# PREFACE.

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In publishing this work, my object is to remove the fficulties which readers of the Puráns and other ancient works Hindu and Buddhist literature generally feel in identifying e ancient places they come across. Apart from the natural Priosity which every one feels to know the modern names of icient places, the knowledge imparts a peculiar interest and zest the perusal of ancient Hindu works. For the compilation of is work, I have been indebted to the works of such authorities General Cunningham, Dr. Führer, Fergusson, Beal, Wilson, unter and others; also to the Archæological Reports, the Asiatic esearches and the Journals of the Asiatic Society of Bengal. ave also derived my information from the accounts of pilgrims where they have generally agreed, and from local traditions, Notwithstanding the impetus that has been given of late to archæological inquiry, there are many ancient places which have not yet been identified. The change in several names that has been brought about by flux of time owing to the subversion of sects and kingdoms, and the changes in the course of rivers, defies he ingenuity of archæologists to identify them. The present book, however, does not mean to discuss the merits of the identiications, but is only intended to be an alphabetical collection of names of such ancient places in India as have been identified with tolerable certainty.

With regard to the arrangement of the names in this work, I should only observe that, for facility of finding them out, I have followed the system observed in English lexicography, except with regard to the a ( $\mathfrak{A}$ ) or a ( $\mathfrak{A}$ ) series of initial letters. I have placed the a ( $\mathfrak{A}$ ) series after the a ( $\mathfrak{A}$ ) series have been exhausted, as is done in the Abhidhans. If this little



Geographical Dictionary can prove itself of any use or interest to its readers, my labours will be amply rewarded.

I wish to express my sincere thanks to Major F. P. Maynard, M.B., I.M.S., for kindly looking through the final proofs for me.

NCIENT NAMES.

MODERN NAMES OR SITUATION.

A.

HISARI

Hazara (country), the Abisares of the Greeks. It was conquered by Arjuna (Mahábhárat and Cunningham).

CHCHHODA-


SAROVARA ... Achchhávat in Kásmir, described by Bánabhatta in his Kádamvari. It is six miles from Marttanda. The Siddhasrama was situated on the bank of this lake (Brihat-Náradiya Purána).

DHIRÁIA

Datihá in the Gawalior territory. was the kingdom of Dantavakra, who was killed by Krishna. The name of Datihá also indicates the place where Dantavakra was killed. The country was conquered by Sahadeva, one of the five Pándavas. A Vaishnava work, quoted by R. K. Roy in his Mahábhárat, places it near Brindaban in the district of Mathura.

AGASTYA-ASRAMA

1. Twenty-four miles to the south-east of Násik, now called Agastipuri: it was the hermitage of Rishi Agastya. 2, Kol-

hapur in the province of Bombay. Sarai-Aghat, forty-three miles south-we of Itah in the North-Western Province (Führer's Monumental Antiquities and I criptions).

AGRAVANA ... Agra, one of the eighty-four vanas Vraja.

AHICHCHHATRA. Ramnagar, twenty miles west of Bar.
The name of Ahichchhatra is at presconfined to the great fortress in the lagranger of Alampur Kot and Nasratganj. It will the capital of north Panchála or Rokhand (Dr. Führer and General Cunnin ham).

AHICHHATRA ... Same as Ahichchhatra.

AHIKSHETRA ... Same as Ahichchhatra.

AIRAVATI ... The river Ravi. The Rapti and Irawadi are also the contractions of the name.

AJAMATI ... The river Ajaya in Bengal.

AJITAVATI ... The Little Gandak river on the nor of Kusinagara (Kasia), where Budul died. The river is also called Hirany vati.

AKHANDHA ... Dildarnagar, twelve miles south of Ghazipur.

AMARAKANTAKA It is a part of the Mikul (Mekala) hill in which the rivers Nerbuda and Sor have got their source.

MARANÁTHA

A celebrated temple of Siva in a grotto "full of wonderful congelations" in the Haramuk mountain of the Bhairavagháti range of the Himalaya in Kásmir (Bernier's Travels, note, p. 418). It is open to the pilgrims in the month of Srában who visit the shrine escorted by officers in the service of the Mahárájá of Kásmir. A miraculous pigeon-like bird is said to appear every wear, gyrating and fluttering over the temple, to the amazed gaze of the assembled pilgrims.

ARÁVATI

1. Nagarhára, about two miles to the west of Jallálábad: a village close to it is still called Nagarak (Na-kie of FaHian) V. St. Martin. 2, Amraoti in Central India.

MARESWARA

Omkárnáth, where the temple of Omkárnáth, one of the twelve great Lingas of Mahádeva, is situated. It is near Mandaleswar, five miles to the east of Mahes (ancient Máhishmati), on the right bank of the Nerbuda, and two miles to the east of the Kheri station of the R. M. Railway.

The twelve great Lingas are: Somanáth in Sauráshtra, Mallikárjuna in Srisaila, Mahá-kála in Ujjaini, Omkára in Amareswara, Kedára in the Himalaya, Bhimasankara in Dákini, Biseswara in Benares. Tryambaka in Gomati, Baidyanátha in Chitábhumi, Náges in Dwáraká, Rámeswara in Setubandha, and Ghusrines in Sivalaya.

AORNOS (of the Greeks)

Ránighat, sixteen miles north of Ohio according to Cunningham, but according to Captain James Abbot, Shah Kote Mount Mahában, situated on the wester bank of the Indus.

APAGA

The Ayuk-nadi to the west of the Rávi in the Panjab.

APARANANDA

A small stream called the Sukrinadi which flows through the districts of Gaya and Patna, and falls into the Ganges.

APARA-VIDEHA...

Rungpur and Dinajpur (Dr. R. L. Mitra).

APARANTAKA

Konkan and Malabar.

ARBUDA

Mount Abu in the Aravali range in Rajputana. It was the hermitage of Rishi Vasishtha. It contains the celebrated Jain temple dedicated to Rishava Deva.

ARDHAGANGA ...

The river Kaveri.

ARIIKIYA

. The river Beas (Vipasá).

RIUNI

The river Báhudá (Dhabalá).

RKAKSHETRA...

Same as Padmakshetra.

UNAKUNDA-

PURA

Warrangal, the ancient capital of Telingana.

HTABAKRA-

ÁSRAMA

... Ráhugráma (now called Raila), ten miles from Hardwar, near which flows the Ashtabakra-nadi, a small river, perhaps the ancient Samangá.

SIKNI

The river Chenab (Chandrabhágá).

SWA-TIRTHA

The confluence of the Ganges and the Kálinadi in the district of Kánouj (Prakriti-vádá).

AUDUMVARA

Cutch, its ancient capital was Koteswara or Kachchheswara.

AVANTI

Ougein was the capital. It was the kingdom of Vikramáditya: Malwa.

AVANTI-NADI

. The Siprá. Ougein stands on this river.

AYODHANA

.. Pák-Pattana in the Panjab.

AYODHYA

Oudh, the kingdom of Ráma. During the Buddhist period, Ayodhyá was divided into Uttara (Northern) Kosala and Dakshina (Southern) Kosala. The river Saraju divided the two provinces. The capital of the former was Srávasti on the Rápti, and the capital of the latter was Ayodhyá on the Saraju. The ancient capital of the kingdom was also called Ayodhyá, the birth-place of Ráma. a place in the town called Janmastha he was born; at a place called Tre ki-Thákur he performed the horse-sai fice, by setting up the image of Sit at Swargadwaram his body was burne Adináth, a Jaina Tirthankar, was bo at Ayodhyá (Führer).

Another name of Ahichchhatra.

Guzerát and part of Malwa.

ARAMANAGARA ..

Arrah in the district of Shahabad.

ÁRATTA

.. The Panjab.

ÁRYÁVARTTA

The northern part of India which lies between the Himalaya and the Vindhyá range.

ÁSILDURGA

Junágar (Tod).

AYUDHA

The country that lies between the Vitastá (Jhelum) and the Sindhu (Indus).

ARIKA-BHSRAMA

BH

Badrináth. The temple of Nara-Náráyana is built on the bank of the Bishen-gangá (Alakánandá) over the site of a hot-spring called Tapanakunda, the existence of which, no doubt, led to the original selection of this remote spot (Asiatic Researches, Vol. XVI). It was the hermitage of the celebrated Rishi Vyása.

IDURYA-PARVATA

The Satpura hills.

IDYUTA

... A part of the Kailas range, at the foot of which the Manas-sarovara lake is situated.

KRESWARI

The river Báblá which falls into the Ganges near Katwa in the district of Burdwan.

LABHI

In Guzerát near Bhaonagar.

## MODERN NAMES OR SITUATON.

BALLALABARI ..

The capital of Ballála Sena, king of Bengal, now called Rámpála, about two miles from Munshigunge at Vikrampur in the district of Dacca. The remains of Ballála Sena's fort still exist at this place.

BANAPURA

... Mahábalipur or the Seven Pagodas on the Coromandel Coast.

BANGA

Bengal. Bengal was divided into five provinces: Pundra or North Bengal; Samatata or East Bengal; Kámarur Assam; Támralipta or South Bengal Karna-Suvarna or West Bengal (Laber Dutt).

BANSAGULMA

A sacred reservoir (kund) on the tient land of Amarakantaka, which is situlon the east, about four miles and a of the source or first fall of the buda.

BARADANA-TIRTHA

.. Baroda, where Rishi Durvásá gave boon to Vishnu.

BASUDHARA-TIRTHA

The place where the Alakánandá got its source, about four miles nort Badrináth, near the village Manal.

BAHUDA

... The river Dhabalá, now called Dhur or Burha-Rápti, a feeder of the Ráp Oudh. The severed arm of Rishi Lik grew when he bathed in this river: he the river is called Báhudá.

## MODERN NAMES OR SITUATIO

## BHARADWAIA-**ÁSRAMA**

Allahabad: the hermitage of Rishi Bharadwája. The image of the Rishi is worshipped in a temple built on the site of his hermitage at Colonelganj. The hermitage was visited by Rámachandra on his way to the Dandakáranya.

BHARU-KACHCHHA

Baroach, the Barygaza of the Greeks. Bali Rájá, attended by his priest Sukráchárya, performed a sacrifice at this place, when he was deprived of his kingdom by Vishnu in the shape of a dwarf (Vámana).

BHAGANAGARA

Hyderabad.

BHAGAPRASTHA Bágpat, thirty miles to the west of Mirat, one of the five prasthas or villages demanded by Yudhishthira from Duryodhana

BHAGAVATI

The river Bágmati in Nepal: Kakouttha of the Buddhists (Lassen).

BHARATAVAR-SHA

India. India (Intu of Hiuen Tsiang) is a corruption of Sindhu or Sapta Sindhu (Hafta Hindu of the Arabs).

BHIMANAGARA .. Kangra.

BHIMAPURA Vidarbhanagara or Kundinapura, the capital of Vidarbha.

The river Bhimá which joins the BHIMARATHI Krishna.



MODERN NAMES OR SITUATION.

BHOJAKATA-PURA

The second capital of Vidarbha, founded by Rukmi, the brother of Rukmini who was the wife of Krishna. A writer in the Asiatic Researches says it was situated near Mozaffarnagar. It is perhaps Ellichpur on the river Purná in Berar.

BHOJAPURA

Same as Bhojakatapura.

BHOTANGA

Bhootan.

BHRIGU-ASRAMA

1. Balia, in the N.-W. Provinces, said to have been the capital of Rájá Bali. Báwán, six miles west of Hardoi in Oudh, also claims the honor of being the capital of Bali Rájá, who was deprived of his kingdom by Vishnu in his Vámana-avatár. Bhrigu Rishi once performed his asceticism at Balia: there is a temple dedicated to the Rishi, which is frequented by pilgrims. Balia was once situated at the confluence of the Ganges and the Saraju; it was called Bágrásan, being a contraction of Bhrigu-ásrama. 2. Baroach was also the hermitage of this Rishi.

BHRIGU-KACHCHHA

Same as Bharukachchha, which is a corruption of Bhrigukshetra, as it was the residence of Bhrigu Rishi (Bhagvat Purán).

BIBHÁNDAKA-ASRAMA

Same as Rishyasringa-ásrama.

### MODERN NAMES OR SITUATION.

BINASANA-TIRTHA

The spot in the great sandy desert in the district of Sirhind where the river Saraswati loses itself after taking a westerly course from Thaneswar.

BINA

.. The river Krishna, the Tynna of the Greeks. It is also called Venwá.

BINDU-SARA

I. A sacred pool situated at the Rudra-Himalaya, two miles south of Gangotri, where Bhagiratha is said to have performed asceticism for bringing down the goddess Gangá from heaven. 2. Sitpur in Guzerát, north-west of Ahmedabadit was the hermitage of Karddama Rishi and birth-place of Kapila.

BINGAR

.. Ahmednagar, seventy-one miles from Poona, which was founded by Ahmed Nizam Shah in 1494.

BIRAJA-KSHETRA The country which stretches for ten miles around Jajpur on the bank of the river Baitarani in Orissa.

BITHABHAYA-PATTANA

... Bitha, eleven miles south-west of Allahabad.

BOLOR

.. Baltistan or Little Thibet.

BRAHMAKUNDA

The kunda from which the river Brahmaputra issues: it is a place of pilgrimage.

BRAHMANALA ... Manikarnika in Benares.

BRAHMARSHI ... The country between Brahmávartta and the river Jamuná: it comprised Kurukshetra, Matsya, Panchála and Surasena.

BRAHMA-TIRTHA Pushkara lake.

BRAHMÁVARTTA The country between the rivers Saraswati and Drisadvati (Manu).

BUDDHAVANA ... Budhain, about six miles north of Tapoban in the district of Gaya.

BUKEPHALA (OF THE GREEKS) ... Jalálpur in the Panjab (Cunningham).

C.

CHAKRA-TIRTHA

1. In Kurukshetra, much resorted to at the time of Mahmud of Ghazni. 2. In Prabhása in Guzerát. 3. Six miles from the village called Tryamvaka, which is near the source of the Godávari.

CHAMPAPURI ... Champánagar near Bhagalpur: it was the ancient capital of Anga.

CHANDANA-GIRI The Malaya-giri,—the Malabar Ghâts,

CHANDAPURA .. Chayenpur, five miles to the west of Bhabua in the district of Shahabad. The celebrated battle described in the Chandi between Kali and the two kings, Sumbha and Nisumbha, is said to have been fought at this place. The Márkandeya Purána, however, places the scene of the battle in the Himalaya. The name of Chandapur is derived from the name of one of the two brothers, Chanda and Munda, who were the generals of the kings.



MODERN NAMES OR SITUATION.

CHANDELGARA.. Chunar. The name of Chandelgara has been derived from the Chandels, a tribe of Kshatriyas who had established their sway between Mirzapur and the district of Shahabad (see Charanádri).

CHANDRABHAGA The Chenab,—the Ascesines of the Greeks.

CHANDRAGIRI ... Near Belligola, not far from Seringapatam, sacred to the Jainas.

CHANDRAVATI ... The river Gogá which falls into the Ganges.

CHANDRIKÁ ... The river Chandrabhágá (Chenab)

CHANDRIKAPURI Srávasti or Sahet-mahet: it was the birth-place of Chandraprabhánátha, the eighth Tirthankara of the Jains.

CHANDWAR ... Firozabad, near Agra, where in 1193 Shahabuddin Ghori defeated Jaya Chandra, king of Kanouj. Chandwar is evidently a contraction of Chandrapura.

CHARANADRI .. Chunar in the district of Mirzapur. The hill-fort of Chunar was at one time considered one of the most impregnable forts in India. It was built by the Pál Rájás, who reigned over Bengal and Behar from the middle of the ninth to the twelfth century of the Christian era. The portion of the fort, which is called Bhatrihari's palace, is the place where he performed asceticism. The fort is said to have been protected by the goddess Gangá Devi all the day, except in the first prahar of the morning.

CHARITRAPURA

Puri in Orissa (Cunningham).

CHARMANAVATI

The river Chambal.

CHATTALA

Chittagong. The temple of Bhaváni on the Chandrasekhara hill near Sitakunda is one of the 52 Pithas, where a portion of Sati's right hand is said to have fallen.

CHEDI

According to Tod, Chanderi, a town in Malwa, was the capital of Sisupála, who was killed by Krishna (see also J. A. S. B., Vol. XV). According to Dr. Führer, Dahala Mandala was the ancient Chedi. According to some, it comprised the southern portion of Bundelkhand and northern portion of Jabbalpur: Rewa. Kálanjara was the capital of Chedi under the Gupta kings. Chedi was also called Tripuri.

CHERA

... It comprised Travancore, part of Malabar, and Coimbatoor.

CHITABHUMI

Baidyanáth,—one of the 52 Pithas. It contains the temples of the goddess Jayadurgá and her Bhairava Baidyanáth.

CHITRADURGA .. Chitteldoorg.

CHITRA-KUTA ...

Kámptánáth-giri in Bundelkhand: it is an isolated hill on a river called the Paisuni (Payoswini) or Mandákini, where Ráma dwelt for some time during his exile. It is twelve miles from Markund and fifty miles south-east of Banda.

CHITRAPALA ...

The river Mahanadi in Orissa.

CHITROTPALA ...

Same as Chitrapalá.

CHOLA

The Coromandel Coast, between the rivers Kaveri and Krishna. Its capital was Kánchi or Kánchipura. Chola was also called Drávida.

CHYABANA-ASRAMA

Chausa in the district of Shahabad: the hermitage of Rishi Chyabana. 2. The hermitage of the Rishi was also situated on the Satpura mountains. 3. Dhosi, six miles south of Nárnol in the Jeypur territory, where the Rishi's eyes are said to have been pierced by a princess of Anupadesa, whom he afterwards married.

D

DAKSHINA-GANGA

... The river Godávari.

DAKSHINA-MATHURÁ

... Madura in the province of Madras. It was also called Mathurá and Minákshi. It was the capital of the ancient kingdom of Pándya or Pándu. It is one of the 52 Pithas where Sati's eyes are said to have fallen.

DAKSHINA-PATHA

... The Deccan at the time of Bhavabhuti was called by the name of Dakshinapatha. It is the Dandakáranya of the Rámáyana.

DAKSHINA-PRAYAGA

... Triveni on the north of Hugli in Bengal (Raghunandana).

DANTAPURA

Rájmahendri on the Godavari, according to Cunningham and McCrindle; but some identify it with Jajpur in Orissa. Hunter says that Puri was the place where Buddha's tooth was kept and afterwards removed to Ceylon. The left canine tooth of Buddha is said to have been brought and enshrined by Brahmadatta, king of Kalinga, shortly after his death.

DARADA

... Dardistan, north of Kásmir, on the upper bank of the Indus.

DARBHAVATI

Dabhoi in Guzerát (Burgess), and according to Führer, Dibhai, twenty-six miles south-west of Bulandsahar. Dibhai was the Rhodopha of the Greeks.

DARDARA

... The southern portion of the Eastern Gháts (Raghuvansa).

DASAPURA

DASARNA

... A part of the Chhatisgarh district. The Desarina Regio of the Periplus was between Masalia or Maslipatam and the mouth of the Ganges (Wilson).

DÁKSHINÁTYA ... The Deccan: that part of India which lies to the south of the Vindhyá range.

DAMALIPTA

... Is a corruption of Támralipta: it was the capital of Sumha (see Sumha).

DAMODARA

. The river Damuda in Bengal.

DEVABANDARA...

Diu in Guzerát.

DEVAGARA

Same as Dharagara.

DEVAGIRI

Part of the Aravali range.

DEVIKOTA

Same as Sonitapura.

DEVI-PATAN

Forty-six miles north-east of Gonda in Oudh: it is one of the 52 Pithas where Sati's right arm is said to have fallen.

DEWALA

Tatta in Scind (Tod).

DHANAKATAKA... Dharanikota, which is one mile to the west of Amarávati: it was at one time the name of the district (Beal). Fergusson identifies it with Bejwada. Dhanakataka or Dharanikota was the capital of Raja Satavahana or Sáliváhana and his descendants.

DHANAPURA

... Joharganj, twenty-four miles from Ghazipur (Führer).

DHARAGARA

Dowlatabad in Hyderabad: the Tagara of the Greeks.

DHARMAPATTANA Srávasti, or the present village of Sahetmahet: it was the capital of north Kosala.

DHARMAPURA ... Dharampur, north of Nasik.

DHARMARANYA... 1. Four miles from Buddha-Gayá in the district of Gaya. It is the Dharmmáranya of the Buddhist records, visited by numerous pilgrims (List of Ancient

Monuments in the Patna Division, p. 64'. A temple sacred to Dharmmeswara exists at this place. 2. By some it is considered to have comprised portions of the districts of Balia and Ghazipur (Dr. Führer's Monumental Antiquities and Inscriptions, p. 191).

DHARMODAYA ... The river Dámudá in Bengal (McCrindle).

DHÁRÁNAGARA... Dhár in Malwa, the capital of Rájá Bhoja.

DRÁVIDA ... Part of the Deccan from Madras to Seringapatam and Cape Comorin, Its capital was Kánchipura (see Chola).

DRISADVATI ... The Caggar (Ghágar) which flowed through Ambala and Sirhind, now lost in the sands of Rajputana (Elphinstone and Tod).

DUD-GANGÁ ... The river Dauli, a branch of the Alakánandá.

DURJAYALINGA... Darjiling, which contains a temple of the Mahadeo called Durjayalinga. Darjiling is a corruption of Durjayalinga.

DURVÁSÁ-ÁSRAMA 1. The hermitage of Rishi Durvásá is pointed out in the Colgong hills at the distance of about a mile from the town of Colgong in the district of Bhagalpur.

2. Durvásá's hermitage was also at Dubáur, in the hills, seven miles south-east of Rajauli, in the sub-division of Nowadah, in the district of Gaya (Grierson's Notes on the District of Gaya).

called Rudra-Himalaya (the eastern peak), Burrampoori, Bissenpoori, Oodgurrikanta, and Swargarohini (the western and nearest peak). These form a sort of semi-circular hollow of very considerable extent filled with eternal snow, from the gradual dissolution of the lower parts of which the principal part of the stream is generated (Fraser's Himala Mountains). See Sumeru-parvata.

GARGA-ÁSRAMA

The reputed site of the hermitage of Rishi Garga is situated in the Rai Bareli district, opposite to Asni, across the Ganges.

GARJAPURA

Ghazipur. This part of the country was visited by Fa Hian in the fifth century. Cunningham infers the ancient name of Garjapura from the modern name of Ghazipur.

GAURA

. See Goura.

GAUTAMA-ÁSRAMA

1. Ahalyásthána in the village of Ahiari, pargana Jarail, twenty-four miles to the south-west of Janakpur in Tirhut.
2. Godná or Revelganj near Chhapra.
3. Áhiroli near Buxar. The Rámáyana, however, places the hermitage of the Rishi Gautama near Janakpur.

GAUTAMI

The river Godávari.

GAYASIRSHA

Gayá. 2. The mount Gayasirsha, called Gayasisa in the Buddhist annals, is the Brahmayoni hill in Gayá, where

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Buddha preached his "burning" sermon called the Sermon of the Mount (Monier Williams' Buddhism).

GAYÁ

It is situated between the Rámsilá hill on the north and the Brahmayoni hill on the south, on the bank of the river Phalgu. The town is composed of the modern town of Shahebganj on the northern side, and the ancient town of Gayá on the southern side. In the southern portion of the town is situated the celebrated temple of Vishnupada, which was erected some two hundred years ago by Ahalyábái, the daughter-in-law of Mulhar Rao Holkar of Indore, on the site of a more ancient temple. The temple of Mangalá-Gouri, one of the 52 Pithas, where Sati's breast is said-to have fallen. is situated on a spur of the Brahmayoni range called the Bháshnáth. Buddha-Gayá (see Uravilwa is six miles to the south of Gaya.

GAYÁNÁBHI

Jájpur in Orissa. Gayásura, a demon who was overthrown by Vishnu, was of such a bulky stature that when stretched on the ground his head rested at Gayá, his navel at Jájpur, and his feet at a place near Rajmahendri.

GÁDHIPURA

Kánouj. It was the capital of Gádhi Rájá, the father of Rishi Viswámitra.

GÁLAVA-ÁSRAMA The hermitage of Rishi Gálava, three miles from Jeypur

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GÁNDHÁRA

... The country of Gándhára lies along the Kábul river between the Khoaspes (Kunar) and the Indus. Its capital was Purushapura, now called Peshawur (Beal). Ptolemy makes the Indus the eastern boundary of the Gandari. It is the Kiantolo of Hiuen Tsiang, the Kundara Gandaridæ of Strabo and other ancient Greek geographers. In the Avin Akbari it forms the district of Pukely. lying between Kásmir and Attock (1. A. S. B., Vol. XV). Gándhára comprised the modern districts of Peshawur and Hoti Murdan, or what is called the Eusofzai country, where discoveries were made of excellent Buddhist architecture and sculptures of the time of Kaniksha, i.e., of the first century of the Christian era, at Ranigat, Sanghao and Nuttu, through the labours of Major Cole (Memorandum of Ancient Monuments in Eusofzai). Pushkarávati or Pushkalávati (Pukely) was its ancient capital, which the Rámáyana placed in Gandharva-desa, Gándhára of the Mahábhárat and the Buddhist period, therefore, is the corruption of Gandharva-desa of Válmiki.

**GEHAMURA** 

Gahmar (E. I. Railway) in the district of Ghazipur. It was the abode of Mura, a daitya, who was killed by Krishna (Führer).

GIRINAGARA

Girnár, one of the hills known by the name of Junágar hills, at a very little distance from the town of Junágar,



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sacred to the Jains as containing the temples of Nemináth and Páraswanáth. It was the hermitage of Rishi Dattátreya.

GIRIVRAJAPURA

Ráigir in Behar, the ancient capital of Magadha, where Jarásandha's palace was situated. It is surrounded by five hills called in the Mahábhárat Vaihára. Varáha, Vrishabha, Rishi-giri, and Chaityaka, but they are now called Baibhárgiri, Vipula-giri, Ratna-giri, Udaya-giri, and Sona-giri. Vaihára has been identified with Baibhár-giri, Rishi-giri with Ratna-giri, and Chaityaka with Vipulagiri. Rangbhum in Jarásandha's fort is pointed out as the spot where Bhima killed Jarásandha. The first Buddhist Synod was held in 477 B. C. on the southern slope of the Baibhar hill in front of the Son-bhándár cave formerly called the Sattapanni cave, where Buddha used to live. Just behind the Baithak of Jarásandha there is another cave called the Pippali cave, where Buddha used to meditate after his meals. Buddha resided in a cave of the Pándava-giri, which is a spur of the Ratna-giri on the eastern side of the town, when for the first time he came to Rájagriha.

GIRIYEK

.. An ancient Buddhist village on the Panchána river, on the southern border of the district of Patna.

GODÁVARI

.. The river Godávari has got its source in the Brahma-giri mountain, situated on the side of a village called Tryam-



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vaka, which is twenty miles from Nasik. Some suppose that the river has got its source in the neighbouring mountain called Jatáphatká. In Tryamvaka there is a tank called Kusávartta, underneath which the Godávari is said to flow after issuing from the mountain. twelfth year, pilgrims from all parts of India resort to this village for the purpose of bathing in this sacred tank and worshipping the Mahadep called Tryamvakeswara.

GOKARNA

Gendia, a town in the province of North Canara, thirty miles from Goa (Wilford). It is a celebrated place of pilgrimage. It contains the temple of Mahabaleswara. It is thirty miles south of Sedasheogar, which is three miles south of Goa. (Newbold, J. A. S. B., Vol. XIV, p. 497).

GOMANTA-GIRI .... An isolated mountain on the northern side of the Western Ghâts, where Krishna and Balaráma defeated Jarásandha (Harivansa).

GOMATI

I. The river Gumti in Oudh. 2. The river Godávari.

GOMUKHI

Fifteen miles north of Gangotri: a celebrated place of pilgrimage.

GONARDDA

The Panjab, from Gonardda, king of Kásmir, who conquered it.

GOPAKAVANA

... Goa.

GOPRATÁRA

... Guptára, a place of pilgrimage on the bank of the Saraju at Fyzabad, where Ráma is said to have died

COURA

1. The whole of Bengal was so denominated from its capital of the same name, the ruins of which lie near Malda at a distance of about ten miles (see Lakshmanávati). 2. Uttara Kosala, the capital of which was Srávasti, was also called Goura. Gondá, a sub-division of Uttara Kosala, forty-two miles south of Srávasti, is evidently a corruption of Goura. The traditions respecting the famous tooth-brush tree (danta-dhávana) of Buddha still exist at Gondá (Führer).

GOURI

... A tributary of the Kabul river.

GOURIKUNDA

A holy place at a very short distance from Gangotri, where the Kedar-Gangá debouches into the Bhágirathi (Fraser's Himala Mountains).

GOVA-RÁSHTRA ... Goa.

GRIDHRAKUTA .... It is a part of Saila-giri,-the Vulture peak of Fa Hian and Hiuen Tsiang. It lies two miles and-a-half to the south-east of new Rájgir and northeast of old Rájgir. Buddha performed here austerities for some time after leaving the Pándava-giri cave, and in his subsequent sojourn, he delivered here many of his excellent sutras.

GUNAMATI-VIHÁRA

The Gunamati monastery, which was visited by Hiuen Tsiang, was situated on the Kunwa hill at Dharáwat in the sub-division of Jahanabad in the district of Gaya. The twelve-armed statue of Bhairab at that place is really an ancient Buddhist statue of Avalokiteswara (Grierson).

GURJARA

... Guzerát. In the seventh century, at the time of Hiuen Tsiang, the name was not extended to the peninsula of Guzerát, which was then known only by the name of Sauráshtra. The modern district of Marwar was then known by the name of Gurjara.

H

HAIHAYA

Khandesh, parts of Aurangabad and South Malwa. It was the kingdom of Kárttaviryárjuna, who was killed by Parasuráma. Its capital was Máhishmati, now called Maheswara or Chuli-Maheswara.

HAIMAVATI

Same as Rishikulyá.

HARAKSHETRA...

Bhuvaneswara in Orissa. It was the site of a capital city founded by Rájá Yayáti Kesari, who reigned in Orissa in the latter part of the fifth century. The Kesari dynasty consisted of forty-three princes, who ruled over Orissa from 474 to 1132 A. D., after the Yavanas (Hunter's Orissa).

HASTINÁPURA ...

The capital of the Kurus, north-east of Delhi, entirely diluviated by the river Ganges. It was situated twenty-two miles north-east of Mirat and south-west of Bijnor, on the right bank of the Ganges. Nichakshu, the grandson of Janmejaya of the Mahábhárat, removed his capital to Kausámbi after the destruction of Hastinápura (Vishnu-Purána)

HÁRITA-ÁSRAMA

Ekalinga, six miles north of Udaipur in Rajputana (Tod).

НАТАКА

.. Undes or Hundes, where the lake Mánas-sarovara is situated.

HEMAKUTA

The Ratna-giri hill, one of the five hills of Rájgir, in the district of Patna.

HIMAVANTA

Thibet.

HIMÁDRI

... The Himalaya mountains.

HINGULÁ

the range of mountains in Baluchistan called by the name of Hingulá, about a day's journey from the sea-coast. The Aghor or Hingulá river passes by its side. It is one of the 52 Pithas or places celebrated as the spots on which the dissevered limbs of Sati were scattered. The temple of Durgá is known here by the name of Mahámáyá or Kottari.

HIRAMBA

. Cachar.

HIRANYABÁHU...

The river Sone, the Erannoboas of the Greeks.

HIRANYA-

PARVATA

. Monghir (see Mudgala-giri).

HIRANYAVATI ...

The little Gandak; same as Ajitavati.

HLÁDINI

... The river Brahmaputra.

HUPIAN

The capital of Parsusthána, the country of the Parsus, a warlike tribe mentioned by Pánini. Hupian is the present Opian, a little to the north of Charikar at the entrance of a pass over the north-east end of the Pamghan range (Beal).

Shecroh in Lár (Beal); Barámula in Kásmir on the Jhelum (Cunningham).

IKSHUMATI

The river Káli-nadi in Rohilkhand.

ILBALA

Ellora near Daulatabad, in Central India. Rishi Agastya is said to have killed the *Daityas* Ilbal and his brother Vátápi at this place while on his way to the south (N. C. Das's Ancient Geography of Asia).

INDRAPRASTHA

Old Delhi. The city of Indraprastha was built upon the banks of the Jamuná, between the more modern Kotila of Firoz Shah and Humayun's tomb, about two miles south of modern Delhi. The river has now shifted its course more than a mile eastwards. The Nigambod Ghât is believed to have formed a part of the ancient capital. Its name, however, is preserved in that of Indrapat, one of the popular names for the fort of the Purána Kilá, which is still pointed out as the fort of Yudishthira and his brothers (Panjab Gazetteer). The fort was repaired by Humayun, which he called Dinpánná Indraprastha was the capital of Yudishthira (Mahábhárat).

INDRASILA

The Giryek hill to the north-east of Gaya. This was famous among the Buddhists as the spot where Sákya is said to have propounded the greater part of Prajná-Parámita.

IRÁVATI

The Ravi (Hydraotes of the Greeks).

ISALIA

Kesariya, thirty miles north of Besarh.

JAHNU-ÁSRAMA

The hermitage of Jahnu Muni is at Sultanganj (E. I. Railway) on the west of Bhagalpur. The temple of Gaibináth Mahádeo, which is on the site of the hermitage of Jahnu Muni, is situated on a rock which comes out from the bed of the Ganges. The river (Gangá) on her way to the ocean, was gulped down at a draught by the Muni when interrupted in his meditation by the rush of the waters, and he again let her out by making an incision in his thigh when interceded by Bhagiratha: hence the Ganges is called Jáhnavi. is the Zanghera of Martin (Indian Empire).

Jajpur (see Yajnapura.)

JAMADAGNI-ÁSRAMA

Zamánia, in the district of Ghazipur: the hermitage of Rishi Jamadagni.

JAMBUDWIPA ... India.

JANASTHÁNA ... Aurangabad.

JÁVALI-PATTANA Jabbalpur.

JETAVANA-VIHÁRA

Joginibhariya mound, one mile to the south of Srávasti. Buddha resided and preached here for some time.

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**IHÁRAKHANDA** 

Chota Nagpur: Kokra of the Mahomedan historians.

JIRNANAGARA

Jooner in the district of Poonah.

JWÁLÁMUKHI ..

A celebrated place of pilgrimage near Kangra, being one of the 52 Pithas where Sati's tongue is said to have fallen. The town is thus described by W. H. Parish in J. A. S. B., Vol. XVIII: "The town of Iwálámukhi is large and straggling, and is built at the base of the western slope of the Jwálámukhi or Chungar-ki-dhar. The town with the wooded slopes of Chungar forming the background, and the valley spread out before it, has a very picturesque appearance from a distance. There is nothing interesting, however, about the town, it being filthily dirty and badly built. Even the celebrated temple itself is not free from its share of all manner of filth. It possesses no architectural beauty, nor anything worthy of notice, except the natural jets of gas." The temple contains the image of Ambiká or Máteswari.



KAILÁS

.. On the north of Lake Mánas-sarovar, beyond Gangri or Darchin, the mountain is situated. It is said to be the

abode of Mahádeva and Párvati. "In picturesque beauty," says H. Strachey, "Kailás far surpasses the big Gurla or any other of the Indian Himalaya that I have seen: it is full of majesty,—a king of mountains." Through the ravines on either side of the mountain is the passage by which the pilgrims perform their perambulation. The Kiunlun range. The Mahábhárat includes the Choor mountain between the Sutlej and Jamuná rivers in the Kailás range.

KAJINGHARA

Same as Kajughira.

KAJUGHIRA

Kajeri, ninety-two miles from Champá (Beal). Cunningham identifies it with Kankjol, sixty-seven miles to the east of Champá or Bhagalpur. Kajughira is a contraction of Kubjagriha.

KAKSHIVATA

The Rajmahal hills.

KALINDA-DESA

A mountainous country situated in the Bándara-puchchha range of the Himalaya, where the Jamuná has got its source: hence the river is called Kálindi.

KALINGA

A country lying on the south of Orissa and north of Drávida on the border of the sea. According to Cunningham, it was between the Godávari river on the south-west and the Gaolya branch of the Indrávati river on the north-west. Its chief towns were Manipura and Rájamahendri. At the time of the Mahábhárata, a large portion of Orissa was included in Kalinga, its northern boundary being the river Baitarani

KALYÁNA

.... Kaliani in the province of Bombay. It was the capital of the Chálukyas in the sixth century. Vijnáneswara, the author of the Mitákshará, was born at this place.

KAMALÁNKA

Comillah: it was the capital of Tipárá in the sixth century.

KAMPILYA

Kampil, twenty-eight miles north-east of Fathgarh in the Farrakhabad district. It was the capital of Rájá Drupada, who was king of South Panchála, and the scene of Draupadi's Sayambara pad's palace is pointed out as the most easterly of the isolated mounds on the bank of the Bur-Gangá. A writer in the Tattwabodhini Patriká identified it with Doarháttá, ten miles east from the bank of the Rámgangá. But its identification with Kampil by Cunningham and Führer appears to be the more reasonable and correct.

KANAKHALA

Hardwar was once called by this name. It is now a small village, two miles to the east of Hardwar (see Máyápuri).

KANIKSHAPURA

Kanikhpur or Kámpur, ten miles to the south of Srinagar. It was founded by Kaniksha, king of Kásmir, who in 78 A. D. convened the last Buddhist synod, which gave rise to the Saka era.

KANSÁVATI

The river Kasai in Bengal.

KANWA-ÁSRAMA

Bijnor: it was the hermitage of Kanwa Muni, who adopted the celebrated Sakuntalá as his daughter.

KNYA-TIRTHA ... In Kurukshetra.



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KAPILADHÁRÁ ...

1. Twenty-four miles to the southwest of Nasik: it was the hermitage of Kapila. 2. The first fall of the river Nerbuda from the Amarakantaka mountains,

KAPILAVASTU ....

The birth-place of Buddha. It has been identified by Carlleyle with Bhuila in the north-western part of the Basti district, about twenty-five miles north-east from Fyzabad. He places the country of Kapilavastu between the Ghagra and the Gandak, from Fyzabad to the confluence of these rivers. Cunningham identifies it with Nagarkhas on the eastern bank of the Chando Tál, near a large stream named Kohána, a tributary of the Rapti, and in the northern division of Oudh beyond the Ghagra river; and he supposes that Mokson is the site of the Lumbini garden, where Buddha was born. But the question has been set at rest by the recent exploration of Dr. Führer on the suggestion of Dr. Waddell. It has been discovered that Kapilavastu lies in the immediate neighbourhood of the Nepalese village Nigliva, north of Gorakhpur, situated in the Nepalese Terai, thirty-eight miles north-west of the Uska Station of Bengal and North-Western Railway. The Lumbini garden been identified with the village has Paderia, two miles north of Bhagavanpur. The ruins of Kapilavastu lie eight miles north-west of Paderia. Buddha was born in 557 B.C., and he died in 477 B.C.



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KAPISÁ

on the declivity of the Hindu Kush.

Julien supposes the district to have occupied the Panjshir and Tagao valleys in the north border of Kohistan (Beal).

The river Suvarnarekhá in Orissa.

KAPITHA

... Identified by Cunningham with Sankisa or Sánkásya, forty miles south-east of Atranji see Sánkásya).

KAPIVATI

... Bhaigu, a branch of the Ramaganga (N. C. Das).

KARAKALLA

Karáchi in Scind: Krokala of Megas-thenes.

KARAVIRAPURA.

A town situated on the north of the Western Ghâts near Jooner, on the bank of the Vená, a branch of the Krishná, where Krishna met Parasuráma and killed its king named Srigála (Harivansa).

KARATOYÁ

... A sacred river which flows through the districts of Rungpur and Dinajpur. It formed the boundary between the kingdoms of Bengal and Kamrupa at the time of the Mahábhárat (see Sadànirà).

KARDDAMA-ÁSARMA

Sitpur (Siddhapur) in Guzerát, the hermitage of Rishi Karddama and birthplace of Kapila.

KARKOTAKA-NAGARA

Karra, forty-one miles north-west of Allahabad. It is one of the 52 Pithas where Sati's hand is said to have fallen (Führer).



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KARMANÁSÁ

The cursed river, the water of which is considered by the Hindus to be polluted, being associated with the sins of Trisanku, the protege of Rishi Viswamitra. The river is on the western limit of the district of Shahabad, and forms the boundary of Behar and the North-Western Provinces. It issues from a spring situated in a village called Sarodak (Hunter's Statistical Account of Bengal, Vol. XII, p. 164).

KARNAPURA ....

Bhagalpur.

KARNA-SUVARNA

Kánsoná, in the district of Murshidabad, the former capital of Bengal at the time of Adisura, who was identical with Vijaya Sena of the inscriptions. It was at the request of Adisura that Bira Sinha, king of Kanouj, sent five Bráhmans, Bhattanáráyana and others, to Bengal in the latter part of the tenth century to perform his sacrifice according Bhattanáráyana, the the Vedas. author of the drama Veni-Samhara, is considered by some to have flourished in the court of Dharma Pála of the Pála dynasty. Even the name of Kánsoná has become antiquated, and the town is now known by the name of Rángámáti. It is situated on the right bank of the Bhágirathi, four miles below Berhampur. Captain Laird says that Rángámáti was anciently called Kánsonápuri, and the remains of the greater part of the palace with its gate and towers are distinctly traceable, although the site is now under cultivation (J. A. S. B., Vol. XXII, p. 281).

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KARNAVATI

The river Kane in Bundelkhand.

KARNÁTA

.. Part of the Carnatic between Ramnad and Seringapatam.

KARUSHA

.. The eastern portion of the district of Shahabad in the province of Behar.

KATADWIPA

Kátwa in the district of Burdwan in Bengal (Wilford).

KATRIPURA

. Tripurá or Tipárá (Prinsep).

KAUSÁMBI

Kosambi-nagar or Kosám, an old village on the Jamuna, about thirty miles to the west of Allahabad. It was the capital of Vatsyadesa, the kingdom of Udayana, whose history has been given in the Vrihat Kathá and Kathásaritságara. Udayana was a contemporary of Buddha. The Ratnávali, a drama by Harsha Deva, places its scene at Kausámbi.

KAUSIKI

... The river Kusi.

KAUSIKI-

KACHCHHA .... The

The district of Purnea.

KAUSIKI-

SANGAMA

The confluence of the Kusi and the Ganges.

KÁLÁDI

In Kerala, where, according to the Sankaravijaya, Sankaráchárya was born in the fifth century of the Christian era; but according to the Sankara-Digvijaya, he was born at Chidambar in South Arcot.

KÁLIGHÁT ... Near Calcutta. It is one of the 52 Pithas, where the four toes of Sati's right foot are said to have fallen. The name of Calcutta is derived from Kálighát.

KALINDI

The river Jamuna.

KÁMA-ÁSRAMA .... Káron, eight miles to the north of Korantedi in the district of Balia, Mahádeva is said to have destroyed Madana, the god of Love, at this place with the fire of his third eye in the forehead (Rámáyana). It was situated at the confluence of the Saraju (Ghágra) and the Ganges, but the Saraju has now receded far to the east of this place, and joins the Ganges near Revel-ganj in Saran. The place contains a temple of Kámeswarnáth or Kauleswaranáth Mahádeo.

KÁMARUPA

1. It extended from the Karatoya river to the eastward, and included Manipur, Jayntiya, Kachhar, West Assam, and parts of Mymensingh and Sylhet. modern district extends from Goalpara to Gauhatti. Its capital is called in the Puráns Prágjyotisha (Wilson). Assam 2. Kámakhyá: it is one of the 52 Pithas containing the temple of the celebrated Kámakhyá Devi.

KAMBOJA .... Afghanistan: Kaofu (Kambu) Hiuen Tsiang. The name of Afghan, however, has been derived from Aswakán (McCrindle).

KÁNCHIPURA

Conjeveram, the capital of Dravida (Chola). The southern portion of the town is called Vishnu-Kánchi, and the northern portion is called Siva-Kánchi, inhabited by the worshippers of Vishnu and Siva, respectively. Sankaráchárya died at Kánchipura, and at Siva-Kánchi exists his tomb or Samádhi with his statue upon it.

KÁNTIPURI

Identified by Cunningham with Kotwal, twenty miles north of Gwalior. According to others, it is one of the ancient names of Katmandu in Nepal. But the Vishnu Purán places it on the Ganges near Allahabad.

KÁNYAKUBJA

Kanouj.

KÁRÁPATHA

Karabagh on the Indus. It is mentioned in the Raghuvansa as the place where Lakshmana's son, Chandraketu, was placed as king by his uncle Ramachandra when he made a disposition of his kingdom before his death. It is the "Carabat" of Tavernier. But the distance he gives from Candahar does not tally with its actual distance from that place (Tavernier's Travels, Ball's Ed., Vol. I, p. 91).

KÁRTTIKEYA-PURÁ

.. Baijnath or Baidyanath in the district of Kumaon.

KARTTIKI

The river Choya, a branch of the Saraswati.

KASHTHA MANDAPA

Katmandu, the capital of Nepal.

KÁSI

Benares (see Váránasi). Kási was properly the name of the country, of which Benares was the capital (Fa Hian).

KÁSYAPAPURA ...

Kásmir. The hermitage of Rishi Kásyapa was on the Hari mountain, three miles from Srinagar.

KEDÁRA

The temple of the Mahadeo Kedárnátha is built on a ridge jutting out
at right angles from the snowy range
of the Rudra-Himalaya below the peak
of Mahápantha. A sacred stream called
Káli-Ganga has its rise here, and it
joins the Alakánandá at Rudra-Prayága.
It requires eight days to go from Kedár
to Badrinath, although the distance is
short as the crow flies. The worship of
Kedáranátha is said to have been established by the Pándavas (see PanchaKedára).

KEKAYA

... A country between the Beas and the Sutlej. It was the kingdom of the father of Kaikeyi, one of the wives of Dasaratha, king of Ayodhyá.

KERALA

.... The Malabar coast. It comprised Malabar, Travancore and Kanara.

KESAVATI

The Vishnumáli river in Nepal. It forms four, out of the fourteen, great Tirthas of Nepal by its junction with four rivers. The names of the four Tirthas are Káma, Nirmala, Akara and Jugana.

KHARKI

. Aurangabad.

KHÁNDAVA-PRASTHA

Same as Indraprastha: Old Delhi.

KHÁNDAVA-VANA Mozuffarnagar, north of Mirat. It is one of the stations of the North-Western Railway. Arjuna, one of the Pándavas, appeased the hunger of Agni, the god of Fire, at this place.

KHIRAGRÁMA ... Twenty miles north of Burdwan. It is one of the 52 Pithas, where a toe of Sati's right foot is said to have fallen.

KIKATA .... Magadha.

KIMMRITYA .... The Kaimur range, between the rivers

Sone and Tonse, being part of the

Vindhya hills.

KIRANA-SUVARNA

... Singhbhum in Chota-Nagpur (Cunningham). It was the southern part of the ancient kingdom of Magadha.

KIRÁTA-DESA .... Tipárá. The temple of Tripureswari at Udaipur in Hill Tipárá is one of the 52 Pithas.

KISKINDHYÁ .... "About a mile easterly from Nimbapur, a small hamlet in the suburb of
Bijanugger, lies an oval-shaped heap
of calcareous scoria, partially covered
by grass and other vegetation. The
Brahmins aver it to be the ashes of
the bones of the giant Walli or Báli,
an impious tyrant slain here by Ráma

on his expedition to Lanka (Ceylon)" 1. A. S. B., Vol. XIV., p. 519, But this does not correctly identify the place. From the accounts of pilgrims, it appears that the ancient Kiskindhyá is still called by that name. It is a small hamlet situated on the north bank of the river Tungabhadra near Anagandi, about sixty miles to the north of Bellary (Balhari). About two miles to the southwest of Kiskindhyá is the Pampá-sarovara, and to the north-west of Pampásarovara is the Anjaná hill, where Hanumána was born, Ráma killed Báli, the brother of Sugriva, and gave the kingdom of Kiskindhyá to the latter.

KLISOBORAS (of

Growse identifies it with Mahában, six miles to the south of Mathura on the opposite bank of the Jamuna (Mathura, p. 279).

KODANGALURA ... Cranganore, a town of Malabar.

KOIL .... Aligarh.

KOLÁCHALA ••• The Brahmajoni range in Gaya (Vàyu Puràn).

KOLÁHALA-PARVATA

... The range of hills near Chanderi, which separates Malwa from Bundel-khand (Mahábhárat).

KOLUKA ... Same as Kuluta.

KORUR

Between Multan and Loni, where the celebrated Vikramáditya, king of Ougein, completely defeated the Sakas in a decisive battle in 533 A.D.,—the date of this battle is supposed to have given rise to the Samvat era. It is also written Kahror.

KOSALA

... Oudh (see Ayodhyá).

KOSALA

(DAKSHINA)

Gondwana. Its capital was Ratanpur in the eleventh or twelfth century. Its former capital was Chiráyu (see Kathásaritságara, in which the story of Nágárjuna and King Sadvaha, called also Chirayu, is given. Comp. Hiuen Tsiang). Vidarbha or Berar in the Buddhist period was called Dakshina Kosala (Cunningham's Geography of Ancient India).

KOTA-TIRTHA ... A tank situated in Kálinjár.

KOTI-TIRTHA ... 1. In Mathura. 2. A sacred tank in Gokarna.

KRATHAKAISIKA. Same as Payoshni: the river Purná in Berar.

KRISHNAVENI ... The river Krishna.

KRITAMÁLA ... The river Vaiga, on which Madura (Dakshina-Mathurá) is situated; it has got its source in the Malaya mountain. (Chaitanya-Charitámrita, Márkandeya Purán and Vishnu Purán).

KRIYANA ... The Kane river in Bundelkhand.

KUBHÁ

1. The Kábul river, the Kophen of the Greeks. 2 The district through which the Kophes or Kábul river flows. The name of Kábul is derived from the Vedic name of Kubhá (Beal's Fa Hian).

KUBJAGRIHA ... Same as Kajughira.

KUKKUTAPÁDA-GIRI ...

Kurkihar, about three miles north-east of Wazirganj, which is fifteen miles east of Gaya (Grierson's Notes on the District of Gaya). The three hills situated about half a mile to the north of Kurkihar are said to have been the scene of some of the miracles of the Buddhist saint Mahá-Kasyapa and eventually of his death.

KULINDA-DESA

The district of Shaharanpur, north of Delhi.

KULUTA

The district of Kulu in the upper valley of the Beas river. Its capital was Nagarkot.

KUMÁRASWÁMI.


This is a celebrated place of pilgrimage. The temple of Kumáraswámi or Kárttikaswami is one hundred and twenty miles to the south-east of Tripati in the province of Madras. It was visited by Sankaráchárya (Sankaravijaya).

KUMÁRI

Cape Comorin.

KUNDINAPURA ... The ancient capital of Vidarbha.

Dowson identifies it with Kundapura,
about forty miles east of Amaravati
(Classical Dic., p. 355). It existed at the
time of Bhayabhuti (Málati-Mádhava).

It was the birth-place of Rukmini, wife of Krishna. It has been identified with Kondavir in Berar (Dr. Führer's Monumental Antiquities and Inscriptions). Kundinapura was also called Vidarbhapura (Harivansa).

KUNTALA-DESA

The ancient name of the province in which Curugode is situated: part of the Bellari district.

KUNTI-BHOJA


An ancient town of Malwa, the birthplace of Kunti, the mother of Yudhishthira and his brothers. It was situated on the bank of a small river called Aswanadi or Aswarathanadi, which falls into the river Chambal (R. K. Roy's Mahábhárata).

KURUJÁNGALA...

A forest country situated in Sirhind, north-west of Hastinapura. It was called Srikantha-desa during the Buddhist period; its capital was Bilaspur, It was included in Kurukshetra.

KURUKSHETRA...

Thaneswar. The district formerly included Sonepat, Amin and Panipat. The war between the Kurus and the Pándavas took place not only at Thaneswar, but also in the country around it. The Dwaipayana-Hrada is situated at Thaneswar. At Amin, Abhimanyu, the son of Arjuna, was killed, and Aswathamá was defeated by Arjuna and his skull was severed. Amin, according to Cunningham, is the contraction of Abhimanyu-khera. Sonepat and Panipat are the corruptions of

Sonaprastha and Pániprastha, which were two of the five villages demanded by Yudhishthira from Durjodhana. Kurukshetra was also called Sthánu-tirtha and Samantapanchaka.

KUSABHAVANA-PURA ...

Sultanpur on the Gumti in Oudh (Thornton). It was visited by Hiuen Tsiang.

KUSAPURA ... Same as Kusabhavanapura (Cunningham).

KUSÁGÁRAPURA Rajgir, the ancient capital of Magadha. Same as Girivrajapura.

KUSASTHALA ... Kanouj.

KUSASTHALI ... Dwáraká, the capital of Krishna, in Guzerát.

KUSRVÁNA-HRADA

... The lake Rawan-hrad.

KUSÁVATI

1. Dwáraká in Guzerát (Tod). It was founded by Anartta, the nephew of Ikshaku. 2. Kasur in the Panjab, thirty-two miles to the south-east of Lahore.

KUSINAGARA

The place where Buddha died in 477 B. C., at the age of eighty. It has been identified by Cunningham with the present village of Kasia, thirty-five miles to the east of Gorakhpur. The charcoal ashes of Buddha's funeral pyre were enshrined in a stupa at Barhi, now called Moriyanagara in the Nyagrodha forest, visited by Hiuen Tsiang.

KUSUMAPURA ...

1. Pátaliputra. 2. Kányakubia.

KUTIKA ... The Kosila, the eastern tributary of the river Rámagangá in Oudh (N. C. Das).

KUTIKOSHTIKÁ

The Koh, a small affluent of the Rámagangá in Oudh (N. C. Das).

LÁKSHMANÁ. VATI

Laknauti is the corruption of Lakshmanávati. It was another name of Gour, the ruins of which lie near Malda. Hunter considers that the name of Gour was more applicable to the kingdom than to the city (Stat. Acct. of Bengal, Vol. VII, p. 51).

LAMPAKA

Lamghan, on the northern bank of the Kábul river.

T.ANKÁ

1. Ceylon 2. A mountain on the south-east corner of Ceylon: it is described as three-peaked in the Rámáyana: it was the abode of Rávana (Beal). There is a place called Nikumbhilá. about forty miles from Colombo, where Indrajita performed his sacrifice (Buddhist Text Society's Journal, Vol. III, Pt. I, Ap.).

LAVAPURA

Called also Lavakota or Lavavára, Lahore, founded by Lava, the son of Rámachandra. The ruins of the ancient city still exist near the present city of Lahore.

The river Looni in Rajputana.

. Guzerát. A writer in the Sádhaná identifies it with a portion of the kingdom of Kanouj. It was also called Lára.

LOHA

.. Afghanistan (Mahábhárat).

LOHITYA

portion of the river Brahmaputra. 2. A portion of the river Brahmaputra is called by this name. Parasurama's axe fell from his hand when he bathed in this river, the axe having got fixed to his hand owing to the sin of killing his mother.

LOMASA-ÁSRAMA

MADHUPURI

Mathura: it was founded by Satrughana, the youngest brother of Ráma, by killing the Rákshasa Lavana, son of Madhu. The town of the demon Madhu has been identified by Growse with Maholi, five miles to the south-west of the present town of Mathura. In Maholi is situated Madhu-vana (or forest of Madhu), a place of pilgrimage.

MADHYADESA

The country between Thaneswara and Allahabad.

MADHYÁRJUNA

Sixteen miles west of Tranquebar.

MADRA

A country in the Panjab between the Ravi and the Chenab. Its capital was Sákala. Madra was the kingdom of Rájá Salya of the Mahábhárat. Some suppose that Madra was also called Bálhika.

MAGADHA

The province of Behar. Its western boundary was the river Sone. The ancient capital of Magadha was Girivrajapura (modern Rajgir) at the time of Jarásandha, who was killed by Bhima, one of the five Pándavas. The capital was subsequently removed to Pátaliputra, which was formerly an insignificant village called by the name of Pátaligráma, enlarged and strengthened by Ajátasatru, king of Magadha and contemporary of Buddha, to repel the advance of the Vrijjis of Vaisali. Udayáswa, the grandson of Ajátasatru, is said to have removed his capital from Rajgriha to Pátaliputra

(Vávu Purán). At one period, the country of Magadha extended south of the Ganges from Benares to Monghir, and southwards as far as Singbhum (Hunter's Statistical Account of Bengal, Vol. XII, p. 65). The people of the neighbouring districts still call the districts of Patna and Gaya by the name of Magá, which is a corruption of Magadha.

MAHÁKAUSIKA .... It is formed by the seven Kosis of Nepal, which are the Milamchi, the Sun Kosi or the Bhotea Kosi, the Tamba Kosi, the Likhu Kosi, the Dud Kosi, the Arun and the Tamor. The union of the Tamor, the Arun and the Sun Kosi forms the Triveni, a holy place of pilgrimage. The Triveni is immediately above Baráha. Kshetra in Purnea above Náthpur, as the point where or close to which the united Kosis issue into the plains.

MAHÁNADI

1. The Phalgu river in the district of Gayá. 2. A river in Orissa.

MAHÁSÁRA

Masár, a village six miles to the west of Arrah, visited by Hiuen Tsiang in the seventh century.

MAHENDRA

I. The Mahendra Mali hills in Ganjam and the Eastern Ghâts were known by the name of Mahendra-parvata, where Parasuráma retired after he was defeated by Ráma. The Rámáyana and Chaitanya charitámrita apply the name specially to the Eastern Ghâts. 2. Mahi on the Malabar coast.

MAHESWARA ... Mysore.

MAHÍ ... The river Mahi in Malwa.

MAHODADHI ... The Bay of Bengal (Raghuvansa).

MAHODAYA ... Kánouj.

MAHOTSAVA-

NAGARA ... Mahoba in Bundelkhand.

MAINÁKA-GIRI ... The Sewalik range.

MAKULA-PARVAΥA

The Kaluhá-páhár, which is about twenty-six miles to the south of Buddha-Gayá and about sixteen miles to the north of Chátrá in the district of Hazaribagh, is evidently a corruption of the name of the Makula Parvata of the Burmese annals of Buddhism (see Bigandet's Life or Legend of Gaudama). Buddha is said to have passed his sixth Wasso (or rainy-season retirement) on the Makula mountain. It forms the western boundary of a secluded valley on the eastern bank of the Lilájan river, containing a temple of Durgá called Kuleswari (Kula and Iswari). But the place abounds with Buddhist architectural remains and figures of Buddha. On a plateau just in front of the hill on which Kuleswari's temple is situated, and on the eastern side of a ravine which separates the plateau from the hill, is a temple which contains a broken image of Buddha in the conventional form of meditation. There are also two impressions of Buddha's feet on the top of the highest peak

of a hill on the northern side of the valley called the Akásalochana, and figures of Buddha carved in the central part of the hill with inscriptions which have become much obliterated by time and exposure. The large bricks found at this hill also attest to the antiquity of the place. The letter, "Ma" of Makula must have dropped down by lapse of time, and kula was corrupted into kaluha. There can be no doubt that the Brahmins appropriated this sacred place of the Buddhists and set up the image of Durgá at a subsequent period after the expulsion of Buddhism.

MALADA

.. The western portion of the district of Shahabad.

MALAYA-GIRI

... The southern part of the Western Ghâts, south of the river Kaveri (Bhavabhuti's Mahávira-charita).

MALAYÁLAM MALLA-DESA Malábar.

1. The district of Multan was the ancient Malla-desa, the people of which were called Mallis by Alexander's historians. Its capital was Multan (Cunningham). Lakshman's son, Angada, was made king of Malla-desa by his uncle Rámachandra. 2. The country in which the Párasnáth hills are situated (Yule), that is, portions of the districts of Hazaribagh and Manbhum. The Puráns mention two countries by the name Malla, one in the west and the other in the east.

MALLA-PARVATA

The Párasnáth hill in Chhota-Nagpur, the Mount Maleus of the Greeks (Yule). See Samet-sekhara.

MALLÁRA

... It is a contraction of Malabar.

MANDÁKINI

1. The Kali-gangá, which rises in the mountains of Kedár. 2. The Paisuni (Payaswini) in Bundelkhand, which flows by the side of Mount Chitrakuta.

MANDÁRA-GIRI...


A hill situated in the Banka subdivision of the district of Bhágalpur, two or three miles from Bansi. It contains a groove around it in the middle. The gods are said to have churned the ocean with this hill as a churner. There are two temples on the top of the hill, one containing representations of six human feet, and the other contained an image of Vishnu called Madhusudana, but it is now empty. There are extensive ruins scattered about the foot of the hill for above two miles, of the time of the Chole Rájás, especially of Rájá Chatra Singh, who lived before the time of the Mahomedans (Martin's Eastern India, Vol. 11). For its sanctity see Skanda Purán.

MANGALA

 Called also Mangali, the capital of Udyána, identified by Cunningham with Mangora or Manglora.

MANGIPATTANA

Balabhi or Dhank, the ancient capital of Sauráshtra or Guzerát, ten miles northwest of Bhaonagar. It was destroyed in the sixth century at the time of Siláditya (Tod).

MANIPURA ...

It was the capital of Kalinga, the kingdom of Bubruváhana of the Mahábhárat. R. K. Roy in his Mahábhárat (Aswamedha Parva), places it to the south of Chikakole. But the situation of the capital of Kalinga, as described in the Mahábhárat and the Raghuvansa, and also the name, accord with those of Mánikapattana, a seaport at the mouth of the Chilka lake.

MARUDBRIDDHA

The Rávi.

MARUSTHALI ...

The great desert east of Sindh.

MATHURA

1. The capital of Surasena. It was the birth-place of Krishna. At a place called Janma-bhumi or Kárágárh on the margin of the Potara-kund tank near the temple of Kesava Deva, he was born; in the adjoining suburb called Malla-pura, he fought with the two wrestlers, Chánura and Mushtika; at Kubjá's well he cured Kubjá of her hump; at Kansa-ka-Tilá outside the south gate of the present city, he killed Kansa; and at Bisráma Ghát he rested himself after his victory. The Jog-ghát marks the spot where Kansa is said to have dashed Máyá or Joganidrá to the ground. Mathura was the hermitage of Dhruva: near Dhruvaghát there is a temple dedicated to him. Growse identifies the Kankáli Tilá near the Kátra with the monastery of Upagupta visited by Hiuen Tsiang, the temple of Bhuteswara with the stupa of Sáriputra, the Jamalpur mound with the monkey-stupa, and the Yasa Vihára

with the temple of Kesava Deva which has been graphically described by Tavernier as the temple of "Rám Rám" before its destruction by Aurangzebe in 1669. Mathura was also called Madhupuri (present Maholi, five miles to the southwest of the modern city), the abode of Madhu, whose son Lavana was killed by Satrughana, the brother of Rámachandra, who founded the present city (Growse's Mathura). 2. Madura, the capital of Pándya, in the province of Madras: it is said to have been founded by Kula Sekhara. It was called Dakshina-Mathura by way of contradistinction to Mathura of the N. W. Provinces.

MATIPURA

Madáwar or Mundore in Western Rohilkhand, eight miles north of Bijnor.

MATSYA-DESA ...


The country around Jeypur. It was the kingdom of Rájá Viráta of the Mahábhárata, in whose court at Vairát Yudhishthira and his brothers resided incognito for one year during the last year of their banishment. Váirát or Bairát is in the Alwar state of Rajputana-Machheri, which is a corruption of Matsya, is the present town of Alwar, which formerly appertained to the territory of Jeypur.

MAULI

The Rohtas hills.

MAYA-RÁSHTRA

Mirát, where the remnant of Maya Dánava's fort is still pointed out in a place called Andha Kota. The Bille-

swara Mahadeo there is said to have been worshipped by Mandodari, the wife of Rávana and daughter of Maya Dánava.

MAYARÁT

... Same as Maya-ráshtra.

MAYURA

... Máyápuri or Hardwar. The present Máyápuri is situated between the town of Hardwar and Kankhala

MÁHISHAKA

Mysore.

MÁHISMATI

.. Maheswara or Mahes on the right bank of the Nerbuda, forty miles to the south of Indore. It was the capital of Haihaya or Anupadesa, the kingdom of the myriad-handed Kártya-vyárjuna of the Puráns,

MÁLAVA

. Malwa, its capital was Dhárá-nagara at the time of Rájá Bhoja. (See Avanti).

MALINI

1. Champánagar near Bhágalpur. 2. The river Mandákini (Prakriti-váda). 3 The river Málini flows between the countries called Pralamba on the west and Apartala on the east, and falls into the river Ghagra about fifty miles above Ajodhyá. It is the Erineses of Megasthenes The hermitage of Kanwa, the adoptive father of the celebrated Sakuntalá, was situated on the bank of this river. Griffith says its present name is Chuka, a branch of the Saraju.

## MODERN NAMES OR SITUATION.

MÁNASA

... Lake Manasarovar, situated in Undes or Hundesa. It has been graphically described by Moorcroft in the Asiatic Researches, Vol. XII, p. 375. According to his estimate, it is fifteen miles in length (east to west) by eleven miles in breadth (north to south). It cannot be marched round in less than twenty-five days.

MÁNIKAPURA

Manikalya in the Punjab, celebrated for the Buddhist topes, where Buddha in a former birth gave his body to feed a starving tiger.

MANYAKSHETRA Malkhead on the river Krishna.

MÁRKANDA-ÁSRAMA

... At the confluence of the Saraju and the Gomati near Bágeswara in the district of Kumanu. Márkanda Rishi performed asceticism at this place.

MAYAPURI

It included Hardwar, Máyápur and Kankhala. Kankhala is two miles from Hardwar: it was here that the celebrated Daksha-yajna of the Puráns took place, and Sati, the daughter of Daksha, sacrificed her life, unable to bear the insult put upon her husband Mahádeva by her father. The present Máyápur is situated between Hardwar and Kankhala. Pilgrims from all parts of India go to bathe at the Brahmakunda in the ghát called Harki-pairi at Hardwar. In a temple behind the temple of Daksheswara Mahádeo at Kankhala, the Yajna-Kunda, where Sati immolated herself, is still pointed out.

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At the time of the Skanda Purán and Kálidás, Hardwar was known by the name of Kankhala.

MEDHÁVI-TIRTHA

Near Mount Kálinjar in Bundelkhand.

MEGNÁDA

.. The river Megná.

MEGHAVÁHANA

The river Megná.

MEKALA

the river Nerbudá has got its source: hence the Nerbudá is called Mekala-kanyaká (Amarakosha).

MINAKSHI

Madura, one of the 52 Pithas where Sati's eyes are said to have fallen. The temple of Minákshi Devi is situated within the town: it is said to have been built by Viswanath, the first king of the Nyak dynasty, in 1520 A.D. (Fergusson).

MITHILA

... I Tirhut, 2 Janakpur (see Videha).

MODÁGIRI

... Monghir (Mahâbhárat).

MOHANA

... The southern portion of the Circars.

MRIGADÁVA

Sárnáth, six miles from Benares, the place where Buddha preached his first sermon after the attainment of Buddhahood at Buddha-Gayá.

MUCHKUNDA

A lake three miles to the west of Dholpur where Kála-yavana, an ally of Jarásandha, was by the device of Krishna consumed with a glance by Muchkunda when he was rudely awaken from his



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slumber (Growse's Mathura, p. 65). On the site of the lake there was formerly a mountain.

MUDGA-GIRI

Monghir (see Mudgala-giri).

MUDGALA-GIRI

Monghir. Mudgalaputra, a disciple of Buddha, converted Srutavinsatikoti, a rich merchant of this place, into Buddhism. The Kashtahárini Ghát at Monghir derives its sanctity from Ráma having bathed in this ghát to expiate his sin for having killed Rávana, who, though a rákshasa, was nevertheless a Bráhman (Kurma Puran). Rámachandra is also said to have expiated his sin of slaying Rávana by bathing at a sacred tank at Hattia Haran, twenty-eight miles southeast of Hardoi in Oudh, and also in the river Gumti at Dhopáp, eighteen miles south-east of Sultanpur in Oudh (Führer).

MUKTAVENI

Triveni, north of Hugli. Muktaveni is used by way of contradistinction to Yuktaveni or Allahabad, where the three rivers Gangá, Jamuná, and Saraswati unite and flow together; at Muktaveni the three rivers separate and flow in different directions.

MUKTINÁTHA

A celebrated temple of Náráyana situated in Thibet in the Sapta Gandaki range of the Himalaya, not far from the source of the Gandak.

MULASTHÁNA-PURA

Multan. Vishnu incarnated in this place as Nrisinha-Avatára, and killed the Asura Hiranyakasipu, the father of



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Prahláda. The temple of Nrisinha Deva is still called Prahládapuri (Cunningham's Geography of Ancient India) The temple of the Sun is said to have been built by Sámba, the son of Krishna, who was cured here of his leprosy by the god (Bhavishya Purán). It was the capital of Malla-desa or the country of the Mallis of Alexander's historians.

MURALÁ

... The river Nerbuda.

MURANDÁ

Same as Lampáká.

NAGARAHÁRA ..

The town was situated at the confluence of the Surkhar or Surkh-rud and Kábul rivers, near Jalalabad.

NAGARAKOTA


Kangra, where the temple of Bajreswari is situated. It was the old capital of Kuluta.

NAIMISHÁRANYA

Nimkháravana or Nimsar, twenty-four miles from the Sandila station of the Oudh and Rohilkhand Railway, and twenty miles from Sitapur. It was the abode of sixty thousand Rishis. Many of the Puráns were written perhaps at this place. It is situated on the left bank of the Gumti.

NAIRANJANA

.... The river Phalgu. Its two branches are the Nilájan and the Moháná, and their united stream is called the Phalgu. Buddha-Gayá is situated at a short dis-



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tance to the west of the Nilájana or Niranjan, which has got its source near Simeria in the district of Hazaribagh.

NANDÁ

The river Panchána or Panchánana which flows through the districts of Gayá and Patna. It flows by the side of Ratnagiri, called Hemakuta or Rishabha-giri, one of the five hills of Rajgir, where Rishabha Rishi performed asceticism. Rishabha Rishi's image is sculptured in the Baibhára-giri near the Sonebhándár cave.

NANDIGRÁMA ... Nundgáon in Oudh (Rámáyana).

NARMADÁ ... The river Nerbuda. It rises in the Amarakantaka mountain.

NAVADEVAKULA Nawal, thirty-three miles north-west of Unao near Bángarmau in Oudh, visited by Hiuen Tsiang.

NAVADWIPA ... The birth-place of Chaitanya, the great religious reformer of Bengal. The Navadwipa of Chaitanya was situated opposite to the present Navadwipa across the river Ganges: the present Navadwipa is situated on the site of the ancient village of Kulia (Amiya Nemái Charita). Chaitanya was born in 1485 and he died in 1527.

NÁGA-HRADA ... The Sárik-Kul lake,—the lake of the Great Pamir (Beal).

NÁLANDA ... Baragaon, which lies seven miles north of Rajgir, in the district of Patna, once the celebrated seat of Buddhist learning



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(Cunningham), It was the birth-place of Sáriputra, the famous disciple of Buddha (Bigandet), but according to Hiuen Tsiang, he was born at Kálapináka. The celebrated Nágárjuna who introduced the Maháyána system of Buddhism in the first century, resided in the monastery of Nálanda, making it the seat of the Maháyána school for Central India (Fergusson).

NIKAI (of the Greeks)

Mong, where the celebrated battle was fought between Alexander the Great and Porus (Cunningham). Mong is now called Murg, a town in the district of Guzerat in the Panjab. Nikai is said to have been built by Alexander on the site of the field of battle.

NILANCHANA

Same as Nilájana.

NILÁJANA

The upper part of the river Phalgu. It is also called Lilájana.

NISHADHA

1. Narwar, the capital of Nala Rájá (Tod). Narwar is the contraction of Nalapura. It is situated on the right bank of the river Sindh, forty miles to the south-west of Gwaliar. 2. The mountains which lie to the north of the Kábul river, called by the Greeks Paropamisos, now called Hindu Kush (Lassen). Paropamisos or Paropanisos is evidently a contraction of Parvata Upa-Nishadha, as McCrindle says that Hindu Kush generally designates now the eastern part of the range and Paropamisos the western (McCrindle's Ancient India, p. 182).

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NYSA

Nysatta on the northern bank of the Kábul river about two leagues below Hashtnagar (St. Martin).

Orissa.

OMKÁRANÁTHA

Same as Amareswara.

PADMAKSHETRA


Kanárak, called the Black Pagoda, nineteen miles north-west of Puri in Orissa. It contains a temple of the sun (Surya), said to have been established by Sámba, a son of Krishna, who was cured here of leprosy by the god. According to some account, he was cured at Multan (see Mulasthánapura). It appears, however, that this temple was built by Lángulyá Narsinh, the seventh king of the Gangávansi dynasty, who reigned from 1237 to 1282 A. D. (Hunter's Orissa).

PADMAPURA

... Same as *Padmávati*: it was the birthplace of Bhavabhuti.

PADMÁVATI

It has been identified by Cunning-ham with Narwar or Nalapura (Archæological Report, Vol. III). But this identification does not appear to be correct. The town was situated at the confluence of the rivers Sindhu (Sindh) and Párá (Párvati) in Vidarbha (Málati-Mádhava, Act IV), and therefore it may be



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safely identified with Vijayanagar, which is a corruption of Vidyánagara, Padmávati being celebrated as a place of learning, especially for its teaching in logic, in the eighth century at the time of Bhavabhuti, who was born at this place (Máhaviracharita and Málati Mádhava).

PAMPÁ

A branch of the river Tungabhadrá: it rises in the Rishyamukha mountain which is eight miles from the Anagandi hills, where Ráma met Hanumána and Sugriva for the first time. Near it is a lake called Pampásarovara (Wilson).

PANCHA-DRÁVIDA

Drávida, Karnáta, Guzerát, Mahárashtra and Tailanga (Wilson).

PANCHA-GANGÁ

The five Gangás are Bhágirathi (Ganges), Gomati (Godávari), Krishnaveni (Krishná), Pinákini (Pennar), and Káveri.

PANCHA-KEDÁRA

The temples of Kedáranáth, Tunganáth, Rudranáth, Madhyameswara, and Kalpeswara,—all situated along the Himalayan chain,—form a peculiar object of pilgrimage, and they are collectively called Pancha-Kedára. Mahádeo, in the form of Sadásiva, fled from Arjuna, one of the five Pándavas, and took refuge at Kedáranáth in the shape of a buffalo, but finding himself hard pressed, dived into the ground, leaving his hinderparts on the surface, still an object of adoration here. The remaining portions of the god are



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worshipped at four other places: the arms (báhu) at Tunganáth, the face (mukha) at Rudranáth, the belly (nábhi) at Madhyameswara, and the hair (jatá) and head at Kalpeswara (Führer).

PANCHA-NADA ...

The Panjab,—the country of five rivers called Satadru, Vipásá, Irávati, Chandrabhágá and Vitastá.

PANCHÁPSARÁ-TIRTHA ... In the district of Udayapur, one of the tributary states in the Chhota-Nagpur division. Kapu, Bandhanpur, Banjiamba and Ponri are supposed to be on the site of the Panchápsará lake of the Rámáyana.

PANCHA-PRAYÁGA

(1) Devaprayága at the confluence of the Bhágirathi and the Alakánandá; (2) Karnaprayága at the confluence of the Alakánandá and the Pindar river; (3) Rudraprayága at the confluence of the Alakánandá and the Káligangá (Mandákini): (4) Nandaprayága at the confluence of the Alakánandá and the Nandákini, a small river; (5) Vishunprayága at the confluence of the Alakánandá and the Dauli (Dudgangá).

PANCHA-TIRTHA

1. A collective name given to five pools, or basins of water, situated between two hills on the west of Hardwar: their names are Amrita-kunda, Tapta-kunda, Ráma-kunda, Sitá-kunda, and Surya-kunda. 2. A place of pilgrimage in the province of Madras, mentioned in the Mahàbhárat: it was visited by Arjuna.



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PANCHAVATI ... Nasik on the Godavari, where Ráma dwelt with Lakshmana and Sitá during his exile; it was here that Sitá was abducted by Rávana, king of Lanká. The Chaitya cave at Nasik is supposed by Fergusson to belong to the second and third centuries of the Christian era.

PARASURÁMA-KSHETRA

Koncan (see Surpáraka-tirtha).

PARASURÁMA-PURA

.. Twelve miles south-east of Patti in the district of Pratapgarh in Oudh. It is one of the 52 Pithas where a portion of Sati's body is said to have fallen.

PARNÁSÁ

... The river Banas in Rajputana: a tributary of the Chambal.

PARUSHNI

.. The river Rávi (Irávati) in the Panjab.

PARVATA

.. A country in the Panjab, between the Rávi and the Sutlej.

PASUPATINÁTHA


A celebrated temple of Mahádeo in Nepal, associated with the story of the fowler and the god: it is said that the fowler obtained the boon of salvation from Mahádeo at this place as the drippings of blood from his bag of game fell upon the head of the latter.

PATALA

... Tatta in Sindh, mentioned in the Periplus of the Erythrean Sea. Cunningham identifies it with Hyderabad in Sindh.

PAYOSHNI

... The river Purná, one of the branches of the Tapti in Berar.



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PÁNCHÁLA

Rohilkhand. Pánchála was divided into North and South Pánchála: the capital of the former was Ahichhatra, and the capital of the latter was Kampilya. South Pánchála was the kingdom of Rájá Drupada, whose daughter Draupadi was married to the five Pándavas.

PÁNDU

... Same as Pándya.

PÁNDUPURA

Pánderpur on the river Bhimarathi or Bhima in the district of Sholapur in the province of Bombay. It contains the celebrated temple of Bithoba Deva or Bithalnáth, an image of Krishna. It was visited by Chaitanya.

PÁNDYA

.. The modern districts of Tinnivelly and Madura. Its capitals at different periods were Uragapura (modern Negapatam) and Mathura (modern Madura). Pandion, a king of Pándya, is said to have sent an embassy to Augustus Cæsar at Rome in 27 B. C. (Gibbon).

PÁNIPRASTHA ...

Panipat, one of the five villages demanded by Yudhishthira from Durjodhana (see Kurukshetra).

PÁRASYA

... Persia: its chief town, according to Hiuen Tsiang, was Surasthána.

PÁRÁ

... The river Párvati which, winding to the north of Narwar, falls into the Sindhu near Vijayanagar in Malwa.

PÁRÁVATI

. Same as Párá in

PÁRIPÁTRA

The western part of the Vindhyá range extending from the source of the Nerbuda to the Gulf of Cambay. It included the Aravali mountains.

PÁRIYÁTRA ... Sa

Same as Páripátra.

PÁRVATI-KSHETRA


Same as Birajá.

PÁTALÁVATI

The Kali-Scind, a branch of the Chambal, mentioned by Bhavabhuti in his Málati-Mádhava. It is called Palaitah by Tod.

PÁTALIPUTRA ...

Patna, built by Ajátasatru, king of Magadha and contemporary of Buddha, for the purpose of repelling the attacks of the Vrijjis of Vaisali (Besarh). The old capital of Magadha was Girivrajapura or Rajgir, but it was subsequently removed to Pátaliputra by Udayáswa, the grandson of Ajátasatru. A very small portion of the modern town of Patna is on the site of the ancient Pátaliputra, the greater portion of which was diluviated by the rivers Ganges and Sone in 750 A. D. It was the birthplace of Arya Bhatta, the celebrated Several Hindu astronomer. sages, as Kátyáyana and Chánakya, flourished in this place. A graphic description of the town has been given by Megasthenes, who was sent as an ambassador by Seleucus Nicator to the court of Chandragupta, king of Magadha, who reigned from 320 to 290 B. C. He

describes the town as being situated near the confluence of the rivers Ganges and Erannoboas (Sone), and says that it was eighty stadia in length and fifteen in breadth, and that it was surrounded by a ditch thirty cubits deep, and that the walls were adorned with 570 towers and 64 gates.

PÁVANI

... The river Irawadi in Burma.

PERIMUDA

the Perimula of the Greeks. It derived its sanctity from a tooth of Buddha which was enshrined there at the beginning of the fourth century of the Christian era, and which was visited by Buddhist pilgrims. The Kenheri cave (Chaitya) in the island is supposed by Fergusson to belong to the early part of the fifth century of the Christian era.

PHULLAGRÁMA

Chittagong.

PINÁKINI

... The river Pennar in the Madras presidency.

PRABHÁSA

bourhood of Pattana" (which contains the celebrated temple of Somnath at its south-western corner) "is esteemed especially sacred by the Hindus as the scene of Krishna's death and apotheosis. A small river, known to Hindu devotees as the Raunakshi, empties itself into the sea, at the distance of about a mile to the eastward of Pattana. At a particular spot on this river, sacred as that

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of Krishna's death, are a ghât and a few temples" (J. A. S. B., Vol vii: Notes of a Journey to Girnár). Raunakshi is another name of the river Saraswati. Somnáth is known to the Jains under the title of Chandra Prabhāsa, It was formerly frequented by a very large number of pilgrims from all parts of India during an eclipse of the moon. Chandra (the moon) is said to have been cured of consumption, with which he was cursed, by bathing in the river Saraswati.

PRADYUMNA-NAGARA

Pándua in the district of Hughli.

PRAHLÁDAPURI

Multán (see Mulasthánapura).

PRAJÁPATIVEDI

A sacred place in Allahabad where Brahmá performed sacrifice: this is the temple of Alopi, which is considered as one of the 52 Pithas where Sati's back is said to have fallen. The temple contains no image, but only a Vedi

PRALAMBA

Madáwár, or Mundore, eight miles north of Bijnor in Western Rohilkhand.

PRANAHITÁ

The united stream of the rivers War. dhá and the Waingangá.

PRASRAVANA-GIRI

The hills of Arangabad situated on the banks of the Godávari, graphically described by Bhavabhuti in his Uttaracharita: in one of the peaks of these hills dwelt the bird Jatayu of the Rámáyana.

PRATISTHÁNA ...

I. Bithoor, where the remains of a fort. which is said to have been the fort of Rájá Uttánapáda, still exist. The celebrated Dhruva was the son of Uttánapáda: he was born at this place; he performed asceticism in the forests of Mathura, 2. There was another town of that name in the Deccan now called Pattana or Mangila-Pattana, thirtyeight miles south-west of Aurangabad; it was the capital of Rájá Sáliváhana. 3. Paithana: it was once a great emporium of commerce in the Andhra country. described by Pliny. 4. Jhusi, opposite to Allahabad, across the Ganges: it is still called Pratisthápur. It was the capital of Rájá Puraravas.

PRAYÁGA

Allahabad. The celebrated Akshava Vata or the undecaying banyan tree. which is still an object of worship, and which is now situated within a dark subterranean chamber in the fort at Allahabad, is thus described by Hiuen Tsiang. who visited India in the seventh century: "In the city there is a Deva temple beautifully ornamented and celebrated for its numerous miracles. According to their records, this place is a noted one for all living things to acquire religious merit." He further says: "Before the hall of the temple there is a great tree with spreading boughs and branches. and casting a deep shadow. There was a body-eating demon here, who, depending on this custom (viz., of committing





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suicide), made his abode here; accordingly on the left and right one sees heaps of bones. Hence, when a person comes to this temple, there is everything to persuade him to despise his life and give it up; he is encouraged thereto both by the promptings of the heretics and also by the seductions of the (evil) spirit. From very early days till now this false custom has been practised."

PRÁGJOTISHA-PURA

Kámrup or Kámakshyá in Assam.

PRÁGVIJAYA ... Jyntea.

PRETODDHÁRINI The river Pyri which joins the Mahánadi at Raju.


PRITHUDAKA ... Pehoa, where the celebrated Brahmayoni-tirtha is situated. It is fourteen miles to the west of Thaneswara.

PULAHA-ÁSRAMA Same as Sálagráma.

PULINDA-DESA. It included the western portion of Bundelkhand and the district of Sagar.

PUNDRAVAR-DHANA

I Pándua, called Firuzabad in later times, six miles north of Máldá (Westmacott). According to Wilson, the ancient Pundra included the districts of Rajshahi, Dinajpur, Rangpur, Nadia, Birbhoom, Midnapura, the Jangal Mahals, Pachet and part of Chunar. Mr. Westmacott also identifies it with Pánjara and Barddhankuti (or Khettál)



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in Dinajpur. Cunningham has identified the capital with Mahásthánagarh on the Karatoyá river, twelve miles south of Barddhankuti, and also with Pabná. James Taylor in his Remarks on the Sequel to the Periplus of the Erythrean Sea (J. A. S. B., Vol. XV) says that in the Kesava Sena Plate, found at Edilpur in the district of Bakergunge, Vikrampur is said to have been Paundraka (see a transcription of the plate in J. A. S. B. of 1838). 2. North Bengal.

PURÁNÁDHI-STHÁNA

... Pandritan. It was the ancient capital of Kásmir.

PURNADARBHA... Kálinjar.

PURUSHAPURA Peshawur, the capital of Gándhára.

PURUSHOTTAMA-KSHETRA ...

Puri in Orissa (see Srikshetra).

PURVA-GANGÁ ...

The river Nerbudá.

PUSHKALÁVATI

Pushkalávati or Pushkarávati, the old capital of Gándhára, is said to have been founded by Pushkara or Pushkala, the son of Bharata and nephew of Ráma. Alexander the Great besieged and took it from Astes (Hasti) and placed Sangœus (Sanjaya) as his successor. It was probably Hashtanagar, eighteen miles north of Peshawur, on the Swát, near its junction with the Kabul river (Cunningham). It was the Peukelaotes of the



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Greeks, situated on the Indus, fifteen miles north-eastward beyond the Cabul river (Lassen),

PUSHKARA ... The Pushkar lake, six miles from Ajmir. It is called also Pokhrá.

PUSHKARÁVATI Same as Pushkalávati.

R

RAGHUNANDANA The range of hills that lies between Bengal and Tipárá.

RAIVATA ... Mount Girnár near Junágar in Guzerát.

RAIVATAKA ... Same as Raivata.

RAMANYA ... Pegu and the delta of the Iráwadi. It was also called Aramana (Beal).

RANTIPURA ... Rintambur on the Chambal. It was the abode of Ranti Deva alluded to by Kálidása in his Meghaduta. The story of Ranti Deva's sacrifice of cows has been given in the Mahábhárat (Wilson).

RATNVDWIPA ... Ceylon.

RATNAPURA ... Ratanpur, the capital of Dakshina Kosala or Gondwana.

RÁJAGRIHA ... I. Rájgir, the ancient capital of Magadha (see Girivrajapura). The new town of Rájagriha was built by Bimbisára, the father of Ajátasatru, at the distance of about a mile to the north of the old town of Rájagriha or Girivrajapura of the Mahábhárat (Cunningham and Bigandet). 2. Rájagiri on the north

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bank of the Beas in the Panjab: the capital of the Aswapatis of the Rámáyana (St. Martin).

RÁJAMAHENDRI

The capital of Kalinga, founded by Mahendra Deva.

RAJAPURI

Rajauri, south of Kásmir, and southeast of Punach, called Puhats by the Kásmiris.

RÁMAGIRI

Rámtege (Ramtek), north of Nágpur in Central India (Wilson). Traditionally Ramtek was the place where Sambuka, a Sudra, performed asceticism, for which reason he was killed by Rámachandra. It contains a temple of Rámachandra, and also a temple dedicated to Nágárjuna. Kálidása places the scene of his story in Meghaduta at Rámagiri. Rámagiri has also been identified with Rámgarh in Sirguja, one of the tributary states of Chhota Nágpur. There is a large cavern called Sitá Bangira cave high up in the rocks, forty-five feet deep and six high, at the entrance, containing inscriptions of the time of Asoka. There is also a natural fissure in the mountain called Háttiphor tunnel (cave), through which a small rivulet has worn a passage. The tunnel is 450 feet long with a diameter ranging from 55 to 16 feet, and height 108 feet. This cave is noticed in the Rámáyana and in the Raghuvansa (Archæological Survey Reports, Vol. XIII, p. 41, and List of Ancient Monuments in the Chota Nagpur Division).

RÁMA-HRADA ... A sacred tank situated near Thaneswar, where Parasuráma is said to have given oblations to the manes of his ancestors after destroying the Kshatriyas.

RÁMESWARA-SANGAMA

.. The confluence of the river Banas with the Chambal.

RÁRA

.. That part of Bengal which lies to the west of the Ganges.

RÁVANA-HRADA

It is the Kusavána-hrada of the time of the Mahábhárat, and Anava-tapta or Anava-tatta of the Buddhist period. The lake is fifty miles in length and twenty-five miles in breadth. There is a hill in the middle of the lake. On the bank of the lake, in the Gyantang monastery, there is a gigantic image of Rávana, king of Lanká. He is said to have bathed every day in the lake, and then worshipped Mahádeva in the Kailása mountain at a place called Homa-kunda. The Sutlej is said to have its source in this lake.

RENUKÁ-TIRTHA About sixteen miles north of Nahan in the Punjab. Renuká was the mother of Parasuráma.

REVÁ ... The river Nerbudá.

RIKSHA-PARVATA The eastern part of the Vindhyá range extending from the Bay of Bengal to the source of the Nerbudá. The mountains of Gondwana.

RISHABHA-PARVATA

... 1. The Palni hills in Madura. 2. The Ratna-giri hill, called also Hema-kuta in the Mahábhárat, one of the five hills of Rájgir (see Nanda).

RISHIKULYÁ ... The Rishikuilia river on which Ganjam is situated: it rises in the Mahendra hills.

RISHIPATTANA... Sárnáth near Benares: Isipatana of the Buddhists.

RISHYAMUKHA... A mountain situated eight miles from Anagandi on the bank of the Tungabhadra. The river Pampá rises in this mountain and falls into the Tungabhadra after flowing westward. It was at this mountain that Rámachandra met Hanumána and Sugriva for the first time (Rámáyana and P. N. Ghosal's Travels).

RISHYASRINGA-ÁSRAMA ...

The hermitage of Rishi Rishyasringa of the Rámáyana was situated at Singheswara in the sub-division of Madhipura, district Bhagalpur. Singheswara is the corruption of Rishyasringa. Bibhándaka was the father of Rishyasringa.

ROHANA

... Adam's Peak in Ceylon: it was also called Sumana-kuta.

ROHI

... Afghanistan: it was also called Roha. Same as Loha,

ROHITA

Rohtas in the district of Shahabad in Bengal, celebrated for its fort, which is said to have been built by Rohitáswa, son of Rájá Harisachandra of the Rámáyana and Márkandeya Purán.

ROHITAKA

Rohtak, forty-two miles norh-west of Delhi.

SADÁNIRÁ

I. The river Karatoyá which flows through the districts of Rungpur and Dinajpur. The river is said to have been formed by the perspiration which flowed from the hand of Siva at the time of his marriage with Durgá. 2. A river in Oudh mentioned in the Mahábhárat and Satapatha Brahmana.

SAHANSARÁMA ... Sásirám in the district of Shahabad (Edicts of Asoka who reigned from 276 to 240 B, C.)

SAHYÁDRI

.. The northern part of the Western Gháts north of the river Káveri.

SAKRA-KUMÁRI-KÁ

Near Renuká-tirtha about sixteen miles to the north of Nahan in the district of Sirmur in the Panjab. The name of Sakra-Kumáriká was used by way of contradistinction to Kanyá-Kumáriká (Mahábhárat).

SALÁTURA

.. The birth-place of Pánini, the celebrated grammarian (Hiuen Tsiang). It has been identified by Cunningham with the village of Lahor, which is four miles to the north-west of Ohind in the Paniab.

SALILARÁJA-TIRTHA

.. The place where the Indus falls into the ocean (Mahabhárat),

SAMANTA-PAN

CHAKA ... Same as Kurukshetra,

SAMATATA ... East Bengal.

SAMÁ ... The river Lohita or Brahmaputra.

SAMBUKA-ASRAMA

... Ramtek, north of Nagpur in Central India, where Sambuka, a Sudra, performed asceticism, for which reason he was killed by Rámachandra (Rámáyana).

SAMET-SEKHARA The Párasnáth hill in the district of Hazaribagh in the Bengal province, the holiness of which is held in great estimation by the Jainas. Páraswanátha, the twenty-third Tirthankar of the Jainas, died here at the age of one hundred years. It was the scene of Nirvána of no less than nineteen of the twenty-four Tirthankars.

SAMUGAR

... Fateabad, nine miles east of Agra (Bernier), where Aurangzebe defeated Dara.

SANKARÁCHÁRYA The name of a mountain, at present called Takht-i-Suleiman, near Srinagar in Kasmir, where Asoka's son Kunála founded a monastery, and where the celebrated reformer Sankaráchárya established Siva worship.

SANKARA-TIRTHA

of Patan at the confluence of the Váchmati and the Manimati: Siva is said to have performed asceticism at this place for obtaining Durgá.



#### MODERN NAMES OR SITUATION.

SANKHODDHÁRA The island of Bati, belonging to the province of Guzerát, situated at the south-western extremity of the gulf of Cutch. Vishnu is said to have destroyed a demon named Sankhásura at this place, and to have restored the Vedas (R. K. Roy).

# SAPTAGRÁMA

Sátgáon: an ancient town of Bengal near Magrá in the district of Hugli: it is now an insignificant village consisting of a few huts. It was a great emporium of commerce at the time of the Romans.

# SAPTA-KULA-CHALA

The seven principal mountains, which are Mahendra, Malaya, Sahya, Suktimána, Gandhamádana, Vindhyá and Páripátra.

## SAPTA-MOKSHA-DAPURI


The seven holy towns are Ayodhyá, Mathurá, Máyá, Kási, Kánchi, Avanti, and Dwárávati.

# SARAJU

The Ghágrá or Gográ. The town of Ayodhyá is situated on this river,

### SARASWATI

1. The river Saraswati rises in the hills of Sirmur and emerges into the plains at Ad Badri, deemed sacred by the Hindus. It disappears for a time in the sand near the village of Chalaur and re-appears at Bhawanipur. Balchhappar it again disappears, re-appears again at Bara Khera; at Urnai, near Pehoa, it is joined by the

Márkanda, and the united river still bearing the name of Saraswati, ultimately joins the Ghaggar (Punjab Gazetteer).

- 2. A river near Somnáth in Guzerát.
- 3. Arachosia (Rawlinson).

SARÁVATI

. 1. The river Sabarmati in Guzerát, which falls into the Gulf of Cambay. Ahmedabad stands on this river. 2. Fyzabad in Oudh (Dr. R. L. Mitra's Lalitavistara), but Sarávati appears to be the corruption of Srávasti (modern Sáhet-Máhet) on the Rápti (compare the Rámáyana and the (Raghuvansa)

SARVANA

... About twenty miles south-east of Unao in Oudh, where Dasaratha, king of Ayodhyá, killed Rishi Sarvana, or Sindhu, the son of a blind Rishi (Rámáyana).

SASASTHALI

Antraveda,—the Doab between the Ganges and the Jamuna.

SATADRU

.. I. The river Sutlej: it is also called the Ghaggar or the Ghara. 2. Sirhind in the Pánjab.

SAURÁSHTRA

The peninsula of Guzerát, the Surastrene of the Greeks. It comprised the country from Sindh or Indus to Baroach: Guzerát, Cutch and Katiwar.

SAUVIRA

. It has been identified by Cunningham with Eder, a town in the province of Guzerát which was Vadari of the Buddhist period. Sauvira was the Sophir of the Bible. According to another writer, Sauvira was situated between the Indus and the Jhelum.

#### MODERN NAMES OR SITUATION.

SÁKADWIPA

.. Central Asia: the country of the Sakas.

SÁKALA

The capital of Madra-desa. It has been identified by Cunningham with Sanglawala-Tiba on the Apagá river west of the Rávi in the Panjab.

SÁKAMBHARI

1. Mewar. 2. Sambhára in Rajputana, where a well called Deodáni is pointed out as the identical well in which Devayáni, the queen of Rájá Yayáti, was thrown by her co-wife Sarmishthá.

SÁKETA

Oudh. Its capital was Sujanakot or Sanchankot, the Sha-chi of Fa Hian, thirty-four miles north-west of Unao in Oudh (Führer).

SÁLAGRÁMA

... A place situated near the source of the river Gandak, where Bharata and Rishi Pulaha performed asceticism.

SÁLIVÁHANA-PURA


Pattana (see Pratisthána).

SÁNKALA

... Same as Sákala.

SANKASVA

Sankisa or Sankisa Basantapur, situated on the river Ikshumati, now called the Káli-Nadi, between Atranji and Kánouj, and twenty-three miles west of Fathgarh in the district of Farrakhabad. It was the capital of Rájá Kusadhwaja, brother of Siradhwaja Janaka, the father of Sitá of the Rámáyana. It was a famous place of Buddhist pilgrimage, as it was here that Buddha descended from the Trayastrinsa heaven by the ladder of gold, accompanied by the gods Indra and Brahmá (Cunningham and Führer).

SANTA-TIRTHA ... At Gungeswari ghát in Nepál, where the river Maradáriká joins the Váchmati or Bágmati. Párvati is said to have performed penance at this place.

SARIKA

One of the 52 Pithas, where Sati's throat is said to have fallen. The temple of Sáriká Devi is situated on the Hari mountain, three miles from Srinagar in Kásmir. It was the hermitage of Rishi Kásyapa (see Kásyapapura,

SEKA

The country about [hajpur, south-east of Ajmir (Yule). But the Mahábhárat places it to the south of the Charmanavati (Chambal) and north of Avanti (Ougein): it was conquered by Sahadeva, one of the Pándavas.

SETIKÁ

Ayodhyá (Oudh). Setiká is evidently a corruption of Sáketa.

SETUBANDHA ...

Adam's Bridge between India and Ceylon, said to have been built by Ráma with the assistance of Sugriva for crossing over to Lanká.

SIARH

Nathadwar on the Banas, twenty-two miles north-east of Udayapur in Mewar, where the ancient image of Kesava Deva was removed from Mathura by Ráná Rái Singh in anticipation of Aurangzebe's raid (Tod and Growse).

SIDDHAPURA

Siddhaur, sixteen miles west of Bára Banki in Oudh. 2. Sitpur (Sidpur) in Guzerát, the hermitage of Rishi Karddama and birth-place of Kapila.

SIDDHÁSRAMA

Buxar in the district of Shahabad, Vishnu is said to have incarnated as Vámana (dwarf) at this place. On the bank of a small stream called Thorá, near its junction with the Ganges, on the western side of Buxar, is a small mound of earth which is worshipped as the birth-place of Vámana Deva (Rámáyana and Brahmánda Purán). A fair is held here every year in the month of Bhádra in honor of Vámana Deva. A fair is also held in honor of Vámana Deva at Fatwa, situated at the confluence of the Ganges and the Punpun, in the district of Patna, where large numbers of people bathe on a festival called Bárani Dawádasi. 2. The hermitage of Suta on the bank of the Achchhodasaroavara in Kásmir (see Achchhodasarovara).

SINDHU


1. The river Indus. 2. Sindh. 3. The river Sindh in Malwa called Dakshina Sindhu in the Mahábhárat. The name of India (Intu of Hiuen Tsiang) is a corruption of Sindhu or Sapta Sindhu (the Hafta Hindu of the Arabs).

SINHALA

.. Ceylon. The *Dipavansa* relates the conquest of the island by Vijaya, who came from Lála or Guzerát (in 483 B.C.)

SINHAPURA

It has been identified by Cunningham with Katas or Katáksha, which is sixteen miles from Pindi Dadan Khan on the north side of the Salt range in the Panjab. According to Hiuen Tsiang, the country

of Sinhapura bordered on the Indus on its western side: it was a dependency of Kásmir in the seventh century. It was conquered by Arjuna.

SIPRÁ ... The river on which Ougein stands.

SITADRU ... The river Sutlej.

SITÁ ... The river Yarkand or Zarafshan on which the town of Yarkand is situated.

SITÁPRASTHA ... The river Dhabalá (see Báhudá).

SIVISTHÁNA ... Sawan on the right bank of the Indus.

SOMA-PARVATA

1. The Amarkantaka mountain in which the river Nerbuda has got its source (Amara-kosha). 2. The southern part of the Hala range along the Lower Valley of the Indus (Rámáyana).


SOMA-TIRTHA... Prabhása (see Prabhása).

SOMESWARA-GIRI The mountain in which the river Bángangá has got its source.

SONAPRASTHA ... Sonepat (see Kurukshetra).

SONÁ ... The river Sone: it was the western boundary of Magadha. It formerly joined the Ganges a little above Bankipur, the western suburb of Patna, from which its embouchure is now sixteen miles distant and higher up the Ganges McCrindle).

SONITAPURA ... The ancient Sonitapura is still called by that name, and is situated in Gárwal on the bank of the river Kedár-Gangá or

Mandákini, about six miles from Ushámat, and at a short distance from Gupta-Kasi. Ushámat is on the north of Rudra-Prayága, and is on the road from Hardwar to Kedárnáth. A dilapidated fort still exists at Sonitpur on the top of a mountain, and is called the fort of Rájá Vána. Sonitapura was the capital of Vána Rájá, whose daughter Ushá was abducted by Aniruddha, the grandson of Krishna (Harivansa). Dr. Führer says that Kotalgarh in the district of Kumaon is pointed out as the stronghold of Vánásura.

A ruined fort situated at Damdamá on the bank of the river Punarbhavá fourteen miles to the south of Dinapur, is called "Vána Rájá's garh," and it is said to have been the abode of Rájá Vána, whence they say Ushá was abducted by Aniruddha, and various arguments are brought in to prove this assertion. But the route of Krishna from Dwáriká to Sonitapura as given in the Harivansa, and the description of the place as being situated on a mountain, do not support the theory that Damdamá was the ancient Sonitapura. An inscription found in the fort proves that it was built by a king of Gour of the Kámboja dynasty. Vána Rájá's fort in the district of Dinajpur is as much a myth as the Uttara-gogriha (northern cowshed) of Rájá Viráta at Kántanagar in the same district. The Assamese also claim Tejpur as the ancient Sonitapura.

SRÁVASTI

Sáhet-Máhet. On the southern bank of the river Rápti (Irávati): it was the capital of Uttara-Kosala, fifty-eight miles north of Ajodhyá Rámáyana). It was the Savatthipura of the Buddhists. Buddha resided here for twenty-five years.

SRIKANTHA

.. Same as Kurujángala. Its capital was Biláspur, thirty-three miles northwest of Sáharanpur.

SRIKSHETRA

Puri in Orissa. Ananga Bhima Deo of the Gangá dynasty built the temple of Jagannáth in 1198 A. D. He reigned between 1175 and 1202 A. D. The Gangávansi kings reigned in Orissa, after the Kesari kings, from 1132 to 1534 A. D.; the first king of the dynasty was Chorgangá and the last king was a son of Pratápa Rudra Deva, who died in 1532, and who was a contemporary of Chaitanya (Hunter's Orissa). The temple of Bimalá at Puri is one of the 52 Pithas, where a fragment of Sati's body is said to have fallen.

SRINAGARA

.... The capital of Kásmir built by Rájá Pravarasena about the beginning of the sixth century of the Christian era.

SRINGAVERA-PURA

Singraur on the river Ganges, eighteen miles north-west of Allahabad. It was the residence of Guhaka Nisháda, who was the friend of Dasaratha and Ráma.

SRIRANGA-KSHETRA

Same as Srirangam.

#### MODERN NAMES OR SITUATION.

SRIRANGAM ... Seringham on the north of Trichinopoly in the province of Madras It contains the celebrated temple of Sri Rangam, an image of Vishnu. The temple was built by the kings of the Nayak dynasty of Pándya,

SRIRANGA-PATTANA

... Seringapatam in Mysore.

SRI-SAILA

... The Palni hills in Madura, which form the northern portion of the Malaya mountain.

SRUGHNA

... Kálsi, in the Jaunsár district, on the east of Sirmur (Beal). Cunningham identifies Srughna with Sugh, near Kálsi, forty miles from Tháneswar, and twenty miles to the north-west of Saharanpur.

STAMBAPURA ... Támralipta or Tamluk.

STAMBA-TIRTHA Kambay.

STHÁNESWARA Thaneswar (see Kurukshetra).

STHÁNU-TIRTHA Same as Stháneswara.

SUBHADRÁ ... The river Iráwadi.

SUBHAVASTU ... Same as Suvástu.

SUCHAKSHU ... The river Oxus: it was also called Vakshu.

SUDÁMÁPURI ... Porebandar in Guzerát.

SUDHÁPURA ... Soonda in North Canara (Thornton).

### SUKARA-KSHETRA

Soron, twenty seven miles north-east of Itah in the Itah district, where Hiran-yáksha was slain by Vishnu in his incarnation as Varáha (boar). It contains a temple of Varáha-Lakshmi. Tulsi Dás, the celebrated Hindi poet, was reared up at this place during his infancy when he was deserted by his parents.

## SUKTIMÁNA-PARVATA

That portion of the Vindhyá range which joins the Páripátra and the Riksha-parvata, including the hills of Bindhyáchal in the district of Mirzapur.

### SUKTIMATI

1. The river Suvarnarekhá in Orissa.
2. The river Betwá in Malwa, which flows through the ancient kingdom of Chedi (Chanderi).

### SULAKSHINI

. The river Chandrávati or Goga which falls into the Ganges.

# SUMANA-KUTA ...

Adam's Peak in Ceylon (Monier Williams).

### SUMERU-PARVATA

Ganges has got its source. It is also called Pancha-Parvata from its five peaks: Rudra-Himalaya, Vishnupuri, Brahmapuri, Udgárikantha, and Swargárohini. Four of the five Pándavas died at the last mountain (see Gangotri).

### SUMHA

. Sumha has been identified by some authors with Arracan; but it appears from the sixth chapter of Dasakumáracharita

that Dámalipta was the principal town of Sumha, and according to the Hemakosha, Dámalipta was another name of Támralipta or Támalipta (Tamluk). Hence Sumha was the country of Tamralipta. There was another country by the name of Sumha in the Panjáb conquered by Arjuna.

Tipárá and Arracan. SUNDHA-DESA ...

The kingdom of which Mathura was SURASENA the capital.

1. Guzerát (see Sauráshtra). 2. Surat. SURÁSHTRA

It has been identified by Cunning-STIRPÁRAKA ham with Surat. Dr R. L. Mitra identifies Surpárika of the Buddhist period with Sipeler (Sippára of Ptolemy), a seaport near the mouth of the Krishna (Lalita-vistara). But the Chaitanyacharitámrita places it to the south of Kolhapur. McCrindle places it (Soupara) about one hundred miles to the

Srinagar in Kásmir. The Mahomedans changed the name into Srinagar (Bernier's Travels, Constable's Ed., p. 397, note).



Burma (Beal). But Fergusson identifies it with Thatun on the Sitang river, forty miles north of Martaban: it was the Golden Chersonese of the classical geographers. The Maháwanso relates that after the third Buddhist synod in 246 B.C., Asoka despatched two missionaries, Sono and Uttaro, to Subarna-bhumi for proselytising the land.

SUVARNAGRÁMA

Sonárgáon in Vikrampur in the district of Dacca, situated on the opposite side of Munshigunge, on the river Dhaleswari.

SUVÁMÁ

The river Rámgangá in Oudh and Rohilkhand.

SUVÁSTU

1. The Swat river,—the Suastos of the Greeks. Pushkarávati or Pushkalávati, the capital of Gándhára or Gandharvadesa, stood on this river near its junction with the Kabul river. 2. Swat. Buddhist writers included Swat in the country of Udyána. It was at Swat that Rájá Sibi of the Mahábhárat and the Sivi-játaka gave his own flesh to the hawk to save the dove.

SYANDIKA

Jaunpur and twenty-five miles north of Benares (P. N. Ghosal's *Travels*).

T

TAILANGA

... Same as Telingana.

TAKKA-DESA

Between the Vipásá and the Sindhu rivers: the Panjáb (Hiuen Tsiang). It was the country of the Báhikas (Ráiá tarangini).

TAKSHASILA

Taxila. General Cunningham places the site of the city near Shah-dheri, one mile north-east of Kála-ká-serai between Attock and Rawalpindi, where he found the ruins of a fortified city. St. Martin places it at Hasan-Abdul, eight miles north-west of Shah-dheri. It is said to have been founded by Taksha, the son of Bharat and nephew of Rámachandra. The Kathá-saritságara places it on the bank of the Vitastá (Jhelum).

TAMASÁ

The river Tonse between the Saraju and the Goomti, which, flowing through Azamgarh, falls into the Ganges. The bank of this river is associated with the early life of Válmiki, the author of the Rámáyana.

TANUSRI

... Tenasserim, the southern division of the province of Lower Burma.

TAPANI

... The river Tápti.

TATINI

. The Chikako! river in the Circars.

TÁMASAVANA

It has been identified by Cunningham with Sultanpur in the Pánjab. Beal places it at the confluence of the Sutlej and the Beas. It was at the Támasavana convent that the fourth Buddhist synod was convened by Kaniksha under the presidency of Vasumitra (Beal's Introduction to Fa Hian). The date of this convention (78 A. D.) has given rise to the Saka era.

TÁMRALIPTA ... Same as Támralipti.

#### MODERN NAMES OR SITUATION

TAMRALIPTI ... I. Tamluk on the river Selai, just above its junction with the river Hugli (Wilson). It formerly bordered on the sea. 2. South Bengal (R. C. Dutt).

TÁMRAPARNI 1. Ceylon of the Buddhists. 2. river Támbraparni in Tinnevelly.

TÁPI The river Tápti.


TELINGANA ... The country between the Godávari and the Krishna, which is now the territory of the Nizam. McCrindle supposes that Telingana is a contraction of Tri-Kalingana or Tri-Kalinga (see Andhra).

TILAPRASTHA Tilpat, six miles to the south-east of Toghlakabad, and ten miles to the southeast of the Kutab Minar. It was includwithin Indraprastha, the capital of Yudhisthira. Shaikh Faridi Bukhari built Faridábád near Delhi on the greater part of the old parganah of Tilpat (Blochmann's Ain-i-Akbari). It was one of the five villages demanded by Yudhish. thira from Durjodhana.

TILODAKA Tilárá, a village on the east bank of the Phálgu, visited by Hiuen Tsiang. thirty-three miles to the south-west of Patna.

TIRABHUKTI Tirhut (see Videha).

TIRTHAPURI Twenty-one miles from Darchin in the Himalaya, on the bank of the Sutlei. Bhasmásura is said to have been killed at this place: a heap of ashes is pointed

out as the remains of that Asura (Fraser). The place of Bhasmásura's death is also pointed out in a cave situated in a hill near Sasiram in the district of Shahabad. Bhasmásura obtained a boon from Mahádeva to the effect that whoever he would touch upon the head should at once be consumed to ashes. He wanted to try the efficacy of the boon by touching the head of Mahádeva himself, -the giver of the boon. Mahádeva fled, pursued by Bhasmásura, and took the protection of Vishnu, who advised the Asura to make the experiment by placing his hand upon his own head instead of that of another. He followed the advice. and was at once consumed to ashes.

TRIGARTTA

Jálandhar, a part of the district of Lahore, according to Wilson; but Wilford identifies the place with Tahora. Tahora or Tihora is situated on the river Sutlej, a few miles from Ludhiana, where excellent ruins were observed by Captain Wade (J. A. S. B., Vol. VI). Kangra is supposed by some to be the ancient Trigartta.

TRI-KALINGA

Same as Telingana.

TRIMALLA

Tirumala, six miles west of Tirupati or Tripati in the district of North Arcot. The celebrated temple of Báláji (Lakshmana) is situated on a mountain called Sesáchala. The Pápanásini-Gangá rises in this mountain.

1. The river Tistá in the district of Rungpur. 2. The river Ganges (Amarakosha).

South Canara.

TUNGABHADRA

A branch of the Krishna, on which Kiskindhyá is situated.

IJ

UDAKHANDA

... Ohind on the Indus in the Peshawur division of the Panjáb.

UDAYAGIRI

A mountain which is five miles from Bhuvaneswara in Orissa. It is a spur of the Assiá range (ancient Chatushpitha) containing many Buddhist sculptures of a very ancient date (J. A. S. B., Vol. XXXIX.)

UDRA

. Orissa.

UDYÁNA

Udyána was situated to the north of Peshawur on the Swát river, but it is probable that it covered the whole hill-region south of the Hindu Kush and the Dard country from Chitral to the Indus. Swát. Mangala was the capital of Udyána.

UGRA

Kerala.

UJÁLIKANAGARA

Jais, twenty miles east of Rai Bereli.

UJJAINI

Ougein, the capital of Avanti, which was the kingdom of Rájá Vikramáditya (515 to 550 A. D.) It is situated on the river Siprá. The celebrated temple of Mahákála (Mahádeo), mentioned by Kálidasa in his Meghaduta, is situated in this town.

UJJÁNAKA

Kafristan: a country situated on the river Indus immediately on the west of Kásmir (Mahábhárat). Ujjánaka is evidently a corruption of Udyána.

UJJAYANTA

Mount Girnár, close to Junágar in Kattiwár. It is sacred to Nemináth, the twenty-second Tirthankara of the Jainas (see Girinagara).

UPAMALLAKA

Malacca.

URAGAPURA

Negapatam (Nágapattana): it was the capital of Pándya in the sixth century (Raghuvansa).

URAGÁ

Same as Urasá.

URASÁ

In the Hazára country between the Bidaspes (Jhelum) and the Indus (Mahá-bhárat).

URANJIRÁ

... The Vipásá (Beas).

URAVILWA

Buddha-Gayá, six miles to the south of Gayá. It was here that Buddha at. tained Buddhahood, below the celebrated Pipal tree (Ficus religiosa), called also the Bodhi tree, immediately on the west of the temple, which was built between the fifth and the seventh centuries of the Christian era. Fergusson supposes that the temple was built by Amara Deva (the author of the Amara-kosha), who was one of the "nine gems" in the court of Vikramáditya who reigned in Malwa from 515 to 550 A. D. (History of Indian and Eastern Architecture, p. 69). The Muchilinda tank, now called Buddha-kunda. is situated to the south of the temple; and the place where Buddha walked up and down after attaining Buddhahood, is marked by a plastered parapet, now called Jagamohan, situated almost immediately on the north side of the temple. The temple faces east, and is one of the most graceful temples in India. Sákyá attained Buddhahood at the age of thirty-six in 522 B. C.

UTKALA

Orissa.

UTPALÁRANYA

Bithoor, fourteen miles from Cawnpur, where the hermitage of Válmiki was situated. It was at this place that Sitá, the wife of Rámachandra, gave birth to Lava and Kusa. It is the site of the celebrated city called Pratishthána, which was ruled by Rájá Uttánapada, the father of

Dhruva. The remains of a fort here, on the bank of the Ganges, are pointed out as the fort of Rájá Uttánapada.

UTPALÁVATA-KÁNANA

Same as Utpaláranya (Márkandeya Purán).

The river Vypar in Tinnevelly.

UTTARAGÁ

The river Rámagangá in Oudh (N. C. Dás.)

UTTARA-KURU

The northern portion of Gurwal and Hundesa.

UTTÁNIKA

The Rámagangá in Oudh (N. C. Dás).


. The O-cha-li of Hiuen Tsiang. It has been identified by Cunningham with Eder in the province of Guzerát: it was Sauvira of the Pauránic period.

VAIRÁTA-PATTANA

of Govisana, visited by Hiuen Tsiang in the seventh century. It has been identified with Dhikuli in the district of Kumaon (Führer's Monumental Antiquities and Inscriptions, p. 49).

VAISALI

Besarh in the district of Mozaffarpur (Tirhut), eighteen miles north of Hájipur, on the left bank of the Gandak. The parganá Besárá, which is evidently a

corruption of Visálá, is situated within the sub-division of Hájipur. Vaisali was the name of the country as well as of the capital of the Vrijjis (Vájjis) or Lichhavis who flourished at the time of Buddha. Buddha lived in the Mahavana monastery, which was situated near the present village of Bakhra, about two miles north of Besarh, and near it was the tower called Kutágár (double storeyed) built over half the body of Ananda. About a mile to the south of Besarh was the mango-garden which was presented to Buddha by the courtesan Amradáriká, called also Ambapáli. Chapala was about a mile to the north-west of Besarh, where Buddha hinted to Ananda that he could live in the world as long as Ananda liked, but the latter did not ask him to live (Bigandet's Life of Gaudama).

VAKSHU

... The river Oxus.

VANAVÁSI

.. Mysore was called by this name during the Buddhist period.

VANÁYU

.. Arabia (T. N. Tarkaváchaspati).

VARÁHA-KSHETRA

is said to have incarnated as Varáha (the boar). There is a temple of Mahádeo Koteswara (see Sukara-kshetra). 2. Another place of the same name exists in the district of Purnea, below the Triveni (see Mahá-Kausika).

.. Rájshahi in Bengal.

VARSÁNA

.. Barsán in the district of Mathura, where Rádhiká, the favourite milk-maid of Krishna, was born.

VASISHTHA-ÁSRAMA

The hermitage of Rishi Vasishtha was situated at Mount Abu (see *Arbuda*), and also at a place one mile to the north of the Ajodhya station of the Oudh and Rohilkhand Railway.

VATSYA

... A country situated to the west of Allahabad. It was the kingdom of Rájá Udayana: its capital was Kausámbi.

VATSYA-PATTANA

... Kausámbi, the capital of Vatsya-desa the kingdom of Vatsya Rájá and Udayana (Kathá-saritságara).

VÁCHMATI

The river Bágmati in Nepal. Eight Tirthas out of the fourteen great Tirthas of Nepál have been formed by the junction of the Bágmati with other rivers. The names of the eight Tirthas are: Panya, Sánta, Sankara, Raja, Chintámani, Pramadá, Satalakshana, and Jayá. The source and exit of the Bágmati are two other Tirthas. Same as Bhágavati.

VÁHIKA

.. A country between the Beas and the Sutlej, north of Kekaya. It is another name of Válhika (see *Takka-desa*).

VÁLHIKA

the Sutlej, north of Kekaya. Váhika is the corrupted form of this name. 2. Balkh,—the Bactriana of the Greeks.

VÁLMIKI-ÁSRAMA


Bithoor, which was the hermitage of Rishi Válmiki, the author of the Rámáyana. Sitá, the wife of Rámachandra, lived at the hermitage during her exile, where she gave birth to the twin sons, Lava and Kusa. The temple erected in honor of Válmiki at the hermitage is situated on the bank of the Ganges. Sitá is said to have been landed by Lakshmana while conveying her to the hermitage at the Sati-ghát in Cawnpur. A large metallic arrow-head of a greenish colour is shown in a neighbouring temple at Bithoor, also situated on the bank of the Ganges, as the identical arrow with which Lava wounded his father, Rámachandra, in a fight for the aswa-medha horse: this arrow-head is said to have been discovered a few years ago in the bed of the river Ganges.

VÁRANÁVATA ...

Barnáwá, nineteen miles north-west of Mirát, where an attempt was made by Duryodhana to burn the Pándavas (Führer).

VÁRÁNASI

Benares. In the seventh century it was visited by the celebrated Chinese traveller Hiuen Tsiang. He has thus described the city and its presiding god Bisweswara: "In the capital there are twenty Deva temples, the towers and halls of which are of sculptured stone and carved wood. The foliage of trees combine to shade (the sites), whilst pure streams of water encircle them. The

statue of Deva Maheswara, made of teou-shih (brass), is somewhat less than 100 feet high. Its appearance is grave and majestic, and appears as though really living." The present Bisweswara, which is a mere linga, dates its existence since the original image of the god, described by Hiuen Tsiang, was destroyed by that iconoclast Aurangzebe and thrown into the Gyánbápi, a well situated behind the present temple.

VÁRÁNASI-KATAKA

Cuttack in Orissa, at the confluence of the Mahánadi and the Kátjuri, founded by Nripa Kesari, who reigned between 941 to 953 A. D. The former capitals of the Kesari kings were Bhuvaneswara and Jájpur (Hunter's Orissa.

VÁSISHTHI

.. The river Gumti.

VEDAGARBHA-PURI

.. Buxar in the district of Shahabad in the province of Bengal (Brahmanda Purán and Skanda Purán). The word Buxar, however, seems to be the contraction of Byághrasara, a tank attached to the temple of Gouri-sankara, situated in the middle of the town.

VEDAVATI

.. The river Dámudá in Bengal.

VENGI

.. The capital of Andhra, situated north-west of the Elur lake, between the Godávari and Krishna rivers. It is now called Vegi.

VENI

... The Krishna: same as Venwá.

VENUVANA-VIHARA

Bimbisára in a bamboo grove situated on the north-eastern side of Rajgir and presented to Buddha, where he resided when he visited the town after attaining Buddhahood.

VENWA

which rises in the Western Ghats. 2. The Krishna. 3. The river Waingangá, a tributary of the Godávari, which rises in the Vindhyapáda range (Márkan-deya Purán).

VESSANAGARA ...

Besnagar, close to Sanchi in the kingdom of Bhopal. It is also called Chetyagiri in the Mahawanso. Asoka married Devi, the daughter of the chieftain of this place, while on his way to Ujjaini, of which place, while a prince. he was nominated governor. By Devi, he had twin sons, Ujjenio and Mahindo, and a daughter Sanghamitta. The two last named were sent by their father to introduce Buddhism into Cevlon with a branch of the Bodhi-tree of Buddha-Gayá. Asoka was the grandson of Chandragupta of Pátaliputra, and he reigned from 276 to 240 B. C. (Turnour's Mahawanso and Fergusson's History of Indian and Eastern Architecture).

VETRAVATI

The river Betwa in Malwa.

VIDARBHA

1. Berar, the kingdom of Bhishmaka, whose daughter Rukmini was married to Krishna. Its principal towns were

VIDARBHA-NAGARA

.. Same as Kundinapura.

VIDEHA

Tirhoot, the kingdom of Rájá Janaka, whose daughter Sitá was married by Rámachandra. Its other name was Mithilá was the name both of Mithilá. the country and the capital. Janakpur was the capital of Rájá Janaka. About a mile to the north of Sitámárhi, there is a tank which is pointed out as the place where the new born Sitá was found by Janaka while he was ploughing the land. Panaura, three miles south-west of Sitámárhi, also claims the honor of being the birth-place of Sitá. About six miles from Janakpur is a place called Dhenuká, now overgrown with jungles, where Rámachandra is said to have broken the bow of Hara. Videha was bounded on the east by the river Kausiki (Kusi), west by the river Gandaka, north by the Himalaya, and south by the Ganges.

VIDISÁ

.. Bhilsa in Malwa in the kingdom of Bhopal on the river Betwa (Vetravati). The Bhilsa topes, including the topes at Sanchi, belong to a period ranging from 250 B. C. to 79 A. D.

VIDYÁNAGARA ...

1. Bijayanagar on the river Tungabhadra, formerly the metropolis of the Brahminical kingdom of Bijayanagar or Karnáta. It was founded by Buka and Aka Harihar in 1336. 2. Vijayanagara

(see Padmávati) at the confluence of the Sindhu and the Párá in Malwa 3. Rájamahendri on the Godávari (Journal of the Buddhist Text Society, Vol. V).

VINÁ

I. The river Krishna, the Tynna of the Greeks. 2. Almorah in Kumaon.

VINDHYA-PÁDA

The Satpura range (Váyu Purán).

VINDHYÁCHALA

The Vindhya range. The celebrated temple of Vindubásini is situated on a part of the hills near Mirzapur: it is one of the stations of the E. I. Railway. The temple of Yogamáyá, which is one of the 52 Pithas, where the toe of Sati's left foot is said to have fallen, is at a short distance from the temple of Vindubásini. Yogamáyá, after she warned Kansa, king of Mathura, of the birth of Krishna, came back to the hills and took her abode at the site of the temple of Vindubásini. The town of Vindhyáchala was included within the circuit of the ancient city of Pampápura (Führer),

VIPÁSÁ

Greeks. The origin of the name of this river is related in the Mahábhárat: Rishi Vasishtha, being weary of life on account of the death of his sons, who were killed by Viswámitra, tied his hands and feet with cords, and threw himself into the river, which, afraid of killing a Bráhmana, burst his bond, and brought him to the shore.

VIRASARA

Bilsar, about twenty-two miles to the north of Sánkásya, where Buddha passed the twelfth wasso (varshá) or rainy-season retirement).

VIRATA

Bairát, one hundred and five miles to the south-west of Delhi, and forty-one miles to the north of Jeypur (Cunningham). It was the capital of Viráta Rájá, king of Matsyadesa, where the five Pándavas lived in secrecy for one year. It is a mistake to identify Viráta with Dinájpur, where at Kántanagar Viráta's Uttara-gogriha (northern cowshed) is shown, the dakshina-gogriha (southern cowshed) being shown at Midnapur, as such identification is not countenanced by the Mahábhárat, which relates that Yudhishthira selected a kingdom in the neighbourhood of Hastinapura as his place of concealment, from which he could watch the movements of his enemy Duryodhana. See Matsyadesa.

VITASTÁ

... The river Jhelum,—the Hydaspes of the Greeks.

VISÁKHÁ

... Oudh was called by this name during the Buddhist period.

VISÁLA-CHHATRA

.. Same as Visálá. Hájipur was included in the kingdom of Visálá. Rámachandra, Lakshmana and Viswámitra, on their way to Mithilá, are said to have halted at Hájipur on the site of the present temple, which contains the image of


Rámachandra on the western side of the town. Háji Ilayas Shamsuddin, king of Bengal, established his capital at Hájipur in the middle of the fourteenth century, and from him the name of Hájipur is derived. The celebrated Rájá Toran Mal made it his residence when he made the settlement of Bengal and Behar. Sonpur, situated at the confluence of the Gandak and the Ganges, was also included in Visála-chhatra. It was at Sonpur that Vishnu is said to have released the elephant from the clutches of the alligator, the fight between whom has been described in the Mahabharat. Rámachandra, on his way to Janakapura, is said to have raised a temple on the spot, and dedicated it to Mahádeo Harihara Náth, in honor of whom the celebrated fair is held every year (Hunter's Stat. Acct. of Bengal, Vol. XI, p. 262).

VISÁLÁ

... Besarh, in the district of Mozaffarpur, the Vaisali of the Buddhist period (see *Vaisali*).

VISWAMITRA-ASRAMA

Buxar in the district of Shahabad in Behar. It was the hermitage of Rishi Viswámitra, where Rámachandra is said to have killed the Rákshasi Táraká. The Charitra-vana at Buxar is said to have been the hermitage of the Rishi, and the western side of Buxar near the river Thorá was the ancient Siddhásrama, the reputed birthplace of Vámana Deva

(see Siddhásrama). The hermitage of Rishi Viswámitra is also pointed out at Devakunda, twenty-five miles north-west of Gayá.

VRAJA

Gokul, the water-side suburb of Mahábana-a village in the neighbourhood of Mathura across the Jamuna, where Krishna was reared by Nanda during his infancy. The name of Vraja was extended to Vrindávana and the neighbouring villages, the scene of Krishna's early life and love. The shrine of Syám Lálá is believed to mark the spot where Jasodá, the wife of Nanda, gave birth to Máyá or Joga-nidrá, substituted by Basudeva for the infant Krishna. Outside the town is Puatná-khar, where Krishna is said to have killed Putaná. Growse identifies Mahábana with Klisoboras of the Greeks and supposes that the modern Vraja was the ancient Anupa-desa. Varsána was the birth-place of Rádhiká, the favourite Gopi of Krishna.

VRINDÁVANA

the scene of Krishna's love with the Gopis. The original image of Govindaji was removed to Jeypur and that of Madanmohan to Karauli in anticipation of the raid of Aurangzebe. The old temple of Govindaji was built by Mán Singh in the thirty-fourth year of Akbar's reign (Growse).

VYÁSA-ÁSRAMA... Manal, a village near Badrináth in the Himalaya. It was the hermitage of Rishi ANCIENT NAMES.

Vyása, the author of the Mahábhárat, and the reputed author of the Puráns.

VYÁSA-KÁSI

Rámnagar, opposite to Benares across the Ganges. The temple dedicated to Váysa Rishi is situtated within the precincts of the palace of the Mahárájá of Benares

#### Y

YAMUNOTRI

A spot in the Bándara-puchchha (monkey's tail) mountain in the Himalaya, where the river Jamuna has its source. It has reference solely to the sacred spot where the worship to the goddess Jamuna is performed. The Jamuna rises from several hot springs, and the spot for bathing is at the point where the cold and warm waters mingle and form a pool (see Kalinda-desa).

YASAPURA

.. Same as Yessavul.

YASHTIVANA

ban in the district of Gaya (Grierson).

It is also called Jaktiban (Cunningham).

Buddha is said to have displayed many miracles at this place.

YAVA-DWIPA

The island of Java. It is said to have been colonised by a prince of Guzerát.

YAYÁTIPURI

... Jajmaw, three miles from Cawnpur, where the ruins of a fort are pointed out as the remains of the fort of Rájá Yayáti (see Sákambhari). The temple of Siddhináth Mahádeo is at a short distance from the fort.

YÁJNAPURA

Jajpur in Orissa on the river Baitarani. It is said to have been founded by Rájá Yayáti Kesari in the sixth century. Jajpur is a contraction of Yayátipura (pronounced Jajátipura). It was the capital of the Kesari kings till the tenth century, when the seat of government was removed to Cuttak by Nripa Kesari. The temple of Birajá at Jajpur is one of the 52 Pithas where a part of Sati's body is said to have fallen.

YESSAVUL

Ahmedabad was founded on the site of the ancient city of Yessavul by Ahmed Shah of Guzerát in 1412 (Thornton's Gazetteer). Yessavul is evidently a corruption of Yasapura (pronounced Jasapura). Ahmedabad was also anciently called Karnávati (Fergusson).

# PREFACE.

For the plan of this work, I have been indebted to the suggestion of Mr. J. D. Cargill, C. S., Sub-Divisional Officer of Buxar, now District Magistrate of Noakhali. The present work will afford facility for finding out the ancient places from their modern names. I have taken this opportunity to make considerable additions both in the names and in the accounts of places, and to supply many omissions which occurred in my Geographical Dictionary of Ancient and Mediæval India: hence the present work may not be inappropriately called an Appendix to the Geographical Dictionary. The subject is so vast that it is not likely that full justice can be done to it by a single individual, and notwithstanding one's attempt to make much of the materials at hand, a work like this must necessarily remain incomplete. Many of the places mentioned in ancient Hindu and Buddhist works have not yet been identified, and most of them defy identification. My attempt in the Geographical Dictionary as well as in the present work, feeble as it may be, has been to make a systematic arrangement and collection of facts regarding ancient places which have been identified, in order to make them useful to the public as works of easy reference.

A.

ABU

Arbuda-parvata, a detached mount of the Aravali range, in the Sirohi state of Rajputana. It was the hermitage of Rishi Vasishtha. It is also one of the five hills sacred to the Jainas as containing the temples of Rishabhanath or Adinath, the first Tirthankara and Neminath, the twenty-second Tirthankara.

ACHCHHAVAT

Achchhoda-saroyara in Kásmir, six miles from Marttanda, described by Bánabhatta in his Kádamyari. Marttanda is situated about five miles to the east of Islamabad, the ancient capital of Kásmir. The Siddhásrama was situated on the bank of this lake.

ADAM'S BRIDGE ... Setubandha between India and Ceylon, said to have been constructed by Rámachándra with the assistance of Sugriva for crossing over to Lanká.

ADAM'S PEAK ... I. Rohana, 2. Sumana-kuta in Ceylon.

AFGHANISTAN ... 1. Kámboja, 2. Kaofu (Kambu) of Hiuen Tsiang, 3. Loha of the Mahábhárat, 4. Rohi.

AGASTIPURI .. Agastya-ásrama,—the hermitage of Rishi Agastya, twenty-four miles to the south-east of Nasik.

AGRA ... Agravana, one of the eighty-four Vanas of Vraja.

AHIÁRI ... 1. Gautama-ásrama, 2. Ahalyásthána, in pargana Jarail, twenty-four
miles to the south-west of Janakpur in
Tirhut. It was the hermitage of Rishi
Gautama, where Indra ravished his wife
Ahalyá.

AHMEDABAD ... 1. Yasapura (Jasapura), 2. Yessavul, 3. Karnávati in Guzerát on the river Sabarmati (ancient Sarávati).

AHMEDNAGAR ... Bingar, seventy-one miles from Poona.

AIRWA .. I. Álavi of the Buddhists, 2. Álabhi of the Jainas, twenty-seven miles northeast of Itawa in the North-Western Provinces, where Buddha passed his sixteenth wasso (varshá or rainy-season retirement). Mahávira, the last Tirthankara of the Jainas, made his missionary peregrinations from this place. It is the A-lo of Fa Hian.

AJAYA ... The river Ajamati in Bengal.

AIMIR

... Ajamera (Bhavishya Purán).

AJUNTA

Achinta, about fifty-five miles to the north-east of Ellora in Central India. In the Achinta monastery resided Árya Sanga, the founder of the Yogáchárya school of the Buddhists (S. C. Das's Indian Pandits in the Land of Snow) It is celebrated for its caves and vihárs, which belong to the fifth and sixth centuries of the Christian era.

ALIGARH

Koel.

ALLAHABAD

1. Prayága, 2. Bharadwája-ásrama, the hermitage of Rishi Bharadwája. The celebrated Akshaya-Bata (the undecaying banian tree) was visited by Hiuen Tsiang in the seventh century.

ALOPI

The temple of Alopi is situated at Allahabad: it is one of the 52 Pithas. It is the ancient Prajápati-vedi of the Mahábhárat, a celebrated place of pilgrimage.

ALWAR

is a corruption of Matsya, the kingdom of Rájá Viráta of the Mahábhárat, in whose court Yudhishthira and his brothers resided incognito for one year. The Alwar state formerly appertained to the territory of Jeypur. There is still a town called Machheri in this state. The capital of Matsya-desa was Viráta, now called Bairat, forty-one miles to the north of Jeypur and one hundred and five miles to the south-west of Delhi.

#### AMARAKANTAKA

Bansagulma at the source of the river Nerbuda in the Amarakantaka mountain. The sacred *Kunda* of Bansagulma is situated four miles and a half to the east of the source of the Nerbuda.

# AMARAKANTAKA MOUNTAIN ...

I. The Mekala mountain, 2. the Soma mountain, in which the river Nerbuda has its source.

# AMARANÁTH

The celebrated temple of Amarnátha is situated in a natural grotto of the Haramuk mountain of the Bhairavagháti range of the Himalaya at Gungabal in Kasmir. The grotto is said to be full of wonderful congelations, where blocks of ice, stalagmites, formed by the dripping water from the roof, are worshipped as images of Siva.

# AMARÁVATI

Dhanakataka, 2. Dhamnakataka,
 Dhányakataka, 4. Dhányavatipura,
 Dharmakota, 6. Dhanakakota have been identified with Dharanikota, one mile to the east of Amarávati in Central India. It was the capital of Andhra. The Buddhist saint Bhávaviveka resided here awaiting the advent of Maitreya Buddha.

# AMER

... Ambara, the ancient capital of Jeypur, which was called Dhoondra. The capital was removed to Jeypur in 1728 A. D. by Siwai Jey Singh.

AMI

... One of the 52 Pithas, eleven miles to the east of Chhapra.

AMIN

... 1. Abhimanyu-khera, 2. Chakrabyuha of the Mahábhárat, where Abhimanyu, son of Arjuna, was killed at the celebrated battle of Kurukshetra. It was included in Kurukshetra.

ANAGANDI

... Konkanapura, the capital of Konkana or Kankana, on the northern bank of the Tungabhadra river (Cunningham).

ANURÁDHÁPURA

The ancient capital of Ceylon. The branch of the celebrated Bo-tree (Pipartree) of Buddha-Gayá was brought and planted here by Mahindo and his sister Sanghamitta, who were sent by their father Asoka to introduce Buddhism into Ceylon in the reign of the king Devánámpiyatissa (Turnour's Mahawanso). The tree still exists in the Mahá Vihára. The left canine tooth of Buddha, which was removed from Dantapura (Puri) in the fourth century to Anurádhápura, still exists in a building erected on one of the angles of Thuparamaye Dagoba (Dhátugarbha) which was built by Devánámpiyatissa about 250 B. C. as a relicshrine of the right jaw-bone of Buddha (Fergusson). The town contains also the Lowa Maha Paya or Great Brazen Monastery described in the Mahawanso: it was built by the king Duttagaimuni in the second century of the Christian era.

ARAVALI

... Arbuda-parvata in Rajputana: its branches terminate at the north at Delhi. A part of the range was called Devagiri. The Aravali range was included in Páripátra or Párijátra.

Arámanagara in the district of Shahabad in Bengal.

ASHTÁBAKRA-NADI

.. The river Samangá, a small river which flows by the side of Raila, ten miles from Hardwar.

ASSAM

... Kámarupa: its capital was Pragjyotishapura.

ASSIA RANGE

Chatush-pitha Parvata in Orissa. Udayagiri is a spur of this range, five miles from Bhuvaneswara, containing many Buddhist sculptures of a very ancient date (7. A. S. B., Vol. XXXIX).

AUMI

with the river Anomá (Anamala) in the district of Gorakhpur, which was crossed by Buddha, after he left his father's palace, at a place now called Chandaoli on the eastern bank of the river, whence Chhandaka returned with Buddha's horse Kantaka to Kapilavastu.

AURANGABAD

.. I. Janasthána of the Rámáyana, 2. Kharki of the Mahomedan historians.

AURANGABAD-HILLS

... Prasravanagiri, situated on the bank of the Godavari, graphically described by

Bhavabhuti in the Uttara-Rámacharita. In one of the peaks of the hills dwelt Jatáyu of the Rámáyana.

AYUK-NADI ... The Apagá river to the west of the Rávi in the Panjab.

B.

BABLA ... The river Bakreswari which falls into the Ganges near Katwa in Bengal.

BADRINÁTH ... Badarikásrama on the bank of the Bishengangá (Alakánandá) in Gurwal. It was the hermitage of Vyása, the author of the Mahábhárat. It contains the celebrated temple of Nara-Náráyana.

BÁGESWAR ... In the district of Kumanu in Oudh, near the junction of the Ganges and the Gomati. It was the hermitage of Márkanda Rishi.

BÁGMATI ... 1. The river Váchmati, 2. the Bhágmati, 3. the Bhágavati, 4. the Kakouttha of the Buddhists in Nepal.

BÁGPAT ... Bhágaprastha, thirty miles to the west of Mirat, one of the five villages demanded by Yudhishthira from Duryodhana.

BAIBHÁRA-GIRI... Vaihára-giri, one of the five hills of Rajgir in Bihar: Webháro of the Buddhists.

BAIDYANÁTH ... I. Chitábhumi in Bengal: it is one of the 52 Pithas. II. Kárttikeyapura in the district of Kumaon.

BAKRAUR

... Gandha-hasti stupa, on the Phalgu, opposite to Buddha-Gayá. It was visited by Hiuen Tsiang.

BALARAMAPUR ... Ramgarh-Gaura, twenty-eight miles north-east of Gonda in Oudh.

BALIA

Bhrigu-ásrama, 2. Bagrásana, the hermitage of Rishi Bhrigu in the district of Balia in the North-Western Provinces. 3. It was a part of Dharmáranya. At a short distance to the north-east corner of Balia, there is a tank called Dharmáranya-Pokhrá, and to the north and east of it there are traces of an ancient jangal or scrubby forest. At Balia there is a temple dedicated to Bhrigu Rishi, containing the impressions of his feet.

BALKH

Τ. Váhlika. Bactriana of Greeks.

BALLABHI

1. Balabhi, 2 Dhank, 3. Mongypattana, the ancient capital of Sauráshtra or Guzerát, ten miles north-west of Bháonagar. It was destroyed in the sixth century at the time of Siláditya (Tod). Bhatti, the celebrated author of the Bhatti-kávya, flourished in the court of Sridharasena I, king of Balabhi in the fifth century. Bhattrihari is also said to have been the author of the Bhatti-kávya. The Ballabhi dynasty from Bhatárka Senápati (a general of Skanda Gupta of Kanouj) to Siláditya IV reigned from 465 to 718 A, D. (Fergusson).

BALTISTAN

Bolor: same as Little Thibet.

BAMILAPUR

... Same as Ballabhi.

BANAS

The river Parnásá in Rajputana.

BÁNDAR-

PUCHCHHA

The mountain called Bándar-puchchha on the Himalaya, in which the river Jamuna has its source, is situated in the country which was called Kalinda-desa: hence the Jamuna is called Kálindi.

BÁRA-BANKI

. Jasnaul in Oudh, from Jas, a Rájá of the Bhar tribe, who is said to have founded it in the tenth century.

BARAGÁON

Nálanda, seven miles north of Rájgir, in the district of Patna. Nágárjuna, the celebrated author of the Mádhyamika Sutras containing the tenets of the Maháyána school of Buddhism and editor of the original Susruta, resided in the Nálanda monastery in the first or second century of the Christian era, making it the principal seat of Buddhist learning for Central India.

BARÁMULA

I Varáhamula, 2. Varáhakshetra, in Kásmir on the Jhelum, thirty-two miles to the north-west of Srinagar, where Vishnu is said to have incarnated as the boar. 3. Hushkapura, founded by Hushka or Huvishka, the brother of Kaniksha. There is still a village called Uskara, which is two miles to the southeast of Barámula (Cunningham).

BÁRI-DOAB

... Between the Rávi and the Sutlej. It comprised the ancient country of Parvata.

BARNAGAR

... The Bara-pura, 2. Ánandapura of Hiuen Tsiang, one hundred and seventeen miles to the north-west of Balabhi in Guzerát (St. Martin).

BARNÁWA

Váranávata, nineteen miles north-west of Mirat, where an attempt was made by Duryodhana to burn the Pándavas.

BAROACH

... 1. Bhrigu-kshetra, 2. Bhrigu-ásrama, 3. Bhrigu-kachchha, 4. Bharu-kachchha, 5. Barygaza of the Greeks: it was the hermitage of Bhrigu Rishi.

BARSÁN

.. Varsána in the district of Mathura was the birth-place of Rádhiká, the favourite Gopi of Krishna.

BASUDHÁRÁ

The source of the Alakánandá, about four miles to the north of Badrináth, near the village Mánál.

BAY OF BENGAL Mahodadhi (Raghuvansa and Váyu Purán).

BEAS

... 1. The river Vipásá, 2. the Arjikeya, 3. the Uranjirá, 4. the Hyphasis of the Greeks, in the Panjab.

BELLARI

. Balahari, south of the river Tungabhadra.

BENARES

... t. Váránasi, 2. Kási. Kási was originally the name of the country, and Váránasi was its capital.

BENGAL


1. Banga, 2. Gour, from its capital of the same name near Máldá. Ancient Banga was divided into five provinces: Pundra or North Bengal, Samatata or East Bengal, Karna-suvarna or West Bengal, Támralipta or South Bengal, and Kámarupa or Assam (R. C. Dutt). That part of Bengal which lies to the west of the Ganges was called Rára. The Pála Rájás from Bhupála to Sthirapála reigned in Bengal from the middle of the ninth to the twelfth century of the Christian era, and the Sena Rájás from Ádisura or Vira Sena to Lakshmaniyá or Surasena reigned from 994 to 1203 A. D. The poet Jayadeva, the author of the Gita Govinda, and the lexicographer Haláyudha flourished in the court of Lakshmana Sena in the twelfth century.

BERAR

.. I. Bidarbha of the Purans, 2. Dakshina Kosala of the Buddhist period (Cunningham). Its capitals were Kundina-nagara and Bhojakatapura.

BESARH

1. Visálá, 2. Visálá-chhatra of the Purans, 3. Vaisali of the Buddhist period, in the district of Muzaffarpur (Tirhut) in the province of Bengal, eighteen miles north of Hajipur on the left bank of the Gandak. Vaisali was the name of the country, as well as of the capital of the Vrijjis (Vájjis) or Lichhavis, who flourished at the time of Buddha who resided here for some time.

BESNAGAR

Chetyagiri or Wessanagara (Vessanagara) of the Mahawanso, close to Sanchi in the kingdom of Bhopal, where Asoka married Devi and by her he had twin sons, Ujjenio and Mahindo, and afterwards a daughter, Sanghamitta.

BETWA

The river Vetravati in Malwa.

BEYT ISLAND

1. The island of Sankhoddhára, 2. Bati, situated at the south-western extremity of the gulf of Cutch. Vishnu is said to have destroyed a demon named Sankhásura at this place. Sankhásura was the husband of Tulsi, who was transformed into the Basil plant by the curse of Vishnu, and Vishnu was transformed into the Sálagráma stone by her curse.

BHÁGALPUR

.. I. The country about Bhágalpur in the province of Bengal, was called Anga, 2. Karnapura.

BHAIGU

... The river Kapivati of the Rámáyana, a tributary of the Ramaganga in Oudh.

BHILSA

.. Vidisá in Malwa. The Bhilsa topes are supposed by Fergusson to belong to a period ranging from 250 B. C. to 79 A. D.

BHIMÁ

... The river Bhimrathi, a branch of the Krishná. It was also called Bhimarathá.

BHOJAPUR

. I. The name was indiscriminately applied to both the capitals of ancient Vidarbha, namely, Kundinapura and Bhojakatapura (compare the *Harivansa*

and the Raghuvansa). II. Near Dumraon in the district of Shahabad in the Province of Bengal. Wilson identifies it with the ancient Márttikábat, but the place has got no tradition beyond the Mahomedan period: the Nava-ratna, evidently a Mahomedan structure, is the only ancient building at this place.

BHOOTAN

Bhotanga.

BHUVANESWAR

 Ekámrakánana, 2. Harakshetra, in Orissa: it was founded by Rájá Yayáti Kesari in the latter part of the fifth century.

BIHAR

. 1. Magadha, 2. Kikata. Its ancient capital was Girivraja or Rájagriha (Rajgir) at the time of the Mahábhárat, but the seat of government was removed to Pataliputra by Udayáswa, grandson of Ajátasatru.

BIJAYANAGAR

I. 1. Padmávati, 2. Padmapura, 3. Vidyánagara at the confluence of the Sindh and Parbati in Malwa. It was the birth-place of the poet Bhavabhuti. The scene of the Málati-mádhava has been placed at Padmávati. II. Hampi on the river Tungabhadra (see Vijayanagara).

BIINOR

.. Kanwa-ásrama: the hermitage of Rishi Kanwa, who adopted the celebrated Sakuntalá as his daughter.

BIKANER

... Bágar-desa in the Pánjab (Cunning-ham).

BILASPUR

... Thirty-three miles north of Saharanpur. The district of Bilaspur was 1. Kurujángala of the Mahábhárat, 2. Srikantha of the Buddhist period.

BILSAR

Virasara of the Buddhists, about twenty-two miles to the north of Sán-kásya, where Buddha passed the twelfth Wasso.

BINDU-SARA

A sacred pool two miles south of Gangotri in the Rudra-Himalaya, where Bhagiratha is said to have performed asceticism to bring down the goddess Gangá from heaven.

BITHA

... Bitabhayapattana, eleven miles southwest of Allahabad. It was an ancient Buddhist town.

BITHOOR

.. I. Válmiki-ásrama, 2. Pratishthána, 3. Utpaláranya, 4. Utpalábata-kánana, fourteen miles north-west of Cawnpur on the river Ganges. It was the capital of Rájá Uttánapáda, father of the celebrated Dhruva, and the hermitage of Válmiki, the author of the Rámáyana, where Sitá, wife of Ràmachandra, gave birth to Lava and Kusa.

BLACK PAGODA

Same as Kanarak.

BODH-GAYA

... 1. Uravilwa, 2. Buddha-Gayá, six miles to the south of Gaya, where Buddha attained Buddhahood below the celebrated Pipal tree called the Bodhitree to the west of the temple. The Vajrásana, on which Buddha is said to

have sat while he gave himself up to contemplation, is a stone seat situated between the Bodhi-tree and the temple. The Buddhakunda to the south of the temple is the ancient Muchilinda tank. The rail to the south of the temple is one of the most ancient sculptured monuments in India.

BRAHMA-GIRI ... That part of the Western Ghats in which the river Godávari has its source.

BRAHMAJONI ... 1. The Brahmayoni hill, 2. the Koláhala-parvata, 3. the Koláchala, 4. the Gayasirsa at Gaya was the Buddhist Gayasisa mountain where Buddha delivered his "burning" sermon, or, as it is called, the Sermon of the Mount. On the site of Asoka's stupa on the top of the hill, the Hindus have now built a temple of Chandi.

BRAHMAKUNDA The Kunda from which the river Brahmaputra issues: it is a place of pilgrimage.

BRAHMAPUTRA 1. The river Hladini, 2. the Lohitya, 3. the Samá.

BRINDABAN ... In the district of Mathura, the scene of Krishna's love with the Gopis.

BUDDHAKUNDA. The Muchilinda tank in Buddha-Gayá to the south of the temple, on the western bank of which Buddha sat for seven days in contemplation after attaining Buddhahood.

BUDHAIN

Buddhavana, about six miles north of Tapoban in the district of Gaya.

BURHA-RAPTI

1. The river Báhuda, 2. the Dhabalá, 3. the Sitáprastha, 4. the Arjuni,—a feeder of the Rápti in Oudh. Same as Dhumelá.

BURMAH

1. Suvarnabhumi, 2. Brahma-desa.

BUXAR

the hermitage or birth-place of Bámana Deva, one of the incarnations of Vishnu, near the junction of the Thorá and the Ganges; 3. Viswámitra-àsrama, the hermitage of Viswámitra, where Táraká was killed by Rámachandra; 4. Vyághra-sara, from a tank near the temple of Gourisankara in the town. Buxar is situated in the district of Shahabad on the line of the East India Railway.

C

CABUL VALLEY

The country of the lower Cabul valley, lying along the Cabul river between the Khoaspes (Kunar) and the Indus, formed what was called the Gandharva-desa of the Rámáyana, and the Gándhára of the Mahábhárat and the Buddhist period. It comprised the districts of Peshawur and Hoti-Mardan, as the district of Mardan is called, known as the Eusufzoi country. Its ancient capital was Pushkalávati (modern Hashtanagar, eighteen miles north of Peshawur), and its second

capital was Purushapura (modern Peshawur). Near the junction of the Indus and the Cabul rivers was the ancient Gonardda-desa, in which Salátura (modern village Lahor), the birth-place of the celebrated grammarian Pánini, is situated.

CACHAR

Hiramba.

CAGGAR

The river Drishadvati, mentioned in Manu and the Puráns as the southern boundary of Kurukshetra, now absorbed in the sands between Jessalmer and Rori Bakher.

CALCUTTA

.. The name of Calcutta is derived from Káli-ghát, one of the 52 Pithas.

CANARA

.. South Canara was called (1) Tulunga, (2) Tuluva.

CANDAHAR

.. The "New Gándhára," where the begging pot of Buddha was removed from Kaniksha's dagoba at Peshawur—the "true Gándhára"—and is still said to be preserved there by the Mussalmans (Rawlinson).

CARNATIC

.. The part of the Carnatic which lies between Ramnad and Seringapatam was called Karnáta.

CENTRAL ASIA

Sáka-dwipa, the country of the Sakas.

CEYLON

... 1. Singhala, 2. Lanká, 3. Ratnadwipa, 4. Támraparni, 5. Serendwipa.

CHAKARNAGAR

Ekachakrá of the Mahábhárat, sixteen miles south-west of Itawa in the N.-W. Provinces.

CHAKRA-TIRTHA

I. In Kurukshetra. II. In Prabhása in Guzerát. III. Six miles from Tryambaka, which is near the source of the Godavari.

CHAMBAL

The river Charmanavati in Rájputana. The Chambal has its source in a very elevated point of the Vindhya amongst a cluster of hills which are called Janapava. It has three co-equal sources from the same cluster, the Chambal, Chambela and Gambhira (Tod). The river is said to have been formed by the blood of the cows sacrificed at the Yajna of Ranti Deva.

CHAMPÁNAGAR

1. Champápuri, 2. Champá, 3. Málini, 4. Champá-Malini, near Bhagalpur in Bengal: it was the capital of Anga, the kingdom of Lomapáda of the Rámáyana and Karna of the Mahábhárat. It is also associated with the story of Behulá and Nakhindar,

CHANDERI

... r. Chedi, 2. Tripuri, the capital of Sisupála of the Mahábhárat, in Malwa.

CHANDRAGIRI ... Near Belligola, not far from Seringapatam, sacred to the Jainas.

CHAUSA

... Chyabana-ásrama in the district of Shahabad in Bengal: it was the hermitage of Rishi Chyabana (Váyu Purán).

CHAYENPUR ... Chandapura, five miles to the west of
Bhabua in the district of Shahabad in
Bengal. It was the residence of Chanda

CHHATISGARH ... 1. Dasárna, 2. Desarena Regio of the Periplus.

GANDAKA ... 1. The river Ajitavati, 2. the Hiranyavati, on the north of Kusinagara where Buddha died.

CHHOTA-NAGPUR

., 1. Mundá (Váyu Purán), 2. Jhárakhanda (Chaitanya-charitámrita), 3. Kokrah of the Mahomedan historians. The Mundás of the present day reside particularly in the district of Ranchi in the Chhota (Chutia) Nagpur division.

CHIDAMBARA ... In South-Arcot, the birth-place of Sankaráchárya according to the Sankara-Digvijaya.

CHIKAKOL ... Srikakola in the Northern Circars.

CHITRAL ... Bolor.

CHITTAGONG ... 1. Chattala, 2. Phullagráma.

CHITTELDURG Chitra-durga.

CHOYA ... The river Kárttiki, a branch of the Saraswati, mentioned in the Mahábhárat.

CHUKA

The river Málini in Oudh (Griffiths).

CHUNAR

district of Mirzapur (N.-W. P.) The fort of Chunar was built by the Pála Rájás of Bengal. The portion of the fort called Bhattrihari's palace is said to have been originally the hermitage of Bhattrihari, the disciple of Vasuráta and author of the Bairágya Sataka.

CIRCARS

... Included in the ancient Kalinga. The southern portion of the Circars was called Mohana-desa.

COLGONG

... Durvásá-ásrama: the hermitage of Rishi Durvásá was situated on a hill at the distance of a mile from Colgong in the district of Bhagalpur in Bengal.

COMILLA

... Kamalinga in Tipárá.

COMORIN

.. 1. Kumári, 2. Kumáriká, 3. Kanyá-Kumáriká in contradistinction to Sakra-Kumáriká in the Himalaya.

CONJEVERAM

... 1. Kánchipura, 2. Kánchi, in the province of Madras: it was the capital of Chola or Drávida which extended from Madras to Seringapatam and Cape Comorin. Sankaráchárya died at this place.

COROMANDEL

rivers Kaveri and Krishna: its capital was Kánchipura. Coromandel is the corruption of Cholamandala.

CRANGANORE ... Kurangalura, a town in Malabar.

CURUGODE

Kuntala-desa in the province of Madras.

CUTCH

1. Audumvara, 2. Kachchha: its ancient capital was Koteswara, or Kachchheswara.

DABHOI

Darbhavati in Guzerát.

DALKISOR

.. I. The river Dwarikeswari, 2. the Dwarakesi, a branch of the Rupnarain, near Bishnupur in Bengal.

DÁMUDÁ

daya in Bengal. (See Vedavali)

DARDISTAN

... Darada, a country between Chitral and the Indus.

DARJILING

Durjayalinga: a temple of Mahadeo called Durjayalinga is situated at this place.

DATIHÁ

Adhirája of the Mahábhárat in the Gwalior territory. It was the kingdom of Dantavakra, who was killed by Krishna. The name of Datihá also indicates the place where Dantavakra was killed. The country was conquered by Sahadeva, one of the five Pándavas. A Vaishnava work places it near Brindaban in the district of Mathura.

DAULI

The Dudh-Gangá, a branch of the Alakánandá.

DECCAN

.. Dakshinátya: that part of India which lies to the south of the Vindhyá range, the portion between the Himálaya and the Vindhyá being called Aryávartta It was the Dandakavana of the Rámáyana, and Dakshina-patha of Bhayabhuti.

DELHI

.. Old Delhi was 1. Indraprastha, 2. Khándavaprastha, the capital of Yudhishthira: it is still called Indrapat, 3. Joginipura of Chánd Bardai. The Puráná killá, or the old fort, is still pointed out as the fort of the Pándavas. It includes a portion of the parganá Tilpat (ancient Tilaprastha), one of the five villages demanded by Yudhishthira from Duryodhana.

DEOGAR

. Same as Baidyanath, in Bengal.

DEVA-PRAYÁGA

At the confluence of the Bhágirathi and the Alakánandá: it is one of the five (Pancha) Prayágas.

DEVI-PÁTAN

Oudh. It is one of the 52 Pithas where Sati's right arm is said to have fallen.

DHANK

... Mangipattana in Guzerát. Same as Ballabhi.

DHÁR

Dháránagara in Malwa, the capital of Rájá Bhoja, who was a great patron of Sanskrit literature. In his court flourished Kálidása, the author of the Nalodaya, Jayadeva, the author of the drama Prasanna Rághava, and others (Bhojapravandha.)

DHOPAP

DHOSI

DHARAMPUR ... Dharmapura, north-east of Damaun

DHARANIKOTA... See Amarávati


DHARÁWAT ... In the district of Gaya, subdivision Jáhánabád, where the Gunamati monastery was situated on the Kunwa hill, visited by Hiuen Tsiang.

DHARMÁRANYA I. 1. Dharmaprishtha, 2. Dharmmáranya of the Buddhist records, visited by numerous pilgrims, four miles from Buddha-Gayá. II. Portions of the districts of Ghazipur, Balia and Jaunpur were known by the name of Dharmmáranya.

DHIKULI ... Vairátapattana, the capital of Govisana, in the district of Kumaon.

Dhutapápapura on the Gumti, eighteen miles south-east of Sultanpur in Oudh, where Rámachandra is said to have been cleansed of his sin for killing Rávana, who was a Bráhman, by bathing in the river there. Rámachandra is also said to have expiated his sin of slaying Rávana at Hattia Haran (Hatyá-harana) near Kalyanmat, twenty-eight miles south-east of Hardoi in Oudh, where he bathed on his return from Lanká. The Kashtahárini Ghát at Monghir also claims the honor of having cleansed the sin of Rámachandra (Kurma Purán).

Chyabana-ásrama, six miles south of Narnol in the territory of Jeypur, where

the eyes of the Rishi Chyabana were pierced by Sukanyá, a princess of Anupadesa, whom he afterwards married.

DHUMELÁ

1. The river Dhabalá, 2. the Báhudá, 3. the Arjuni, 4. the Sitáprastha,—a feeder of the river Rapti in Oudh. Same as Burha-Rapti.

DIBHAI

.. Darbhavati, twenty-six miles southwest of Bulandsahar.

DILDARNAGAR... Akhandhá, twelve miles south of Ghazipur.

DIU

Devabandara in Guzerát.


DOAB (GANGETIC) 1. Antraveda, 2. Sasasthali between the Ganges and the Jamuna.

DOARHATTA ... Same as Kampil.

DOWLATABAD ... 1. Devagiri, 2. Devagara, 3. Dharagara, 4. Tagara of the Greeks, in Hyderabad. It was founded by Singhana in the eleventh century. Vopa Deva, the celebrated grammarian, and Hemádri flourished in the court of Singhana II, who ascended the throne in 1247 A. D.

DUBAUR

Durvásá-ásramá: the hermitage of Durvásá Rishi was situated on a hill, seven miles south-east of Rajauli in the subdivision of Nowada, district Gaya.

DWARKA

1. Dwáriká, 2. Dwárávati, 3. Kusasthali in Guzerát It was the capital of Krishna: he founded it after his flight from Mathura when attacked by Jarásandha, king of Magadha: hence he is worshipped there as Ranchhora-náth. 4. Tod has also identified Dwarka with Kusávati, but this identification is doubtful, as Kusávati was situated on the border of the Vindhyá hills.

EASTERN GHATS 1. Mályavána-giri, 2. Mahendra-parvata. Its southern portion was called Dardara.

EDAR

1. Sauvira of the Mahábhárat, 2. Sophir of the Bible, 3. Vadari of the Buddhists, in Malwa.

EKALINGA


Hárita-ásrama, the hermitage of Rishi Hárita, the author of one of the Sanhitás. It is situated in a defile about six miles north of Udaipur in Rajputana.

ELLICHPUR

... I. Bhojakatapura, 2. Bhojapura,the second capital of Vidarbha.

ELLORA

The abode of Ilbala, a demon, who and his brother Vátápi were killed by Agastya. It is situated near Dowlatabad in Central India. The Viswakarmá cave (chaitya) at Ellora and the viháras attached to it are supposed by Fergusson

to belong to a period between 600 to 750 A D., when the last trace of Buddhism disappeared from Western India.

FATEABAD

Samugarh, on the Jamuna, nine miles east of Agra, where Aurangzebe defeated Dara.

FEROZABAD

1. Chandwar, 2. Chandrapura near Agra, where in 1193 Shahabuddin Ghori defeated Jayachandra, king of Kanouj.

G.

GAHMAR

Geha-Mura, in the district of Ghazipur (E. I. Railway): it was the abode of Mura, a demon, who was killed by Krishna.

GÁLAVA-ÁSRAMA The hermitage of Rishi Gálava was situated at a distance of three miles from Jeypur in Rajputána.

GAMBHIRÁ

A branch of the river Chambal near Fatehabad in Malwa, mentioned by Kálidása in his Meghaduta (see Chambal).

GANDAK

1. The river Gandaki, 2. the Sálagrámi 3. the Náráyani.

GANGÁ-SÁGARA

The Ságara-Sangama at the mouth of the Ganges where Kapila destroyed the sons of Sagara by his curse.

GANGES

The river Gangá

GANGESWARI-GHÁT

Sánta-tirtha in Nepal at the confluence of the rivers Maradáriká and Bágmati. Párvati is said to have performed penance at this place.

GANGOTRI


The source of the river Ganges in the Rudra-Himalaya in Gurwal.

GANJAM

Ganjam appertained to the ancient : Kalinga, the capitals of which were Manipur (Mánikapattana), Ganjam and Rajamahendri at different periods.

GAYÁ

1. Gayasirsha. 2. The southern portion of the modern town of Gayá was the ancient Gayá. The present temple of Vishnupada was built by Ahalyábái. Maháráni of Indor (1766 to 1795), on the site of an old Buddhist temple: the impression of Vishnu's foot which is worshipped at present was an engraving of Buddha's foot formerly worshipped by the Buddhists. The Brahmajoni hill on the southern side of the town was the Gayasisa or Gayasirsha mountain of the Buddhists, where Buddha delivered his "flaming" sermon to his new disciples after his return from Benares. On the site of Asoka's stupa on the top of the mountain the Hindus have built a temple of Chandi. All the temples in Gayá, containing impressions of feet, where the oblation ceremony is

performed now-a-days, as at Rámsilá hill and other places, were ancient Buddhist temples appropriated by the Hindus after the decay of Buddhism in India. The Surya-kunda near the Vishnupada temple was an ancient Buddhist tank. Brahma-sara of the Mahábhárat is one mile to the south-west from the Vishnupada temple (Gayá Máhátma).

GENDIA

... Gokarna, a town in North Canara, thirty miles to the south of Goa.

GHÁGAR

.. Same as Sutlej.

GHÁGRÁ

.. The river Saraju in Oudh: the town of Ajodhya is situated on this river.

GHARA

.. Same as Sutlej.

GHAZIPUR

... The districts of Ghazipur, Jaunpur and Balia in the Norh-Western Provinces appertained to the ancient Dharmáranya (see Balia).

GHILGHIT

... Gahalata.

GIRIYAK

... Same as Giryek.

GIRNÁR

.. I. Raivata, 2. Raivataka, 3. Ujjayanta, 4. Girinagara,—the Junagar hill in Guzerát. It was the hermitage of Rishi Dattátreya. Suta was killed by Balaráma at this place. It is also one of the five hills sacred to the Jainas, containing the temples of Nemináth and Páraswanáth.

GIRYEK

The Indrasilá hill on the southern border of the district of Patna, ten miles to the south of Bihar (town), containing an ancient Buddhist village on the river Panchána. On this hill Indra is said to have questioned Buddha on forty-two points. On one of the peaks of this hill is situated what is called Jarásandha-ka-Baithak, which is a Dagoba or tope (stupa), erected according to Hiuen Tsiang in honor of a Hansa (goose), who sacrificed himself to relieve the wants of a starving community of Buddhist Bhikshus of the Hinayana school. It is Fa Hian's "Hill of the Isolated Rock" (Cunningham).

GOA

... 1. Gova-ráshtra, 2. Gopakavana, which are perhaps the contractions of the ancient Govardhana or Govardhanapura of the Puráns, sacred to Parasuráma,

GODÁVARI

The river Dakhsina-Gangá, 2. the Gautami, 3. the Gomati, It has its source in the Brahmagiri mountain near the village called Tryambaka.

GODNÁ

Gautama-ásrama at Revelgani near Chháprá (see Ahiári).

GOGA

1. The river Chandrávati, 2. the Sulakshini, which falls into the Ganges.

GOGRA

Same as Ghágrá

GOKUL

... Vraja, four miles south-east of Mathura across the Jamuna where Krishna was reared by Nanda during his infancy. The name of Vraja was extended to Brindában and the neighbouring villages, the scene of Krishna's early life and love. Gokul is the water-side suburb of Mahábana which has been identified by Growse with Klisoboras of the Greeks.

GOLKANDA

... Gowál-kunda, about seven miles from Hyderabad in the Nizam's territory (Tod). The seat of government was removed from Golkanda to Hyderabad in 1589.

GOMUKHI

.. Fifteen miles north of Gangotri.

GONDA

... Goura in Oudh: it was a subdivision of Uttara Kosala, the capital of which was Srávasti. The whole of Uttara Kosala was called Goura. The famous toothbrush (dantadhávana) tree of Buddha still exists at Gonda.

GONDWANA

Dakshina Kosala (see Berar): it included Wairágarh in the district of Chanda, about eighty miles from Nágpur (Ball).

GONDWANA HILLS

... The hills of Gondwana were included in the ancient Riksha-parvata.

GOUR

The ancient capital of Bengal, the ruins of which lie near Máldá at a distance of ten miles. It was also called Lakshmanavati or Laknauti. Gour was also called Rámakeli in the fifteenth century.

GOURI-KUNDA ... At the confluence of the Kedar-Gangá and the Bhágirathi, at a short distance from Gangotri.

GOWHATI ... 1. Prágjotishapura, the capital of Kámarupa, 2. Kámarupa, 3. Kámakshyá in Assam. It is one of the 52 Pithas.


GREAT DESERT Marusthali, east of Sindh.

GUMTI ... 1. The river Gomati, 2. the Vásishthi in Oudh.

GUPTÁRA ... Gopratára on the bank of the Saraju at Fyzabad in Oudh, where Rámachandra is said to have died.

GUZERÁT ... 1. Gurjjara, 2. Sauráshtra, 3. Suráshtra, 4. Ánartta, 5. Láta, 6. Lára or Lála. In the seventh century, when Hiuen Tsiang visited India, the southern parts of Rajputana and Malwa were known by the name of Gurjjara, the modern peninsula of Guzerat being then known by the name of Sauráshtra. The Sah kings of Sauráshtra from Nahapana to Swami Rudra Sah reigned from 79 to 292 A. D. According to Fergusson the

Saka era dates from the coronation of Nahapana, who was a foreigner (History of Indian and Eastern Architecture, p. 150). But the convention of the last Buddhist synod by Kaniksha, who was a Saka, was a more remarkable incident of the time than the coronation of such an insignificant king as Nahapana, as it concerned the religion of the whole of India.

H.

HAIIPUR

The sub-division of Hajipur, in the district of Mozaffarpur in the province of Bengal, was called 1. Visálá, 2. Visálachhatra. Rámachandra and Lakshmana are said to have halted at Hajipur on their way to Mithilá at the site of the present temple, which contains the image of Rámachandra, on the western side Vaisali (Besarh), eighteen of the town. miles north of Hajipur, was the capital of the Vrijjis or Lichhavis at the time of Buddha. Sonepur, in the sub-division, was the place where Vishnu released the elephant from the clutches of the crocodile, and on the spot where the fight took place, Rámachandra is said to have raised the temple of Hariharanáth Mahádeo.

HALA MOUNTAIN The southern part of the Hala mountain along the lower valley of the Indus was called Somagiri.

HARDWAR

1. Gangádwára, 2. Haradwára, 3. Kanakhala, 4. Máyápuri, 5. Mayura, 6. Haridwára. Though Kanakhala and Máyápuri are at present two different towns and distinct from Hardwar, yet at different periods Hardwára was known by these two names (see Skanda Purán and Meghaduta of Kálidása). Kanakhala is two miles to the south-east of Hardwar. It was the scene of the celebrated Dakshayajna of the Puráns. Máyápuri is between Hardwar and Kanakhal: it was one of the seven sacred towns of India. The temple of Máyá Devi is situated in Máyápur.

HARI-PARVAT ... Sáriká, three miles from Srinagar in Kásmir, where the temple of Sáriká Devi, one of the 52 Pithas, is situated.

It was the hermitage of Rishi Kásyapa, from whom the name of Kásyapapura or Kásmir was derived.

HASHTÁNAGAR... 1. Pushkalávati, 2. Pushkarávati, 3. Peukelaotes of the Greeks, the old capital of Gándhára or Gandharva-desa, founded by Pushkara, son of Bharata and nephew of Rámachandra. It is situated fifteen miles north-eastward beyond the Kábul river

HASSAN-ABDUL... 1. Takshasila, 2. Taxila of the Greeks, eight miles north-west of Shahdheri in the Panjab, between Attok and Rawalpindi. The Kathá-saritságara places it

on the bank of the Jhelum. It was founded by Taksha, son of Bharata and nephew of Rámachandra.

HASTINAPUR

The capital of the Kurus and of Duryodhana of the Mahábhárat, twenty-two miles north east of Mirat Nichakshu, the grandson of Janmejaya, removed his capital to Kausámbi after the diluviation of Hastinápura by the Ganges.

HATTIA HARAN

Hatyá-harana, twenty-eight miles south-east of Hardoi in Oudh (see Dhopap).

HAZARA

1. Abhisári of the Mahábhárat, 2. Abhisárá, 3. Abisares of the Greeks. The ancient Uraga or Urasa appertained to the country of Hazara.

HAZARIBAGH

The eastern portion of the district of Hazaribagh in the province of Bengal appertained to the ancient country of Malladesa.

HIMALAYA

1. Himádri, 2. Himáchala.

HINDU-KUSH

... Nisadha-parvata,—the Paropomisos of the Greeks.

HINGLÁJ

Hingulá, situated at the extremity of the Hingulá range on the coast of Mekran in Baluchistan. It is one of the 52 Pithas. Tod says it is nine days' journey from Tatha by Karachi Bunder and about nine miles from the seashore.

HULLABID

Dwara-samudra in Mysore, where the seat of government was removed in the middle of the twelfth century.

HUNDES

Same as Undes.

HYDERABAD

I. Bhágnagara in the Nizam's territory, from Bhágmati, the favourite mistress of Kutab Shah Mahomed Kuli who founded it in 1589, removing his seat of government from Golkonda, about seven miles distant. II. Hyderabad in Sindh has been identified by Cunningham with Patala.

India (Intu of Hiuen Tsiang) is a corruption of Indu or Sindhu or Sapta Sindhu (Hapta Hindu of the Arabs).

... 1. The river Sindhu, 2. the Sushomá in the Panjab,

. Jávalipattana.

JAIS

... Ujálikanagara, twenty miles east of Rai Bareli.

Yayátipuri, three miles from Cawnpur, where the ruins of a fort are pointed out as the remains of the fort of Rájá Yayáti (see Sambhára lake).

JÁJPUR

The country which stretches for ten miles around Jájpur in Orissa was called 1. Birajá-kshetra, 2. Párvati-kshetra, 3. Gayánábhi, 4. Yajnapura, 5. Jajátipura (Yayátipura).

**JAKHTIBAN** 

.. Same as Jethian.

JALALABAD

Nagarahara, at the confluence of the Surkhar or Surkhrud and Kábul rivers. It is also called Amarávati in one of the Játakas. A village called Nagaraka still exists about two miles to the west of Jalalabad.

JALANDHAR

.. 1. Jálandhara 2. Trigartta in the Pánjab.

JALANDHAR-DOAB

.. Between the Beas and the Sutlej in the Pánjab. It comprised the ancient countries Kekaya, Váhika or Válhika

**JALLALPUR** 

.. Bukephala of the Greeks in the Pánjab.

**JAMUNA** 

... I. The river Yamuná, 2. the Kálindi from the country called Kalinda-desa in which it has its source.

**JAMUNOTRI** 

The source of the river Jamuna in the Bándarpuchchha range of the Himalaya, situated in the ancient country called Kalinda-desa. Some South of Southout of South of South of South of South of South of South of Sout

JARÁSANDHA-KÁ-BAITHAK ...

Hansa-stupa (see Giryek).

The country around Jeypur, including Alwar, was the ancient Matsya-desa of the Mahábhárat. Its capital was Virtáta (modern Bairát) where the Pándavas resided *incognito* for one year: it is a small village to the west of Alwar and forty-one miles north of Jeypur and one hundred and five miles south-west of Delhi.

**JHALRAPATTAN** 

Chandrávati in Malwa on the Chandrabhágá river.

**IHELUM** 

... 1. The river Vitastá, 2. the Behat, 3. the Hydaspes, 4. the Bidaspes of the Greeks, in the Pánjab. It leaves the valley of Kásmir at Barahmula and falls into the Chenab near Jhung.

IHUSI

Pratishthánapura, on the north bank of the Ganges, three miles east of Allahabad: it was the capital of Puraravá. It is still called Pratishthápura.

JOGINI-BHARIYA MOUND ...

Jetavana-vihára, one mile to the south of Sáhet-máhet on the Rapti in Oudh, where Buddha resided for several years.

JOHARGANJ

Dhanapura, twenty-four miles from Ghazipur.

IOONIR

Jirnanagara in the province of Bombay. The Chaitya cave of Joonir is supposed by Fergusson to belong to the first or second century of the Christian era.

JUNÁGAR

... 1. Javananagara (Yavananagara), 2. Asildurga in Guzerat.

IWALAMUKHI ... A celebrated place of pilgrimage near Kangra, being one of the 52 Pithas, where Sati's tongue is said to have fallen.

IYNTEA

1. Pravijaya, 2. Prágvijaya in Assam.

KÁBUI.

1. Kubhá of the Vedas, 2. Ortospana of the Greeks, 3. Urddhasthána (Cunningham).

KÁBUL VALLEY See Cabul valley.


KAFRISTAN

... Ujjánaka: a country situated on the river Indus, immediately to the west of Kásmir.

KAILAS

The mountain is situated on the north of Lake Mánas-sarovara beyond Gangri or Darchin. It is also called the Kiunlun range.

KAIMUR HILL ... The range was called Kimmritya, between the rivers Sone and Tonse.

KAJERI

1. Kubjagriha, 2. Kajughira, 3. Kajinghara, ninety-two miles from Champa in the district of Bhagalpur.

KÁLÁDI

.. In Kerala, the birth-place of Sankaráchárya, according to the Sankara-vijaya.

KALHUÁ

The Makula mountain of the Burmese annals of Buddhism, where Buddha passed his sixth year of Buddhahood. The Kaluhá hill is situated in the district of Hazaribágh, twenty-six miles to the south of Buddha-Gayá and sixteen miles to the north of Chatra. The place abounds with the remains of ancient Buddhist architectures and figures of Buddha. It also contains two impressions of Buddha's feet on the top of the highest peak on the northern side of the valley called Akásalochana and a temple dedicated to Buddha containing his broken image. There are inscriptions also, but they have become obliterated and illegible. On the top of a hill on the western side there is a temple of Durgá called Kuleswari, All the images to be found in the place are the images of Buddha, except that of the goddess Kuleswari. Even the image which is called Bhaironáth is an image of Páraswanáth. There can be no doubt that the Brahmins appropriated this sacred place of the Buddhists and set up an image of Durgá at a subsequent period.

KALIANI

Kalyána in the province of Bombay. It was the capital of the Chalukya kings (western branch) from Jaya Sinha Vijayáditya to Tribhuvana Malla from the fifth to the twelfth century. It was the birth-place of Vijnáneswara, the author of the Mitákshará.

KÁLI-NADI

... 1. The river Ikshumati, 2. the Káligangá, 3. the Mandákini in Rohilkhand. Kanouj stands on this river.

KALINJAR

... r. Kálanjara, 2. Purnadarva, in Bundelkhand. It was the capital of Chedi under the Gupta kings. It contains the temple of Nilakantha Mahádeo.

KÁLI-SCIND

The river Pátalávati, a branch of the Chambal in Malwa. It is called Palaitah by Tod. Its identification with Nirvindhyá (7. B. T. S., Vol. V., Pt. III., p. 46), which rises in the Vindhyapáda (Satpura range), does not appear to be correct.

KALSI

... Srughna in the Jaunsár district on the east of Sirmur.

KALUHÁ

... Same as Kalhuá.

KAMBAY

... Stambha-tirtha in Guzerát.

KAMPIL

.. Kámpilya, twenty-eight miles northeast of Fathgarh in the district of Farrukhabad, N.-W. P. It was the capital of South Panchála, the king of which was Drupada, the father of Draupadi of the Mahábhárat. It was the birth-place of the celebrated astronomer Varáhamihira, (Brihat-Játaka).

KÁMPTÁNÁTH-

Chitrakuta in Bundelkhand on the river Pisani, twelve miles from Márkund and fifty miles south-east of Banda. Rámachandra resided here for some time while on his way to the Dandakáranya.

KÁMPUR

... Kanikshapura, ten miles to the south of Srinagar in Kásmir, founded by Kaniksha, king of Kásmir.

KANARAK

1. Arkakshetra, 2. Padmakshetra, nineteen miles north-west of Puri in Orissa. It contains a temple of the Sun, built by Languliya Narsinha, the seventh king of the Gangávansi dynasty, who reigned from 1237 to 1282 A.D.

KANE

... 1. The river Karnávati, 2. the Kriyána, in Bundelkhand.

KANGRA

... 1. Nagarakota, 2. Bhimanagara on the Ravi-Bánganga river. It was the old capital of Kuluta.

KANKAN

... 1. Parasuráma-kshetra. 2. It was part of Aparántaka: Kankan and Malabar formed the ancient Aparántaka.

KANKHAL

... See Hardwar.

KANOUI

1. Kányakubja, 2. Gádhipura, 3. Kusamapura, 4. Kusasthala, 5. Mahodaya, on the river Káli, a branch of the Ganges. After the Andhra-bhrityas of Pataliputra, the Guptas (from Sri or Rájá Gupta to Mahendra, a minor son of Skanda Gupta) rose into power and reigned at Kanouj (319 to 465 A. D.). From Chandra Gupta I, the third king

of the dynasty, to Skanda Gupta, the period is sixty-five years from 401 to 465 A. D. They adopted a new era called the Gupta era in 319 A. D. (Fergusson). The Guptas were destroyed by the Hunas under Toraman and his son Mihirakula in the sixth century. Kanoui was the birth-place of Viswamitra of the Rámáyana. Siláditya II. or Harshavardhana (known as Sri Harsha in Sanskrit literature), who was the fourth king after Vikramáditya of Ujjaini, made Kanouj his capital and reigned from 610 to 650 A. D. (Max Müller). He was visited by Hiuen Tsiang in 636 A. D In his court flourished the celebrated writer Bánabhatta (called also Bhandin) -the author of the Kádamvari, Harshacharita, and Ratnávali: Dhávaka-the real author of the Nágánanda; and Chandráditya who versified the Vessantara Játaka. The celebrated poet Bhavabbuti was in the court of Yasavarmana of Kanouj: he went to Kásmir with Lalitáditya (672 to 728 A. D.) after the conquest of Kanouj by the latter (Rájatarangini). Sriharsha wrote the Naishadha-charita at the request of Jayachandra, king of Kanoui, in the eleventh century.

KAPILADHÁRÁ...

I. Kapila-ásrama, twenty-four miles to the south-west of Násik: it was the hermitage of Kapila Rishi. II. The first fall of the Nerbuda from the Amarakantaka mountain.

KÁRÁBAGH

Kárápatha on the Indus, mentioned in the Raghuvansa as being the place where Lakshmana's son Chandraketu was placed as king by his uncle Rámachandra when he made a disposition of his kingdom before his death. Tavernier writes it as Carabat.

KARACHI

... Karakalla in Scind,—Krokala of Megasthenes.

KARATOYA

... I. The river Karotoyá, 2. the Sadánirá, which flows through the districts of Rungpur and Dinajpur. It formed the boundary between the kingdoms of Bengal and Kámarupa at the time of the Mahábhárat.

KARMANÁSÁ

limit of the district of Shahabad in Bengal, and forms the boundary between the province of Bengal and the North-Western Provinces. Its water is considered to be polluted by the Hindus, being associated with the sins of Trisanku of the Rámáyana.

KARNA-PRAYÁGA

At the confluence of the Alakananda and Pindar rivers. It is one of the five (Pancha) Prayagas.

KÁRON

Káma-ásrama, eight miles to the north of Korantedi in the district of Balia in the North-Western Provinces. Mahádeo is said to have destroyed Madana, the god of love, at this place with the fire of the third eye in his forehea.

KARRA

Karkotaka-nagara, forty-one miles north-west of Allahabad. It is one of the 52 Pithas.

KÁRTTIKA-SWÁMI

Same as Kumára-swámi.

KASAI

The river Kansávati in Bengal,

KASIA

Kusinagara, thirty-five miles to the east of Gorakhpur on the old channel of the Hiranyavati or Chhota Gandak. It was at Kusinagara that Buddha died. The ashes of Buddha's funeral pyre were enshrined in a stupa at Barhi, now called Moriyanagar, in the Nyágrodha forest, visited by Hiuen Tsiang.

KÁSMIR

... Kásyapapura: the hermitage of Rishi Kásyapa was on the Hari mountain, three miles from Srinagar.

KASUR

Kusávati, thirty-two miles to the south-east of Lahore, said to have been founded by Kusa, son of Rámachandra.

KATAK

Váránasi-Kataka in Orissa, at the confluence of the Mahánadi and Kátjuri; founded by Nripa Kesari, who reigned between 941 to 953 A. D.

KATHIWAR

The southern portion of Kathiwar was called Prabhasa, containing the celebrated temple of Somnáth, at a short distance from which was the spot where Krishna died.

KÁTMANDU

1. Káshthamandapa, 2. Kántipuri, the capital of Nepál.

KATWA

.. Katadwipa in the district of Burdwan in Bengal.

KÁVERI

... The river Arddhagangá,

KEDÁR

is situated in the Rudra-Himalaya in Gurwal below the peak of Mahápantha on the west of Badrinath. The worship of Mahádeo Kedáranátha is said to have been established by Arjuna, one of the five Pándavas. The river Káli-Gangá rises at this place and joins the Alákánandá at Rudra-Prayága.

KESARIYA

. Isalia of the Buddhists, thirty miles north of Besarh in the district of Mozaffarpur in the province of Bengal, where Buddha passed the eighteenth and nineteenth Wassos of his Buddha-hood.

KETAS

... I. Sinhapura of the Mahábhárat, 2. Katáksha, a town in the Panjáb, sixteen miles from Pindi Dadan Khan on the north of the Salt Range. According to Hiuen Tsiang, the country of Sinhapura bordered on the Indus on its western side. It was conquered by Arjuna.

KHAIRA-DIH

Jamadagni-ásrama, thirty-six miles north-west of Balia: it is said to have been the residence of Rishi Jamadagni and the birth-place of his son Parasuráma. See Zamania.

KHANDES

Khandes, Southern Malwa and parts of Aurangabad formed the ancient country of Haihaya or Anupadesa, the kingdom

of the myriad-handed Kárttyaviryárjuna, who was killed by Parasuráma. Its capital was Máhishmati (modern Maheswar or Mahes) on the river Nerbuda, forty miles to the south of Indore.

KHEDA (KAIRA) ... Khetaka of the Padma Purán between Ahmedabad and Khambay in Guzerát. It is the Kiecha of Hiuen Tsiang, which Cunningham has correctly restored to Kheta or Kheda, now called Kaira. Khetaka was situated on a small river called Vetravati near its junction with the Sábhramati (Sabarmati). Julien renders Kiecha by Khacha or Kachchha.

KHIRAGRAMA ... Twenty miles to the north of Burdwan. It is one of the 52 Pithas.


KISKINDHYA ... A small hamlet on the north bank of the river Tungabhadra, not far from Anagandi. It was the ancient Kishkindhyá of the Rámáyana, where Rámchandra killed Báli, the king of the monkeys.

KIUNLUN RANGE Same as Kailas.

KOH ... The river Kutikoshtika of the Rámáyana, a small affluent of the Ramaganga in Oudh.

KOLAPUR ... I. Kolhápura, 2. Agastya-ásrama, the hermitage of Rishi Agastya, in the province of Bombay.

KOLLUR ... Gani on the river Krishna, celebrated for its diamond mine (Tavernier). Gani is evidently the corruption of Khani (mine).

KONDAVIR

r. Kundinapura, 2. Bidarbhanagara, the ancient capital of Bidarbha, and the birth-place of Rukmini, wife of Krishna, 3. Bhimapura. Cunningham identifies it also with Kusávati, but this identification is doubtful. Another Kondavir is mentioned by Tavernier, at present called Konavaidu, in the province of Madras, not far from Guntur; it was built in the twelfth century by a king of Orissa. Kondavir is the same as Kundapura of Dowson, forty miles east of Amaravati in Central India.

KONKONA

.. Same as Kankan.

KORUR

.. Between Multan and Loni, where Vikramáditya, king of Ujjaini, defeated the Sakas in a decisive battle in 533 A. D.,—the date of this battle is supposed to have given rise to the Samvat era.

KOSÁM

Vatsya-pattana, about thirty miles to the west of Allahabad: it was the capital of Vatsya-desa, the kingdom of Ràjá Udayana. Harsha Deva places his scene of the Ratnávali at this place.

KOSILA

... The river Kutiká or Kutilá of the Rámáyana, the eastern tributary of the Ramaganga in Oudh.

КОТАН

The district of Kotah in Rajputana appears to have been the ancient Seka, which was conquered by Sahadeva (Mahábhárat). Yule, however, identifies Sèka

with the country around Jhajpur on the Banas to the south-east of Ajmir.

KOTALGARH ... Sonitapura of the Harivansa, where Ushá was abducted by Aniruddha, the grandson of Krishna. See Vána Rájá's gar.

KOTA-TIRTHA ... In Kálanjara.

KOTESAR ... 1. Kotiswara, 2. Kachchheswara, the capital of Kachchha (Kutch) on the river Kori, a branch of the Indus

KOTI-TIRTHA ... I. In Mathura. II. A sacred tank in Gokarna.

KOTWAL ... Kái tipuri, twenty miles north of Gawalior.

KRISHNA ... 1. The river Krishná, 2. the Krishnaveni, 3. the Krishnavenwá, 4. the Benwá, 5. the Veni, 6. the Biná, 7. the Tynna of the Greeks.

KUARI ... The river Kumári in the Gawalior
State: it joins the river Sindh near its
junction with the Jamuna.

KULU ... 1. Kuluta, 2. Koluka in the upper valley of the Beas. Its capital was Nagarakota.

KUMÁRA-SWÁMI Is about one hundred and twenty miles to the south-east of Tirupati in the province of Madras.

KUMBHACONUM

1. Kámakoshthi 2. Kumbhaghonum
in the province of Madras. It was the
ancient capital of Chola.

KUNDAPURA

1. Kundinapura, 2. Kundinanagara, 3. Bidarbhanagara, 4. Bhimapura, forty miles east of Amarávati in Central India. Same as Kondavir.

KURKIHAR

Kukkutapádagiri in the district of Gayá, where the Buddhist saint Mahá-Kasyapa died.

KUSHÁN

Kapisá, ten miles west of Opian on the declivity of the Hindu-Kush.

KUSI

The river Kausiki in Bengal. Its confluence with the Ganges was known as the Kausiki Tirtha or Kausiki-sangama.

LAHARI-BANDAR The ruins of Dewala, -- the "Metamorphosed city" as it has been called,-are situated at a very short distance to the north of Láhari-bandar or Lári-bandar in Scind: in fact, Láhari-bandar was built with the ruins from Dewala (Cunningham).

LAHOR

Sálatura, the birth-place of Pánini, the celebrated grammarian. The village is situated at a distance of about sixteen miles to the north-east of Attok.

LAHORE

1. Lavakota, 2. Lavavára in the Panjab. It was founded by Lava, son of Rámachandra of the Rámáyana.

LAMGHAN

1. Lampáká, 2. Murandá on the northern bank of the Kábul river.

LITTLE-GANDAK

Same as Chhota-Gandak.

LITTLE THIBET

Bolor. Little Thibet is also called Baltistan and Chitral. Its capital was Skardu.

LOMASGIR-HILL

Lomasa-ásrama, the hermitage of Lomasa Rishi: it is four miles north-east of Rájauli in the sub-division of Nowadah in the district of Gayá.

LOONI

... The river Lánguli in Rájputáná.

MADAWAR

Matipura in Western Rohilkhand, visited by Hiuen Tsiang, 2. Pralamba of the Rámayaná.

MADHYÁRJUNA... Sixteen miles west of Tranquebar.

MADURA

1. Mathurá, 2. Dakshina-Mathura, 3. Minákshi, in the province of Madras. was the capital of Pándya. The districts of Madura and Tinnivelly formed the ancient Pándya or Pándu. It is one of the 52 Pithas where Sati's eyes are said to have fallen.

MAHÁBALIPUR ...

Banapura on the Coromandal Coast. The "raths" of Mahabalipur are the true representation of ancient Buddhist viharas or monasteries.

MAHABANA

A town about six miles from Mathura across the Jamuna. Gokul, in which Krishna was reared up during his infancy,

was the waterside suburb of Mahabana. Mahabana was the ancient Braja, and the Klisoboras of the Greeks. It was sacked by Mahmud of Ghazni as the "fort of Raja Kulchand" (see Gokul.)

MAHANADI

.. 1. The river Chitrapalá, 2 the Chitrotpalá, 3. the Mahánadi in Orissa.

# MANENDRA-MÁLI

HILLS

The Mahendra hills of Ganjam, where Parasuráma retired after he was defeated by Ráma. The hills included the Eastern Gháts.

MAHES

... Same as Maheswar.

MAHESWAR

... Máhishmati on the right bank of the Nerbuda, forty miles to the south of Indore. It was the capital of Haihaya or Anupadesa, the kingdom of the myriad-handed Kárttyavirjárjuna of the Puráns.

MAHI

... I. 1. The river Mahati (Váyu Purán), 2. the Mahi (Márkandeya Purán) in Malwa. II. Mahendra in the Malabar coast.

MAHOBA

.. Mahotsava-nagara in Bundelkhand (Cunningham).

MALABAR

... 1. Mallára-desa, 2. part of Aparántaka: Malabar and Konkona formed the ancient Aparántaka, 3. Malabar, Travancore and Canara formed the ancient Kerala, called also Ugra.

MALABAR COAST 1. Kerala, 2. Ugra (see Malabar).

MALABAR GHATS 1. Malaya-giri, 2. Chandana-giri: the southern portion of the Western Gháts, south of the river Kaveri.

MÁLINI

1. Same as the river Chuka in Oudh, which flows between the ancient countries called Pralamba and Aparatála, and falls into the river Ghágra (Saraju) fifty miles above Ajodhya. The hermitage of Kanwa, the adoptive father of the celebrated Sakuntalá, was situated on the bank of this river. 2. Erineses of Megasthenes.

MALKHEAD

Mányakshetra on the river Krishna.

MALL

Upamallaka.

MALWA

1. Málava, 2. Avanti. Its capitals were Ujjaini and Dháránagara.

MANÁL

A village near Badrinath in Gurwal. It was the hermitage of Rishi Vyása, the author of the Mahabharat.

MÁNAS-SAROVAR


The lake Mánasa-sarovara, 2. Mánasa is situated at the foot of that part of the Kailása range which is called Baidyutaparvata.

MANBHUM

The western portion of the district of Manbhum in the province of Bengal appertained to the ancient country of Malla-desa.

MANDÁKINI

I. Same as the river Kali-nadi. II. The river Paisuni (ancient Payoshni) which flows by the side of Chitrakuta in

Bundelkhand: it was created by Anusuyá, the wife of Rishi Atri and daughter of Daksha, to avert the effect of a drought of ten years.

MANDÁRAGIRI... A hill in the Bánká sub-division of Bhágalpur in Bengal, two or three miles from Bansi. The gods are said to have churned the ocean with this hill as a churner.

MANDASOR ... Dasapura on the Chambal in Malwa, about ninety-five miles south-east of Udayapur.

MANGALÁ-GOURI One of the 52 Pithas, in Gaya.

MANGILA-PAT-

TANA. ... Pratishthána, thirty-eight miles southwest of Aurangabad. It was the capital of Rájá Sáliváhana, king of Maháráshtra.

MANGLORA ... 1. Mangala, 2. Mangali, 3. Mangalapura on the Swat river. It was the capital of Udyána.

MANIKALYA ... Mánikapura in the Panjab, celebrated for its Buddhist topes where Buddha in a former birth gave his body to feed a starving tiger.

MANIKARNIKÁ ... Brahmanála in Benares.

MÁNIKPATTAN... Manipura of the Mahábhárat, a seaport at the mouth of the lake Chilka. It was once the capital of Kalinga. The situation of the capital of Kalinga as

described in the Mahábhárat and the Raghuvansa and also the name accord with those of Mánikpattan.

MÁRÁTTA COUNTRY

Máháráshtra, the boundaries of which in the seventh century were: Malwa on the north, Kosala and Andhra on the east, Konkona on the south, and the sea on the west. Its ancient capitals were Pratishthána, Kalyáni and Devagiri.

MARWAR

... Mordua-desa in Rajputana: Gurjara of the seventh century.

MASAR

Mahásara, an ancient village six miles to the west of Arrah in the district of Shahabad in Bengal, visited by Hiuen Tsiang, at a very short distance from the Karisat station of the E. I. Railway. It now contains only two temples.

MATHURA

founded by Satrughana, and was the birth-place of Krishna. Eighty miles all round Mathura was called the Vraja-Mandala.

MAURAWAN

... Six miles east of Unao in Oudh. It is said to have been the capital of Mayuradhwaja of the Mahábhárat (Führer).

MAYAPUR

... 1. Máyápuri, 2. Mayura (see Hard-war).

MEGNA

1. The river Meghanáda, 2. the Meghaváhana in east Bengal.

MEWAR

Sákambhari in Rajputana.

the celebrated battle was fought between

MONGHIR ... 1. Mudgalagiri from Mudgalaputra, a disciple of Buddha, 2. Mudga-giri (a contraction of Mudgala-giri), 3. Modágiri,

4. Hiranyaparvata of Hiuen Tsiang.

MUKTINATH

... A celebrated place of pilgrimage situated in Thibet or north of Nepal on the Sapta-Gandaki range of the Himalaya, south of Sálagráma, not far from the source of the Gandak. The place is associated with the legend of Tulsi and Náráyana, and a temple of the latter exists at this place: hence the Gandak is called the Náráyani.

MULTAN

(Padma Purán), 3. Prahládapuri, where Náráyana incarnated as Nrisinha and killed the Asura Hiranyakasipu, the father of Prahláda. It was the capital of Malladesa, or the country of the Mallis of Alexander's historians, which was given to Lakshmana's son Angada by his uncle Rámachandra, when the latter made a disposition of his kingdom before his death.

MUNDORE

.. Same as Madawar.

MURG

... Same as Mong.

MUZAFFARNAGAR Khándava-vana of the Mahábhárat, north of Mirat: it is one of the stations of the North-Western Railway. Arjuna appeased the hunger of Agni, the god of fire, at this place.

MYSORE

. 1. Mahishaka, 2. Maheswara, 3. Vanavási of the Buddhist period.

N.

NANDA-PRAYÁGA At the confluence of the Alakánandá and Nandákini, a small river. It is one of the five (Pancha) Prayágas.

NARWAR

1. Nishadha, 2. Nalapura, forty miles south-west of Gwaliar. It was the capital of Rájá Nala of the story of Nala-Damayanti of the Puráns.

NASIK

Panchavati-vana on the Godavari, where Sitá was abducted by Rávana, king of Lanká. The name of Nasik is evidently derived from the circumstance of Surpanaká's nose having been cut at this place by Lakshmana.

NATHADWAR

Siarh on the Banas, twenty-two miles north-east of Udayapur in Mewar. It contains the celebrated original image of Kesava Deva removed by Rana Ráj Singh from Mathura in anticipation of Aurangzeb's raid.

NAWAL

... Navadevakula, thirty-three miles northwest of Unao near Bangarmau in Oudh, visited by Hiuen Tsiang (Führer).

NEGAPATAM

. 1. Uragapura, 2. Nágapattana, the capital of Pándu or Pándya, in the province of Madras.

NERBUDA

... 1. The river Narmadá, 2. the Muralá, 3. the Purva-Gangá, 4. the Revá. It rises in the Amarakantaka mountain.

NIGAMBOD-GHAT Nigambodha-tirtha of the Padma Purán in Old Delhi (Indraprastha).

NIGLIVA

... In the Nepalese Terai, north of Gorakhpur and thirty-eight miles northwest of the Uska station of the Bengal and North-Western Railway. It has been identified by Dr. Führer with Kapila-

vastu, the birth-place of Buddha. The ruins of Kapilavastu lie eight miles north-west of Paderia, which has been identified with the Lumbini garden, where Buddha was born.

NILAKANTHA

A celebrated place of pilgrimage containing the temple of Nilakantha Mahádeo to the north of Katmandu in Nepal.

NILGIRI

... The Nila Parvata or Niláchala in the district of Puri in Orissa.

NIMKHÁRVAN

the Sandila station of the Oudh and Rohilkhand Railway, and twenty miles from Sitapur, on the left bank of the Gumti. It was the abode of sixty-thousand Rishis: many of the Puráns were written at this place.

NIMSAR

.. Same as Nimkharvan.

NIZAM'S STATE

1. Andhra, 2. Tailanga, 3. Tri-Kalinga between the Godayari and the Krishna.

NORTHERN CIRCARS

... The southern portion of the Northern Circars between the Chikakol river and the Godavari was called Mohana-desa; the northern portion was part of Kalinga.

NUDDEA

... Navadwipa in Bengal, the birth-place of Chaitanya. It was the last Hindu capital of Bengal, conquered by Bakhtiar Khiliji in 1203. To the north-east of the present Navadwipa, at the distance

of about a mile, are the ruins of Ballála Sena's palace, and there is also a tank of Ballála Sena called Balláladighi.

NUNDGAON

Nandigráma of the Rámayána in Oudh where Bharata resided during the exile of Rámachandra.

NYSATTA

... Nysa of the Greeks on the northern bank of the Kabul river, about two leagues below Hashtanagar.

OHIND

.. Udakhanda on the right bank of the Indus in the Peshawur division of the Panjab.

OMKÁRNATH

... Amateswara, near Mandaleswara, which is five miles to the east of Mahes (the ancient Máhishmati) on the bank of the Nerbuda. It is one of the twelve great Lingas of Mahádeo.

OPIAN

... Hupian, twenty-seven miles to the north of Kábul.

ORISSA

... 1. Udra, 2. Odra, 3. Utkala.

OUDH

1. Ayodhyá, the kingdom of Ráma, 2. Kosala: it was divided into Uttara and Dakshina Kosala, 3. Sáketa, 4. Setiká, 5. Visákhá, 6. the town Ayodhyá.

OUJEIN

.. I. Ujjaini, 2. Avantipura. It was the capital of Vikramáditya (II) the Great (515 to 550 A. D.), who revived Hinduism and introduced Siva-worship. His victory ever the Sakas in 533 A. D. gave rise to the Samvat era. In his court

flourished the celebrated poet Kálidása, the author of the Sakuntalá; Amara Sinha, the author of the Amara-Kosha; Varáha-mihira, the author of the Brihat-Játaka: Bararuchi (called also Kátyáyana), the author of the Várttika and Prákrita-prakása; Ghatakarpara, the author of the Yamaka-kávya; Dhanwantari, the author of the Briddha Susruta Sanhitá: Kshapanaka (also called Dinnágáchárya-a disciple of the Buddhist patriarch Basubandhu), the commentator of the Nyáya-sutras of Gautama; Sanku: and Betálabhatta, the chronicler. They were called the "nine gems" of the court of Vikramáditya. Oujein contains the celebrated temple of the Mahádeva called Mahákála of the Puráns and Kálapriyanátha of the dramas. On the northern side of the town is situated the hermitage of Sandipana Muni, where Krishna and Balaráma were educated. Bhatrihari's cave is about two miles to the north of the town on the bank of the Sipra. The Bhairava mountain near Oujein is one of the 52 Pithas, where Sati's upper lip is said to have fallen.

OXUS

1. The river Vakshu, 2. the Suchakshu, 3. the Chakshu.

PADERIA ... A village in the Nepalese Terai, two miles north of Bhagabanpur. It has been identified with the Lumbini garden, where Buddha was born (see Nigliva).

PAIN-GANGA ... The river Nirvindhyá of the Puráns, a tributary of the Godavari.



PALNI-HILLS ... 1. Sri-saila, 2. Rishabha-parvata, in the district of Madura (Chaitanya-Charitámrita).

PAMPA ... A branch of the Tangabhadra. Mount Rishyamukha is situated on the eastern bank of this river, where Rámachandra met Hanumána and Sugriva for the first time. There is also a lake called Pampá-Sarovara near Kishkindhya (see Kishkindhya).

PAMPUR ... Padmapura on the right bank of the Behat (Jhelum), eight miles to the southeast of Srinagar in Kasmir. It is celebrated for its cultivation of Kunkuma or saffron (crocus sativus), which was largely used as a cosmetic by the ladies of ancient India.

PANCHÁNA ... I. The river Nandá, 2. the Panchánandá, which flows through the districts of Gayá and Pátná. It flows by the side of Ratna-giri, called also Hemakuta or Rishabha-giri, one of the five hills of Rajgir, where Rishabha Rishi performed asceticism. Rishabha Rishi's image is

sculptured in the Baibhára-giri near the Sonabhándára cave.

PANDERPUR

PANDRITAN

Puránádhishthána, the ancient capital of Kásmir, eight miles to the east of Srinagar.

The dynasties from Chandragupta which reigned at Pátaliputra are: the Mauryas from Chandragupta to Brihadratha (325 to 195 B. C.): in the seventeenth year of the reign of Asoka (276 to 240 B. C.), the grandson of Chandragupta, the third Buddhist synod was held at Pátaliputra under the presidency of Mudgaliputra Tissa; the Sungas from Pushpamitra to Devabhuti (188 to 76 B. C.); the Kanwas from Vasudeva to Susarman (76 to 31 B. C.); the Andhra-bhrityas (Satakarnis or Sataváhanas of the inscriptions) from Sipraka to Gautamiputra (31 B. C. to 312 A. D.); the Vasithiputras from Puliman, son of Gautamiputra, to Pulomáchi (333 to 429 A. D.). Pátaliputra was the birth-place of the celebrated astrono-

RISHIKUILA ... r. The river Rishikulyá, 2. the Haimavati, on which Ganjam is situated. It rises in the Mahendra hills.

RISHYAMUKHA

It was on this mountain that Sugriva dwelt after he fled from Kishkindhyá.

It is eight miles from the Anagandi hills on the Tungabhadra.

ROÁLSAR ... About sixty-four miles to the north-west of Jwálámukhi: it is said to contain seven miraculously moving hills, and consequently it is a place of pilgrimage.

ROHILKHAND ... Panchála: it was divided into North and South Panchála. The capital of North Panchála was Ahichchhatra (Ramnagar), and that of South Panchála was Kámpilya (Kampil). Drupada of the Mahábhárat was king of South Panchála.

ROHTAK ... Rohitaka, forty-two miles north-west of Delhi.

... Rohita in the district of Shahabad in Bengal, thirty miles south of Sásiram. It is said to have been founded by Rohitáswa, son of Harisachandra of the Rámáyana and Márkandeya Purán.



SÁLAGRÁMA ... Near the source of the river Gandak in the Sapta-Gandaki range of the Himalaya in the southern boundary of Central Thibet. It was the hermitage of Bharata and Pulaha. From the name of this place, the Gandak is called Sálagrámi.

SALSETTE ... The island of Perimuda,—the Perimula of the Greeks, near Bombay. It derived its sanctity from a tooth of Buddha, which was enshrined there at the beginning of the fourth century.

SAMBHÁRA LAKE Sákambhari in Rajputana.

SANGLAWALA-TIBA

... 1. Sákala, 2. Sánkala, the capital of Madra-desa, on the Apagá river west of the Rávi in the Pánjab.

SANKARA-TIRTHA In Nepal immediately below the town of Patan at the confluence of the Báchmati and the Manimati rivers.

1. Sáranganátha, 2. Mrigadáva, 3. Rishipattana, 4 Isipatana of the Buddhists, six miles from Benares, where Buddha preached his first sermon after the attainment of Buddha-hood at Buddha-Gayá.

SARVANA

... About twenty miles to the south-east of Unao in Oudh, where Dasaratha, king of Ayodhyá, killed Sarvana, the son of a blind Rishi.

SÁSIRAM

... Sahansaráma in the district of Shahabad in Bengal.

SATGAON

... Saptagráma, an ancient town of Bengal near Magra in the district of Hugli.

SEMAH ... I. Semulapura (Sambhalpur?) on the river Koel in the district of Palamu in the Chhota Nagpur division: Soumelpour of Tavernier, 2. Sambalaka of Ptolomey celebrated for its diamond mines (Ball).

SERINGAPATAM Srirangapattana, on the Káveri, in Mysore.

SERINGHAM ... 1. Srirangam, 2. Srirangakshetra in the province of Madras.

SEVEN PAGODAS 1. Banapura, 2. Mahábalipura on the Coromandel Coast.

SEWALIK RANGE Maináka-giri.

SHAHABAD ... The eastern portion of the district of Shahabad in Behar was called Karusha, and the western portion was called Malada.

SHAH-DHERI ... 1. Takshasila, 2. Taxila of the Greeks, one mile north of Kála-ká-serai, between Attock and Rawalpindi. The Kathá-saritságara places it on the Jhelum.

Takshasila was founded by Taksha, son of Bharata and nephew of Rámachandra.

STAM

SIDDHAUR

Siddhapura, sixteen miles west of Bára-Banki in Oudh.

SINDH

I. The river Sindhu or Dakshina-Sindhu in Malwa, II. Sindhu-desa.

SINDH-SÁGAR DOAB

Between the Indus and the Ihelum. It comprised the ancient countries of Ayudha and Sauvira.

SINGBHUM

Kie-lo-na-su-fa-la-na of Hiuen Tsiang: it has been identified by Cunningham with Kirana-Suvarna (Singbhum) in the Chhota Nagpur division. Beal identifies it with Karna-Suvarna (Rángámáti) in the district of Murshidabad. Sasánka, king of Kirana-Suvarna, was a great persecutor of Buddhism: he destroyed the Bodhi tree at Buddha-Gaya (Hiuen Tsiang). It was the southern boundary of the kingdom of Magadha.

... The Avanti-nadi in Malwa: Oujein stands on this river.

SIRHIND

... 1. Kurujángala of the Mahábhárat, 2. Sairindha-desa of the Puráns, 3. Srikantha-desa of the Buddhist period, 4. Satadru of Hiuen Tsiang, in the Panjab.

SITPUR

... 1. Siddhapura, 2. Kardama-ásrama and the birth-place of Kapila, 3. Bindusara in Guzerat, eighty-two miles from Ahmedabad.

SOMNATH

ra-Prabhása, 2. Somatirtha, 3. Chandra-Prabhása of the Jainas, on the south of Guzerát. It is situated at the confluence of the three rivers Hariná, Kapilá

Tilaprastha, six miles to the southeast of Toghlakabad and ten miles to the south-east of the Kutab Minar, included in pargana Faridabad.

TINNIVELLY

The districts of Tinnivelly and Madura formed the ancient Pándya or Pándu. Its capital was Uragapuram (Negapatam).

TIPPERA

.. 1. Katripura, 2. Tripurá, 3. Kirátadesa, 4. Sundha-desa. The temple of Tripureswari at Udayapur in Hill Tippera is one of the 52 Pithas.

TIRHUT

... I. Tirabhukti, 2. Videha, 3. Mithilá, 4. Trihuta, the kingdom of Rájá Janaka of the Rámáyana.

TIRUMALA

Trimalla, 2. Báláji, six miles west of Tripati or Tirupati in the district of North Arcot.

TIRUPATI

... Tripadi in the province of Madras.

TITTÁ

... 1. The river Trisrotá, 2. the Tritiyá in the district of Rungpur. It rises in the Kanchanjanga mountain.

TONSE

the Saraju and the Goomti: it flows through Azamgarh and falls into the Ganges. The bank of this river is

TRAVANCORE ...

It formed a part of the ancient Chera or Chela. Travancore, part of Malabar and Coimbatoor formed the ancient country of Chera. Travancore was also called Mallára.

TRIMBAK

ed Tryamvaka, near the source of the Godávari, where the sacred tank called Kusávartta is situated. It contains the temple of the Mahádeo Tryamvakeswara, one of the twelve great Lingas of Mahádeva.

TRIPATI


.. Same as Tirupati.

TRIVENDRUM

Ananta-Padmanábha in Travancore, called from a shrine of Padmanábha. It was visited by Chaitanya.

TRIVENI

I. 1. Muktaveni, 2. Dakshina-Prayága, north of Hugli, where the three rivers Gangá, Jamuná and Saraswati separate and flow in different directions after having flowed unitedly from Allahabad, which is therefore called Yuktaveni. II. The junction of the three rivers Jamuna, Chambal and Sindh, between Etawah and Kalpi. III. The junction of the three Cosis, Tamor, Arun and Soon near Náthpur in Purnea.

I. 1. Varáha-giri, 2. Gijjhakuto of the Buddhists, one of the five hills of Rajgir. II. A spur of the Chatushpitha range in Orissa, five miles from Bhuvaneswara. See Assia range.

UDAYAPUR

I. In Hill Tippera: it is one of the 52 Pithas. II. The Panchápsará lake of the Rámáyana is supposed to have been situated in the district of Udayapur, a tributary state in the Chhota-Nagpur division.

UNDES

. 1. Hunadesa, 2. Hátaka where the lake Mánas-sarovara is situated.

VAIGA

The river Kritamálá on which Madura (Dakshina Mathurá) is situated: it rises in the Malaya mountain.

VÁNA RÁJÁ'S GAR 1. Sonitapura of the Harivansa, 2.

Devikota in Gurwal on the bank of the Kedár-Gangá, about six miles from Ushámat and at a short distance from Gupta-Kási, whence Aniruddha, the grandson of Krishna, abducted Ushá, daughter of Rajá Vána.

Vengipattana, the capital of Andhra, situated on the north-west of Elur lake, between the Godávari and the Krishna.

VIJAYANAGARA ...

I. 1. Hámpi, 2. Vidyánagara on the river Tungabhadra, thirty-six miles northwest of Bellari in the Madras presidency. Sayanáchárya or Mádhava, the celebrated commentator of the Vedas, was the minister of Buka Rai, king of Vijayanagara (Thornton and R. C. Dutt). II. 1. Padmávati, 2. Padmapura, 3. Vidyánagara, the birth-place of Bhavabhuti, at the confluence of the Sindh and Párá in Malwa: it was included in the ancient kingdom of Vidarbha,

·VINDHYÄCHAL ...

I. The western part of the Vindhya range from the source of the Nerbuda to the Gulf of Kambay, including the Aravali range, was the Páripátra or Párivátra of the Puráns; the eastern portion from the Bay of Bengal to the source of the Nerbuda, including the hills of Gondwana, was the Riksha Parvata; and the range which joins the Páripátra and the Riksha Parvata, including the portion near Bindhyáchal in the district i of Mirzapur, was called Suktimána. II. Bindhyáchala, seven miles to the southwest of Mirzapur, celebrated for the temple of the goddess Bindubásini, appertained to the ancient city of Pampápura.

VIPULA-GIRI ...

1. Chaityaka-giri, 2. Wepullo of the Buddhists, one of the five hills of Rájgir in the district of Patna.

VISHNUMÁLI ... The river Kesavati in Nepal.

VISHNU-PRAYÁGA At the confluence of the Alakánandá and the Dauli (Dudh-Gangá). It is one of the five (Pancha) Prayágas.

VYPAR ... The river Utpalávati in Tinnivelly.
