· SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

NILGIRIS.

I have the honer to report on the Revenue Settlement of the Nilgiri District for the Fasli year 1283 (1873-74). The usual statements accompany.

1. TERRITORIAL CHANGE.—By Order of Government, No. 1,097, of 15th July 1873, the tract known as the Ouchterlony Valley was transferred to the jurisdiction of the Commissioner. The additional territory is estimated to be about 260 square miles in extent, and it comprises twenty coffee estates measuring 3,635 acres, paying revenue at 2 Rupees per acre on planted portions over three years old. For revenue and magisterial purposes the tract has been considered part of the Todanad Village.

2. VILLAGES AND STATIONS AT WHICH THE SETTLEMENT WAS MADE.—I conducted the settlement personally. It was commenced in February and completed in June. The subjoined statement gives the stations at which it was made.

Under cultivated hamlets, an increase of four occurs. They are named Nayeehutty and Maroonthanutty in the Mekanad Village, and Hosahutty and Aramanahutty in the Parapganad Village. These new hamlets have arisen in connection with the coffee industry, the coolies finding it convenient to establish settlements in close proximity to the estates on which they are employed. The new hamlets of Mekanad are in the neighborhood of the Colacumbay Valley properties. Hosahutty is in the vicinity of the coffee estates within a short distance of Kotergherry, and Aramanahutty is between Coonoor and Wellington.

Of the 342 new puttas, 225 were issued to individuals who acquired their holdings by purchase or inheritance, twenty-two were issued to applicants for land at Seegoor falling under the operation of the durkhast rules, nine puttas were renewed to the Kooroombers in accordance with the terms of Board's Proceedings, No. 898, of 4th June 1872, and eighty-six were issued in consequence of miscellaneous changes.

5. SEASON AID SANITARY STATE OF THE DISTRICT.—Under this head I quote in part from my report on the health of the district. "The season was one of drought." On the east face of the Hills the rainfall was considerably below the average. "There was more rain in Colacumbay, but not the usual quantity. Leaf-disease appeared in the estates in this direction."

The rain deficiency on the Koondas was 21 inches. At Kodanad it was 13 inches compared with the fall of the previous year.

- "The tea estates at Kotergherry suffered considerably from drought. In consequence of the want of moisture all over the Hills, the coffee and tea crops were deficient. Fortunately for planters high prices for both these descriptions of produce have prevailed throughout the year."
- "Badaga cultivation suffered from drought. Potatoes failed and dry grains yielded half a crop. Small-pox among the native population broke out in June 1873. In Ootacamund there were about fifty cases, of which one-fourth were fatal. There were outbreaks of this malady at Kotergherry and Coonoor amongst natives, and the disease appeared more or less in the villages scattered over the Hill plateau. The medical officers attributed its appearance to importation from the plains, chiefly from the Madura District after the Pulni festival. Small-pox rarely resists the first burst of the south-west monsoon on the Hills, and the past year was no exception to the rule. In the past year, an increase of venereal disease has been reported. It is believed to be attributable to clandestine prostitution which no sanitary measures can reach. The European population throughout the year has been very healthy."
- 6. BIRTH AND DEATH STATISTICS.—The births and deaths in the district are exhibited in the prescribed statements.

The total number of births was 1,113 against 938 in Fasli 1282. Of the former, 601 were males and 512 females against 509 and 429, respectively, for Fasli 1282. The birth-rate was 22.48

- per 1,000 of the population. The number of deaths egistered was 958, viz., 549 males and 409 females against 923 in 1282. The death-rate was 19:36 per 1,000 of the population. Twenty-eight deaths from small-pox and 503 from fevers were recorded. The registration of these statistics would appear to have been more satisfactory than heretofore.
 - 7. RAINFALL.—The subjoined table exhibits the rainfall at the different stations where registers are maintained. The average fall of the whole district was 50 43 inches, and the number of rainy days 108. The fall was 17 06 inches less than that in 1872-73. It was scanty except during the last two months of the year under review, when it was copious and fairly distributed over the district.

The excessive drought was the cause of the very heavy loss during the year. There were four outbreaks of cattle-disease during the fasli year just closed, which destroyed 306 head. This is about five-sixths of the number of animals attacked, and considerably in excess of the mortality recorded in the previous year. The various outbreaks were from time to time reported to the Board of Revenue.

The tax on trees was under Board's Proceedings, No. 449, of 2nd March 1874, re-transferred to the head of Land Revenue, Miscellaneous. No. 6 consists of several items, the largest being a payment of Rupees 4,795 made by Mr. Wapshare on account of Mr. Ouchterlony's estates in the valley, Rupees 1,780 being the third sexennial instalment of arrears on the Kartery Estates collected under G. O., No. 1,200, of 12th July 1871, and G. O., No. 1,353, of 11th August 1871, Rupees 820 paid by the present proprietors of the Prospect Tea Estate, and Rupees 618 received on account of the Madanaad Estate. The collection of these outstandings was suspended under order of Government, No. 1,659, of 22nd September 1871, Rupees 542 of arrears were collected on Mr. Mullaly's Nerrooly Valley Estate which formed the subject of G. O., No. 2,445, of 30th August 1869, and Rupees 319 were collected from Mr. Groves, under sanction of G. O., No. 460, of 7th May 1873.

Under Sale-proceeds of Waste Lands an increase occurs of Rupees 1,977. Two sales realized large sums, one to Mr. Mullaly for Rupees 1,050, and one to Mr. Reilly for Rupees 673.

15. EXTENT OF LAND CULTIVATED WITH SPECIAL PRODUCTS.—The following statement is intended to show the cultivation of special products, tea, coffee cinchona, tobacco and the ordinally native grains in comparison with the previous fash. The statistics were separately reported as directed in Board's Proceedings, No. 664, of 25th April 1872. The increased acreage under Coffee, amounting to about 600 acres, exclusive of the cultivated area of the Ouchterlony Valley, is satisfactory and may be attributed to the high prices ruling for this product in the Home Market.

The figures are only approximately correct. There has been a diminution of cultivation in the rdinary food-grains of the district, but this has been alluded to above as due to the unfavorable character of the season.

SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

SALEM.

I have the honor to submit with the usual statements my Report on the Revenue Settlement of the Ristrict for Fasli 1283 (1873-74.)

- 2. As in the two preceding years the introduction of the Revenue Settlement protracted the Jamabandi over an unusually long period. It commenced in January and ended in June.
- 3. Having returned from furlough after the expiration of the fasli I took no part in the Jamabandi of the year. Mr. Price, the Acting Collector, settled Uttengiri and Cossoor; Mr. Wilkinson, the Acting Sub-Collector, settled Ahtore, Kistnagheri and Dharampoory; and the Acting Head Assistant Collector (Mr. LeFanu) did Tripatore and Salem.
- 4. The Jamabandi of the Namkul Division was conducted partly by Socriamoorthy Pillai, and partly by Kristna Row, who were acting for Mr. Pritchard.
- 5. The time occupied in the settlement of each taluq is given in Statement No. 1. The Jamabandi of each taluq was made within its own limits, and the places were chosen with due regard to the convenience of the ryots.
- 6. Number of Villages.—The gross number of villages, viz., 2,784, shows a decrease of one village, as compared with the preceding year. This is owing to the fact that the Revenue Settlement Department clubbed two small villages in the Oossoor Taluq with other villages, and that one village, viz., Kodayanji, was transferred from North Arcot to this district as per orders

noted in the margin. Hence there is a net decrease of one village in the total number for the district.

- 7. TENURE OF VILLAGES.—In the tenure of villages there is an increase of one under the head of Shrotriem Jodi, and this is in consequence of the enfranchisement under the Inam rules of a share village.
- 8. Puttas.—The aggregate number of puttas for the year, viz., 202,934, falls short of the last year's number by 1,754. This is owing partly to relinquishments of their holdings by the ryots, whose assessments were raised in the new settlement, and partly to the abolition of the tenure under which lands were held on pasture puttas.
- 9. Of the total number of puttas 46,747-were issued afresh, 146,739 remained unaltered, and 9,448 were old puttas in which changes were simply noted down.
 - 10. The new form of putta is now in force throughout the district.

- 11. Season.—The season was a very indifferent, one. The early rains in May, upon which the dry crops in the upland taluqs depend principally, failed. The fall from April to July was very slight; in August and September it as moderate; and in October, heavy. There was little or no rain afterwards till May.
- 12. It will thus be seen that the season was not favorable for cultivation, especially for dry crops. The heavy rains of October favored the wet cultivation in most parts of the district; but in the Oossoor Taluq, however, the supply that the tanks received was insufficient, and comparatively larger remissions were called for.
- 13. The average rain-fall of the district is shown in the subjoined abstract. Contrasted with the past year it shows a decrease of 13:1:—

- 14. Sanitary Condition.—Public health during the year contrasts favorably with the past one. Fever and small-pox were as usual the chief prevailing diseases; but they were on the whole of a milder nature and less fatal than in the previous year.
- 15. Cholera.—Seven isolated cases of cholera were reported during the year. One of these occurred in the town of Salem, and six (one male and five females) in the Taluq of Trichengode.

 Of the case that occurred in the Salem town the Zillah Surgeon was of opinion that it was not one of cholera, but of aggravated diarrhea. The cases in Trichengode I am inclined to attribute to the same cause.
 - 16. Févers.—Fever prevailed more or less in every taluq, but in Uttengiri it was of a severer type and of longer duration. The deaths (21,566) under this head show a decrease of 1,681 compared with the past year.
 - 17. Small-pox.—This disease was more severe in the Salem town and Southern Taluqs than in other parts of the district. The number of deaths contrasted with the preceding year shows a decrease of 2,126.
 - 18. The enclosed statement shows the number of deaths and births for the year.
- 19. Cattle Disease.—Disease amongst cattle manifested itself throughout the district, especially in the Taluqs of Trichengode, Salem, Tripatore, and Uttengiri. It was not, however, of a severe type. The cyclone of 5th and 6th of May caused a large number of deaths (122,935) amongst cattle. The sudden change from great heat to very great cold struck cattle of all kinds as if by a plague, but I have reason to believe that the number of deaths reported by the village officers was much exaggerated. I am now instituting inquiries on this point.

- 21. It will be seen from the above that prices have risen gradually during the past three years. This I ascribe partly to the adverse character of the season, and partly to the cause mentioned by the Acting Collector in his report for Fasli 1282, viz., to the reaction which has set in after the stimulation given to cultivation by the famine of 1866-67.
- 22. COMMUTATION RATES.—From the ruling prices above shown it will be perceived that with only one exception (Varagoo) the prices of all grains far exceed the commutation prices, which are Rupees 91-10-8 for the Northern Taluqs, and Rupees 100 for the Southern Taluqs.
- 23. Wages of Labor.—In the Tripatore Taluq, where several irrigation works were under progress, and where there was some difficulty in procuring labor on account of certain railway works going on simultaneously, and in the Salem town, where several buildings were under construction, wages of labor rose somewhat. In other parts of the district there were no material changes.
- 24. Introduction of the New Settlement.—The work of the Settlement Department was brought to a close in this district during the year. At the Jamabandi the new settlement rates were introduced into the remaining two taluas of Tripatore and Oossoor.
- 25. Settlement Results.—The settlement results in the two taluas into which the new settlement rates were introduced during the year is shown in the annexed table :—

- 27. Ryots' Holdings—Statement No. 3, Enclosure A.—The extent of land under occupation at the beginning of the year was Acres 1,209,809, assessed at Rupees 18,01,041. Land actually given up during the year amounted to Acres 81,656, assessed at Rupees 86,983. Waste land taken up afresh was Acres 46,616, assessed at Rupees 47,249. The result shows that at the end of Fasli 1283 there was under the occupation of the ryots 16,101 Acres, assessed at Rupees 28,993, less than the extent held by them at the end of the preceding year. This is owing to large relinquishments, especially in the Taluqs of Salem, Ahtore, Trichengode, Uttengiri, and Dharampoory. The relinquishments for the whole district amounted to Rupees 86,983, while lands taken up to only Rupees 47,249. The settlement increase having partly made up the deficiency the net decrease was as above shown Rupees 28,993.
- 28. The large amount of relinquishments must only be ascribed to the unfavorable character of the season.
- 29. The particulars of the item "Lands transferred to other heads," which has been added under deductions in Enclosure A. to Statement No. 3, are as follow:—

- 30. The difference between the figures entered under the head "Sold or transferred," and those under "Purchased or obtained by transfer," is owing to the fact that those under the former head represent the old area and assessment, whilst those under the latter head refer to the area and assessment according to the new settlement rates introduced at the Jamabandi in those taluqs, which were for the first time brought under settlement.
- . 31. ACTUAL CULTIVATION.—The land actually cultivated during the year was Acres 1,147,596, assessed at Rupees 17,03,824, or Acres 23,295, assessed at Rupees 35,737, below the cultivation for the preceding year.
- 32. Waste Remitted.—Acres 3,700, assessed at Rupees 17,005, were remitted under the head "Wet." This was chiefly in the Oossoor Taluq, where the unfavorable character of the season called for more remissions than anywhere else.
- 33. WASTE CHARGED.—Acres 42,412, assessed at Rupees 51,220, were charged. Most of this was under the head "Dry."
- 34. The total Ryotwar beriz, exclusive of Miscellaneous items, amounted according to Column 59 of Statement No. 3 to Rupees 16,34,964, while the sum entered under the same head in the Demand, Collection, and Balance Statement for June last was Rupees 16,34,115, thus showing a difference between the two accounts of Rupees 849. This is owing to the inclusion through a mistake in the Demand, Collection, and Balance Statement under the head "Miscellaneous" instead of "Ryotwar" of the water-tax in the taluqs of Namkul and Tripatore.
- 35. Final Settlement.—The following statement exhibits the cultivation and settlement of the year under review contrasted with the preceding one.

- 36. The decrease in the cultivation has already been accounted for.
- 37. The assessment being consolidated the head "Second crop" is nil.
- 38. The decrease under the head "Additional assessment" is owing partly to the introduction of the "water-tax," and partly to the Settlement Department having carried to the head of "Wet" the lands which hitherto appeared under "Dry converted into wet" in the taluqs of Tripatore and Oossoor.
 - 39. The decrease under "Road Fund" is proportionate to the decrease in cultivation.
- 40. The introduction of the Village Service Cess into the taluqs of Tripatore and Oossoor for the first time accounts for the increase under "Village Service Fund."
 - 41. The Miscellaneous revenue will be treated in its proper place.
- 42. Sugar-cane, Cotton, and Indigo.—The subjoined abstract shows the particulars under this head in a comparative form :—

- 43. There was a slight increase in sugar-cane, and a decrease in Indigo cultivation. The large increase in cotton cultivation is owing to the fact that in the Namkul Taluq the cultivation of cotton in the Muta villages was omitted in the previous year's returns through a mistake.
- 44. It will be seen that the figures entered in Enclosure B. to Statement No. 3, and those entered in Statement No. 2, submitted with my last Revenue Administration Report, do not correspond. The cause of this is owing partly to the omission in the Trichengode Taluq of the cultivation of special products in one-third of the taluq, and partly to the introduction of the settlement rates into the Tripatore and Oossoor Taluqs subsequent to the submission of the Revenue Administration Report.

- 46. The remissions for Shavi (Rupees 4,672) were called for on account of the unfavorable character of the season, especially in the taluqs of Oossoor, Dharampoory, Ahtore, and Trichengode.
- 47. The sum of Rupees 1,601 entered under the head of "Palanastam" represents the difference between the dry and wet assessment of lands depending on certain tanks in the Oossoor, Trichengode, and Namkul Taluqs; owing to their having breached the ayacut under them was unirrigable.
- 48. The small amount under the head "Fixed cowle" appertains to those villages which were not, on account of their feverish and unhealthy situation, brought under the new settlement in the taluqs of Salem, Kistnagherri, and Oossoor.
- 49. The abolition of "Pasture system" under the new settlement accounts for the large decrease under "Remissions for pasture." The small sum which still appears under that head belongs to lands in beds of tanks and other Poramboke—Vide correspondence noted in the margin.

In the present demand only the actual quit-rent for the year, viz., Rupees 616, is included.
- 57. Ryotwar and Miscellaneous.—The variations under this head have already been explained.
- 58. Abkari.—The revenue under this continues to be the same as last year, and it will be seen that the entire demand was collected within the year.
- 59. Income-tax.—The amount (Rupees 10) which appears under this head was collected in arrears during the year, and the same is entered under the head "Demand."
- 60. Revision of Assessment.—The subjoined statement shows the land revenue for a series of years, commencing with Fasli 1264 (1854-55), which was the year preceding that in which Mr. Brett's general reduction of assessment was introduced:—

- 61. DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE, CURRENT.—Statement No. 7 exhibits the particulars under this head.
- 62. Mutas.—The balance against the permanently settled estates was, at the end of the fasli, Rupees 48,561. The subsequent collections to the end of August reduced this to Rupees 27,206. These are due chiefly from the mutas of Kundarapully in the Kistnagiri Taluq, and Razipur in the Salem Taluq. Both are under Government management, and portions of the former have been advertised for sale under the orders of the Beard, dated 1st August 1874, No. 2,048.
- at the end of August Rupees 7,055. The agraharams in arrears have been advertised for sale.
- 64. Ryotwary and Miscellaneous.—The ryotwary and miscellaneous balance was at the end of the fasli Rupees 2,07,601, and at the end of August Rupees 1,17,430. The large balance under this head is owing to an order which the late Acting Collector issued immediately after the cyclone of May last, directing the Tahsildars not to press collections for some time. Measures have now been adopted for realizing the still outstanding balance.

great measure to the orders marginally noted, which enabled the Revenue authorities to pro-

ceed against the movable property of the Mutadars.

- 67. Stringent measures adopted for the collection of the revenue under "Jodigy" was the cause of the increase under that head.
- 68. The large decrease under Ryotwary and Miscellaneous is owing to there having been smaller amount of arrears outstanding under these heads at the beginning of the fasli under report than at the beginning of the preceding fasli.
 - 69. The increase under "Stamps" is due to the extensive use of the Court Fee ctamps.
- 70. ARBEARS OF REVENUE.—It will be observed from Statement No. 8 that the arrears of former faslis amounted at the end of the year to Rupees 1,03,545, and at the end of August to Rupees 1,00,736. Of this amount Rupees 66,064 are irrecoverable. This sum includes Rupees 29,878 which was recommended in the last year's report for remission. It will be written off in the accounts of September under the sanction of Government conveyed in the Board's Proceedings, dated 18th August 1874, No. 2,295. The amount, for writing off which sanction is now solicited, is therefore only Rupees 36,186, and I request that it may be accorded.

71. The amount shown as "Irrecoverable" was set down as such after careful inquiries

made by the Settlement Officers at the Jamabandi.

72. The amount recommended for remission includes Rupees 1,708, being the assessment of the lands taken up for public purposes in mutas and agraharams as per enclosed statement. This will not occur in future if the application submitted to the Board by the late Acting Collector on the 4th June last for the permanent deduction of the amount from the peishcush is sanctioned.

73. The amount entered under "Income-tax" is all the balance remaining under that

head, and there is no prospect of the amount being realized.

74. Coercive Process.—Process under Act II. of 1864 (Madras) were issued against 8,985 defaulters for the recovery of Rupees 1,30,094. The property actually sold realized Rupees 26,546. The particulars are given in detail in Enclosure A. to Statement No. 8.

75. PROCESS FEES.—The Process fees collected during the year amounted to Rupees 1,512.

76. Interest.—A statement showing the interest realized on arrears of revenue is enclosed. It shows that Rupees 6,026 under "Land Revenue," and Rupees 138 under Abkari, were realized during the year.

77. CHARGES—Statement No. 9.—The charges for the year amounted to Rupees 1,95,607, or Rupees 17,409 below those of the past year. The only variation that calls for any remark is the decrease under "Salary of Collector, etc.," and this is owing chiefly to the fact of my having been absent on furlough.

- 79. VILLAGE AND TALUQ ACCOUNTS.—These accounts were as usual examined by the several officers who conducted the settlement, and are reported to be satisfactorily kept.
- 80. There has been a marked improvement in the preparation of the Mortuary returns. Accuracy in the registration of births and deaths has been insisted upon.
- 81. The Treasury accounts of the Namkul and Trichengode Taluqs were examined by the Treasury Deputy Collector, Mr. Johnston, during the year, and his report has already been laid, before the Board with the late Acting Collector's letter of the 16th May 1874, No. 165. Mr. Johnston was also recently employed in examining the accounts of Dharampoory and Tripatore Taluqs, and the various defects and inaccuracies which that officer has detected in the accounts will be pointed out to all the taluq officials by Circular.
- 82. SUB-COLLECTOR'S REPORT.—The report of the Sub-Collector on the settlement of his Division, which does not call for any special remark, is enclosed.

- 7. Season.—The average rain-fall during the year was 21.68 inches against 38.08 inches in the preceding year. The details of the rainfall during each month are given in the margin.
- 8. From this it will be seen that the rain-fall was exceedingly small and the season unfavorable for cultivation. Many, in fact most of the tanks, received but a limited supply. In many cases both wet and dry crops failed entirely, and in others the outturn was small.
- 9. Sanitary Condition.—The public health during the year under review was on the whole good. The division was entirely free from cholera. Small-pox and fever prevailed to a certain extent, especially in the Kistnagherry Taluq. The Medical subordinate attached to the Sub-Collector's office was sent to this taluq and spent some months there, and his treatment was successful in ameliorating the condition of the fever-stricken patients. The mortality was not large from either fever or small-pox. Vaccination is being extended, each taluq being divided into circles and a Vaccinator appointed to each circle. In March last a charitable Dispensary, supported entirely by voluntary donations and subscriptions, was opened in Oossoor, and already some 4,278 persons have been treated.
- 10. The diseases named "Komari" and "Kundu" were prevalent among cattle, but the loss by disease was insignificant. Medicines were obtained from Dr. Scudder of Arcot and freely distributed. Segregation of healthy and sick cattle was attended to. There was a heavy loss of cattle during the cyclone in May last, as many as 10,014 head of cattle perishing in the Oossoor Taluq alone.
- 11. PRICES.—As a necessary consequence of the indifferent season the prices of all articles of food rose during the year under review, as is shown in the comparative statement below :—

- 13. From the above statement it will be seen that in the year under report there was a net decrease in the cultivated area of 3,584 Acres, assessed at Rupees 19,932.
- 14. The increase under the head of Wet is due principally to the excess area discovered by the Survey Department in the Oossoor Taluq having been added to the puttas, and to the introduction in that taluq of the new Settlement rates. One of the reasons for the large decrease under the head Dry is due to the abolition of the Grazing-tax in Oossoor. All lands formerly held on this favorable tenure having been fully assessed large relinquishments took place, which were not counterbalanced by the lands taken up in the other taluqs.

33. Shrotriem Jodi.—Two villages were enfranchised and one shrotriem was incorporated with the Government villages. The result of these changes (the quit-rent on the shrotriem village incorporated with Ayen being less than that fixed on the two newly enfranchised villages) would naturally have caused an increase in the demand, whereas there was an actual decrease of Rupees 1,690. This is owing to a mistake committed last year in the Oossoor Taluq. In Fasli 1282 orders were issued to collect quit-rent for past years on a certain shrotriem in this taluq which had been resumed, but was restored in that fasli. The collections were credited to Shrotriem Jodi instead of to Land Revenue, Miscellaneous, and so the shrotriem demand in fasli 1282 was increased.

- Mudaliar, died. In him Government have lost a valuable public servant. His successor only cined the office in August, but is performing his duties most satisfactorily. The Tahsildar of Oossoor, D. B. Seshagherry Rao, having completed the settlement of the boundary between Mysore and Salem, which work he performed in a most praiseworthy manner, resumed charge of his taluq in November last. I have had every reason to be satisfied both with him and the Tahsildars of Kistnagherry and Dharampoory. The Sheristadar of the Oossoor Taluq, Rama Rao, is, I regret to observe, utterly unfit for his position. Tiroovencadum Pillai, Sub-Magistrate of Pennagaram, has been recommended for dismissal. With the exception of the Head Clerk of my office, whom, for repeated disobedience of orders and utter unfitness for such a post, I have had to remove: the other subordinates of the Sub-Division have given me satisfaction.

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I have the honor to submit the Annual Report on the Settlement of the Revenues of the District for Fasli 1283 (1873-74), together with the usual Statements.

2. Places at which the Settlement was made.—Of the five taluqs of the District Kundapur and Udipi, forming the range of the Head Assistant, were settled by the Collector; Mangalore and Uppinangadi by the Acting Head Assistant Collector, Mr. E. Gibson; and Kassergode by the Assistant Collector, Mr. G. Stokes. The settlement was commenced on the 10th January and closed on the 21st April. The accompanying Statement No. 1 indicates the places and dates at which each taluq was settled.

4. RAIN-FALE.—The following statement shows the fall of rain during the year; exhibiting a remarkable decrease of 57 Inches and 48 Cents against the quantity that fell in the previous year:—

- 5. SEASON —The quantity of rain that fell during the year was seasonable, while that of the previous year was unusually heavy and irregular. The decrease did not in any way affect agriculture; on the other hand the double crop rice-fields produced a better outturn. The single crop uplands and gardens, however, seem to have slightly suffered; the fall of rain in the latter stages of the monsoon being somewhat scanty, but the yield on the whole was not unsatisfactory.
- 6. Sanitary Countries.—The state of public health was generally good during the year. The annexed table represents the mortality of the district by various causes. The district prioved immunity from cholera. The two deaths, however, recorded against this epidemic would seem to have been due to cholera of a sporadic type. Fever and small-pox were the chief prevailing diseases. The former exhibited a decrease of 234 in the number of its victims, while the latter showed an increase, not withstanding the efforts of the Vaccine establishment. On the whole a comparison of the Mortuary Registers of Faslis 1282 and 1283 shows an increase of 393 deaths during the past year. Probably this increase is only apparent, and is due to greater accuracy in the village returns:—

7. Health of Cattle.—There was a decided improvement in the health of cattle. The returns show a decrease of 2,212 in the number of deaths. The district was almost free from epidemic disease. The ravages of tigers also exhibited a marked decline, there being a decrease of 458, or nearly one-third in the mortality under this head. This is accounted for by the enhanced rewards offered and paid for the destruction of these animals.

village of Kadapara, in Kassergode Taluq, not having been taken up for cultivation.

16. Cultivation of Special Products.—The only special products grown in the district are sugar-cane and cotton. In the former there was no material difference. The cultivation of the latter article was introduced for the first time in the previous year, a probable area of 32 Acres having been cultivated among rice and other crops in the Kumeri lands of the Kassergolo Taluq. The experiment having produced rather a favorable result 45 Acres more were cultivated during the year, but the produce is reported to have fallen off by one-third per acre of that of the previous year, which is to be accounted for by the scantiness of the rain in the latter stages of the monsoon.

- 51. Examination of Taluq Treasury.—During the year under review one Taluq Treasury, was examined by the Treasury Deputy Collector. A few irregularities and errors of a petty nature were discovered, but instructions have been issued to rectify them.

Report for the year. I cannot, however, leave the district without placing on record, for incorporation in that report by my successor, my deep sense of obligation to my Head Assistant, Mr. Edward Gibson, and my Assistant, Mr. Gabriel Stokes, in that they have been indeed Assistants to me in the full sense of the name. They have relieved me of all amjeties about their charges, by making me feel that they did their duty therein not only with pains taking care but also with ability and judgment, that left nothing to be desired, and any call on their extra energies was ever met with kindly readiness however hard the strain, and at times it has been very hard, so hard that it is a matter of astonishment that the Government is so well served as it is.

The Treasury Deputy Collector, Mr. B. C. Leggatt, has been a constant source of anxiety, and his discharge of his duties very far from satisfactory.

About the marginally noted Tahsildars, I have only to repeat the remarks of last year,

His ability is decided, his application very great, and his personal influence from natural strength

SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

MALABAR.

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I have the honor to submit my Report upon the Revenue Settlement and Collections of this District for the last Fasli 1283 (1873-74), accompanied by the usual Statements as per list enclosed.

- 2. The settlement of the taluqs were conducted by the several officers of the district as noted in the margin.
- 3. Puttas.—There were 169,879 puttas issued during the year, showing an increase of 2,245 over the previous year, which is due to transfer of holdings, increase of cultivation,

and other ordinary causes that call for no remarks.

- 4. TERRITORIAL CHANGE. There was so change in the number of villages during the year.
- 5. Season.—The total rain-fall was less than that of the previous year. The north-east monsoon, on which the second crop is mainly dependant, failed in November when it is usually expected, and the result was that the crop seriously suffered in several parts of the district. The subjoined table will show that the fall was much less in that month than that of the corresponding period of any of the preceding four years. There was, however, no scarcity of food, the local

markets being well supplied with grains imported from Mangalore and other places by sea and backwater, and from Eastern districts by rail.

6. Sanitary Condition.—The sanitary condition of the district was far from satisfactory, and indeed worse than that of any of the previous four years as the following table will show. The chief source of the mortality was small-pox, which swept over the face of the district and proved very destructive, especially in Ponani where the number of deaths from this cause alone was 8,952. The disease has become endemic in that taluq for the last two years. The Vaccination staff has been hard at work and considerable temporary addition made, but little check therefrom is perceptible:—

- 11. GRANT OF COWLES .- Forty-five cowles were issued during the year for the reclamation of waste land, viz., 8 for 77 Acres of Try land, and 37 for 177 Acres of wet land.
- 12. Remissions,-Statement No. 4 will show that the remissions granted during the year amounted to Rupees 12,022-13-0, or in excess of those for the previous year by Rupees 6,885-5-9. · Of this, however, Rupees 7,269-8-1 would more correctly be noted as transfer, being arrear due in the Ouchterlony Valley, the realization of which fell to the Commissioner of the Nilgiris, so that the amount of real remission is not abnormal.

The collections under the several heads of revenue aggregated Rupees 38,86,995, which are less than those of the previous year by Rupees 33,624. The decrease is explained under the several heads to which the sum appertains.

- 14: Land Revenue, Permanently Settled.—The decrease under this head is owing to the non-paymere by Sultan Ali Rajah of Cannanore of any portion of the peishcush due by him for the year. This added to the previous year's peishcush and Rupees 14,000 of that due for Fasli 1281, which also remain uncollected, makes a sum of Rupees 44,486 outstanding against him. It is not necessary to recapitulate here the circumstances under which this demand is left to accumulate, as they are already in the knowledge of Board and Government. The only course now left is to attach a portion of the estate.
- 15. Ryotwar.—The decrease under Ryotwar and is ellaneous is too small to call for remarks.
- 16. Abkari.—The Abkari farms were left for three years together from Fasli 1282, and hence the absence of any fluctuations in the revenue requiring explanation.
- 17. Salt—There is a decrease of Rupees 65,719 under this head as compared with the previous year, and it is attributable to the extensive illicit manufacture of country salt carried on in sea-board taluqs, more especially in that of Ponani, not only for domestic purposes of the manufacturers but also for clandestine sale in inland parts. As the manufacture is legal and mere possession, no matter in what unreasonable quantities, is not penal it is almost impossible to put a stop to the illicit trade. The charges on account of this item do not show any material difference. The quantity of salt purchased during the year was 611,090 Maunds, or 3,479 Maunds less than the purchase of the previous year. The rate of price was 8 Annas and 4 Pies higher per garce, which is not noteworthy, as the previous year's rate was less than that of its predecessor by Rupees 4-5-11 per garce.
- 18. Sea Customs.—This item shows a comparative decrease of Rupees 19,617, which is due to the falling off in the quantity of cocoanut oil exported and of European liquors imported during the year under report.
- 19. Land Customs.—The increase of Rupees 631 under this head is on account of the duty levied on French liquor passed over from the Foreign State of Mahé into British territory.
- 20. Stamps.—Under this head occurs an increase of Rupees 89,942, of which the great bulk (Rupees 89,528) was contributed by the sale of Court Fees stamps. This result was brought

of Government of India, dated 10th February about by the present system* of collecting Process Service fees in Courts in stamps instead of in cash as heretofore. The practice was in force only for one month in the preceding year, which accounts for the law increase.

21. Income-tax.—The decrease observable under this item is explained by the fact that no Income-tax Act was in force during the year 1873-74. Out of Rupees 1,791 shown under collection Rupees 209 represents sums realized in respect of cases which, having escaped assessment in the previous year, were brought to account during the year under review.

22. Balance.—The uncollected balances that outstood at the close of Fasli 1283 aggregated Rupeel 1.24,414, of which Rupees 52,812 is the arrear of previous fasli. Out of this latter sum Rupees 29,426 represents the arrears of peishcush due by Sultan Ali Rajah of Cannanore and which, added to the sum of Rupees 15,000 payable by him for the year under report, raises the total demand against him to Rupees 44,426, as shown in paragraph 14 above. Of the remaining sum of Rupees 79,988, Rupees 60,775 appertains to the Wynaad Taluq and the greater portion of this is coffee tax due by European planters. The postponement of the demand last year exercised an unfavorable effect on this year's collections, the demand being a double one. The season, though not so disastrous as the previous one, was far from good. The remainder is such as ordinarily occurs and requires no explanation. Rupees 39,270 has been collected since the close of the fasli.

23. Of the above balances Rupees 8,222-11-1 has to be struck off the accounts as irrecoverable. This sum consists of Rupees 1,055-13-1 of the amount recommended to be written off in the previous year's report, and of Rupees 2,987-2-11 and Rupees 4,179-11-1 on account of Land Revenue and Incometax, respectively; the latter being included in this report with reference to Board's Circular Memorandum, dated 9th March 1874, No. 322. The particulars of these two items which are to be struck off the account for the year under report are as noted below. Items Nos. 9 and 10 under Land Revenue are balances, for reasons stated in paragraph 24 of my last year's report, and belong to Fasli 1282:—

- 24. Statement No. 9 will show that the charges of the year amounted to Rupees 5,55,337 against Rupees 5,63,999 of the previous year. The decrease of Rupees 8,662 is owing to the order of the Government of India, prohibiting the allowance of discount to licensed vendors of Court Fees stamps, which was in force for a few months of the year tile cuntermanded by another order of the same authority.

- 26. Examination of Taluq and Village Accounts.—The Taluq and Village accounts, as far asothey are applicable to this district, are kept up regularly. The latter were examined by the several settling officers and found generally in a satisfactory condition.
- 27. Examination of Taluq Treasury under Stand No. VIII. of 1874.—The Taluq Treasury of Palghaut was examined by the Treasury Deputy Collector in March of the year under report and the accounts were found in good order. A few irregularities found in the mode of keeping the accounts have been rectified.
- 28. REMARKS ON THE CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATES. An unusual number of vacancies occurred among the higher officials of the district, and four new Tahsildars had to be appointed, or as many as had been appointed in the preceding twelve years.

The Huzur Sheristadar, Tayil Ramunni, accompanied me during the inquiries into the Moplah disturbances, and, as usual, rendered most valuable assistance. His sudden death, almost immediately afterwards, deprived the district of one of its most useful and trustworthy public servants. His death was shortly afterwards followed by that of the Ernad Taluq Tahsildar, Ramunni Marar. This officer had for twenty years been Tahsildar, first of Walluvanad and then of Ernad, and during this long period he earned a reputation for ability and integrity both with his superiors and among the people such as I have never known excelled. For many years his decision had been always accepted as final. The other Tahsildars have continued to merit approbation, and I am glad to be able to testify to the satisfactory manner in which the duties of Eheristadar have been transacted by the present incumbent, Krishna Pattar.
