9. The average rate of the retail sales of paddy grain in villages during the year under report was Rupees 1-4-6‡ per Tanjore kalam, or Rupees 148-12-5 per Madras garce, being, as shown in the margin, slightly in excess of the similar average rate of the preceding year, and no less than 166½ per cent. above the fixed commutation rate, which is Rupees 0-7-8½ per Tanjore kalam, and Rupees 55 12-11 per Madras garce.

10. The market selling price above mentioned, though decidedly high, has been only in keeping with what has been more or less maintained for the last ten or twelve years, and being the necessary result of the progressive state of the population and trade I do not imagine that any considerable falling off therein is within the bounds of probability.

Wages of labor,

11. The laboring classes have had ample employment within the district, while the

demands from Ceylon and other Colonies have been unceasing, and their condition, therefore, has not been injuriously affected by the high prices of food.

Ryots' holdings.

12. As will be seen from the following comparative table the aggregate of the ryots'

holdings during the year under report was 10,13,824 Acres, assessed at Rupees 39,36,003. This exhibits an increase of Rupees 9,306 over the preceding year, being the result of lands assessed at Rupees 5,826 given up or rendered unavailable for cultivation, against those assessed at Rupees 15,132 taken up:—

13. In waste remitted there is a decrease of Rupees 19,190 compared with the preceding

year, which, as well as the increase of Rupees 68,967 in actual cultivation, is due to the generally more favorable character of the season. In waste charged there is also a decrease of Rupees 40,354.

Settlement of Land Revenue.

14. The result in the aggregate of the settlement of the land revenue of this district,

under the head "Ryotwar," for the year under report is, as will be seen from the annexed statement, a decrease of Rupees 3,989 below the preceding year, arising from variations in the different component items, as particularized below.

16. Of the four items of increase above enumerated the first two have been already explained. The increase* in second crop assessment and water tax, and the decrease in shavy, etc., remissions (to be more particularly noticed hereafter) which comprize respectively the third and fourth items above specified, are likewise

attributable to the generally more favorable character of the season.

17. In the Road Fund, which also finds place in the statement appended to paragraph 14, there is an apparent increase of Rupees 1,16,556, which, however, is due partly to the fact that in the preceding year's statement the road cess on ryotwar lands alone was, erroneously entered; while in this year's statement the whole demand, including the cess on Inams, etc., is exhibited. It is due partly also to the demand for the preceding year having, under the Board's Proceedings

marginally noted, † been diminished by as much as had been collected in the year before over and above half the annual tax.

18. Under the head "Land Revenue, Miscellaneous," last entered in the statement above referred to, there is a small increase of Rupecs 1,569. The variations in the several component items, of which this increase is the result in the aggregate, have been fully explained in statement No. 5, and no special notice here under this head seems, therefore, necessary.

- Special products.

19. The extent to which special products were cultivated during the past year is shown

in the subjoined table in comparison with the year preceding, from which it will be seen that there is an increase in cotton and indigo, with a decrease in sugar. The cultivation of these products, however, is carried on in this district to such a limited extent that these variations, in themselves unimportant, call for no particular remark.

With reference to the Board's Circular Memorandum, dated the 23rd October 1866, No. 1,064, beg here to state that no tanks, ruined or otherwise, were made over to the ryots during the past year on the terms sanctioned in the Proceedings of Government.

Remissions.

21. The amount remitted under the head of Shavy was Rupees 25,798, which, plus the

small sum of Rupees 637 remitted on account of Fassul Cummy and Rupees 26,283 for waste remitted, makes up a total of Rupees 52,718 against Rupees 1,21,538, which was the amount of remissions granted in the preceding year. This satisfactory result of the settlement of the year under report is due to the generally favorable character of the past season compared with the year preceding, which was exceptionally bad for the upland parts of the district, and in which, therefore, special measures of relief were accorded with respect to dry lands.

General Abstract of all heads of Revenue.

22. The following general abstract shows in one view the result of the settlement under

the several heads of Land Revenue, as well as Extra Sources, in comparison with the year preceding:—

Land Revenue.

23. The variations under the two heads of Land Revenue, viz., "Ryotwar" and "Miscel-

laneous," have been already noticed; the Peshcush is an item not liable to any variation, and the decrease of Rupees 6 under the head of Jody is too small to need any explanation.

Abkarry.

24. The increase of Rupees 3,725 under the head of Abkarry is the result of higher bids

obtained for some of the farms sold in consequence of the expiry of previous leases.

Income Tax.

25. The amount which appears under the head of Income Tax consists only of deductions

made from the salaries of Government officials under Act IX. of 1869, since that Act, as regards other incomes, was not brought into actual operation before the close of the Fusly.

License Tax.

26. The increase of Rupees 12,467 under the head of License Tax, as compared with the

preceding year, is due to the fact that, owing to the Certificate Tax Act of 1868 having been brought into operation at a later date in the year than was the License Tax Act of 1867 during the preced-

ing year, a larger proportion of assessments under the Act first mentioned were made during the Fusly year or subsequent to 30th June 1868.

Sea Customs.

The increase of Rupees 32,182 under the head of Sea Customs is the net result of a gross increase of Rupees 54,519 in exports against a gross decrease of Rupees 20,581 in imports, plus a further decrease of Rupees 1,756 under the head "Miscellaneous." The increase first mentioned arises chiefly from the increased exportation of rice and paddy to Ceylon, while the decrease in imports is due to the diminished importation of various articles of import trade, (of which the most important are betel-nuts,) as also to the exemption of timber from import duty by

Act XI. of 1868, counter-balanced by a small increase in the importation of piece goods and sundry other articles.

Land Customs.

28. The increase of Rupees 7,728 under the head of Land Custems is due to the increased

exportation of rice and grain to the French Settlement of Karikal and thence by sea to Ceylon,

counter-balanced by a falling off in sundry articles of import.

Salt. 29. The falling off of Rupees 42,847 in the Salt revenue is due partly to the fact that

the sales in the southern and northernmost-depôts in the preceding year were exceptionally large, and were, as a necessary consequence, followed by a corresponding falling off during the year under report, and partly to the Great Southern of India Railway having to compete with the Madras Railway at a disadvantage with regard to the cost of carriage of salt to Western Districts. It is in a measure due also to illicit manufacture of earth salt and theft of salt spontaneously produced on the coast, both of which practices there is reason to fear are to some extent carried on in certain out-of-the-way localities. I have adopted all practicable measures with a view to the detection and suppression of these practices.

Stamps.

30. The increase of Rupees 58,805 in Stamp revenue is due chiefly to increased litigation arising out of the ordinary contingencies of society, as also to stricter compliance with the requirements of the Stamp law in private transactions under the operation of its penal provisions now generally more rigidly enforced. The suits which have been filed during the year under report for the recovery of arrears of rent due to the estate of His Highness the late Rajah of Tanjore, and which had accumulated to a considerable extent in consequence of the neglected state of the affairs of his family, are alone computed to have cost about Rupees 25,000 for stamps, and the Abkarry engagements, renewed in consequence of the resale of the farms, have on a rough calculation contributed about Rupees 8,500 to this branch of the public revenue.

Demand and Collection.

31. The entire demand, comprising all Sources of revenue, amounted to Rs. 68,76,910 against Rupees 68,05,193 in the preceding year, thus exhibiting an increase in the aggregate of Rupes 71,717. Of the total demand Rupees 67,85,368 were realised within the year, leaving at its close a balance of Rupees 91,542 distributed between the two heads of Land and Abkarry, as shown in the margin. The balance

under the head last mentioned has since been collected, and the Land Revenue balance has, by subsequent collections up to the 20th instant, been reduced to Rupees 19,971 -a result which I am sure will be deemed satisfactory, considering that it is the balance of a demand amounting to very nearly forty-two and a half lacs, and bears to it a percentage of less than half. The balance last mentioned is in course of realization, and will be realised with the exception of such a small portion as may have to be written off by reason of its being absolutely irrecoverable.

The arrears of Land Revenue for previous years, as they outstood at the beginning of the year under report, amounted to Rupees 1,80,720, of which Rupees 1,68,752 have been collected up to the 20th instant, and a further sum of Rupees 3,524 has been remitted under the sanction* of Government marginally noted, thus leaving a balance of Rupees 8,444. Of this last mentioned sum Rupees 8,064 are recoverable, and the remaining balance, viz, Rupees 380, † as per separate explanatory statement, t being irrecoverable I beg that sanction may be obtained for its being remitted.

33. The marginal table shows the extent to which coercive process was employed in the realization of arrears of revenue during the past and preceding years, and calls for no special remark. I must, however, here add that in those parts of the district which are either indifferently irrigated or are dependant entirely on falling rains, and where, therefore, owing to the generally scanty yield of the harvest the ryots have been unable to realize the benefits of high prices, some difficulty has been experienced in collecting the Government demand, and that the very satisfactory state of the collections

nevertheless thus really testifies to the efficiency of the generality of Revenue Officers of the district.

Receipts and Charges, 34. The actual receipts and charges under

each head of Revenue are exhibited in the annexed comparative table, from which it will be seen that the total receipts amounted to Rupees 69, 69, 767, while the total charges amounted to Rupees 6, 68, 682, being about 91 per cent. on the former :-

Receipts-Land Revenue.

35. The receipts under the head of Land Revenue show an increase of Rupees 31,870,

notwithstanding that the amount of arrears which outstood at the beginning of the year was much smaller than in the year preceding, and that the demand for the year was much smaller than in the year preceding, and that the demand for the year was slightly below that of the preceding year. This is due entirely to the more punctual realization of the demand.

Abkarry.

36. Under the head of Abkarry there is a decrease of Rupees 5,414, which is accounted

for by the fact that the amount of arrears which remained to be collected on account of the previous years was smaller than in the year preceding.

Other heads of Revenue.

37. The variations in the receipts under other heads of Revenue having already been

explained under the head of Settlement need no recapitulation here.

Charges-Land Revenue.

38. In Land Revenue charges there is a net decrease of Rupees 7,978, arising out of a

gross decrease of Rupees 17,507, made up of the items enumerated below, against a gross increase of Rupees 9,529.

The decrease in Land Custom charges is to inconsiderable to require any notice. Salt. 42. In Salt charges there appears on the whole a net increase of only Rupees 1,619; the gross increase of nearly Rupees 17,000 arising chiefly from enlarged expenditure on " Petty Construction and Repair," and the transportation of Vedarniem salt to Negapatam on Government account, being nearly counter-balanced by the saving effected in consequence of the charges of shipping salt sold for export trade having ceased to be borne by Government, and by diminished expenditure for kudiwaram, consequent on a diminished out-turn of salt.

43. The increase of Rupees 5,746 in Stamp charges consists of Rupees 1,798 in the item of discount allowed to vendors, (which bears a corresponding proportion to the sales,) and Rupees 3,990

in that of refunds—an item of a contingent nature—counter-balanced by a small decrease of Rs. 42 in contingent expenses.

> License Tax, 44. Thecharges under the head of License Tax representsmerely refunds made on objection

petitions and appeals, and the item being in its nature variable the decrease of Rupees 1,357, which appears under this head, needs no remark.

Landed property acquired by Public Servants. 45. The subjoined table shows the amount of landed property acquired by public servants during the year under report. The rules on the subject of returns being rendered for such acquisitions have been duly observed by all persons concerned, though in some few instances those holding inferior appointments on the Talook and Village establishments have, from misapprehension of the rules, not kept to the prescribed date. Due notice has been taken of mistake s thus made, and the rules have been again re-published, with instructions calling the prominen t attention of all public servants thereto.

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SUB-COLLECTORATE.

I HAVE the honour to submit the Annual Report on the Settlement of Land and extra sources of Revenue in the Sub-division of Tanjore for Fusly 1278, (1868-69,) together with the several Statements and their enclosures prepared in the prescribed forms.

2. In the year under report an attempt was made to get through the Jummahbundy earlier than usual. Petitions for remissions on account of waste and shavy were received up to the end of January, and were forwarded to the Tahsildars for examination about the beginning of February. They were reported upon in the early part of March, and the distribution of puttahs commenced soon after and continued to the 21st of May; whilst in the Fusly preceding the

distribution of puttahs did not begin till the 4th of May. The settlement of both the talooks of the Sub-division was conducted by my predecessor, Mr. Best, at the places noted in the margin.

- 3. The total number of puttahs issued during the year under report was 25,146 against 24,368 of the preceding year, the increase of 778 being the result of separate registration of sub-divisions of holdings and similar causes. The number of puttahs that remained unaltered is 16,815. Of the remaining 8,331 the alterations required were in 6,554 cases made in the old puttahs, and in 1,777 cases fresh puttahs were given.

5. Under the head of Amany there was in Fusly 1277 one hamlet of 29 Acres, but in Fusly 1278 one of its Merassidars came forward and signed the Izara Muchilka for his particular holdings, thus converting it from Amany to Mottamfysal. With this exception there was no alteration in the area of the different villages.

Season.

6. The rain-fall was good, amounting to 35 inches, which was a great improvement on the scarcity of the previous year, as will be seen from the enclosed statement:—

Sanitary.

7. The sanitary condition of the Sub-division during the past Fusly was decidedly good, and

even better than that of Fusly 1277. There has been no cholera to speak of during the year under report, whilst 1,286 deaths took place in the previous Fusly by this disease. Considerable attention was paid to the arrangements directed to be made by the late Sanitary Committee in anticipation of the attendance of crowds at the festivals which are annually celebrated at Nagore, Valangany, and Trivalore, and it appears that not a single death was reported in any of these occasions last Fusly. There are also great facilities now for the use of European medicine and treatment, and they are more made use of by the native community in the large towns of Nagore and Negapatam.

8. There appears to have been more deaths last Fusly than in the preceding one from small-pox and fever. It is to be hoped, therefore, that the Vaccination establishment will soon visit this district. Mr. Best did attempt last Jummahbundy to get the ryots to subscribe funds for maintaining a Vaccinator at their own expense, but this they were unwilling to do, and I am afraid cannot be expected. The deaths which occurred by other causes do not require any remarks. Cattle appear to have been altogether free from disease.

Prices

9. The following statement shows that prices of all kinds of grain have considerably fallen during the year under report:—

previous Fusly, though 169 per cent. above what is called the standard price. Prices, therefore, are still high, though slightly easier than what were caused by the indifferent harvests and scanty rain-fall of the previous years. In the year under report the average price of paddy was 13 per cent. below that of the Ryots' holdings.

10. The annexed table exhibits the operations of the year with regard to Ryots' holdings:—

- 11. The extent of ryots' holdings at the end of Fusly 1277, as entered in the last Jummah-bundy Report, was Acres 2,27,569, assessed at Rupees 10,79,137. These figures would usually be entered as the ryots' holdings at the beginning of the next Fusly, but as some Amany land was converted into Mottamfysal last Fusly this extent was transferred from Amany to Ryotwary, and produces the differences observable.
- 12. Besides the addition of these Acres 18, assessed at Rupees 117, Acres 5,162, assessed at Rupees 22,046, were newly taken up, and Acres 4,296, assessed at Rupees 19,482, relinquished during the year under report, thus causing on the whole a net increase of Acres 884, assessed at Rupees 2,681, in the aggregate of ryots' holdings, as compared with that of the year preceding.
- 13. With regard to the entry "Waste remitted Acres 575, assessed at Rupees 2,359," it may appear strange that there was any remission at all in such a favorable season; by t the fact is that there is a great deal of land (especially in the Negapatam Talook) rated as Nurjah, which seldom has a chance of a fair supply of water. It is said that the supply channels are in bad order and silted up, but I do not think that this is the case to any large extent. If this were really all that was wanted the ryots would probably take the matter in hand forthwith and clear out the channels themselves, if thereby they could secure a crop. The real fact seems to be that this land is incapable of being irrigated, owing to its being on too high a level, and all the water is drawn off to the lower lying land which secures its two crops, while this land has none. Properly speaking two crops ought not to be allowed until all the land has had one crop, and the owners of low-lying land ought to abstain from taking more water than what they want for their first crop; but this is not attended to, and there is no one to enforce it, the consequence of which is that practically this higher land is incapable of wet cultivation, as nothing short of a deluge would irrigate it. This last year proves the point conclusively; the rain-fall was large, amounting to 35 inches, and the freshes were plentiful and seasonable. It is clear, therefore, that if the land could not be irrigated this year it never can be irrigated, and it will be better, therefore, at once to transfer it to the head of Poonjah. This would be in accordance with the principles laid down by the Board of Revenue, No. 134, of Dalyell's compilation; for although the irrigation work may not have been destroyed or injured, yet it may fairly be said that it is incapable of irrigating this land. This course would be far better than the present system of keeping it classed as Nunjah and then remitting the assessment regularly year by year, however good the season may have been. I therefore propose to look into these cases, and wherever remission has been given for five years at once to rate the land as P6onjah, so that at any rate that assessment may be secured regularly in future instead of, as at present, the land being kept permanently waste. If in any year the rain-fall or the freshes are so excessive as to allow of paddy being grown on this land it would be very easy to charge the kasr or water-rate for that one exceptional year, but such an occurrence is not to be expected; and even by that arrangement the ryots would gain, as the charge is particularly low in this district, being only Rupees 1-14-3 an Acre, whereas in other districts it is 5 Rupees a cawny, or Rupees 3-12-6 the Acre. As it is many ryots would willingly grow Poonjah crops on such land, but are prevented from doing so by the present rules, which make the ryot liable for the full Nunjah assessment if any kind of crop is raised, even a Poonjah one. As, therefore, it would not pay them well to raise a Poonjah crop and pay the Nunjah assessment they prefer to leave the whole waste, and get the whole assessment remitted. The transfer after all would only do what is being aimed at in the present Survey and Settlement Department, namely, put into a proper class land which has been incorrectly rated before.

Actual cultivation.

14. In the extent of cultivation there is an increase of Acres 4,969 and Rupees 18,195. This arises from the decrease of Acres 1,797 and Rupees 6,815 in waste remitted, plus the decrease Acres 2,288 and Rupees 8,699 in waste charged being added to Acres 884 and Rupees 2,681, which is the excess of land taken up over lands given up during the year under report.

15. The following remissions were also granted during the year under report :-

16. The increase in the amount of remission granted for shavy and second crop is so small that it requires no explanation here. The decrease in the amount of remission granted for the Katgutgai Kadarambam villages of the Negapatam Talook is owing to the special privilege of a percentage remission allowed by the Board of Revenue last year for the above villages not having been granted in the year under report.

17. The following abstract statement shows in one view the particulars of cultivation and settlement of Fusly 1278, as compared with those of the year preceding:—

• 18. The settlement of land revenue, it will be observed, has resulted in a nominal net increase of Rupees 4,165, but in the statement two items appear under the heads of "Increase" and "Decrease," which are brought in merely to balance accounts and do not constitute any part of the actual increase or decrease in the revenue as settled during the year under report. These two entries must, therefore, be noticed in the first instance.

Road cess.

19. One of these is the remission on account of road cess. This was given in Fusly

1277, simply because an over-collection was made in the preceding Fusly by mistake. In the past Fusly, however, no remission was given in this way, and consequently the very large sum of Rupees 12,067 appear under the head of "Decrease."

Village establishment.

20. So also there is a large increase of Rupees 23,096 under the head of Deduction on

account of the salary of the village establishment: this is owing to that sum having been deducted from the Jummahbundy of the past Fusly and carried to the credit of "Village Service Fand" under a Circular Order issued by the Board of Revenue, whilst such was not done in the year preceding.

- 21. Hence excluding these two amounts it will appear that there has been a real increase of as large a sum as Rupees 15,194. This is principally owing to the large decrease in remissions for waste and shavy.
- 22. The increase in the assessment of the ryots' holdings, and the decrease in the different kinds of remissions granted, have been fully explained. The slight increase in Fasul jasti and Water tax is owing mainly to the favorable character of the season. The increase in the Road cess is the amount charged on the additional land brought under cultivation during the year under report. The excess of Rupees 608 in Miscellaneous items consists of various small sums which call for no remark.

Special products.

23. Special products are not cultivated in this district to any great extent. The annexed

tabular statement shows the extent to which sugar-cane, indigo, and cotton were cultivated in this division during the past and preceding years:—

25. The only item of land revenue which requires an explanation is that of "Ryotwar," wherein there is a decrease of Rupees 8,959. This arises from an increase of Rupees 15,194 in the settlement of the past Fusly, (paragraph 21,) minus excess of Road cess (Rupees 449) and of Miscellaneous (Rupees 608) being counter-balanced by Rupees 23,096, which is the pay of village establishment deducted from the Jummahbundy and carried to the credit of Village Service Fund.

Abkarry.

26. The increase of Rupees 199 under Abkarry is accounted for by an increase in the fees

paid on account of licenses for selling English liquors, etc.

Sea Customs.

27. Under the head of Sea Customs there is an increase of Rupees 32,657 observable.

28. The falling off in the Import duty on betel-nut is owing, firstly, to a Board's order of 1868, directing that the value of this article should be estimated according to the Tariff rate of 7 Rupees per cwt., and not according to the market price as formerly; and, secondly, to the still further reduction of the rate from 7 Rupees to $5\frac{1}{2}$ in the Tariff of 1869: that on Timber is on account of the exemption of that article from duty by Act XI. of 1868: that on Railway stores is owing to the completion of the railway line from Negapatam to Erode: the increase on Grain, export duty, arises from an increased demand in, and consequent exportation to, Ceylon. The other items require no notice.

Land Customs.

29. There is an increase of Rupees 7,418 in the Land Customs. Almost the same causes which operated to bring about a rise in the Sea Customs collections have contributed to bring about this result in the Land Customs.

Stamps. 30. The increase of Rupees 19,501 in the Stamp revenue is due partly to the fale of the Abkarry farm and the consequent renewal of shopkeepers' Muchilkas, partly to the stricter enforcement of the provisions of the Stamp Act, and partly to increased litigation.

License Tax, Certificate Tax, and Income Tax.

31. The collections under these heads call for no remark. The collections under the Income Tax Act (IX. of 1869) had only just been commenced when the Fusly closed.

Road cess.

32. The decrease of Rupees 12,571 under Inam Road Cess arises from the fact of the cess due for Fusly 1266, together with certain penalties awarded under Act III. of 1866, having been included in the demand for Fusly 1277; whilst the tax due for Fusly 1278 only has been entered in the demand for that Fusly.

Arrears collection.

36. The arrears outstanding at the close of the Fusly 1277 amounted to Rupees 28,100.

Of this Rupees 27,778 have been collected, and Rupees 322 have been struck off the accounts. There is still an irrecoverable balance of 2 Annas, being the quit-rent of a certain piece of land for Fusly 1277 by mistake included in the demand, although it had been converted into a free-hold from the beginning of that Fusly. It is, therefore, requested that permission may be granted to strike off the said sum of Annas 2 from the accounts.

37. The extent to which coercive process was employed in the realization of arrears of land revenue during the past and preceding years is given below. It should be stated here that no money was collected on account of batta for process servers, as all notices issued under Act II. of

TRICHINOPOLY.

I have the honor to submit my Report on the Revenue Settlement of this District for Fusly 1278, (1868-69,) with the prescribed Statements.

Officers by whom, and stations where, the settlement was 2. This statement shows the Officers by conducted .- Statement No. 1. whom, and the stations where, the settlement of each talook was conducted, the period occupied by the settlement, and the number of puttahs distributed.

3. I settled the talooks of Trichinopoly, Kulitallay, and Perambaloor; the Acting Head Assistant Collector, Mr. Martin, settled the talook of Moosery; and Mahomed Esuf, the Deputy Collector, settled the Woodiarpolliem Talook.

Variations in the number and tenure of Villages.

Puttahs,

4. No variations took place during the Fusly in the number and tenure of villages.

5. Puttahs and kutchats in the new bookform were issued to the ryots this year, agreeably to the instructions contained in Board's Circular Memorandum, No. 1,206, dated 3rd December 1866, and Board's Proceedings, No. 5,811, dated 10th August 1868.

form, exclusive of the value of paper and pasteboard supplied from the stationery, was Rupees 414-9-11, and the price realized by the issue of these puttahs and kutchats amounted to Rupees 3, 160-14-0. This satisfactory result is owing to all the lower Cutcherry servants having lent a hand in sewing, cutting, and bind-

ing; and to Captain Walters, the Jail Superintendent, having greatly aided me with convict labor.

Although the statement exhibits a small decrease in the average rain-fall during the Fusly, yet the rains were on the whole more evenly distributed throughout the year, whereas one or two heavy down-pours during the preceding Fusly tended to raise the average of that season.

Season.

7. The season was very favorable for the early crops, but not so with regard to those of

later date. The failure of the looked-for rains in November and December was much felt. Fortunately, however, the river springs, nourished by the plentiful south-west monsoon, afforded a bountiful supply, which, when diverted from the river beds by the coramboos or temporary dams, caused a good flow of water to be kept up in the irrigation channels until the very close of the cultivating season. The beneficial effects of these ancient native methods of irrigation were never more clearly manifested than during the cast year.

Sanitary condition.

8. In a sanitary point of view the twelve months under report were unusually fortunate.

The district was remarkably free from all epidemics, and only a very few cases of cholera have been reported during this period. Not a single instance of cholera occurred within the densely populated municipality, and the thickly crowded festival at Sreerungum was totally free from this disease. The cattle also were healthy and their numbers undiminished by any murrain or disease.

Emigration.

9. The number of emigrants during the year was only 169. Owing partly to the facilities

now afforded to the poorer classes to become land-holders on their own behalf, in consequence of the lightened assessment and the proper working of the Durkhast rules, and owing also to working people finding sufficient labor near home, especially on the Railway and in the Public Works Department, very few people were seduced away from this province by the legalized crimps or maistries.

Prices.-Statement No. 2

10. The prices of all food grains ruled much lower than during the preceding Fusly,

The 1st and 2nd sort paddy fell 7 and 8 per cent. respectively, as compared with the preceding Fusly, although these prices were still 8 and 10 per cent. higher than the averages of the last ten years. Dry grains fell from 2 to 7 per cent. below last Fusly, being nevertheless 2 to 8 per cent. higher than the averages of the last ten years. This is attributable partly to the increase

in the out-turn of the early crops in the upland parts of the district, and partly to the large importations of paddy from Tanjore, which more than compensated for the exportations to the southwards from this province. When the prices actually realized during the year are compared with the commutation rate upon which the new settlement was based, we find that wet grains averaged thrice and dry grains between twice and thrice this settlement standard, thus most amply compensating the cultivating classes for any deficiency in out-turn, owing to diminished rain-fall during the close of the season.

The average prices of paddy and rice of the 1st sort, as given in this statement, do not tally with the averages of those prices as given in the monthly Demand, Collection, and Balance Statements submitted to the Board. The prices of 1st sort paddy and rice were being erroneously entered as prices of 2nd sort paddy and rice in the Price Returns of the Woodiarpolliem Talook from month to month. This mistake was subsequently discovered, and is rectified in this statement. Hence the difference.

Ryots' Holdings. -Statement No. 3.

11. The aggregate extent of land in the ryots' holdings at the commencement of the

Fusly was 9,31,897 acres, assessed at Rs. 12,94,616, of which 25,473 acres, assessed at Rs. 24,959, were relinquished, and 44,343 acres, assessed at Rupees 42,122, were newly brought under the plough. Thus the actual extent of land under this head at the close of the Fusly was 9,50,767 acres, with an assessment of Rupees 13,11,779, or 18,870 acres, assessed at Rupees 17,163, in excess of the preceding Fusly.

The Board are doubtless aware that though they have prohibited the "Podoogal" or "Fallow" system it still goes on merrily in an indirect way; the holder gives Razeenamah one year for the land he elects to retain as fallow, and takes it up the next. Most frequently no one else in the village knows of this relinquishment but the Curnum, and in order to stop this arrangement to some extent I have ordered the Razeenamahs to be published in the village, thus letting the neighbours know what has been given up, and what is consequently available to their hands; hitherto all has been kept dark.

Land transferred.—Statement 3 A.

12. This statement shows that out of the 25,473 acres of land entered under the head

of "Lands given up" 15 acres, assessed at Rupees 78, have been transferred to that of "Inam." This is caused by certain lands having been purchased and made over partly as compensation for certain Inams taken up for the Railway, and partly for Inams allotted to the

Devastanum.* The remaining extent of land

under the above head consists chiefly of the following items:—

A .- Lands relinquished on Razeenamahs.

- B.—Lands taken up by Government for the Lunatic Asylum, and for the construction of certain roads
- C.—Lands purchased on behalf of Government in consequence of there having been no bidders for them at the sales held for the realization of the arrears of revenue.

The lands forming the last item are utterly unfit for cultivation, and are lying waste. Hence they are included under the head of "Lands given up."

Remissions necessary only to the sum of Rupees 400.

13. The actual concessions granted this year were next to nothing, only about Rs. 400.

Fortunately for this district the ryots have been given firmly to understand that one of the objects of a lightened assessment was the abolition of these annual alleviations. Thus during the present season remissions were neither asked for by the ryots, nor proffered by the native officials. I only trust that when both the revised settlement and those that took part in it have become things of the past that the old system of remissions, so dear to the hearts of the native subordinates, will not again be brought into existence with all its attendant iniquities.

SETTLEMENT REPORT OF

Waste remitted.

14. The sum of Rupees 418 was remitted in the Moosery Talook by the Acting Head Assistant

Collector, after he had ascertained that the lands in question had suffered from want of water, owing to breaches in the banks of the tanks upon which this cultivation was depending. This itemeof Rupees 418 was the total amount of actual land revenue foregone at the annual settlement. The other remissions are merely comparative deficiencies between this Fusly and last, and they speedily changed into large augmentations of revenue when examinations regarding them were strictly made.

Waste charged.

15. Waste land to the amount of acres 87,833, assessed at Rupees 72,223-13-0, was

charged during the Fusly under report. This, compared with the extent charged in the previous Fusly, shows an increase of acres 11,713, assessed at Rupees 17,024, which is attributable to the causes detailed in paragraph 13 of this report, and to the fact that with a light assessment the ryot, if left to himself, is perfectly willing to pay for what he really elects to hold, without making any trouble or solicitations for remission. Again, with our present low rates of Poonjah assessment large tracts of waste dry land are retained in the puttahs of the ryots for pasturage for their cattle, and for these acres of grass land the owners are only too happy to pay.

The actual cultivation exhibits an increase of 23,388 acres, assessed at Rupees 29,057. This is attributable partly to the favorable nature of the season at its outset, and partly to the steady increase in the extent of land taken up for cultivation consequent on the lightened assessment under the new settlement. Nevertheless much remains to be done to effect the fulfilment of

17. There is an increase in the cultivated area under indigo and sugar-cane. This is attributable partly to the season having been more Cultivation of special Products.—Statement No. 3, Enclosure B.

Cultivation of special Products.—Statement No. 3, Enclosure B.

The cultivated area of cotton, as shown in the statement now submitted, is less by 3,008 acres, assessed at Rupees 3,587, than the aggregate area made up from the monthly statements submitted to the Board. This is owing to the cultivation of "Ottadum," or cotton sown together with other crops having been included under this head in the aforementioned monthly statements, whereas it is altogether excluded from the present return.

Irrigation Works.

18. The subjoined statement shows the principal sources of irrigation with the extent of cultivation and assessment dependent upon each.

Ruined Tanks.

19. Only one ruined tank was asked for under the Board's rules, and the applicant

afterwards repented of his request and cried off; the fact is the present Nunjah assessment is so light that the indulgent standard of Rupe 2 per acre for the tax under these privately restored reservoirs is no indulgence at all in the eyes of our cultivators.

Remissions.-Statement No. 4.

20. As already mentioned in paragraph 13 no remissions were granted this year on

account of waste or shayy. A sum of Rupees 4 is entered under the head of "Tarum Cummy." This is twing to a certain field which was erroneously entered in the accounts as "Permanently improved Punjah" having been now brought under the head of Ordinary Punjah. It will appear from this statement that the remissions under the heads of "Fasal Cummy or second crop not cultivated," and Water Tax," exceeded those of the preceding Fusly under the corresponding heads by Rupees 2,657 and Rupees 2,254 respectively. This naturally attracted my attention, and inquiry speedily showed that the Curnums had been committing wholesale frauds in keeping back from the accounts both wet lands cultivated with second crops, and dry lands irrigated by Government water. The scrutiny very soon more than compensated for the amount thus said to be deficient under these heads, and the examinations thereby inaugurated have already recovered Rupees 65,000 otherwise lost to Government, as will be detailed hereafter.

Statement No. 5.

21. This statement shows the demand, collection, and balance of the "Land Revenue

Miscellaneous items." In the item "Jody on sundry Inams" the amounts of demand on account

of Personal and Service Inams, under the head of Arrears, do not tally with the corresponding amounts entered under the head of Balance in the statement for the preceding Fusly. This is owing to a sum of Rupees 189, which ought to have been brought under the item "Personal," having been erroneously included under the item of "Service" in the statement submitted last year. This mistake has been corrected in this statement.

The aggregate amount of demand was Rupees 61,051, or an increase of Rupees 14,340, as compared with that of the preceding Fusly. The causes of this augmentation are as follow:—

The increase of Rupees 12,008, under the item "Land cultivated but not included in the Jummahbundy," is attributable partly to the settlement having been made very early this year, but mainly to the commencement of the investigations after the settlement, which so frightened some of the Curnums into propriety that they hastened to bring to account what they had wittingly left out, lest their fraudulent omissions should be detected by the Examiners.

The increase of Rupees 1,397, under the head of "Revenue fines," is owing to the fines imposed on village servants under Regulation IX. of 1822 for frauds brought to light by the present Azmaish.

Similarly the increase of Rupees 1,534, under the head of Inam Water-rate, is owing to this subject having been taken in hand by the Azmaishdars, who have also, subsequently to the close of the Fusly, discovered large tracts of Inam lands annually watered from Government sources free of charge. The balance of Rupees 2,364 is almost entirely due upon the Inam village of Daranelloor. I have already addressed the Board upon this matter, and they have submitted it to Government with recommendation for realization by sale of the lands concerned.

The differences under the remaining items being comparatively slight call for no remarks.

Zemindaries, Mootahs, etc.—Statement No. 6.

22. This statement exhibits a balance of Rupees 8,882 at the close of the Fusly, of which

Rupees 3,747 have been since realized, and the balance of Rupees 5,135 is under collection.

Permanently settled.

24. The decrease of Rupees 3,287, under the head of "Permanently settled," is owing to

the collection under this head in the preceding Fusly having included the realization of the arrears of the previous Fusly.

Ryotwar and Miscellaneous.

There is an increase of Rupees 1,20,363 under the head of Ryotwar, and of Rupees 16,084

under that of Miscellaneous. This must be attributed to an earlier settlement, and to greater exertions having been made in realizing the kists with punctuality. I had at one time hoped to

have collected all the land revenue within the Revenue year, but the Woodiarpolliem Tahsildar failed me, although the others did right well, particularly the Moosery Tahsildar. But the

Board's orders,* preventing our acting in accordance with the provisions of the law for the realization of arrears, tends to prevent any

remarkably satisfactory collection result at the close of the year.

Abkarry.

The decrease of Rupees 5,754 in the item of "Abkarry" is due to the fact that there

were less arrears to be collected than during the preceding Fusly.

License Tax.

There is a decrease of Rupees 7,100 under

the head of "License Tax," and an increase of Rupees 5,958 under that of "Profession and Trade Tax." This is owing to Act XXI. of 1867 having been repealed, and Act IX. of 1868 having come into force in May 1868.

Income Tax.

A sum of Rupees 943 was collected during the Fusly on account of Income Tax, which came into force in April last.

Stamps.

The increase of Rupees 15,6/5 under "Stamps" is the result of the Stamp law being

more correctly understood by the people, and more strictly carried out by the authorities. Notice is, moreover, taken of deficient stamps brought for registration, and an additional Moonsiff's Court * has lately been opened at Trichinopoly itself.

Statement No. 7.

25. There is a balance of Rupees 42,726 on account of all sources of revenue at the close

of the Fusly. Of this sum Rupees 14,358 were realized up to 31st July last, and the balasce, viz., Rupees 28,368, is under collection. A statement showing the Talookwar particulars of the demand and collections of land and other sources of revenue is submitted agreeably to the instructions contained in Board's Circular Memorandum, No. 689, dated 30th June 1839. The Enclosure A. of Statement No. 7 is not forwarded, as the Board consider it to be unnecessary.

Arrears. - Statement No. 8.

There was a balance of 63,119-9-3 on account of all sources of revenue

at the beginning of the Fusly. Of this sum Rupees 57,911-15-1 have been collected, leaving a balance of Rupees 5,207-10-2, of which Rupees 4,261-11-5 are recoverable, Rupees 372-5-3 are doubtful, and Rupees 573-9-6 are irrecoverable, in consequence of death, desertion, and poverty of the defaulting ryots.

A sum of Rupees 1,860-9-4 was recommended for remission in last Fusly, and sanction was received only for Rupees 1,727-4-10. The remaining sum of Rupees 133-4-6 consisted, as stated in paragraph 40 of the Jummahbundy Report for the last Fusly, of trifling sums over-collected up to Fusly 1276 from certain ryots, and erroneously credited to the balance due by other ryots, and is irrecoverable. I beg, therefore, to request the sanction of the Board for the remission of Rupees 706-14-0 in the aggregate.

Coercive Process .- Statement No. 8 A.

27. The number of cases in which coercive process had to be employed this year was

1,533, and the amount of arrears, for the recovery of which such measures, were resorted to, was Rupees 18,472. The value of property, both real and personal, attached amounted to Rupees 11,116, while the value of property actually sold amounted to Rupees 4,737, or Rupees 2,322 less than the value of property sold last year.

Vide Board's Proceedings, No. 62, dated 8th January 1869.

28. A sum of Rupees 4,888 was realized from revenue defaulters for the services of pro-

cesses, etc, under Madras Act II. of 1864, of which Rupees 4,291 were paid to persons deputed under the Act. There is thus a balance of Rupees 597 under the head of "Process Service Fund."

Statement No. 9.

29. The gross collections from all sources of revenue amounted to Rupees 17,56,204,

and the aggregate charges to Rupees 1,58,006, thus leaving a balance of Rupees 15,98,198 at the close of the Fusly.

There is an increase of Rupees 24,327 in item "Salary of the Collectors, etc." This is owing to the salary of Mr. Cadell, the Acting Civil and Session Judge of this district, and the permanent Collector of the district of South Canara, having been debited under this item.

The decrease of Rupees 1,450 in the item "Huzoor and Talook establishments" is owing to the salary of the Tahsildar of Kulitallay having not been drawn during the Fusly owing to his absence on leave.

The increase of Rupees 1,885 in the item "Miscellaneous" is attributable to the batta paid to the Tahsildars and Merassidars who attended the Public Works Commission at Madras from this district.

The differences in the other items call for no special remarks.

Talook and Village Accounts.

30. The Village and Talook accounts were in most instances found to be correctly kept.

Land acquired by public servants.

31. No lands were acquired by public servants during the Fusly under report.

Remarks regarding the Revenue investigations now in progress.

32. In conclusion, I must bring to the Board's notice that I found the annual exami-

nations of cultivation were but nominal, and that the only result was the realization of small illicit gains by the examining officers. I finished the settlement very early this year, and called upon the Curtums to furnish within a fixed time correct accounts of concealed cultivation, and of such Porambeke lands as are referred to in paragraph 63 of Mr. Puckle's report, dated 30th May 1865. I also deputed as many Cutcherry servants and Talook Goomastahs as could be possibly spared for the purposes of examining into the above items, but these hands were manifestly insufficient for such a task.

Mr. Master was kind enough at this juncture to place at my disposal the services of the settlement party at Salem, and a strict examination which is still progressing was set on foot.

The result was the discovery of annual defalcations in the following instances :-

- (1.)—Lands improperly deducted at the new settlement as "Uncultivable," when in reality they are and always have been double crop wet lands.
- (2.) Dry lands irrigated by Government water without being charged the proper waterrate.
- (3.)—Lands annually capable of bearing two crops, but entered at the settlement as one crop, owing to the false representations of the owner, aided by the village officers, whereby the former thus quietly obtained a second crop free of assessment year after year.
- (4.)—Garden lands irrigated by baling from river channels not charged.

Again, in cases of Inam lands water-tax was not regularly collected when dry Inam lands were irrigated from Government sources, nor was the second crop regularly charged when registered. One crop Inam lands were a second time cultivated with wet produce. Orders issued upon this point had been grossly neglected, and the existence of the preliminary register, which was the foundation upon which these charges should be made, was practically ignored.

Subjoined is a statement showing the amount of annual losses sustained by Government, and hitherto brought to light by the present examination in the foregoing items:—

Season.

9. The season during the year under review have on the whole been favorable, and the

rain-fall above the average, consequently the supply of food has been sufficient for the people, and cheaper than last year.

Cattle generally have been healthy, but there were a good many cases of murrain in Dindigul in August. During the latter part of the year cattle have suffered a good deal from want of drinking water in the Melur and Dindigul Divisions, but there has been no serious mortality amongst them. The money placed at my disposal for the improvement of the supply of drinking water has, I am glad to say, been judiciously and economically expended, so that though the amount is small the outlay has done a great deal of good.

57. There has been some difficulty in collecting this money, (notwithstanding remissions,) especially where the rain-fall was deficient, but I have acted in the spirit of the instructions con-

veyed to me by the Board in their Proceedings of the 1st March 1869, No. 1,341, and have exercised great forbearance in granting extra time where it was required. This is shown by the fact that coercive process for the recovery of land revenue arrears has only been resorted to throughout the district in 41 cases during the entire year. I am of opinion that this consideration for the people (who, as a rule, are willing though often unable to meet their liabilities) will financially be productive of good results, and now that the season has assumed so favorable an aspect I expect that the balance will be speedily realised.

- 58. More than half of the Ryotwary balance is outstanding in the Periacolum Talook, and I cannot help attributing it to the want of energy on the part of the present Taksildar. Moreover, the talook is a difficult one to manage, and I am thinking of transferring him to an easier charge.
- 59. The collection of a balance of Rupees 1,712 in the Madura Talook is stayed, pending the disposal of certain claims for remissions on account of withered crops raised in March.

- 87. This difference has been caused by the increased amount of refunds on account of certificates from the Courts.
- 88. The Village and Talook accounts were scrutinized during the settlement, and were regularly and well kept, (generally.)
- 89. I agree with the Sub-Collector in considering that the accounts would be much cleaner and more tidy if a better quality of paper were used.
- 90. With reference to the Board's Circular Order of the 13th August 1859, I beg to annex a short abstract showing the lands acquired by public servants during the Fusly under reference:—

^{91.} My Covenanted subordinates have been zealous and efficient in the discharge of their duties; Messrs. Bliss and McWatters are especially deserving of credit for the ability and energy, they have displayed in conducting the administration of their divisions. These qualities have had full scope this year, for the settlement of the Sub-division demanded great personal care and labor which were freely and efficiently rendered, and the work of the Zemindaries, which is at all times heavy, was increased and complicated by numerous disputes arising from the litigation which has taken place with regard to the Shevagungah Zemindary.

- 92. Deputy Collectors Ram Row, Devasikamany Pillay, and Ramasamy Moodelliar, have done their work zealously and efficiently, and I have much pleasure in recording my appreciation of the valuable assistance they have rendered me.
- 93. I have had every reason to be satisfied with the conduct of the Hoozur Native officials; and Talook Officers have, as a rule, behaved well and done their work efficiently.

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SUB-COLLECTORATE.

I have the honor to report on the Settlement of the Sub-division for Fusly 1278, and to forward eight Statements according to the prescribed forms.

Statement No. 1

2. The settlement was made by myself, with the exception of the five hill villages which were

settled by Messrs. Arbuthnott and Wilkinson during my absence on leave.

- 3. The transfer of four villages from the talook of Melur to that of Dindigul, and of the village of Nallampoliem from the Pulni Talook to that of Dharapuram in the Coimbatore District, caused the increase and decrease in the number of Ryotwary villages of the Dindigul and Pulni Talooks respectively.
- 4. In the accompanying detailed statements the changes caused by these transfers have been particularly shown, but in the statements which are embodied in this letter general results only are shown, to avoid occupying undue space. This will account for some apparent discrepancies between the figures entered in this report and that for Fusly 1277, the reasons of which will be clearly discernible on reference to the particulars given in the enclosures.
 - 5. The new form of puttah according to the specimen copies forwarded with the Board's

Circular Memorandum, dated 3rd December 1866, was adopted during the settlement of the year under report. The number of puttahs as compared with Fusly 1277 is given in the margin. I attribute the increase to the net increase of

three villages in the Sub-division. As all new puttahs were issued there were no renewals. ,

6. I have so fully reported on the season in my letters embodied in Board's Proceedings, No. 1,341, dated 1st March 1869, that it is not necessary for me to say more here than that its general character was very unfavorable. A seasonable and copious fall of rain in the months of May, June, and July 1868, gave the best hopes of a prosperous harvest and induced a considerable increase of cultivation, but this favorable opening of the season was not followed by a continuance of timely rains. In the month of August the rain-fall was but slight, and in the three subsequent months but scanty in Dindigul and very inadequate in Pulni, and in every part of the division partial and uncertain in the extreme. The general result was that the dry crops (which in these talooks form the bulk of the cultivation) suffered very considerably in almost every village, and in some to an extent which may be called disastrous.

• 7. By the Board's orders marginally noted I was authorized to make liberal remissions for loss of produce, particulars of which are given below. This aid has prevented any general distress up to this time, but I fear that if we do not have rain soon the effects of the short out-turn of last Fusly's crops will not be long in

8. The health of man and beast was generally good during the year, notwithstanding the scarcity of rain and the scant supply in some places of water to drink. There was at no time any important epidemic outbreak of disease. Cattle have suffered considerably for want of

fodder.

Statement No. 2.

10. From this statement it would appear that grain of every description sold at moderate

prices throughout the present as compared with the past year. On an average grain food was 8 per cent. dearer than in the ten years, Fuslies 1267-76, but 7 per cent. cheaper than in Fusly 1277.

Statement No. 3.

11. The large increase entered for Fusly 1278, under the head of "Lands taken up," is

chiefly attributable to the "Enclosed waste" having been included in the ryots' holdings under orders of the Board, conveyed in their Proceedings, No. 1,129, dated 24th February 1865, and as mentioned as being intended in last year's Settlement Report. The increase in holdings does not, therefore, represent a proportionate increase in actual cultivation.

- 14. From the above statement it will be seen that the cultivation was 18,915 Acres, assessed at Rupees 20,927, above that of Fusly 1277. This increase is mainly nominal, and attributable to the "Enclosed waste" having been included under the head of Cultivation, though remitted again under the heads of "Waste" (Statement No. 3), or "Shamilat Bunger" (Statement No. 4), in compliance with the Board's order to conduct the settlement in a liberal spirit.
 - 15. Enclosures A., B., and C. to Statement No. 3 require no remark.

Statement No. 4.

16. This shows the particulars of remission granted for the Fusly under report, as compared

with that of the previous Fusly. It would appear from this that the remission of this Fusly falls short of that of the previous one by a net amount of Rupees 5,412. This account, however, does not include the remission on entire waste which is shown in Statement No. 3, and amounts to Rs. 73,031.

In Fusly 1277 the remission on waste was Rupees 26,639. Adding together the remission shown in the two accounts, Nos. 3 and 4, the totals stand thus:—

I proceed to notice the items of Statement No. 4.

Shamilat Bunger.

17. The increase of Rupees 19,513 under this head is owing to the exceptional character of the season and the Board's orders noticed above.

Teerwa Cummy.

18. The increase of Rupees 2,749-13-2 under this head is owing to the increase of dry

cultivation on lands classed as wet for which no water was this year available, and on which I charged only dry rates, as dry crops only had been cultivated owing to the adverse nature of the season. It includes also some cultivation of garden produce for which Government supplied no water, but which was dependant entirely on the ryots' own wells.

Special Remissions on dry Cultivation.

19. By the Board's orders above adverted to I was authorized to grant remissions on dry

cultivation, as a special case, to the extent of 75 per cent. in certain specified villages, and of 50 per cent. in the rest of the Sub-division; discretion being allowed me to grant various rates not exceeding the above maxima, as might seem necessary at the time of the Jummahbundy. After careful inquiry I came to the conclusion that the only way of fairly apportioning the remission was to arrange the villages in groups according to the reported rain-fall, the known nature of the soil and rate of assessment, the out-turn of the crops, and other particulars as ascertained by inquiry at the time. If it had been possible a more detailed inquiry might have been better than the plan I adopted; but it was manifestly not in my power to make separate investigations into the individual losses of more than 38,000 persons, and I am quite satisfied, from the very few complaints I received, that on the whole the people were contented with the proportions of the demand remitted in their respective villages. The percentages remitted, and the number of villages to which each was applied, are given below:—

20. The increase under this head is due. to increased cultivation being entered under the tank referred to in the correspondence marginally noted.

Statement No. 5.

Settlement Report.

The large decrease in the Sundry sources of Revenue is attributable to the first entry in the Item No. 51 being blank for Fusly 1278. "Enclosed waste" has this year been · included in the ryots' holdings as mentioned above, and explained as being intended in last year's

Statement No. 6. 22. The large balance of Rs. 29,694-14-2 outstanding against the Kannivady estate is owing to the request of the renter, for concession to him of extra time for the payment of his peishcush, being under the consideration of the Poard's Proceedings, No. 3,766, 27th May 1869. Board. Orders have been given, however, for the immediate collection of the sum (Rupees 14,694-14-2) I proposed in my letter, No. 102, dated 12th April last, the renter should be made to pay by the end of June last, and of which nothing has as yet been realised.

- 24. The decrease of Rupees 17,692 in the Land Revenue Demand is owing to the large remissions granted this year.
- 25. The diminution of Rupees 1,295 under the head of Abkarry, in comparison with Fusly 1277, was caused by the sale of the Abkarry farms for Fusly 1278 at a reduced rate.
- 26. The falling off in the Stamp revenue is attributable partly to a decrease of litigation, due I fear to the gradual deterioration of the condition of the people caused by the continuous succession of bad seasons, and partly to the talooks not being kept-properly supplied with stamped paper in May and June.

Statement No. 7.

28. The Ryotwar balance outstanding at the end of the Fusly, as shown in this statement, . is less than last Fusly, but still amounts to the large sum of Rupees 41,209. It has since been reduced by subsequent collections up to July 31st to Rupees 3,161-9-3. There has been some difficulty in making the collections, notwithstanding the remissions.

29. Under the head of Abkarry the balance at the end of the Fusly amounted to Rs. 1,894. which has since been reduced by the subsequent collections to Rupees 136-5-1. In April the Dindigul renter fell into arrears, and I was obliged to take the farm under management. The balance now outstanding is Rupees 136, which I hope to be able to realize shortly by the sale of the renter's effects here and in the Coimbatore District.

Statement No. 8.

The arrears of former years amounted at the end of the Fusly to Rs. 6,636, which was

reduced by subsequent collections to the end of July to Rupees 6,634-10-8.

The recoverable arrears, amounting to Rupees 1,163-11-4, are in course of collection. Rupees 1,993-13-4 32. Of the doubtful arrears Rs. 1,945-9-9 form the subject of a boundary dispute pending in your office between two hill villages, one belonging to Government and the other to Kannivady estate. A similar dispute between Dindigul and Tirumungalum Talooks accounts for the remain-

der, or Rupees 48-3-7. 33. The irrecoverable arrears, amounting to Rupees 3,477-2-0, are as follows, and I request that sanction may be obtained for writing them off:-

Rupee 1-8-0.

Rupees 1-8-0 is the tax on certain waste land charged for Fusly 1277, the puttah of which stands

in the name of a man who has absconded and has not been heard of for several years. The land was · ponakadu and is now over-grown not having been cultivated since 1862, and is therefore not saleable. I request, therefore, that the arrears may be written off.

Rupees 2-12-5.

This sum also is the teerwa on certain other waste lands fixed under the same circumstances as

* above for Fusly 1277. The defaulter has disappeared for the last seven years and the land has ever since been submerged under the water-spread of a tank and consequently cannot be sold for arrears.

Rupees 797-9-4.

Rupees 797-9-4 is the difference between the highest dry tax and Nunjah tax on certain lands,

which, though classed as Nunjah, are dependant entirely on private wells. The arrears under this head amounted, as per last year's Report, to Rs. 533-9-9 for Fusly 1276. Deducting Rs. 114-3-10 as belonging to Nallampoliem village, transferred from Pulni to Dharapuram Talook in the Coimbatore District, there remain Rupees 419-5-11. Add Rs. 378-3-5, the amount due for Fusly 1277, and we get the above sum of Rupees 797-9-4. The lands in question are entered as Nunjah in the Fysal accounts, but as a matter of fact there is not now any supply of water for their irrigation and they are cultivated as garden by means of wells dug at the ryots' own expense, and should be charged at Punjah rates only. In fact dry rates only have been paid, this difference being allowed to fall into arrears until the question of their permanent transfer to the Punjah head can be settled. I am not at present prepared to recommend this, as I have not as yet been able to obtain an Engineer's opinion on the subject of the ultimate restoration of the irrigation works; but I have charged the ryots dry rates only this year, as they received no water from Government, and would now request that this balance, which is nominally outstanding against them, may be remitted.

Rupees 2,674-4-9.

This balance, which includes interest, is due by the Abkarry renters of Dindigul Talook for

Fusly 1277, as adverted to in paragraph 25 of last year's Report. As therein anticipated by me

after all their property has been sold and the proceeds thereof, together with the subsequent collections from the sub-renters, set off against the arrears, there still remains the above sum due to Government. This loss must be put down to the badness of the season in Fusly 1277, and is now recommended to be written off the accounts, as there is no prospect of the realization of any portion of it.

Rupee 1.

This is a fine imposed on a Curnum, which was subsequently remitted at the recommendation

of the Tahsildar, but the sum having been brought to the demand account sanction is required for

34. Coerceive measures have been resorted to only in four instances, one that of the Abkary renter noted in paragraph 33, and the others for the recovery of land revenue amounting to. Rupees 35-4-0. In the first instance, Rupees 41-8-0 have been realised and in the others the whole arrears were recovered.

35. The Talook accounts are pretty well kept. The Village accounts in Pulni are the same, but in Dindigul are by no means satisfactory. In my opinion, however, the general untidiness of the accounts, which I was sorry to notice, is to a great extent due to the very inferior quality of the paper supplied. It is called Double-Double Pott I believe, and seems to me better suited for printing than for writing on. If it is the least damp the ink runs, and wherever the paper is folded it tears and breaks at once. No one can keep an account neat under such circumstances.

37. Two tanks and 154 wells were newly constructed under the rules during the Fusly. No public or private topes were planted.

38. For the first half of the year P. Subbaya was Sheristadar of my office and rendered me able and zealous assistance. Of Ramasawmy Iyer, Tahsildar of Dindigul, now absent on sick leave, I may say the same. I have seen no reason to change my good opinion of these two officers. Mr. Burby, Tahsildar of Pulni, seems daily to grow less and less efficient, but his service will terminate in a few months. During Subbaya's absence on duty in your office A. Ramanujalu Naidoo, Collector's Head Revenue Clerk, has filled his place. He wants experience in the somewhat miscellaneous work of a Sub-division Sheristadar, but is willing, hard-working, and of fair ability, and promises to become a valuable officer. During Ramasawmy Iyer's absence on leave, N. Gopalaiengar, Sub-Magistrate of Shevagungah, has acted as Tahsildar of Dindigul. This officer knows his work, but appears to me to be lamentably wanting in energy. He must improve considerably before he can hope for a permanent Tahsil.
