1857. MAJOR CHARLES ALBERT DODD. Bengal Staff Corps. (Born 4th August 1840) - Joined the service as Ensign, 12th November 1857; arrived in India, and posted to Her Majesty's 23rd R. W. Fusiliers, 12th November 1857; appointed to do duty with the Oudh Military Police, 4th November 1858; posted to 74th Native Infantry, 1859; appointed to officiate as Assistant Chief of Police, February 1860; was employed on special duty at Lucknow, in clearing off the advances made to the Oudh Police on its first organization, sometime in 1860, the exact date of which cannot now be ascertained ; admitted to Staff Corps, 18th February 1861; appointed Personal Assistant to the Inspector-General of Police, North-Western Provinces, 15th March 1861; appointed to be a District Superintendent of Police of the then 3rd grade on Rs. 500, continuing to act as Personal Assistant to the Inspector-General of Police, North-Western Provinces, 7th August 1861; Lieutenant, 1st January 1862; Officiating District Superintendent of Police, 2nd grade, continuing to act as Personal Assistant, 1st August 1863; leave in India on private affairs from 11th April to 9th October 1865; resumed charge as Personal Assistant to the Inspector General of Police, North-Western Provinces, 10th October 1865; promoted to be a District Superintendent of Police of the 3rd grade, on Rs. 600 per menth, continuing to act as Personal Assistant to Inspector-General of Police, 24th October 1866; Officiating District Superintendent of Police, 2nd grade, continuing to act as Personal Assistant, 8th February 1869; services placed temporarily at the disposal of the Government of India, Home Department, for employment as Secretary to the Committee assembled at Calcutta to revise the forms of Police statistics, February 1869; left for Calcutta, 11th February 1869; returned to Allahabad and resumed charge of his office as Personal Assistant, 4th March 1869; privilege leave from 27th April to 1st June 1869; Officiating Superintendent of the Government Press and Curator of Government Books, North-Western Provinces, 7th April 1870; appointed to be an Honoravy Magistrate, and invested with full powers of a Magistrate, to be exercised within the precincts of the Government Press at Allahabad and the neighbouring Christian village, 27th April 1870; confirmed in the appointment of Superintendent, Government Press, and Curator of Government Books, NorthWestern Provinces, 1st. December 1871; privilege leave from 24th August to 23rd October 1872; subsidiary leave from 25th April to 4th May 1873; leave to Europe on urgent private affairs from 5th May to 25th February 1874; subsidiary leave from 26th February to 1st March 1874; resumed charge of his appointment as Superintendent of Government Press and Curator of Government Books, North-Western Provinces, 2nd March 1874; privilege leave from 25th May to 18th June 1876 and from 19th May to 5th August 1877; absent without leave from 6th August to 21st September 1877; exempted from the consequences of overstaying his leave and reinstated in his appointment of Superintendent of Government Press and Curator of Government Books, North-Western Provinces and Oudh, from 22nd September 1877; privilege leave from 1st September to 31st October 1879.

WAR SERVICES—Joined Her Majesty's 23rd Royal Welsh Fusiliers in November 1857; was present with the regiment in the action of Kala Nadi and the capture of Fatehgarh. Was present with Sir Robert Walpole's column on the banks of the Ranganga; afterwards at the siege and capture of Lucknow. Accompanied the 23rd Fusiliers to Nawabganj and Bara Banki; served there with Brigadier Purnell's column for three months; afterwards joined the Oudh Police, which formed part of Lord Clyde's column in his march through Oudh to the Nepaul frontier. Was severely burnt at an explosion of gunpowder in the Kaiser Bagh at Lucknow on the 1st April 1858—medal and clasp.

(Born 16th September 1851).—Joined the service as a clerk in the Government Secretariat, General Department, 1st May 1874; appointed to officiate as Reporter on the Vernacular Press of Upper India, 16th June 1876; confirmed in the same appointment, 11th August 1877; privilege leave from 21st October to 20th November 1878; officiated as Urdu Translator to Government, in addition to his own duties, from 14th to 27th September 1878.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY TO THE BOARD OF REVENUE, NORTH-WEST-ERN PROVINCES.

- 1854. WILLIAM HENRY DAWE. Uncovenanted. (Born 20th August 1838).—
 Joined the service as a clerk in the office of the late Military Board on the 6th
 September 1854; transferred on the 1st May 1855 to the office of the InspectorGeneral of Ordnance and Magazines, and from the 1st July 1856 to 30th June
 1859 held the post of Subsidiary Ledger-keeper in the office of the Military
 Auditor-General, Ordnance Department; resigned Government service with
 effect from 1st July 1859, in order to join a mercantile firm.
- 1864. Was re-appointed to Government service on the 1st May 1864, as an Assistant in charge of the home section of the office of the Military Accountant, Bengal; was transferred on the 24th August 1869 as a 1st grade Assistant to the Government Secretariat, Bengal, and attached to the Judicial and Political Departments; had a month's privilege leave in October 1872; was subsequently selected for his present office of Assistant Secretary to the Board of Revenue of the North-Western Provinces, to which he was gazetted with effect from the 20th April 1874; received the commendation of Government in the stamp embezzlement case which occurred in the Commissioner of Stamps' Office, North-Western Provinces; privilege leave from 16th May to 15th July 1878.

^{*}Previous to this date Mr. Wollaston had served Government in various capacities, ultimately rising to the position of a Sub-Judge of the 1st grade some time in 1867. He, however, resigned the service on the 1st November 1873.
