Cholera made its appearance only at the end of the Fusly, and then only in a few villages of the Anantapoor Talook. Precautionary measures were taken and supplies of medicine distributed.

8. Fever was prevalent throughout the Fusly, as will be seen by the statement I attach. The number of persons attacked and the number of deaths are greater by 1,504 and 194, respectively, than in Fusly 1277. A blank return has been received from Dhurmaveram, but I cannot believe that this is correct. Further inquiries are being made.

The increase in the cultivation, both in wet and dry lands, is chiefly due to the favorable nature of the season.

Causes of the decrease of remission on waste lands.

The remission on dry lands sanctioned last year by the Board of Revenue, in consequence of the unfavorable nature of the season, were discontinued. In Fusly 1277 it was found necessary to grant large remissions for Nunjah and Bagayet lands left waste, but this was not needed in the present Fusly.

Causes for the difference of remission on cultivated lands. The increase of remission under the head of Shamilat Dasavundum is due to the increase of cultivation of lands on which this sort of Dasavundum remission is allowed.

The decrease of Shrotriem remission is the result of the enfranchisement of the two shrotriem villages in the Madakserah Talook where a shrotriem remission was allowed when they were under ryotwar system.

The increase of cultivation of lands on which remission of Kuttoogutta, etc., were allowed is the cause of the increase in the small amount of remission under this head.

Last year remission of 24 Rupees was granted in excess to a Reddy in Dhurmaveram Talook, whose Inam was left waste so as to make up the proper amount of emoluments for his service. It was disallowed this year, his Inam having been cultivated.

The increase of cultivation of cotton and indigo is to be attributed to the better fall of rain. The period between February and May is the suitable season for the sugar-cane cultivation; the insufficiency of water at that time has been the cause of the decrease of the cultivation of sugar-cane, and the low rates offered for jaggery has also tended to produce the same result.

In previous Fusies exorbitant amounts were bid for the farms and the consequence was that the contractors were unable to pay the kists, and the uncollected arrears had to be written off. These years more moderate and safer amounts were bid. The decrease under the head of License Tax is owing to the difference of rates imposed by Act XXI. of 1867, and Act IX. of 1868.

The item of Rupees 3 for Income Tax was collected under Act IX. of 1869, and is a deduction made from a pension in the Anantapoor and Pengondah Talooks for the months of May and June. Collections under this Act are only just commencing, chiefly because copies of the Act have only just been supplied.

Under Salt there is a decrease.

The revenue derived from Stamps always fluctuates to some extent. In this year the prices realised by the sale of crops above the average enabled the ryots to discharge their debts without putting their creditors to the trouble of a Civil suit. In good years there is less litigation and consequently less demand for stamp papers than in less favorable ones.

The decrease under the 2nd and 3rd heads was caused by a failure of the mangoe crop and other fruit-bearing trees; less amounts were, therefore, bid. No explanation is given why the Babool trees sold less.

The increase under the 5th head is partly owing to the increase of cultivation, but chiefly to other causes. The assessment which had been collected on lands which had been irregularly cultivated without filing a proper durkhast Mr. Sharp ordered to be credited to the head of Sevoy

902 Double assessment. 286 Sale proceeds of produce of land-26 Treble assessment, Jummah or Land Revenue, Miscellaneous. As a sort of punishment to the ryots he imposed double rates of assessment on these lands. For this reason the produce of some of these lands was attached and sold. The increase under this head is Rupees 1,214, particularized in the margin.

The decrease under No. 6 head shows that fewer instances of concealed cultivation have been detected.

The entries under No. 9 are necessarily of a fluctuating character. More fines seem to have been imposed in this year.

The increase under No. 13 is owing to Jody being credited under its proper head instead of under Quit-rent on Inams as was the case last year.

The increase under Nos. 14 and 15 is due to the increase of cultivation.

The decrease under No. 16 is caused by the fact that several Bhatwarti Inams have been sold for arrears of revenue in consequence of the failure of the Inamdars to pay quit-rent.

Under head No. 22 is credited the receipt from the sale of Puttah books. None were sold in Fusly 1277.

Rupees 80,585 have still to be collected, and Rupees 7,154 are irrecoverable. Rupees 5,053 of this last sum is the Jody fixed on the Inam of village servants which cannot be collected, the Jody imposed being so heavy. The remaining Rupees 2,101 is irrecoverable from poverty and other causes. In some instances also Mr. Sharp imposed an excessive water tax, and then reduced it, ordering the difference to be entered at Khatla. These items are accordingly included in the account.

Mr. Sharp has left on record opinions favorable to the Anantapoor and Dhurmaveram Tahsildars. Sivaramappa, the Sub-division Sheristadar, has fully maintained the high character he had previously earned, and has been of great use to me in the preparation of this report.

SETTLEMENT REPORT OF BELLARY.

In conclusion, I must apologize for the brevity of this report, and for the crudeness of some of the explanations of which I am fully sensible. But I may remind that it is less than three weeks since I took charge of the Division, and the return is already so long over-due that I am unwilling to keep it back any longer.

SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

CUDDAPAH.

I have the honor to submit with the usual Statements, in the forms received with the Board's Circular Memorandum, No. 825, of the 2nd August 1869, my Annual Report on the Settlement and the collection of the Revenues of this District for Fusly 1278, (A. D. 1868-69).

Villages at which the settlement was made.

2. Statement No. 1 shows the places at which, and the names of the several officers by whom, the Jummahbundy was conducted in each talook. Three talooks were settled by myself and three by the Acting Sub-Collector. The Acting Head Assistant, and the Deputy Collector on general duty, each settled three and two talooks respectively; the places of settlement being more than one in each talook, thereby affording the ryots every facility of access to the Settlement Officer. The Jummahbundy was commenced by me on the 15th January last, and was finished by myself at Voilpaud, in the talook of that name, on the 16th May 1869.

3. In the year under report 1,51,752 puttahs were issued, being 862 puttahs in excess of those issued in Fusly 1277, as shown below. The increase is chiefly owing to the extension of the area of cultivation, and partly to the transfer of lands:—

The former, however, has been incorporated with the Government ayacut since, under the Proceedings of Government, No. 1,814, dated 25th June 1869, communicated with Board's Proceedings, No. 4,864, dated 7th July following.

- 9. The season was, on the whole, a favorable one. Although, as may be seen from the marginal Memorandum, the rain-fall was slightly less than in Fusly 1277, it was more seasonable and enabled the ryots to put down their Mungary crops in May and June, such as sujjalu, aricalu, jonna, corralu, and raggy, etc.
- 10. The out-turn of the Hingary crops of white jonna, cotton, corra, and horse-gram, etc., sown in September and October, was above the average in places where there was sufficient and seasonable rain-fall, but scantier where moisture was deficient in subsequent months. The months of December, January, and February were perfectly dry.
- The out-turn of the irrigated crops was in some instances poor, owing to some of the tanks in the talooks of Budwell, Sidhout, and Pullampet having received but a partial supply.

Rain Register.

12. The accuracy of the rain registers kept in the talooks does not appear to be open to The Tahsildars in most talooks, I think, understand the management of question generally. No opportunity is lost of impressing on them the great importance of accurate the rain gauges. measurement. One Tahsildar returned the rain-fall as five inches instead of five tenths. This mistake was corrected. The instructions conveyed in paragraph 4 of Board's Proceedings, No. 5,642. dated 4th August 1868, will be attended to in the current Fusly, (1279.)

- 13. There were 155 fatal cases of chelera during the Fusly year, but fever and small-pox of a virulent type prevailed throughout the district, 20,313 having succumbed to these dis-In the margin is shown the increase of mortality over that in the preceding year.
- Medicines were liberally administered. and there is reason to believe with considerable beneficial effect.
- 15. The health report of the district has already been separately submitted, together with a statement showing the ratio of mortality to the population, as called for in Board's Proceedings, No. 4,407, dated the 15th June 1868.

- 16. Murrain or saruku prevailed amongst cattle mostly in the talooks of Cuddapah, Madanapully, Kadiri, and Proddatur. The mortality was much less than in the preceding year, as shown in the margin.
- Statement No. 2 exhibits a marked fall in prices as compared with those obtaining Indeed, with the exception of that of paddy, prices, were much lower than the averages of the last ten years, as will be seen from the comparative abstract of prices below
- 18. This favorable circumstance is attributable to the improved out-turn of both the dry and wet crops, also to a comparatively less demand from without the district, owing to the season having been more favorable in the adjoining districts also.

Ryots' Holdings. Statement No. 3 shows the ryots' holdings, cultivation, and net demand of the Fusly. Enclosure A. of this statement exhibits the holdings at the beginning of the year, and the subsequent alterations therein, the waste remitted and charged, and the extent of actual cultivation.

20. The subjoined comparative abstract of cultivation shows a net increase over Fusly 1277 of Acres 27,301, with an assessment of Rupees 77,639, or over 4 per cent. on the total assessment of Fusly 1277, namely, 17,93,834.

SETTLEMENT REPORT OF

21. The increase in the extent is chiefly owing to lands newly taken up on durkhast, and to transfers of lands, etc., as may be seen from Enclosure A. in No. 3; but the net decrease of Rupees 12,029 is chiefly attributable to the reduction of Rupees 16,635-7-8 from the demand on dry lands irrigated by private wells, sanctioned in Board's Proceedings, No. 6,301, dated 4th September 1868, and approved by Government in their Order, No. 1,836, under date the 29th June 1869, Revenue Department.

Waste Remissions.

22. The extent left waste during the year under report was 72,073 Acres, assessed at Ru-

pees 1,37,138, from the total holdings of 13,17,677 Acres, assessed at Rupees 18,06,245; the percentage of waste being about 7½, of which the amount of waste remitted was Rupees 99,620, or 69,979 Rupees less than in the preceding year.

Standing Circular Order, No. 137.

23. The remissions were large in the four talooks of the sub-division, owing to a failure of water in the tanks, etc. They were granted under the rules of 1st November 1865.

From this it may be seen that the dry waste charged was on account of lands left waste or fallow either by litigation, neglect, or for pasturage, etc., and that the wet waste charged was on account of lands which inquiry at the settlement proved to have been left waste through carelessness, though the tanks and channels under which they are situated received a sufficient supply of water.

27. Under Road cess, imposed under the provision of Act III. of 1866, there is an increase

 of Rupees 2,564, or about 5 per cent. over the demand for Fusly 1277, which is owing to the charge being made on ryots who had taken up fresh lands during the year, and to certain cases which escaped notice in the preceding year

having been brought under the impost in the Fusly under review.

Statement No. 6 shows the Demand. Collection, and Balance of Shrotriem Jody villages enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner; there being no Zemindaries, Mootahs, or Poliputs in this district. The increase of Rupees 3,438 under "Arrears" is owing to quit-rents not being punctually paid up, as well as to the sanction for writing off irrecoverable balances having been received late. The net decrease of Rs. 50 under "Current" revenues is owing to the reduction from the shrotriem demand of Rs. 92 on account of the reduction from the beriz for Village Service Fund, (Board's Circular Mehorandum, No. 230, dated March 1869,) and to the annual payments as compensation for Moturpha abolished in the five villages noted in the margin, as sanctioned in Government Order. No. 2,405, dated 17th September 1868, communicated with Board's Proceedings, dated 6th October of the same year.

The Shrotriem village of Vadlavanipully, in the talook of Pulivendla, with a quit-rent of Rupees 42, was erroneously included last year under "1, Jody on Sundry Inams" of Statement No. 5, which in Fusly 1278 was included under "Current demand" of Statement No. 6, its legitimate place; hence a corresponding increase under this head.

- 39. The increase of Rupees 88,671 in the total collections of arrears over last year is nominal, as the portions of collections of revenue suspended during the famine year in the talooks of Kadiri and Royachoty were brought to account in the year under report, while the increase of Rupees 2,12,853 over last year, under "Current collections," is chiefly due to the season having been favorable, and consequently to less remission having been granted during the year.
- 40. In furtherance of the Board's instructions, conveyed in the Circular Memorandum, No. 689, dated 30th June 1869, a Statement in the prescribed form, of the Talookwar particulars of the Demand and Collections of Land and other sources of Revenue, accompanies the Report as an enclosure to Statement No. 7.

Statement No. 8 .- Revenue Arrears.

41. Statement No. 8 exhibits the Collection on account of old balances of all sources of

Revenue. In column 7 thereof is inserted a balance of Rupees 45,182 at the close of the Fusly under report, which was by subsequent collections up to the end of July last reduced to Rupees 43,602, or about 14 per cent. on the demand. From this balance a sum of Rupees 29,433-6-9 is recommended for remission as irrecoverable, the Fuslywar particulars of which are shown in the subjoined abstract, as directed by the Board in paragraph 8 of their Proceedings, No. 4,345, dated 17th June 1869.

43. In the three talooks of Budwell, Kadiri, and Voilpaud no property was sold for arrears,

while in the talooks of Madanapully, Puli endla, and Sidhout coercive measures were resorted to to a rather large extent.

44. From Enclosure A. in No. 8 it may be seen that out of property to the value of Rs. 8,212 attached it was only necessary to sell property to the value of Rupees 1,946, or 24 per cent. on the value attached.

- 45. The amount of fees collected in the service of processes, etc., and that paid to Process servers and salesmen, etc., is shown in the margin, as directed in paragraph 7 of Board's Standing Circular Order, No. 277-2.
- 46. Statement No. 9 shows a net increase in collections, current and arrears, of Rupees

3,01,522 over the preceding year, though there was a deficit of Rupees 35,575 under License Tax, owing to new enactments, against a net decrease of Rupees 1,195 in the charges, the variations in which will be noticed below.

47. The decrease of Rupees 2,417 in the salaries of the Collector, Sub-Collector, etc., is owing to no permanent Collector having been appointed to the district till lately, and to its 1st Class Deputy Collector having been admitted to a Superannuation pension.

- 48. The decrease of Rupees 608 under "Huzoor and Talook Establishments" is chiefly due to the salaries of servants on privilege leave being withheld till they rejoin their appointments. The decrease of Rupees 535 under "Saderward" is due to the strict observance of the rules regulating the charges both in the Huzoor and in Talooks. The decrease of Rupees 2,266 under License Tax establishment and refunds do not call for special remarks, as the Act was repealed before the second half of the Fusly under review.
- 49. The increase of Rupees 615 under "Medical charges" is due to the increased scale of salaries of the Hospital Assistants attached to the Collectorate, while the increase of Rupees 1,331 under Stamps is attributable to commissions on large sales of stamps under the discount system, as well as to the duties refunded on stamp certificates of the Civil Courts.
 - 50. The total charges are in the proportion of 9 per cent. on the gross collections.

51. No applications have been made for the sub-division of the joint liability of share-holders of enfranchised whole Inam villages held under joint tenure to the payment of quit-rent to Government.

52. With reference to Proceedings of the Board of Revenue, No. 2,070, dated 31st March 1869, I have to observe that the practice of charging "Fasul Jasty" on irrigated Inam lands does not obtain in this district.

56. Referring to paragraph 2 of the said Proceedings a sum of Rupees 10,716, made up of the items marginally noted, has been collected during the year under report on unirrigated Inam lands and credited to "Water tax," etc.,—

10,716 Item No. 46 in Statement No. 5—under

"Current demand." All the three items noted above bear an analogy to the different kinds of water rates obtaining in the case of Circar lands.

54. It appears that "Teerwah Jasty" is charged on dry Inam lands for Government water irrigating them, and again "Fasul Jasty" or second crop assessment on the same Inam when a second crop is raised with Government irrigation. Then Government water from tanks and channels is utilized in irrigating Inam lands under what are locally called "Dasavandum wells" Nirsarigy or water rate is charged.

SUB-COLLECTORATE.

I HAVE the honor to submit the Settlement accounts and Report of the Sub-division for Fusly 1278.

2. The settlement of the talooks of Madanapully, Royachoty, and Kadiri were conducted by me, and that of Voilpaud by the Collector.

- 7. Since I took charge of the sub-division on the 29th October 1868, I have resided within my division except for nineteen days spent at Cuddapah.
- 8. The season has, on the whole, been favorable to cultivation, especially to the dry crops on which the well-being of the sub-division talooks mainly depends. The following statement shows the rain-fall as compared with Fusly 1277. From May till November rain fell in all the talooks, and although the tanks were many of them only partially supplied the fall was most timely for the dry crops. The increase over the rain-fall of last year was rather over six inches on an average of all the *\dagger*alooks:—

The chief increase in tanks filled, it will be observed, is in the Royachoty talook; while in Madanapully there is a decrease of 14 compared with last Fusly. The rain-fall in these hilly talooks is always very partial, and generally comes in heavy showers, which are only local in their effect.

10. The average produce of dry and wet crops is given below. The yield was more plentiful than last year and no blight attacked the crops. Rain fell at seasonable times, both for sowing and for maturing the various grains. Prices have been generally much lower, though at the close of the Fusly there was a tendency to rise, owing to great quantities of dry grain being exported to Chittoor:—

11. The sanitary state of the sub-division was not so good as during the former Fusly. Small-pox and fever were very prevalent in all the talooks, and especially in the north of Kadiri and the eastern parts of Voilpaud. Medical aid was afforded in both localities it is hoped with good effect. The talooks of Kadiri and Royachoty were free from cholera, and that of Madana-pully nearly so.

In the talook of Voilpaud 1,555 persons were attacked, and 813 died. The disease was brought into that talook from Tirupathy.

In the same talook small-pox was most virulent; the deaths having been 885 against 269 in the other three talooks. Looking, however, at the filthy condition of the generality of the villages, and the quantity of manure and dirt collected round the houses, the only wonder is that so comparatively few persons are carried off by epidemic discusse.

12. The loss of cattle by disease compares favorably with that of the preceding Fusly. Pasturage and water are always very scarce during the hot months, and little care is taken to store fodder for cattle; hence they become out of condition and weak, and fall easy victims to any prevalent disease.

There is a decrease in the price of all kinds of grain, owing chiefly to the favorable nature of the season, and also to the increased facilities of import afforded by the Railway to Cuddapah and thence to the sub-division. A good deal of the better kinds of grain were imported from Cuddapah to Madanapully, and from Bellary to Kadiri.

14. Statement No. 3 exhibits a net increase of Land revenue, amounting to Rs.63,369-12-0. This is almost entirely due to the better supply of water. Under the heads of Fasul Jasty and Teerwah Jasty the increase is Rupees 10,964. Under the head of Miscellaneous there is an increase of Rupees 393-14-6. This is attributable to the more favorable nature of the season, and the consequently increased prosperity of the ryots. The decrease of remissions, amounting to Rupees 2,089-4-9, is explained in paragraph 19.

The large increase under the head of Demand on wet lands, Rupees 49,958, and also of Fasul Jasty and Teerwah Jasty is, of course, owing to the increase in the rain-fall. There is only a slight increase of Rupees 358 in dry cultivation.

- 15. Enclosure A. in Statement No. 3 shows an increase in ryots' holdings of Rupees 358 in dry land, and of Rupees 1,089-8-8 in wet land. Dry lands were relinquished to the amount of Rupees 9,057, and taken up to the amount of Rupees 9,415; while in wet lands the assessment of those relinquished was Rupees 5,430, and of those taken up Rupees 6,520.
- 16. Remissions on wet lands amounted to Rupees 84,220-2-4, which shows a decrease of Rupees 48,868-9-7 when compared with last Fusly. Wet land cultivation amounted to Rupees 2,96,580-13-2, being an increase of Rupees 54,257-14-4 on that of last year. Dry cultivation was Rupees 2,34,097, being Rupees 1,160-6-10 in excess of the previous season. The remissions on Shamilat Bunger, or portions of fields left waste, is very small when compared with those of the previous Fusly, and amounted only to Rupees 59-11-9.

The dry land left waste was taxable at Rupees 6,739-5-8 against Rupees 7,511 in last year; no remission was granted. Wet land left waste was charged to the amount of Rupees 8,183-9-4, being a decrease of Rupees 1,778-3-9 on that charged during last Fusly.

- 17. Enclosure B. in Statement No. 3 shows the cultivation of sugar-cane, cotton, and indigo. There is a decrease in the cultivation of cotton and sugar-cane, and a slight increase in indigo. The decrease of the two former crops is owing to the larger profit obtainable from other crops.
- 18. Enclosure C. in Statement No. 3 requires no remark, as the canal does not pass through the sub-division.
- 19. Statement No. 4 shows the several kinds of remissions. Under the head of Shamilat Bunger there is a decrease of Rupees 2,521-8-4, and no remissions were granted for withered crops. There is also a decrease under the head of Wet land cultivated with dry crops, on which half the nunjah assessment is charged. Remissions on seed destroyed also shows a slight decrease of Rupees 21-1-1.
- 20. The increase in Items Nos. 2, 4, 5, and 7 of permanent remission is owing to the cultivation having been more extensive. The decrease of Rupees 4-6-10 under Item No. 6 is owing to the cultivation having been less.

The decrease of Rupees 2-9-1 in remil.ion on topes is owing to the conditions under which the land was granted not having been complied with. The land was granted for planting a tope, but the holder subsequently cancelled his application, and the land was fully assessed.

The pay of Village servants, amounting to Rupees 68, has been deducted from the beriz of the villages concerned, according to the late orders of the Board for this Fusly.

21. Statement No. 5.—There is a decrease of Rupees 306-8-6 in the current demand under the head of Miscellaneous, owing to the transfer of stamps from that head.

Water tax on Inam lands shows an increase of Rupees 1,005-14-0, and cultivation after Jummahbundy an increase of Rupees 2,327-4-11. This is entirely owing to the larger rain-fall.

Concealed cultivation shows an increase of Rupees 299-4-3, but I am unable to state whether this is wing to increased watchfulpess on the part of the Revenue Inspectors, or to greater laxness on the part of the village officials. Several of the latter were punished by fine or suspension. There is a large decrease of Rupees 3,876-8-0 in tope rents owing to the fruit trees having failed.

The item of Maramut Taffrick has been transferred to the Public Works Department, so that no collections are shown under that head.

There is an increase in the quit-rent and jody payable on Inams of Rupees 209-7-6, owing to many having been enfranchised during the past year.

There is a decrease in the over-collections from the ryots of Rupees 206-8-7, owing to many village officials having been punished for carelessness in making collections.

The other items do not appear to call for any particular remark.

22. Statement No. 6.—The number of permanently settled villages is the same as last year, namely, sixty-two. The total demand is Rupees 3-5-8 less than last year, owing to the deduction of Moturpha, Quit-rent, in two villages under sanction of Government in their Proceedings, No. 2,405, dated 17th September 1868.

The outstanding balance in these villages is larger this year than last by Rupees 1,399-11-11. This is, however, in course of realization.

23. Statement No. 7.—The balance of the current land revenue up to the end of the Fusly was Rupees 73,584-6-6, which is Rupees 43,099 less than last year. Subsequent collections up to the end of July were Rupees 40,031-12-9.

The balance is Rupees 33,552-9-9 against Rupees 59,517-10-10 at the same period last year. The collections and balance of arrears show an increase this year of Rupees 24,397-13-11. This, however, is owing to a large amount of dry remission, Rupees 22,760-10-10, still standing as balance in the demand, but which is recommended to be struck off this year.

There is a decrease of Rupees 394 under Stamps, and of Rupees 474 under License Tax.

There is an increase under all other heads owing to the season having been favorable.

In your letter, No. 124, 'dated 30th June 1869, you directed that no further steps should be taken for collecting the outstanding balances of the two last kists on dry land in the Royachoty and Kadiri Talooks, and stated that the order of the late Acting Collector, directing these non-collections, must be considered equivalent to an order for remission. At the same time I was directed to remark on the matter in my Settlement Report. The reasons for this remission were fully explained in my predecessor's letters, Nos. 17 and 22, dated 26th February, and 6th March 1868.

I have now the honor to request that sanction may be obtained for writing off Rupees 22,760-10-10 as irrecoverable. A sum of Rupees 376-14-3 in Royachoty, and Rupees 68-8-8 in the Kadiri Talook, had been collected out of the sum of Rupees 23,206-1-9 mentioned in your letter. The amount of the other items recommended for remission is Rupees 484-0-10, or Rs. 51 less than the amount recommended last year.

25. Enclosure A. in Statement No. 8.—There is an increase in the number of instances in which coercive measures were employed for the collection of arrears.

There were no sales of moveable or immoveable property in Voilpaud or Kadiri Talooks. The value of lands sold in Madanapully was Rupees 274-14-0, compared with Rupees 201-7-0 last year. A sum of Rupees 315-10-0 was realised on the moveable and immoveable property of five

individuals in the same talook.

26. Statement No. 9.—There is an increase in the gross collections during the last Fusly of Rupees 1,47,011-5-5, the cause of which has already been explained.

The net increase in Disbursements is Rupees 36,122-8-0. This is chiefly due to the disbursement of the salaries of the Revenue Settlement Department in the Talooks of Voilpaud and Royachoty. There is also an increase of Rupees 690 in the payment of the Huzoor and Talook Establishments, owing to the increased salary of the Dresser attached to the sub-division.

- 27. Statement No. 10.—There are six tanks in the sub-division, having each a combined Circar and Inam ayacut exceeding Rupees 3,000. Out of a total Circar ayacut of Rupees 33,461 only Rupees 10,958 was collected last year, while this year Rupees 20,705 was realised.
- 28. Statement No. 11.—No ayacut tanks are given on dry sist in this Fusly. The wet cultivation under fourteen tanks previously handed over is Rupees 218 against Rupees 87 in last year. The rate of Rupees 3 per acre is generally too high to afford a fair profit to the ryots taking up the tanks for repairs. The assessment of the Chinaganypully tank in the Kadiri Talook was erroneously entered last year as Rupees 132. The proper amount, Rupees 170, has now been entered.

- 31. I personally examined many of the Talooks and Village Manual accounts, and found them generally kept with fair accuracy. The headings to them are now all printed, and the forms furnished to the Curnums, so that there is now nothing for them to do except fill up the various columns. The new rain gauges were received in the month of April, and will afford far more reliable returns of the rain-fall than the old ones. I examined the registers kept in the Madanapully and Kadiri Talooks, and they appeared generally to be written up with accuracy. A mistake was discovered in the Kadiri register, which was, however, promptly rectified. The rain-fall for one day was returned as five inches, instead of five-tenths. Every effort is made to impress the Tahsildars with the importance of keeping these registers with utmost exactness.
- 32. The Tahsildar of Madanapully, N. Appa Row, was transferred at the close of the Fusly to Proddatur, owing to his possessing land in this talook.

The Tahsildar of Kadiri, Vencatachalapathy Naidoc, is an able and active man, and is the only one of the Tahsildars who systematically visits the villages in his range.

I have found my Sheristadar, H. Kristna Row, of great assistance in examining the accounts, and see no reason for not endorsing the favorable opinion expressed regarding his conduct by my predecessors.

SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

KURNOOL.

I have the honor to submit my Report upon the Revenue Settlement of the District for Fusly 1278, (1868-69,) with the prescribed Statements.

- 2. Statement No. 1 shows the places at which the settlement was made, and the period occupied in it. The talooks of Sirwell and Koilkuntla were settled by me. Mr. McCarthy settled the Head Assistant's Division, comprising the talooks of Cumbum and Markapur. The talooks of Pattikonda and Ramalkota were settled by Deputy Collector Timmappa; Mr. Turner, the Assistant Collector, settled the Nandikotkur talook; and Deputy Collector Sudersana Row the Nundial Talook. With the exception of (Kambhalapa) a village in the Ramalkota Talook, the Curnum of which failed to appear with his accounts at the time of settlement, and which was in consequence settled at Pyapalli in the Pattikonda Talook, all the talooks were settled within their respective limits, and at not less than two stations in each.
- 3. There have been no variations in the year under report in the number and tenure of villages.

The number of new puttahs appearing against the Ramalkota Talook is to be ascribed mainly to the introduction into nineteen of its villages of the settlement rates of assessment. The issue of fresh puttahs in the remaining talooks was occasioned by large variations in ryots' holdings and by transfers. In the three talooks where the new form of puttah was adopted the issue of miscellaneous puttahs was avoided.

5. The marginal table gives the particulars of rain-fall during the year. The season was on the whole decidedly favorable. In the six talooks situated to the west of the Nallamalla Hills the rain during the south-west monsoon was abundant. Nearly all the tanks received a full supply, and the yield both of wet and dry crops, especially the latter, was large.

Two tanks, one at Yapadinne and one at Kochervu, in the Ramalkota Talook breached. The latter, as I have already explained to the Board, could not be advantageously repaired, and regarding the former I have written to the Superintending Engineer for estimates for repairs.

In the two talooks, Cumbum and Markapur, lying to the east of the Nallamalla Hills the rains of the north-east monsoon on which they chiefly depend generally failed. A large extent of land was either thrown up or left waste, and where cultivation was attempted the crops in many places wholly withered. It was, therefore, found necessary, as shown hereafter, to allow large remissions on wet holdings.

6. The sanitary condition of the district during the first six months of the Fusly was generally good. During the latter half of the year, while the 19th Regiment was marching into the district, cholera made its appearance, and has continued to hover about a great part of the district. Fever and small-pox prevailed and

carried off large numbers. The marginal figures give the particulars of mortality from these causes.

7. Murrain also prevailed among cattle generally throughout the district. Mr. Thacker has supplied a great deal of medicine, the efficacy of which appears doubtful, except when administered at the premonitory stage of the disease.

I experience great difficulty in persual ing the villagers to segregate the sick cattle, a means of prevention to which they appear almost superstitiously adverse to adopt.

Prices .- Statement No. 2.

From the subjoined comparative abstract it will be seen that the prices of grain, especially of the dry grains which form the food of the masses, show a marked decrease in comparison with those of the last four Fuslies. This is to be ascribed chiefly to the favorable character of the season, and in some measure to importations from the Nizam's territories.

10. It will be apparent from the above statement that the holdings for the year under report exhibit, in comparison with the holdings of the previous year, a net increase of Acres 4,837 in the area and a net decrease of Rupees 9,062 in the assessment. Both the increase in the area and the decrease in the assessment is chiefly due to the introduction of the new survey areas, and the settlement rates of assessment in some of the villages of the talooks of Ramalkota, Nundial, and Sirwell.

Of the entire area thus occupied, amount-Actual Cultivation and Waste remitted. ing to Acres 11,88,894, assessed at Rupees 12,89,693, the area actually cultivated amounted to Acres 11,57,191, assessed at Rupees 12,61,230, and Acres 31,703, assessed at Rupees 28,463, were left waste. Of this latter acreage the assessment on Acres 798, amounting to Rupees 5,941, was remitted. The greater portion of this remission was allowed in the Cumbum and Markapur Talooks, where from the deficiency of the later rains the tanks failed to afford sufficient water.

Dry Remissions.

- 12. From Enclosure A. to Statement No. 3 it will be seen that dry remissions were also allowed in the Fusly under report, though to a trifling extent. This was granted with the permission of the Board* in the Sirwell Talook, where 26 acres of land, lying at the foot of the Nallamalla Hills, were left waste from dread of tigers in the neighbourhood.
- 13. The subjoined abstract, in the form prescribed by the Board in their Circular Memorandum of 14th August 1866, shows the net settlement of the district for Fusly 1278, as compared with that of Fusly 1277.

- 15. There is a net increase of Rupees 752 under Teerwa jasty, or additional assessment. The increase is distributed through all the talooks situated to the west of the Nallamalla Hills, and is attributable to the favorable character of the season.
- 16. The increase of Rupees 4,893, under the head of "Water tax," is for the most part nominal, being simply transferred to this head from under Additional assessment, in consequence of the introduction of the settlement rates, whereby a specific water-rate is charged on every acre irrigated.
 - 17. The fluctuations under the remaining heads do not call for remark.

Special Products.

18. The annexed statement, abstracted from Enclosure B. to Statement No. 3, gives in

- 19. The decrease in the extent of cotton cultivation, and the increase in that of indigo, cannot be traced to any other cause than the state of the market, with respect to these articles, at the commencement of the cultivating season. The falling off in the area of sugar-cane cultivation occurs mainly under the Cumbum tank, and is attributable to the short supply of water in the talook.
- 20. The number of the principal irrigation works of the district, with particulars of their ayacut and cultivation, is shown in the subjoined abstract:—

- 21. In the year under review three ruined tanks, situated in the Pattikonda Talook, have been made over to private enterprise. Only one of these has an ayacut according to the Pymash accounts. This was made over at Rupees 3 per acre, the rate prescribed for the district. The other two, ruined long before the Pymash, were made over at the existing dry rates of assessment.
 - 22. Referring to paragraph 6 of the Board's Official Memorandum of 22nd December 1868, I beg to annex a statement showing the extent to which the water from Madras Irrigation and Canal Company's canal was used for irrigation purposes during the past Fusly.

23. Water was let into the canal up to the seventy-second mile, but the extent to which it is availed of for irrigation was small owing to the want of distribution channels, and the Company not being yet prepared for the irrigation much beyond twenty miles. In the month of September there was a breach in the anicut at Sunkesula, which temporarily cut off irrigation, but without any serious damage to the cultivation.

Other Remissions.

24. Statement No 4 contains particulars of miscellaneous remissions granted during the year under report, compared with those of the previous year. As desired by the Board in paragraph 4 of their Memorandum above referred to, I have given full explanation in the body of the statement of all remissions peculiar to the district. I proceed to review seriatim the sums remitted during the year.

1.-Shamilat Bunger.

25. This remission was allowed chiefly in the Markapur and Cumbum Talooks on por-

tions of fields left waste in consequence of inadequate supply in the tanks.

26. Under this head there appears a sum of Rupees 2,080, or 515 Rupees more than the amount remitted in the previous year. This was almost entirely in the two talooks referred to in the preceding paragraph, where the crops under many of the tanks withered for want of water.

3 .- Pannyboodthy.

27. The trifling sum that appears under this head was remitted in the Ramalkota Talook,

the grops having been destroyed by inundation.

4.—Payamaly.

No. 1,141, dated 20th February 1869.

28. This remission was allowed in the Ramalkota Talook, under the orders of the Board noted in the margin, where, in consequence of the break of the Kochervu tank, 112 acres of land under it was damaged.

5.-Teerwa Cummy.

29. This is the remission given on certain wet lands situated mostly under breached

tanks, which were allowed to be cultivated with dry crop, as there was no prospect of there being water enough for the irrigation of wet crops.

6 .- Tope Remissions.

30. There is an increase of Rupees 57 under this head, which occurs almost entirely

in the Nundial Talook, where, during the year under report, some fresh lands were given to the ryots under the Tope rules.

Dasavandam.

31. The increase of 112 Rupees under this head is the result of increased cultivation

under the Dasavandam tanks, which are situated in the Markapur and Cumbum Talooks.

Remissions peculiar to the District.

32. The terms Kattugutta Mukta Cowle, Sery, Sagawat, are all explained in the body of

the statement. The variations in these remissions are attributable to the extent to which the lands enjoying these indulgences are cultivated; the remissions on the uncultivated portion merging in the general remissions allowed on waste.

Shotriem Vaza.

33. This is the amount deducted from the beriz of an unenfranchised Shotriem village

(Malasomapuram) in the Ramalkota Talook, and paid to the Shotriemdars. This item will disappear from the next Fusly, as by that time the Shotriem will have been enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner.

Land Revenue, Miscellaneous.

34. The demand under Land Revenue, Miscellaneous, shows a net decrease of Rs. 6,098

above that of the previous year, resulting from a total increase of Rupees 8,323 in some items, and a total decrease of Rupees 14,421 in others. The increase occurs chiefly in the items

noted in the margin. The large increase under Water tax on Inams is chiefly due to the favorable character of the season, and to a strict

enforcement of the recent order of Government by which all Inams, classed by the Inam Commissioner as one crop lands, are to be charged with fasal jasty as Circar lands, whenever water is obtained from a Government tank for a second crop. As desired by the Board the two items of which this tax is composed, namely, Fasal jasty and Teerwa jasty, are separately shown in Statement No. 5.

- 35. The items showing a large decrease are shown in the margin. The falling off under "Revenue derived from cultivation [after the settlement" requires no particular explanation.

 3. Rent of Gardens and Topes.

 The decrease under "Grass rent" is due to the settlement of the decrease under "Grass rent" is due to the settlement.
- decreased competition, the previous year's lease having proved a great loss. The decrease under "Rent of gardens and topes" is caused by a deficiency of produce, in consequence of which they were let at a lower lease,
- 36. There are no Zemindaries in this district. Statement No. 6 shows the enfranchised Shotriem villages. There has been no change in the demand under this source of revenue.
- 37. Adverting to Standing Order, No. 13 6, I have the honor to state that no application have as yet been received from the holders of any enfranchised Shotriem for the sub-division of their joint liability to the payment of the Government quit-rent.

Demand from all sources of Revenue,

38. The following abstract exhibits the current demand of all the revenue of Fusly 1278, as contrasted with that of Fusly 1277:—

- 39. The aggregate demand from all sources of revenue amounts to Rupees 18,96,159, being a net increase of Rupees 18,219 on the beriz of the previous year. The increase occurs chiefly in License Tax, Income Tax, Certificate Tax, and Stamps.
- 40. The total demand under Land Revenue is Rupees 14,69,047, or Rupees 6,163 below the demand of the past Fusly. The decrease is chiefly to be observed in the Miscellaneous revenue, and is fully explained in paragraphs 34 and 35 of this report.
- 41. The Abkarry demand of the year under report is Rupees 2,67,133 against Rupees 2,66,111 of the past Fusly, showing an increase of Rupees 1,022 attributable to the increased prices for which some of the farms were sold by auction in June 1868.

Salt.

Stamps

- 42. The trifling decrease in this item does not call for remark.
- 43. The large increase in the Stamp revenue is to be ascribed to the operation of the revised B. Schedule.

Certificate Tax.

44. The revenue from this source exhibits an increase of Rupees 12,686. The Certificate

Act only came into operation towards the close of Fusly 1277, and in consequence the collections in that year were small. Full collections were made in the Fusly under report.

Income Tax.

45. The amount assessed up to the close of the Fusly under the Income Tax Act, which

came into operation on the 1st of April last, was Rupees 10,283. The assessment is in progress, and every effort is being made to complete it as early as possible.

46. Out of the aggregate demand of Rupees 18,96,159 the collections within the Fusly amounted to Rupees 18,64,934, which left a balance of Rupees 31,225 at the close of the year. Of this sum Rupees 17,639 have since been collected.

Land Revenue Collections.

47. Out of the entire demand of Rupees 14,69,046, under the head of Land Revenue, a sum of Rupees 14,56,907, or more than 99 per cent. of the demand, was collected within the Fusly, leaving a balance of Rupees 12,140, or four-fifth per cent. of the demand. The collections up to July last amounted to Rupees 3,729, which reduces the balance to Rupees 8,411.

48. The balance under this head at the close of the Fusly was Rupees 18,725, which was simply nominal, as some of the contractors had deposited as security Promissory Notes instead of money as in the previous year, many of which they have since had restored to them on payment of their kists in money.

The above statement gives for the total collections of the year, both arrears and current, Rupees 18,77,672, which shows a net decrease of Rupees 57,763 below the collections of the previous year. The decrease occurs largely under Abkarry, and is to be seen both in current and

50. The decrease under Abkarry arrear collections is due to the circumstance of there being but little arrear demand in the beginning of the year under report. The decrease in the current Abkarry collections is already explained in paragraph 48.

51. The decrease in the Land Revenue, Miscellaneous collections, is attributable to diminished demand. The variations in the collections of the remaining sources of revenue do not call for remark.

52. The total amount of arrears under all Arrears, No. 8. heads of revenue, as detailed in Statement 8,

was Rupees 19,655, of which Rupees 12,739 were collected within the Fusly, and Rupees 4,243 remitted under the Orders of Government, dated 22nd December 1858, No. 3,200, and 17th June 1869, No. 4,345. The balance thus left, amounting to Rupees 2,673, has been reduced by subsequent collections to Rupees 2,609. Of this sum Rupees 1,799-6.5 are deemed, after careful inquiry by the Division Officers and myself, irrecoverable.

53. The marginal figures give the particulars of this irrecoverable balance, and I solicit

Coercive Process.

54. In the recovery of Land revenue coercive process was employed in some of the

talooks, where land valued at Rupees 1,913, and personal property to the value of Rupees 218, was sold, as detailed in Enclosure A. to Statement No. 8.

55. Adverting to paragraph 7 of Standing Order, No. 1 of 1869, I have the honor to report that the amount realised by the service of process under Act II. of 1864, in the year under report, was Rupees 104-1-1, of which only Rupees 3-4-0 it was found necessary to expend. The Tahsildars have been instructed to levy, in future, no sums further than what may be absolutely necessary for the service and execution of such process.

Charges.

- 1. Salary of Huzoor and Talook Establishments.
- 2. Contingencies.

56. The charges of the year under review exhibit an increase over the charges of the preceding year by Rupees 4,997. The increase occurs mostly in the items noted in the margin.

- 57. The increase in the salaries of the Htzoor and Talook establishments is caused by the arrear pay of servants absent on leave in the previous year having been disbursed in the current year.
- 58. The increase under "Contingencies" is due to the payment of Rupees 1,371 to Deputy Collector Sudersana Row under the Orders of Government, dated 12th December 1868, No. 3,098, being the difference of his special batta from 18th December 1866 to 31st December 1868.

Talook and Village Accounts.

60. The Talook and Village accounts were, as usual, examined by the Settlement Officers,

and were found generally well kept; where instances of inaccuracy or omission occurred the parties were either warned or punished by fines.

61. I have no fault to find with any of the officials in the Revenue Department, who have all worked well and performed their duty satisfactorily. The early date at which I am enabled to forward this report is entirely due to the exertions of the Head Sheristadar Choudappa, and K. S. Narasaya, the English Record-keef r, who, when not occupied with the especial work of his office, lends his aid most willingly in any department when necessary.

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SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

MADRAS.

I HAVE the honor to submit the Report on the Annual Settlement for Fusly 1278, with the usual Statements.

Statement No. 1.—Names of the Officers who conducted the settlement and the time occupied in doing so.

The time occupied in doing so was one month and twenty-six days. The third talook of the Principal Division, Trivellore, was settled by Mr. Lee-Warner, Assistant Collector, in one month. The Acting Sub-Collector Mr. Crole was occupied for two months and eight days in conducting the settlement of the three talooks of the Sub-division.

Variation in the number and tenure of Villages.

3. Under the Orders of Government, dated 22nd December 1868, No. 3,201, (Land Revenue,) the village of Annamanaikenkuppam, which is held on Jaghire tenure from the Kalastri Zemindar, has been transferred from the North Arcot to the Madras District. No revenue is payable to Government from this village. With this exception there has been no change in the number or mode of tenure of the villages of the district in the Fusly under review.

Number of Puttahs distributed, with remarks regarding the number renewed and unrenewed.

4. The total number of puttahs issued in Fus 1278 was 49,983, or 1,385 more than in the previous Fusly. The excess is attributed to durkhast and transfers by sale, etc. No old puttahs were made usel of in Fusly 1278, as, according to the Board's Circular Memorandum, dated 3rd December 1886, No. 1,206, fresh puttahs in the new form were issued to all the ryots of the district.

Season and sanitary condition of the District.

5. The following table shows the average rain-fall for the year as registered in the talooks, and which is a trifle less than that of the previous year, while it is less than half of that of Fusly 1276, which was inches 37.88:—

- 6. In the Report for Fusly 1277 I had occasion to remark that much reliance could not be placed on the registered rain-fall of this district owing to the gauges being out of repair, but as new ones of a superior kind have since been supplied there is reason to expect that greater accuracy in this respect will be attained in future.
- 7. The season, in an agricultural point of view, was very unfavorable, being not only much below the average but even worse than that of the previous Fusly, which was notoriously a very bad one; as observed before the rain-fall was less, and the failure of the north-east monsoon, on which the Nunjah cultivation of this district is mainly dependant, was still more complete.
- 8. Notwithstanding the pressure resulting from two successive bad seasons there was no absolute distress. Relaxation of the ordinary remission rules was authorized by the Board in their Proceedings, dated 19th January 1869, No. 49. Surplus labor was absorbed by ordinary public works by special projects, namely, Chembrambakum tank, and the Madras Water works and Relief works, for which special funds were sanctioned.
- 9. The public health was on the whole good. Cholera did not make its appearance, but small-pox and fever of a mild type prevailed more or less in various parts of the district for the greater part of the Fusly. Cattle disease also prevailed to a certain extent, as was naturally to be expected from the want of water and pasture owing to the failure of the north-east monsoon. The price of fodder was exceedingly high.

Statement No. 2 .- Prices of grain.

10. The average price of first and secondsort paddy was 8 per cent. above that of the

previous Fusly, and 178 per cent. above the commutation rates. From the following abstract it will be seen that the prices of the staple food grains of the district were comparatively higher than the average of the previous ten years, and also in excess of the prices of the previous Fusly. The increase above the average ranged from 3 per cent. for cumboo to 27 per cent. for first sort paddy, while the increase over the previous Fusly was from 3 per cent. on cholum to 9 per cent. on first sort paddy:—

Ryots' holdings.

11. The net holding of Fusly 1278 exceeds that of the previous Fusly by Acres 23, 310, assessed

at Rupees 24,535. The extent of land relinquished in Fusly 1278 was Acres 11,657, Rs. 23,487, less than in the previous Fusly, while the land taken up was Acres 6,986, Rupees 12,673, in excess of the previous Fusly. The increase in the holding may be ascribed to the anticipations of the ryots, that as Fusly 12.77 was a bad season the chances were that Fusly 1278 would be a good one. No doubt also the liberal remissions granted in Fusly 1277 on account of the adverse nature of the season inspired the ryots with confidence to enlarge their holdings, in the expectation of receiving similar liberal treatment should circumstances require it.

13. The gross cultivation in Fusly 1278 was Acres 3,88,186, assessed at Rs. 11,14,889,

or Acres 4,569, Rupees 17,861, less than the previous Fusly. The decrease under the head of Poonjah is only Acres 746, Rupees 3,109; while the decrease in Nunjah is Acres 3,823, Rupees 14,752, which is to be ascribed to the failure of the north-east monsoon.

Waste charged.

14. The extent of waste charged in Fusly 1278 was Acres 7,128, assessed at Rupees 8,872,

Waste remitted.

15. The extent of waste remitted in Fusly 1278 was Acres 1,15,472, assessed at

Rupees 2,88,370, or Acres 21,089, assessed at Rupees 54,695, in excess of the previous Fusly. The cause of the increase is, that while the extent of the holdings is greater than in the previous Fusly the actual cultivation was, owing to the unfavorable nature of the season, less.

20. It is here necessary to explain the decrease of Rupees 24,809 in the item Road Cess-The cause is, (1) that in Fusly 1277 the cess was imposed on Zemindary villages for the first time, and that the cess on such villages for eighteen months, namely, the half of Fusly 1276 and the whole of Fusly 1277, was credited to the demand of the latter Fusly; (2) in Fusly 1276, in the ryotwary villages, 85 per cent. of the cess was charged; whereas, according to Board's Proceedings, dated 12th November 1867, No. 7,376, paragraph 2, only 50 per cent. should have been charged; the difference 35 per cent. was remitted in Fusly 1278, and the demand for that Fusly proportionately reduced.

22. No ruined tanks were made over to private enterprise, nor were any such applications received during the Fusly under report.

Statement No. 4 .- Remissions.

3. Remissions for waste, entered in Statement No. 3, have already been noticed and

accounted for. Under the head Occasional remissions there is a net decrease of Rupees 1,25,123.

24. Remission for Shamilat Bunger was granted in Fusly 1278, with the previous sanction of the Board—Vide Board's Proceedings, dated 19th January 1869, No. 320, and Government Order, dated 19th idem, No. 154. The increase of Rupees 2,132 in this item is proportionate to the increased extent of the ryots' holdings.

Shavy.

25. The decrease in this item, to the extent of Rupees 1,84,468, is to be ascribed to the fact

that in the previous Fusly a good deal of short produce, namely, where the out-turn did not exceed four marcals, was remitted as total Shavy; whereas in Fusly 1278 such crops were treated as short produce, a percentage remission only being granted, and this accounts for the increase of Rupees 63,168 under the head.

Teerwah Cummy.

26. The decrease of Rupees 5,847 in this item is attributable to the circumstance that in

Fusly 1277, when from want of water poonjah crops had been raised on nunjah land, the difference between the nunjah rate and first class poonjah was remitted, while similar indulgence was not shown in the Fusly under report. The fluctuations in the other items of occasional remissions are trifling, and call for no remark.

Fixed Remissions.

27. The increase of Rupees 391 in the item "Reyaett" is owing to increase of cultivation Tope cowle (ordinary) there is a net decrease of

by those entitled to such remission. In the item Tope cowle (ordinary) there is a net decrease of Rupees 355, resulting from a gross decrease of Acres 2,288, assessed at Rupees 1,766, caused by relinquishments and cancelment of cowles, and a gross_increase of Acres 1,128, assessed at Rupees 1,411, for which cowles were granted in Fusly 1278.

28. Under the head Ten years' tope cowle there is an increase of Rupees 1,466, the assessment on Casuarina and firewood plantations, which had been charged with the full Taram assessment, but which were granted free of assessment for ten years in Fusly 1278 with the sanction of Government—Vide Government Proceedings, dated 16th December 1867, communicated by Board's Proceedings of the 9th January 1868, No. 131. The increase of Rupees 4,918 in the item 2nd Crop teerwah on nunjah land irrigated by private wells is to be ascribed to the increase in 2nd Crop cultivation, and to the scarcity of water in the public reservoirs. The increase of Rupees 456 in the item Quarter Teerwah jasti, remitted under Standing Circular, No. 123-1, is owing to the fac that the amount remitted on this account in Fusly 1277 was by mistake included in the item Remission of second crop teerwah on nunjah raised by private wells.

Items on the collection or from the entire Beriz of Villages.

29. The decrease of Rupees 55 in the item
"Share of Shotriem proceeds" is consequent on
the resumption by Government of 25 shares of the Shotriem village of Rajakilpakam, Sydapet
Talook, formerly held by one Fatma Bee, to whom a fixed allowance was granted instead—Vide
Government Order, dated 7th April 1868, No. 921.

30. The increase of Rupees 1,594 in the item Allowance for heads of villages, etc., is proportionate to the increase in the settled beriz on which it is calculated.

Statement No. 5.—Demand, Collection, and Balance under the head "Miscellaneous."

31. The current demand under this head for the Fusly under report is Rupees 1,47,227,

being a net decrease of Rupees 2,263, resulting from a gross increase of Rupees 3,650 and a gross decrease of Rupees 5,913, caused chiefly by a decrease in the item "Cultivation after the settlement," ascribable to the adverse nature of the season.

- 32. The fluctuations in the component items of "Miscellaneous, Land Revenue," are trifling and call for no remark, except No. 51, "Other items," the fluctuations in which are noted below.—
- (1). Decrease of Rupees 1,786 in the item Manawari (ground-rent) on house sites in the villages transferred from the North Arcot District, abolished under the orders of the Board, dated 28th April 1868, No. 3,092.
- (2). Puttah fund—an increase of Rupees 2,031, being the charge imposed for the first time on the ryots of this district for the puttahs in the new form, which were issued in Fusly 1278, according to Board's Miscellaneous Circular, dated 3rd December 1866, No. 1,206.
- (3). Difference between the demand on account of arrears as shown in the Huzoor accounts and in the Talook and Village accounts, namely, Rupees 4,700 has been credited under the head "Miscellaneous." The cause of the discrepancy is attributable to the alterations made in respect of the annual settlement of Fuslies 1272 and 1273, which was fully explained in the Report for last Fusly, paragraph 77.
- (4). Caadras Certificate fees.—There is a decrease of Rupecs 4,367 in the item owing to a less number of certificates having been issued.
- (5). Decrease of Rupees 1,555, being the amount omitted by mistake from the demand of Fuslies 1275 and 1276, and credited in the accounts of Fusly 1277—enhanced quit-rent on Shotriems.

- 37. The current demand against "Mootahs" and "Rents for more than one year" is precisely the same as that of the previous Fusly.
- 38. The decrease of Rupees 139 in "Shotriem" is in consequence of the abolition of Shotriem kist, Rupees 75, on the commutation of Fatma Bee's variable share of the proceeds of the Shotriem village Rajakilpakam into a fixed allowance, as sanctioned by Government in their Order, dated 7th April 1868, No. 921, communicated by Board's Proceedings, dated 22nd idem, No. 2,984, and because Rupees, 64, enhanced quit-rent imposed by the Inam Commission on the Shotriem village of Pudupakam, Chingleput Talook, to which the Shotriemdar did not consent, was erroneously entered in the demand of last year.
- 39. The increase under the head "Ryotwar," amounting to Rupees 1,16,639, is ascribable to the circumstance that the amount of remission granted in Fusly 1278 is considerably less than in the previous Fusly.
 - 40. The decrease under the head "Miscellaneous" has already been explained.

Abkarry.

41. The increase of Rupees 50,626 under this head is ascribed to the increased sale of arrack in Madras, owing to the extensive public works under execution in its vicinity.

Salt.

42, The increase of Rupees 1,32,317 in Salt revenue is ascribed to three causes, (1) the

extension of the North-West Line of Railway; (2) the improved condition of the salt approaches, particularly that of the Cheyur pans; (3) a large demand for export: Messrs. Hazee Abdullah Hazee Abubaker and Co. purchased outright the whole stock of salt at Covelong and shipped it to Calcutta.

43. The Home and Inland consumption this year amounted to Maunds 14,38,044, or 61,372 Maunds more than Fusly 1277. The quantity exported in the Fusly under review was Maunds 3,07,050, or 2,19,142 Maunds more than in the previous Fusly. Most of this was exported to Calcutta.

- 44. Thus the whole quantity of salt in store during the Fusly was Maunds 29,00,667, or 7,96,769 Maunds less than in the previous Fusly.
- 45. The decrease in the quantity manufactured was Maunds 6,30,836, and is attributable to the fact that the Ennore bar was not opened until April, up to which time manufacture in the northern pans was suspended.
- 46. Kudiwaram paid for the manufacture of salt in Fusly 1278 amounted to Rs. 67,636, or Rupees 50,264 less than the previous Fusly, which is attributable to the large decrease in the quantity manufactured.
- 47. Deducting the gross charges, Rupees 2, 30, 282, from the gross revenue, Rupees 23, 55, 008, the net salt revenue for the Fusly amounts to Rupees 21, 24, 726, or Rupees 1, 77, 271 more than the previous Fusly. The excess is to be ascribed to the large increase in sales already noted.

48. The net increase in Stamp revenue is Rupees 18,933, and is due to increased sales.

Stamps.

License Tax.

49. The decrease of Rupees 7,590 is owing to the abolition of the fifth class in the

License Tax Act of 1868, whereby incomes under Rupees 500 were relieved from taxation.

Income-Tax.

50. The Income Tax Act was introduced in May 1869, in supersession of the License Tax Act of the previous year.

Remarks on the collections on account of the current femand.

52. The current demand for the Fusly under report is Rs. 49,40,611, of which Rs.46,47,886, or a little over 94 per cent., was realised within the Fusly, leaving a balance of Rupees 2,92,725, or about 6 per cent., at the close of the Fusly. Subsequent collections up to the end of August reduced this balance to Rupees 1,76,876, or 3½ per cent.

- 54. The balance of Rs. 25,892 against the late Abkarry contractor is probably withheld, pending the disposal of certain claims to compensation now before Government. however, is sufficient to cover the balance.
- 55. The Statement of the Demand and collections of Land and other sources of Revenue in the form prescribed by Board's Circular Memorandum, dated 30th June 1869, No. 689, is herewith submitted.

3. Arrears for Fusly 1273 standing in the accounts against Mooniappah Moodelliar and others, renters of the Shell quarries at Annamalaicherry, Ponneri Talook, remitted by the Board in their Proceedings, dated 27th November 1866, No. 8,534.	525	. 9	10)

The other minor items, amounting to Rupees 2,273-8-3, are detailed in the annexed explanatory statement.

Coercive process.

61. Coercive process was employed in 1,172 villages against 9,377 persons for the

recovery of arrears amounting to Rupees 1,49,655. The value of property attached was Rupees 1,67,359. The sale proceeds of property actually sold was Rupees 26,041, or Rupees 8,401 less than the previous Fusly.

62. With reference to Board's Circular No. 1 of 1869, (Standing No. 277-2,) paragraph 7, I have to state that nothing was collected on account of procees fees during the Fusly under review.

Statement No. 9.— Gross collections and charges.

63. The gross collections from all sources of revenue in Fusly 1278 was Rupees 49,74,689, or a net increase of Rupees 4,68,874, resulting from a gross increase of Rupees 4,76,464 against a gross decrease of Rupees 7,590. This decrease is in the item of License Tax, and has already been explained. In all other items there has been increase.

- 64. The gross charges amounted to Rupees 7,29,706, being a net increase of Rupees 1,617, resulting from a gross increase of Rupees 92,946 and a gross decrease of Rupees 91,329. The percentage of charges on the collections is $14\frac{1}{2}$, or $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. less than the previous Fusly. Deducting the gross charges, Rupees 7,29,706, from the gross collections, Rupees 49,74,689, the net revenue of the year is Rupees 42,44,983, or $85\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.
- 65. It will be observed that this statement exhibits the charges on account of License Tax as in excess of the collections. The cause is that the collections for the Town of Madras up to May inclusive were remitted to the Madras Bank. The collections for June alone are entered in column 2 of the Abstract, while the charges for the whole year, exclusive of the Collector's salary which was drawn from the Bank, are entered in column 5.
 - 66. I will now notice the causes of fluctuations in the principal items of charges.
- (1). Refunds of Revenue.—There is an increase of Rupees 4,789, the amount charged for waste and subsequently remitted.
- (2). Salaries of Collectors, etc.—The increase of Rupees 11,298 is attributable to the circumstance that three additional Assistant Collectors were posted to the district.
- (3). Tent and house-rent allowance—. The increase of Rupees 1,646 is to be ascribed to the same cause as that mentioned in the last item.
- (4). Huzoor and Talook Establishments.—The increase is Rupees 1,373 and is owing to pay of the temporary establishment sanctioned by Government in their Proceedings, No. 106, dated 13th January 1868, being for the whole year, whereas it was for only a portion of the previous Fusly.

Contingencies.

67. The increase of Rupees 3,750 in this item is owing to the following extra charges:—

- (1). Extra tentage of the Settlement Officer appointed for the settlement of boundary disputes between the Kalastry Zemindar and Government.
 - 2). The pay and batta of his establist ment.

Abkarry.

68. The increase of Rupees 25,208 is almost wholly ascribable to increased quantity of Colombo arrack purchased.

69. Decrease of Rupees 2,994 is chiefly owing to the reduction of establishment in April 1869.

Salt.

70. The increase of Rupees 1,662 on account of establishment is thus accounted for—

Arrears of pay due to the Superintendents of Kattur and Vadasamanjeri was disbursed in Fusly 1278, an Assistant Superintendent for Vichur was newly entertained, and the pay of other servants increased.

- 71. The decrease of Rs. 50,864 in the item "Purchase of Salt, etc.," and of Rs. 34,132 under the head "Charges for conveying and storing salt," is to be ascribed to the decrease in manufacture.
- 72. The decrease of Rupees 2,988 in charges for exporting salt is in consequence of no charge having been incurred under that head in Fusly 1278—Vide Notification of the Board of Revenue, dated 21st March 1868, published in the Fort Saint George Gazette of the 7th April 1868, page 856.
