The 7th Day of December 1772.

The Committee of Secrecy "appointed to enquire into the State of the *East India* Company; and, for that Purpose, to inspect the Books and Accounts of the said Company; and to report to the House what they find material therein, in respect to the Debts, Credits, and Effects, of the Company, as also to the Management and present Situation of the Company's Affairs; together with their Observations thereupon;"—Have, pursuant to the Instruction given them by the House, proceeded in the First Place to enquire "into the late Proceedings of the said Company, in Relation to the Appointment of Commissioners for superintending and regulating the Company's Affairs at their Presidencies in the *East Indies*:" And find,

THAT the Proposal, for a superintending Commission to regulate the Company's Affairs at their Presidencies in the *East Indies*, first began in the Committee of Correspondence of the said Company, upon the 29th of July 1772; when the said Committee having taken into their most serious Consideration the State of the Company's Three Presidencies of *Fort William*, *Fort St. George*, and *Bombay*, and thinking it of the highest Importance that the most vigorous and effectual Measures should be speedily taken to reform the Evils and Abuses subsisting there, resolved unanimously, to recommend to the Court of

Directors, as their Opinion, "That the present State of the Company's Affairs at their said Presidencies do require a superintending Commission with extraordinary Powers."

Which Resolution being, on the 5th Day of August following, laid before a Court of Directors, they agreed with the Committee of Correspondence therein; and then resolved, That a General Court of the Company be summoned to meet on the 12th of August; and that the above-mentioned Resolution be communicated to them for their Confirmation.

And Your Committee further find, That on the said 12th Day of August the said Resolution having been laid before a General Court, and a Motion being there made to agree with the Court of Directors in their Opinion, it was resolved by the General Court, That the further Consideration of the said Motion should be deferred until that Day Seven-night:—on which Day, being the 19th Day of August, the Chairman acquainted the General Court, that in pursuance of their Resolution of the 12th, the Court was met on the further Consideration of the Motion then made "That this Court doth agree with the Court of Directors in their Opinion, That the present State of the Company's Affairs at their Presidencies of *Bengal*, *Fort St. George*, and *Bombay*, doth require a superintending Commission with extraordinary Powers."

And the Court entering upon the further Consideration thereof accordingly;



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It was moved, That an Amendment be made to the said Motion by an Addition as follows;

“ And that it be referred to the Court of Directors to prepare an extraordinary Commission, appoint proper Persons to carry the same into Execution, and report their Proceedings to a General Court:”

And a Debate arising on the said Amendment; and also on a further Amendment of the Word “appoint” to the Word “recommend”;

The Question was put, to agree with the said Amendments,

And upon a Division of the Court, it appeared that there were 103 for the Amendments, and 86 against them.

And it was accordingly resolved, That the said Amendments do stand as Part of the Question proposed; viz.

“ That this Court doth agree with the Court of Directors in their Opinion, That the present State of the Company’s Affairs at their Presidencies of *Bengal*, *Fort St. George*, and *Bombay*, doth require a superintending Commission with extraordinary Powers; and that it be referred to the Court of Directors to prepare an extraordinary Commission, recommend proper Persons to carry the same into Execution, and report their Proceedings to a General Court:”

And the same being so declared from the Chair;

The further Debate on the Question, so amended, was adjourned to that Day Sevensnight;—on which Day, being the 26th Day of August, the said General Court having amended the said Question, by leaving out the Words “an extraordinary” and inserting the Word “such” instead thereof; it was resolved, That the Question, so amended, should be put by the Ballot on the 2d Day of September, and the Determination thereof be reported to the General Court the same Evening.

And Your Committee find, That on the said 2d Day of September, upon the Report of the Ballot on the said Question, there were 331 Votes for the Question, and 146 against it.

And Your Committee find, That at a Court of Directors, held on the 22d Day of the same Month September, it was ordered, That it be referred to a Committee of the whole Court, to consider of what is necessary to be done in consequence of the Resolution of the General Court of the 2d Instant; viz.

“ That the present State of the Company’s Affairs at their Presidencies of *Bengal*, *Fort St. George*, and *Bombay*, doth require a superintending Commission with extraordinary Powers; and that it be referred to the Court of Directors to prepare such Commission, recommend proper Persons to carry the same into Execution, and report their Proceedings to a General Court;” and to report their Opinion thereon, from Time to Time, to the Court of Directors.

And Your Committee observe, That at a Committee of the whole Court, upon the 24th Day of the same Month September, the Question was proposed, “ That the Committee do consider of the Regulations necessary to put a Stop to the Evils complained of in *India*, prior to going into the Commission:”

And the said Question was put by the Ballot, and passed in the Negative.

And then the said Committee adjourned the further Consideration of the said Reference to Tuesday the 29th of the same Month;—on which Day the Committee having deliberated on the Nature and Extent of the Powers to be delegated by the intended Commission, and under what Title the Persons constituted to execute such Powers should act, whether as a Select Committee, with the like Authorities as had been granted to such Committees, or as Commissioners according to the late Appointment in 1769; it was resolved, on a Question

put by the Ballot, “ That a superintending Commission be appointed for the Regulation of the Company’s Affairs in the *East Indies*.”

And the said Committee of the whole Court then proceeding to consider of the Number of Gentlemen, of which it would be most proper, and conducive to obtain the Ends thereby proposed, that the said Commission should consist; it was, after a very attentive Deliberation, unanimously resolved, “ that the superintending Commission do consist of Nine Persons, Six whereof to be sent from hence, and the other Three to consist of the Governor, Secretary in Council, and Commander in Chief.”

And the said Committee then agreed to adjourn, till the 6th of October, the Consideration of the Powers proper to be granted by the said Commission; and ordered, that, in the mean Time, each Director be furnished with a Copy of the Commission and Instructions given to the Commissioners appointed in 1769.

And on the said 6th Day of October, the said Committee of the whole Court taking into Consideration the Powers proper to be granted;

And *Charles Sayer*, Esquire, the Company’s Standing Counsel, having accordingly prepared a Draft of a Commission for that Purpose, the same was read: And it being proposed that the Opinions of the Attorney and Solicitor General should be taken on the said Draft; it passed in the Negative:—Then the Draft being again read, and maturely considered Clause by Clause, several Amendments made thereto, and the Blanks filled up, the further Consideration of the said Draft was adjourned to the 8th of October;—on which Day it was again read, with Mr. *Sayer*’s Approval, and Opinion that it is legal; and it was then agreed, That the Opinions also of Mr. *Wallace*, Mr. *Skyrner*, and Mr. *Jackson*, be taken, “ If the said Commission is legal; and if not, wherein it is illegal?”

And the said Committee of the whole Court ordered Copies of the former superintending Commission, dated the 15th Day of September 1769, and of the Opinions of the honourable Mr. *York*, and of the then Attorney General Sir *William De Grey*, on the Legality of that Commission, to be sent to the above Three Gentlemen.

And Your Committee find, That on the 14th of October, at a further Meeting of the Committee of the whole Court of Directors, a Motion was made, “ That it is the Opinion of this Committee of the whole Court, That it will be highly for the Interest of the *East India Company*, that the Commissioners, now to be sent out with extraordinary Powers to *India*, should consist of Six Directors, to be chosen by Ballot out of the present Direction, and the Direction of last Year;” the Debate on which Motion was adjourned to the 21st of the said Month;—on which Day the said Debate was resumed; and the Motion, on the Question being put thereon by the Ballot, passed in the Negative.

And the said Committee of the whole Court then entering upon the Consideration of the Persons proper to be nominated for the Execution of the said Commission to be sent from hence; and the Chairman proposing Lieutenant General *Robert Monckton* to be one of the Commissioners; and the Question being put, to proceed to the Election of the Candidates One by One by the Ballot, it passed in the Negative:—And the Committee, on a Motion, then agreed to adjourn to Friday next, and to submit to the Court of Directors then to proceed to the Choice of Six Commissioners agreed to be appointed here, from Lists to be made out of the whole Number of Candidates, in the same Manner that Lists are annually formed of Candidates for the Direction.

And Your Committee find, That at a Court of Directors, on the 23d Day of the same Month of October, the Court entered upon the Consideration of the Choice

of proper Persons, to be recommended to the General Court, to be sent from hence, to carry into Execution the superintending Commission, with extraordinary Powers, proposed to be sent to the *East Indies*:

And several Gentlemen being nominated for that Purpose, it was resolved by the Ballot, That Lieutenant General *Robert Monckton*, *Edward Wheeler*, Esquire, *William Devaynes*, Esquire, *Peter Lascelles*, Esquire, and *Daniel Wyer*, Esquire, be Five of the Persons to be recommended to the General Court: And there appearing an Equality of Votes in Behalf of *Benjamin Langlois*, Esquire, and *George Cuming*, Esquire; the same was determined, by drawing Lots in the usual Manner prescribed by the Company's Charter, That *George Cuming*, Esquire, be the other Person recommended to the General Court: And the Recommendation of the Six Gentlemen was declared accordingly.

And Your Committee find, That at a General Court of Proprietors, held on the 29th Day of October, the Court of Directors reported all their Proceedings had, respecting the said Commission; and the Draft of the Commission prepared by the Court of Directors was then read,—and the further Consideration of the said Report was postponed till that Day Fortnight; and the said Draft of the Commission was ordered to be printed for the Use of the Proprietors.

And at the next General Court, held the 12th Day of November, the Court entered upon the Consideration of the said Draft; and some Objection being taken to the adding “the Governor, Second in Council, and “the Commander in Chief for the Time being,” in the Manner as in the said Commission is mentioned; it was resolved, “That it be referred to the Court of Directors to fill up the Blanks in the said Draft, and insert such further Clauses as shall appear necessary; and that the further Consideration of the said Commission, with such Alterations, be postponed to Tuesday next the 17th of the same Month November:” —On which Day, at the said General Court, the Draft of the said amended Commission was read, together with the Opinions of *James Wallace*, *Richard Jackson*, and *Charles Sayer*, Esquires, “That the same, as it now stands altered, is legal, and warranted by the Constitution of the Company:”—And the Court entering upon the Consideration of the said amended Draft; it was moved, That the Opinions of the Attorney and Solicitor General be taken upon the Legality of the said Commission; and was determined, upon a Division, That that Question should not be put: And some Amendments being made to the said Draft, and it being moved to approve thereof as now amended, it was resolved, That the Question on the said Motion be put on the Ballot, on Tuesday the 19th, and reported to the General Court the same Evening:—And it appears, that on the Ballot taken on the said 19th Day of November, there were 233 Votes for the Question, and 106 against it.

And at a General Court of Proprietors, held on the Day following, it was resolved to meet on the 24th Day of the same Month November, to consider of the Nomination of the superintending Commissioners for the *East Indies*;—on which Day it being moved, That the Court doth approve of the Resolution of the Court of Directors, of Persons proper to fill and execute the superintending Commission to be sent to *India*; it was resolved, That the Question be put by the Ballot, upon the 27th Day of the same Month; and reported to the General Court the same Evening:—And the said Ballot having been taken accordingly; it appeared by the Report made by the Scrutineers, that there were 209 Votes for the Question, and 188 against it.

And it further appears to Your Committee, That the aforesaid Resolution having been notified to the several Persons so chosen, they had severally, by Letter, signified their Acceptance of such Appointment.

Your Committee then enquired whether any Proceedings had been had, either in the Court of Directors or in any Committee of the said Court, concerning any Allowances to be made to the Supervisors; or whether any Estimate had been made relative to Expences likely to be incurred by the Commission; and, upon inspecting the Minutes of the said Court, and of their Committees, they did not find any Proceedings relative thereto; but having asked the Chairman of the said Company, what he knew of any Intention with respect to the Salaries and Allowances to be made to the present Supervisors? he said, There was nothing fixed of that Sort; but that it was mentioned in the Court of Directors, that the Salaries were to be paid in the *East Indies*, instead of being paid in *England*, as the Salaries of the last Supervisors were; and that when the Number was encreased from Three to Six, it was suggested in Argument, by those who made that Motion, that the whole Expence might be paid out of the Savings of *Mahomed Reza Cawn's* and the Ministers Stipends:

And being asked, Whether any Thing was said, as to the Amount of the Salaries? he said, He believed Gentlemen mentioned the Salaries given to the last Supervisors: And he further added, That their Expences were to be borne in like Manner as was settled with respect to the last Supervisors.

And the Deputy Chairman being asked the same Question, respecting the Salaries and Allowances, said, They had come to no Resolution yet; but the last Supervisors having had £. 10,000 a Year each Man, to be paid here in *England*, he believed it was intended to annex the same Salaries to the present Supervisors, but to be paid in *India*, out of Savings there; and he confirmed what the Chairman had said, That their Expences were to be borne in the same Manner as was settled with respect to the former Supervisors: But they both said, That no additional Allowance was to be made to the Three Commissioners Abroad.

And having been asked, Whether, if the Savings arising in Manner above-mentioned were not employed to defray the Charges of this Commission, such Savings would not go to the Company's Cash? they answered, Undoubtedly Yes.

And the Deputy Chairman being asked, Whether any Period was fixed for the Execution of the last Commission? he said, It was understood it would be finished in about Three Years—and he added, That it was expected the present Commission would make other large Savings Abroad.

Your Committee having been thus referred to what was settled with respect to the Salaries and Allowances made to the Supervisors appointed in the Year 1769, as the Rule by which they were to judge of the Expences of the present intended Commission, they thought it their Duty to enquire what the said Salaries and Allowances were; and they find, That by Agreement entered into with Messrs. *Vanfittart*, *Scrafton*, and *Ford*, they were each of them to have £. 10,000 per Annum, to be paid in *London* every Six Months; the First Payment to be made at the Expiration of the First Six Months after their Departure from *England*, and to continue till the Expiration of Six Months after they should receive Notice to leave *India*; and were moreover to be allowed all Expences of their Table, travelling in *India*, their Passage Home, and all other reasonable Expences, in or about the Execution of the Trust.

And Your Committee also find, That a Clerk was appointed to the said Commission, with £. 500 per Annum Salary; and a Chaplain, to be paid as usual to Chaplains in *Bengal*; viz. about £. 300 per Annum.

And Your Committee find, That the Company actually paid the Sum of £. 34,066. 7s. on Account of the said Commission; as appears by the Paper hereunto annexed.



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Your Committee, for the further Information of the House, think proper to annex to this Report, Copies of the several Drafts of the Commission now intended by the Company to be carried into Execution, with the several Opinions of Counsel taken thereon.

And as the Committee of the Court of Directors ordered to be sent to their Counsel, who were to give their Opinions on the Legality of the said Drafts, Copies of the superintending Commission in 1769, and of the

Opinions of the honourable Mr. York and of Sir William De Grey, the then Attorney General, on the Legality thereof, Your Committee think it right also to annex to this Report a Copy of the said Commission and Opinions.

Your Committee are now proceeding in their Enquiry with respect to the Debts, Credits, and Effects of the Company, and will report thereupon with all possible Dispatch.

Memorandum: This Draft was read in the Committee of the whole Court the 6th and 8th October 1772; read and approved in the Court of Directors the 28th, and read in the General Court of Proprietors 29th October 1772.

The United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, to all to whom these Presents shall come, send greeting. Know ye, That the said United Company, for divers weighty Motives and Considerations, finding it necessary and expedient to delegate such Powers as are hereinafter mentioned and contained, and having especial Trust and Confidence in the Justice, Fidelity, Prudence, and Abilities of

have made, ordained, constituted, authorized, and appointed, and by these Presents do make, ordain, constitute, authorize, and appoint, them, the said

or any Five of them (notwithstanding any Powers by the said United Company, or their Court of Directors, given or granted to their Presidents and Council, or to their Select Committee, or any of them, at any of their Settlements or Presidencies in India) to be Commissioners in all Cases and at all Times, during the Continuance of these Presents, when and wheresoever the said

or any Five of them, shall think necessary and expedient, to superintend, direct, controul, conduct, manage, and transact (subject nevertheless to the Limitations, Restrictions, and Qualifications, hereinafter expressed) all the Business and Affairs of the said United Company in and through all Parts of India, during the Good-will and Pleasure of the said United Company (reserving nevertheless, and always excepted out of this Commission, all the legal Judicature, and all Courts of Civil and Criminal Jurisdiction, and Courts Martial, in India, granted or established by any Act of Parliament,

or by any Royal Charter or Charters, and all Powers and Authorities to them or any of them belonging or appertaining): And for carrying into full and complete Execution the Purposes and Intentions of the said United Company, they do by these Presents give and grant unto the said

or any Five of them, shall seem fitting and necessary, for carrying into Execution the Purposes intended by these Presents. Provided nevertheless, and it is the true Intent

Intent and Meaning of the said United Company, that if any of the said Company's Presidents or Council, at any of their respective Settlements, shall be removed or dismissed by Virtue of these Presents, the said Commissioners, or any Five of them, shall fill up and supply such Office or Offices immediately, and not suffer the same to remain vacant: And the said United Company do hereby further give and grant full Power and Authority unto the said

or any Five of them, in all Cases, and at all Times, during the Continuance of these Presents, when and wheresoever the said

or any Five of them, shall think necessary and expedient, to superintend, inspect, manage, order, direct, and conduct, all Affairs, Matters, and Things, which in anywise relate to, or concern, the said United Company's Duancee or Revenues in *India*, or any of them, or their Trade or Investments there, and to put the same, and the Collection, Management, and Accounts touching or concerning the same, on such Footing and Conditions as to them the said

or any Five of them, shall seem just and necessary: And the said United Company do hereby further give and grant unto the said,

or any Five of them, full Power and Authority in all Cases, and at all Times, during the Continuance of these Presents, when and wheresoever the said

or any Five of them, shall think necessary and expedient, to collect and recover all Debts and Demands due or owing to the said United Company in *India*, upon any Account whatsoever, and to give and sign full Receipts and Acquittances for the same, with full Power to compromise or compound any such Debts or Demands, and to settle all Accounts and Differences touching or concerning the same; and to that End and Purpose, in the Name, or on the Behalf of the said United Company, by due Course of Law, to sue for the same; and generally to transact, perform, and do all such Acts, Deeds, Matters, and Things, and to use and exercise all such Powers and Authorities, as are incident or necessary for carrying these Presents into Execution, and for correcting all Abuses, and obtaining the necessary Reformation in the State of the Company's Affairs, as well Civil as Military, throughout *India*, (except as before excepted, respecting the Judicature, and Civil and Criminal Jurisdiction, and Courts Martial, in *India*) in as full and ample Manner, to all Intents and Purposes, as the said United Company could or might or can do, by Virtue of any Powers or Authorities in them vested, or to them belonging or appertaining. Provided always, and the said United Company do by these Presents intend and require, that, notwithstanding the full and ample Powers and Authorities herein contained, the said

and every of them, shall be subservient to, and obey and fulfil, all such Orders, Rules, and Instructions, as, at the Time of passing this Instrument, or at any Time hereafter, during the Existence or Continuance of these Presents, shall be given, imparted, or transmitted to the said Commissioners, or any Five of them, by or from the Court of Directors of the said United Company for the Time being, or any Thirteen of them. And lastly, the said United Company do hereby further strictly enjoin and command all and every their Presidents, Councils, Factors, Agents, and Servants, as well Civil as Military, and of whatever Rank or Denomination, to obey and fulfil the Orders and Instructions of the said Commissioners, or any Five of them; and also to be aiding and assisting, to the utmost of their Power, in enabling the said Commissioners, or any Five

of them, fully and effectually to carry these Presents, and the Powers herein contained, into Execution.—In Witness, &c.

I have perused the intended Commission from the *India* Company, to those who are to be intrusted with the Superintendance and principal Conduct of the Company's Trade, Revenues, and Concerns in *India*; to which I see no Objection in Point of Law, as I do not find it repugnant to, or inconsistent with, any Act of Parliament respecting the Company or its Trade, or any of the Charters granted to the Company, according to my Recollection of them; but as I have not any Copies of the Charters to refer to, my Opinion in this Respect is founded on my Memory, which is by no Means so perfect upon the Subject as to rely upon; if any of the Powers in the intended Commission should be repugnant to the Charters, they are void, for it is not competent to the Company to contravene the Powers or Regulations prescribed by their Charters:—The Company have, as I conceive, for effecting the Purposes of their Institution, an incidental Power to appoint Agents to superintend the Management of all their Concerns, with Authorities of Appointment, Controll, Suspension, and Dismission, of all other Agents or Servants, of whatever Distinction or Denomination, belonging to the Company.

Mr. Jackson's Opinion is desired, Whether this Commission is legal; and if not, wherein it is illegal?

I have perused and considered this Draught; and am of Opinion, from the best Recollection I have of the *East India* Company's Charters, the Charter of Justice, and the several Acts of Parliament relating to the Company, that the Commission (if expedient) is legal and warranted by the Constitution of the Company, unless it be in that it enables the Commissioners to exercise, not only all such Powers and Authorities as are incident or necessary for carrying those Presents into Execution, but also such as are necessary for correcting Abuses, and obtaining Reformation of the Company's Affairs, in as full and ample Manner as the said United Company could, or might, or can do, by virtue of any Powers or Authorities in them vested, or to them belonging.

Upon those general Expressions I entertain Doubts; because, though the Company may delegate its executive Powers (nay must delegate those to be exercised in *India*) I do not think they can legally delegate any Part of their legislative Powers; which yet are included among the Powers and Authorities vested in the Company, that may be necessary for correcting Abuses.

The United Company of Merchants of *England* trading to the *East Indies*, to all to whom these Presents shall come, send greeting. Know ye, That the said

United Company, for divers weighty Motives and Considerations, finding it necessary and expedient to delegate such Powers as are hereinafter mentioned and contained, and having especial Trust and Confidence in the Justice, Fidelity, Prudence, and Abilities, of A. B. and C. have made, ordained, constituted, authorized, and appointed, and by these Presents do make, ordain, constitute, authorize, and appoint, them the said A. B. and C. and during the Continuance of these Presents, a Difference of Opinion upon any Measure to be pursued in the Execution of the Powers and Authorities herein contained, shall happen to arise between the Survivors of the said Commissioners, then, and in every such Case, the Opinion of such One of the said Two surviving Commissioners, who is first named in this present Instrument, shall be decisive and conclusive; but it is nevertheless hereby ordained, that the other surviving Commissioner shall be at liberty, and he is hereby required, to enter his Dissent, with his Reasons in Writing, to every such Measure, in respect whereof any such Difference of Opinion shall have arisen or happened. Provided also, and the said United Company do by these Presents intend and require, that notwithstanding the full and ample Powers and Authorities herein contained, the said A. B. and C. and every of them, shall be subservient to, and obey and fulfil, all such Orders, Rules, and Instructions, as at the Time of passing this Instrument, or at any Time hereafter, during the Existence or Continuance of these Presents, shall be given, imparted, or transmitted, to the said A. B. and C. or the Survivors or Survivor of them, by or from the Court

of Directors of the said United Company for the Time being, or any Thirteen of them. This Commission being intended for the Reformation of Abuses in a distant Country, the Powers given by it must, from the Nature of the Proposition, be general, and restrained only by Reference to *Special Instructions*, in some Matters given to the Commissioners, who are Gentlemen esteemed worthy by the Company to be entrusted with such large discretionary Powers. But the Authority conveyed by this Instrument neither directs, nor will enable, the Commissioners to violate any of the Royal Charters or Statutes, on which the Rights, Franchises, and Constitution, of the Company depend: All such Acts will be inconsistent with the plain Words and meaning of the Commission, and will of themselves be void in Law. The Effect of it is to enable the Commissioners to controul the Execution of such temporary and revocable Powers as have flowed merely from the Court of Directors, or from the General Court, by superseding (if they shall think fit) Acts done in *India* by virtue of those Powers, or by displacing corrupt and insufficient Officers, or by assuming into their own Hands, in the several Settlements of the Company, for a convenient Time, and in particular Instances, the ordinary Powers of Management. As to the Civil and Criminal Jurisdiction of the Courts of Justice, or Courts Martial, or the Laws by which they decide, I am of Opinion that this Commission does not authorize, nor can justify, the least Infringement of them.

Copy of the Attorney General's Letter to Lord Weymouth, dated 17th September 1769.

In obedience to your Lordship's Commands, signified to me by your Letter, bearing Date the Fourteenth of this Instant September, and enclosing a Copy of the Commission for the Gentlemen appointed by the *East India Company* to superintend their Affairs in *India*, as amended by Mr. Yorke, Mr. Sayer, and myself; and informing me that His Majesty thinks it proper, in order to prevent Mistakes, and to satisfy the Forms of Office, that you should ask me, Whether the enclosed is a Copy of the Commission which has been amended by Mr. Yorke, Mr. Sayer, and myself; and whether, as it now stands, and is meant to operate, I think it free from those Difficulties, in point of Law, which I thought the former Commission was not free from?

I have caused the said Copy of the Commission to be compared with the Draft of the Commission amended by Mr. Yorke, Mr. Sayer, and myself, at a Meeting had at the Request of the Company; and I find it to be the same, except in One or Two immaterial Instances; and as it now stands, and is meant to operate, I think it is free from those Difficulties, in point of Law, which occurred to me upon perusing the Commission before it was so altered, except that the Commissioners thus appointed will not, as I conceive, be subject to such Inquiries, Trial, and Punishment, as the Legislature have

thought fit to make the Presidents and Council of the India Company subject to by the Statutes of the 27 G. II. and the First of His present Majesty, although I apprehend that a Civil Action may be maintained against them by the common Law, for any Injury done by them to a private Subject.—It likewise appears to me, that if the Commissioners shall act conformably to the Intention of the Commission, in not keeping the

Offices of Presidents and Council vacant longer than shall be necessary, there will be no reasonable Ground to apprehend any Obstruction to the Courle of Judicature, or to Courts Martial.

The Committee of Secrecy, appointed to enquire into the State of the *East India* Company; and for that Purpose to inspect the Books and Accounts of the said Company; and to report to the House what they find material therein, in respect to the Debts, Credits, and Effects, of the Company, as also to the Management and present Situation of the Company's Affairs, together with their Observations thereupon:—

HAVING finished their Inquiries into the special Matters referred to them, by the Instruction of the House, of the 30th Day of November, proceeded in the next Place, in pursuance of the Order of the House, to state the Debts, Credits, and Effects, of the said Company; and, as these are dispersed in different Parts of the World, they thought it would contribute to a more clear and perfect Knowledge of the Company's Affairs, if they distinguished such of their Debts, Credits, and Effects, as are in *England*, from such as are now Abroad, at their Presidencies in *India*, in *China*, at *Saint Helena*, and floating on the Sea.

And Your Committee thought it right in stating the Debts, Credits, and Effects, of the Company in *England*, to begin by stating an Account of the Cash in the Company's Treasury, on the First Day of December 1772, being the Day on which they entered on this

Inquiry, and of such Sums as the Company expect to avail themselves of, from the Produce of their present Sale, and of all other Sums which they will be entitled to receive, before the 2d Day of March 1773, being the Day on which their next Sale will probably begin; and to state, per Contra, on the Debit Side of the Account, all Demands upon the Company in *England* already due, and such others as will become due before the said 2d Day of March, of which Day Your Committee have made Choice for the final Period to this first Part of their State of the Company's Affairs in *England*, as the Company will then have received the principal Payments for Goods sold in their present Sale: And this first Account may therefore be properly considered as the Cash Account of the said Company.

And in the next Place, Your Committee have stated the Remainder of the Company's Effects and Credits in *England*, and, per Contra, all other Debts of the Company, which will not become due till after the said 2d Day of March 1773.

And Your Committee having thus finished a State of the Company's Debts, Credits, and Effects, in *England*; they proceeded to state a like Account of the Debts, Credits, and Effects, of the Company Abroad, at their Presidencies in *India*, in *China*, at *Saint Helena*, and floating on the Sea.

Your Committee find that the *East India* Company have been accustomed to borrow these Loans of the Bank, from 2 Months to 2 Months; and Mr. *Tooke*, the Deputy Accountant of the *East India* Company, informed Your Committee, that, as far as his Knowledge goes, these Loans have hitherto been discharged out of the Produce of the Sales that were making at the Time of borrowing the same. Your Committee find, That the Company have, for the most Part, regularly paid their Debts under these Two Articles, and are not now more than usual in Arrear.

Your Committee find in the annual Account of the Company, a Claim on the Public for Hospital Expences for His Majesty's Troops on the Coast of *Coromandel*, in the last War; an Account of which was delivered to the Commissioners of the Treasury the 12th of June 1770; but it appears by a Minute of the Treasury Board of

Your Committee find, That nearly Three Fourths of the Value of the Goods remaining in the Warehouses is Tea, being in Weight 16,811,391 lb. which is supposed to be almost sufficient for Three Years Consumption. The Remainder of the Goods in the Warehouse, are Piece Goods and Raw Silk from *Bengal*, Salt Pêtre, &c. which latter Articles will be put up in the next Year's Sales.

Another Part of this Debt, to the Amount of £. 105,980, consists of Balances due from the Company's Officers, such as the Custom Master, who collects the Company's Customs, the Collector of their Land Revenues, exclusive of the *Dewanny*, and the Company's Steward: And he esteems this to be a good Debt. Another Part of this Debt, to the Amount of £. 272,478, consists of Balances due from the Renters of the *Dewanny*, in the several Districts of the Province of *Bengal*: This Balance is struck the 30th of April 1771, and is the Balance of the Year ended on that Day. Mr. *Hoole* informed Your Committee, that the Company's Servants had proposed to the Court of Directors to write off Sixteen Lack and 83,876 of *sicca* Rupees, being the Balance of the preceding Year, and which he has therefore not included in this Account: And he supposes that the Company's Servants in *Bengal* still consider this Arrear of £. 272,478 as a Debt to be recovered.

and Canvas, Stationary for the Factory, and European Goods for the Use of the Factory; and that what is here charged is an Estimate of what was actually there on the 31 of March 1772, and is a very perfect Valuation according to the European Prices—And that the Military Stores at Bengal consist of Musquets, and all other Stores of a Military Nature, actually in Magazine there, exclusive of those out in Service. He thinks that neither the Value of Guns on the Ramparts, nor any other Ordnance, is included in this Account—And that all in general are valued according to the European Prices.

Mr. Hoole gave the same Evidence with respect to these Stores, as he did with respect to those at Bengal, except that the Guns on the Ramparts are included in this Account.

Mr. Hoole again gave the same Evidence with respect to the Stores at Bombay and Bencoolen, as he did with respect to those at Bengal; and he is certain that the Guns on the Ramparts are not included in the Value of the Military Stores of these Prefidencies.

Your Committee find, by the Evidence of Mr. Hoole, That the Company's Vessels in India are valued according to the Prime Cost there, and that at Fort St. George, not only the Value of the Prime Cost of the Vessels is included, but also of all the Stores that have been supplied to them, which has sometimes made the Value of a Vessel amount to Double the Prime Cost of her Building:

Your Committee have not included in the above Account, any Valuation of the Fortifications and Buildings of the Company Abroad.—They are far from thinking that the same ought not to be considered as of great Use and Value to the Company in carrying on their Commerce, and protecting their several Settlements: But, they can by no Means agree in Opinion with the Court of Directors, who, by their Minutes of the 27th of April 1769, ordered, "That the Amount of the Fortifications, &c. should again be added to the annual Statement, to be made up in June 1769." And Your Committee find, That such Amount was added to the said Account, made up in June 1769, and has been added in all the annual Accounts made up since that Period; and that in the last annual Account, made up on the 1st of July 1772, there is included, in consequence of such Order of the Court of Directors, under the Article of Factory at *Bengal*, the Sum of 191 Lack and 54,558 Current Rupees, which, at 2 s. 3 d. each, amount to the Sum of £. 2,154,888; which Sum, by a Memorandum at the Foot of the said Account, is stated to be the Amount of what had been then expended for Fortifications, Buildings, &c. at *Bengal*.

Your Committee having no Rule by which they can form any Judgment of the real Value of this Part of the Company's Effects, can only state to the House what they find in the Company's Books and Accounts concerning them: And it appears to Your Committee, that in all the annual Accounts from the Year 1732, which is the first Year in which any annual Sum was made up, the Sum of £. 400,000 has been charged under the Head of Dead Stock; which appears to Your Committee to be for the Dead Stock Abroad only, as there is another Article charged, in every such annual Account, for *East India* House and Warehouses, to the Amount of from £. 25,000 to £. 40,000.

Your Committee find, That in the annual Account 1765, £. 300,000 was deducted from the Quick Stock Account of *Fort William*.

And that, in the annual Account 1766, the said Sum of £. 300,000, together with £. 30,000 more, was deducted from the Quick Stock Account of *Fort William*.

And that, in the annual Account 1767, the same Sum of £. 330,000 was deducted from the Quick Stock Account of *Fort William*.

And Your Committee find, That in the General Letter of the Court of Directors, dated the 16th of March 1768, to the President and Council of *Bengal*; the Directors ordered, that the Dead Stock consisting of Forts, Buildings, and Works, and their Appurtenances, should have no Place in the Quick Stock.

And Your Committee find, That in the annual Account of 1769, the Amount of Fortifications, &c. was again added under the Head of Factory at *Bengal*, by Order of the Court of Directors in the Manner before mentioned: And that the Court of Directors have continued to add the said Amount, and all additional Charges for Fortifications, Buildings, &c. in all their annual Accounts made up since that Period.

Your Committee have annexed the Account which was laid before them relative to the above Matters.

Extract of the Letter from the Nabob of Arcot to the Court of Directors, dated the 20th March 1772.

EVERY Demand hitherto made on me by your Governor and Council, I have fully paid, though I could not prevail on them to give me my Accounts till very lately, and even those are wrote in such a Manner, that neither I nor any of my People can well understand them: However, from the Beginning of my Transactions to the End of October 1771, there is not a Daum due from me to the Company: The Governor and Council in December 1769 thought proper to charge to my Account Ten Lacks of Pagodas as my Share of the Expence of the *Mysore* War; they have frequently mentioned in their Letters to me, that I acknowledged this as just Debt, and promised to pay it; and I understand from your Letters, that they had been at great Pains to write in the same Manner to *England*: In the *Mysore* War I expended large Sums, as I maintained the whole Army, paid the Expence of the Troops, as well as those employed in the War, as in the Defence of the *Carnatic* at the Time: By what Management then could the extraordinary Expences amount to such a Sum? This is the Sense I have always had of the Agreement I entered into with the Governor and Council in 1768, That I was to be put in Possession of the conquered Country, out of the Revenues of which the whole Expence of the War was to have been paid:

The Event of the War is well known, and in every one Article the Governor and Council failed on their Part, even in such as I esteemed essential to my Honour as well as to my Interest, and that of my Country. I desire you to consider this Matter well, and am certain that you will then see this Matter in the Light I do; and I appeal to yourselves, whether you think it probable I ever could be brought voluntarily to acknowledge this Demand as a just Debt in such Circumstances.

I have nothing so much at Heart as endeavouring by every Means to make my Friendship with the Company stronger and stronger, and therefore in my last Letter by the Ship *Lord North*, I told you, that the next Ship should bring you Accounts of my Friendship, that you might set your Minds at Ease. What is Money to me without your Friendship? or what Sum can equal the Value I have for you? Therefore, since you have been told that I would pay you Ten Lacks of Pagodas, I now tell you, that out of pure Friendship, and merely as the Result of my own free Will and Choice, I will, in Time of Peace and Tranquillity, pay to my Friends the *East India* Company Ten Lacks of Pagodas: I ask nothing in Return but your Friendship, which I doubt not you will readily grant.

The 9th of February 1773.

The Committee of Secrecy, appointed to “ enquire into the State of the *East India* Company, and for that Purpose to inspect the Books and Accounts of the said Company, and to report to the House what they find material therein, in respect to the Debts, Credits, and Effects of the Company, as also to the Management and present Situation of the Company’s Affairs, together with their Observations thereupon;—”

HAVING made their Report of what they found material with respect to the Debts, Credits, and Effects of the Company, proceeded, in pursuance of another Part of the aforesaid Order, to enquire into the Situation of the Company’s Affairs; and first, with respect to the Profits, which the Company derive from their Commerce, or from the Territorial Acquisitions, lately obtained in the *East Indies*: And as such of the Company’s Profits, as they are able to realize in *England*, are the only Fund, out of which any Dividend can be made to the Proprietors of the said Company, or any Payment to the Public, Your Committee thought it right, in the first Place, to endeavour to shew to the House, what those Profits appear to have been. And Your Committee having enquired, in what Manner any Part of the Revenues arising from the said Territorial Acquisitions have hitherto been remitted from the Countries where they are collected, they find, that Part of the said Revenues have been remitted from one Presidency to another, and to *China*, in Cash, and by Bills, as well as by Goods; but that no Part of them have hitherto been remitted to *England*, except by Means of the Company’s Investments; and consequently that the Profits which the Company have received from the said Revenues, are included in the Produce of their Sales. In order therefore to shew the Profits which the Company have derived from their Commerce, or from the Revenues aforesaid, as far as the same have been realized in *England*, Your Committee will begin by stating to the House an Account of the Produce of the Company’s Sales, and their other Receipts, and of their Payments in *England*, for Ten Years, distinguishing each Year, and of what was owing by the Company in *England* at the End of each of the said Years. And in the next Place, Your Committee will state the Amount of what has been received from the Revenues arising from the said Territorial Acquisitions, and of all other Receipts, at the several Presidencies, and at *Saint Helena*; and, per Contra, of all Charges and Disbursements there, and also of the Receipts of the Company in *China*,

and of all Disbursements there, for Ten Years, distinguishing each Year; and they will state this Account under such Heads, as will best enable the House to judge in what Manner, and to what Degree, these Revenues have contributed to the Profits of the Company in *England*.

And, in stating the annual Account of the Produce of the Company’s Sales, and their other Receipts, and of their Payments, and of the Debts of the Company in *England*, at the End of each Year, Your Committee will consider every Year as ending on the First Day of March; as on that Day the Company have generally received all Payments arising from the Produce of the Sales of March and September preceding; and as all Charges and Expences for the Outfits of the ensuing Season are then for the most Part incurred; and further, as all Ships of the preceding Season are generally then arrived, and no Ship of the ensuing Season is yet arrived; so that the Company’s Affairs are then in such a Situation, as to make this Period the most proper at which to state the Balance in favour or against the Company, on their Affairs in each Year in *England*. And Your Committee will add at the Foot of the Credit Side of every annual Account, the Value of the Goods then remaining in the Company’s Warehouses in *England*, in order to shew in what Proportion they have increased or diminished their Stock in *England*, during each respective Period.

Your Committee expected to find in the Books of the Company some Account similar to that, which they now intend to state; by which they might be able to judge of the disposeable Money in *England*, belonging to the Company, at the End of each Year: But, upon Enquiry, it does not appear that any such Account has been kept in the Books of the Company. Under this Difficulty it was necessary to collect these Accounts from a Variety of dispersed Materials; and it employed the Servants of the Company (whom Your Committee found very intelligent and industrious in their several Stations) more than six Weeks to prepare them in the Manner in which Your Committee now report them to the House.—And Your Committee find, by the following TEN ACCOUNTS, prepared by their Direction, by *Ranceford Tookey*, Esquire, Deputy Accomptant to the said Company, That the Produce of the Company’s Sales, and their other Receipts, and their Payments in *England* for the Ten Years ending on the First Day of March 1772, and what was owing by the Company at the End of each Year, were as followeth; viz.

Your Committee think proper to observe, That in the Course of these Ten Years the Teas remaining in the Company's Warehouses belonging to the Buyers, increased from Eight hundred Ninety-two thousand and Four hundred Pounds, to Five million Three hundred Ninety-five thousand Eight hundred and Eighty Pounds: These Teas, though remaining in the Warehouses, were paid for in course, and are therefore properly made a Part of the Produce of each Year's Sales; but as it is evident that these Sales have exceeded the Consumption, and as this Quantity of Surplus Tea must necessarily operate to the Diminution of future Sales, a Deduction must be made on these Accounts in any Estimate to be

formed of the Produce of future Sales, on an Average of the Sales for the last Ten Years.

Your Committee having thus stated an Account of the Produce of the East India Company's Sales, and their other Receipts, and of their Payments in England for Ten Years, viz. from the 1st Day of March 1762, to the 1st Day of March 1772, and of their Debts at the End of each Year; they will now proceed to state an Account of what has been received by the Company from the Revenues arising from the Territorial Acquisitions lately obtained in the East Indies, and of all other Receipts at the several Presidencies, and at Saint Helena, and, per Contra, of all Charges and Disbursements there,
