



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

Silver plate is in large demand by Europeans for whom it is principally worked. Gold plate is seldom made except for Rájas. Price including value of silver Re. 1-4-0 to Rs. 2-8-0 a tola according to quality of workmanship. Temple doors (principally Jains) have plates of silver and brass hammered in rich ornament over the wood.
