Mr. Hole gave the same evidence in every respect with regard to the goods at Bombay, as he did with regard to those at Bengal and Fort Saint George; and added, that the reason of the quantity of goods at Bombay being so much larger than at the other presidencies, is, that this account includes the company's goods in Persia, and at Surat, which are very considerable.

Your Committee find, by the evidence of Mr. Hoole, that this debt confifts of advances made for investments to the agents, factors, and country merchants, and of money owing to the company for goods fold, to the amount of £433,115. " should again be added to the annual settlement, to be made up in June 1769." And your Committee find, that fuch amount was added to the faid account, made up in June 1769, and has been added in all the annual accounts made up fince that period; and that in the last annual account made up on the 1st of July 1772, there is included, in confequence of fuch order of the Court of Directors, under the article of factory at Bengal, the firm of 191 lack and 54,558 current rupees, which, at 2s. 3d. each, amount to the fum of f.2,154,888. which fum, by a memorandum at the foot of the faid account, is flated to be the amount of what had been then expended for fortifications, buildings, &c. at Bengal.

Your Committee having no rule by which they can form any judgment of the real value of this part of the company's effects, can only flate to the House what they find in the company's books and accounts concerning them: And it appears to your Committee, that in all the annual accompts from the year 1732, which is the first year in which any annual sum was made up, the sum of £.400,000. has been charged under the head of dead stock, which appears to your Committee to be for the dead stock abroad only, as there is another article charged in every such annual account for East India

Your Committee have annexed the account which was laid before them relative to the above matters.

East-India Company. Payment of duties on unrated goods to be respited till 9th December 1772. Extract of the Letter from the Nabob of Arcot to the Court of Directors, dated the 20th March, 1772.

EVERY demand hitherto made on me by your Governor and Council, I have fully paid, though I could not prevail on them to give me my accounts till very lately, and even those are wrote in such a manner, that neither I nor any of my people can well understand them: However, from the beginning of my transactions to the end of October, 1771, there is not a daum due from me to the Company. The Governor and Council, in December, 1769, thought proper to charge to my account ten lacks of pagodas, as my share of the expence of the Myfore war; they have frequently mentioned in their letters to me, that I acknowledged this as a just debt, and promised to pay it; and I understand from your letters, that they had been at great pains to write in the same manner to England: In the Myfore war I expended large fums, as I maintained the whole army, paid the expence of the troops. as well those employed in the war, as in the defence of the Carnatick at the time: By what management then could the extraordinary expences amount to fuch a fum? This is the fenfe I have always had of the agreement I entered into with the Governor and Council in 1768, that I was to be put in possession of the conquered country, out of the revenues of which the whole expence of the war was to have been paid. The event of the war is well known, and in every one article the Governor and Council failed on their part, even in fuch as I effectived effential to my honour, as well as to

my interest, and that of my country. I defire you to confider this matter well, and am certain, that you will then see this matter in the light I do; and I appeal to yourselves, whether you think it probable I ever could be brought voluntarily to acknowledge this demand as a just debt in such circumstances.

I have nothing so much at heart as endeavouring by every means to make my friendship with the Company stronger and stronger; and therefore, in my last letter by the ship Lord North, I told you, that the next fhip should bring you accounts of my friendship, that you might fer your minds at ease. What is money to me without your friendship? or what furn can equal the value I have for you? Therefore, fince you have been told, that I would pay you ten lacks of pagodas, I now tell you, that, out of pure friendthip, and merely as the refult of my own free will and choice, I will, in time of peace and tranquility, pay to my friends the East-India Company ten lacks of pagodas: I alk nothing in return but your friendship, which I doubt not but you will readily grant.
