Government, No. 543, dated 24th March 1871, sanctioning the transfer of the resumed or relinquished minor Inams in Zemindaries and Polliems to the proprietors on a reduced Taram assessment to be added to the quit-rent or peishcush, has made this item a fluctuating one. The increase of Rupees 61 under this head is owing to the resumed and relinquished Inams in some of the Shrotriems in the Kanigiri and Kandukur Taluqs being transferred to the Shrotriemdars, with an addition of the reduced assessment on such Inams to the quit-rent on the several Shrotriems—Vide Board's Proceedings, No. 1,857, dated 18th September 1872, and the Collector's docket, No. 1,197, of the 28th May 1873. The small increase in the Ryotwar revenue needs no remark. There was no change in the Abkári revenue, as the Abkári farms of the district were rented for three faslis from Fasli 1282. The abolition of the Income-tax from April 1873 is the cause of the decrease under that head. No explanation is necessary for the slight increase in the Road Fund. Under the head of Land Revenue, Miscellaneous, there is an increase of Rupees 7,171-5-3, and a decrease of Rupees 737-10-8, which gives a net increase of

Rupees 6,433-10-7. The devails of this item for the past and current faslis are compared in the subjoined statement:—

16. Items Nos. 1 and 2 fluctuate with the Ryotwar revenue, and as there has been an increase in that revenue there has been a corresponding increase in these two items. The decrease in Item No. 3 is due to the transfer of minor Inams in some of the Shrotriem villages in the Kanigiri and Kandukur Taluqs to the Shrotriemdars in accordance with the order of Government, No. 543, dated 24th March 1871. Survey excesses in Inams, in about twelve villages of the Kanigiri Taluq, were charged for in the fasli under report, as the accounts from the Settlement Department were received only in this fasli. Some cases in the Ongole Taluq, which were under inquiry, were finally disposed of in the fasli under report; and hence the increase in Item No. 4. The increase in Item No. 7 is due to heavy prohibitory assessment being charged in all cases of unauthorized cultivation, however small in order to repress the tendency of ryots to cultivate without permission. Lands covered with trees were generally given on Cowle puttas, ary hence the decrease in Item No. 8 and increase in Item No. 12. In the year under report, no commission was charged for sale of distrained property as there were no such sales; hence the decrease in Item No. 13. The increase in Item No. 17 is the charge on survey excesses in Bhalerow's Inams in Chundy. Some of the Cheyroot farms in the Kandukur Taluq were rented in the fasli under report, and hence the increase in Item No. 20 is the charge mainly levied on

encroachments on Government lands by prickly-pear, partly also on enclosures for straw stacks, cattle pens, etc., fenced by hedges of other materials erected on such lands. The increase in Items Nos. 5, 6, 10, 15, 16 and 21, and the decrease in Items Nos. 9, 11 and 19 call for no special remarks.

17. Demand, Collection, and Balance of Revenue.—The subjoined statement shows the demand, collection, and balance of revenue for Fasli 1283. It will appear therefrom that the balance due on the 31st July 1874 was Rupees 44,056-6-7. This is considerably more than double the balance of last year on the corresponding date, viz., 31st July 1873. The percentage of collections in the fasli is 93.96, while it was 97.68 in Fasli 1282. The greatest portion of the balance is in the Kandukur Taluq as shown below, and the cause of such a high balance is almost entirely due to the loss on jonna and sazza crops suffered in the Kandukur and Ongole Taluqs:—

- 23. Acquisition of Lands by Public Servants.—No public servant appears to have acquired and fresh lands in the year under report.
- 24. Sub-division of Engranchised Inam Villages.—In the year under report no enfranchised Inam villages were sub-divided.
  - 25. SURRENDER OF RUINED TANKS .- No ruined tanks were made over to ryots during the year.
- 26. AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS.—A statement prepared in the prescribed form showing the agricultural statistics of the three taluqs of the Sub-Division is herewith submitted. From inquiries made at the Jamabandi, and from the Tahsildars' reports, it appears that the entries in the Addangal have been from time to time verified.
- 27. STATE OF BOUNDARY MARKS.—From the returns received from the Tahsildars, which are herewith submitted, it appears that all the boundary marks in the Kanigiri Taluq were in good order. In thirteen villages of the Ongole Taluq 1,242 marks were damaged and 2,013 have disappeared. These numbers appear to be the same as shown in the last year's return. In thirty-seven villages of the Kandukur Taluq 1,119 marks have disappeared and 191 were damaged. This shows that greater care is bestowed on the preservation of the marks in the taluq.
- 28. ABSENCE OF THE SUB-COLLECTOR FROM THE SUB-DIVISION.—The Sub-Collector was absent from his division on the whole for forty-nine days, that is from 1st to 24th July and 8th August to 1st September 1873. On both occasions he went to Nellore on general duty.
- 29. VILLAGE AND TALUQ ACCOUNTS.—The Village accounts have been generally prepared according to the forms and instructions contained in the Manual. The Taluq accounts were as prescribed in the Manual and were also neatly kept in the three taluqs.
- 30. CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATES.—I am glad to repeat my favorable report of last year as to the conduct of my Sheristadar Toke Jeyaram Nayudu, and of the Tahsildars and Deputy Tahsildars.

# SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

## BELLARY.

I HAVE the honor to submit my Report on the Settlement of this district for Fasli 1283 or A. D. 1873-74, with the prescribed Statements.

- 2. Places where the settlement was made.—Statement No. 1 shows the places at which the settlement was made by each officer, and the period occupied by the same. The settlement was commenced in November and completed in April. It was conducted at two or more places within the limits of each taluq. I settled four taluqs, viz., Pennakondah, Hindupur, Madaksira and Dharmaveram, belonging to the Head-Assistant Collector, who in return settled two taluqs, Bellary and Anantapur, of which the former belonged to myself, and the latter to the Sub-Collector. The Sub-Collector conducted the settlement of four of his taluqs, viz., Gooty, Adony, Aloor and Tadpatri. The Deputy-Collector on General duties settled Hospett, Hoovinhadgalli, Kudlighi and Harpanhalli Taluqs, all four in his own charge, and the additional Deputy-Collector settled Raidrug which is under his charge.
- 3. VARIATIONS IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES.—The variations in the number and tenure of villages are given in the subjoined abstract:—

There is an actual increase in the taluq of Kudlighi of four villages, owing to the lands belonging to those villages having been newly cultivated this year. But there is a decrease of three villages named Chowdeswarahal, Siddapur and Narsapur, in the Adony Taluq. These small villages were situated so close to other large villages as to admit of their amalgamation with the latter, as proposed by the Revenue Survey Department. This was carried out under the Orders of the Board, Miscellaneous Nos. 5,305 and 5,479, dated 21st and 28th August 1873, respectively. In the same taluq, another village called Madara, which was formerly a hamlet, was made a separate village on the proposal of the Survey Department, and under the above Board's Order, No. 5,479; the net decrease therefore in this taluq is two villages. One village in the Tadpatri Taluq was transferred to the Cuddapah District owing to its being almost surrounded with villages belonging to that district. This was done on the proposal of the Revenue Survey Department, and under the Orders of the Board of Revenue, Miscellaneous No. 3,242, dated 28th May 1873. Thus there is a net increase of one in the Government villages. There has been no change in villages of other descriptions.

- 4. Puttas.—The total number of puttas as shown in Statement No. 1 is 1,46,455. The net increase of puttas is 3,139, which is chiefly due to the transfers of lands by puttadars to their co-sharers, to the issue of separate puttas under the decrees of Civil Courts, and to the cultivation of waste-lands. There is, however, a decrease of 240 puttas, the actual increase being 3,379.
- 5. Season.—The season on the whole was less favorable than in the previous year. The total failure of the early rains was felt generally throughout the district. But the later rains were favorable for the cultivation of the later crops. The subjoined Statement shows the monthly fall of rain:—

Acres 462 assessed at Rupees 796 have been newly taken up on cowle tenure. The lands held on cowle tenure in the year under report are therefore acres 507 assessed at Rupees 885. 21. RUINED TANKS.—Applications for repairing two ruined tanks were received this year.

One of these tanks had no irrigable area under-it; dry assessment has been therefore ordered to

be charged on the lands irrigated by it. The other tank had its own irrigable area, 20 acres, and permission to repair it was given on payment of the highest dry rate; Rupees 2-8-0 per acre on the lands to be irrigated by the tank.

22. Particuliers of Remissions.—Statement No. 4 contains particulars of remissions of all kinds on cultivated lands. These amount to Rupees 9,016 showing an increase of Rupees 369 on those of last fasli.

The increase under the first head is owing to the grant of remissions on account of withered crops and also on account of dry crops raised in wet lands for want of water. The decrease under the second head is due to a smaller extent of Dasavandum lands being cultivated than in the previous year. The increase under the third head is attributable to the remissions allowed newly to the

ciently remunerated for their services. This amounts to Rupees 132, but there is a decrease under Other items such as Kandachari remission and Inam remission, etc., in the former owing to the relinquishment of the Kandachari lands on account of inability to perform the duties, and to the cultivation of lands held on that tenure to a smaller extent than usual; and in the latter to the cultivation to a smaller extent of the lands on which Inam remission was usually allowed. The net increase is therefore Rupees 34, as shown in the above abstract.

Enclosure A to Statement No. 4 is prepared in accordance with the Official Memorandum of the Board of Revenue, No. 750, dated 6th June 1872. It gives the particulars of dry and wet for all remissions granted on cultivated lands. The amount under Dry is Rupees 4,986, while that under Wet is Rupees 4,030.

23. MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.—Statement No. 5 contains the particulars of Miscellaneous items and the usual memorandum explanatory thereof is submitted. This shows a decrease of Rupees 10,156-4-7, as compared with last year. This is attributable chiefly to the variations under the items exhibited below:—

Many Inam lands upon which water-tax for second crop cultivation was charged last year were cultivated in the year under report with only one crop for want of water. Under this head alone there is a decrease of Rupees 10,077.

The decrease in the first two items is also due to the same cause. But the last one is attributable to the ryots not cultivating lands without permission to the same extent as in the previous year, and therefore the charge under "Prohibitory assessment fell short. Enclosure A to Statement No. 5 is prepared in accordance with the form sent by the Board, with their Proceedings No. 811, dated 20th June 1873. This shows the particulars of the extent of dry and wet for all the miscellaneous items given in Statement No. 5.

24. Statement No. 6 exhibits the demand, collection and balance of Shrotriem and Jodi villages enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner. This shows a net decrease of Rupees 0-12-6. It is due to the reduction of quit-rent on the lands taken up for a road.

Enclosure A to Statement No. 6 is prepared according to the form sent by the Board, with their Official Memorandum, No. 824, dated 11th July 1873. This gives the particulars of the extent of dry and wet, etc., for the amount of quit-rent entered in Statement No. 6.

This shows a net decrease of Rupees 52,754. The decrease of Land Revenue is due to the decrease of cultivation as already noticed. The Abkari farm of this district has been rented out for three years from Fasli 1282 to 1284 for Rupees 7,00,900. The decrease under that head is in the amount of sale proceeds of liquor confiscated under the Abkari Act, and in the fees levied on the licenses issued for the sale of European liquors.

The decrease of Income-tax is owing to the abolition of that tax for the year under report.

The decrease of Salt revenue is owing to the decrease in the manufacture of earth salt in

consequence of the introduction of the system of charging gradually increasing rates on salt pans, under the recent orders\* of the Board.

The Stamp revenue is of a fluctuating character; its increase in this year is chiefly due to the levy of Procees fees by means of Court Fees labels, under the Orders of Government, No. 10, dated 1st April 1873, communicated by the Board of Revenue, in their Proceedings, No. 722, dated 6th May 1873.

The decrease in the collection of arrears is chiefly due to the existence of a smaller amount of arrears at the beginning of the year under report than in the previous year. - The balance of the current demand at the end of Fasli 1282 was Rupees 1,20,681-10-7 and that of the year under report is Rupees 1,35,034-5-11, showing an increase of Rs. 14,352-11-4. This is due to the insufficiency of the early rains on account of which the cultivation of the early crop was carried out to a less extent than in the previous year; the ryots were therefore unable to pay their kists regularly.
- 29. Of this balance, however, were collected up to the end of August last Rs. 1,15,464-1-0,
- and measures are being taken for the collection of the balance. 30. Statement No. 8 exhibits the collection of arrears of all sources, which leaves a balance

of Rupees 26,358-9-3. This shows a decrease on that of last year of Rupees 4,190-12-11, This is due to the amount of arrears being less at the beginning of the fasli than that in last

year. The balance consists of Rupees 12,302-11-10, which was recommended in the previous year's report to be written off; sanction " for which has only now been received. A sum of Rupees 3,593-5-1, recommended to be written off in the Settlement Report of Fasli 1281 is also included in the balance. This has now been ordered+ to be written off. If these sums be deducted from the total balance of Rs. 26,358-9-3, there remains Rs. 10,462-8-4, an amount less by Rupees 4,063-14-6 than the balance of last year. Of the current demand there remains a balance of Rupees 19,570-4-11 unrealized at the end of August last, which is Rupees 0-9-3 per cent. on the demand of the district. The balance of the old arrears has been reduced to Rupees 10,065-5-2.

31. Statement No. 9 shows the charges under various heads.

Refunds of Revenue. - There is an increase of Rupees 1,910-1-3. The Refunds must always fluctuate, as they are made in cases of over-collections, etc. They occur in the present year under the heads of Land Revenue and Magisterial fines.

Collector's salaries.—The increase under this head is Rupees 22,902-2-9. The Collector was confirmed in his appointment in this district in March 1873, and since that time his salary has been charged to the head of "Land Revenue," whereas it was previously debited to "Law and Justice," as his permanent appointment was that of a District Judge. This is the chief cause for the increase.

Tent and House-rent allowances.—The decrease under this head is Rupees 237-9-11. No tentage or house-rent was paid to the Additional Deputy-Collector, whereas they were paid to the Assistant Collector who was posted to this district in the previous fasli. Hence the decrease.

Salaries of the Huzur and Taluq establishments. — Under this head there is a decrease of Rupees 1,946-8-1. This is owing to the non-payment of salaries of a suspended Tahsildar and a Sub-Magistrate who went on privilege leave within the year.

Saderward .- Under this head there is a small increase of Rupees 133-11-6 due to the . purchase of things with reference to the requirements of the officers.

Medical Charges.—Under this head there is a decrease of Rupees 276-5-10. The Collector's Apothecary was absent on privilege leave : his pay for that period was debited to the Military Department, hence the decrease.

Contingencies.—There is an increase of Rupees 1,870 under this head, due to the payment of the salary of the temporary establishment in this year as well as charges on account of batta to establishment and extra tentage.

Miscellaneous.—Under this head, there is a decrease of Rupee 2,438-15-7. Service labels for the Printing Office are now debited to Printing. Whereas the cost was debited to Land Revenue in last year.

Abkari Contingencies.—There is a decrease of Rupees 105-2-0. No Abkari Muchilkas were registered in Fasli 1283 whereas one was registered in Fasli 1282, in consequence of the

death of an old contractor; hence the decrease.

Income-tax — There is a decrease of Rupees 1,248-6-6. This is due to the abolition of the establishment entertained for the performance of the duties connected with the Income-tax which has ceased to be charged since April 1873.

Stamps.—There is a decrease of Rupees 3,988-9-8. This is attributable to the reduction of the rate of discount on the sale of Court Fees Stamps and to the prohibition of their sale by

Stamp Vendors during the year under report.

32. Of the old arrears of Rupees 25,961-6-1, Rupees 7,559-7-9 are now recommended to be written off as irrecoverable. This leaves a balance of Rupees 18,401-14-4, of this amount Rupees 15,896-0-11 was recommended last year to be written off; sanction however has only lately been received (vid: Board's Proceedings, No. 2,295, dated 18th August last, received on the 14th September 1874,) orders will be issued to write off the amount in the Demand, Collection, and Balance Statement for September 1874. The remainder Rupees 2,505-13-5 may perhaps be recovered. Strict orders have been issued for its collection. Particulars of arrears now recommended to be written off are given in the Statement marked R. Of the total amount Rupees 7,559-7-9, Rupees 5,324-13-2 relate to the Jodi of the village servants; out of this Rupees 630-15-5 are irrecoverable on account of death, poverty, and other causes. The remainder is Rupees 4.693-13-9. This consists of Rupees 818-5-2 payable on Inams placed under attachment in consequence of the dismissal of the village servants, and also in consequence of their voluntarily giving up the Inams through inability to pay the Jodi charged on them. Many of these Inams remained uncultivated this year owing to the want of timely rain, and some on account of the poorness of the soil. It was therefore found impossible to collect the Jodi charged on them. The remaining amount Rupees 3,875-8-7 is also irrecoverable. It was left uncollected owing to the insufficiency of the emoluments of the village servants, as stated in my letter, No. 101, dated 5th April 1873. Deducting the amount of Jodi, viz., Rupees 5,324-13-2 from the total amount of Rupees 7,559-7-9 above shown, there remains a balance of Rupees 2,234-10-7 which is irrecoverable. All means of collecting it having proved abortive.

4. During the fasli under report, no changes took place in the number or tenure of Inam villages consisting of sixty-five mowza and thirteen hamlets. As in the previous fasli, fifty-eight of these paid a fixed Jodi to Government, and the remaining seven were enjoyed free.

The number of Government villages and hamlets in Fasli 1282 was 625 and 472 respectively. In the fasli under report, there was a decrease of two in the former, and an increase by the same number in the latter on account of the following changes:—

- (1.) Jagannathapoor, a mowza villege, was transferred from the Tadpatri Taluq of this district to Poolivendla Taluq of the Guddapah District—Vide Government Order, No. 489, 15th May 1873, Revenue Department.
- (2.) Narsapur and Siddapur, mowza villages, in the Adony Taluq, were amalgamated with Isvy mowza in the same taluq, and registered as two of its hamlets. Board's Proceedings, No. 5,479, 28th August 1873.
- (3.) Chowdeshwaryhal, a mowza village, in the Adony Taluq, was amalgamated with Chinna Toombalum mowza in the same taluq, and registered as a hamlet—Board's Proceedings, No. 5,305, 21st August 1873.
- (4.) Iswa and its handat Madin, in the Adony Taluq, were registered as two separate mowas villages of that taluq—Vide Board's Proceedings, No. 5,479, 28th August 1873.
- (5.) Naglapoor Mowza, in the Bellary Taluq, was transferred to the Adony Taluq. Government Order, No. 847, 14th August 1873, Revenue Department.

The villages of Halsangootta, Parlapally, etc., belonging to the Pattikonda Taluq, in the Kurnool District, were transferred to the Adony Taluq, under Government Order, No. 316, 5th March 1874, Revenue Department. But the changes were not effected in the accounts of this fasli for reasons assigned in this Office letter, No. 163, dated 29th April last.

It will be observed from the above Statement that some puttas of the Aloor Taluq were distributed in the Adony Taluq. This was done only in the case of two puttas in one village not far from Adony, owing to the failure of attendance of the Village Officers and Puttadars at the last station of the Aloor Taluq.

The increase in the number of puttadars and puttas is not so great as to need any special remark, the principal and usual causes being the taking up of fresh lands, the addition of one village from the Bellary Taluq, and also the splitting up of single puttas into two or more.

6. The season was on the whole a favorable one for cultivation, but not more favorable than that of the preceding fasli. The Moongary rains failed generally throughout the division.

Public health was generally good. Dengue fever which was prevalent in the preceding fasli did not appear in the fasli under review.

7. There was no appearance of epidemic diseases, hence no Statement is annexed.

The number of deaths from ordinary fever and dengue in Fasli 1282 was 2,429. In the fasli under report, the number was less by 481. This is attributable to the favorable nature of the season. The deaths were attributable to no extraordinary causes-

In the last Settlement Report it was remarked that the similarity between the numbers of attacks and deaths from fever as registered in the Aloor and Adony Taluqs, rendered these returns unreliable. I have to endorse this opinion again in this fashi. The omission is due to carelessness on the part of the Taluq officials in checking the correctness of the Returns from the villages notwithstanding the issue of strict orders on the subject. The Tahsildar of Aloor, however, reports that the Accounts received from his villages and his abstracts prepared therefrom, are accurate. This may be true, but the internal evidence of the Returns points to a contrary conclusion. Strict orders enforcing careful scrutiny and revision on the part of the Taluq officials have been reiterated.

The number of deaths among cattle was 796 more than that in the preceding fasli. Disease extended this year to the Aloor and Adony Taluqs which were free from it in the two preceding faslis. Fewer cattle died in the Gooty and Tadpatri Taluqs owing to the favorable nature of the climate. In the Anantapur Taluq, the number of deaths was more than double that in the previous year. The ryots of the twenty-seven villages where the mortality occurred suffered extremely by the loss of their cattle.

Medicine was available for use in all the taluqs, but the ryots do not appear to have confidence in its efficacy. Many prefer to follow their own treatment.

The decrease in the price of Paddy was very small, and calls for no special remark.

The decrease in the price of Cholum was due chiefly to a good yield in the Hingary season.

The rise in the price of Sajjaloo, Raghi, and Horse-gram can be attributed only to the inadequacy of the supply, arising from failure of the early rains, to the demand which continued steady.

Other grains such as Dholl, Green-gram, etc., known by the Generic name of \*\*Akkady Dhanyam' and which are not shown in this Statement as not forming staples of consumption, were sold very dear, owing to the failure of Moongary rains.

The increase of Rupees 17,373 is attributable to paucity of relinquishments and increased cultivation in the fashi under report, owing to the favorable nature of the Hingary season. The increase is also due to some extent to the addition of the village of Naglapoor to the subdivision.

The cultivation of Sugar-cane is carried on to a very limited extent in the Sub-division owing to the unsuitability of the soil.

The large increase in the Cotton cultivation arose chiefly from lands which should have been cultivated with food-grains in the Moongary season, having to be cultivated with cotton in the Hingary season owing to the failure of the early rains. The large decrease in the Aloor Taluq

was due to the fact that lands which had been cultivated with cotton in preceding fasli were cultivated with Cholum in this, the alternation of crop being necessary to avoid impoverishing the soil.

The decrease in the cultivation of Indigo, was due to the increased importation for home consumption of superior Indigo from Cuddapah, and the consequent falling off in the demand for that of this district.

The increase under Jodi was due to the following cause :---

Some years ago two Service Inam lands, in the Aloor Taluq, were relinquished by the then holders through inability to pay the Jodi. In placing this land under attachment the Jodi was omitted from the demand from some causes not known at present. During the subsequent years in which the land was cultivated, the whole assessment was credited to the Village Service Fund. In the fasli under review, the Inam land was restored to the original Inamdar on condition of his paying the original Jodi. The mistake was then found out Hence the increase.

The decrease under "cultivation before and after Jammabundy without permission" and "Prohibitory assessment" is due to the fact that ryots are now beginning to understand the results entailed by cultivation without permission.

The decrease under "Fines" was due to there being fewer cases of grave neglect on behalf of village officers in the collection of Government revenue, and also to the measure of the penalties imposed being generally reduced in conformity with the spirit of Board's Proceedings, Nos. 357, 22nd February 1872, and 552, 19th April 1872.

The fall of revenue under "Rent of Custard Apple trees on Adony Hills" was due to the failure of produce in consequence of want of rains at the beginning of the fasli.

The irrecoverable amount of Rupees 3,466 consists chiefly of Jodi shown as "Mamool Khatla" (quit-rent on Service Inams annually written off for special reasons) and of the balances due op Putta and Inam lands sold for arrears and bought in by Government.

The collection of revenue in the Aloor and Adony Taluqs was very slow during the earlier kists, and large balances were outstanding. The Tahsildars of those two taluqs attributed the cause to the want of demand for Cotton in the former taluq, and to the Survey and Demarcation work being in progress in the latter. The latter course was to some extent true, as the attention of the village officials was thereby withdrawn from the work of collection. Stringent measures were adopted by this Office, and the submission of daily reports of collection directed, and the arrears were thus reduced.

The amount of property sold in the Aloor Taluq was nearly double that sold in the preceding fasli. This was on account of the leniency shown by the Tahsildar of that taluq towards ryots at the beginning of the kists in allowing them time until demand for Cotton should put them in funds. As soon as this came to my predecessor's notice, he issued orders for the prompt collection of arrears, as nothing in the character of the season called for any special indulgence. The ryots consequently had heavy demands to liquidate at once, and property had to be attached and sold in the cases of those who failed to pay.

- 32. No new lands were acquired either by the Huzoor or Taluq officials in the fasli under report. This Statement is therefore blank, and is not annexed.
- 33. Subordinates.—The circumstance of my being merely in a very temporary charge of the division, precludes my expressing any very decided opinion regarding my subordinates, other than those who have come more immediately under my supervision. With the employés in my Office. I have had no fault whatever to find. I endorse with considerable pleasure, the good opinions which I find on record concerning the Sheristadar D. Kristna Rao. The present report has been necessarily compiled in the main by him, and I hope it may be considered a not discreditable specimen of his efficiency and carefulness, regarding which, as also his personal character, I have

every reason to be much pleased. My Head Clerk Hanumuntha Rao is a promising man, and most careful and attentive. I have also to express my satisfaction with the Clerk in charge of the Magisterial Department, Oomerkhan.

As regards the Tahsildars, I do not think I should record any opinion. They have all during my time worked well and regularly.

I HAVE the honor to submit the Annual Report on the Settlement and Collections of this District for Fasli 1283, together with the prescribed accounts and statements.

2. Places where the Settlement was made.—Statement No. 1 shows the number of days occupied in the settlement at each station, the number of villages settled, the officer conducting the Jamabandi, and the number of puttas distributed. The work of settlement commenced on the 21st January, and was completed on the 30th June. The protraction of the Jamabandi work till the close of the fasli year can only be explained by the time unnecessarily occupied by the General Deputy Collector, T. Kristna Row, in settling the Jamalmadugu Taluq from 13th March to 31st May. The average time at each station was eleven days.

3. VARIATION IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES. The subjoined statement exhibits the result of the variation in the number and tenure of villages in the district during the year under report :-

The rain-fall was slightly less this year. The Pennair, Papagni, Kunder, and Chayair rivers were in fresh in the months of August, September, October, May, and June. Large tanks received a full supply of water.

6. SEASON .- The cultivation of dry land having been impeded by the want of early rains the outturn of the dry crops, jonna, sazza, and horse-gram was below the average. Wet crops

have not, on the whole, turned out well. Tanks received their water late in the year when the sowing season was passed, and the crops to a certain extent suffered from blight and insects. This year has not been altogether a favorable one for cultivation.

From the above it will be seen that there is a decrease in Land Revenue inclusive of Miscellaneous beriz, amounting to Rupees 36,756. This is chiefly due to the unfavorable character of the season as I have already explained. The large decrease of Rupees 18,271 under the head of Fasaljasti, and that of Rupees 14,293 under Miscellaneous, is also the result of a bad season. When dry land was cultivated with wet crops the assessment was hitherto entered under the head of Tirvajasti. In Board's Proceedings, No. 2,295, dated 14th August 1874, it is directed that prohibitory assessment should alone be entered under the head of Tirvajasti, and that water-rate should be shown separately. The column Tirvajasti for this year is therefore left blank, and the item Prohibitory assessment, which is Tirvajasti, as that term is now interpreted by the Board, is entered under Miscellaneous.

14. CULTIVATION OF SPECIAL PRODUCTS.—In the subjoined abstract statement the results of the cultivation of special products during the fasli are compared with those of the previous year:-

Remissions granted on Shamilat or partially waste land is included in Remissions on entire fields of waste, consequently the column for Fasli 1283 against Item No. 1 in the above statement is left blank. The large in rease in Items Nos. 2, 4, and 5 is owing to scanty early rains and excessive later rains notwithstanding that wet land has been cultivated with dry crops, and has been charged with dry assessment. The decrease under Item 8 is attributable to the small cultivation of second crops and to the lapse of rights to usual remissions. The small increase in Item 3 is owing to the destruction of seeds by heavy rain. Of the total amount of remissions granted this year, viz., Rupees 20,536, or Rupees 930 above that of last year, Rupees 16,543 are on account of irrigated lands, while Rupees 3,993 were allowed on dry lands.

From the above it will be observed that there is a decrease of Rupees 14,300 on the whole. The decrease of Rupees 13,297 in Item No. 4, "Cultivation subsequent to Jamabandi," occurs more particularly in Cuddapah, Jamalmadugu, Proddatur, and Madanapalli Taluqs, where the settlement was not completed till late in the year. The decrease in Item No. 15 is owing to decrease in second crop cultivation owing to want of water. In Items Nos. 2, 3, 6, 7, 10, 11, 14, and 18.

the changes being of a trifling nature, they need no remarks. The increase in Item 1 is due to the conversion of two Shrotriem villages to two Government villages at explained in paragraph 3, and their quit-rent is added to this item. In Item No. 5 the decrease is owing to very many cases of concealed cultivation having been brought forward during the current Fasli. In Item No. 8, "Rent of Topes," the considerable increase of Rupees 6,008 is owing to the season having been favorable to fruit trees. The decrease in Item No. 9 is due to some of the Inams having been released from attachment during the fasli under report. In Item No. 16 the increase is attributable to the recovery of rent on C. class lands due by the Railway Company for the current as well as for past faslis. The decrease in Item No. 13 is due to the scanty rains.

the previous year. The reason for the decrease in Land Revenue has already been explained. The demand on Shrotriem villages has been reduced to Rupees 741-0-1 as explained in the margin. The decrease under the head of Abkari is owing to a smaller number of licenses having been granted for the sale of Foreign liquors. The abolition of Income-tax under orders\* of Government, dated 31st March 1873 is the cause of the decrease under this head. Under recent orders of Government Court Fee stamp labels are being used for serving Judicial processes, consequently there is an increase of Rupees 24,930 in stamps. The increase of Ru-

pees 3,734 under the last item, "Earth-salt," is owing to licenses having been for the first time granted for the manufacture of earth-salt under the orders of Government, No. 790, dated 28th July 1873:—

The year under report opened with an arrear of Rupees 3,26,1 6-0-6. After deducting the collections within the fasli, and those up to 31st July 1874, we have a balance of Rupees 40,339-15-6 still for collection. In this is included the sum of Rupees 6,337-6-5 recommended for remission in the last year's Jamabandi Report, and for which the sanction of Government was communicated in Board's Proceedings, No. 2,295, dated 18th August 1874. This amount has therefore to be deducted from the sum to be entered in the Jamabandi Report for the next fasli.

22. RECOMMENDATION IN REGARD TO IRRECOVERABLE BALANCE.—Of the remaining balance I request sanction to write off the following sums of Rupees 7,335-9-8 and 965-1-10 of Land Revenue and Road-cess, respectively. difficulty, determined the a nount of arrears recoverable and irrecoverable. That officer's report on the subject reached me a short time ago. As I intend to make a special report on the subject I have not included the irrecoverable balances of that taluq in this report.

- 24. The Enclosure A. appended to Statement No. 8 shows the extent to which coercion has been employed for the collection of revenue by the attachment and sale of property in Fasli 1283. Processes were issued in 647 villages against 5,179 defaulters for the recovery of Rupees 50,395. The value of the real and personal property attached was Rupees 35,000, of which the property sold was estimated at Rupees 15,134 and the sale proceeds realized Rupees 11,997.
  - 25. AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS.—A statement of agricultural statistics and acreage of crops, etc., called for in the Board's Proceedings, dated 1st February 1870, No. 716, is forwarded with the other Jamabandi returns.
- 26. RUINED TANKS.—No ruined tanks were made over to private enterprize during the fasli under report.
- 27. Costs in Civil Suits.—In conformity with the orders of the Board of Revenue, dated 19th October 1871, No. 4,434, a statement showing the demand, collection, and balance of costs awarded to Government in Civil suits is submitted.
- 28. PRINCIPAL SOURCES OF IRRIGATION.—The following abstract shows the number of principal sources of irrigation requiring notice under clause 5, paragraph 4, of Board's Miscellaneous Circular Memorandum, No. 787, dated 14th August 1866:—

From the above it will be observed that the extent actually cultivated was this year larger by Acres 1,115, assessed at Rupees 412, while the revenue was smaller by Rupees 2,925 than in last fasli. The reasons for the falling off of the assessment are as follow:—

1st.—That some wet lands paid dry assessment for raising dry crops owing to the scarcity of water.

2nd.—That remissions to a larger amount were granted on wet lands owing to the failure of crops from want of water.

There is an increase of Rupees 1,200 over the charges of the preceding year. The increase in Item 2 is owing to the deputation allowance drawn by the Collector, Head Assistant, and Deputy Collectors, and that in Item 3 is due to Divisional Officers having travelled more than in the last year. The increase in Item 4 is due to the disbursement of arrears of salary and to deputation allowance drawn by substitutes appointed in lieu of Tahsildars when on privilege leave, and on special duties. The purchase of Service Postage stamps has caused an increase in Item No. 8. No charges have been made under the head of Abkári and the consequence was the decrease in Item No. 9. The abolition of discount on purchases of Judicial stamps for some time in the year was the cause of decrease in Item No. 10, and lastly the non-existence of Income-tax establishment during the year has shown a decrease in Item 11.

- 32. Examination of Taluq and Village Accounts.—The taluq and village accounts have been examined as usual and found to be correct, with the exception of those in Cyddapah.
- 33. Examination of Cash Accounts, etc., by the Treasury Deputy Collector.—The Deputy Collector in charge of the Treasury has examined, during the year, the cash accounts of Pullampet, Proddatur, and Cuddapah Taluqs under the Standing Order, No, 8 of 1874 (283-2.) From the reports received I find that the mistakes in the accounts of the first two taluqs are not of a grave nature. In the Cuddapah Taluq accounts important omissions and grave mistakes have been discovered.

None of the taluqs have been settled beyond their respective limits.

4. Variation in the Number and Tenure of Villages.—The total number of ryotwari villages in the Sub-Division is 401 against 403 in last year, the changes having taken place in the Royachoty and Kadiri Taluqs. The villages of Mallepalli and Timmanayanipolitiem have been transferred to Kadiri from the taluqs of Pulivendla under G. O., No. 1,056, of the 2nd October last; while the village of Somayazulapalli was amalgamated with that of Vepulakunta with reference to the Board's Proceedings, dated 19th February 1873, No. 1,019, Miscellaneous.

The hamlet of Kondagattupalli attached to the village of Patnam has been constituted a separate village under the orders of the Board of Revenue of the 17th July 1873, No. 4,468, Miscellaneous.

5. The villages of Matampalli and Turpuvarigi, in the taluq of Royachoty, have been formed into one village now called Masapet; while the village of Kasivanikalva has been joined to Padamatavariga now called Royachoty.

The villages of Subbarow Agraharam and Vedullacheruvoo together, and those of Inayati Sagaram and Pemmadipalli together, have been constituted into two villages instead of four. These changes have been carried out under the Board's Proceedings, No. 1,019, dated 19th February 1874.

There have been no changes during the year under the head of Shrotriem villages.

- 8. This increase is chiefly owing to the transfers of joint holdings by Puttadars to their co-sharers, to the issue of puttas to persons claiming ownership under Civil Court's certificates, and to the durkhasts for lands on which prohibitory rates were imposed in the previous years.
- 9. I beg to state that I have resided within the precincts of my division during the last year, except on two or three occasions when I went to Madras for the late Agricultural Exhibition and to Cuddapah to attend the Sessions and to examine the records.
- The season was not so favorable for agricultural operations as in the past fasli.
   The rain-fall, though copious, was untimely, being too late for the first crop and too early for the

second crop seasons. The monthly fall of rain during the year is shown in the following abstract in a comparative view:—

11. It will be observed that the average quantity of rain-fall in the taluqs of the Sub-Division is 33·103 in excess of that of Fasli 1282 by 6·872. This increase is due to the heavy rains in September and October last which were not very advantageous to the ryots, as the first crop suffered from too much moisture, and the failure of rains in March and April proved detrimental to the second crop just at a time when it was about to come to maturity. The rains of May and June were only beneficial for the first crop cultivation of the current Fasli. Several of the tanks in the Sub-Division have been damaged during the year owing to the excessive down-pour of rain in October last and some 40 tanks, both Circar and Dusbundum, were breached.

13. The rains in the taluqs of Voilpaud and Royachoty have been but partial. Under the head of Tanks fully supplied there is a decrease of 657 against an increase of 1,591 in last year; while under the head of Tanks partially supplied there is an increase of 462 against a decrease of 1,133 in the past year.

14. The yield of crop during the year is generally more satisfactory than in the previous year, though full crops have not been reaped under any source of irrigation. In some parts of the taluqs of Royachoty, Kadiri, and Voilpaud, sazza, oil-seeds, and raggy in wet fields suffered from blight, known as "Cheda" and "Lukkateguloo." The heavy rains of October have rendered

dry grains, especially at Voilpaud, less profitable than otherwise. Owing to the failure of rains in March and April paddy, raggy, and jonna in some parts of the division have entirely withered away.

The average yield of crop under tanks and channels is nine and twelve-sixteenths against eight and nine in last year, and the dry crop generally has been as good as that of the previous year. The crop under wells has fared very well.

15. Public Health.—The subjoined statement shows the sanitary state of the district during the year under report in comparison with the last fashi:—

16. The public health was, on the whole, not good. The taluqs in this division happily escaped any visitation of cholera during the year, except at Royachoty where only four deaths appear to have taken place for the whole fash from this epidemic. The number of men attacked with fever is considerably larger, being nearly three times as much as in last year; while the extent of mortality under the head is 6,500 against 4,500 in the previous one. The fever has been reported to be of a very malignant type, and to have proved particularly fatal in the taluq of Madanapalli. Small-pox has also prevailed especially in the Voilpaud Taluq, and the total loss under this head is nearly four times as much as in last year.

17. FARM CATTLE.—The sudden and heavy falls of rain have generally exercised a very evil influence on the health of cattle. From the statement hereunder given it will be observed that the extent of mortality under the head of Goats and Sheep is 31,108 against 16,293, or nearly double that of last year; while the number of deaths among bullocks and buffaloes is greater than the previous one by 3,410. In the Royachoty Taluq alone the loss among cattle generally is 14,427 against 2,072 during the past fasli. The annexed statement exhibits the number of deaths among cattle in a comparative view:—

<sup>20.</sup> It will thus be observed that the extent of occupation for the year under report, minus the amount of remissions granted at the Jamabandi, is Acres 587,650, assessed at Rs. 5,51,765, against Acres 586,133, assessed at Rupees 5,54,653, exhibiting a decrease of Rupees 2,888-3,10 including dry and wet, which is due to the increase of remissions under "Waste" and "Withered crops" for reasons already stated. Lands to the extent of Acres 12,875, assessed at Rupees 9,237, were relinquished by the ryots during the year against Acres 21,870, assessed at Rupees 15,548, in the previous one; while the durkhasts amounted to Acres 15,315, assessed at Rupees 10,728, against Acres 17,324, assessed at Rupees 7,915, which exceeds that of last year in assessment by Rupees 2,813, which is owing to lands having been taken up more extensively.

- 21. Under the heads of Tirwajasti and Fasaljasti there is a large decrease of Rupees 1,386 and 11,519 respectively, which is entirely due to the want of water-supply in the tanks on the failure of rains at the first crop season. The net land revenue after deducting remission, which are a little more than last year, amounts to Rupees 5,84,280-1-6 against Rupees 6,00,837-15-10 in last year, showing a decrease of Rupees 16,557-14-4.

- 23. There is a slight increase of Rupees 650-0-5 in ryots' holdings under the head of Dry lands, and a decrease of Rupees 335-2-10 under the head of Wet. The extent of dry lands relinquished during the year is Rupees 6,799-5-0, and lands taken up is Rupees 7,449-5-5. - 27. There is an increase in the extent of sugar-cane and cotton and a decrease in that of indigo, which is mostly grown in a few villages of the Royachoty Taluq, but no extensive cultivation of this product is made in the Sub-Division as the soil generally seems to be unsuited to it. Cotton and sugar-cane have been more extensively cultivated in the Kadiri and Madanapalli Taluqs respectively during the past year, and the increase under the former head is Rupees 769; while that under the latter is Rupees 2,838 over that of Fasli 1282.
