It will be seen that there is a balance of Rupees 1,028-10-7 to be accounted for. Rs. 707-12-7 have been classed recoverable, and steps for the collection of the same are in progress. Rs. 30-6-8 are doubtful being the amount due by certain land-holders whose immovable property has been attached; but it is doubtful whether the sale proceeds will be sufficient to meet the demand.

The remainder, Rupees 290-7-4, is classed irrecoverable for the following reasons:-

Under the foregoing circumstances I request that you will take steps to write off the accounts the above irrecoverable balance of Rupees 290-7-4.

19. Processes under Act II. of 1864 were issued in 345 villages against 5,355 individuals for the recovery of Rupees 1,20,796. Value of the property attached amounted to Rupees 98,002; of

this, property estimated at Rupees 13,247 was actually sold for Rupees 11,344.\*

20. A statement of lands held by servants newly entertained and those newly acquired by old public servants will be submitted shortly.

- 21. The village accounts were examined by the Huzur and Taluq establishments and found to be generally correct.
- 22. Vaccination.—The Sub-Collector's Dresser was employed while on circuit in vaccinating persons in the villages visited.
- 23. Sub-division of Joint Liability of Share-holders in enfranchised whole Inam villages.—No applications have been received for the sub-division of enfranchised whole Inam villages under the notification contained in Board's Circular No. 15 of 1868.
- 24. The statements of the agricultural statistics, average crop, etc., were forwarded to your office with my letters Nos. 90, 125, and 131, dated 9th, 23rd, and 26th April last respectively.
- 25. CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATES.—The conduct of subordinates has been generally satisfactory. As in previous years' Settlement Reports I have to record my entire satisfaction with the manner in which his duties have been discharged by the Sub-division Sheristadar Baru Rajah Raò.

# SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

#### KISTNA.

I HAVE the honour to submit my Report on the Settlement of the Kistna District for Fasli 1281, (A. D. 1871-72,) with the usual statements.

- 2. Statement No. 1.—In this statement are shown the stations where, and the Officers by whom the Settlement of each taluq was conducted, as well as the number of days occupied in the work and the number of puttas distributed. The late Acting Collector, Mr. Hannyngton, settled Bezwada, one of the two taluqs under the charge of the Head Assistant Collector. Part of Gudivada was settled by him also, and the remaining portion by myself; Repalle Taluq was settled by myself in full, these two being the taluqs kept in the Collector's charge. The Sub-Collector, Mr. Newman, settled the taluqs of Bapatla and Sattenapalli within his own Division, and also that of Vinukonda, which is under the charge of the General Deputy-Collector. The Head Assistant Collector settled the taluq of Guntur within the Sub-Collector's Division in addition to Nandigama Taluq in his own range. The Bandar Taluq was settled by the additional Deputy-Collector. The General Deputy-Collector settled the taluqs of Narsarowpeta and Palnad. The settlement of each taluq was made within its own limits, and at places convenient to the ryots concerned.
- 3. There were no changes in the tenure of villages in the year under report. The only puttas that were given were for lands newly taken up, or to replace old ones damaged.
- 4. Season.—The subjoined abstract shows the average rain-fall during the year under report in comparison with that of the preceding Fasli :—

The season was on the whole not as favourable as that of the previous year. The rain-fall up to December made up the usual average but was partial, and after December failed altogether. The tanks in the upland taluqs received only a moderate supply of water, while those in the

Divi Division\* of Bandar Taluq got none, owing to the entire failure of Kistna freshes.

The Punasa or early crop, such as sujja, gidda jonna, mokka jonna, and korra therefore yielded well; but the staple dry crop of the district, pedda jonna or cholum, suffered from blight, and the dry paddy crop was very scanty indeed from the partiality of the rains. The wet crops also suffered from want of water at the end of the year, while the Pyra or late crop, oil seeds, grain, etc., was tolerably good.

5. Sanitary Condition.—The public health was on the whole good during the year. Small-pox prevailed in almost every part of the district, and the mortality from it was greater

than in the last year, when the number of deaths was exceptionally small. There was much fever in the taluqs, which make up what is called the Guntur portion of the district, where the deaths were nearly 5,000. Up to Fasli 1279 the deaths recorded for the whole district have not exceeded 4,310. In the two last years they have been nearly double that number. The deaths from other diseases, how-

ever, are less than in last year, and the total of deaths this year is less than the average of the last five years. Cattle disease prevailed in all the taluqs more or less, but there was not any extraordinary fatality anywhere.

- 6. Statement No. 2.—The prices of all food grains ruled higher than in Fasli 1280. This was due chiefly to the failure of seasonable rains, and to exportations to Hyderabad where it was said famine was imminent. Except Cumboo, however, all food grains were sold at a less rate than the average of the ten years preceding.
- 7. STATEMENT No. 3.—The extent of land held at the beginning of the year was acres 17,97,742, assessed at Rupees 32,23,874-0-5—Vide Statement No. 3 abstracted below. Out of this 78,758 acres, assessed at Rupees 2,34,198-15-3, are deducted on account of relinquish-

9. Waste Charged.—The waste charged is acres 3,22,904, assessed at Rs. 4,47,697-2-3. This includes portions of cultivated fields left waste, as also lands left fallow and for pasture by the ryots. Two-thirds of the whole extent lies in the upland villages.

- 12. From want of seasonable rains the ryots took more anicut water, than usual for their dry crops.\*
- 13. In accordance with the observations of the Board in paragraph 4 of their Proceedings,

dated 31st May 1872, No. 858, I have not shown separately in the accounts of this year the water-tax of the Delta Taluqs north of the Kistna. Hence the large decrease of Rs. 1,44,479 under the head of Water-tax on wet lands.

- 14. The large increase under the head "Road Fund" is due to the introduction of Local Fund Act IV. of 1871, and to the settlement and realization of Road Cess on certain Inam lands and Zemindari estates during the Fasli.
- 15. The merahs of village servants, which are included in the account, are not entered in Column 53 of Statement No. 3, (in accordance with Board's Official Memorandum, dated 6th June 1872, No. 750). Hence the decrease of Rupees 23,174.
- 16. The decrease of Rupees 14,109 under the head of Remissions, and Rupees 36,993 under the head of Miscellaneous items, will be explained in the remarks regarding Statements 4 and 5.
- 17. There is no sugar-cane cultivated in this district. The extent of land cultivated with cotton and indigo is shown below. The increase of acres 22,177 in the cultivation of cotton is due chiefly to the moderate falls of rain we had, and to the high prices that ruled at the commencement of the cultivating season. The decrease in indigo cultivation is due to want of sufficient rain:—

- 38. Permanently Settled.—The arrears due by the Nuzid and Dovarakota estates cause the decrease of Rupees 75,668. The Devarakota estate is now attached.
- 39. Jodi of Shrotriem Villages.—There is a slight decrease in this item. It requires no explanation.
  - 40. Ryotwar.—The decrease of Rupees 20,514 in this item already explained.
- 41. Miscellaneous shows a net increase of Rupees 58,416, due to the collection of the arrears of water-tax on Zemindari estates.
- 42. Abkári.—The decrease of Rupees 15,753 under this head is owing to want of punctuality on the part of the Abkári renters in paying their instalments of rent. A great portion of this has been subsequently collected.
- 43. In all other items of Sundry sources of Revenue, except Abkari, the amounts brought to account are the amount of collections, there being no fixed demand for those heads. The causes explained, therefore, in paragraphs 32 to 36 are applicable to the increase and decrease in the collection of these items.

53. Refunds of Land Revenue.—The increase under this head is explained as follows:—
Rupees 6,217 were refunded to the Zemindar of Devarakota on account of water-tax collected on waste lands—Vide G. O., dated 17th April 1872, No. 133, R. D.

Rupees 3,570 were refunded to Penumarti Lakshmipati Sastrulu on account of past proceeds of his Inam under G. O, dated 16th June 1871, No. 1,070, R. D.

The remaining Rupees 864 were refunded under the orders of Government, Inam Commissioner, and the Collector.

- 54. SALARIES AND EXPENSES.—The decrease of Rupees 680 in the salaries of the Collector and his Assistants is due to various changes.
- 55. The increase of Rupees 604 under the head of "Huzur and Taluq Establishments" is due to the new establishment of Sub-Magistrate sanctioned for the town of Guntur.
- 56. The increase of Rupees 2,634 under the head of "Contingencies" is due to the purchase of Service stamps for public letters, and the employment of extra establishments for copying the old records. Under the head of "Abkári contingencies" there is a small expenditure of Rupees 105 for registering Abkári leases.
- 57. INCOME-TAX.—The decrease of Rupees 1,025 under this head is due to the reduction of Taluq establishments.
- 58. SEA CUSTOMS.—The small increase of Rupees 52 under the head of "Sea Customs" is due to a refund of Export duty and the purchase of Service labels.
- 59. Salt-Establishments.—The small increase of Rupees 115 is due to the increase of establishment sanctioned.
- 60. Purchase of Salt and Manufacturer's share.—The increase of Rupees 39,201 under this head is owing to a larger quantity of salt having been manufactured to meet the demand of the year, the quantity in hand at the beginning of the Fasli was insufficient. The increase of Rupees 3,144 under the head "Charges for conveying and storing Salt" is due to the same causes.
- 61. Freight on Salt imported.—Rupees 4,599-14-0 were paid on account of freight for the importation of 54,492 maunds of salt from Isakapalli salt pans in the Nellore District for sale at Nizampatam Kotar—Vide Board's Proceedings, dated 5th January 1872, No. 37.

- 62. Salt compensation.—The decrease of Rupees 107 under this head is due to lands having been assigned to some Inamdars in lieu of money allowances.
- 63. Stamps.—Commission or discount to Licensed Stamp Vendors.—The increase of Rupees 709 under this head is due to the increased rate of discount sanctioned from January 1872, and the decrease of Rupees 752 under Contingencies is due chiefly to smaller refunds under the certificates granted by Courts.

In all bad cases the Curnams were punished for their carelessness.

- 5. There is an increase in Ayacut of acres 1,85,192, or 9 per cent., and an increase in assessment of Rupees 36,131, or 1 per cent. This is due to the introduction of survey areas in Fasli 1279 in the Guntur portion of the district and to the assessing these survey areas at the old rates in some villages where concealments of cultivation were bright to light.
- 6. Under the head "Cultivation" there is an increase in land of acres 1,74,897, or nearly 11 per cent., and in assessment of Rupees 1,12,292, or nearly 4 per cent. This is due chiefly to the increased cultivation since Fasli 1276.

- (3). Hamlets.—In the return submitted in Fasli 1276 the total number of hamlets was entered as 1,524. In the return prepared last year before the census was taken the total number is given at 1,617. According to the return now submitted it is 1,658, which shows an increase of 134 over the return of Fasli 1276, and of 41 over that prepared last year. The difference between the return now submitted and that of 1871 is accounted for by the Tahsildars as resulting from an omission in the latter of certain hamlets by mistake; but no explanation is given of the large increase of hamlets since 1276.
- (4). Uninhabited Villages.—In Fasli 1276 the number of uninhabited villages was returned at 82. They have now increased to 97. The circumstances under which 15 villages have since been deserted are not explained by the Tahsildars.

- (5). Area—The total area of the district was given at 4,546 square miles in the last quinquennial return submitted with the Jamabundi Report. In the revised statement submitted with letter, No. 2,383, dated 28th July 1868, it was given at 8,751\frac{2}{3} square miles, and the mode in which the area was calculated was specified in that letter. The return showing the areas having been revised before the census of 1871 was taken, the result according to the information then available was recorded in the Census Form No. IV. submitted with letter, dated 3rd July 1871, No. 1,251. The Board will observe that in this return the area was entered as 7,150 square miles. The return now submitted with this report gives the area at 7,239 square miles, showing an increase of 89 square miles over the area returned in 1871. This increase is owing to a mistake made in the Kanigiri Taluq, where it appears the area of some Inam villages was not correctly entered in the return of 1871; and to the new survey areas being shown in the present return of the Ongole Taluq, for which these areas were not available in 1871.
- (6). CIRCAR AYACUT AND CULTIVATION.—Enclosure B.—The total ayacut exclusive of Poremboke is 19,12,586 acres against 15,29,325 acres in Fasli 1276. A comparison between these two years in regard to areas is not however fair, as the area now recorded is according to the results of the new survey, and is therefore more accurate than that given in the last quinquennial year according to the old accounts. The occupied area for the whole district is 42 per cent. on the ayacut area. The Board will observe on referring to the Taluqwar details that in all the taluqs, except Gudur and Kanigiri, the area occupied is larger than that unoccupied. In the Gudur Taluq 68 per cent. of the ayacut area is unoccupied, while in the Kanigiri Taluq the per-

centage is 69. In the former Taluq\* the dry assessment is unduly high, which probably accounts for a considerable extent of land being waste. In the Kanigiri Taluq I have no

information as to the incidence of assessment. I fancy it is the indifferent nature of the soil, and the poverty of the land-holders in general, which prevent the extension of cultivation in this part of the country. The state of the district, as indicated by the Quinquennial Return-B., may be briefly described as follows:—Out of 19 lacs of acres forming the ayacut about 9 lacs are occupied under Putta, about \( \frac{2}{4} \) lac are held as Inams, and about  $6\frac{2}{4}$  lacs are left unoccupied.

- (8). Population—Enclosure D.—The total population of the district is 13,75,405. In the return furnished with my letter, No. 40, dated 6th January 1872, it was given at 13,75,349, and the difference of 56 is owing to a mistake made in the Kanigiri Taluq in adding up the figures. The Tahsildars of Gudur, Nellore, Udayagiri, and Kanigiri, as well as the Deputy Tahsildars of the four Zemindari divisions, have not furnished the details of the population to be entered in Enclosure D., as the duplicates of the schedules of the final enumeration have not been retained by the village officers. The Tahsildars of the remaining five taluqs have sent in the details which will be communicated to the Census Officer at Madras. As the information is not complete the Enclosure D. is not submitted herewith, but will be compiled after the results of the tabulation now going on at Madras under the superintendence of Mr. Gover are known—Vide Board's Circular Memorandum, No. 120, dated 22nd January 1872.

In Fasli 1266 the number of cows and buffaloes was returned respectively at 1,64,946 and 72,026. The census now taken is the third after the census of Fasli 1266. The results of none of these three censuses in respect of cows and buffaloes show an increase over the results of the census taken 15 years ago. In all other items there has been increase.

- (10). Rent Roll—Enclosure F.—From Enclosure F. the Board will observe that nearly half the number of puttas are under 10 Rupees, while a third of the total number range from Rupees 10 to 30. The preponderance of pauper ryots thus continues in the same proportion as in the last quinquennial year. There were four puttas paying upwards of 1,000 in Fasli 1276, and the number is now doubled. I have reason to believe that there is a large number of ryots paying more than 1,000 Rupees, but as such payments are made on account of several puttas in the same or other villages the Rent Roll statement, which is prepared with reference to the actual puttas issued, does not represent the actual state of things.

SANITARY CONDITION .- The mortality from cholera was considerably less than in the previous year, and the district has been during the last two or three years comparatively free from this epidemic. The loss from small-pox and fever is greater than in the previous year. Cattle disease also prevailed throughout the district, but not to any remarkable extent.

(1). The only items in which the variations are heavy are those which relate to the Salt Department. The Deputy-Collector has explained the fluctuations in paragraph 17 of his report.

- 28. Working of Village Accounts.—Special reports have been called for on the working of the village accounts. Some reports are still due. So far as the reports have been received the village accounts appear to have been kept pretty well. On receipt of all the reports I propose to issue a Revenue Circular, reviewing the omissions and inaccuracies of minor importances brought to light by the recent inquiries, and I will adopt the requisite steps to guard against such omissions in future.
- 29. Lands acquired by Public Servants.—The 1st Class Revenue Inspector of the Atmakur Taluq, named Chillara Seshaya, acquired 31.4 acres of land in Rudrakota, Kavali Taluq. It appears that the former holder of this land gave the same to him as a gift in 1872. With this exception the returns received from the Tahsildars do not show any new acquisition of lands by public servants during the year under report.
- 30. Inspection of Rain Gauges.—No reports have been received on this subject from the Divisional Officers.
  - 31. Boundary marks. Due attention is being paid to the preservation of boundary marks.
- 32. Sub-division of Enfranchised Inams.—No applications have been received during the year for the Sub-division of enfranchised Inam villages.
- 33. Remarks on the Conduct of Subordinates.—My Sheristadar, R. Venkatakistna Row, B.A., is, as I believe the Board are aware, a very talented Revenue officer, and the assistance he gives me in the Revenue branch of the administration is invaluable. He relieved me of almost all trouble with the census, organizing the most careful arrangements and supervising their operation, not only throughout the district but in the Municipality also, and I have every reason to believe that the results were remarkably successful.

- \*3. FLUCTUATIONS IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES.—There has been no variation in the number of villages, and the tenure on which they are held, since the last Settlement Report. But when compared with Fasli 1276 there is an increase of two ryotwar villages. These two villages were transferred from the Kavali to Kanigiri Taluq in Fasli 1280, and were referred to in paragraph 3 of the last Settlement Report.
- 4. Puttas.—The number of fresh puttas issued in this Fasli is 8,788, of which 8,655 are ordinary puttas, and 133 Book-puttas. The following statement gives the details required in Circular No. 28 of 1870. From the statement it will be observed that there has been a decrease in the number of puttas issued, which is mainly attributable to large relinquishments in the Fasli under report:—

5. Season.—The seasons were not on the whole favourable this year. Although we had rains from the beginning of this year still the rain-fall in all the taluqs of the Sub-division, as will be seen from the subjoined statement, was much less during the year under report than in the previous year, and consequently many of the tanks received but an insufficient supply of water.

This circumstance necessitated the grant of large remissions on account of wet waste. All the dry crops yielded a fair return, except "jonna," in some of the villages of the Ongole Taluq. This deficient yield of this crop resulted from want of seasonable rains in those villages. Some wet crops in seven villages of the Kandukur, and three villages of the Ongole Taluq suffered from insufficiency of water, which necessitated the grant of remissions on account of perished or withered crops:—

<sup>6.</sup> Sanitary State.—The Sanitary condition of the Sub-division was on the whole satisfactory. Fever was prevalent in all the taluqs, but it was not of an alarming nature in any place. Small-pox also visited most of the villages in the three taluqs, but there appears to have been no serious cases. Cholera existed in the beginning of the year in but very few villages of the Ongole and Kandukur Taluqs, and in the former taluq the number of deaths was rather large, more particularly in the village of Pellur, where 67 appear to have died. Cattle suffered slightly in all the taluqs from diseases, and the most prevalent of the diseases were "Ghalikuntlu," "Gudepettu," and "Peda-Chida."

<sup>7.</sup> PRICES CF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS.—The following statement exhibits the average prices of the principal grains as compared with those of the last year. It will be observed therefrom that, notwithstanding the unfavourableness of the season, the prices of all grains have fallen, except that of horse-gram. This falling off is attributable to the absence of large exportations to other districts:—

8. Ryots' Holdings.—Subjoined is a statement showing the ryots' holdings for Fasli 1281, from which it will be seen that in the year under report there was a decrease of 6,455 acres, assessed at Rupees 10,106, on the holdings of the last year. The decrease is owing to large relinquishments made during the year. Of the three taluqs the greatest portion of the lands relinquished was in the Kandukur and Kanigiri Taluqs. In the former 6,162 acres, with an assessment of Rupees 12,292, were relinquished, and in the latter 6,368 acres, with an assessment of Rupees 4,253. I may here remark that relinquishments were largely made in regard to dry lands:—

9. <sup>11.</sup> No remission was granted on Dry Waste.—The remission on wet waste was Rupees 21,505, of which Rupees 21,450 was granted for entire wet numbers. This sum is more than three times the amount remitted last year. Such large remissions were found necessary on account of the insufficient supply of water to many of the tanks. The amount of remission granted for portions of wet numbers was only Rupees 55, and this amount was given only in two villages of the Ongole Taluq, Allur and Peranamitta. In Allur a portion of a number having been left waste on account of excavations made by the Public Works Department the assessment on the portion, amounting to Rupees 3, was remitted. The remainder, Rupees 52, is the remission granted on portions of numbers which were more than 4 acres in extent, and wherein the waste preponderated over the cultivated portion. The usual remission of Rupees 48 was given on account of the salaries of the Munsifs of Tammavaram, Timmanapalem, Bodduvanipalem, and Medaramitta in the Ongole Taluq. This is the custom obtaining in the Kistna District, from which these villages were transferred to this district. A sum of Rupees 37-9-10 was remitted during the Jamabundi on account of perished crops in the Ongole village. A further sum of Rupees 1.400-1-6 had to be remitted after the Jamabundi, and before the close of the Fasli on the same account in the Ongole and Kandukur Taluqs. A remission of the difference between the wet and the highest dry rates was given to the extent of Rupees 510-13-2 in the Ongole and Kandukur Talugs in accordance with Revenue Circular, No. 33, dated the 28th June 1869. The lands, on account of which this remission was given, have been transferred by the Settlement Department from the head of "Wet" to that of "Dry."

<sup>13.</sup> The cultivation of sugar-cane, as will be seen from the statement, was confined to the Kanigiri Taluq, and even there it was not extensively carried on. The small increase in the Fasli calls for no special remarks. The cultivation of cotton has fallen only in the Ongole Taluq,

while it has increased in the Kandukur and Kanigiri Taluqs; in the former it was five times that of last year. It may here be remarked that cotton cultivation is on the increase in the Kanigiri Taluq. There is a large decrease in the indigo cultivation in the Ongole and Kandukur Taluqs, and but a very slight increase in that cultivation in the Kanigiri Taluq.

15. The Abkari farms having been leased for three Faslis, from Fasli 1279, the revenue from that source is unaltered. The quit-rent on Shrotriems being a fixed sum there is no variation therein. In the other items shown in the above statement there is a decrease in all except one, the Road Fund, in which there is an increase of Rupees 26,329, which is ascribable to the increase of the cess from half to one Anna per Rupee. The decrease in the Ryotwar revenue is attributable to the less favourable season; that in the Income-tax to the reduction of the tax from 3 to 1 per cent., and to the extension of incomes below Rupees 750 from the operation of the Act. Under Land Revenue, Miscellaneous, there is an increase of Rupees 468-10-8 and a decrease of Rupees 7,655-15-7, which give a net decrease of Rupees 7,187-4-11. 16. The increase in Items Nos. 12, 13, and 15, and the decrease in Items Nos. 5, 11, 16, 17. and 19. need no special remarks. Items Nos. 1 and 2 fluctuate with the Ryotwar revenue. and as there has been a fall in that revenue there is a corresponding decrease in these two items. The decrease in Item No. 3 is due to the relinquishment of minor Inams, as also to the attachment and sale of such Inams for arrears. The increase in Item No. 4 is the amount of quit-rent charged on an Inam granted newly in the Singarayaconda shrotriem. The Chayroot farms were not rented out for the Fasli, and hence no revenue was derived from that item. A large extent of Inam lands having been irrigated from Government sources there is an increase in the Item No. 7. Item No. 8 includes the sist on unrecorded occupations brought to notice by the Settlement Department, and Item No. 9 includes the value of trees on such unrecorded occupations. Most of these occupations were disposed of in Fasli 1280, and the number of cases disposed of in the current Fasli were but few, and hence the large decrease in those items. The variation in regard to Item No. 10, between the amounts for the Fasli under report and the previous one, is probably owing to difference in the number of offences for which fines were imposed, and also no doubt to the diverse views entertained by the several officers in regard to their gravity. The increase in Item No. 14 is the amount of sist on lands newly taken up during the Fasli in the Kanigiri Taluq under Circular No. 51 of 1869.

17. Demand, Collection, and Balance of Revenue.—The following statement shows the demand, collection, and balance for Fasli 1281. It will appear therefrom that the balance on the 31st July was less than that on the same date last year. The percentage of collections in this year was 95.43, while it was 93.41 last year:—

- 22. Acquisition of Lands by Public Servants.—In the Fasli under report no public servants appears to have acquired any fresh lands.
- 23. Sub-division of enfranchised Inam VILLAGES.—No sub-division has been made of enfranchised Inam villages in the Fasli.
- 24. Surrender of Ruined Tanks.—No ruined tanks appear to have been made over to ryots in the year, but in Poda Alavalapadu, in the Kanigiri Taluq, permission was granted to nine ryots jointly for the construction of a tank in the village under the Board's Standing Order, No. 125.
- 25. AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS.—Herewith is forwarded a statement showing the agricultural statistics of the Sub-division, prepared in the prescribed form both for the Government and shrotriem villages in accordance with paragraph 4 of the Board's Proceedings, No. 716, dated 1st February 1870. From inquiries made during the Jamabundi, and from the Tahsildars' reports, it appears that the entries in the Adangal have been verified from time to time.
- 26. VILLAGE AND TALUQ ACCOUNTS.—The Village and Taluq accounts have been prepared generally according to the Manuals. Some Curnams were fined in all the three taluqs for their omission to prepare some of the minor accounts, and some for their negligence shown in the preparation of some other accounts. The Taluq accounts in the Kandukur Taluq have been very neatly kept. This cannot be said of the accounts in the other taluqs.
- 27. State of Boundary marks.—The returns received from the taluqs, showing the state of the boundary marks, are submitted herewith. The boundary marks in all the villages of the Kanigiri Taluq are all right, while those in 13 villages of the Ongole, and 43 villages of the Kandukur Taluqs are not in good order. The number of marks damaged in the Ongole Taluq is 1,242, and of those that have disappeared 2,013. Some Gumastahs have been detached by the Deputy Director, Revenue Settlement, to repair the marks damaged and to restore those that have disappeared. In the Kandukur Taluq the number of marks damaged are 269, and those disappearing 1,222.
- 28. ABSENCE OF THE SUB-COLLECTOR FROM THE SUB-DIVISION.—The Sub-Collector was absent on the whole for two months and six days from his division, that is from 29th September to 4th October 1871, and from 27th March to 26th May 1872. In 1871 the Sub-Collector went to Nellore to consult the Collector on some matter, and in 1872 to take charge of the Collector's office during the latter's absence on privilege leave.
- 29. From the annexed statement it will appear that there is an increase of two villages under the head of Ryotwar. These two villages are those transferred from the Kavali to the Kanigiri Taluq in Fasli 1280.:—

- 30. The increase in the number of Zemindari villages is due to the fact that the number entered for Fasli 1276 included only villages situated within the limits of the three Government Taluqs, those in Podile and Darsi not having been included. The number 520 shown for Fasli 1281 is the total number of the Zemindari villages in the Sub-division.
- 31. In the subjoined statement the agricultural stock of the Sub-division is exhibited. The decrease in the number of cows, buffaloes, and sheep call for no special remarks. The demand

32. The population and number of houses is shown in the following statement. The census was taken on the 15th November 1871, as directed by the Board of Revenue. The population has increased during the last five years by 78,553, which is 15·19 per cent. for five years, or 3·4 per cent. per annum. There is also an increase of 4,423 houses over the number in Fasli 1276. The increase is, of course, a natural consequence of the increase in the population. In the accounts received from the Podile and Darsi Divisions details as to the number of houses terraced, tiled, and thatched were not given, and consequently such details have had to be omitted in the statement:—

- 37. It will be observed from this statement that there is an increase both in the occupied and unoccupied ayacut. The increase in the occupied ayacut is attributable to many "Porumboke" (immemorial waste) lands having been brought under cultivation, and partly to the increased extent discovered by survey. The increase in the unoccupied waste is due to the increased extent found by survey, and very slightly to some of the Inam lands having been permanently resumed for default of payment of quit-rent, or for not receiving the title-deeds.
- 38. Having been only a short time in charge of this Division I do not feel myself in a position to say much as to the conduct or efficiency of officials. From what I have seen of the Sub-division Sheristadar Toke Jeyaram Nayudu, who has prepared this report, I am glad to be able to speak of him very highly. He seems to be a very efficient officer, and has given me much assistance.

## SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

## BELLARY.

I mave the honour to submit my Report on the Settlement of this District for Fasli 1281, or 1871-72, A. D., with the prescribed Statements, Annual and Quinquennial.

2. Places where the Settlement was made.—Statement No. 1 shows the places at which the settlement was made by each officer, and the period occupied by the same.

The settlement was commenced in November and completed in June.

It was conducted at two or more places within the limits of each taluq. Of the five taluqs

· Hospett, Kudlighi, Havinhadgally, and Hurpenhully.

settled by me four\* belonged to the Deputy Collector on General Duties, and one (Raidrug) belonged to the Assistant Collector. In return

the Deputy Collector settled Hindupur and Madaksera Taluqs belonging to the Head Assistant Collector. The Sub-Collector settled three of his own taluqs, namely, Gooty, Alur and Adony, and that of Bellary which was under my charge. The Head Assistant Collector conducted the

† Pennakondah and Dhurmaveram.

The Head Assistant Collector conducted the settlement of two of his own taluqs,† and two others belonging to the Sub-Collector (Anantapur and Tadpatry).

3. VARIATIONS IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES.—The variations in the number and tenure of villages are shown in the following abstract:

The increase in the Government villages is owing to the cultivation of lands of four small villages in the Kudlighi Taluq, which were left waste last year. In another small village of the same taluq this year there was no cultivation. Thus the net increase is three under this head. Three Shrotriem villages have been enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner this year and title-deeds issued. One Shrotriem village of the Kudlighi Taluq, the lands of which were left waste last year and brought under cultivation this year, has been added to the number of the villages under that tenure; hence the net decrease under that head is two. The three Shrotriem villages which were enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner having been added to those of Kayem Jodi there is an increase under that head.

4. Puttas.—The total number of puttas as shown in Statement No. 1 amounts to 1,42,456.

The net increase of puttas is 600, which is due to the transfers of portions of putta lands under

the decrees of the Civil Courts, and to the giving up by Puttadars of some lands to co-sharers by means of Razinamahs. For these separate puttas were issued. There is, however, a decrease of 1,684 puttas, the actual increase being 2,284.

5. Season.—The season on the whole was less favourable than in the previous year. The quantity of rain was less. The following statement shows the monthly fall of the same :—
