RESOLUTION

ON THE

REPORT ON THE SUMMARY SETTLEMENT OPERATIONS

IN THE

Remaining portions of the Kani and Pale townships, Lower Chindwin District, SEASON 1903.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of Burma, in the Revenue Department,-No 2S-5, dated the 1st March 1905.

READ-

Report on the Summary Settlement Operations in the remaining portions of the Kani and Palà townships, Lower Chindwin district.

Note by the Settlement Commissioner, dated the 12th April 1904, and letter No. 1524—2S-55, dated the 23rd July 1904, from the Financial Commissioner, Burma.

Resolution.—With the present Report the Summary Settlement of the surveyed area of the Lower Chindwin district is completed.

- 2. The area dealt with is similar in general conditions to the adjoining tract in the Kani and Palè townships which was settled during the season 1901-02. The land revenue rates proposed by the Settlement Commissioner in conference with the Commissioner correspond in the main to those sanctioned for the latter tract and are accepted by the Lieutenant-Governor as suitable. Good reasons are given for the slight enhancement of the rates for first class Mogaung paddy and for the small reduction in the rates on ya land in comparison with those assessed in the adjoining tract.
- 3. The rates now sanctioned will result, as pointed out by the Financial Commissioner, in an enhancement from Rs. 665 to Rs. 1,086 in the assessment on State lands in the tract. There are, however, special circumstances which render a considerable enhancement inevitable. The past assessment on State lands has been nominally levied, so it has been ascertained, at the money value of one-third of the gross produce. The cropped area of State land amounted to 1,676 acres in the year of settlement, and at the most moderate computation the value of one-third of the produce from this area must have been far in excess of the sum of Rs. 665 realized. A large share of the State land area must therefore have entirely escaped assessment hitherto, and the increase in the total demand results rather from the levy of a general assessment on all State lands than from the imposition of heavier rates on land already taxed.
- 4. The Lieutenant-Governor also sanctions the application to the present area of the Rs. 6 rate of commuted thathameda which is in force elsewhere in the district. This rate with the land revenue rates to be imposed, will give the moderate increase of 26 per cent. in the total assessment. For the whole surveyed area of the Lower Chindwin district the combined land revenue and thathameda will have been enhanced in consequence of the Summary Settlement from Rs. 5,89,547 to Rs. 7,46,056 or about 27 per cent.
- 5. The rates now sanctioned will be imposed from the 1st July 1905 and will be continued until regular settlement.

I am directed to forward, for the orders of Government, the fourth and last Report on the Summary Settlement operations in the remaining portions of the Lower Chindwin district, season 1903. A note by the Settlement Commissioner containing the conclusions arrived at by a Conference consisting of himself and the Commissioner, Sagaing Division, is prefixed to the Report. The absence of the Deputy Commissioner from the Conference is explained in paragraph 1 of the Note.

- 2. The Financial Commissioner observes that many of the class II ya kwins in the area dealt with during the year of report are apparently a continuation of the class II tract of the previous year for which a rate of 6 annas was sanctioned while the rate proposed for class II land in the present area is 4 annas only. The statement in paragraph 9 of the Report that "the ya lands in this year's tract are as a whole inferior to those in last year's tract" probably does not apply to the large block of class II land lying south of kwin No. 1292 which might suitably have been treated as similar to the tract immediately adjoining it on the south which was placed in the second class of last year's tracting. Similarly, the block of 2nd class ya kwins extending from kwin No. 1469 on the north to kwin No. 1550 on the south lies between two blocks of 1st class ya land and adjoins a solid block of 2nd class ya land in the 1901-02 tract on which a rate of 6 annas per acre has been sanctioned. The ya land dealt with in 1903 is no doubt on the whole inferior, but it can hardly be the case that the lines between the areas dealt with in 1901-02 and in 1903 divides the better land on the south-east from the inferior land on the north-west with any approach to accuracy.
- 3. The members of the Conference propose to enhance the demand on State land from Rs. 665'20 to Rs. 1,086'48. This proposal appears to run counter to the principle laid down by Government in paragraph 6 of the Resolution on the Mingin Settlement Report and entirely concurred in by the Government of India in their Under Secretary's letter No. 332—88-2 of the 4th March 1904 that it is "desirable to disturb existing conditions as little as possible, to continue the rates on State land at or near their present figure

 It is submitted, however, that an adherence to this principle practically involves a reduction in the assessment of persons cultivating State lands, for they will share in the benefit of the reduced that hameda without being called on to pay more for their land. It does not appear that this result has been fully considered.
- 4. Subject to the above remarks the Financial Commissioner recommends that the rates proposed by the Commissioner and Settlement Commissioner be adopted.

NOTE BY THE SETTLEMENT COMMISSIONER.

Proceedings of a Conference held at Sagaing on the 2nd Warch 1904 to sonsider the proposals of the Deputy Commissioner, Lower Chindwin, for the summary settlement of portions of the Kani and Pale townships, Lower Chindwin district.

PRESENT:

Mr. H. L. EALES, C.S., Commissioner, Sagaing Division, Mr. H. M. S. MATHEWS, Officiating Settlement Commissioner.

The report was drawn up by Major H. N. Warde and as the Officiating Settlement Commissioner had gone through the report with him at Mônywa some to days previously, his presence at the conference was not considered necessary. Although the tract under report is extensive and is divided into 341 kwins, the area cultivated is small, that actually cropped being only 40,027 acres. This tract is an extension westwards and northwards of the Salingyi area settled in the previous season 1901-02. The land is not a continuous block as some of the surveyed area in the north lies in narrow valleys separated from the nearest settled area by tracts of unsurveyed hilly country.

2. The bulk of the population is Burman and is agricultural. Subsidiary occupations are silkworm rearing and the extraction of forest produce. The condition of the people is poor, being much the same as in the previous year's

3. The statistics of outturns recorded in the statements given under paragraph 9 of the Report refer to the crops cultivated in the rains of 1902 and reaped at the end of that year or the beginning of 1903, when the settlement party was commencing operations. The season was not a particularly favourable one, but it does not appear to have been much below normal. The statistics for Mayin and Kaing are those for crops grown in the dry weather of 1902, nearly a year before settlement operations commenced. The year 1902 was a fair year for these crops.

The outturns of all crops were ascertained not by actual measurement but by enquiry from the cultivators. The enquiries might have been more numerous for several crops, and in one or two cases it is noticed that the averages obtained are swollen by what appear to be abnormal outturns which might have been rejected. Although we do not consider that too much weight can be attached to these figures, we think that the assumed outturns given in paragraph 9 are probably not far from the mark and may be accepted as the basis of the low assessments which

it is now proposed to imp ose.

4. Prices of crops were, it is said, recorded circle by circle and the averages of these circle prices are the figures given in Statement VIII of the Appendices.

Considering how much hinges on the prices, we think it a pity that the circle details as well as the general average were not given in the statement. We make this remark especially because the Deputy Commissioner in dealing with communications in paragraph 4 of the Report says that the inland villagers are at a great disadvantage in the conveyance of their produce into the settled parts of the country. From the Deputy Commissioner and from the Inspectors who worked with him it is, however, understood in conversation that this disadvantage does not materially reduce the local prices obtained for produce. The production is so small that the local demand is said to be sufficient to keep prices up to or near the level of those ruling near the main river. Again it is said that increased fertility in these up-country valleys compensates for any small deficiency in the price

obtained.

After giving due consideration to these statements we have, however, come to the conclusion that in the case of Mogaung paddy which forms the staple crop, it would be safer to adopt a produce value, lower than Rs. 70, which could be applied to the whole area both inland and riverine. We are influenced in the fact that in the Mingin subdivision on the north the Deputy this decision by the fact that in the Mingin subdivision on the north the Deputy Commissioner of the Upper Chindwin district thought it advisable to assume a price of only Rs. 40 for a valley cut off from the main river and the principal mar-

The conditions are not the same further south but we consider that Rs. 60 should be adopted as the assumed price of paddy and we have based our recommendations accordingly.

These are practically the figures for net produce which were obtained last year, and as this year's paddy land is said to be better than that of Salingyi, we think that the 1st class rate may be slightly enhanced from last year's rate of Rs. 2 to Rs. 2-4-0, the rate of Rs. 1-8-0 for second class State land remaining the same as last year. We do not support the Deputy Commissioner's proposal for rates of Rs. 2-8-0 and Rs. 1-10-0 as we think that the rates now recommended are quite high enough for the more distant villages.

We are of opinion that the Deputy Commissioner's proposals for Mayin

paddy, for dry crops on paddy land and for ya land may be accepted as they

stand.

The conditions governing Kaing and gardens seem to be very similar to those obtaining in Salingyi. The Deputy Commissioner has followed the proposals made for last year's Salingyi area, but Mr. T. C. Wilson has placed on record, and we agree with him, that the Kaing and garden rates should be the same as those which were finally sanctioned and which differed largely from the Deputy Commissioner's proposals.

The details of our proposals for land assessment are given in the following statement:

6. In examining the Report the Commissioner discovered that by a clerical error the area of first class Mogaung paddy land was shown in the statement under paragraph 12 as 4,500 across in excess of that shown under paragraph 8. Some delay has been caused by referring this matter back to the Deputy Commissioner but the figures have now been corrected. The result of this correction is that the enhancement under the Deputy Commissioner's proposals amounts to 32 per cent. as now shown instead of 44 per cent. as it appeared originally.

SUMMARY SETTLEMENT OPERATIONS

IN THE

REMAINING PORTIONS

OF THE

KANI AND PALE TOWNSHIPS, LOWER CHINDWIN DISTRICT.

SEASON 1903.

The total area under report included in 341 kwins was cadastrally surveyed by the Survey of India Department from whom trace maps were completely received by the end of July 1903.

The Summary Settlement Operations were started in February 1903, and concluded in the early part of November 1903.

CHAPTER I.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF THE COUNTRY.

1. The area under report is bounded on the north by the Mingin and Taungdwingyi townships of the Upper Chindwin district : on the south by the Myaing township, Pakôkku district; on the east by the Chindwin river, and by the portions of the Kani and Pale townships operated on last year and for which the report has already been submitted: and on the west by the unsurveyed portions of the Lower Chindwin district. These portions consist of the hilly ranges, known as Pondaung and Ponnya, between this and the Pakôkku district, and are devoid of cultivation of any kind whatsoever.

The length and breadth of the above area, from north to south is 72 miles, and from east to west 8 miles, respectively.

The area is 547'47 square miles or 350,378'37 acres.

The area under report is situated in the most westerly part of the district and forms a portion of the Yinmabin subdivision.

The above portion consists of undulating ground, generally, the slope of which is towards the east, and it encloses small areas of mean elevation, which much resemble small plateaus in their formation. Of the small ranges of hills, Mahudaung range, which commences in the Mingin subdivision, Upper Chindwin district, has its slope towards the "Shitywagyaung" villages of Pale township. Pyidawtha, Kywegaung, Chinthe, Pyinhlaing, Pagyi, Thandaung, Pindaung and Kodaung ranges run up to the boundary of the Pakôkku district. Besides the Chindwin river which forms the north-eastern boundary of this area, there are many streams which traverse this tract from west to east, and which flow into the Chindwin river. These are generally known as Thingadon, Yewa, Tinzon, Chaungmagyi, Yinbo, Hutti, Satha and Yama chaungs, which are mere mountain streams that swell during the rains and run dry at the close of the rains. Some sillagers divert the courses of these streams and irrigate some portions of their paddy fields as far as half a mile or so from their beds. Other cultivated lands lie mostly and dry uplands that cannot be irrigated in this manner and consequently the cultivated contents. on dry uplands that cannot be irrigated in this manner and consequently the cultivation on them is dependent on the scanty and uncertain rainfall.

In the southern portion of Kani township, a little to the west of the Chindwin river, there are three craters of extinct volcanoes, with flourishing villages around them. One of them is utilized for many kinds of cultivation in and around it. A kind of insect known as "Twinbo" is caught in the lakes of these craters, and is considered a delicacy by some Burmans who eat it with "Laphet" (pickled tea). This is a source of revenue to Government, as the right to fish for it is annually sold by auction.

- 2. The area under report is peopled by Burmans of mixed blood. This is attributed to the fact that the "Chins" and "Yaws" have intermarried with the early Burman settlers of the tract. The pure Yaws and Chins are no longer found in these tracts.
- 3. The villagers of Laingde, Kuzeik, and Pwinga villages in Seywagyaung in the north-western portion of the Yinmabin subdivision, rear silkworms as an industry, in addition to their agricultural pursuits, and obtain thrice a year a small quantity of silk thread, which is roughly estimated at about one viss of silk thread per family which is locally sold at the rate of Rs. 14-4-0. This thread after being dyed black is said to be used in the weaving of "Yawpatsos." Forty households in Saingde village, twenty in Kuzeik, and ten in Pwinga, are engaged in rearing sikworms.

In Nyaungbinle village, eight households are engaged in the extraction of "Thitsi" (lacquer) from trees they find in the forests near about their villages. On an average each household annually extracts about 150 viss of lacquer, if the rainfall is normal; but in a year of deficient rainfall, the yield obtained by each household is about half that quantity. The most favourable time of the year for this industry is from August to February. "Thitsi" of good quality, free from water, fetches Rs. 150 per 100 viss; if it be mixed with water, the price is Rs. 90 per 100 viss.

The chief forest products are "Indwe" (resin), "Pwenyet" (dammar), "Shaw" (fibre), Bamboos, "Thetke" (a kind of grass used as thatch) and timber for building purposes.

In consequence of the restriction enforced on them under the Forest Regulations, the villagers do not wholly depend on forest produce and seek employment in the Forest Department for their living.

In Thingadon and near Kinyetha village there are some earth-oil springs. Three men from Mandalay obtained licenses to work these for one year which have now expired Only two started borings which have not been successful.

4. The communication to these parts is by means of footpaths over hills and valleys which are interspersed in many places with huge boulders of rocks.

Communication by land within this area is still in a backward condition, hence the villagers are at a great disadvantage as to the conveyance of their produce into the settled parts of the country. The only good communication they have is the great waterway of the Chindwin river, but this is of use only to those villagers who are on or near the banks of the river.

CHAPTER II.

GENERAL CONDITION OF THE PEOPLE.

- 5. According to the census of 1901 the population of the area under report is 23,523 souls, which gives a density of 43.53 souls per square mile, while the density per square mile of occupied and cultivated area is 307.09 souls.
- 6. Excepting the conditions that have been mentioned in Chapter I, the other general conditions relating to the tract and to the condition of the people are the same as in the other parts of the district, regarding which mention has been made in the previous report for Salingyi, and portions of Kani and Pale townships. Those conditions are therefore omitted in detail in this report, but statistics relating to them are embodied in the statements attached to the Re port as Appendices.

CHAPTER III.

- SOIL CLASSIFICATION AND ASSESSMENT GROUPS.

 7. The soil classification observed in this is the same as in the previous report for Salingyi, and portions of Kani and Pale townships; the geographical tracts; namely, alluvial, upland and valleys are similarly divided into eight soil classes for the purpose of revenue assessment, which are as follows:-
 - (i) Mayin paddy in Taze tract.
 - (ii) Mogaung paddy, first class.
 - (iii) Mogaung paddy, second class.
 - (iv) Ya land, first class.
 - (v) Ya land, second class.
 - (vi) Dry crops on paddy-land.
 - (vii) Kaing lands.
 - (viii) Gardens and groves.



stated by the cultivators being 30.08 baskets and 27.56 baskets respectively.

The corresponding outturns last year were 25 and 18 baskets for I and II class soils respectively, making all allowances for the fact that the year 1902-03 (in which the statistics for the present report were taken) was a better year than 1901-02 and for the fact that the statistics do not represent the results of actual crop-cutting but only the statements of cultivators regarding the outturns of selected single fields, the figures given in the statement below show conclusively that it is quite safe to assume outturns of 30 baskets and 20 baskets for I and II class Mogaung respectively: it would indeed be possible to assume higher outturns, but the enhancement which it is desirable to take will be obtained with the assumed outturns given above.

The Ya lands in this year's tract are as a whole inferior to those in last year's tract, as they are generally high-lying, while last year they were level and low-lying with good soil. The net produce works out to very nearly the same figure as last year, but it is obtained as the result of different outturns and prices which in the case of cotton and sessamum were rather abnormal in the year of report.

The staple crop on Yaland, ie., pyaung, gives a smaller average outturn and is sold at a lower price in the present tract than in last year's, and from a general knowledge of the tract it is considered advisable to propose slightly lower rates for Yalands than were sanctioned for the last tract.

Ya land —As mentioned above the ya land as a whole is somewhat inferior to that dealt with in the last report though the statistics do not show this very clearly, except in the case of pyaung, the main crop. It is accordingly considered advisable to propose the following rates which are slightly lower than those sanctioned last year:—

Non-paddy crops on paddy land.—The rate sanctioned for non-paddy crops on paddy land for the last report, namely, Rs. 50 per acre will be suitable for this year's tract, as the soil of the paddy land is generally of good quality and the rate is practically intermediate between the rates for the two classes of ya land.

All other crops.—Mayin, Kaing, gardens and groves in this year's tract are of the same description as those dealt with in the last report, and it is recommended that the rates sanctioned in the case of that report be applied to the area dealt with in the present report also.





No. 239.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 27 of the Upper Burma Land and Revenue (Regulation, 1889 (Regulation III of 1889), and with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council, the Lieutenant-Governor is pleased to fix the rates set forth in the subjoined Schedule A as the rates at which land revenue shall, with effect from the 1st July 1905, and until further orders, be assessed, according to the classification adopted by the Deputy Commissioner on State and non-State lands bearing matured crops in the kwins of the Kani and Palè townships of the Lower Chindwin district named in Schedule B.
