The following is a sketch of the formation of the Native artillery of the Bengal army, the whole of which was disbanded after the Mutinies of 1857-58.

Three companies of Golandaz or Native artillerymen were raised by the Nawab of Oudh in 1776, and in the following year were transferred to the Company's service, and were commanded by Major Patrick Duff. These in 1778 were increased to three battalions, and became a separate brigade. The whole were, however, except one company, reduced in 1779. Three more companies were raised in 1782, but these, together with the former one, were finally reduced in 1785.

Golandaz were again raised in 1797, but were not collected into separate companies until 1805, when a corps of five companies was formed. At the same time a corps of 400 "Irregular Golandaz" was formed of Native artillerymen who had come over from the Mahrattas; it was stationed at Delhi and was gradually absorbed.

In 1811 a troop of Native horse artillery was raised for the expedition to Java, but was reduced on the conclusion of that service.

In 1815 the Golandaz were increased to the number of 16 companies. Two years later a tentative measure was introduced, withdrawing the "Gallopers" from Native cavalry regiments and forming them into three troops of Native horse artillery; this arrangement was made permanent in 1819 (G. O. C. C., May 1st).

The Native artillery so formed remained with some modification until 1857. In 1825 (G.G.O. No. 192) the Native horse artillery was formed into four troops, one with each of the four brigades of horse artillery, while of foot there were to be two battalions of four companies each; the latter was afterwards increased to three battalions of six companies each, and a fifth troop was added to the 1st Brigade.
