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rote. Hereupon Mr. Walpole fad. He did not fee how the Peritioners could be reliev'd; that the Refolutions, pursuant to which this Bill was brought in, had been laid before, and approv'd by the King and Council, and had also been agreed to by a great Majority of the House before the last short Prorogation; and that they had given their Word and Honour to the Members ahat were gone into the Congreys that they would not alter a Tittle in them; and as he could not fee any thing that could be done for the Petitioners, he therefore mov'u for adjourning the Debate, and defir'd that that Question, might be put as a previous one. This was opposed by Mr. Broderick, who faid, He wonfier'd what that Gentleman meant, by defiring to have fuch a Question pur, before the Question for taking the Petition into Confideration; which, he thought, would look as if they could not answer the Allegations contain'd in the faid Petition; and therefore he moved, that they might go upon the Debate of it. He was feconded by Samuel Sandys, Efq; who spoke strenuously in Favour of the Petitioners; but the Court Party infifting upon Mr. Walpole's Motion, the Question for acfourning was put, and carry'd by a Majority of 78 Voices against 29. By this Time four of the Justices of the Peace for the City of Westminster attending, according to Order, they were call'd in, and being at the Bar, Mr. Speaker acquainted them, That the House was inform'd that there was a great Crowd of riotous People in the Lobby and Passages leading to this House, and that he was commanded by the House to direct them, the faid Justices, to go and disperse the faid riotous Crowd, and to take Care to prevent the like Riots for the future. Hereupon the four Justices, arrended by five or fix Constables; defir'd the Petitioners to clear the Lobby and Paffages; and upon their Reinfal, caus'd the Proclamation against Rioters to be twice read, declaring to ing, they should incur the Penalties of the Act. The next Day the Commons, in a Committee of the whole Honf, confider'd of the Bill to reflore Publick Cred to and the first Question that occasion'd any Debate was, At what Price the Subscribers upon the Second Subscription should be oblig'd to take South Sea Stock? Some were for 263 L and others for 203 L and after several Speeches (by Mr. Horatio Walpola, Mr. Tonge, Mr. Rubert Walpole, Mr. Sioper, Mn. Brodrick, Mr. Lowides, Mr. Lowther, Mr. Harsley, Mr. Milner, and Sir John Eyles) it was agreed without dividing, that the said Subscribers should take Stock at 203.

The next Queffion was, Whether Brokers, or fuch as had acted as Brokers for Brokeridge, who had borrow'd Money of the South Sea Company upon Stock, or Subfiription-Receipts, thould, like the other Borrowers, be diffenanced from all further Demands, by paying to the Cashier of the said Company Ten per Cene. of the Money borrow'd? But after some Debate, it was carry'd by 62 Votes against 42, that the said Brokers should be excepted; and a Clause was added to the Bill, to oblige them to pay the whole Money borrow'd.

After this, Sir Thomas Croffe declar'd, that upon looking over the South Sea Books, he found that many of the Borrowers had not given any Security for the Money borrow'd for three Months, or thereabouts, after the Money lent: Upon which the Question was put, and carry'd withour a Division, That all those who had borrow'd Money of the Company, and had not given Security, by transferring Stock, or Subscription Receipts, fourteen Days after the Money lent, should be oblig'd to repay the whole Money. Several other Amendments were made to the Bill, which being reported the next Day to the House by MA Farrer, some of them were agreed to; buc when they came to that relating to the Brokers, the fame occasion'd a confiderable Debate. Mr. Robert Walpole among the reft, expres'd his Apprehensions, That obliging the Brokers to repay the whole Money they had borrow'd, might rather be detrimental, than advantageous to Pullick Credit, and occasion the Fall of the South-Sea Stock, which was now upon the Rife; and that the Brokers, to excuse themselves, might probably accuse others, which would afford fresh Matter of Complaint and Diffute, therefore he mov'd that the faid Claufe be lefe our of the Bill. He was answer'd by General Rolle and Mr. Soper; but upon the Question being put, it was carry'd by a great Majority, that the Brokers thould only be XXm excepted

excepted from the Clause relating to the Borrowers; that is to say, that they should not be oblig'd to repay the whole Money by them borrow'd; nor yet be discharg'd from further Demands, by paying Ten per Cent. of the Money borrow'd; but be lest either to compound with the South Sea Company, or to be sued at Common Law. The other Amendment, relating to the Borrowers, who had not transferr'd their Stock, or Subscription Receipts in due Time, was also lest out of the Bill; and some other Amendments being made by the House, the said Bill was order'd to be ingress'd.

On Monday the 7th of Angust, the said Bill was read the third Time, passed, and sent up to the Lords; after which, the Commons adjourn'd to Thursday the roth, when the Lords signify'd to shem by a Message, that they had agreed to the same without Amendment. The same Day the King came to the House of Peers, with the usual State and Solemnities, and the Commons being sent for up, and attending, his Majisty gave the Royal Assent to the said Bill, and to a private Act; and then his Majesty, by the Mouth of the Lord High Chancellor, made the following Speech to both Houses.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I Am glad that the Business of thir, and the sormer Session, is at length brought to such a Period, that I have now an Opportunity of giving you some Recess, after the great Pains you have taken in the Service of the Publick.

The Common Calamity, occasion'd by the wicked Execution of the South Sea Scheme, was become so very great before your Meeting, that the providing proper Remidies for it was very difficult: But it is a great Comfort to me, to observe, that Publick Gredit now sbegins to recover; which gives me the greatest Hopes that it will be entirely restor'd, when all the Provisions you have made so that End, shall be duly put in Execution.

I have great Compassion for the Susserings of the Lanocent, and a just Indignation against the Guilty; and have readily given my Assent to such Bills as you have prefented to me, for punishing the Authors of our late Misfortunes, and for obtaining the Restitution and Satisfaction due to those who have been injur'd by thems, in such Manner as you indg'd proper. I was at the same Time, willing and debrous, by my Free and General Pardon, to give Ease and Quier to the rest of my Subjects, many of whom may, in such a General Infatuation, have been un-

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you my hearty Thanks for the Supplies you have granted for the Current Service of this Year; and particularly for your enabling me to discharge the Debts and Arrears on the Civil Litt, and to make Good the Engagements I was undere for procuring Peace in the North, which, in all Probability, will now very soon be concluded. These Instances of your Faithful Endeavours to support the Honour and Dignity of the Crown, at Home and Abroad, are tresh Marks of your Zeal and Affection to my Person and Government.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I take this Opportunity of acquainting you, that we have renew'd all our Treaties of Commerce with Spain, upon the fame Foot as they were fettled before the late War; which must necessarily prove an immediate and valuable Advantage to the Trade and Manufactures of this Kingdom.

I earnestly recommend to you all, in your several Stations, to suppress Profaneness and Immorality, and to

preserve the Peace and Quiet of the Kingdom.

You are all fensible, that the Discontents occasion'd by the great Losses that many of my Subjects have sustain'd, have been industriously rais'd and inflam'd by malicious and sedicious Libels; but I make no Doubt, but that, by your prudent Condust in your several Countries, all the Enemies of my Government, who flatter'd themselves they should be able to take Advantage from our Missortunes, and blowers the Sufferings of my People into Popular Discontent and Disaffection, will be disappointed in their wicked Designs and Expectations.

And then the Lord Chancellor, by his Majesty's Command, faid, My Lords and Gentlemen,

His Majesty, through a most tender Concern for all his Subjects, is very fentibly affected with any publick Calamities which may have reach'd, on even threaten'd this Nation; and is extreamly defirous that the utmost Cares should be employ'd to guard this Kingdom from the difmal Effects which a neighbouring Country hath felt from a contagious Diftemper; your Prefervation from which, hitherto, he looks upon to be owing, under God, to the Prudence and Vigilance of those intrusted with the Administration of his Affairs: And although your Trade may have fuffer'd, and the negeffary Means us'd for your Security, have created fome extraordinary Expence, yet there is Ground to hope, that in this-S-filon of Parliament, such Remedies may be apply'd, as ewill reflore the Nation to a flour thing Condition. As an Inflance of his Majefty's Readiness to contribute all in his Power on fo defirable an End, he has been graciously pleas'd, upon the Application of several confiderable Persons of this Kingdom, to direct, that a Commission be pass'd under the Great Seal of Ireland, for receiving voluntary Subscriptions, in order to establish a Bank : As this is a Matter of a General and National Concern, his Majesty leaves it to the Wisdom of Parliament to confider, what Advantages the Publick may receive by erecting a Bank, and in what Manner it may be fefil'd upon a lafe Foundation, fo as to be beneficial to the Kingdom.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I shall order the feveral Accounts and Estimates to be laid before you. What I have in command from his Majesty to ask, will be such necessary Supplies as may support the Establishment, and secure the Peace of the Kingdom. I am to acquain you, that since, by the unweary'd Endeavours of his Majesty, the Peace Abroad draws near to a happy Conclusion, two Regiments are returning to this Kingdom, which, during the Rustire with Spain, were thought necessary to remain in England, to be in Readiness for such Service as the Exigence of Assars, or the Designs of the Enemy, might require.

My Lords and Gentlemen.

Whatever Hopes the dif ffected may conceive from unhappy Divisions amongst our felves, I doubt not but you will frustrate and defeat them by your prudent Conduct, and perfect Unanimity, which cannot but contribute to the Security of our most excellent Church, as by Law establish'd, and to the strengthening the Protestant Interest at Home, which will make the deepest Impression upon his Majesty, who has been so indefatigable in the Maintenance of it Absord.

On the other Side, the Czar restores to Sweden, Part of Finland, and gives his Swedish Majesty two Millions of Rixdollars, payable at two different Terms, conformably to a separate Article.

5. That Part of Finland shall be evacuated to the Sweden, in the Space of four Weeks after the Exchange of the

Ratifications.

6. The Swedes shall be permitted to buy every Year sifety thousand Rubels worth of Corn at Riga, Revel, and Wybenes, and to transport it without paying any Duties of Export, except in such Years when the Harvest proves bad, or some other folid Reason hinders it.

quilitor

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quisitor of Ancona, that the said Report is notoriously false and groundless: For these Causes we have thought fit to give Notice thereof to the Publick by these Presents, forbidding every Body to rail at, abuse, or insult the Jews in any Manner whatsoever, upon Pain of Imprisonment, and other arbitrary Punishment, as the Superiors shall think fit, even upon the Deposition of one single Witness. Therefore we exhort every Body to pay ready Obedience to this Order, that they may not incur the Penalties aforesaid.

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
