tahsildar of Madakserah made it impossible for the Sheristadar to leave the Cusbah, and the settlement of the talook was, therefore, conducted at the Cusbah.

3. In the five talooks of the Sub-division there are 710 villages, with 1,048 hamlets. Of these villages 607 are ryotwary, and the remaining 103 are held on permanent quit-rent and Inam tenure. Last Fusly there were 609 ryotwar villages, but in the Fusly under report two shrotriem villages in the Madakserah Talook were enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner, and have been added to the number of villages assessed with permanent quit-rent.
