INTRODUCTION

Sangeet Natak Akademi - the National Academy of Music,
Dance and Drama - was established by the Government of India
in 1953. The idea was to constitute an independent, autonomous organisation which could coordinate and oversee all
activities in the sphere of the performing arts, traditional
as well as classical, within the country. The aims and objectives of the Akademi are spelt out in its Memorandum of Assoeiation (excerpts - Appendix I) drawn up by the Government of
India, which also funds all Akademi activities.

Over the years, in furtherance of its objectives, the Akademi has implemented several programmes and schemes for the purpose of preserving, nurturing and promoting the performing arts in various parts of the country. In recent years, priority has been given to projects pertaining to the folk and tribal arts threatened by rapid socio-economic development. These schemes - Preservation and Promotion of Rare Forms of Traditional Performing Arts, Development of Tribal Culture, Promotion and Preservation of Puppetry - have been incorporated in the Five Year Plans for the overall development of the country.

Several other schemes, designed by the Akademi to sustain and develop specific performing arts, are now part of Akademi's Five Year Plans. Among these are Assistance to Young

Theatre Workers, Organising of Music Festivals, Grant of Fellowships to promising young artistes, Research in Science of Music, Documentation and Dissemination of Archival Material pertaining to Performing Arts, and Inter-State Exchange of Cultural Troupes. The implementation of these schemes has been reported, from time to time in the Annual Reports of the Akademi.

Annually, the Akademi honours outstanding performers and performing-art scholars with Awards and Fellowships. A Fellowship is the highest honour the Akademi confers on an individual performer or scholar. The Awards, carrying a purse of Rs 10,000, are for artistic excellence, achievement and sustained contribution.

The Awards ceremony is a notable annual event, followed by a week-long festival of music, dance and drama featuring Award-winners. This year, marking a break with previous practice the Awards ceremony was held outside the Capital, in Madras, and was presided over by the Vice-President Shri R. Venkataraman. The Akademi proposes in future to hold the ceremony, by rotation, in different parts of the country in furtherance of its object of cultural cross-fertilization.

The Akademi publication programme takes in books and monographs on the performing arts and the quarterly <u>Sangeet Natak</u> - now in its twentieth year. The <u>SNA News Bulletin</u>, a quarterly reporting current Akademi activities had been part of the programme too for two decades. Temporarily in abeyance, the

Bulletin is sought to be revamped in content and format, and should reappear refurbished next year. The Publication grants given by the Akademi, have, over the years, been of some help to writers and institutions publishing on the performing arts of India.

The Documentation Unit of the Akademi, equipped with sophisticated audio and video equipment, covers many of the major programmes of music, dance and drama throughout the country. Over the years the Archival collection has grown considerably; the Akademi has now 4,500 hours of audio recordings, 140 hours of video, some 34,000 black & white photographs and transparencies, and 1,05,000 feet of 16 mm film.

The Library, open to the public 10.00 a.m. - 7.30 p.m., continues to be widely used. Its specialized holdings on the performing arts draw researchers in the performing arts, as the attached Listening Room draws music lovers. The Listening Room collection of discs includes a wide variety of Indian and foreign music, and the facility is offered free to interested individuals.

The Museum of Musical Instruments continues to attract visitors, particularly those interested in Indian folk instruments, of which it has a near-unexampled collection as also of masks and puppets. Several rare instruments were added to the collection during the year.

Kathak Kendra, New Delmi, and Jawaharial Nehru Manipur Dance Academy, Imphal - training institutions in Kathak and Manipuri dance and music - are constituent units of the Akademi. They are now recognised as the premier institutions in the country for teaching Kathak and Manipuri.

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TRIBUTES

On 31st October 1984, the nation mourned the tragic death of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi. Apart from being a national leader, the late Prime Minister was known for her patronage of the arts and had endeared herself to the community of artists throughout the country.

The General Council of the Akademi, at its meeting on 27th November 1984, condoled the death of Shrimati Gandhi and paid tributes to her memory. The Chairman, Dr. Narayana Menon, recalled her long association with the Akademi as its Chairman for nearly seven years: 1965-72. He mentioned that condolence messages were received in the Akademi from numerable art organisations throughout the country and from abroad. The Chairman particularly referred to the message received from the Composers Union of the USSR. All messages were conveyed to Shri Rajiv Gandhi.

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ORGANISATIONAL SET-UP

Sangeet Natak Akademi is a national institution set up by the Government of India in 1953 for the promotion of the performing arts. Registered under the Societies Registration Act of 1860, it functions as an autonomous organisation.

The management of the Akademi vests in its General Council. The general superintendence, direction and control of the affairs of the Akademi vests in the Executive Board, which is in fact the governing body of the Akademi. The Finance Committee, of which the Akademi's Financial Adviser is ex-officio Chairman, assists the Executive Board in financial matters.

The principal executive officer of the Akademi is the Secretary who is assisted by a Finance and Accounts Officer, five Assistant Secretaries, a Special Officer (Documentation), a Technical Office: (Filming), an other officers and staff. The registered office of the Akademi is in Rabindra Bhavan, New Delhi. The Akademi manages and runs two training institutions - Kathak Kendra, New Delhi, and Jawaharlal Nehru Manipur Dance Academy, Imphal - the management of which vests in the Executive Board of the Akademi, assisted by the Advisory Committee of the two constituent units. Detailed report of activities of these two institutions are given separately in the report. The Akademi is financed entirely by the Department of Culture, Government of India.

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Festivals, Programmes and Exhibitions

Children's Play

In July, two shows of the children's play <u>Durga Zali</u>

<u>Gauri</u> by Avishkar of Bombay were presented on 2 and 3 May.

A large number of children participated in the production.

Audition of Trainees

Students of Ustad Aminuddin Khan Dagar, training in Dhrupad, and the students of Pandit Purushottam Das learning Pakhawaj under the Akademi's scheme of Promotion and Preservation of Rare Forms, were auditioned at Rabindra Bhavan in June.

An Evening of Dhrupad

The programme was held at India International Centre on 2 June 1984 featuring a solo recital by Ustad Aminuddin Khan Dagar and a duet by the Dagar Brothers - Zahinuddin Khan Dagar and Fayyazuddin Khan Dagar. In the foyer of the auditorium an exhibition of photographs of musicians of the Dagar family was mounted.


Clarionet Recital

India International Centre collaborated with the Aka-demi in presenting a clarionet recital on 3 August 1984 by Ralph D' Mello. Mr D' Mello, a musician of Indian origin, has distinguished himself as a clarionetist in the West.

Programmes for International Buddhist Conference



' A series of cultural programmes were presented during the ICCR-sponsored International Buddhist Conference held



at Vigyan Bhavan, New Delhi, 10-15 October 1984. The programmes were held at Siri Fort Auditorium in the evenings. The Akademi collaborated in these presentations.

Lok Utsav

Lok Utsav was a major event of the year, a festival of folk performing arts held in October on Rabindra Bhavan lawns. During the six-day long festival some 250 artistes presented nearly 40 different forms of music and dance from all over the country, providing a kaleidoscopic view - rarely obtained - of our rich and variegated folk heritage. Some of these forms, like Padayani and Khongjom Parba, were seen in Delhi for the first time.

Memorable among performances was that of 93-year-old Raja
Ram Bhau Kadam, who sang Gondhal songs from Maharashtra.

Panchavadyam featured - an ensemble of instruments played in
Kerala temples. Other percussion ensembles were Thayambaka
(Kerala), Tala Vadya Anjuman (a melange of popular percussion)
and Goan percussion. Two martial arts featured - Kalaripayattu (Kerala) and Thang-Ta (Manipur). Also from Manipur
were the ritual arts of Sankirtan and Lai Haroba, and popular
tribal group-dances like Thabal Chongbi and Kitlam. Burra Katha
(Andhra Pradesh) and Powada (Maharashtra) were forms of ballad
presented, while forms of puppetry included Tolu Bommalata
from Andhra Pradesh and Katputli Rajasthani. The vigorous
dance of the Panthis from Madhya Pradesh (Chattisgarh) proved

to be one of the most popular presentations at the Festival.

Lok Utsav was a big draw, and most successful in terms of audience appeal. It served besides as a exercise for selection of forms and troupes to be presented in the Festival of India in France.

Koodiyattam Festival

In collaboration with the Margi Koodiyattam School, Trivandrum, the Akademi organised 14-22 December 1984 the Koodiyattam Festival 1984 at Trivandrum. The Festival was held under the auspices of Ammannur Chachu Chakyar Smarak. Gurukulam, Irinjalakuda.

Shri Ammannur Madhava Chakyar and his troupe presented three plays - Toranayudham, Baliyudham, Kaliyana Saugandhikam.

Tal Vadya Utsav

The Akademi collaborated with ICCR in yet another international event, the Tal Vadya Utsav, in February 1985. To this festival of percussion music held at Siri Fort Auditorium, the Akademi contributed the entire Indian component, comprising items like Tal Vadya Anjuman, Manipuri drum dances, Tatkar in Kathak style, drum dances by the tribals of Orissa. A memorable duet by eminent percussionists Umayalpuram K. Sivaraman and Zakir Husain on the Mridangam and Tabla was one of the highlights of the festival. At the Bonbay chapter of the Utsav, the Akademi presented a Tal Vadya Kacheri featuring the eminent percussionist Falghat R.Raghu,

while Zakir Husain was presented in a solo recital.

Organisation of Music Festivals

Under its scheme "Organising Music Festivals in the Country" the Akademi funded a Festival of Himahal Pradesh folk dances and music at Una, the Rai Umanath Bali music festival at Lucknow and a festival of music organised by Delhi SPIC MACAY. To celebrate the International Year of the Youth the Akademi organised two festivals of dance and music at Trivandrum and Pune in collaboration with Kerala Sangeetha Nataka Akademi and the Directorate of Culture, Maharashtra respectively. These were held in the last week of March 1985.

At Una the Akademi's Documentation Team was present and a large number of folk dances and music of Himachal Pradesh like Songhe Chham (Lion Dance), Rupana Geet and Harnatar were recorded on video and audio tapes.

"Yuva Utsavs" held at Pune and Trivandrum provided a platform to very large number of promising young professionals in the field of music and dance. They covered the artistes of the western and the southern zones predominantly but in order to promote cross fertilization in art there was also an exchange of artistes between them.

Workshop on Body Connotation and Voice Culture

An International Workshop on Body Connotation and Voice Culture was organised 20 February - 10 March 1985 by Sopanam,

Trivandrum, in collaboration with the Akademi and ICCR. Designed for actors' inter-action with the traditional performing arts of Kerala, the workshop had seven participants from China, Africa, England and Japan, 17 from India (15 Kerala actors and two graduates of the National School of Drama). Mr John Martin, Theatre Director from the Pan Project, and Shri K.N. Panikkar were Artistic Directors of the Workshop.

Marathi Musical Play

Two shows of a new Marathi musical play, <u>Padgham</u>, written by Shri Arun Sadhu, produced by Theatre Academy, Pune, and directed by Shri Jabbar Patel, were staged in Delhi 5-6 March, 1985; the Akademi co-sponsored the shows with Shri Ram Centre, Delhi.

Tradition and Innovation in Indian Dance

The programme was presented by National Centre for the Performing Arts at Max Mueller Bhavan, Bombay, with the cosponsorship of the Akademi. It featured newly choreographed works by leading dancers, both Indian and foreign. These included Astad Deboo, Ileana Citaristi, Govindan Kutty Nair and Kumudini Lakhia.

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Festival of India in France & USA

Encouraged by the success of the Festival of India in UK 1982-83, the Government of India decided to hold similar Festivals in France and the USA in collaboration with the respective Governments. This series of Festivals was conceived by the late Prime Minister Smt. Indira Gandhi with the aim of projecting Indian life and culture in all its aspects.

The Festival of India Committee was set up by the.

Government of India, with Smt Pupul Jayakar as Chairman. The

Chairman and Secretary of the Akademi being closely associated with the Committee as members, the Akademi has taken on the task of selecting performers for the various performing arts events planned for the two Festivals.

The following folk troupes from different regions, comprising some 200 artistes in all, have been identified by the Akademi for performances at the inaugural ceremony of the Festival of India in France to be held in June 1985.

Most of these forms were presented at the Lok Utsav organised by the Akademi about which a report appears elsewhere. The Lok Utsav served the purpose of selection of forms and troupes to be presented during the course of the Festival of India in France.

from different regions.

The Festival in France will be inaugurated in Paris on 7 June 1985 by Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi and French President Francois Mitterand.

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Assistance to Young Theatre Workers

The objective of the scheme is to support the endeavours of young theatre workers engaged in exploring and developing a theatre idiom indigenous in character, inspired by the traditional/folk theatre of the country. Through such support it is hoped to ensure the continuity of the existing indigenous thrust in our theatre and provide the impetus for a broad-based movement.

The scheme is operated on the basis of a State-wise division of the country into four zones - North, South, West and East. Four Zonal Festivals are held every year by rotation in the States comprising the zone with the collaboration of the respective State Sangeet Natak Akademi or the State Cultural Department. The Zonal Festivals are followed by a National Festival held in Delhi. The objectives of the scheme will be found at Appendix III.

The Akademi has constituted a separate experts Committee for each zonal festival. The Committee's task is to help in selection of plays for the respective zonal festival and, at Delhi.

A three-day Seminar on Perspectives of Contemporary Indian Theatre was organised 17-19 December 1984 in collaboration with India International Centre, New Delhi, to coincide with the Festival.

Promotion and Preservation of Rare Forms of Traditional Performing Arts & Award of Fellowships

The Rare Forms Scheme was devised to promote and preserve traditional performing arts threatened with extinction for want of support and resources. A number of such forms have been identified and training programmes in several of them have been initiated with the financial assistance of the Akademi.

Training programmes in Rudra Veena, Pakhawaj, Koodiyattam, Dhrupad, Sarangi, Navajanardhanam, Ashtapadi-singing
and Ravan Chhaya were identified in the past by the Akademi
under traditional masters; some of these continue.

In addition, two programmes in Pakhawaj commenced this year under Raja Chhattrapati Singh in Bijna, and at Kathak Kendra under Pandit Prem Vallabh. A training programme in Adhyatma Ramayan began under Smt Saride Manikyam, one of the few living exponents of the art; the programme is being conducted under the general supervision of Dr Natraj Ramakrishna in Hyderabad.

These programmes apart, the Akademi offers Fellowships to outstanding students for advanced training in rare instruments under eminent gurus or institutions. The value of a Fellowship is Rs 500 a month, the guru receiving an equal amount. A Fellow is also allowed a grant up to Rs 1000 a

year for equipment and contingent expenditure. The following received Fellowships in the year under report: Mohammed

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INTER-STATE EXCHANGE OF CULTURAL TROUPES

The broad objective of the Scheme, operative since 1957, is to create opportunities by which people from different parts of India get to know more about each other's performing arts and culture, and thus catalyze the emotional and cultural integration of the country. It is implemented through exchange of the performing troupes and individuals between the different Indian States. In course of time, this exposure of the people of one region to the arts of another is expected to contribute to mutual awareness and integration.

Originally administered by the Department of Culture, Government of India, the Scheme was transferred to the Akademi in 1979-80.

The exchange programme is chalked out every year in consultation with representatives of State Governments. In the current year, the following exchanges took place:

- 1. A 35-member troupe from Haryana visited Himachal Pradesh 22 November 1 December 1984, performing folk music and dances at Chamba, Dalhousie, Joginder Nagar, Nahan, Palampur, Shimla and Solan.
- A 22-member Nagaland troupe visited Goa, Daman and Diu 8-16 January 1985, performing at Curcherem, Mapusa, Margao, Panaji, Parsem, Ponda and Vasco. The troupe also performed in Maharashtra 18-27 January 1985.

- 3. Smt. Chitra Vishweswaran, Bharatnatyam dancer from Tamil Nadu, led a 26-member troupe to Rajasthan 5-15 February 1985 for performances in Bhilwara, Bundi, Jaipur, Jhalawar, Jodhpur and Udaipur.
- 4. A 41-member music and dance ensemble from Goa,
 Daman & Diu visited Manipur 13 February 5 March 1985.
- 5. A 25-member Raslila group from Uttar Pradesh visited Tamil Nadu 18-27 February 1985, performing in Kalaivanar, Madurai, Nagercoil, Thanjavur, Tiruchirapalli and Vellore.
- 6. A 40-member folk dance and music ensemble from Himachal Pradesh visited Haryana 20 February 2 March 1985, performing in Chandigarh, Daderi, Gurgaon, Jind, Karnal, Kurukshetra and Mahindergarh.
- 7. A 22-member Rajasthan folk music and dance group visited Dadra and Nagar Naveli 21-28 February 1985, performing in Dadra, Dudhani, Khanvel, Mandoni, Nareli, Randha and Silvassa.
- 8. A 20-member Bhumika Creative Danes Centre troupe from Delhi visited Kerala 20 March 1 April 1985, performing at Alwaye, Badagara, Cannanore, Kodungalloer, Sherthalai and Trivandrum.

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Promotion and Preservation of Puppetry

The scheme seeks to sustain and promote the threatened art of puppetry by supporting training in the various forms of Indian puppetry by recognised institutions and individuals, and by organising puppet shows and workshops.

A major event this year was Putli Natak Samaroh, a four-day Puppetry festival, presented in Delhi 20-23 March, 1985; the venue was Shah Auditorium. The schedule of performances follows:

PUBLICATIONS

The Akademi has been publishing, since its inception, literature on music, dance and drama with the object of disseminating knowledge about the performing arts. The publication programme, begun on a modest scale, has grown considerably over the years and now takes in the quarterly Sangeet Natak as well as books and monographs on music, dance and drama. Part of the publication programme too is S.N.A. News Bulletin which, temporarily, ceased publication in January 1984: it is expected to reappear refurbished next year. Its own publications apart, the Akademi of the financial assistance to institutions and individuals for the publication of books and journals on the performing arts.

The Publication Committee, set up by the Executive Board guides the Akademi's Publication programme, framing its policy, recommending choice of titles and financial assistance for publications not the Akademi's own. The Committee is an advisory body, and its recommendations are subject to approval by the Executive Board.

Sangeet Natak :

Four issues (Nos. 68 - 71) of the Akademi's quarterly journal appeared in the course of the year. Founded 1965, the journal attracts contributions from scholars of Indian performing arts, and has achieved a sizeable readership at home and abroad. The annual subscribers to the journal is Rs. 15/- \$ 7.50 for overseas subscribers.

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Documentation and Dissemination

The Documentation Unit of the Akademi is a professional team of photographers, cinematographers and sound engineers which has been filming, and recording on tape, the entire range of Indian performing arts from the inception of the Akademi. Archival holdings have swelled over the years, and now stand at 1,0,5000 feet of 16 mm silent film, 23000 photographs and 11000 transparencies, 4500 hours of audio recording and 150 hrs. of video recording. The documentation team covers all performing art events of note - folk, traditional, classical - and the archives continue to grow.

Dissemination

During the year over 80 groups availed of the playback facilities provided by the Akademi for audio and video recording. Some 99 hours of audio and 102 hours of video recordings were played for various delegations, research scholars and others. The dubbing service for classical music has been discontinued on account of copyright problems, but the

ies of 19 hours of folk and tribal music were supplied on request this year.

Similarly, copies of photographs and clides from the photographic archives were supplied on request for research and publication - copies of 1460 photographs and 280 slides.

Some 27 groups viewed more than 60 films from the Akade i archives.

To keep the Unit technically abreast of current work in filming and recording, members of Unit have regularly an attending seminars and workshops. Shri S. Bensal, Special Officer (Documentation), and Shri R.S. Manatra, Technical Officer (Filming), attended a two-day Workshop on Video Software Production Techniques organised by Sory in Land.

Shri Dilip Kumar, Technical Officer (Recording) attended the Workshop on Audio Technology organised in april 1984 by the National Centre for the Performing Arts in Lombay.
