Land Revenue.

In the above Proceedings the Roard of Revenue report on the settlement of the Government demand and the collec-

tion of the revenue of the Presidency for Fasli 1280, or revenue year ending 30th June 1871.

- 2. The gross revenue of the year amounted to Rs. 721,39,349 against Rs. 713,11,476 in Fasli 1279. The increase was Rs. 8,27,873. The Government, in their Proceedings dated 3rd April 1871, No. 618, showed how the revenues have, within the last fifteen years, gradually risen by 28 per cent. Compared with the average (Rs. 591,82,020) of those years, the report now before them shows an increase of Rs. 129,57,329, or nearly 22 per cent. The average of the last five years of the series was Rs. 655,30,522, and the increase in Fasli 1280 above that sum was Rs. 66,08,827, or 10 per cent.
- 3. In the concluding paragraph of their report the Board give a summary of the revenues of the Presidency during the last seventy years; but the comparison,

7. Season.—Both the south-west and north-east monsoons were, on the whole, favourable for agricultural purposes, and the rainfall was not only copious but also seasonable. The district of Ganjam, however, suffered from scant early rains and excessive later rains, as also from locusts. A cyclone in November was the cause of considerable damage in the adjoining district of Vizagapatam. The districts of Madura and Tinnevelly felt a want of sufficient and timely rains.

8. Sanitary Condition.—The sanitary condition of the country has already.

been noticed by Government in their Proceedings dated 29th January 1872, No. 173. The mortuary returns are not yet reliable, and orders have been issued in view to obtaining great accuracy. Though, on the whole, the

death-rate in Fasli 1280 was somewhat less than in Fasli 1279, or 17.84 per mille against 18.05, the loss of life from virulent diseases, and especially from fever, was greater. Cattle also suffered from disease.

9. PRICES.—The fall in the prices of all descriptions of food-grains was considerable in Fasli 1280. Compared with Fasli 1276, the last year of high prices, and the subsequent years, the decrease year after year shown in the subjoined table indicates how very small is the margin left by the Government demand between ease and depression among the agricultural classes:—

- 10. Within the last four years prices have fallen 52 per oint. in raggy and horsegram, 47 per cent. in cholum, 43 per cent. in paddy, and 32 per cent. in mboo. Compared with the decennial average, the loss is not so great, but it is still large enough to be sensibly felt by the ryots.
  - 11. The Board will explain, in their future reports, the effect of the market-prices, with reference to the commutation rates in those districts which have be recently settled.

all the districts, South Canara excepted, was Acres 19,987,687, assessed at Rs. 348,15,632, against Acres 19,612,378, assessed at Rs. 345,05,756, in Fasli 1279. The entire increase was Acres 375,309 in land, and Rs. 3,09,876 in

assessment. Of this the greater portion, or Acres 338,625, assessed at Rss2,03,171, was of necessity in "Dry" or unirrigated land. There was an increase of Acres 36,684, assessed at Rs. 1,06,705, in "Wet" or irrigated land. These results are shiefly due to the favourable character of the season. In Salem the introduction of the new settlement in the Ahtoor Taluq influenced the increase in the occupied area.

13. RYOTWARI SETTLEMENT.—The actual ryotwari settlement of the Presi-

dency amounted to Rs. 363,14,065 against Rs. 353,04,762 in Fasil 1279, showing an increase of upwards of ten lakes of Rupees. This increase was fairly distributed among all the subordinate items of the settlement, while under remissions on account of lands left waste, there was a decrease of Rs. 4,04,409, or about 50 per cent. These results are reliable indications of the very favourable character of the season.

14. The greater portion of the reverue under "Water-tax" consists of the water-rate levied in the delta taluqs irrigated from the Godavery and Kistna anicuts. The Govern-

ment observe from a note inserted in paragraph 10 of the Board's Proceedings that, while in the former district, the entire proceeds of the Water-rate are entered under "Water-tax," the similar collection in the latter district is shown under "wet assessment." Uniformity of system should be secured if possible, and the Board-will consider how this can best be attained.

15. Manissi Ns. - The decrease under remissions on account of lands left waste has already been noticed. The aggregate of occasional remissions under the

The Govern ment desire to be informed of the circumstances under which remission for "Shamilat Bunger," the discontinuance of which was ordered by the Board's Standing Circular dated Stho August 1859, based on the orders of Government, is still continued. The Government are aware that the orders' issued in 1859 were considerably modified by the Proceedings of Government dated i3th, March 1860, No. 364; but those orders were not rescinded so (ar as they related to

Shamilat Bunger. As to the last item "Tirva Kumme," or reduction of erroneous over-rating, the Board remark that it occurred chiefly in Coimbatore, Chingleput, and Nellore, but that it will soon disappear in the general revision of assessment now in progress in these districts. The cause of the increase of Rs. 18,312 should have been stated.

account of the remuneration of village servants need no particular remark. The decrease of Rs. 23,644 in the former occurred chiefly in the Chingleput District on account of second crop cultivation under private wells; the

favourable character of the monsoons having rendered remissions such as were given in the previous year unnecessary. The small increase of Rs. 1,621 under the latter item was the result of the increase in the revenue.

17. Peishcush or Zemindari Revenue.-The demand on account of peisheush amounted to Rs. 51,43,642 against Rs. 51,42,752 in Fasli 1279. The small increase of Rs. 890 is the result chiefly of additions made to peishcush on account of quit-rent on Inams for which title-deeds were issued during the year; the collection of the quit-rent being entrusted to the Zemindars with a small commission to cover expenses, the baland being added to the demand against them.

18. Shrotriem and Inam Quit-rent.—The decrease of Rs. 33,256 mider

Shrotriem and Inam quit-rent is the combined result of a gross increase of Rs. 14,216, and a gross decrease of Rs. 47,472; the former is owing to the extended operation of the Inam

Rules, and the latter chiefly to the transfer of the collection of quit-rent in Vizagapatam to the Zemindars and proprietors; the proceeds thereof being credited to

- "Miscellaneous." The Government doubt the consistency of crediting the quitrent on minor Inams partly to "Shrotriem and Inam quit-rent," and partly to "Miscellaneous." The entire proceeds of this rent, whether collected by Government or by proprietors, should be shown under one head.
- 19. MISCELLANEOUS.—The revenue under "Miscellaneous" amounted to Rs. 39,50,763 against Rs. 40,04,416, showing a decrease of Rs. 53,653. The gross decrease amounted to the large sum of Rs. 2,80,267 from non-recurrence of charge for concealed cultivation in the Trichinopoly District, which was collected for four years, at once in Fasli 1279; from slackness in collections on account of sales of escheat lands in Malabar; and from the relinquishment of waste and "Porumboke" lands cultivated in Fasli 1279 without permission, and consequently charged with prohibitory assessment in that year. The greater portion of this decrease was covered by a large increase in Water-tax on Zemindari and Inam lands in the Kistna District, and in "Jodi on sundry Inams" in the Vizagapatam District already allyded to.
- 20. The total land-revenue demand under all heads amounted to Rs. 466,47,305 against Rs. 451,24,022, the increase being 9,23,283.
  - 21. Special Products.—There was a very large decrease in the area under cotton, and an increase under Indigo, Fasli 1279. Fasli 1280. influenced chiefly by the prices of these

cotton, and an increase under Indigo, influenced chiefly by the prices of these articles in the market. The decrease under cotton was distributed among several districts, and needs no special remark.

- 23. ABKARI.—The decrease of Rs. 2,19,596 under Abkari is due chiefly to default of renters and the resale of the farms for lower prices. There was reckless competition for the farms in the previous year, and this reaction was, in some measure, expected. The sales of liquor in Madras and Ganjam, which are not leased in farm, show diminished consumption in Fasli 1280.
- tax," was the arrears of former years. The large increase of Rupees 9,35,278 under

"Income-tax" was the result of the enhanced rate of the tax under Act XVI. of 1870.

25. SALT.—The increase of Rs. 1,96,288 under "Salt Revenue" was the result of the Shanned price of Rs. 2 per Indian Maund having been in force throughout the year, instead of for a portion only as in the previous year. The total quantity sold shows a decrease of Indian Maunds 2,51,326, and the aggregate

sales are less than what they were tenthe years ago, notwithstanding the great extension of the railways during that period. The Government have, in paragraph 24 of their Proceedings dated 3rd April 1871, No. 618, noticed the effect of the increase from time to time in the

monopoly price on the consumption of this necessary of life; but they were not then prepared to pronounce a decided opinion as to the effect of the present rate of Rs. 2 per maund.

26. The Government have now before them the sales of one full year and the particulars of the sales show that the quantity purchased ostensibly for home-consumption (consumption of the district in which salt is manufactured and sold) was Indian Maunds 33,80,653 against Indian Maunds 33,85,362 in Fasli 1279, and Indian Maunds 34,56,572 in Fasli 1278. Compared with the average (Maunds 33,47,797) of the five years preceding the Fasli in which the rate of Rs. 2 per Maund was introduced, there was an increase of Indian Maunds 32,856 in the sales

of Fasli 1280. According to the cessus recently taken, the population of the thirteen coast districts, inclusive of the town of Madras, is nearly 20,000,000, and at the moderate allowance of 15 lbs. per

head (the actual consumption in the jails is about 20 lbs.), the ordinary consumption of the districts alluded to ought to amount to at least 36,46,000 Maunds, if no smuggled or illicitly manufactured salt found its way into use. The Price Returns show changes as below in the bazaar selling rate of the coast districts since the increase in the Government monopoly rate:—

cent. These facts and the quantities sold during the preceding years appear to indicate that consumption has been affected.

- 28. The same was more or less the case in the inland districts. The sales for these districts in Fasli 1280 amounted to Indian Maunds 30,34,397 against Indian Maunds 31,81,479 in Fasli 1279 and Indian Maunds 33,61,858, the average of the previous five years. The statistics under this head cannot be minutely analysed, as much of the salt is taken to the other Presidencies, and parts of this Presidency may be supplied from beyond the frontier. In Mr. Pedder's reports on the Bomog Salt-system, the average increase in the quantity of Bombay salt exported to Berar and the Central Provinces is estimated at 3 lakhs of Indian Maunds; but even assuming that the salt-trade of the northern districts with those provinces suffered to a corresponding extent, still the sales for consumption in the inland districts, if proportion to the increase in the population, should have been much more than Indian Maunds 30,34,397.
- 29. The bazaer price of salt in these districts at present averages Rs. 356 per garce, the increase above the average (Rs. 319) of the five years ending Fasli 1278 being Rs. 37 per garce.
- 30. Two tables prepared in the Government Office to elucidate the above remarks are appended to this order. The Board will be requested to deal with the subject fully in submitting their report for Fash 1281.
  - 31. The entire quantity of salt available for sale during the year was Indian Maunds 139,27,300 against 156,14,786 in Fasli 1279. Of this, the quantity sold was 68,05,863, and the balance in store exclusive of wastage at the close of the year was 69,26,606, which was less than the similar balance at the close of the previous year by nearly fourteen lakks of Indian Maunds. falling off in the manufacture was large in three districts.\* The Board explain that the decrease in Chingleput is only

nomina', as much of the salt that was actually manufactured was not received into Store in consequence of want of water in the canal. The Collector of Tanjore reports, in a letter received with the Board's Proceedings dated 12th March 1872, Miscellaneous No. 1,898, that frequent and heavy rain during the manufacturing season interfered with and materially impeded the manufacture. No explanation is given from Ganjam. It is evident that active measures are necessary to maintain a sufficient stock, and the Board will issue such orders as may appear necessary with reference to the progress made in the current Fasli.

32. The charges of the Salt Department amounted to Rs. 12,25,749 against 13,21,742 in Fasli 1279, and the ratio to gross revenue in the two years was 10\frac{1}{2} and 9\frac{3}{4}, respectively. The decrease of Rs. 95,933 was chiefly the result of the smaller quantity manufactured during the year. The expenditure under "Petty Construction and Repairs" was Rs. 24,852 against Rs. 16,296 in the previous year. The Board appear to have over-looked the special request in paragraph 26 of the Order of Government dated 3rd April 1871, No. 618, to notice this subject in their future reports. It was there desired that the full employment of the Budget grant to the extent necessary should be insisted on, as a primary duty of the Deputy-

Collectors in immediate charge of the Salt Department, and the Board should have explained what the available grant in each district was, and how far it was utilized. They will be pequested to submit a special report of this description for the official year 1871.72, and hereafter to devote a paragraph to the subject in their annual report on the settlement of the revenues.

districts and the result is attributed chiefly to heavy rains and to the long period during which the salt had been stored. The salt of the Godavery District is stated to be so friable as to cause more than ordinary wastage. Sanction is granted for writing off the entire wastage of the year, amounting to Indian Maunds 2,06,289-31.

- 35. Sea Customs.—The increase of Rs. 36,499 under Sea Customs was the result chiefly of greater activity in the export-trade in rice, paddy, and other articles at several of the ports. In Madras there was a decrease of Rs. 31,432, owing to a falling off in the imports of cotton, twist, and yarn, metals, spirits, and wine.
- 36. Land Customs.—The increase of Rs. 11,464 under Land Customs was owing to increased imports into South Arcot from the French Territory, as also to more careful supervision on the part of the Customs authorities.
- 37. STAMPS.—Under Stamps there was a nominal increase of Rs. 1,43,941; and on actual decrease of Rs. 23,900. The former is owing to the returns of the previous year, Fasli 1279, not including the collection of Court Fees during the three months in which they were credited to "Law and Justice," and the latter

is the result of the lighter rates of duty prescribed by Acts XVIII of 1869 and VII. of 1870 on transactions involving small amounts.

- 38. Demand, Collection, and Balance of Current Revenue.—The total depland on account of all sources of revenue amounted to Rs. 737,99,340, of which Rs. 672,99,296, or 91·19 per cent. (against 92·50 per cent. in Fasli 1280) was collected within the Fasli. The balance at the close of the Fasli was Rs. 64,89,304 exclusive of remissions, amounting to Rs. 19,740 under Abkari and Income-tix. This balance was reduced to Rs. 19,18,686 on the 31st October 1871 by subsequent collection of Rs. 45,70,618 up to that date. On the whole the collection of the revenues in Pasli 1280 was not so prompt as in the previous year, but it is not on that ground less satisfactory, as the fall in the prices already noticed must have caused much difficulty in payment. The balances were heaviest in Chingle-put, North Arcot, and South Arcot.
- 39. The Board's explanation of the balances under the several heads, except Abkari, is generally satisfactory. The Government, in their Orders dated 22nd. December 1868, No. 3,200, paragraph 28, and 11th May 1869, No. 1,313, paragraph 25, called the attention of the Board to the need for enforcing the conditions of the Abkari leases and watching the collections, so as to prevent the balance exceeding the value of the security lodged. The report now before Government shows that in the Chingleput District the balance against the renter was allowed to rise to double the aggregate of the deposits, and this must have been the case more or less in South Arcot and Salem, or the large arrears could not have remained unrealized. The Board will draw the special attention of the Collectors to this subject.
- 40. DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE OF ARREARS.—The total demand on account of arrears amounted to Rs. 63,88,937. The collections up to 31st October 1871 amounted to Rs. 49,25,888, and, excluding the remissions, aggregating Rs. 2,94,970, the balance left was Rs. 11,68,079. The Board report that of this balance the sum of Rs. 3,65,045-2-10 is irrecoverable, and under the explanation given in paragraphs 55 to 61 of their Proceedings, sanction is granted for writing off the amount.
- 41. The manuscript statement of particulars of arrears in each district referred to in paragraph-63 of the Board's Proceedings includes the sums actually collected subsequent to the Fasli, and the irrecoverable balances inquired into and recommended to be written off. A statement showing the Fasliwar details of arrears in each district under each head for the sum of Rs. 8,03,034 classed as "Recoverable and Doubtful" would be sufficient for the purpose for which the Government require it.
- 42. The small balance of Rs. 129 under "Shrotriem Jodi" in Ganjam could have been easily inquired into and disposed of. The "Ryotwar" balances in Cuddapah, Chingleput, and Madura appertain to very old dates, and if they are not included in the sum now sanctioned to be written off, the Collectors of these districts should be called upon to submit special reports on them without delay, in order that the accounts may be cleared of these old, and for the most part worthless arrear claims.

collections is much to be regretted, but was probably unavoidable in consequence of the low prices for produce which prevailed, and which doubtless induced many perfectly solvent ryots to delay payment until the law was enforced

44. The Government observe that the village and taluq accounts are reported to be well lept in all the districts, excepting South Arcot. The Collector of the last-named district has not yet had much opportunity for inspecting these accounts, but the Board will request him to give careful attention to the subject when he is moving through the district. It is not advisable that this inspection should form a recognized part of the annual settlement. It should frequently be sudden and without previous notice.

#### PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF REVENUE, dated 18th December 1871.

PREFATORY. The Board resolve to submit to Government their report on the Revenue Settlement and collections of the Madras Presidency for Fasli (Revenue year) 1280, (1st July 1870 to 30th June 1871) accompanied by the prescribed Abstract Statements and a file of the printed reports of Collectors.

TERRITORIAL CHANGES—Districts.—During the Fasli under report, Madras was constituted a separate district, the Collector of Madras having charge of Abkari, Quit-rent and other items of administration connected with the Town of Madras in addition to the duties of Collector of Customs as heretofore. By this arrangement, the number of districts in the Presidency has been increased from twenty to twenty-one.

5. NUMBER OF PUTTAS -In the total number of puttas issued, there was a net increase of 24,887. It is needless to go into the causes of this increase which is accounted for by a variety of circumstances, such as ryots taking up lands for the first time, transfers by inheritance sale, or mortgages, duplicates issued to replace lost puttas, etc. The large increase of "Fresh Puttas" is due chiefly to the introduction of the new settlement in the Ahtar Taluq of the Salem District, and of correct areas ascertained by the Survey Department in certain taluqs of the

Coimbatore District. On the lands included in the jurisdiction of the Madras District permanent quit-rents are paid, and no putter are issued for them.

It may however be observed generally that the rains of October and November were too heavy for Jonna and other staple dry grains, though they were very favourable for Paddy, Sugar-cane and other later crops. The river freshes were everywhere abundant and regular, and the anicuts of the Godavery, Kistna, Pennar and Cauvery, together with the more recent works at the heads of the more important branches of the Cauvery in the Tanjore District made the distribution of their supplies seasonable and even throughout the year. The districts, where the season was partially unfavourable, will now be noticed. In Ganjam, the early rains were insufficient for sowing seed and the later rains were so copious as to be destructive to the standing crops of paddy and sugar-cane. A portion of this district was also ravaged by locusts. The harvest owing to

these circumstances was 50 per cent. below the average. The same want of early rains was also felt in Vizagapatam, which district was further visited by a cyclone in November, whereby considerable damage was done to the crops.

In Kurnool, the early dry crops suffered from excess of rain, but the north-east monsoon was favourable not only to the rice-crop, but also to the later white Jonna.

"In Madura, the rain was scanty and partial, both as regards dry and wet crops except under river channels and river-fed tanks.

In Tinnevelly, matters were still worse. The rains were very late, and by the time the tanks filled it was the middle of January and the rain came too late to be of any use. There were similar failures in the staple dry crops in the Godavery, Kistna and Coimbatore Districts, bwing either to excessive rains as in the first two, or to want of rain in the early part of the season, as in the last.

7. Sanitary Condition.—Notwithstanding the abundant rain and plentiful harvest, much sickness prevailed throughout the year and the deaths from cholera, small-pox, and fever were greater in number than in the previous year in nearly all districts. Godavery in the north and Tinnevelly in the south suffered most from cholera. South Canara was severely visited by small-pox, while Salem, North Arcot, Coimbatore, Cuddapah, Vizagapatam and Godavery suffered much from fever.

There was no want of pasturage, yet the cattle were not free from disease, which prevailed in all districts, though not with the same fatal effects as in former years. The excessive rains and the cold weather consequent to the north-east monsoon told upon the health of cattle. The labours of Veterinary Surgeon Dr. Thacker were marked by success, but the prejudice against segregating the infected cattle is still strong in the minds of the ryots. Many believe that it is cruel to take the infected cattle far away from their stall-companions, and assert that such treatment brings about the death of some which might otherwise recover from the attack.

8. PRICES OF ACRICULTURAL PRODUCE.—The prices of nearly every description of agricultural produce fell considerably. The falling off was very marked in the preceding season, but it was still greater in that now under review. Compared even with the decennial averages, the contrast is very unfavourable to the former. But the averages exhibited in the table fail to

indicate the great fall in the market experienced in particular months of the year, and that too when the heaviest instalments of the public demand fell due.

The result, however beneficial to other classes of the population, was disastrous to the ryots who throughout the Presidency experienced the greatest difficulty in certain months in disposing of their produce to meet payment of the Government demand. This occurred not only in poor districts, but also in those which had the reputation of being well off, and in which it was thought the cultivators had laid by money in former years. The Collector of Tanjore for instance remarks that it fared very ill with the land-owners of that district; whilst prices where high, they could well afford to pay the Government demand in advance, and at the same time indulge in the luxuries of litigation and a high style of living, but they are now very differently circumstanced after the marked decline in prices caused by two successive good seasons. Not even the wealthiest handed proprietors, he adds, escaped the process of distraint, and it is a fact that in April and May, the months in which heavy instalments are due, jewels of no small value came into the money market for loans which were obtained at 12, and in several instances as much as 24 per cent. interest. Much of the dry waste is, as is well known, retained for pasturage and for fallows, and it is now a well understood rule that no remission of a sessment is claimable on dry waste unless under very exceptional circumstances. The charge made on "wet" waste is, as a rule, made only when it is patent that negligence and not want of water was the cause of the failure of crops. The latter cause cannot have contributed much to "wet" waste during the year under review.

Adverting to the very large extent of "waste" charged in North Arcot, the Collector explains that he made it a rule this year to turn a deaf ear to all applications for remission for lands submerged within the water spread of tanks, unless such applications were accompanied by a surrender of the right to such lands for ever. The majority of the ryots concerned, however, elected to pay and keep the lands, which are in their estimation very valuable.

15. Ryotwar Settlement.—The actual Ryotwary settlement is formed by deducting from the total holdings the waste remitted (alluded to in paragraph 13,) by adding to the actual cultivation (1) the portion of the waste which is charged for; (2) the assessment on account of 2nd crop cultivation; (3) additional assessment; (4) water-tax; and (5) miscellaneous items, (all of which will be briefly noticed hereafter,) and by deducting therefrom (1) occasional remissions, (2) fixed remissions; (3) deductions on account of Village establishment and sundry other purposes.

16. The settlement of the Ryotwary revenue thus made for the Fasli under report, amounted to Rupees 402,64,828, against Rupees 393,09,178 in the preceding Fasli, resulting in an increase of Rupees 9,55,650 as will be seen from the following comparative abstract:—

The settlement of Fasli 1279, (1869-70,) which yielded the highest Ryotwary revenue on record, furnished matter for congratulation. The result of Fasli 1280, (1870-71,) is still more

favourable, showing a further increase of nearly 10 lakhs, thus giving another proof of the expansive character of the Land Revenue under the Ryotwary system in this Presidency.

from the cultivation of two crops on land assessed for a single crop only, was Rupees 6,44,235 against Rupees 5,50,948 in the previous Fasli. The Districts from which the greater part of this item of revenue is derived are noted in the margin. The increase of Rupees 44,562 in Chingleput, Rupees 13,453 in North Arcot and Rupees 13,186 in Bellary, was the natural result of the favourable season. The small increase observed in other districts calls for no explanation.

18. Ryotwar—Additional assessment (or Teerwa Jasty).—The revenue from additional assessment on account of irrigation applied to "dry" lands, was Rupees 5,41,764 against Rupees 4,39,555 in the previous year and accrued in the districts named in the margin. The increase was chiefly contributed by the districts moted opposite. The remainder of the increase under this head is distributed over several other districts and callsfor no particular notice.

on Government lands.—The revenue from water-tax was Rupees 11,33,156, against Rupees 10,62,725 in the previous Fasli and was contributed chiefly by the districts named in the margin. The greater part of this tax is levied in the Delta Taluqs irrigated by the Godavery and Kistna anicuts. The increase of Rupees 59,560 in the Godavery District, is due to the extensive cultivation of wet crops under anicut irrigation, and to the conversion of a considerable extent of land from "dry" into "wet."

They consisted chiefly of the items noted in the margin. The largest remissions under this head were granted in sevent districts. The reduction of the standard assessment (Item No. 1) occurred chiefly in Coimbatore, Chingleput and Nellore, but it will soon disappear in the general revision of assessment now in progress in these districts. Out of the total remissions (Item No. 2) for Shavi or withered crop, three-fourths were given in Maduras and Tinnevelly. The remissions under loss of produce (Item No. 3) appear rather large this year and are chiefly owing to the crops having been destroyed by floods

No. 5) were given under the special sanction of the Board on dry cultivation which suffered seriously from want of rain in the Madura and special remission was similarly granted on some wet lands, which were cultivated with dry crops, after the season proper for "wet" crop.

The districts in which the decrease is most considerable are noted in the margif. † In the first two districts the decrease in cultivation is due entirely to the fall in prices. The decrease in the Kistna District is ascribed chiefly to failure of crop owing to the heavy rains which fell in the month of October 1870. The increase observed in Trichinopolyt is unexplained, and that in Coimbatore is stated to be due to the high prices which still obtained at the beginning of the Fasli and which doubtless led to the extension of the cultivation. In Indigo cultivation, an increase is observed which is chiefly contributed by the districts named in the margin.§ The increase in South Arcot and

other districts is due to the rise in the market price of this article.

Excise on Spirits and Drugs, (Abkari). There was a decrease in Abkari revenue amounting to a little less than 2½ lakhs of Rupees distributed over almost all the districts. The districts in which the falling off is most noticeable are named in the margin; the decrease in all of them, except Madras and Garjam, is due to the farms having been re-sold at a much lower rate owing to the default-of the original contractors. The decrease in the town of Madras is chiefly owing to the reduction of dowles (agreements to sell) consequent upon a

falling off in sales; and that in Ganjam is attributable to diminished consumption. Under the new form of contract, duty is levied only on the quantity of liquor sent out of the distillery for sale in the district.

37. LICENSE TAX.—The small amount which appears as collections under this head was derived from arrears due for previous Faslies on account of the tax which has long since been abolished. The increase observed is so trifling that it does not need any explanation.

38. INCOME TAX.—There was a large increase from Income Tax in all the districts in consequence of the enhancement of the tax by Act XVI. of 1870. The districts contributing most largely to the revenue from Income Tax are noted in the margin.

39. Salt Revenue.—In the revenue from salt, there was an increase of Rs. 1,96,288 though there was a decrease of Indian Maunds

othough there was a decrease of Indian Maunds 2,51,326 in the quantity sold. This latter result is due to several causes explained below. The increase in the revenue mainly resulted from

the enhancement of the monopoly price to Rupees 2 per Indian Maund which was in force throughout the year, while in the preceding year it was in operation during nine months only. The above net increase of Rupees 1,96,288 in the revenue has resulted from a gross increase of

Rupees 4,34,121 in nine districts and a gross decrease of Rupees 2,37,833 in five districts. The districts in which the increase was largest are named in the margia. The increase in Malabar, Nellore and Godavery is accounted for

by the fact already stated. The increase in Tinnevelly is ascribed to rapid sales when the old stocks which had accumulated at the lower monopoly price were exhausted. In Tanjore it is stated to be due partly to the enhanced rate of the monopoly price and partly to an increase in sales caused by deficiency of supply in the adjoining depot of Killay in South Arcot. The increase in the Kistna District is due to much of the salt bought for home consumption having been really taken to Bezwada and Juggiapettah and there stored for exportation into the Nizam's territory. The facilities of water communication to these places offered inducements to private enterprise for establishing inland salt depots to which the Lambadies prefer to resort because it saves them the trouble and annoyance of the transit of their thousands of bullocks through the highly cultivated tract of the Delta where pasturage is scarce. The largest decrease was in the

districts noted in the margin. In Ganjam it was due chiefly to the unwillingness on the part of local salt traders to make large purchases of

salt, because the Brinjaries of the Central Provinces would not barter their goods for salt as the latter were obliged in crossing the Inland Customs line of the Central Provinces to pay full duty on all salt not duly covered by passes (Rowanahs) which could not be re-issued in sufficient number on the enerchants' breaking bulk at the places of barter. All this however has been since remedied by the removal of the restriction complained of. The falling off in South Arcot was due to a number of circumstances. The Chunampet Depot was quite inaccessible to traffic owing to absence of road communication and the merchants preferred the salt of the neighbouring pans of the Chingleput District. The supply at the Killay Depot ran short. The enhancement of the Government price and the insufficiency of the abatement allowed to wholesale purchasers are also mentioned as other causes. The Collector's suggestions about offering additional inducement the salt dealers ought to be brought forward in a separate communication and should not have been made in the Settlement Report.

In six districts, the wastage was below 5 per cent. and therefore calls for no remark. In the remaining six, it exceeded this limit. The heavy floods of 1869 soaked the salt on the platforms of

Coilpatam and Tuticorin in Tinnevelly: meeover the salt in certain pans had been stored eight years. Heavy rains and exposure caused the large wastage in Tanjore: In this District also some salt had remained stored in the heaps for from four to seven years. The cyclone of

November 1870 did much damage to the salt heaps of certain depots in Vizagapatam. The salt of the Godavery District is soft and easily reduced to powder; hence the exess in the rate of wastage there. In Ganjam and Madura the excess over the standard is trifling and is ascribed to old salt having been sold by retail. The Board consider these explanations to be on the whole satisfactory and accordingly recommend that sanction be given to write off the whole wastage of Fasli 1280 amounting to Indian Maunds 2,06,289-31.

44. Sea Customs.—The revenue from Sea Customs amounted to Rupees 28,05,693 against Rupees 27,69,194 in the preceding Fasli being greater by Rupees 36,499. In five Districts there was a gross increase of Rupees 1,42,397 and in the other seven, a gross decrease of Rupees 1,05,898. The increase was most considerable in the districts noted in the margin. Import duties amounted to Rupees 16,66,934 and Export duties Rupees 11,05,990. The collections at the Madras port alone were under the former head Rupees 13,30,787 and under the latter Rupees 2,92;011. The chief articles of trade yielding these duties are noted in the margin.

The increase in Tanjore was due chiefly to greater activity in the export trade in rice and paddy and larger importations of Railway materials for the extension of the Great Southern of India Railway to Tuticorin. In South Arcot it was due to large exports of Paddy to Ceylon from Porto-Novo. In Tinnevelly it was due to large imports of Cotton Piece-goods, Wines, and Betel-nut, and to large exports of Chillies and Gingelly-oil cake. The increase in the Godavery District was due to large exports of grain and that in Malabar was chiefly owing to a larger exportation of Rice

and Pepper. The districts in which a considerable decrease occurred are those noted in the margin. In the Madras port, the decrease was due to a falling off in the imports of Cotton Twist

and Yarn, Metals, Spirits and Wines. In Ganjam, it was owing to the dulness of the market. In . South Canara, it was partly owing to the falling off in the export of Rice to foreign ports and partly to the falling off in the importation of European Liquors, consequent on a general depression of trade. .

45. LAND CUSTOMS.—The revenue from Land Customs accrues in four districts, and amounted during the year under report to Rupees 1,88,891, being in excess of the preceding year by Rupees 11,464. This increase is contributed chiefly by South Arcot\* in which it was due to increased imports, and to more

energetic supervision on the part of the Customs authorities.

• 46. REVENUE FROM STAMPS .- The Stamp revenue of the year under report amounted to Rupees 39,55,479, (including Miscellaneous); of which Rupees 23,66,896 was derived from Court Fee stamps, and Rupees 15,88,583 from Non-judicial stamps. The total revenue compared with

It will be observed that the total arrears-demand brought forward exceeds by Rupees 17,909 that shown in the accounts as the outstanding balance at the end of Fasli 1279 (1869-70). This difference resulted from several causes. In Coimbatore a sum of Rupees 367, appertaining to villages transferred from Madura in Fasli 1279 (1869-70) was brought forward in the account of Fasli 1280 (1870-71). The excess appearing under Income Tax is the result of the collection alone having been dealt with as the demand in Fasli 1279 (1869-70) in the Madra's District and Tanjore; the recovery of arrears made in Fasli 1280 (1870-71) had accordingly to be exhibited as demand to square the accounts. The total amount outstanding at the beginning of the Fasli as above explained was Rupees 63,88,937 whereof Rupees 48,40,053 were recovered and Rupees 2,94,970 were remitted. There remained at the end of the Fasli Rupees 12,53,914, which was reduced, by subsequent collections up to October 1871, to Rupees 11,68,079. It was erroneously collected by the Deputy Tahsildar of Vissanapetta Division and credited to Government in Faslic 1279, (1869-70,) and the Zemindar deducted it from his Peishcush and paid only the remainder. The balance in Nellore is due to the quit-rent imposed on certain "Kattubadi" Inams having been included in the Peshcush of the Chundi estate for Fasli 1279, (1869-70,) which amount the Inam Commissioner subsequently decided should be collected only from Fasli 1280, (1870-71): this sum is therefore irrecoverable. The irrecoverable balance in Salem represents the assessment of lands taken up in certain permanently settled estates for Railway, Local Fund roads, and other public purposes. The Collector promises to submit shortly a report recommending the permanent deduction of the amount from Peshcush for future years.

It consisted generally (in all districts, except Salem and South Arcot) of quitrent which was charged in the accounts before the distribution of Title deeds and which was afterwards pronounced by the Inam Commissioner to have been improperly collected. The balances exhibited against Salem and South Arcot represent the assessment of lands situ-

ated in Shrotriem villages taken up by Government for various public purposes.

The irrecoverable arrears under Ryotwar recommended to be written off by the Collector of Vizagapatam in his report amount to Rupees 195-1-11: but the balance at the end of October 1811 is only Rupees 179: as the difference has been probably since collected, the last mentioned sum is taken in the Board's Abstract, as the more correct figure. The irrecoverable arrears in the Madras District are said to consist chiefly of the quit-rents charged on waste lands on the seashore and on mosques, pagodas, burial and burning grounds, tombs, charitable endowments and public roads. The Collectors concerned all report that the irrecoverable balances had been fully investigated before they were so classed in the accounts and recommend that they be written off.

Processes were issued in 12,660 villages against 1,56,993 ryots for the recovery of Rs. 18,87,786, and property was attached to the estimated value of Rupees 13,77,678. But the property actually sold was worth only Rupees 3,04,179, of which Rupees 1,42,292 represents value of lands and Rupees 1,61,887 of movable property. The processes issued in every district were about double the number of those in the last year—a circumstance which as already observed was necessitated by the great difficulty experienced by the ryots in disposing of their produce even at low prices.

Rupees 1,32,000 per annum. The whole of the revenue demand of Rupees 1,58,026 appears to have been collected by the renters with the exception of Rupees 626. The marginal figures

indicate that in the extent of land under Paddy, there was a slight falling off, but this was counterbalanced by nearly as much increase under Indigo cultivation. There is also a slight increase this year under Sugar cane and other grains.

- 68. MISCELLANEOUS SUBJECTS—State of Village and Taluq accounts.—The village and taluq accounts are reported by all Collectors (except South Arcot) to have been examined by themselves and their subordinates during the settlement and found generally well kept. The Acting Collector of Chingleput states that after the late disclosures in the Chingleput Taluq, a thorough scrutiny into the accounts in all the taluqs was made at the time of settlement partly by himself and partly by Mr. Crole, the Sub-Collector, and Mr. Kough, and that they were all found correctly kept. The Collector of South Arcot, while stating that he has personally had little opportunity of forming an opinion on this subject, suspects that the village and taluq accounts are not generally kept in the proper forms. No reasons are assigned and in their absence the Collector would perhaps have done well to have suspended his judgment: the Board observe that the Sub-Collector who examined the taluq and village accounts at the Jamabundy and subsequently, only remarks that necessary instructions were given as regards irregularities discovered.
- 69. MISCELLANEOUS SUBJECTS.—Improvement effected in the system of Village Establishment during the year.—The revised scheme of Village establishment was introduced in two-Districts, Trichinopoly and Godavery. Act IV. of 1864 (Madras) was for the first time introduced into the latter district and the Village Service Inams were also enfranchised.
- 70. While performing on this occasion the pleasing task of recording the highest revenue that has yet been realized, the Board consider that it may not be amiss to conclude this report with a retrospect of the various branches of Revenue under their administration since the early times of our rule in this Presidency. Such a retrospect is illustrated by the subjoined table; wherein the amount of each branch of revenue at the commencement of each decade of the last seventy years is noted. The Land Revenue has grown from 230½ to 447 lakhs, and this in spite of reductions of assessment throughout the Presidency; the Abkari from 2 to 57 lakhs; the Sea-Customs from 2 to 28 lakhs; the Salt from less than a lakh to 126 lakhs; Stamps from 2 to 39½ lakhs,

the grand total of all sources from 253 to 722½ lakhs. Though these figures represent only taxes collected, they must also be regarded as unerring indications of a nation's prosperity:—
