Publications

The publication programme of the Akademi takes in books and monographs on the performing arts besides the quarterly journal Sangeet Natak, begun in 1965. The Sangeet Natak Akademi News Bulletin, reporting Akademi activities, also appears quarterly. Apart from its own publications, the Akademi provides financial assistance to authors/institutions to publish books and journals on the performing arts.

The Publication Committee, set up by the Executive Board, guides the publication programme. It consists of the following: Shri P V Krishnamoorthy, Chairman; members: Dr M Nagabhushana Sarma, Shri Komal Kothari, Dr (Mrs) Kumud Metha, Shri Rahul Barpute, Shri Samik Banerjee.

Marathi Stage Sangeet by Ashok Ranade was a new title published this year. Available Akademi publications are listed at Appendix 5.

Four issues (Nos. 79-82) of Sangeet Natak appeared during the year. One of these, No. 79, was a special issue on 'Teaching Indian Classical Music' edited by Jayashree Banerjee.

The Sangeet Natak Akademi News Bulletin, started in 1965, appeared regularly during the period. Distributed free to institutions and individuals interested in the arts, the Bulletin is meant to disseminate information about Akademi activities.

II by Puru Dadheech; Rs 2000 for Sangeet Kala Vihar, Miraj; Rs 2500 for Abhinaya Navanita by Sri Narayana Iyyenger and Sri T P Nattuvanar to be published by

Music Academy, Madras; Rs 2500 for Chaturdandi Prakasika by Sri Venkatamakhi to be published by Music Academy, Madras; Rs 4500 for Abhinaya Sara Samputa by Sri Narayana Iyyengar to be published by Music Academy, Madras Rs 5000 for the journal of the Music Academy, Madras.

Copies of the following books were bought by way of subsidy: Christian Theatre in India by Chummar Choondal; Nritya Geetha Mala by Rajee Narayan and Natyashastra (28th Chapter with Sanskrit/Hindi Commentary) by K.C.D. Brahaspati.









Inter-State Cultural Exchange Programme

Handled by SNA from 1980 but operative since 1957, the programme promotes exchange of performing troupes and individual artistes between the different States of the country. The object is an integrative awareness, nationwide, of the great variety of our performing arts. Implementation of the programme rests on State Governments, SNA playing a pivotal role—advising, subsidizing, coordinating the sponsored exchanges.

The exchange programme is planned at an annual meeting with representatives of States/Union Territories. The meeting this year was held in Shimla on 25 April 1986. The hosts were the Directorate of Art, Culture and Languages, Government of Himachal Pradesh. Evident on the occassion was the enthusiasm of participants for accelerated exchanges—a reflection of the interest generated in many parts of the country by the tours of performers from other regions.

The following exchanges took place

during the year:-

- A 30-member Gujarat music and dance group—Venu Naad—toured Himachal Pradesh in June 1986. The group performed at Shimla, Nahan, Mandi and Kulu.
- 2. A 30-member music and dance group from Chandigarh toured Kerala and Karnataka in August/ September 1986. In Kerala the group performed at Trivandrum, Trichur, Kottayam, Ernakulam, Kozhikode and Palghat. In neighbouring Karnataka, the shows were in Bangalore, Mysore and Mandya.
- 3. A 28-member music and dance group from Uttar Pradesh toured Mizoram, Meghalaya and Sikkim 9-25 October 1986.
- 4. A 30-member music and dance group from Madhya Pradesh toured Assam 16–24 October 1986. The group performed at Shivsagar, Nowgong, Guwahati, Mangaldoi, Tejpur.
- A 30-member music and dance group from Goa toured Haryana 17-27 October 1986. The group

gave performances at Faridabad, Narnaul, Sirsa, Jind, Sonepat, Ambala and Chandigarh.

6. A 30-member music and dance group from Goa toured Mizoram 9–20 November 1986. The group performed at Aizwal, Lunglei, Kolasib and Hnathial.

7. A 30-member Gujarat dance group—Madhur Jyoti Dance Academy, Baroda—toured Uttar Pradesh 9–17November 1986. The group performed at Mathura, Agra, Meerut, Moradabad, Shahjahanpur and Lucknow. The group also toured Delhi 17–20 November, performing in two schools in the Capital besides giving a public show.

8. Rangmandal—a repertory company of Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh—toured Rajasthan 6–19 December, 1986. The company performed at Kota, Bhilwara, Udaipur, Jodhpur, Borunda and Jaipur.

 A 30-member music and dance group from Haryana toured Goa

17-24 Dec. '86.

10. A 27-member music and dance group from Manipur—Performing Arts Centre, Imphal—toured Tamil Nadu and Pondicherry 23–31 December 1986. The group gave performances at Madras, Kanchipuram, Vellore, Coimbatore, Salem and Pondicherry.

 A 30-member music and dance group from Karnataka toured Maharashtra 20–30 December 1986. The group performed at Bombay, Nasik, Thane, Pune and Sholapur.

- 12. A music and dance group from West Bengal toured Daman and Gujarat 23 December—4 January 1987. The group performed at Daman, Surat, Dohad, Kasturinagar, Ahmedabad, Veraval and Dwarka.
- A 30-member folk dance group from Mizoram toured Goa 7–13 December 1986. The group gave performances at Ponda, Margao, Paiguinin, Bicholim and Mapusa.

- 14. A 30-member music and dance troupe from Punjab toured Tamil Nadu 15–26 February 1987. The troupe performed at Madras, Tirunelveli and Nagerkoil.
- 15. A 30-member theatre group from Bihar—Kala Sangam, Patna—toured Rajasthan 17-27 February 1987. The group gave performances at Jodhpur, Bikaner, Hanumangarh, Khetri and Jaipur.
- 16. A 26-member Rengma tribal troupe from Nagaland toured Tamil Nadu 18-26 March 1987. The troupe performed at Madras, Tanjavur, Dharmapuri, Pugalur and Erode.
- 17. A 30-member music and dance troupe from Himachal Pradesh toured Mizoram and Manipur from 25 March 1987. The tour is till 6 April 1987 with performances at Aizawl, Pushpak, Imphal, Moirang, Churachandpur and Ukhrul.

Indo-foreign Cultural Exchange Programme

Certain provisions of the Cultural Exchange Agreements entered into by the Government of India with other countries are implemented by the Akademi. These relate chiefly to exchange of material on the Indian performing arts. The record for the year follows:

The following material was sent to Prague for presentation to institutions: 50 photographs; two SNA monographs on puppetry (Ravana Chhayya by Jiwan Pani and Tolu Bommalata by Nagabhushana Sarma).

SNA journals, new bulletins and brochures on various activities were sent to Akademi's contacts in the following countries: Bangladesh, China, FRG, France, Holland, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, Netherlands, Pakistan, Surinam, Sweden, Switzerland, U.K., USA.

Documentation

The Akademi has, from its inception accorded high priority to the recording and filming of our traditional performingart forms. Begun in a small way in 1953 the programme has expanded considerably, covering the gamut of Indian performing arts, folk and classical. This has been made possible by the setting up in the 60s of a fully equipped recording studio. The documentation programme has resulted in archival holdings of over 1,33,000 feet of 16 mm films, 40, 000 photographs/transparencies (15,800 slides), over 5,000 hours of audio/video recordings. A list of new audio/video recordings this year appears in Appendix 6.

A new venture for the documentation team of the Akademi was the production of a film—Sangai, Dancing Deer of Manipur—based on the JNMDA dancedrama Keibul Lamjao. Choreographed by Chaotombi Singh, the dance-drama was first presented outside Manipur in Nritya-Natika, an all-India dance-drama festival organized by SNA in November '85.

Sangai tells of the plight of a species decimated by loss of habitat. The narrative comes from a Manipuri legend of wide popular appeal. Kadeng, a chieftain, leads a hunting expedition into the forests at the King's command. There he traps a Sangai to fulfil a wish of his betrothed, Tonu, but returns with the prize to find her gone, abducted by the King. Sangai employs the legend to bring home its message of conservation.

The 46-minute 16-mm film was shot on the sets at Kalinga Studio, Bhubaneswar, in January 1987. It was edited in February and scheduled for release in August 1987.

Sangai is directed by Aribam Syam Sharma, a National Award-winning filmmaker of Manipur. All technical aspects of the production were handled by the SNA documentation team led by cinematographer R S Malhotra.

Library and Listening Room

The Akademi Library has over the years, acquired a specialist collection of books on the performing arts, several of them rare and out of print. Over fifty periodicals, both Indian and foreign, are available in the Library which caters chiefly to students and researchers in the performing arts.

An adjunct to the Library, the listening room has a representative collection of discs and cassettes of classical and folk music, chiefly Indian. It offers simultaneous facilities for eight listeners.

Financial Assistance to Cultural Institutions

The Akademi continued to render financial assistance to institutions working in the field of music, dance and drama. In addition to Rs. 4,37,500/ committed to 74 identified institutions in 1982-83, the Grants Committee recommended enhanced grants amounting to Rs. 61,500/ for the year 1986-87 to these institutions (Appendix 8 & 9). Rs. 6,39,000/ was recommended as grant-in-aid to 137 cultural institutions during the year (Appendix 7). Rs. 29,000/ was sanctioned out of the discretionary grant placed at the disposal of the Chairman/Vice-Chairman (Appendix 10). Grants sanctioned during the year totalled Rs 11,67,000/-.

The Grants Committee which considers requests for financial assistance from performing art institutions met on 21 May 1986 and 24 December 1986. The Committee comprises of the following: Shri P V Krishnamoorthy, Chairman, Shri K S Kothari, Secretary; members: Shri Komal Kothari, Shri Ashok Vajpeyi, Dr. Ashok D Ranade, Shri T R Sukumaran Nair and Shri L Damodar Singh.

Budget and Accounts

The Akademi receives grant-in-aid from the Department of Culture, Government of India, for meeting expenditure on Non-Plan and Plan activities. The budget of the Akademi in respect of Non-Plan and Plan expenditure was as follows:

Museum of Musical Instruments

The Akademi has been collecting performing-art objects from its inception, though methodical collection of museum material began only in 1968. Tribal, folk and classical instruments are on view in the Museum, acquired from different parts of the country. Part of the folk and tribal instruments, costume and jewellery collection has been received as gift from visiting troupes of musicians and Government agencies. Some instruments and objects have also been acquired from foreign visitors.

The existing collection divides into two broad categories: folk, tribal and classical musical instruments; masks, puppets, headgears, costumes, ornaments and other

performing-art artefacts.

The Museum has a large collection of Indian folk musical instruments; it houses some 2000 objects in all. Around 25 instruments were acquired during the year. These include some rare instruments like Tirio, a tribal flute of Bihar; Morchang, a variety of Jew's harp from Rajasthan; Sambal, a pair of drums, from Maharashtra; Jhika, wooden clappers from West Bengal; Suddha Maddalam, Uddukai, Thavil—all drums of Tamil Nadu; Dama and Ghumat, drums from Meghalaya and Goa.

Acquisition apart, the Museum received a new impetus in the way of classification and display; some 230 instruments are now on view with the addition of new

showcases.

Promotion and Preservation of Rare Forms of Traditional Performing Arts

Through this scheme, the Akademi seeks to provide sustenance for forms of traditional performing arts no longer in vogue. Over the years various rare forms have been identified; practitioners of nearly thirty forms have received support by way of training and performance

opportunities.

The Rare Forms Fellowship Scheme supports advanced training in several forms of music, dance and theatre. Details of the training given are reported regularly and the progress made by trainees assessed at the end of the year. The three current training courses are by Ustad Hafizullah Khan in Sarangi and in Pakhawaj by Raja Chhattrapati Singh which commenced in 1985 and by Guru Purushottam Das in Pakhawaj which commenced in 1983.

In Memoriam

Several outstanding figures in the world of performing arts passed away during the year.

Thakur Jaidev Singh, a musicologist and scholar of enormous range, expired on 27 May 1986; he had been elected Fellow of the Akademi in 1965. The brilliant Carnatic flutist T R Mahalingam died on 31 May '86; he received the Akademi Award in 1965. The versatile Carnatic vocalist/instrumentalist B Devendrappa passed away on 9 June 1986. He received the Akademi Award in 1963. Debaprasad Das, the eminent Odissi guru, passed away on 16 July'86; He received the Akademi Award in 1977. Baidyanath Sharma, a famous Daskathia singer, who had won the Akademi Award in 1981, died on 10 December 1986. Suleman

Juma Jumani, a veteran Nobat player who had performed at the opening ceremony of the Festival of India in France, expired on 15 December, 1986; he received the Akademi Award in 1985. Devakottai Narayana Iyengar, an eminent Carnatic vainika, passed away on 9 January 1987; he received the Akademi Award in 1969. Adi Pherozeshah Marzban, the popular Bombay director and playwright, died on 26 February 1987; he received the Akademi Award in 1970. Timir Baran Bhattacharya, the noted Sarod player and orchestrator with Indian instruments, died on 29 March 1987; he received the Akademi Award in 1976.

Sangeet Natak Akademi pays its homage to the memory of the deceased.

Kathak Kendra: Delhi

A constituent unit of Sangeet Natak Akademi, Kathak Kendra is among the leading dance-teaching institutions in the country. Set up in 1964, it offers several comprehensive courses in Kathak and allied subjects like vocal music and Pakhawai. The courses are designed to prepare artistes of professional standard. The Kathak Kendra also maintains a Production Unit, comprising highly trained artistic personnel, with a view to enriching the repertoire and technique of Kathak through experimental work. The Kendra has on its staff teachers of eminence in the various disciplines in which training is imparted.

The management of Kathak Kandra vests in the Executive Board of the Akademi which is assisted by an Advisory Committee. The Advisory Committee of Kathak Kendra comprises Shri P V Krishnamoorthy, Chairman; members: Shri Jiwan Pani (Director, Kathak Kendra), Shri K S Kothari (Secretary, SNA), Prof. S K Saxena, Shri Birju Maharaj, Smt Rohini Bhate, Smt Damayanti Joshi, Smt Kumudini Lakhia, Smt Maya Natarajan. In the period reported the Committee met twice on 28 August 1986 and 3 February 1987.

Students/Courses

The Kendra had 150 students on roll this year for the seven courses offered: a five-year Foundation Course; three-year Diploma (Pass) and Honours Courses; Specialization Course in dance, vocal music and Pakhawaj; and Refresher Course in Kathak. Scholarships are awarded for all courses.

Dikshantotsava was held 9-15 May 1986 at Triveni Kala Sangam. The programme marks the end of the Kendra session and features final-year Kathak students who perform before examiners and an invited audience. Twenty-three 'finalists' performed this year.

Teaching Faculty

The faculty comprises Birju Maharaj, Pradhyapak; Durga Lal, Sahachari Pradhyapak; Mannu Lal Shukla, Kathak Guru; Reba Vidyarthi, Kathak Guru; Bharati Gupta, Varishtha Kathak Prashikshika, Geetanjali Lal, Kathak Prashikshika; Rajendra Kumar Gangani, Kathak Prashikshak; Manika Prasad Misra, Tabla Prashikshak; Irene Roy Choudhury, Gayan Prashikshika; Ram Kishore Das, Pakhawaj Prashikshak and Nisha Mahajan, Yoga Prashikshika.

Production Unit

The Production Unit, headed by Guru Birju Maharaj, has a large repertoire of dance-dramas and other choreographic works in Kathak. A group of eight dancers and nine musicains are members of the repertory, which accepts professional engagements and often travels within and outside the country. Participation by Apprentice Fellows and Students in its activities is encouraged with a view to giving them experience in ensemble work and choreography

During the year, Gurus, Prashikshaks and the Repertory Unit choreographed seven short numbers presented in the Maharaj Kalka Bindadin Kathak Mahotsava held

4-7 February 1987 in Delhi.

The Production Unit toured Madras, Tirupati, Cuttack and Bhubaneswar in December 1986. It presented programmes including lecture-demonstrations of Kathak conducted by Shri Jiwan Pani at Madras 19–20 December, Tirupati 22 December, Cuttack 25 December, Bhubaneswar 26 December 1986. These programmes attracted press and public acclaim.

The following dancers are members of the Unit: Km Saswati Sen, Smt Kalyani Chakraborty, Km Durga Arya, Shri Krishan Mohan Misra, Shri Ram Mohan Misra, Shri Bipul Chandra Das, Shri Jai Kishan Maharaj, Shri Ashok Chakraborty.

Festivals

The third Saraccandrika festival was presented 17-19 October 1986 in Delhi. Eighteen Kathak dancers from all over the country participated in the festival. The annual Maharaj Kalka-Bindadin Kathak Mahotsava was presented 4-7 February 1987 in Delhi. The production Unit and Gurus presented some new choreographic works in the festival: Samanvaya, Abhilasha, Rasaranya and Naada-Gujan by Birju Maharaj; Panchattava—Leela by Bharati Gupta; Panchakanyaa by Geetanjali Lal, Nandini Singh, Prerna Srimali, Veronique Azan and Abha Bhatnagar; Pushpaali-Rasa by Rajendra Kumar Gangani.

Apart from these, the following groups and individual dancers presented their new work in the festival: Kadamb, Ahmedabad; Pandit Sunder Lal, Baroda; Punam Jain, Delhi; Vijay Shankar, Calcutta; Sriram Bharatiya Kala Kendra, Delhi; Satyanarain Chakra, Delhi; Nritya Bharati, Pune; Shovana Narain, Delhi.

Sponsored Programmes

Ten Kathak Kendra performances were

sponsored by various agencies during the year. Two of these were presented on 12 and 13 April 1986 on the occasion of Kumbha Mela at Haridwar. A show was presented on 8 October 1986 at Rashtrapati Bhavan in honour of the King & Queen of Jordan. The dance-drama Krishnavan was presented 15 October 1986 at Brindavan on the occasion of the Autumn Festival of Temple Dance. A dance programme was presented on 21 October 1986 at Ashoka Hotel, New Delhi, on the occasion of the Presiding Officers Conference. A performance was given on 12 November 1986 at Kamani Auditorium, New Delhi, in aid of welfare projects of the A V Baliga Memorial Trust. A programme was presented on 24 November 1986 on the occasion of Delhi Day Celebration at Pragati Maidan, New Delhi. A performance was presented on 12 December 1986 at Ashoka Hotel, New Delhi, in honour of the Governor of Istanbul. A programme was presented on 10 February 1987 in New Delhi on the occasion of the 29th Congress of the International Chamber of Commerce, New Delhi. A performance was presented on 23 February 1987 on the occasion of the Sahitya Akademi Annual Awards Presentation Ceremony'. Staff and students of the Kendra also performed in Afghanistan, Fiji and Egypt as part of Cultural Exchange Programmes.

Lecture-Demonstrations/ Workshop

Manda Kranta Bose gave a lecture-demonstration at the Kendra on 9
February 1987 on the 'History and Development of Kathak'. Reena Singha, founder-director of the Kathak Institute, Toronto, held a workshop on 'Dance for the Deaf and Other Handicapped Children' on 11 March 1987. This was followed up with a talk by Smt Reba Vidyarthi, Kathak Guru, on 'Kathak for Handicapped Children' with demonstration by Nirupama Kaul, a deaf and dumb student of the Kendra, on 31 March 1987.

Jawaharlal Nehru Manipur Dance Academy: Imphal

A constituent unit of Sangeet Natak Akademi, JNMDA is the leading institution in the country for the teaching of Manipuri dance. Set up in 1954, it offers several comprehensive courses in Manipuri dance and allied subjects like Thang-ta and Lai Haroba. The courses are designed to prepare artistes of professional standard. The institution has on staff teachers of eminence. It also has a Production Unit with a large repertoire of dance-dramas.

The management of JNMDA vests in the Executive Board of the Sangeet Natak Akademi, which is assisted by a local Advisory Committee. The Advisory Commettee comprises General K V Krishna Rao (Retd), Chairman; Shri N Khelchandra Singh, Vice-Chairman; members: Shri K S Kothari (Secretary, SNA), Shri A.H Choudhury, Th. Babu

Singh (Principal, JNDMA), Prof. Mangthoi Thaimei, Shri S Thanil Singh (Teachers' Representative), Shri Prakash Singh (Director, JNMDA).

Students/Examinations

The Academy had 247 students on roll this year. The annual Certificate and Diploma Course examinations were held 7–21 August 1986, the Post-Graduate Course examinations 4–20 September 1986.

The Annual Function and Convocation of the Academy was inaugurated by General K V Krishna Rao (Retd), Governor of Manipur, on 8 January 1987. Dr L Chandramani Singh, Minister in the Manipur Cabinet, presided over the function. General Krishna Rao gave away the diplomas and presented gold medals to the three best students.

Maharas by the JNMDA Production Unit

The annual study-cum-performance tour of Diploma and Post-Graduate Course students of dance was organized in Kakching where the students performed during the Laiharaoba festival on 22 May 1986.

Performances

A five-member troupe from the Academy performed in the International Folklore Festival, Italy, in July 1986. The troupe also performed in Bulgaria under the Indo-Bulgarian Cultural Exchange Programme. A 19-member Academy troupe performed at the opening ceremony of the 10th Asian Games at Seoul on 20 September 1986. This was followed by a tour of Phillipines and Thailand.

In both Bhakti Aur Sangeet and Lok Utsav '86—festivals presented by SNA in Delhi-artistes of the Academy were represented. In the former Padavali Kirtana was rendered by Kula Singh, Sanayaima, Ranjana Devi and Tombinou Devi on 24 September 1986. In Lok Utsav an 11-member troupe performed Pung Cholom and Thang-ta on 24 and 26 October 1986 respectively. Academy troupes also featured in two festivals in the Yuva Utsav series presented by SNA in Madras and Kanpur. In Madras Pung Cholom and Thang-ta were presented 19 and 20 November 1986 respectively. At Kanpur Academy troupes performed

Pung Cholom and Vasant Ras on 29 and 30 January 1987 respectively.

Artistes of the Academy performed in Delhi on three other occasions, sponsored by different agencies. On 10 September 1986 an eight-member Academy troupe performed at Teen Murti House in honour of visiting dignitaries. Academy artistes featured in Apna Utsav, presented 8–26 November 1986. At the inauguration of Kham, an international exhibition/seminar on Inner and Outer Spaces at the Indira Gandhi National Centre for Arts, Sanaton Singh and Thanil Singh—teachers in the Academy—presented Manipuri Nata Sankirtana.

The Production Unit of the Academy presents composite programmes of dance and music at Imphal on occasions of national importance and in honour of dignitaries visiting the State. These programmes are sponsored by various departments of the State Government as well as other agencies. This year the Production Unit, along with students of the Academy, presented nine programmes of the kind.

The first time ever, artistes of the Academy were 'shot' in a studio during the filming of Sangai: Dancing Deer of Manipur, based on the dance-drama Keibul Lamjao earlier produced by the Academy. Thirty-eight artistes—dancers and musicians—participated in the shooting at Kalinga Studios, Bhabaneswar, in January 1987.

- x. to encourage the development of amateur dramatic activity, children's theatre, the open-air theatre and the rural theatre in its various forms;
- xi. to revive and preserve folk music, folk dance and folk drama in different regions of the country and to encourage the development of community music, martial music and other types of music;
- xii. to sponsor music, dance and drama festivals, seminars, conferences on an all-India basis and to encourage such regional festivals;
- xiii. to award prizes and distinctions and to give recognition to individual artistes for outstanding achievement in the fields of music, dance and drama;
- xiv. to take suitable steps for the maintenance of proper and adequate standards of education in music, dance and drama and with that object to organise research in the teaching of the said subjects;

Scheme of Assistance to Young Theatre Workers (excerpts)

The Scheme and its Objectives

- 1. The scheme is called "Scheme of Assistance to Young Theatre Workers." The operative periodicity of the scheme is annual.
- 2. The broad objective of the scheme is to support the endeavours of young theatre workers engaged in exploring and development a theatre idiom indigenous in character, inspired by the folk/traditional theatre of the country. The intention, however, is not to promote derivative art based on folk/traditional models, but to catalyze the growth of a theatre idiom enriched by indigenous theatrical experience.
- 3. A necessary corollary of this objective is to help, on the one hand, the folk/traditional theatre forms grow through a process of artistic cross-fertilization with modern theatre and, on the other, to help contemporary theatre assimilate the rich heritage of the past. This assimilation is sought to be aided by encouraging experimental endeavours in any artistic area such as playwrighting, style of presentation, acting methodology, etc
- 4. With such an objective in view the adoption of rigid parameters, artistic or other, is neither possible nor desirable. It is to be noted that:
- (a) to be considered for assistance a production need not be a replication of any specific folk play or confine itself to the dramatic framework of any single folk/traditional form. What is expected is a creative exploration and assimilation of the approaches, styles and usages of our folk/traditional theatre.
- (b) only new productions of original plays in Indian languages and translations of such plays are acceptable, as also adaptations based on literary works of Indian origin. New plays in Indian languages—not staged earlier—are especially welcome. Playwrights are offered special remuneration.
- (c) translations and adaptations of non-Indian plays are excluded from the purview of the scheme.
- (d) only new productions are considered. Revivals of earlier productions by the same director or group are not considered unless supported by adequate justification.
