Revenue Settlement and Collections of the Madras Presidency for Fasti 1287.—Submitting to Government Board's Report on the —

No. **F,6**84.

The ragi crop, however, did not fail totally in any part of the district. Its average yield was one-fourth to half. Of the later dry crops, cholum was totally destroyed in parts of Trinomalai, Villupuram, Tirukoilur, Kallakurchi, and Virudachalam Taluks by excessive rain, and also by insects. The varagu crop gave a fair yield, more than half the ordinary outturn. The wet cultivation fared much better than in the preceding year.

TANJORE.—The north-east monsoon brought such heavy rain in November and December that much of the standing crops was either submerged or washed away by floods in the northern and south-eastern parts of the district. The standing crops in Pattukotai and parts of Tanjore and Mannargudi also suffered from excess of water besides being injured by blight. The outturn on the whole was below the average.

TRICHINOPOLY.—The loss of crops, both wet and dry, was considerable owing to want of rain in June, July and August. The crops raised after the heavy rains which fell from the end of August till December presented a most luxuriant appearance for a time, but excess of rain in some parts, and locusts and other insects in others, especially in the Perambalur Taluk, caused considerable damage. The average yield of wet crops was five-eighths and that of dry crops three-eighths.

MADURA.—The crops were all soriously injured by blight and rot. Great damage was also caused by locusts, which ravaged the fields and injured the plants. The yield was therefore unsatisfactory, and in some places very scanty, except where the harvest had commenced before the arrival of the locusts. Both cholum and ragi gave no return. The average outturn of rice is estimated at between half and one-eighth, but in some favored localities it was about three-fourths.

TINNEVELLY.—The outturn of the dry crops which promised well proved rather poor, as they were much affected by the continued and excessive rain. What escaped the mischief done by excessive rain, and what remained after a good portion of the food crops had fortunately been reaped in the meantime, was in many villages almost completely destroyed by locusts. The wet crops fared no better. In most parts of the district they were attacked by a sort of fungus, and also by flies and locusts, the yield was far below the average.

COIMBATORE.—The heavy rains in October seriously damaged the crops, and together with a superabundance of insect life, resulted in a very deficient outturn.

NILGIRIS.—The standing crops sustained some damage by the failure of the south-west monsoon, and by the early commencement and late continuance of the north-east monsoon. The season was favorable for tea cultivation, but it was disastrous to chinchona, as the h rk could not be collected to the full extent owing to the dry weather. The season was particularly favorable for coffee in the Ouchterlony Valley, but in other parts it was disastrous. The rainfall of March and April 1877 brought out a heavy blossom which was destroyed by the succeeding drought, and the outturn was unusually light.

SALEM.—The ryots sowed with the early rains of April and May, but as the showers held off in June, July, and August, the crops on the ground perished, except a small portion of the cumboo resuscitated by the later rain of September. The rains of this month and October were favorable for wet crops, which yielded about half a full crop, but the dry crops suffered from excessive or untimely rain in some places and from disease and locusts in others. The produce of ragi and the minor dry cereals was one-eighth to one-half, and that of pulses was not even one-fourth of the return of good years. Thovarai and gram were almost entirely destroyed by excessive rain. The outturn of oil seeds was generally poor; gingelly was completely destroyed in four taluks by the drought of July, and on the whole the yield of dry crops was about three-sixteenths.

SOUTH CANARA.—The outturn of all crops was satisfactory throughout the district, except in parts of the Kandapur Taluk, where the second rice crop was injured to some extent by insects. One good season was not, however, sufficient to enable the gardens to recover from the effects of the drought of the previous year ; hence their produce was on the whole below the average. MALABAR.—The Kannai crops (crops harvested in the month of Kanni, *i.e.*, September and October) were to some extent injured by insufficiency of water just as they were beginning to mature, while a superabundance of rain fell when they were ready to be harvested, and when the seed for the Magarom crop (crop harvested in the month of Magarom, *i.e.*, January and February) was about to be sown. The coccoanut trees, however, were greatly benefited by the rains of October and November.

5. SANITARY CONDITION .- The public health of the Presidency was more unsatis-

factory even than in the preceding year. The ruinously high prices which prevailed placed wholesome food almost out of the reach of the lower classes of the population, and their emaciated condition caused them to succumb readily to ordinary diseases. Cholera prevailed more or less throughout the year, though apparently it was not as fatal as in the earlier stages of the famine; but a fever of a malignant type broke out with extraordinary virulence in all the districts affected by the famine, caused apparently by malaria

generated by the heavy rains that fell after a two years' drought, and the mortality from it was terrible. Small-pox also proved more than ordinarily fatal. The death-rate for the whole Presidency, which according to the mortuary returns was 17.9 per mille of the population in Fasli 1284, 23.2 in Fasli 1285, and 34.2 in Fasli 1286, reached 46.2 in Fasli 1287; the real mortality must have been much higher, as the registration of vital statistics is still very imperfect. The losses of population in the famine districts consequent on increased mortality, and diminished births have been very severe, and the partial census taken in selected tracts about the end of the fasli under "eport showed that in these tracts 483,159 out of a population of 3,554,617 ording to the census of 1871, or nearly 14 per cent., were missing, even without ing any allowance for natural increase since the general census of 1871, the rate such has not yet been determined. Towards the latter end of the fasli, as the sure of the famine became lighter, public health improved. The following stateant shows the mortality in each district as shown by the mortuary returns, but, as ready explained, these returns are very defective ---

6. PRICES OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE.—The average prices of the staple grains during the fasli are compared below with those of the previous fasli as well as with the averages of the last ten years :—

7. The average wholesalc prices of paddy for the whole Presidency, including parts of the country not affected by the famine, were nearly double the ordinary rates, and those of dry grains were considerably higher still. The large advance in prices as compared with those of the preceding fash was due to the unpropitious character of the season in Fash 1287 following so close upon one of unexampled severity and to depletion of food-stocks in the country. Prices, moreover, did not reach famine rates till nearly the middle of Fash 1286, whereas they maintained that level throughout Fash 1287; consequently the average of the latter year is greatly in excess of that of the former.

The subjoined statement shows the average retail prices for the whole Presidency of the principal food-grains in seers of 80 tolas per rupec. It has been compiled from the monthly price returns submitted by Collectors.

The comparison, though useful in ordinary years as indicating the pressure of the existing assessments, is valueless as regards the drought-stricken districts in the abnormal circumstances of the last two years, high prices being of advantage to the ryots only in so far as there is surplus produce to dispose of.

9. RYOTWARI SETTLEMENT.—The Ryotwari settlement is formed by adding to the assessment of the holdings—

- (1) Charge for second crop and
- (2) Water-tax on Ryotwari land,

And deducting therefrom—

- (1) The assessment of waste remitted.
- (2) Other remissions dependent upon the season.
- (3) Fixed remissions.
- (4) Deductions on account of village establishments and sundry other purposes.

Items classed as Miscellanoons Revenue are afterwards added. Each of the above items will be noticed in order.

The large increase in the Chingleput District is due to the excess area discovered by the new settlement in the taluks of Chingleput and Madhurantakam having been brought to account and to the disposal of the large number of durkhasts kept in abeyance for three years previous to the sottlement.

The increase in the Godavari District is ascribed to the extension of cultivation under the stimulus of the prevailing high prices of agricultural produce.

The increase in Kistna occurs in the deltaic portion of the district, and is apparently due to the same cause.

The increase in Bellary, Tanjore, Nellore, and Trichinopoly is due to the comparatively favorable nature of the season.

The increase in Tinnevelly is large as regards area and small as regards assessment. It is chiefly due to the introduction of the new Survey areas, and rates of assessment, to the issue of puttas for lands cultivated without permission which were formerly shown under miscellaneous, and to extension of cultivation owing no doubt to the monsoon rains having set in early.

The small increase in North Arcot is due to the smaller extent of land relinquished by ryots owing to the reviving hopes of a better season.

In Malabar there is an increase in the area, and a decrease in the assessment which has not been explained, but it is evidently owing to the increase in dry cultivation which is not charged with assessment when certain kinds of crop are raised.

The small increase under assessment in South Canara is composed partly of assessment of new lands taken up, and partly of assessment imposed on certain salt pans in consequence of the introduction of the excise system in that district—vide Board's Proceedings, dated 23rd June 1877, No. 2,980.

The increase in Ganjam, Coimbatore, and Nilgiri is small, and does not call for remark.

The decrease in Kurnool is stated to be due to large relinquishments during the year in consequence of the adverse season and the impoverished condition of the ryots, and also in some measure to the introduction of the enhanced new settlement rates in the Cumbum and Markapur Taluks.

In Vizagapatam, South Arcot, Madura, and Salem the decrease is owing to the failure of the early rains, and the unpromising character of the sowing season.

The decrease in Cuddapah is due partly to relinquishments owing to the famine, and partly to some dry lands hitherto classed as ryotwar, but held on favorable assessment, having been treated by the Revenue Settlement Department as Inams and entered as such in the accounts. The decrease in Malabar is not explained, but it is small.

f the total extent of holdings, aggregating a little more than 20 millions of acres (excluding South Canara, for which particulars of area are unknown), about $15\frac{3}{4}$ millions, or 78.7 per cent., were cultivated—a larger proportion than in Fasli 1286 (70.9 per cent.) though considerably less than the ratios of Faslis 1284 and 1285 (88.2 and 87.2 per cent. respectively).

14. RYOTWARI SETTLEMENT—Second Crop Assessment.—The amount charged on account of second crop assessment was Rs. 9,37,824, against Rs. 4,96,166 in Fasli 1286, showing an increase of Rs. 4,41,658. This item compares favorably even with the revenue in Fasli 1284, a particularly favorable year. The increase occurs in all districts excepting Godavari and Coimbatore. This satisfactory result is due to the abundant rainfall. The decrease in Godavari is explained to be due to the closing of the anient canals during a portion of the cultivation season, The decrease in Coimbatore is too triffing to need explanation.

15. RYOTWAR SETTLEMENT-Water Tax on Government Lands .- The demand on account of water tax amounted to Rs. 23,85,627 against Rs. 20,71,887 exhibiting an increase of Rs. 3,13,740. This revenue is chiefly derived from the districts of Godavari and Kistna where in the Delta Taluks all lands are assessed at dry rates, whether irrigated or not, a separate charge at a uniform rate being made for irrigation. The largo increase noticeablo in the Godavari, and Kistna is due to the increase in the holdings, and the number of applications for water-the result as already explained of the increase of cultivation under the stimulus of high prices. In the other districts the increase is due

to the season having been much more favorable for wet cultivation during the year under report than in the preceding year. The total assessment on Ryotwari holdings including the second crop assessment and water tax in Fasli 1287 compares with those of the previous faslis as follows :----

16. RYOTWAR SETTLEMENT REMISSIONS .- In addition to the remissions usually granted on account of irrigated lands under the rules, it was found necessary to grant with the sanction of Government special remissions on account of unirrigated lands also in consequence of the failure of the early rains, loss of cattle, and the impoverished condition of the ryots from the offects of famine in the previous year, but care was taken to withhold remissions from those whose losses arising from their inability to cultivate the entire area of their holdings or from failure of crops on some portions of their holding had been made good by the abnormally high prices at which they were able to dispose of the produce of the portions on which they reaped a crop. The usual rule is to grant romissions as a percentage reduction of the demand of the tract which has suffered without inquiry into individual losses, but a temporary departure from this rule was considered necessary in the interests of the ryot as well as Government in an exceptional year like that of Fasli 1287 which was, owing to the high prices prevailing, extremely favorable to those who had any produce to sell, while it was the reverse to those who had none. Individual inquiries were therefore ordered to be made, whether the value of the Government share of the crop reaped by the applicant for remission was or was not sufficient to meet the assessment of his entire holding, and remissions were granted only to the extent to which such value fell short of the Government dues. The amount of the extraordinary remissions thus granted will be shown further on.

WASTE REMITTED.—Of the lands under occupancy, 4,257,153 acres, or 21.3 per cent., assessed at Rs. 48,10,114, were left waste. Of this extent, ryots were allowed remissions on 668,819 acres, assessed at Rs. 9,26,896, and made to pay on 3,588,334 acres, assessed at Rs. 38.83,218. In other words, 80.7 per cent. of the assessment of wasta was charged and 19.3 per cent. remitted, the proportions in 1286 being 43 and 57 respectively.

Item 3-Remission of assessment on second crop.—This remission was granted only in the Tinnevelly District. The Collector recommended that in consideration of the many disasters that had befallen the ryots in the year under report, and that preceding it in the taluk of Sankaranainarkoil, those who had reaped their main Pishanam crop should be allowed to grow a short crop of rice or a dry crop before the end of the fasli year without oxtra charge, and represented that Government would lose nothing by this concession, as, except on these terms, no second crop would be raised, while it would be a

great boon to the ryots. This proposal was approved by the Board.*

Item 4—Tirwacummi or difference between dry, and wet assessment.—Ryots were allowed under the usual rules to raise dry crops as far as possible on irrigated lands when water was insufficient for a wet crop, and wherever a crop was so raised the difference between the wet and dry assessment was remitted.

Item 6-Remission of water-rate.—This remission was chiefly given in the Kistna District, and it represents water-rate remitted on lands left waste owing to deficiency of water.

Item 7-Panyboodthy, or Payamalay or cultivation injured by water.—The decrease is chiefly due to there having been no floods in the Kistna District as in last year.

Item 8—Occasional remissions allowed on the gradual introduction of the new rates of settlement in the districts of Nellore, Cuddapah, and Kurnool.—The remissions under this head are irrespective of season. They result from the introduction by graduated increments of the new settlement rates in cases where, owing to inequalties in the former assessments, an unduly heavy sudden increase would otherwise have occurred. The difference between the full assessment, and that actually charged in the year is entered in the accounts as remission till the full assessment is reached.

The increase under this head is due to the introduction of the graduated settlement rates in the Sidhout Taluk of Cuddapah District, and in the taluks of Cumbum

The increase in Cuddapah, and Kurnool is due to extended cultivation of lands on which permanent remissions are granted, and the decrease in Chingleput is owing to the introduction of the new settlement. Excluding Fasli 1286, which was an exceptional year, from comparison, it will be seen that the remissions in Fasli 1287 exceeded the average of the five: years (a series embracing good and bad years) by a little more than $10\frac{1}{4}$ lakhs of ruppes. Considering the calamitous character of the seasons of the past two years, and the losses sustained by the ryots, it cannot be considered that any undue amount of revenue has been sacrificed; on the contrary, the remissions actually granted are much less than the Board anticipated.

the comparatively favorable season, and is spread overall the districts, except Ganjam and Vizagapatam. In the former there is a decrease of Rupees 70,858 and in the latter of Rupees 4,033 owing to the season having been very unfavorable in that district. On the whole the Ryotwari demand of Fasli 1287 falls short of the average of the five years before the famine by only $2\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs of rupees.

22. ENTIRE LAND REVENUE DEMAND INCLUDING PERMANENTLY SETTLED REVE-

NUE, JODI AND MISCELLANEOUS.—Having in the foregoing paragraphs reviewed constituents of the Ryotwar Settlement, the Board will now proceed to explain the variations in the other branches of Land Revenue, viz., Peishcush on Permanently Settled Estatos, Shrotriem Jodi and Quit-rent and Miscellaneous.

Item 1-Jodion Inams.—The increase of Rupees 32,533 occurs chiefly in the districts of Cuddapah, and Kurnool. In the former district, it is due to the exhibition under this head of the favorable assessments of certain lands recently

transferred from Ryotwar to Inams, and to the collection of Jodi this year on the service Inams on which the quit-rent was remitted last year owing to the adverse nature of the season. In the latter it is partly due to excess discovered on survey being charged with additional quit-rent by the Settlement Department in Cumbum and Markapur Taluks, and partly to remission of quit-rent on village service Inams not having been granted in Fasli 1287 as was the case in Fasli 1286.

which the increase occurs are those noted in the margin, and it is due to the more favorable character of the season for wet cultivation.

The decrease in the Kistna District is due to water-tax on certain Zemindaris and minor Inams not having been settled within the year under report for want of sufficient information.

Item 6-Receipts from Process Service Frees.—The increase* is chiefly in the districts noted in the margin⁺, and is due to more extensive recourse to coercive measures in all districts for the realization of heavy arrears. In 1286, in several districts coercive measures were not resorted to in consideration of the impoverished condition of the ryots owing to the famine.

Item 7-Rent of Islands.—The increase is chiefly in the Godavari District and is owing to the large rents realized in consequence of the prevailing high prices. Item 19.—The decrease is due to the measures adopted in the previous year for checking unauthorized cultivation of Sircar Kumai by imposition of penal assessments which had the effect of discouraging this description of cultivation.

Item 31.—The increase is in the Tinnevelly District, and is due to the realization of the sale proceeds of the shells collected last year being carried to credit during the year under report. The remaining items do not call for remark.

34. Arrack or Country Spirits .- The revenue under this head is raised by the undermentioned three different modes, viz. :---

Excise. (1.)

(2.) Assignment in farm of the exclusive privilege of manufacture and sale.

(3.) Amani or direct management.

Excise.-Under this system the manufacture and sale of arrack in particular tracts, generally whole districts, is assigned to contractors on condition of their paying duty at fixed rates per gallon of liquor issued for consumption and sale and subject to several other conditions in regard to the prices to be charged, and strength at which liquor is to be sold.

The contractors also guarantee the payment of a certain sum as minimum revenue in the event of the duty on actual issues falling below that amount. The subjoined statement shows the amount so guaranteed in the several excise districts, and the actual realizable demand in Faslis 1286 and 1287 :---

In Coimbatore, Salem, and Tanjore the Government directed that duty should be collected for this year also irrespective of the guaranteed amounts, on the actual issues only and the demand in these districts is therefore less than the guaranteed amount. This concession was extended after the expiration of the fashi to all the excise districts in which the guaranteed minimum revenue had not been reached, except Vizagapatam where half the difference was remitted, but the demand for these

latter districts has not been altered as the transaction appertains to Fasli 1288. Compared with Fasli 1286 the demand is less in the districts noted in the margin, mainly because owing to the unfavorable seasons, and the effects of famine consumption decreased and the issues consequently had to be reduced; the fact that the leases

expired at the close of the fasli also led to a reduction of issues to obviate large stocks of liquor being left on hand. The following are the districts in which the right of selling country spirits was farmed out :---

The falling off in the Kistna and Madura Districts is due to the losses sustained by re-sale of certain Abkári farms owing to the default of the renters in payment of their rents.

Amani or direct Management.—This system prevails only in two districts, Madras and Vizagapatam. In Madras, which includes for Abkári purposes a belt of country extending eight miles beyond the limits of the High Court's original jurisdiction. Arrack is purchased by Government from contractors and supplied to shopkeepers, each shopkeeper agreeing to sell a certain number of gallons per diem and to pay for the quantity at a fixed price.

The Abkári of the Jeypore country in Vizagapatam, with the exception of the Taluks of Gunapore and Royagudda is farmed out under the management of the Special Assistant Agent. This amount also is shown under Amani.

35. TODDY.—Except in Chingleput and the town of Madras the toddy revenue is rented out for fixed sums. In Chingleput it was rented to Mr. Prichard, the farmer of the arrack revenue on the condition of his paying Government 90 per cent. of his net collections. In Madras the toddy shops are divided into certain classes according to the number of cocoanut or palmyra trees assigned to each and there is a fixed rent for each class. Besides the regulated number of trees any shopkeeper is allowed to use additional trees without limit on the payment of one anna for every eight trees per diem. The trees from which toddy is to be drawn are marked and registered by Government officers. The subjoined statement shows the toddy revenue of each district in Faslis 1286 and 1287 :—

37. INCOME TAX.—There was no demand under this head in the fasli under report.

38. LICENSE TAX.—Act III of 1878 imposing a license-tax on trades, dealings, and industries in this Presidency came into force on the 1st April 1878, and was thus in operation only during the last three months in the fasli under report. During this period there was barely time to make the necessary preliminary arrangements and the collection of the tax could not be commenced till several months later. The current demand under this head therefore was only Rs. 1,955.

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The revenue derived from this source was Rs. 20,46,142 or Rs. 27,264* more than that in Fasli 1286. This resulted from a gross increase of Rs. 1,84,896⁺ in six districts, and a gross decrease of Rs. 1,57,632 in the same number of districts.⁺ The increase at the chief port is due to larger imports of cotton twist, cotton piece-goods, gold and silver lace and thread, malt liquor, spirits, woollens and corals, and that in Malabar to larger imports of liquors, oilman's stores and metals. The increase in South Canara is ascribed to the export of large quantities of rice to dutiable ports, particularly to Goa. The increases in other districts are small and do not call for remarks. The large decrease in the Tanjore District is chiefly due to diminished importation of railway materials and to decreased exportation of rice and paddy; the former owing to the approaching completion of the northern extension of the South Indian Railway and the latter to the prevalence of famine and the consequent absorption of the surplus produce of the district within the Presidency. The decrease in South

Arcot and Kistna is chiefly due to the cessation of exports of rice to foreign countries for the same reason, and that in Godavari to the revision of the tariff and abolition of the duties on many articles. The decreases in Ganjam and Nellore are trifling and do not call for remark. A statement showing the amount of duty collected on imports and exports in each district in the Presidency for Faslis 1286 and 1287 is subjoined :--

tricts noted in the margin. The large decrease in Tanjore is the result of less exportation of rice, and paddy through Karical owing to the prevalence of famine. The variations in the other districts are small and do not call for remark.

41. SALT.—Several circumstances contributed to affect the salt revenue during the fashi under report, *i.e.*, (a). The enhancement of the price of salt

from Rs. 2 to Rs. 2-11-0 under Act XVIII of 1877, which had the effect of diminishing the consumption and increasing the revenue. (b) The impoverishment of the people and the loss of population owing to the continuance of famine and high prices. (c) The abolition of the discount of 5 per cent. hitherto allowed by Government on wholesale purchases. (d) The discontinuance of Government sales in Malabar and South Canara which had the effect of considerably diminishing the revenue credited to this Presidency inasmuch as salt imported from foreign ports alone pays duty on importation, the duty on that imported from Bombay being collected at that place. (e) The introduction of a change of system in exhibiting the value of salt sold on credit in the accounts. Hitherto the value of salt sold on credit has been credited in the accounts as soon as it was sold, with a corresponding debit to advances recoverable, but during the fasli under report orders were issued that in future actual realizations alone should be shown in the accounts. When this system was introduced the value of salt included in previous year's accounts, but not yet realized, had to be debited to the salt revenue of the fasli. Owing to all these disturbing causes the quantity of salt sold and imported fell off by 265,838 Maunds, and the revenue by Rs. 14,00,373, as will be seen from the subjoined statement. The decrease in the revenue, however, is only nominal, being due to the adjustment made by the Accountant-General of the large sum of Rs. 16,17,263 on account of the salt sold on credit in previous years :--

The decrease in Ganjam is ascribed to deficiency of stock at the principal stations. In Vizagapatam, Godavari, Nellore, South Arcot, and Tanjore the increase is stated to be due to the enhancement of the price. There was also an increase in the quantity

sold in Vizagapatam and Nellore. In Tanjore the abolition of the discount system is stated to be the cause of the increase. The decrease in Kistna is attributed to the abolition of the discount system, to the minus adjustment of Rs. 88,766 on account of salt sold on credit in the previous years and to the decreased demand at Hyderabad for Kistna salt, in consequence of the great facilities afforded by the Nizam's State Railway for the importation of Bombay salt into that territory. The increase in Cuddapah is ascribed to the higher rate of duty levied on earth-salt in accordance with the graduated scale of License Fees sanctioned in G.O., dated 28th July 1873, No. 790. The decrease in Chingleput is due to the minus adjustment of Rs. 15,28,497 on account of salt sold on credit in previous years.

In Madura the decrease is mainly owing to diminished sales consequent on the large importation of duty paid on Tuticorin salt by rail.

In Tinnevelly the increase is partly due to the enhancement of the price and partly to more extensive purchases, especially for exportation by sea and by rail.

The decrease in South Canara is attributed partly to the discontinuance of the Government sales and partly to the importation of a larger quantity of Bombay salt upon which duty is prepaid at the port of exportation. The decrease in Malabar is due to the cessation of sales of monopoly salt from 1st November 1877 and the prepayment at Bombay and Madras of the duty leviable on supplies sent to this district.

The stock on hand in some districts is below the quantity required by the Standing Orders of the Department, viz., two years' supply in more important stations and eighteen months in others; but the quantity stored at the end of the fasli does not fully represent the quantity available as the manufacturing season is not over till later in the year and all the salt manufactured is not brought into store before its close. In Ganjam and Vizagapatam the stock fell short of requirements, had to be replenished by importations from Kistna and Tanjore.

43. Wastage.—The usual statement detailing the quantity of salt recommended by the Collectors to be written off the accounts of Fasli 1287 on account of wastage is subjoined.

The rate of wastage in the heaps of salt sold by weighment exceeds the usual 5 per cent. in Tanjore, Madura, and Tinnevelly. In Tanjore the excessive wastage is

attributed partly to careless covering, but chiefly to the unusually heavy rains which fell in November and December 1877. No explanation is given for the excessive

wastage in Madura, but it is also probably due to the heavy rains of 1877. In Tinnevelly the unusually high wastage is due to the salt having remained in store for a long time and to the heavy rains and floods of 1877. The total wastage to be written off the accounts amounts to Maunds 279,984, of which Maunds 8,673, the excess wastage at Negapatam, were written off the accounts under the authority G.O., dated 24th May 1878, No. 783. The Board request that sanction may be accorded for writing off the accounts the remaining wastage, amounting to Maunds 271,311. Sanction is requested for writing off a further quantity of Maunds 1,243 found short in restoring salt imported at Bimlipatam, and Maunds 22 of salt illicitly manufactured and ordered to be destroyed as being unfit for use in South Canara. The Board request that sanction may be accorded to write off this quantity also. The total quantity to be written off amounts to Maunds 272,576.

Item No. 1.—The decrease in Item No. 1 is entirely due to the Salt establishments in South Canara and Malabar having been incorporated with the Sea Customs establishments and their cost charged to the latter head under G.O., dated 28th August 1878, No. 1,367.

Item No. 3.—The increase under this item is due to famine batta having been paid throughout the year, while in Fasli 1286 it was paid only during a portion of it.

Item No. 4.—The large increase under this item appertains principally to Chingleput and is due to compensation paid to salt ryots on account of the losses sustained by them by the heavy rains under G.O., dated 2nd July 1877, No. 2,173.

Item No. 5.—The increase in Item No. 5 is due to the execution of a large number of emergent works which were rendered necessary by the floods in Tinnevelly and to very few works having been executed in Fasli 1286 owing to financial pressure. Items Nos. 6 and 8.—The decrease in these items is due partly to diminished manufacture in Godavari and Tinnevelly, but chiefly to the fact that no salt was purchased in South Canara and Malabar owing to the discontinuance of the Government sales in those districts.

Items 7 and 10.—The increase in these items is due to the large quantity of salt shipped to Ganjam and Vizagapatam.

The variations in the other items do not call for any remark.

Compared with the revenue of Fasli 1286 there is a decrease of Rs. 1,92,857 under Court Fee Stamps, and an increase of Rs. 79,961 under General Stamps. The falling of under the former head is large in the districts noted in the margin. In South Arcot, Madura, and Cuddapah this is attributed to diminished litigation in consequence of the famine ; the Collector of Madras states that the cause of the decrease in that district is not ascertainable. The decrease in the Tanjore District is ascribed to the general depression caused by high prices, and the operation of the Registration Act in reducing litigation.

The increases under the head Non-Judicial Stamps is large in the districts noted in the margin. This result in Tanjore is attributed to large monetary transactions in connection with the rice trade. The increase in Bellary is stated to be due to purchase of stamps by Abkári

contractors, sub-renters, and shopkeepers for executing Muchilikas on the introduction of the new lease, and that in Kurnool is to increased sales of land by Ryots reduced to poverty during the famine. The increases in other districts are small, and do not require remark. In the Tinnevelly District there was a large decrease of Rs. 17,611. The Collector attributes this partly to the fact that the people were relieved from the necessity of borrowing so much as in the previous year owing to the liberal aid granted from the Mansion House Fund ; but chiefly to the poor condition of the people, their circumstances being such as to incapacitate them from lending money.

64. It will be seen that the Land Revenue collections, considering the circumstances of the past two years have been eminently satisfactory, being 404 lakhs or $125\frac{1}{2}$ lakes in excess of the collections of Fasli 1286. At the end of each ordinary year there is usually a balance of between 55 and 60 lakhs left for collection in the succeeding year, but the balanco at the end of Fasli 1286 had swollen to 141 lakhs owing to the suspension of coercive measures of collections in consequence of the famine. Of this amount no less than 91 lakhs were collected in the fasli under report, notwithstanding that the famine had not then subsided and $3\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs were written off as irrecoverable, leaving a balance at the end of the year of $46\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs. The balance out of the current demand, however, amounted to 1341 lakhs, probably because the ryots had to make large payments in Fash 1287 on account of the arrear demand of 1286 and current demand of 1287, and this together with the arrear balance made up a total of 180 lakhs at the end of Fasli 1287. The greater portion of this amount has since been recovered during the current fasli, the realizations up to the end of March 1879 amounting to 119 lakhs. Of the remainder it is expected that one-half will be collected, but the recovery of the other half is very uncertain; and it may have eventually to be written off the account; the result on the whole cannot, however, be regarded as otherwise than gratifying, considering the difficulty of adjusting the demand accurately with reference to the actual losses, and the tendency of settling officers to under-estimate rather than over-estimate them with a view to prevent an undue sacrifice of revenue, as well as the impoverished condition in which the famine has left the agricultural population.

65. Taking 450 lakhs, the average current demand of the three years previous to the famine, as the standard, the settled demand in the two years of the famine shows a deficiency of 88 lakhs, and supposing that half of the arrea balance referred to in the preceding paragraph is finally found to be irrecoverable, the total loss of Land Revenue due to famine would amount to 118 lakhs.

72 .--- VILLAGE AND TALUK ACCOUNTS .--- The Collector of Ganjam reports that the village and taluk accounts are on the whole fairly kept, but that the accounts of the Curnams of Berhampore and Goomsur Taluks still need improvement. The Collector of Vizagapatam states that the condition of the village, and taluk accounts in his district is still unsatisfactory. The Collector of Bellary reports that the taluk and village accounts were examined by the settling officers, that carelessness and inattention were noticed in some cases and the necessary orders were issued for the correct preparation of the accounts. In Kurnool the village and taluk accounts do not appear to have been well kept, and the arrears account, No. 28, particularly seems to be in a state of confusion. From Chingleput it is reported that there was evidence of carclessness in not initialling numerous corrections. This is attributed to the famine and distraction caused by the work of the Settlement Department which disorganized the whole of the village staff. In the district of Tanjore the Head

Assistant Collector, Mr. Spencer, in examining and verifying the village accounts discovered the concealment of extra water-cess to the extent of Rs. 18,000; also in connection with the grant of remissions in the Mannargudi Division; the village accounts were sent for by the Collector and examined and the discrepancies noticed and pointed out to the Divisional Officers. The village and taluk accounts in the Tinnevelly District were carefully scrutinized by the Collector, who issued the neces-sary instructions for their correct preparation. In Coimbatore corrections were not initialled in some cases, accounts of collections were not prepared, and the entries of crops in the Cultivation and Adungal accounts did not agree. There was also a want of punctuality in entering the payments of revenue in the Katchat Receipt books, &c. This is attributed mainly to the Revenue Inspectors being drawn away from their legitimate duty of inspecting and checking the village accounts and cultivation, to make inquiries in rovenue cases before the Tahsildars, whose time is much taken up by their Magisterial work. The remedy lies in the strengthening of the staff of Revenue Inspectors, for which proposals were submitted by the Board some years ago, and the consideration of which has been deferred for financial reasons. The Commissioner of the Nilgiri reports that the accounts and registers prescribed are not properly maintained in all the divisions. In South Canara the state of the accounts appear to be satisfactory. In the other districts the accounts are stated to be in a fair condition.

The extreme dryness of last season and the issue of a notification that no waterrate would be charged for that year for dry crops irrigated unless a fair crop was

reaped stimulated the ryots to irrigate as much land as possible. The absence of any such inducement to take advantage of the supply at hand in the year under report accounts for the decrease.

I HAVE the honor to submit the Settlement Report of the Ganjam District for Fasli 1287 (1877-78).

- 2. SETTLEMENT—Statement 1.—
 - (1.) The settlement of the Goomsur Taluk was made by me at Russelkonda, Gangupore and Balipadra, and occupied fifteen days, commencing the 13th February.
 - (2.) The Berhampore Taluk was settled by Mr. Forbes, the Acting Senior Assistant Collector; the Jammabandi was held at Berhampore, Purushottapore, and Chetterpore; it commenced the 18th February and was completed on the 20th March 1878.
 - (3.) The Chicacole Taluk was settled by Mr. Grahame, the Principal Assistant Collector, at Chicacole, Calingapatam and Narsanapet and occupied three days, viz., 18th and 30th April and 14th May 1878.

3. VILLAGES.—The number of villages in the three Government Taluks was 1.579 against 1,573 in the preceding fash, showing an increase of six villages as exhibited below :—

- 4. The increase is in Goomsur Taluk and is due-
 - 1st.—To a former error in the accounts of fasli 1283. The cultivated land of three jungle villages was bought in by Government at auction sale for arrears and the villages were at once removed from the accounts. Cultivation has been resumed in all three, and so they are brought on the accounts again;
 - 2ndly.-Two villages which were being shown in the taluk accounts without separate number were numbered in Fasli 1287;
 - 3rdly.— Two villages which were by mistake included under "Joint-rent" were transferred to "Ryotwar."

The decrease of one village under "Joint-rent" is the net result of two villages transferred to "Ryotwar" and of one village (not numbered previously) now newly membered.

5. PUTTAS.—The number of puttas issued at the settlement was 39,850 against 39,543 of the preceding fasli. An increase of 307, the net result of an increase of 586 and a decrease of 279. 1,128 puttas were altered owing to changes either in the holdings or in the holders.

6. SEASON.—The season was decidedly unfavorable, and the district barely escaped, being classed as a famine one. A large extent of land was left waste for want of rain. The paddy that did grow yielded barely more than half the usual crop. and in consequence of the failure of the north-cast monsoon, the raggi which promised fairly at first was not as good when reaped as was hoped, and the later dry failed altogether. The price of food was very high. Cholera was very bad; there was difficulty in getting work, and the poorer people had endured a considerable amount of distress before the late advent of the south-west monsoon of the current fash put it in their power to earn their living by cooly as usual. The Berhampore and Goomsur Taluks suffered most. The subjoined table shows the rain-fall. It will be observed that the distribution of it was very unfortunate. Had the excessive 8 inches of April and May fallen in September and October, there would not have been so bad a failure of erop, or probably any worth naming :—

Public health was bad. The excess of deaths ovor last year's returns was due entirely to cholera, or probably some bowel-complaint induced by poor and insufficient food. There was a very large diminution in the number of deaths by small-pox. There is also a notable falling off in the number of births, most probably due to the increasing distress. The falling off is most marked in January and the subsequent months. The report of deaths of cattle is certainly not reliable. The return from Chicacole is blank and that from Goomsur shows only 260 deaths; the general return shows 7,824 deaths this fasli against 1,576 of last fasli. Both these are far too low. It is absurd to suppose only 1,576 cattle died in a year out of the 144,506 head reported to exist in Fasli 1286; and though, in an ordinary year, 7,824 might be nearer the true figure last year from the absence of pasture and scarcity of water, the mortality was probably as far greater in proportion as that of the people.

8. PRICES-Statement 2.—The prices of food-grains were ruinously high. The famine in the south led to large export which took away the best part of the stock of the district, and that, immediately followed by the bad season, sent up prices to double and more than that the usual rate.

There was however no scarcity of food. The markets were always supplied as usual, and the importation of paddy and rice from Puree and Cuttack continued though not to the extent usual.

9. RYOTS' HOLDINGS—*Statement* 3.—The extent of the ryots' holdings during the year under report was 305,067 acres assessed at Rupees 6,71,357 against 303,863 acres assessed at Rupees 6,69,539 in the preceding fasli—an increase of 1,204 acres and Rupees 1,818 assessment as shown below :—

11. WASTE CHARGED AND REMITTED.—Of the above-mentioned area of ryots' holdings, viz., 305,067 acres, assessed at Rupees 6,71,357, an extent of 24,052 acres, assessed at Rupees 43,565, were left waste. Of this waste, 15,075 acres, assessed at Rupees 28,424, were in the Berhampore Taluk and the rest in the other two taluks.

The waste in the Berhampore Taluk was chiefly in the rain-fed lands.

The assessment of 2,680 acres left waste, viz., Rupees 7,053, was remitted in the three Government Taluks, and the remaining waste, viz., 21,372 acres, assessed at Rupees 36,512, was charged.

The actual extent cultivated was thus 281,015 acres assessed at Rupees 6,27,792 against 276,303 acres assessed at Rupees 6,09,783 in last fasli.

12. NET SETTLEMENT.—The actual extent charged for is therefore 302,387 acres assessed at Rupees 6,64,304 as follows :—

From the above amount of assessment, viz., Rupces 6,64,304, a sum of Rupces 568 on account of fixed or cowle remissions and a sum of Rupces 73,818 on account of loss of crop must be deducted, and a sum of Rupces 48 must be added on account of "Water-cess" charged on dry lands temporarily converted into wet. The net result, Rupces 5,89,966, forms the ryotwari demand.

The increase in sugar-cane and indigo and decrease in cotton are so small, they call for no remark.

15. PROGRESSIVE COWLES—Enclosure C to Statement 3.—At the end of Fasli 1286 there were 1,075 acres, assessed at Rupees 1,500, held on this tenure. Of these, 172 acres, assessed at Rupees 108, became liable to full assessment and 15 acres, assessed at Rupees 9, were relinquished. The extent remaining was therefore 888 acres assessed at Rupees 1,383. Add 100 acres, assessed at Rupees 100, taken up in Fasli 1287. The total is 988 acres assessed at Rupees 1,483. The cowle remissions amounted to Rupees 568, and the net amount actually payable on account of the cowle lands was therefore Rupees 915.

There were in Fasli 1286 thirty-four cowles, of which six expired (the land having been either brought to full assessment or relinquished) and one newly granted, so that the number of cowles now existing is twenty-nine.

16. PORTIONS OF FIELD LEFT WASTE—Enclosure D to Statement 3.—Of the extent of waste charged, viz., 21,372 acres, assessed at Rupees 36,512, 12,821 acres, assessed at Rupees 28,190, appertain to portions of fields, while the remaining 8,551 acres, assessed at Rupees 8,322, consist of entire fields.

17. PARTICULARS OF CULTIVATION—Enclosure E to Statement 3.—Of the land settled, viz., 302,387 acres, assessed at Rupees 6,64,304, 116,301 acres, assessed at Rupees 1,41,215, were dry land; 623 acres, assessed at Rupees 1,362, were cultivated with dry crops, but irrigated; 43 acres, assessed at Rupees 44, were dry temporarily converted into wet and charged with a water cess of Rupees 48; and the remaining 185,420 acres, assessed at Rupees 5,21,683, were wet, bearing a consolidated wet assessment. The last item includes rain-fed wet land.

Under the above explanation, I trust that the Board will be pleased to obtain the sametion of Government for writing off the accounts the above-mentioned sum of reported that the land was left uncultivated for want of rain and not through the neglect of the ryots. I personally inspected many villages and satisfied myself that the grant of remission was necessary. The Tahsildar recommended a total remission of Rupees 8,000, but after carefully going over the accounts and discussing each village with him I reduced the amount to Rupees 4,356-3-11. Remission was only granted in cases where there was total loss of erop in entire puttas, or where the entire demarcation number was left waste. Small portions were left out of consideration.

16. STATEMENT 5 shows the demand, collection, and balance of Land Rovenue Miscellancous items for Fasli 1287, as well as the collections made on account of current demand and arrears. Rupces 180, being quit-rent in arrears for the past eleven years on a personal Inam in Parasamba village in the Tarla estate was taken into account during the fasli under review—*Vide* your letter, No. 122, dated 9th January 1878. Hence the increase under this head. The small increase and decrease in the various minor items in this statement are of a fluctuating nature and therefore call for no special remark.

17. ENCLOSURE A IN STATEMENT 5 and its foot-note give the particulars of Revenue and Miscellaneous items shown in Statement 5. The information called for in the Revenue Board's Proceedings, No. 85, dated 3rd April 1875, is given in the foot-note to Enclosure A.

18. STATEMENT 6 shows each permanently settled estate and each Inam village in the Sub-Division with its demand, collection, and balance, arrear and current. There were no changes in the tenure of the estates and Inam villages or in the demand on them. The balance due on all estates at the end of the fasli was Rupees 10,448-12-10* and on all the Agraharams Rupees 6,390-3-2. The amount is being collected.

19. STATEMENT 7 shows the demand, collection, and balance of all sources of revenue, current and arrear. The following is a comparative abstract statement of the whole revenue demand in the Sub-Division :---

40. Item 4.—Salt charges comprise the following items :—

(b.) The increase in the cost of establishment is due to the entertainment of additional establishment in all salt stations except Itchapore under G.O., dated 15th October 1877, No. 3,106, and to payment of famine batta to all servants drawing less than Rupees 16 a month. सत्यमेव जयते

(c.) The increase in the preventive establishment is due to the entertainment of a large number of Police guards for a longer period than usual as the working season was a good one and the rains later than usual.

(f.) 42. NET REVENUE.—The total charges of collections, viz., Rupees 3,49,376, came to nearly 10.43 per cent. on the gross collections, viz., Rupees 33,49,352. Deducting the charges of collections the net revenue was Rupees 29,99,976 against Rupees 35,18,750 of the preceding Fasli 1286.

43. MANUFACTURE AND STORAGE OF SALT-Statement 10.—The quantity of salt manufactured here and received into store during the year under report was 1,634,637 maunds against 669,423 maunds in the preceding Fasli 1286; 96,011 more maunds were received from the Kistna District. The quantity in store at the end of Fasli 1286 was 501,199 maunds, and a quantity of 5,339 maunds was the gain by weighment, &c. The total quantity available for sale during the year was 2,237,186 maunds. Of this 906,866 maunds were sold during the year and 54,834 maunds written off as wastage—Board's Proceedings, dated 1st December 1877, No. 5,136.

There were thus 1,275,486 maunds in store at the end of the year under report. Deducting a further quantity of 51,554 maunds recommended to be written off on account of wastage in the last report on which orders of Government have yet to come, there remained a net quantity of 1,223,932 maunds in store. The actual quantity manufactured during the year was 1,718,413 maunds against 435,917 maunds in the preceding fash and against the dittum or estimate of 1,850,000 maunds.

44. WASTAGE OF SALT.—Statement 11.—The wastage of salt discovered during the year under report was 29,513½ maunds in 874,722 maunds in 740 heaps, and is 3.38 per cent.

45. Sanction for writing off the account the above-mentioned wastage is requested.

46. Statement 12 showing the Talakwar Collections. —The collections as compared with the preceding year exhibit a decrease owing to the unfavorable character of season as already explained. Measures have, however, been taken for speedy collection of outstanding balances where possible.

cellaneous No. 14,391, and Board's Proceedings, dated 4th April 1878, No. 930, were dismissed in April and June 1878 respectively. The costs awarded to Government in both amounted to Rupees 91-12-0.

53. BOUNDARY MARKS.—The field and village boundary marks are said to be generally in good order. I have called for a special report.

54. RAIN REGISTERS.—Wherever there are rain gauges, rain registers have been on the whole carefully kept.

55. No applications were received for the sub-division of joint liabilities in sufranchised whole Inam villages.

56. STATE OF RECORDS.—The records in the Huzur and Taluk offices are in good order. The temporary establishment entertained in the Taluk and Huzur offices under G.Os., dated 26th September 1876, No. 2,231, and 25th October 1877, No. 6,190, did a good deal in arranging the records, distinguishing papers to be destroyed from those to be retained, and keeping registers of such arrangement.

57. RUINED TANKS.—No ruined or abandoned tanks were made over to private endividuals for repairs.

58. The Acting Principal Assistant Collector's report on the settlement of the Chicacole Taluk is enclosed.

SUB-COLLECTORATE.

I HAVE the honor to submit my Report on the Settlement of the Chicacole Taluk for Fasli 1287 (1877-78), accompanied by the usual statements.

2. STATEMENT No. 1 shows where, by whom, and on how many days the settlement was made, and the number of puttas issued. The only puttas given were for new land taken up or instead of old ones. The settlement began on 17th April and ended on 14th May 1878. It was made within the limits of the taluk at places convenient to the ryots. There were no changes in the tenure of villages in Fasli 1287.

3. The season on the whole was not good for dry and wet crops. The unusual and heavy rains that fell in April and May 1877 enabled the ryots to plough their lands thoroughly by the end of May, but owing to the failure of rain in June the seedlings withered. Subsequently frequent showers fell which enabled the ryots to sow again, but the continued dry and hot weather in July killed some of the second sowings. The remaining plants were saved by the late rains in August. Transplantation operations were not over till late in the year. The Vansadhara and the Langula rivers received moderate freshes. The dry crops, raggi and cumboo, were not a success; the outturn ranging between a fourth and a half crop. Want of drinking water and pasturage was not felt anywhere.

Cholera prevailed to a greater extent this year than in the provious year, and in feet the Sub-Division was never entirely free from it. Medicines were freely distribated subordinate Medical Officers itinerated through the division, and active steps were taken to check the spread of the disease and to improve the public health. Deaths among cattle were more compared with the previous fasli.

6. STATEMENT No. 2 shows the prices of first and second sorts of paddy and rice, of cholum, cumboo, raggi, and horse-gram. The prices of all these grains were higher than in the previous year owing to the famine in the south which caused a great demand for all these articles.

7. As in the last year survey areas were entered in the village accounts during Fasli 1287. The Revenue settlement of the taluk was finished by the Deputy Director and the new rates of assessment will be introduced in Fasli 1288.

8. Ryots' holdings and cultivation are shown in Statement No. 3. The following is an abstract showing in one view the holdings at the beginning of the year, the subsequent changes, and the waste remitted and charged :---

The decrease in sugar-cane and cotton is chiefly due to the fact that the rain-fall did not fall in well with the time of cultivating those crops. The increase in indigo is due to the opening of a new factory at Toolugu in Chicacole Taluk.

12. ENCLOSURE C IN STATEMENT No. 3.—The land under progressive cowle was Acces 213 Cents 90, with an assessment of Rupeos 145-0-3, of which Acres 106 Cents 77. assessed at Rupees 34, were brought to full assessment during the year under review. There were only Acres 107 Cents 13 of land, with an assessment of Rupees 111-0-3, under progressive cowle at the end of the fashi. No fresh land was taken up this year.

13. ENCLOSURE D IN STATEMENT No. 3 shows the particulars of the area and assessment of portions of fields left waste, the extent and assessment of which are included in Enclosure A of the Statement. No remission was granted on portions of tields left waste.

14. ENCLOSURE E IN STATEMENT 3 shows the particulars of land actually cultivated and of waste charged.

15. The amount of remissions in the present year was Rupees 4,393-8-8 against Ruppes 139-4-9 in Fasli 1286. The particulars are as follow :---

The amount of cowle remissions was Rupces 37-4-9 against Rupces 45-12-9 in Fasti 1286. The decrease under this head is owing to the fact that in the year under report some portions of progressive cowle land bore a higher assessment than in the previous year in accordance with the terms of the cowle. No shamilat bunger remission was granted. The occasional remissions during the year came to Rupces 4,356-3-11, granted in twenty-nine villages. Acres 927 Cents 58 of wet land were left uncultivated for want of water and the crops cultivated late in the year on Acres 600 Cents. 80 were totally lost owing to the failure of rain in the latter part of the cultivation season which necessitated the remission of assessment. The Tahsildar

reported that the land was left uncultivated for want of rain and not through the neglect of the ryots. I personally inspected many villages and satisfied myself that the grant of remission was necessary. The Tahsildar recommended a total remission of Rupees 8,000, but after carefully going over the accounts and discussing each village with him I reduced the amount to Rupees 4,356-3-11. Remission was only granted in cases where there was total loss of erop in entire puttas, or where the entire demarcation number was left waste. Small portions were left out of consideration.

16. STATEMENT 5 shows the demand, collection, and balance of Land Rovenue Miscellancous items for Fasli 1287, as well as the collections made on account of current demand and arrears. Rupces 180, being quit-rent in arrears for the past eleven years on a personal Inam in Parasamba village in the Tarla estate was taken into account during the fasli under review—*Vide* your letter, No. 122, dated 9th January 1878. Hence the increase under this head. The small increase and decrease in the various minor items in this statement are of a fluctuating nature and therefore call for no special remark.

17. ENCLOSURE A IN STATEMENT 5 and its foot-note give the particulars of Revenue and Miscellaneous items shown in Statement 5. The information called for in the Revenue Board's Proceedings, No. 85, dated 3rd April 1875, is given in the foot-note to Enclosure A.

18. STATEMENT 6 shows each permanently settled estate and each Inam village in the Sub-Division with its demand, collection, and balance, arrear and current. There were no changes in the tenure of the estates and Inam villages or in the demand on them. The balance due on all estates at the end of the fasli was Rupees 10,448-12-10* and on all the Agraharams Rupees 6,390-3-2. The amount is being collected.

19. STATEMENT 7 shows the demand, collection, and balance of all sources of revenue, current and arrear. The following is a comparative abstract statement of the whole revenue demand in the Sub-Division :---

The sum of Rupces 678-7-8 recommended as irrecoverable in your report for Fasli 1286 is correct. The difference, Rupces 8-4-8, has been included in the amount newly recommended for remission instead of in the amount shown under "Amount recommended for remission last year."—*Fide* statement annexed to paragraph 38 of my Report for Fasli 1286. This complication has arisen from the fact that certain sums recommended as irrecoverable in my reports for past faslis were not included in the irrecoverable balance accounts sent from your office, and that the same sums had to be recommended in my accounts for the subsequent faslis. To avoid future differences between these balances a fresh statement[#]

faslis previous to Fasli 1287, striking a correct balance at Rupees 3,404-5-5. This statement has no reference to former accounts.

23. The amount recommended for remission in your report for Fasli 1286 was Rupees 678-7-8 on account of arrears up to Fasli 1285. If from this amount we deduct Annas 12-9 since collected there will remain Rupees 677-10-11 recommended to be written off, but the writing off of which has not yet been sanctioned by Government. In addition to this amount Rupees 2,726-10-6 are now recommended for remission, and I request that you will apply for sanction to write off the accounts the irrecoverable balance of Rupees 3,404-5-5, as particularized below :--

33. I examined the Treasuries in my Division, and submitted the usual periodical report on their inspection. I also inspected the salt stations in my Division.

34. One Mahomedan was employed during the year.

35. I have examined the records in my Division. The records have been properly arranged and are kept in good order.

36. I examined the taluk and village accounts at Jamabandi and found that a great improvement has been made in the preparation of the village accounts.

37. I was not absent from the Sub-Division during the year.

38. None of my Huzur subordinates acquired fresh land during the year under report.

4. The number of fresh puttas issued during the year was 333 against 238 in the previous year. 5. Season.—The season was on the whole very unfavorable for agricultural operations. The early rains were scanty and partial although there was a heavy fall in May 1877. This fall did nothing but damage by bursting tanks. The south-west monsoon was late and scanty both in the hills and plains and was characterized by periods of drought which threatened to prevent the cultivation of irrigated crops altogether. During the months of November and December 1877, which was the time for paddy to ripen, there was little or no rain; the dry crops however came up well. The average outturn of all kinds of crops may be estimated as follows:—

The wet crops suffered much for want of rain, particularly in the latter part of the year and consequently a remission of Rupees 7,484 was of necessity granted to Government taluks. The supply of water for drinking purposes was fair, and some difficulty for pasturage was felt in the months of March and April 1878. The average rainfall in the district was 33.8 inches against 35.8 in the previous year. The subjoined statement shows the monthly average rainfall as compared with that of the preceding year: --

In the Golgonda and Sarvasiddhi Taluks the rainfall was 28.8 and $31.1\frac{1}{2}$ inches respectively. The south-west monsoon*

respectively. The south-west monsoon* rainfall was thus 17.6 against a normal fall of 24, and the north-east monsoon† gave 4.6 instead of 12.

6. Sanitary Condition.—The public health was bad during the year. Cholera prevailed throughout the district and caused 7,588 deaths against 3,371 in the previous year, or 4,217 more than those of the previous year. The deaths from small-pox increased by 109, being 275 against 166 in the previous year. The deaths from fever and other causes were 13,184 and 6,335 respectively, that is, the former decreased by 3,240 and the latter increased by 1,317. The total deaths registered were 27,382, or

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2,403 more than those of the previous fasli as shown below. The registered number of births during the fasli under review was 23,436 against 25,048 in the previous year:---

7. Every effort was made to check the prevalence of cholera by the free distribution of cholera pills, omum water, and chlorodyne; tar and brimstone were also burnt. Conservancy in the villages was promptly attended to.

8. Cattle Disease.—The health of the cattle was on the whole good.

9. STATEMENT No. 2—*Prices.*—The prices of all agricultural products have risen very considerably during the year, more than cent. per cent. This is due partly to the unfavorable character of the season and partly to the large exportations to the famine-stricken districts in the south. Private trade has, however, been active and furnished the markets with abundant supplies although some difficulty was experienced for a few days in the month of September in the town of Vizagapatam in getting supplies. The subjoined statement exhibits the average prices of the staple food-grains in Fasli 1287 as compared with the previous fash and with the average prices of the previous ten years :—

10. STATEMENT No. 3.—Ryots' Holdings.—The extent of holdings held by ryots at the beginning of the fasli under report was Acres 78,709 assessed at Bupees 1,91,012; that of lands relinquished during the year amounted to Acres 3,280 bearing an assessment of Rupees 10,080. There remained, therefore, a balance of Acres 75,429 assessed at Rupees 1,80,932. Acres 2,741, assessed at Rupees 7,814, were newly taken up, making a total of Acres 78,170 with an assessment of Rupees 1,88,746. There resulted, therefore, a net decrease of 539 acres of land assessed at Rupees 2,266. The decrease is attributable to the relinquishment of lands especially in the village of Thatakulapalem in the Sarvasiddhi Taluk in consequence of the unfavorable character of the season.

14. Actual Cultivation.—The extent under actual cultivation during the year was 70,584 bearing an assessment of Rupees 1,68,032 against 70,433 acres assessed at Rupees 1,75,110 in the preceding year as compared in the subjoined statement :—

The increase in extent is chiefly due to the cultivation of dry land, and the decrease in assessment is on wet land for the cultivation of which there was no sufficient rain.

21. Agricultural Statistics.—In the Government taluks of Golkonda and Sarvasiddhi the lands under ryots' holdings were 78,170 acres and under minor Inams 25,544 acres. In 59,677 acres of the former and 19,241 acres of the latter foodgrains were sown. In 17,808 acres of Circar land and 5,052 acres of minor Inams other products were raised. In Inam villages the lands held under holdings were 16,114. Of this acres 11,273 were sown with food-grains and acres 3,944 with other products. Acres 1,572 were left fallow.

Item No. 2.—The decrease under this head is nominal, a portion of the rent for Fasli 1287 for Palkonda and Honjaram Estates having been paid in advance in Fasli 1286, vide paragraph 24 of the last year's report.

Item No. 3.—The increase under this item is due to the extended cultivation of the Poramboke lands owing to the prevailing high prices, especially for the last two years.

Land-revenue, Miscellancous.—A great portion of the amount is due on account of quit-rent on enfranchised Inams payable by Zemindars, and will be collected shortly.

Abkari.—The arrears under this head consist mainly of the deficiency of the amount guaranteed as minimum revenue by the late renters of the district.

The amount of arrears for which processes were issued was Rupees 77,287. The amount of arrears for which property was attached was Rupees 42,027, while that for which property was sold was Rupees 10,764.

33. Process Service Fund.—The opening balance of the year was Rupees 1,447-3-0. The receipts during the year amounted to Rupees 1,584-15-10 making a total of Rupees 3,032-2-10. The expenditure incurred under this head was Rupees 761-12-7, leaving a balance of Rupees 2,270-6-3. The number of batta peons entertained in the two Government Taluks varied in different months according to requirements.

In the Zemindari Taluks whenever occasion arises to issue processes, special batta peons were employed. The batta collected in these taluks does not admit of the entertainment of a separate Process Service Establishment.

Land Revenue.—The increase under this head is due to the payment of famine batta for the entire year under G.O., No. 41 of 5th January 1877, to the entertainment of a General Deputy Collector under Board's Proceedings, No. 3,615, dated 6th April 1878, and to the salary of the Principal Assistant Collector for $1\frac{1}{2}$ months of Fasli 1286 having been paid in Fasli 1287.

Abkari.—There is a net increase of Rupees 322 under this head, this is due to the payment of Rupees 536 to Gopanna Patnaik, Abkari Renter of Koraput Taluk, on account of collections made by Government during the first six months of his lease.

Sea Customs.—The decrease is due to the less refunds made during the fash under report.

Salt.—The decrease under this head is chiefly due to large expenditure in Fasli 1286 on account of repairing damages to salt works after the cyclone of October 1876.

Stamps.—The increase is principally in the commission paid to Stamp Vendore and is attributable to increased sales.

35. STATEMENTS Nos. 10 AND 11.—The season was favorable to salt manufacture. The quantity of salt remaining in store at the beginning of the fasli was 188,892 Indian Maunds. During the year under report 285,532 Indian Maunds were manufactured, and 50,008 maunds were received from the Godavari District under Board's Proceedings, No. 3,848, dated 17th August 1877, and 246 maunds were gained by measurement. The total quantity available for consumption was therefore 524,678 Indian Maunds. Of this, 347,630 maunds were consumed and 8,037 written off the accounts under sanction of Government conveyed in Board's Proceedings, No. 5,136, dated 1st December 1877, leaving a balance of 169,011 maunds at the close of the fasli. This consists of 56,187 maunds recommended to be written off the accounts—vide paragraph 31 of the last Settlement Report—105,255 maunds actual quantity in store, and 7,569 maunds now recommended to be written off the accounts. Most part of the salt sold this year was that manufactured and received into store during the fasli, hence the centage of waste, namely, 1.88, is less than that reported last year. 1 recommend that the following wastage be written off the accounts:—

"The Tahsildars have reported improvement in the keeping of the village accounts during the year. Now the less surprising revelations are occurring to show how little check is held by the taluk officers over the curnams and their work. It is rare to find a village pettandar who can do more than sign his name or affix his mark; when the curnams are not only writing the accounts but making the revenue collections, it can be easily understood what gross irregularities are committed." 39. Palconda and Honjaram Estates.—Mr. D. Mackie, Agent on behalf of the renters of the Palconda and Honjaram Estates, died in June last and was succeeded by Mr. Tomlinson. Copies of his report and accounts furnished by him are herewith submitted. From the accounts it will be seen that the net settlement of the renters was Rupees 1,58,492 against Rupees 1,58,722 of the preceding year. The collections amounted to Rupees 1,51,280, leaving a balance of Rupees 7,212 at the close of the fash. SETTLEMENT REPORT

0F

GODAVARI.

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I HAVE the honor to report on the settlement of the district for Fasli 1287 (A.D. 1877-78) together with the prescribed statements.

2. STATEMENT No. 1.—This statement exhibits the stations where, and officers by whom, the settlement of each taluk was gonducted, the number of days occupied in the work, and the number of puttas distributed. All the taluks were settled within their limits at places convenient to ryots. Mr. Kough, the Acting Head Assistant Collector, settled Bhimavaram Taluk of the General Deputy Collector's Division and fourteen villages of the Tanuku Taluk of his division. Having been appointed Sub-Collector of the Kistna District, he was relieved by the Assistant Collector Mr. Tate who settled Ellore Taluk of the Head Assistant's Division and Peddapuram Taluk of the Collector's Division. The Temporary Deputy Collector Baru Raja Rao Pantulu Garu settled the remaining seventy-four villages of the Tanuku Taluk. The General Duty Deputy Collector settled Narsapur Taluk of his Division and Yernagudem Taluk of the Head Assistant Collector's Division. The settlement of the Ramachandrapuram and Amalapuram Taluks of the Sub-division was made by the Acting Sub-Collector Mr. Kelsall. The settlement of Bhadrachalam Taluks was conducted by myself. I could not do more as I was for some time engaged in settling a boundary dispute between this district and Bustar. The Acting Salt Deputy Collector P. Pundarikakshudu Pantulu Garu settled Rajahmundry Taluk of the Sub-Collector's Division and Cocanada Division which belongs to the Collector's Division.

3. VARIATIONS IN VILLAGES.—The following statement shows the variation in the number of villages and tenures as compared with the preceding year :—

It will be seen from this that there is an increase of thirteen villages under "Rents for one year." They have been recently built by Kois in the Bhadrachalam Taluk, whose number of villages was seventy-three last year against eighty-six this year. The taluk itself is hilly, and the Kois move about and build their houses in any corner of the jungle and call it a village and abandon it at their pleasure, so that the number rises or falls with their movements.

4. PUTTAS.—The number of puttas for the current year is 67,004 against 65,398 of the last year. The increase may be ascribed chiefly to the increased number of durkhasts and sub-divisions between joint-holders. The puttas for rents for one year and more than one year are 162, the remainder representing individual puttas. Of the 162 puttas above referred to, 156 were granted to villages and the other six for important hamlets leased out separately from the villages to which they appertain. Of the 66,842 individual puttas, 3,003 were newly issued and 20,825 were modified owing to the usual causes and the others remaining unaltered.

5. SEASON.—The season may on the whole be said to have been as unfavorable as in last year, if not more. The monsoon commenced in May as usual, but was scanty throughout as it was in the year before and particularly in the latter part. Very few indeed of the tanks in the upland taluks have received a good supply of water, some not sufficient for oultivation. There was scarcity of drinking water in some villages of the upland taluks. Gingelly suffered from blight, and its outturn

was but poor. The outturn of raggi, cumboo, korra and chama, &c., ranged from one-fourth to oneeighth. The crops in the Delta Taluks were good, but their outturn was in most cases below the average.

6. CANALS.—The canals in the whole delta were as usual closed for repairs during the year under report as detailed in the margin. There was no canal communication between Cocanada and Dowlaishvaram for just a month.

7. RAINFALL.—The annexed statement shows the average fall of rain as compared with the preceding year,

There was a net decrease of rainfall to the extent of 2 inches 99 cents. The fall in the months of June, July and August was much less than in the corresponding months of the preceding year, and there was no rain whatever in January, February and March.

From this it will be seen that the sanitary condition of the district has been worse than in the preceding year. The number of cases from small-pox alone amounted to 13,296, while there were only 100 cases in Fasli 1286. Deaths from cholera were more than double. The number of deaths from fever has fallen short of that of the preceding year by 7,222. The first-named epidemics continued throughout the district during the greater part of the year. The mortality among cattle in the year under report was less than in the preceding year as shown below:—

Rupees 45,251 were remitted on 16,892 acres in this year against Rupees 24,696 on 10,930 acres in Fasli 1286 chiefly in the upland taluks and upland portions of some taluks. This increase may be chiefly attributed to the scanty fall of rain during the cultivation season and deficient supply of water in tanks. The decrease in the

The decrease of 2,685 acres, assessed at Rupees 11,943 under dry, and the increase of 17,694 acres, with an assessment of Rupees 30,345 under wet in the year under report, are chiefly due to a larger extent of dry lands being cultivated by anicut water in consequence of the prevailing high prices of food-grains.

The decrease of Rupees 22,982 under second-crop assessment is chiefly due to the closing of the anicut canals during the cultivation season, and this has occurred in the Delta Taluks.

The increase in Water-tax, Local and Village Service Funds, is consequent on the increase in the holdings and the number of applications for water.

The increase under remissions and miscellaneous items will be accounted for under Statements Nos. 4 and 5 respectively.

12. ENCLOSURE B IN STATEMENT No. 3.—Sugar-cane, &c.—This statement shows the cultivation of sugar-cane, cotton and indigo contrasted with that of the year before.

The decrease in the extent of sugar-cane cultivation chiefly occurs in the Pithapuram division owing to the slight freshes of the Yeleru river. The marked decrease in the area cultivated with cotton may be attributed to the unfavorable character of the season for its cultivation, to the less demand for the article and to the extraordinary high prices of food-grains. The last cause accounts chiefly for the large decrease in indigo cultivation.

13. STATEMENT No. 3, ENCLOSURE C. - Progressive Cowle. - There are no lands held on progressive cowle in this district.

14. STATEMENT No. 3, ENCLOSURE D.—Fields left waste.—This gives the extent of portions of fields left waste included in waste charged in Statement No. 3. The decrease in dry and dry converted into wet is consequent on the increase under dry crops irrigated and delta wet caused partly by this and partly by several holdings being newly taken up by ryots for cultivation. It is gratifying to note that there has been a remarkable increase in the irrigated area chiefly occasioned by the stimulus given to cultivation by the prevailing high prices of food-grains. The decrease of 5,857 acres, assessed at Rupees 18,870 under upland wet, is attributable to a large extent of waste remitted during the year under report.

of which Rupees 9,022 represent remissions on account of water-tax, and the remainder Rupees 55,964* is the amount remitted from the assessment. The remissions during the year exceed those of the preceding fasli by Rupees 15,547. Of this amount Rupees 15,098 represent the difference of wet and dry assessment of wet lands cultivated with dry crops on account of scarcity of water in tanks in upland villages.

19. STATEMENT No. 4, ENCLOSURE A.—Of the Rupces 64,986 remitted, Rupces 823 were on account of assessment on dry lands which have been washed away by the river or taken up by the Public Works Department as well as on account of assessment exclusive of Jodi of the enfranchised Service Inams escheated to Government, Rupces 55,141 of assessment, and Rupces 9,022 of water-tax were remitted on irrigated lands.

20. STATEMENT No. 5.—Miscellaneous Demand, Collection, and Balance.—This statement exhibits the demand, collection, and balance of Land Revenue, &c., Miscellaneous items for Fasli 1287, as also remissions under those heads. The nature of

each item and particulars of the mode of settlement are shown in a separate memorandum appended to the above statement.

There is a large increase of Rupees 1,79,669 in the demand of Land Revenue Miscellaneous items in the year under report the reasons therefore; are explained below under the main heads.

The increase in the revenue from rented villages and in the rent on islands situated in rivers is due to the prevailing high prices.

The increase in the cultivation of jungle lands is owing to the extended cultivation of those lands in the Bhadrachalam Taluk.

Certain lands in four villages of the Cocanada Division in the Pithapuram Estate were classed as usual wet at the close of the fasli, and the water-tax that had been collected previous to settlement had to be refunded to the Zemindar and to his ryots. It was therefore credited to "Excess collections over the demand;" hence the increase in the excess collections.

The increase in the water-tax on Zemindari, &c., lands is due to the extended cultivation owing to the high prices and to the extended use of anicut water both for dry and wet lands and for want of rains in the early part of the season. The seanty freshes the Yeleru had received has also largely contributed to the increase. The decrease in the Revenue Process Service Fees is due to the punctual realization of Government demands. Owing to high prices, the ryots were well able to pay off their dues, and there was no great necessity for recourse to coercive process.

The commission on the estates under the management of the Court of Wards for the past two faslies was carried to the credit of Government in the year under report, and hence the increase under that head.

The increase in the demand of Poramboke lands is consequent on the increase in the surreptitious cultivation of such lands caused by the high prices of grains.

The decrease in the first two items and the increase under Ryotwar and the other two items of Land Revenue have been explained in paragraphs 10, 20 and 21 of this report on Statements Nos. 3, 5 and 6.

The decrease in the demand of Abkári is chiefly due to the farm of the Bhadrachalam Taluk having been purchased for a small sum in consequence of the Ippa flowers from which arrack is made in this taluk not having yielded to the usual extent owing to deficient rains.

There is an increase of Rupees 78,858 under Salt due to the enhancement in the price of the article sanctioned by the Board in their telegram, dated 28th December last.

The large falling off of Rupees 21,105 in the Sea Customs is due partly to the abolition of duties on many articles.

The increase under Land Customs is ascribable to larger imports of tobacco, &c., than in previous year.

The decrease under Court Fees Stamps is not large, and calls for no remark.

The large increase of Rupees 10,864 in Non-judicial Stamps must be attributed in some measure to the greater care taken by the Registration Department in seeing that documents are properly stamped, and in some measure to increased money dealings consequent on increased wealth.

Of the decrease of Rupees 85,090 in the Permanently Settled, Rupees 83,486-5-4 appertain to the Pithapuram Estate. This amount was not collected from the Rajah under G.O., dated 13th March 1878, No. 391, communicated with the Board's Proceedings, dated the 23rd idem, Miscellaneous No. 2,949. This amount has been since adjusted under orders of the Board contained in their Proceedings, dated 14th August 1878, No. 2,264.

The decrease in Shrotriem Jodi is chiefly attributable to a larger amount of arrears having been collected in Fasli 1286, which has not been the case in the year under report.

The increase in Ryotwar and Miscellaneous is due chiefly to the increased demand and partly to the punctual collections.

The increase in the sale of waste lands is due to a larger extent of land having been sold in the year under report.

The decrease in Abkari is due to some extent to the deposits made by the Abkari renters not having been adjusted within the fasli. This has been since done.

The increase in Salt, Land Customs and Non-judicial Stamps, and the decrease under Sea Customs and Court Fee Stamps, follow the increase and decrease in the demand of those items.

The balance up to September 1878 last amounted to about 1.1 per cent. of the total demand.

The balance under permanently settled estates chiefly belongs to Pithapuram estate, amounting to Rupces 83,486, which was ordered to be held in abeyance—*vide* (4.0., No. 391, dated 13th March 1878, communicated with the Board's Miscellaneous No. 2,949, of the 23rd idem.

The balance under other items of Land Revenue will soon be collected.

The balance under sundry sources belongs to Abkári of Ellore, Amalapuram and Ramachandrapuram Taluks. Of this, Rupees 2,300 have been subsequently brought to account; strict measures have been adopted for the realization of the amounts due by the renters of Ramachandrapuram and Amalapuram Taluks.

Of the arrear of Rupees 70,445, Rupees 13,649 are recoverable, Rupees 14,774 loubtful, and the remainder is irrecoverable. The doubtful balance chiefly belongs to water-tax on Zemindari and other Inam lands claimed as usual wet. Some of the cases connected therewith have been disposed of during the year under report, and enquiries are being made about others. The remaining doubtful balance is due to the usual causes. 26. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 8--Coercive Processes.—The number of defaulters against whom processes were issued was 28,340, the amount of the arrear involved was 4,74,091 Rupees; property was attached for an arrear of Rupees 75,124 due by 2,786 ($\frac{1}{14}$ nearly of the number of defaulters). The number of persons whose property was sold was 460 (or about one-sixth of the number of ryots whose property was attached) for an arrear of Rupees 18,488 and the estimated value of the property sold was Rupees 10,645 against Rupees 31,194 in the preceding year. The decrease may be attributed to the prevailing high prices of food grains, which enabled some ryots to pay their demands previous to the attachment and sale of their property.

27. STATEMENT No. 9.—Gross Collections and Charges—This statement shows the gross collections and charges. The following is an abstract of the same :---

The increase in receipts has already been explained in paragraph 23. The net increase of Rupees 25,831 in charges is owing to an increase of Rupees 49,341 under some items and decrease of Rupees 23,510 under others as explained below.

The increase of Rupees 7,926 under land revenue refunds is mainly due to the refund of water-tax to the Rajah of Pithapuram and to his ryots on lands subsequently classed as usual wet.

The net increase of Rupees 600 in the salaries of the Collector, &c., is owing to several changes in the salaries of the above officers in the year under report, viz., my predecessor, Mr. Hope, drew only acting allowance in addition to the salary as Principal Assistant Collector of Ganjam in Fasli 1286. My late Treasury Deputy Collector, Mr. Richardson, was paid up to 31st January 1878 at the rate of Rs. 600, while his successors drew only acting allowances. There was a Temporary Deputy Collector from May to November 1877, while there was none for ten months in the previous fasli.

The decrease in the tent and house-rent allowances is due to the absence of Head Assistant and Assistant Collectors for a portion of the current year.

The increase of Rupees 1,410 in the salaries of the Huzur and Taluk establishments is chiefly due to the payment of famine batta for the whole of the fash under report while it was paid from 19th November 1876 in the previous year.

The increase of Rupees 401 in the Saderwared is owing to the high prices of lamp oil, &c.

The increase of Rupces 3,138 in the Land Revenue Miscellaneous is chiefly owing to the famine batta paid to Process Service establishment and to greater expenditure for the service telegrams on account of season.

The increase in the salaries of the Huzur and Division establishments of the Salt Department is due to the famine batta paid to them during the whole of the current fashi.

The increase of Rupees 1,217 is owing to the retention of the extra Police establishment for a greater portion of the current year.

The decrease in the purchase of salt manufacturer's share and conveying and storing salt is owing to the less dittum of salt manufacture for the current fasli.

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The dittum for Fasli 1287 is 300,000 Indian Maunds while 400,000 Indian Maunds for Fasli 1286.

Rupees 23,186 were incurred in the current year on account of exportation of salt to Vizagapatam on Government account in the current fasli while there was no such charge in Fasli 1286.

A greater amount has been spent in the current year for the repair of salt roads, &c.

28. STATEMENTS Nos. 10 AND 11—Salt Transactions.—These statements exhibit the transactions of salt. The annexed abstract gives the receipts and sales of salt during the fasli under report as compared with previous year :—

The receipts during the fasli show a large decrease in consequence of the salt of the current year not having been received into store within the year. It will be observed that the balance on hand on the 30th June 1877 was *Indian Maunds* 288,209.

The average sales of salt for consumption during the last three years were at 319,989. The variations in the sales under the different heads are not large and are attributable only to fluctuations of trade.

The wastage of salt in the heaps sold amounted to 13,871 Indian Maunds or 3.64 per cent. against 4 of last year and 3.47 and 6.1 of the two previous years respectively. The average of the last three years is 4.52 while the same of current year is only 3.64.

In connection with this subject I would remark that the year was by no means favorable to salt culture. Indeed it was as unfavorable as its predecessor, and the ryots had been put to additional expense owing to the long duration of manufacture at Penuguduru. Manufacture was begun earlier than in any previous year, but owing to the mixture of fresh water of the Godavari with the water in the salt creek which supplies brine, the yield of the crop was below the average and each crop took a longer time than usual. There had been rains now and then at both stations, Penuguduru and Mogultur, to the detriment of the operations of manufacture. The result was that the ryots were employed longer than they would have been in an ordinary good season, and they felt this the more because of instructions from Madras to continue manufacture both in this and the last year after they had once closed all operations. The prices of all articles of consumption were unusually high; laborers could not be procured except on higher rates of pay, and the circumstances of the ryots were therefore bad.

29. TALUK AND VILLAGE MANUAL ACCOUNTS,—The taluk and village accounts continue as well as before, and I have no special remarks to make on this head.

30. HUZUR Accounts.—The Huzur accounts are carefully kept.

31. LANDS ACQUIBED BY PUBLIC SERVANTS.—The annexed statement exhibits the number of public servants who hold lands and the extent thereof. A. Ramanna, the Tahsildar of Tanuku who died at the close of the fasli held some lands in that taluk. The other Tahsildars and Deputy Tahsildars have reported that they hold no lands within their jurisdiction. Kotti Subbarao Pantulu, the Deputy Collector on General Duty, who died in July last, had some lands and gardens in his division. The other Deputy Collectors have no lands in the district :—

32. LAW SUITS.—The following statement exhibts the costs awarded to Government in the several suits and recovered in Fasli 1287 as also the amount of stamp duty due to Government in pauper suits, the portions collected, and the balance left. It will be seen that the amount of costs awarded is Rupees 904-10-2, of which Rupees 648-2-7 have already been collected before the end of the current fasli and Rupees 73-1-8 were levied subsequent to June 1877. There will still be a balance of Rupees 183-5-11 under costs yet to be collected. Of this Rupees 83-13-3 is the amount due from persons who are reported to be possessed of no property but still under inquiry; while Rupees 31-5-7 is the amount for the recovery of which applications were made to the Courts for the issue of warrants. The remainder Rupees 68-3-1 is the amount due from persons deceased and left no property. It cannot be collected. I request therefore that the Board will be pleased to obtain the sanction of Government for writing off the amount as irrecoverable.

The amount of stamp duty in pauper suits awarded is Rupees 6,334-9-10, of which Rupees $\cdot 1,262$ -14-8 have already been collected before the end of Fasli 1287, and the following is an abstract of particulars of the remaining balance :—

From the statement in the margin, it will be seen that there is an increase of 20,195 acres in food-grains and a decrease of 19,981 acres in other products. The chief cause for the increase in the former and the decrease in the latter is the stimulus given to ryots by the prevailing high prices of food-grains.

In the Ramachendrapuram Treasury, Rupces 80 were kept in a separate bag and not credited to cash chittah. Orders were issued to the Tahsildar to credit the same to account. In the Peddapuram Taluk Treasury compensation money was kept separate in a separate chittah. The amount was ordered to be credited to "Deposit" and paid to the parties when they attend. A stamp was found without district seal. It was subsequently sealed. In Ellore Taluk it was found that accounts were not well kept. The Tahsildar's attention is directed to this point. With the exception of the above defects, the result of the examination of cash, cash accounts, and stamp stock is correct and satisfactory.

In Fasli 1286 the number of fresh puttas, of altered puttas, and of unaltered puttas were 904, 11,752, and 13,181, respectively. The decrease in dry and increase in wet have chiefly resulted from the exceptional nature of the season which induced many to apply for canal water who had hitherto done without it, which was followed by the transfer of the lands from dry to wet in the accounts; the large increase in cultivation in the year was also entered under the head of Wet. The decrease in the second crop ssessment is due to most of the anicut channels in Ramachandrapuram Taluk having been closed during the latter part of the fasli. The large increase in water-tax is the result of the same causes as have already been dwelt upon with reference to the increase of wet cultivation. In the dry Taluk of Rajahmundry, and in the upland villages of Ramachandrapuram Taluk, a large extent of land left waste under tanks was remitted. Hence the increase under that head.

The increase under "Other remissions" and Miscellaneous items will be explained hereafter.

The increase under No. 1 has occurred because some title-deeds were delivered to Inamdars in the fasli under report. The increase under No. 2 is the result of extended use of irrigation in the Ramachandrapuram and Amalapuram Taluks for both wet and dry crops.

The lankas sold well on account of the prevalent high prices of produce, hence the increase under Item No. 3.

Items Nos. 4, 5, 6 and 8 are of a fluctuating nature and call for no remark.

The decrease under No. 7, which is owing to the fact that the high prices realized for their crops enabled the ryots to pay more punctually than usual, is small.

Item No. 9 explains itself.—The increase under No. 11 is due chiefly to the adjustment of Government commission of the estates under the management of the Court of Wards in the year under notice.

Of the sum of Rupees 1,888-4-9 under Ferry rents Rupees 688-4-0 were already recommended for remission, and the rest, viz., Rupees 1,200-0-9, is classed as irrecoverable as it is due by paupers. There appears to have been much remissness on the part of the Tahsildars in the collection of ferry rents, and I am now issuing stringent orders to them upon the subject, so that I hope for an improvement.

24. CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATES.—Having only joined the division since the close of the fasli I can say nothing on this point. I must note, however, that the Ramachandrapuram Tahsildar applied for and obtained leave of absence exactly at the time when the Jamabandi of his taluk was being done.

3. The settlement of each taluk was carried on within its limits and the whole was settled by the end of May.

4. VARIATION IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES .- No variation occurred in the number and tenure of villages.

5. There is a very small increase of 2,959, or below 2 per cent. in the number of puttas over that of the preceding year, which does not call for any special notice.

6. SEASON.—The season was on the whole pretty favorable when compared with Fasli 1286.

The total quantity of rain-fall during the whole year was inches 28.54 against 20.66 in the proceeding year, nearly five inches less than in Fasli 1285, also a dry year.

The rain which fell in June, July, August, and November was unequally distributed, as well as deficient in quantity; while in May, September, and October the fall was general and copious.

7. The Kistna did not rise as usual, the highest fresh having been 10.60 feet over the crest of the anicut. The river-fed tanks in Divi Division were empty.

8. Owing to deficiency of rain from June to August and to prevalence of insect pests dry crops suffered to some extent, not, however, so scriously as to demand remission, except in seven villages of the Vinukonda Taluk and two villages of the Narsa-raopet Taluk alluded to in the Board's Proceedings, No. 1,524, dated 7th June 1878.

Wet paddy in the Upland Taluks gave more than an average outturn, but in the Delta, owing to the prevalence of blight, the yield was below the average.

9. SANITARY CONDITION.—The total mortality shows a decrease of 668 when compared with that of Fasli 1286, and an increase of 8,070 when compared with that of Fasli 1285. Cholera, small-pox, and fever visited most of the taluks. The deaths from small-pox are in excess of those of Fasli 1286.

10. No. 2, STATEMENT SHOWING AVERAGE PRICES OF GRAINS.—The average prices of the staple grains, except cumboo, advanced 50 per cent. and upwards over those of Fasli 1286; while cumboo rose 38 per cent.: they were more than double the average of the previous ten years excluding famine year).

11. The high prices which ruled before the commencement of the harvest season of the year, combined with the exceptional circumstances of Fasli 1286, pressed on the poor very much and the district was over-run by streams of famine wanderers from the neighbouring distressed districts, so that the introduction of State relief was necessitated. The necessity ceased from the beginning of February last as the harvest season and the irrigation repairs in the Public Works Department afforded the poor sufficient means of livelihood.

4. The rainfall of the year as compared with that of the previous fasli is given below :—

Taking the division as a whole the fall was 20 inches more than in Fasli 1286. It was heavier in the north than in Kurambranad, but no portion of the division had reason for complaint on account of the season which was decidedly a good one. Excellent Kani and Magarom harvests were secured, and the former particularly was decidedly above the average. As a consequence, no general remission of assessment was necessary. Only those occasional and temporary remissions, usually given in consequence of assessed trees having passed out of bearing, were required.

5. The public health was much the same as in the previous year. Cholera, which commenced in Fasli 1286, continued epidemically during the greater part of the year, and 2,474 persons fell victims to it. Smallpox was also prevalent, but only in a sporadic form. As was to be expected from the progress from south to north, which has been well marked during the last three years, Cherakal Taluk suffered most. 29. No. 4, STATEMENT SHOWING THE PARTICULARS OF REMISSION. —The fluctuations under the principal items of remissions are accounted for below.

30. Loss of PRODUCE.—In the year under report only Rupees 27,195 had to be remitted as against Rupees 3,44,045 in Fasli 1286, in which year the loss was greater. Hence the large decrease under this item.

31. LAND FLOODED.—This item represents the water tax on wet waste remitted in the Delta Taluks, and the explanation given in paragraph 14 accounts for the increase of Rupees 31,835 under it.

32. SALARIES AND RUSSUMS OF CURNAMS.—This item represents the usual deduction from Beriz allowed to the Curnams in the Palnad Taluk : the increase of Rupees 67% under it is due to the increased Beriz.

33 SPECIAL REMISSION TO CURNAMS.—The increase of Rupees 79 has resulted from the increased occupation by certain Curnams entitled to Bád Inams.

34. FEES TO VILLAGE SERVANTS AND LAND CESS.—The increase under these two items is due to the increased extent of occupation.

35. The remissions in the year under report aggregated Rupces 1,00,989 against Rupces 3,86,010 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rupces 2,85,021.

36. No. 5, STATEMENT SHOWING THE DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE OF MIS-CELLANEOUS ITEMS.—The items under which there are large fluctuations are explained below : —

37. No. 1, Jodi on Sundry Inams.—The increase of Rupees 2,494 is ascribed to the inclusion under this item of Jodi on certain Service Inams in the Sattanapalle Taluk, which was erroneously included under the Village Service Fund in Fasli 1286; to the charge on excess in certain minor Inams on account of Fasli 1286 having been brought to account in the year under report; and to certain minor Inams having been newly enfranchised.

38. Nos. 6 and 10, Cultivation of Waste and Porambokes.—The increase of Rupees 5,824 under Item No. 6 and of Rupees 2,140 under Item No. 10 is attributed to the unauthorized cultivation or encroachments of a large extent of assessed and unassessed waste lands and Porambokes for which no puttas were issued at the Jamabandy.

39. No. 13, Grazing tax or Grass rent.—The decrease of Rupees 11,602 is owing to less competition. This chiefly occurred in the Vinukonda Taluk, which was much affected by the scarcity of Fasli 1286.

40. No. 37, Rent of Islands situated in Rivers. -- The decrease of Rupees 6,904 is the to the sales of new accretions being less than in the previous year.

41. No. 46, Excess Collection over the Demand.—The increase of Rupees 1,476 is chiefly due to erroneous collections.

42. No. 47, Water tax on Zemindaries and Inam Lands.—The water tax on certain Zemindaries and minor Inams was not settled within the year under report from want of sufficient information. Hence the decrease of Rupees 27,926.

43. No. 56, Revenue Process Service Fees.—The year under report commenced with heavy arrears, for the speedy realization of which and current revenue coercive process had to be resorted to more than in the previous year. Hence an increase of Rupees 18,490.

44. No. 58, List on Seri Lands not included in the Dowle of previous Fasli.—The charge made is Rupees 19,754 as against Rupees 2,141 in the previous year. The large increase of Rupees 17,613 is chiefly due to the following causes :—

- (1.) In Fasli 1286 Dalwa crop was cultivated in the Colair lands of the Gudivada Taluk, but its charge, amounting to Rupees 10,820, was brought to account in the year under report.
- 2.) The remission granted for Fasli 1286 in the three taluks of the Vinukonda Division and in the Gudivada Taluk was revised as stated in paragraph 29 of that year's Settlement Report and a sum of Rupees 8,470 was again charged in the year under review.

45. No. 60, Double Charge for Water.—The decrease of Rupees 2,872 is chiefly due to a less extent of unauthorized irrigation than in the previous year.

46. No. 65, Other Items.—The revenue under this head amounted to Rupees 36,102, or Rupees 19,493 more than in the previous year. The increase is chiefly owing—

- (1.) To the water tax on certain Zemindaries, Agraharams, and minor Inams remaining unsettled at the close of Fasli 1286 having been brought to account during the year under report.
- (2.) To the transfer of Jodi of certain Service Inams in the Sattanapalle Taluk from the head "Village Service Fund," to which it was erroneously credited in the previous year to the head " Land Revenue."
- (3.) And to the sales of tank beds more than in last year.

47. The gross revenue derived from miscellaneous items shows an increase of Rupees 17,024 in land revenue and of Rupees 190 in other items over that of the previous year.

48. No. 6, STATEMENT SHOWING THE DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE OF ZEMIN-DARIES, &C.—The arrears of Peisheush and Shrotriem on Zemindaries and Inam villages at the close of the Fasli 1287, subsequent

50. PEISHCUSH.—The increase of Rupces 15 is due to the addition made to the peishcush of Innagadapa Zemindari of two-thirds of the assessment of a resumed Inam situated in Innagadapa and made over to the Zemindar under Board's Proceedings, No. 4,833, dated 15th May 1878.

51. JODI AND QUIT-RENT ON SHROTRIEM AND INAM VILLAGES.—The decrease of Rupees 22 is ascribed (1) to the revision of quit-rent made by the Inam Commissioner in two Agraharams of the Palnad Taluk and in an Agraharam of the Repalli Taluk, and (2) to the reduction of quit-rent in an Agraharam of the Gudivada Taluk sanctioned in Board's Proceedings, No. 14,590, dated 22nd October 1877, on account of lands taken up for public purposes.

52. RYOTWARI AND MISCELLANEOUS.—The variations under these items have been explained in paragraphs from 12 to 47.

53. ABKARI.—In Fasli 1286 the arrack rents of eight taluks purchased by Venkataswami Nayadu were cancelled from 1st September 1876 under Board's Proceedings, No. 1,641, dated 26th June 1876, and resold for a sum less than that offered in the first sale. As Venkataswami Nayadu had held them for the first two months the demand of these eight farms for Fasli 1286 was calculated for two months in proportion to the original rent and for the rest of the year in proportion to the amount obtained in the resale, (vide Board's Proceedings, No. 1,761, dated 10th July 1876); while for the whole year under report the demand included the rent accruing from the resale. Hence the decrease of Rupees 3,385.

54. SALT.—The decrease of Rupees 88,755 is attributed to the abolition of the discount system, as well as to the decreased demand at Hyderabad for Kistna salt in consequence of the great facilities afforded by the Nizam's State Railway for the importation of Bombay salt into Hyderabad.

55. SEA CUSTOMS.—The decrease of Rupces 12,299 is chiefly due to the less exportation of food-grains which were exported in considerable quantities to Jaffna in the previous year.

56. STAMPS.—The increase of Rupees 2,532 is the result of a gross increase of Rupees 10,229 in the sales of non-judicial stamps and a gross decrease of Rupees 7,697 in the sales of judicial stamps. The decrease in the latter is attributable to the less number of petitions presented to the Revenue authorities and to fluctuating litigations, while the increase in the former has resulted probably from extended private transactions in consequence of famine and high prices.

58. PERMANENTLY SETTLED, SHROTRIEM JODI, RYOTWARI, AND MISCELLANEOUS.—A the outset of Fasli 1287 there were heavy arrears under each item resulting from the postponement and difficulty of collection in the previous year. These and the current kists were speedily and punctually collected in the year under review. Hence the large increase in collections.

59. ABKARI.—The decrease is due to the difficulty of collection. Some of the renters who fell in heavy arrears have wilfully withheld payments, claiming remission for the loss they had sustained in consequence of famine in Fasli 1286 and of the misunderstanding as to the relative rights of the toddy and arrack renters. The subject was dwelt on at length in this office, No. 1,585, dated 25th Jvly 1878, embodied in the Board's Proceedings, No. 2,301, dated 16th August 1878. One of the defaulters, Lakkarazu Lakkarazu, has been imprisoned under Section 48, Act II of 1864, and steps are being taken to proceed similarly against other defaulters.

60. SALT, SEA CUSTOMS, AND STAMPS.—The fluctuations under these items have been accounted for in paragraphs 54, 55, and 56.

The opening balance of Fasli 1287 was Rupees 8,81,846, of which Rupees 6,56,186 were collected and Rs. 14,291 were written off the accounts under the orders of Government, leaving a balance of Rupees 2,11,369 at the close of the fasli. 65. Of the arrear above five fashis there remains a sum of Rupees 6,781 which is partly recoverable and party doubtful. Of this Rupees 571 are against Shrotriem in the Gudivada Taluk, and appear to be due to the erroneous credit of collections of this item to other items in the taluk accounts. The error will be rectified after scrutiny which is being made, and the balance, if any to be recovered, will be soon realized.

66. The amount of Rupees 195 under Ryotwari, distributed over Bapatla, Bander, Guntoor, Gudivada, and Bezwada is almost entirely recoverable.

67. The sum of Rupees 6,017 under Miscellaneous is made up of Rupees 1,511 in the Bander Taluk, Rupees 4,304 in the Nuzvid Division, Rupees 75 in the Bapatla Tatuk, Rupees 2 in the Guntoor Taluk, Rupees 94 in the Gudivada Taluk, and Rs. 31 in the Bezwada Taluk. The greater portion is due against minor Inams in the Zemindari and Government villages and Inam villages, many of the holders of which live in distant countries; some laxity in collection appears to have been tolerated in the taluks. Stringent orders have been issued for their speedy realization.

68. Of the total arrears of all the years including those above five Faslis, Rupees 48,154-14-9 are irrecoverable and Rupees 51,986-6-1 are doubtful, which will be decided as soon as possible either for collection or remission according to the circumstances of each case. The recoverable arrears of Rupees 85,976-5-8 will be collected as soon as practicable.

80. It will be observed that the quantity of salt manufactured and received into store was 341,127 Indian Maunds or 280,981 Indian Maunds less than in the previous year. The decrease is due to less manufacture having been permitted in consequence of a considerable stock on hand at the beginning of the year under report and of bad sales.

81. The increase of 22,214 Indian Maunds under sales is made up of a decrease of 74,698 Indian Maunds both in Home and Inland consumption, and an increase of 96,912 Indian Maunds in exportation by sca. The decrease in the two former is ascribed as noticed in paragraph 54 to the abolition of discount system and to less demand at Hyderabad for Kistna salt, while the increase in the latter is due to the transmission of salt from Nizampatam to Calingapatam as mentioned in paragraph 77.

82. The sales of salt in the year under report have resulted in the wastage of 23,216 Indian Maunds, or a little below 5 per cent. which is not an unusual rate. Sanction is solicited to write off this as also the wastage of Fasli 1286 recommended to be written off in the last Jamabandi report.

83. No. 12 STATEMENT.—The Talukwar demand and collection of the various sources of revenue are particularized in this statement.

84. EXAMINATION OF TALUK AND VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.—No glaring errors have been brought to notice in regard to this accounts.

85. No lands seem to have been acquired by public servants during the year under report. The annexed statement shows the previous acquisitions :---

64. In the upland taluks wet paddy yielded more than the average, while in the delta, where the wet cultivation is extensive, the yield fell far below the average from the effects of blight.

Cholum represents gidda jonna and peda jonna. The former has produced indifferently, while the latter suffered from blight and may be said to have generally failed. Variga, pulses, and castor suffered in some places from insect pests. The yield of other crops was pretty fair.

95. For the whole district the outturn of all dry crops may on average be estimated at an 8-Anna crop and the wet crop at an 11-Anna crop.

6. The season opened well in the beginning of the fash, though rain was partial in some localities, and the ryots of the four taluks in the sub-divisions were enabled to carry on cultivation operations extensively and raise the early dry crops, such as korra, sajja, gidda jonua, mokka jouna, &c. These crops have yielded well generally throughout in Guntoor, Repalle, and Sattanapalle Taluks, but in Bapatla they suffered from deficient rains and grubs.

7. The dry paddy crops, such as vela vadam, jilama, and budama, yielded above the average and gave 12 Annas crop on the whole, while the cholum produce fell below the average, that is, the outturn was between one-sixteenth and one-fourth in the several taluks owing to excessive rains and to its being sown late in the season.

8. The wet dry crop under tanks in the upland taluks Guntoor and Sattanapalle was raised and transplanted extensively, and the outturn was as good as could be expected.

9. Late Crops.-For pulse grains, &c., the season did not prove generally propitious.

10. As regards the wet paddy crop in the Repalle and Bapatla Taluks owing to the good rains that fell and channel irrigation, the lands were extensively cultivated with rice crop which gave a very favorable harvest generally, the outturn being more than half of the average yield in Repalle and three-fourths and full crop in Bapatla Taluk, though it suffered in some localities from deficient rains and from submersion. 11. The public health was much affected by the prevalence of cholera, small-pox, fever, and guinea-worm. Loss of life was, however, not extensive except in the Sattanapalle Taluk where the number of deaths from other diseases is said to be 2,127.

12. The services of the Vaccinators were available and medical aid was afforded wherever necessary.

13. There was also an outbreak of disease among cattle in all the taluks except Guntoor). The number of animals carried off was very great in Sattanapalle and Bapatla Taluks and small in the Repalle Taluk.

14. Statement No. 2 shows that the prices of paddy and other wet and dry grains were considerably higher in this than in the previous year.

15. Statement No. 3.—It will be seen from the following abstract that there was an increase of acres 12,524.34 in the extent of cultivation and of Rupees 58,533-11-11 in the assessment :—

16. This result is due to the increase in the extent of lands taken up this year. 17. Euclosure A shows that of acres 36,150.45 assessed at Rupees 97,094-14-8 entered as relinquishments, acres 14,940.36 assessed at Rupees 40,217-1-10 are absolute relinquishments and acres 14,664.65 assessed at Rupees 35,081-4 8 are transfers, to which are added acres 129.29 assessed at Rupees 464-4-6, being lands taken up for public purposes and found less on measurement being encroached on by the river as well as lands of which the assessment was altered by the Settlement Department, thus the total demand for the current year amounted to Rupees 19,68,765-4-6 after deducting the remissions on account of full waste (Rupees 10,903-5-9) and usual and other remissions, and including fasaljasti or second crop assessment and water-rate on dry crops Rupees 12,054-0-6.

18. Enclosure B shows that the total area on which cotton was cultivated was acres 74,078.69 assessed at Rupees 1,20,557.15.5 against the figures of last fash showing a decrease of acres 5,778.41 assessed at Rupees 9,979.8.6 owing to a larger extent of land cultivated with this article having been used for the growth of food-grains chiefly in the Sattanapalle Taluk, though there was a slight increase in the other taluks.

19. The cultivation of indigo this year was acres 12,702.01, assessed at Rupees 20,323-12-4, exhibiting a decrease of acres 1,207.26 in the extent and an increase of Rupees 2,085-11-10 in the assessment.

20. Enclosure C is blank, there being no lands taken up on progressive cowles.

At the beginning of Fasli 1287 the amount of arrears outstanding was Rupees 4,19,198-4-8, of which Rupees 3,22,021-15-6 were collected within the fasli including remission, leaving a balance of Rupees 97,176-5-2.

Of the unadjusted balance of Rupees 97,176-5-2, a sum of Rupees 43,131-0-3 is classed as doubtful, Rupees 3,923-1-6 is the amount of defalcation discovered in the villages of Korapad, Ippatam, and Nidamarru of the Guntoor Taluk. The matter is still under reference to the Collector.

Rupces 34,579-14-1 is the amount of wet remission granted in the Repalle Taluk for Fasli 1286, but pending reference to the Engineer Department.

Rupees 1,049-12-6 is the amount of arrears of Pullari or grazing rents of certain villages of Bapatla Taluk which the renters withheld on the ground that the grass was taken for thatching the salt heads. The matter is under reference to the Collector.

Rupees 947-8-10 is the assessment on lands taken up for roads and channel banks.

Rappes 820-1-4 Gallutumulu cess on usual wet Inams, which the holders object to pay.

Rupees 213-9-7 is the assessment charged on Inams on the ground that Sire and Poramboke lands were included in them.

Rupces 333-10-10 is the arrears of assessment, the collection of which is stopped for want of property in the villages of the defaulters peuding enquiry if they possess. any in other villages.

Rupees 238-5-3 is the assessment charged on excess in the Inams which the Inamdars objected to pay, saying that the Inams contained no excess actually.

Rupees 388-8-0 is the amount of arrears due from paupers absconding or deceased ryots.

Rupees 176-12-7 is the arrears of assessment charged on Porambokes which the defaulters demur to pay on the ground that the lands are not Porambokes.

Rupees 298-10-7 is the amount objected to by the ryots on the ground that there is deficiency in their holdings.

The remainder Rupees 160-14-2 belong to some sundry items involving arrears of assessment, &c., due by some individuals who object to pay on divers grounds, regarding which enquiry is being made.

Rupees 28,313-10-8 are irrecoverable and have been recommended for remission, viz., Rupees 16,769-1-7 as per last year's account (after deducting Rupees 9,068-0-9 the amount remitted) and Rupees 11,544-9-1 now recommended as irrecoverable.

As regards the remainder Rupees 25,731-10-3 classed as recoverable, prompt measures will be taken for the speedy realization thereof.

Coercive measures .- Enclosure A in Statement No. 8 shows the extent to which coercive process was employed in the collection of revenue in Fasli 1287. Processes were issued against 40,984 defaulters for the recovery of Rupees 3,94,686-0-8. Property to the estimated value of Rupees 1,48,480-6-9 was attached, but the amount realized from the property actually sold was Rupees 18,707-12-1, of which Rupees 6,086-13-6 were the sale proceeds of lands and Rupees 12,620-14-7 of personal property.

Examination of Taluk Accounts.-Owing to my having taken charge of the district late in February the Jamabandi was protracted into the hot weather and the scrutiny of accounts was neither so close or exhaustive as I could wish it to be. This year intimation has been given that every village will be examined in closest detail, and as the revision of establishments will by that time be completed, the efficiency of the Curnams will be exhaustively tested. At present 1 fear their accounts are, as a rule, far from regularly kept.

Conduct of Subordinates .- That both of the Taluk and Huzoor staff has been very satisfactory. The clerks in my office are diligent and efficient, and of my Sheristadar P. Jwalarangam Puntulu, now ten years in this post, can only speak in the highest terms of praise.

The Tahsildar of Guntoor K. Purushottam and the Deputy Tahsildar of Ponnoor D. Narasimha Rao are very excellent officers. The latter will, I hope, make a good Tahsildar and deserves promotion.

The Tahsildar of Bapatla R. Nagabushanam Nayudu of fifteen years' standing or upwards is hard-working and a most energetic mover about his taluk.

5. SEASON.—The total rain-fall during the year was 34 inches against 12:59 inches in the year before, as shown in the margin. As already stated in the Administration Report the rain-fall in the year was very favorable and agricultural operations were in consequence very active. The scarcity of rain in June, July, and August was more than compensated by the copious showers of the north-east monsoon and the crops yielded well.

6. SANITARY CONDITION.—As will be seen from the details given in the margin the sanitary condition of the district during the year was far from satisfactory. A fatal species of fever succeeded the famine and 38,904 people fell victims to it. The total number of deaths in the year was 14,000 more than in the previous year.

7. AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS.—The following is a comparative abstract of the prices of the principal grains produced in the district.

In the last Jamabandi Report Rupees 2,28,613 were shown as the balance outstanding on the 31st November 1877 on account of past years up to Fasli 1285. A balance of Rupees 8,67,469 having accrued on account of Fasli 1286, the total amount of arrears up to 1286 at the end of November 1877 was Rupees 10,96,082 according to the Treasury accounts. Deducting collections up to 30th November 1878 and remissions amounting to Rupces 7,62,507 the balance ought to be Rupces 3,33,575. The sum shown under Abkári is the balance by the toddy contractor of the Udayagiri farm which has been sold at his risk, and enquiries are being made to ascertain whether the defaulter has any property from which it can be realized. 28. WORKING OF VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.—The village accounts in this district are generally kept in proper order. No special reports have been received from the Tahsildars.

29. LANDS ACQUIRED BY PUBLIC SERVANTS.—The 2nd Gumastah of the Nellore Deputy Tahsildar's Office, Rallapalli Narasimhulu, purchased a wet Inam in Madirazugudur in the Nellore Taluk, measuring 4.68 acres paying a quit-rent of Rupees 30-7-0. The 2nd-class Revenue Inspector of the Nellore Taluk, Rallapalli Venkata Seshiah, his brother, also owns an interest in those lands.

30. INSPECTION OF RAIN GAUGES.—No reports of inspection have been received.

31. BOUNDARY MARKS.—The total number of boundary marks is given at 1,295,204, of which 1,247,934 are said to be in good order, 33,004 are in need of repairs, and 14,266 are missing altogether.

REMARKS ON THE CONDUCT OF PUBLIC SERVANTS.—The year was one which the recovery of the district from famine, the requirements of the famine audit, increased cultivation and crime which continued unusally rife made a year of hard work, but it was dealt with energetically and efficiently by my subordinates.

: FLUCTUATIONS IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES .- In the fash under report there were no variations in the tenure of villages nor in the number. The Jamabandi accounts for Fasli 1287 were prepared for the old villages as they stood prior to amalgamation by Survey Department agreeably to instructions conveyed in the Proceedings of the Board of Revenue, No. 636, dated 6th March 1876.

1. PUTTAS.-The number of fresh puttas issued in Fasli 1287 was 8,464, of which 193 were book puttas and 8,271 ordinary or single sheet puttas. The details required in Circular, No. 28 of 1870, are given in the subjoined form.

Though there was more rain this year than last fasli (a famine year) still it was considered to be quite insufficient and untimely. Several of the dry crops, such as sujja and cholum, etc., suffered serionsly for want of timely rains in all the parts of the Sub-Division except in some portions of the Ongole Taluk. The tanks received only a moderate supply of water. Hence wet Shavi remissions had to be granted, especially in Kandukur Taluk. Dry remissions were also granted in Kandukur and Kanyagiri Taluks. The dry crops were partially injured by locusts and other insects.

Water for drinking purposes was procurable in all places except in a few villages of the Kandukur and Kanyagiri Taluks. On the whole the year under report was undoubtedly better than the preceding famine year.

6. SANITARY STATE.—The sanitary condition of the Sub-Division in the fasli under report was unsatisfactory. Ague commenced with the advent of the rains and did great have, especially in Kanyagiri and Kandukur Taluks and Podili and Darsi divisions. There were many deaths from it. Cholera, small-pox, and diarrhee were prevalent to some extent. Guinea-worm prevailed also in the Kandukur and Kanyagiri Taluks. Table diseases were prevalent during the early part of the fasli under report owing probably to want of sufficient pasturage and water in the early part of the year. As the year advanced, however, these became more plentiful and in Kanyagiri Taluk specially there was more than sufficient pasturage for the cattle which survived, about half of the cattle in the division having (it is reported) died from starvation during the last year and the early part of the present year.

11. REMISSIONS ON ACCOUNT OF DRY WASTE.—In the year under report the total occupied waste was 97,366 Acres, which was less than half the extent left waste in the previous year. The extent of dry waste in the three taluks was 91,514 Acres, and the amount of dry remission granted in the year under report with reference to G.O., No. 387, dated 12th March 1878, was only Rupees 538 against Rupees 56,399 in the previous year, namely Rupees 526 in the Kanyagiri Taluk, 12 Rupees in the Kandukur Taluk, whilst no dry remission at all was granted in the Ongole Taluk. I must remark here that the amount of remission aforesaid relates to dry waste, only the details of remission granted for dry Shavi being given in the ensuing paragraphs. The yield of the dry crop was on the whole a moderate one.

(a). Remission on account of Wet Waste.—The total extent of wet waste was 5,852 Acres, which is rather less than half the extent of the previous fasli. The total amount remitted on account of wet waste was Rupees 22,977 against Rupees 58,750 in the previous year. Of the sum of Rupees 22,977 remitted on account of wet waste Rupees 21,918 relates to whole numbers and Rupees 1,059 to partial numbers. The amount remitted on account of partial waste was entirely in the Kandukur Taluk.

(b.) Allowances to Heads of Villages.—The usual remission of Rupees 48 was given on account of the salaries of the Village Munsifs of Tammavaram, Temma-napalem, Madaramitta, and Bodduvanipalem in the Ongole Taluk.

(c.) Shavi.—The amount remitted under this head was as follows :—

against Rupees 40,244 in the previous year. The largest amount of remission under these two heads relates to Kandukur Taluk. No remission for dry Shavi was granted in Ongole Taluk, nor for wet Shavi in Kanyagiri Taluk.

(d.) Teervakammi.—The amount remitted under this head was Rupees 3,104. Of this sum Rupees 3,069 belong to the Kandukur Taluk and Rupees 35 to the Ongole taluk, while no remissions were granted in Kanyagiri Taluk. The amount granted under this head in the previous fasli was Rupees 2,778, the increase is therefore Rupees 326. Dry crops in wet lands seem to have been raised to a great extent in Kandukur Taluk owing to insufficiency of supply of water in the tanks.

(c.) Increment Remission.—The remission which was granted on account of the gradual introduction of the new settlement rates in accordance with Revenue Circulars, No. 21 of 1874 and No. 3 of 1875, amounted in the fash under report to Rupees 12,686, which is a little more than half the sum granted in the previous fash.

(f) Lift Remission.—The amount remitted on account of irrigation by lift at the rate of 1 Rupee per acre was Rupees 258, which nearly tallies with the amount remitted in the previous fasli. This remission was granted in accordance with Revenue Circular, No. 3 of 1875, quoted above.

(g.) Remission on account of Topes.—Under Clause 1, paragraph 5, of Revenue Circular, No. 57 of 1874, a sum of Rupees 179 was remitted on account of public topes in the Ongole and Kandukur Taluks.

(h.) Remission on account of loss of Crops by Locusts or Grasshoppers.— A sum of Rupees 121 was remitted in Kandukur Taluk on account of loss of crops by locusts and grasshoppers. This remission seems to have been specially granted by the Temporary Deputy Collector C. Ramarau Garu.

(i.) Cowle Remission.—A sum of Rupces 18 was remitted on account of waste lands covered with prickly-pear given on cowle for a term of years free of assessment in accordance with G.O., No. 1,236, dated 29th September 1874, communicated in Revenue Circular, No. 63 of 1874.

13. The cultivation of sugar-cane, which is confined to the Kanyagiri Taluk, has decreased to 1 Acre.

15. The quit-rent on Shrotriems being a fixed sum there is no variation in that item.

The toddy farms were rented out for three Faslis from Fasli 1285, and hence the only difference in that revenue is a slight increase of Rupees 3 due to the sale proceeds of stolen toddy in Kandukur Taluk.

The large increase in Ryotwar Revenue, Land Revenue, Miscellaneous, and Road Fund is owing to the small demand in the previous fashi on account of the then prevailing famine.

Under Land Revenue, Miscellaneous, there is an increase of Rupees 4,130 and a decrease of Rupees 1,410, which give a net increase of Rupees 2,720. The details of this item for the current and last faslis are shown in the statement hereunder annexed:—

Item No. 1 has been abolished with reference to G.O., No. 844, of the 29th May 1875, but the demand under the same is the amount payable in the Chundi estate. The small decrease in Items Nos. 2 and 6, and the small increase in Item No. 10, need no remark. The decrease in Item No. 3 is due partly to relinquishments and partly to errata lists received from the Revenue Settlement Department reducing or cancelling the charge on the excess. The large increase under Item No. 4 is owing to the more favorable nature of the season of the year under report than that of the previous famine year. The indulgence granted to ryots to cultivate Ashalminha or other unoccupied lands at moderate rates on account of the famine in last year was withdrawn in the year under report, and hence the large decrease in the Item No. 5. No pasture was sold in Fasli 1286 on account of famine. The demand of Rupees 597 under Item No. 9 for the year under report relates only to Kanyagiri Taluk. No sales took place in the taluks of Ongole and Kandukur.

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Coercive measures for realization of arrears were not adopted in Fasli 1286. The large increase in Item No. 7 is owing to the said measures having been put in force during the year under report. The increase in Items Nos. 18 and 19, and the decrease in Items Nos. 7, 8, 12, 13, 15, and 16, need no special remark. The demand in the current year under Items Nos. 11 and 14 being the same as in the previous years these items call for no remark.

16. DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE OF REVENUE.—The subjoined statement exhibits the demand, collection, and balance of current revenue for Fasli 1287. It will appear therefrom that the collections within the Fasli were 32.47 per cent. of the demand against 2.23 per cent. in the previous year, and that subsequent collections up to 30th November 1878 were 38.95 per cent. against 13.78 per cent. in the previous year. The total collections therefore up to 30th November 1878 on account of the current demand for Fasli 1287 were 71.42 per cent. against 16.02 per cent. in the previous year. I may add here that the full demand of the current year could not be collected, as the demand for the previous year also had to be collected this year owing to famine in the previous years :—

29. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—Movable and immovable property, of the value of Rupees 7,906, was sold during the year for the realization of arrears of revenue, amounting to Rupees 40,247, against property of the value of Rupees 1,133 sold for arrears of Rupees 1,471 during the previous year. The increase is chiefly under Abkári and is due to the default of the Mangalore arrack renter.

30. COLLECTIONS AND CHARGES.—The collections and charges of the fasli under cach major head compared with those of the preceding year are shown in the subjoined abstract. The result is a net falling off in the collections of Rupees 1,58,811 and in charges of Rupees 32,438. In both cases the deficiency is due to fluctuations in the item of salt, although there were slight variations in the other items which will be noticed below :—

31. Land Revenue.—The charges under this head show a net decrease of Rupees 2,460, which is owing to the rice supplied to the Islanders in part payment of the price of coir having been purchased at Rupees 145-8-0 per corgi instead of Rupees 186 paid last year.

32. Sea Customs.—The net increase under this item amounted to Rupces 7,055, and is chiefly due to the whole of the cost of the amalgamated Customs and Salt establishment having been charged to this head.

33. Salt.—The monopoly system having been abandoned no purchases of salt were made during the fash, nor was there any occasion for transfer of salt from one depôt to another; no charges were therefore incurred on this account. The salt establishments in all places where there is no local manufacture were incorporated with Sea Custom establishment, and their cost charged to the latter head. All these causes contributed to the net decrease of Rupees 37,219 appearing under this item.

34. LANDED PROPERTY ACQUIRED BY PUBLIC SERVANTS.—During the fasli under report twenty-three public servants acquired landed property, assessed at Rupees 978-11-2, by purchase, inheritance, &c., and twenty public servants parted with landed property, assessed at Rupees 541-2-5.

35. Cost of Civil Suits.—A statement of costs incurred in civil suits for and against Government is enclosed.

36. TALUK AND VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.—The village accounts are kept in the new forms in pretty good order, and as the Village Accountants have become better acquainted with these forms fewer mistakes have been noticed.

37. EXAMINATION OF TALUE TREASURIES.—All the Taluk Treasuries were examined during the year. Those of Udipi and Kundapur by the Acting Head Assistant Collector Mr. Wynne, that of Kassergode by myself, and of Upperangadi by the Assistant Collector Mr. Hebbert. The Treasury of Kassergode and the accounts of the Mangalore Taluk were also examined by the Treasury Deputy Collector Mr. Leggatt. The accounts were, on the whole, found to be correctly kept. 28. ABSENCE OF THE SUB-COLLECTOR FROM THE SUB-DIVISION. --- Mr. Hardinge was absent from the Sub-Division as follows :---

29. VILLAGE AND TALUK Accounts.—The village and taluk accounts appear to have been examined in Ongole Taluk by the late Acting Sub-Collector, and in Kandukur and Kanyagiri Taluks by the late Temporary Deputy Collector. They seem to have been kept up correctly and in proper form.

30. TALUK TREASURIES.—The Taluk Treasuries that were examined were found to be correct. On examination of the Treasury in Darsi Division by the late Acting Sub-Collector some irregularities were discovered and the Acting Head Gumastah of the Division was suspended for six months.

31. RAIN GAUGES.—The rain gauges seem to be in good order.

32. SALT PANS.—The salt pans do not seem to have been examined by the late Acting Sub-Collector during the year under report.

33. SEA CUSTOMS.—There are four sea ports in the Sub-Division, viz., Kottapatam (including Ithamukkala), Ramayapatam, Kanuparti, and Pakala. The import and export trade seems to have been carried on to a less extent than in the previous famine year, owing partly to the disappearance of the famine and partly to the opening of the Buckingham Canal. The three first ports were visited by the late Acting Sub-Collector during the year under report. The ports and the offices attached thereto seem to have been found in good order.

34. VILLAGE SITES—GRANTS OF UNCLAIMED PORTIONS OF.—A grant of $4\frac{1}{2}$ cents of village site was made in Ongole Taluk according to the Tahsildar's return. Nil statements were received from the other two taluks of Kandukur and Kanyagiri.

35. CONDUCT OF THE HUZUR AND TALUK OFFICIALS.—No notes on the subject seem to have been left by the late Acting Sub-Collector so I am unable to append any remarks.

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BELLARY.

I HAVE the honor to submit my Report on the Settlement of this District for Fasli 1287, or A. D. 1877-78, with the prescribed statements.

2. PLACES WHERE THE SETTLEMENT WAS MADE.—Statement No 1 shows the places at which the settlement was made by each officer and the period occupied by the same.

The settlement was commenced in November 1877, and completed in September 1878. It was conducted in two or more places within the limits of each taluk. Mr. Master settled two taluks, viz., Bellary and Adoni, the former was in his own charge and the latter belonged to the Sub-Collector. The Sub-Collector settled three taluks of his own division, viz., Gooty, Alur, and Tadpatri. The Acting Head Assistant Collector conducted the settlement of three taluks, Penukonda, Hindupur, and Madaksira, all of them belonging to his own division. The Deputy Collector, Har-panahalli division, settled three of his own taluks, Hospet, Huvinhudgalli, and Harpanahalli. The Deputy Collector, Bellary Division, made the settlement of the Kudligi and Raidroog Taluks which belonged to his division. The Temporary Deputy Collector, B. Nursimhacharry, conducted the settlement of the two taluks of Anantapur and Dharmavaram which were temporarily under his charge.

3. VARIATIONS IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES. - The variations in the number and tenure of villages are given in the subjoined abstract :---

The decrease of one in Government villages is due to the non-cultivation of the lands of a small village called Helaverahulli in the Harpanahalli Taluk. There has been no change in the number and tenure of the other villages during the year under report.

4. PUTTAS.—The total number of puttas as shown in Statement No. 1 is 153,939. The net increase of puttas is 2,383. This is chiefly due to the taking up of more lands for cultivation in consequence of the fall of rain being greater than in the previous year.

5. SEASON.-- The season on the whole was favorable, the rain-fall being $3\frac{1}{2}$ times that of Fasli 1286. Much of the rain was, however, unseasonable, and considerable damage resulted from it to the autumn dry crops. Notwithstanding the character of the season the poorer class of ryots were unable to cultivate their lands from want of seed-grain and cattle, the effect of the famine of the previous year. In cases in which it was found necessary advances were made to the ryots for the purchase of seed-grain. The following statement shows the monthly fall of rain as compared with that of the previous year:--

12. B. Lands taken up.—The net decrease under this head is to a great extent explained by the result of the last-mentioned statement. A much smaller area having been relinquished than in the previous fasli it could not have been expected that the taking up of land would show an increase proportioned to that which occurred in Fasli 1286. The recent strain on the resources of the ryots was also an impediment to their assumption of fresh obligations. In wet lands, however, there was an increase in the area taken up, which is no doubt due to the heavy fall of rain in the autumn, and the assurance based thereon of a good outturn of the wet crops.

The decrease of sugar-cane cultivation is due to the failure of the supply of water in the irrigation sources at the time of the second crop cultivation of Fasli 1286. The increase under the second head is due to the increase in the cultivation of lands for which Dasavandum remission is usually granted. The increase under the third head is chiefly due to the increase in the cultivation of lands are remission is ordinarily allowed.

Enclosure A to Statement No. 4 is prepared in accordance with the Official Memorandum of the Board of Revenue, No. 750, dated 5th June 1872. It gives the particulars, dry and wet, for all remissions granted on cultivated lands. The amount remitted under "dry" is Rupees 23,370, while that under "wet" is Rupees 8,302.

24. MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.—Statement No. 5 contains the particulars of Miscellaneous items : the usual Memorandum explanatory thereof is submitted. This shows an increase of Rupees 26,826 as compared with last year. This is attributable chiefly to variations in the items exhibited below :—

The increase under the first head is due to the increase in the area of wet lands under second crop cultivation in consequence upon the greater supply of water in irrigation sources. The decrease under the second head is attributable to the lesser number in Fasli 1287 of assessment lands cultivated without durkhast and requiring the imposition of prohibitory assessments. The increase under the third head is owing to the greater fall of rain. The increase under the fourth head is due to the increase in the cultivation of Inams upon which Taffrick is charged. Item No. 5 is obviously of a fluctuating character. The increase of Rupces 1,387 under that head is due to the greater stringency exercised in times of famine. Item No. 6 calls for no remark. The increase under the seventh head is attributable to the increase of cultivation of thans by the use of Government water, consequent upon the sufficiency of the supply. The increase under the eighth head arises from the issue of a greater number of processes for the collection of arrears of revonue during the year under report.

The decrease shown under Item 9 calls for no remark. There was no such transaction in the present year.

Enclosure A to Statement No. 5 is prepared in accordance with the form sent by the Board with their Proceedings, No. 811, dated 20th June 1873. This shows the particulars of the extent of dry and wet for all the miscellaneous items given in Statement No. 5.

An enclosure showing the particulars of romissions granted on miscellaneous items of revenue is prepared in the form prescribed in the Board's Proceedings, No. 1,320, dated 17th May 1875. The column of "Current domand" of Statement No. 5 is sub-divided as directed by the Board.

25. Statement No. 6 exhibits the demand, collection, and balance of Shrotriem and Jodi villages enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner This shows a decrease of Rupees 62, which is due to the reduction of quit-rent on the Shrotriem village of Busayagaripully in the Hindupur Taluk in consequence of the Shrotriemdar having relinquished 796 Acres of land, assessed at Rupees 500.

Enclosure A to Statement No. 6 is prepared as prescribed by the Board in their Official Memorandum, No. 824, dated 11th July 1873. This gives the particulars of the extent of dry and wet, &c., on which the quit-rent entered in Statement No. 6 is charged.

This shows a net increase of Rupees 14,41,208. The decrease of Shrotriem jodi and the increase under Ryotwar and Miscellaneous have been already explained. The increase in the Abkári revenue is owing to the increase in the quantity of liquor issued from the arrack farm of the Bellary Cantonment and the consequent increase of Excise duty. The decrease in Salt revenue is chiefly due to the enhancement of the rates of tax payable by the manufacturers of earth-salt under the orders of the Board, No. 1,780, dated 9th September 1873. Stamp revenue is always of a fluctuating character; its increase in this year is due to the purchase of stamps for the purpose of executing Muchilkas by Abkári contractors, sub-renters and shopkeepers, and to the increase in the number of suits filed in the Courts.

This shows a net increase of Rupees 9,29,961. The increase in the collection of arrears is chiefly due to the existence of an amount of arrears at the beginning of the year under report greater than that outstanding at the commencement of the previous year. The increase in the collection of current revenue is attributable to the increase of the revenue demand for Fasli 1287.

COLLECTION from all Sources of Revenue.

30. The balance of the current demand at the end of Fasli 1286 was Rupees 11,57,637, and that of the year under report is Rupees 20,92,809, showing an increase of Rupees 9,05,172. The increase of the balance under land revenue is due to the increase of the demand in the current year, and to the inability of the ryots to pay their kists regularly from the effects of the famine of last year. The increase of the balance of Abkári revenue is also attributable to the inability of the Abkári contractors to pay their kists punctually in consequence of the loss sustained by them during the famine.

31. Out of this balance, however, there were collected up to the end of December 1878 Rupees 7,09,428, and measures are being taken for the collection of the remainder. The harvest of the winter crops will, it is hoped, render the collection of the land revenue demand comparatively easy.

32. Statement No. 8 exhibits the collection of former arrears under all heads of revenue. It shows a balance of Rupees 4,78,428-13-2 at the end of the year. This amounts to an increase of Rupees 4,18,173-5-3 over that of the previous year in which the old arrears were only Rupees 60,255-7-11. This is chiefly due to the prevalence of distress last year. This statement includes the sum of Rupees 8,852-4-10, which was recommended in the previous year's report to be written off, and for which sanction* has since been received.

• File Board's Proceedings, No. 3,202, dated If this sum be deducted from the total 20th November 1878. balance of Rupces 4,78,428-13-2 there remains Rupces 4,69,576-8-4. Of the current demand there remains a balance of Rupces 13,83,381 unrealized at the end of December last, which is Rupces 41-3-0 per

cent. on the demand of the district. The balance of the old arrears is Rupees 3,28,499.

33. Statement No. 9 shows the charges under various heads.

REFUNDS OF REVENUE.—There is a decrease of Rupees 14,608. The refunds must always fluctuate. The largeness of the amount under this head in Fasli 1286 was due chiefly to the remission of assessment, which had already been collected in Raidroog Taluk. The occasion for such refunds did not arise in Fasli 1287 to the same extent.

(1.) Collectors' Salaries.—There is a decrease of Rupecs 3,066. This is chiefly attributable to the suspension of the Temporary Deputy Collector K. Nursing Row,

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and also to the Acting Head Assistant Collector Mr. Ross having gone on leave for two months, for which period no salary was drawn during the year under report.

(2.) Tent and House-rent Allowances.—There is a decrease of Rupees 224 under this head, chiefly due to the Head Assistant Collector not having drawn tent allowance and house-rent during his absence on leave, and also to fixed tentage not having been drawn for some days in the month of May intervening between the permanent Collector going on leave and the Acting Collector joining the district.

(3.) Salaries of the Huzur and Taluk Establishments.— Under this head there is an increase of Rupees 1,416 due to the payment of arrears of salary to the Tahsildar of Kudligi, who was suspended but reinstated under the orders of the Board. The increase is also due in part to the payment of full salary in arrears for some months to the Acting Tahsildar of the Bellary Taluk.

(4.) Saderward.—There is an increase of Rupees 430 under this head due to the purchase of larger supplies with reference to the requirements of officers.

(5.) Medical Charges.—Under this head there is an increase of Rupees 109, attributable to the payment of travelling allowances to the Medical subordinates attached to the Collectorate when on circuit, and to charges incurred in carrying medical stores.

(6.) Contingencies.—There is an increase of Rupees 1,501. This is due to the drawing of extra tentage by officers who travelled through the taluks more frequently than usual on account of the famine with concomitant expenses of office servants, record, bandies, &c.

(7.) Miscellaneous.—There is an increase of Rupees 5,627 under this head. This is due chiefly to the expenses incurred by the Bank in sending remittances to several taluks to meet famine expenditure, as well as to charges incurred in sending remittances to other districts, to charges incurred in despatching service telegrams, and to the purchase of more service labels than in the previous year.

(8.) Abkári Contingencies.—There is a decrease of one rupee. In Fasli 1286 this sum represented the amount of charge for conveyance of Abkári returns. No similar charge was incurred in the year under report.

(9.) Stamps.—There is an increase of Rupees 775. This is chiefly due to the increase of sales of stamps in the year in question and the consequent increase of commission paid.

34. Of the old arrears of Rupees 3,57,862, Rupees 29,363 are now recommended to be written off as irrecoverable. This leaves a balance of Rupees 3,28,499.

* Vule Board's Proceedings, No. 3,202, dated 29th November 1878.

Of this Rupees 8,852 were recommended last year to be written off for which sanction* has since been received. The

balance, Rupees 3,19,646, may perhaps be recovered. Strict orders have been issued for its collection. Particulars of arrears now recommended to be written off are given in the statement marked R. Of the total amount of Rupees 29,363, Rupees 26,163 relate to the Jodi of village servants. Out of this Rupees 326 are irrecoverable on account of death, poverty, and other causes, and Rupees 19,461 are irrecoverable on account of the Inams of village servants having been left waste and in some cases the crops raised thereon having been lost for want of rain in Fasli 1286, a year of famine. The remainder is Rupees 6,376. This consists of two sums of Rupees 2,391 and 3,985. The first of these is payable on Inams placed under attachment in consequence of the dismissal of village servants, and in other cases in consequence of their voluntarily giving up their Inams through inability to pay the Jodi charged on them. Many of these Inams lay waste in consequence of their being unfit for cultivation, it was therefore found impossible to collect the Jodi charged on them. The balance, Rupees 3,985, has been left uncollected owing to the insufficiency of the emoluments of certain village servants as reported in this office letter, No. 101, dated 5th April 1873. Deducting the amount of Jodi, viz., Rupees 26,163, from the total amount of Rupees 29,363 proposed to be written off there remains a balance of Rupees 3,200, ryotwari revenue, which is irrecoverable, all means of collecting it having proved abortive.

35. As directed in paragraph 8 of the Board's Proceedings, dated 17th June 1869, No. 4,345, an abstract showing the fasliwar particulars of arrears remaining unadjusted at the close of the fasli is annexed.

2. PLACES WHERE THE JAMABANDY WAS MADE.—The subjoined Statement No. 1 shows the number of days occupied in the settlement at each station, the officers who conducted the Jamabandy, and the number of puttas distributed. The Jamabandy was commenced by the Temporary Deputy Collector H. Subbarow Garu on the 8th February 1878 in the Jammulamadugu Taluk, and was completed by the Collector Mr Horsley and the Sub-Collector on the 29th June 1878. The average duration at each station was seven days.

6. SEASON.—Compared with the previous year of drought the season may be said to have been a good one; but the effects of the famine were still severely felt. The loss of life among cattle and men had been so great that a vast quantity of land was left uncultivated owing in some cases to there being no cultivation and in others to the ryots having no cattle or means to purchase cattle. The crops under the irrigation canal and the river and spring channels throve well, but those under tanks failed in some places at the last moment owing to want of water. Both the wet and dry crops yielded an average of 10 Anna crop, and the produce where cultivation was earried on was satisfactory.

7. SANITARY CONDITION.—The annexed statement shows that, though cholera and small-pox have slightly subsided, the mortality from fever was greater than in the last fashi :—

10. The causes of the increase in the several items are explained below :---

- No. 1.-As the lands in the Sidhout Taluk on which Gaddateeru and other remissions were given were classified by the Settlement Department as Inams, the assessment after deducting the usual remissions have been entered as quit-rent.
 - 2.-Increase in the cultivation of Service Inams.
 - 4.--Assessment on lands cultivated subsequent to the settlement of some ,, taluks completed before March.
 - 11.-Increase in the cultivation of the classes of lands to which it refers.
 - 14.-Collection of fees for the service of coercive processes issued for the col-lection of Land Revenue arrears, and the inclusion under the Land ,, Revenue, Miscellaneous, of items, the particulars of which are not known.

The variations under the other items need no explanation. On the whole there has been a net increase of Rupees 46,350.

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19. DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE OF CURRENT REVENUE.—The annexed comparative statement of the demand, collection, and balance of current revenue under the several heads shows that the balance, on the 31st July 1878, was less by Rupees 1,94,235 than the sum outstanding on the corresponding day of the previous year. The decrease is due to the enforcement of collections from well-to-do persons. There was still a large balance to be collected owing to the non-adjustment of Abkári deposits and the indulgence shown in the collection of kists from impoverished ryots. Paragraph 13 explains the causes of the increase in Land Revenue. The increase of Rupees 48 under Shrotriem Jodi was the amount usually paid out of the demand on account of the salaries to certain servants in Shrotriem villages of Pullampet Taluk, but not deducted in this year owing to the village officials not having performed their duties. The decrease under Abkári is due to the resale of the Pullampet toddy farm. The increase under earth-salt is due to the annual increments of the rates and the increase under the license tax is owing to the introduction of Act III of 1878. The decrease in Stamp Revenue was caused by the effects of famine in diminishing litigation.

Deducting the collections from the arrears due at the beginning of the fasli a balance of Rupees 1,55,961 was left at the end of July 1878, including Rupees 800 recommended to be written off the accounts in paragraph 22 of the last year's report. This is due to the non-adjustment of Abkári deposits and the accumulation of the heavy arrears at the beginning of the fasli on account of famine.

23. The irrecoverable items of some of the taluks not having been settled reports have not been completely received from all taluks. These items will therefore be included in the next year.

24. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 8 shows the extent to which coercion was employed in the collection of revenue by the attachment and sale of property. In the year under report processes were issued against 64,486 ryots for the recovery of Rupees 4,12,327, the property movable and immovable of 722 persons was attached and sold for the arrears due from them amounting to Rupees 9,987, and Rupees 6,135 were collected; Rupees 5,687 being from real and Rupees 448 from personal property. Rupees 8,180-10-1 were collected as process fees and Rupees 7,959 paid as wages to process servers. The amount recovered by sales shows a decrease as compared with the last year, while the number of processes issued exhibits an increase. This is attributable to many of the ryots having paid up the arrears before the property was brought for sale.

25. AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS .- As required by Board's Proceedings, No. 716, dated 1st February 1871, the statement showing the acreage of crops is forwarded.

RUINED TANKS.-No tanks were surrendered in the year under report for 26.private enterprize.

The total charges during the year under report as compared with the last fasli shows a decrease of Rupees 10,657 for the following reasons:—

The decrease in *Item No.* 1 is attributable to a large amount refunded last year owing to the collections at the settlement rates having been subsequently reduced by the Settlement Department on revision. The increase in *Item No.* 2 is due to the full salary drawn by the permanent Collector after his return and by the Special Sub-Collector Mr. Lister for the month of May 1878.

I/em No. 3 was larger in consequence of the frequent absence on tours of officers on famine duty.

Item No. 4 was less as some of the Tahsildars drew only deputation allowance.

Item No. 5 rose on account of the pressure of famine work.

Item No. 6 was less owing to the appointment of lower class Hospital Assistants in the room of those that were in office in the last fasli. The decrease in *Item No.* 7 was due to the establishment batta included under this head.

Item No. 8 was heavier on account of the frequent remittances in and from the district.

Item No. 10 shows an increase on account of the sale of non-judicial stamps of higher denomination on which the highest rate of discount is allowed.

Item No. 11 was the amount of refunds sanctioned on account of excess collections from the earth-salt manufacturers.

32. TALUE AND VILLAGE ACCOUNTS, The village and taluk accounts were examined as usual and orders to correct the irregularities noticed were given.

33. EXAMINATION OF TALUK TREASURIES AND CASH ACCOUNTS BY TREASURY DEPUTY COLLECTOR. --Owing to the famine work the Treasury Deputy Collector had always to remain at head quarters and in consequence the taluk accounts were not examined by him during the year.

34. EXPLANATION ABOUT THE NET DEMAND.—The net demand entered in the last column of the Statement No. 3 which accompanies this report does not tally with that entered in the Divisional Officer's statements submitted to the Board with reference to Proceedings, No. 2,496, dated 31st May 1877, as in the latter statements the Divisional Officers failed to include certain items of the miscellaneous demand.

35. CONDUCT OF THE DISTRICT OFFICIALS.—The year was still one of great distress and the pressure on all the officers was very great. With but few exceptions all the Officers, European and Native, did their work nobly, and where so many have done so well it would seem invidious to pick out any for special consideration. The Sub-Collector's Sheristadar B. Teperoomal Chetty was, during a large portion of the year under report, acting as Temporary Deputy Collector and did very well indeed. He has now reverted to his old post; when a future vacancy occurs he is well deserving of promotion, and I would respectfully urge his claims for consideration. Having once occupied the position of a Deputy Collector he is now unwilling to accept a Tahsildar's post, although carrying with it a higher salary. Whilst expressing my general satisfaction at the conduct of all the Tahsildars I would especially select Tirumal Row, the Tahsildar of Kadiri, for favorable mention. He is a man of a strong character, and has proved himself admirably adapted for a crisis like the one the district has just passed through.

8. Under the head of new puttas the decrease is 1,460, while the number of old puttas altered is in excess of the last year by 681. There is likewise an increase of 2,133 under the head of old puttas unchanged.

9. Since I took charge of the Sub-division, I have not left its limits except on one occasion, when I went via Cuddapah to Pulivendala to settle that taluk.

10. The season, though not very favorable, was on the whole more satisfactory than the previous year. The fall of rain was scanty and fever existed badly.

14. Out of the 4,254 tanks in the Sub-division, 782 tanks have received no supply at all while more than three-fourths of the total number have been either fully or partially supplied.

15. The yield of crops has improved this year.

On an average the yield of dry crops is more than half while that under wells it is nearly three-fourths. The yield of wet crops is nearly one-half against one-fourth in the previous fasli. This is owing to the insufficiency of water in many tanks and in some places to the prevalence of a disease called "Aggi," especially in the Rayachoti Taluk.

16. The sanitary condition of the Sub-division during the Fasli 1287 has not been much better than the past year. The mortality from fever and small-pox is greater than before, the former having caused an immense loss of human life.

There was a slight fall in the prices of all agricultural products during the year except in horse-gram which has risen owing to the failure of the crop in this and in the preceding years. The small decrease in the second sort rice is due partly to the expectations of reaping a good crop and partly to the sale of Government reserve grain at the local markets in the latter part of the year.

24. The net holdings for the year in report are Acres 559,256, assessed at Rs. 4,65,322, which exhibits slight decrease of Acres 1,115 in extent and an increase of Rs. 1,610 in assessment. The extent relinquished during the year is Acres 2,818, assessed at Rs. 1,072, against Acres 16,976, assessed at Rs. 8,782, in the previous year both under wet and dry. Out of the total holdings of Rs. 2,27,516 under dry at the beginning of the year, lands to the extent of Rs. 766 were relinquished and lands taken upon durkhast to the extent of Rs. 524 against Rs. 5,448 and Rs. 706 respectively in last year. The wet lands under occupation at the commencement of the lash amounted to Rs. 3,36,196, out of which lands, assessed at Rs. 306, or Rs. 3,028 below that of last year, were given up while the durkhasts amounted to Rs. 2,158 against 1,050 in the past fasli. These changes are attributable to a better year.

25. In the above circumstances, the grant of remissions were sparingly given brought some indulgence was shown for the waste under dry as in the previous year. The large decrease in Items Nos. 1, 2, 4, and 6 is due to the season being more favorable for cultivation this year than last year, and the increase in Item No. 7 is on account of the increase of cultivation, the assessment being remitted to the extent of one-half, one-third, &c. The Item No. 8 is the amount of remission granted on putta lands in lieu of payments of salaries to village officers. This occurs only in the taluks of Vayalpad and Kadiri, while in the remaining taluks this practice has ceased and ready-money payments substituted.

36. The slight falling off in Item No. 1 is owing to the relinquishments presented chiefly in the Madhanapalle Taluk by the Inamdars concerned.

37. The large increase in Item No. 2 is on account of "Hangami" Jodi which is only collected when lands are brought under cultivation.

38. Similarly the increase in Items Nos. 3, 5, 8, 9, 12, 13, 14, and 15 is due to the increase of cultivation during the year.

39. The increase in Item No. 10 is caused by the imposition of heavy fines during the famine when such a course was held indispensable to enforce attention to orders issued to village officers in reference to Village Relief and Census Work.

40. The collections having been made according to the kistbundi in the belief that no remissions would be allowed on dry lands (which indulgence was granted at the Jamabandi which was late) there was found a large excess collection over the demand during the current fasli. Hence the increase in Item No. 12.

41. The large decrease in Item No. 16 is owing to there having been no sales of lands for arrears of revenue on account of famine.

42. The increase in Item No. 17 is caused by the issue of demands to process servers for the collection of revenue which fell into large arrears in the previous year when coercive measures were withheld owing to the prevalence of distress among the ryots. This has also given rise to the increase in Item No. 18.

43. The Item No. 19 has appeared this year as loans were granted under the Land Improvement Act only in the latter part of last year and the beginning of the current year.

44. Out of the total amount of all the miscellaneous sources of revenue, Rs. 8,725 are derived from unirrigated lands against Rs. 8,663 or Rs. 62 in excess of the previous year, while Rs. 25,931 are from irrigated lands against Rs. 14,276 in the last fasli.

45. No changes have taken place during the year in the demand against the shrotriem villages which amounts to Rs. 7,847-2-0, of which Rs. 2,791-4-2 has been

collected within the close of the fasli, leaving a balance on the 1st July last of Rs. 5,055-13-10 against Rs. 5,711-11-7. This balance has been reduced by subsequent collections to Rs. 3,206-1-7 on the 1st October last.

COMPARATIVE Statement of Current Revenue and Arrears.

47. Under the head of Land Revenue the current demand is Rs. 5,60,759, of which Rs. 2,70,937 were collected during the fasli, leaving a balance on the 1st July last of Rs. 2,89,822 against Rupees 2,35,495 of the preceding year. This item has been reduced by subsequent collections to Rs. 1,22,242 on the 1st October 1878.

48. The largest of these balances stand in the taluks of Madhanapalle and Vayalpad where a small portion has been since collected. The smallest arrears obtain in the Rayachoti Taluk. The decrease of collection is caused by the withholding of coercive measures consequent on the poverty of the ryots who have not as yet fully recovered from the effects of the late famine.

49. The total demand inclusive of current and arrears under Arrack and Toddy which have been as before separately rented is Rs. 1,19,042 or Rs. 29,081 in excess of last year. Of this Rs. 76,507 were collected, leaving a balance on the 30th June of Rs. 42,535. This balance has been reduced by subsequent collections to a sum of Rs. 24,896 up to 1st October last.

50. The large decrease under the head of Stamps is owing to the sales being less than last year on account of the pressure of famine.

51. The total of old balances under all Sources of Revenue at the beginning of the year in report is Rs. 2,48,716, of which the collections during the fasli amount to Rs. 2,01,437, and the balances on the 1st July last were Rs. 47,279 against Rs. 13,296 in the preceding year.

Out of this balance Rs. 11,864 have been collected, leaving a balance of Rs. 35,415 outstanding on the 1st October last. Out of this amount a sum of Rs. 219-14-0 is now recommended for remission as irrecoverable. This occurs only in the taluks of Madhanapalle and Kadiri, but there may be a large amount to be entered as irrecoverable owing to the desertion and death of many ryots during the late famine, and the exact amount cannot now be determined as the landed property of the defaulters has not been attached and sold during the year for the reasons above set forth.

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SETTLEMENT REPORT OF CUDDAPAH.

55. It will thus be observed that processes were issued for the collection of an arrear of Rs. 1,10,213-6-9 during the year or Rs. 73,915-5-8 in excess of the previous year. This is owing to the difficulty of collection consequent on the nature of the season. The amount of property sold is far less than that attached owing to the arrears having been paid up by the defaulters before the day of sale.

56. The total colloctions during the year amount to Rs. 5,44,290-2-0 against Rs. 1,61,616-15-5 in the preceding year, showing an increase of Rs. 3,82,673-2-7, and the amount disbursed is Rs. 1,44,878-1-3 or in excess of the last year by Rs. 5,490-0-8, which is chiefly on account of the salaries of the Settlement establishment which is greater than during the last fash by Rs. 5,737-14-5.

57. The increase of Rs. 21,059-7-7 under the head of salaries of revenue establishment is owing to the stay of the Collector and his establishment in this division on account of his inspection of village relief and the Jamabandi.

58. There is a large decrease of Rs. 32,407-6-4 under the head of the survey establishment salaries owing to the withdrawal of the survey party consequent on the cussation of their operations in the Sub-division.

59. No Inams of ruined pagodas have been incorporated with the Government agacut during the past year.

I HAVE the honor to submit the report on the Revenue Settlement and Collections of the Kurnool District for Fasli 1287.

2. TIME AND PLACE OF SETTLEMENT.—Statement No. 1 gives the stations where and the officers by whom the Sottlement of the several taluks was conducted, as also the time taken to settle each taluk. Owing to the late date at which sanction was accorded for the grant of dry remissions, the time and labor involved in working out the remissions on the principles laid down by the Board (*vide* Board's Proceedings, dated 13th March 1878, No. 674,) the prossure of work caused by the progress of famine relief operations in five taluks of the district, and the introduction of the Settlement rates in the taluks of Markapur and Cumbum, the Jamabandi was unavoidably delayed, and the last taluk was not settled till the end of September.

3. CHANGES IN TENURE AND NUMBER OF VILLAGES.—There were no changes in the tenure of any of the villages in the district, but their number rose from 696 to

698 during the fasli under review in consequence of the conversion of two* hamlets in the Markapur Taluk into Monja Villages by the Settlement Department.

4. SEASON.—The season was on the whole unfavorable though better than in Fasli 1286. The total average rain-fall for the fasli was 22.16 inches against 12.08 in the previous fasli and 24.61 the average of ten years ending Fasli 1285. The fall, however, was unequally distributed over the several months, having been scanty in July and August and excessive in September and October. In consequence the early cholum (yellow), cumbu, corra, and areca crops either failed entirely or yielded a very poor return. The later or white cholum crop was successful in the central black cotton taluks of Koilkuntla, Sirvail, Nandial, and the western half of Nandikotkur, but elsewhere it was destroyed by the ravages of grass-hoppers. Subjoined is a table comparing the rain-fall of the district for the last twelve faslis :--

5. PRICES.—The average prices of the principal kinds of food-grains during the fasli were from 2 to 25 per cent. above those of the preceding fasli, and from 89 to 149 per cent. higher than the average of ten years ending Fasli 1286. As compared with the famine year of 1276 they were from 26 to 55 per cent. higher as shown below :—

6. HEALTH.—The year was the most unhealthy one known within the last twenty years. Fever was virulently and fatally prevalent while famine added to the sufferings of the people. Cholera and small-pox were also prevalent though in a milder form. The total number of deaths in the district during the Fasli under report was 74,679 against 56,112 in the preceding year, or 81.76 per mille against 61.09 per

As enumerated at the census of 1870. mille of population. There is every reason to believe that between a fourth and a third of the population of the district has disappeared during past two years of famine, though the death registers maintained in the district do not exhibit such a result. The census of the Nandikotkur Taluk, which was taken in April 1878, showed a decrease of nearly 22 per cent. on the population of 1870. Allowing for the normal increase of population between 1870 and 1876 at the rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum, the results of the census of April last would indicate a decrease of 28 per cent. As the famine in other parts of the district was not less severe than in Nandikotkur it may fairly be presumed, I think, that the rate of depopulation generally in the district was the same as in this taluk.

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7. CATTLE.—Cattle suffered mostly from want of pasture and fodder in the first two months of year, but they recovered their condition rapidly after September, pasture having become abundant. Cattle disease \mathbf{w} is not heard of during the year.

8. PUTTAS.—The number of puttas for the year was 87,046 against 90,715 of the previous year as shown below :---

The large number of new puttas distributed during the year was due to 22,335 puttas having been issued afresh on account of the introduction of the settlement rates in the Cumbum and Markapur Taluks and to the issue of fresh puttas in other taluks to replace those that were lost. The modifications in old puttas were as usual owing to relinquishments and sales.

11. The decrease is due to the large relinquishments made during the year in consequence of the adverse season and the impoverished condition of the ryots. There was also a net decrease of 894 acres in area and Rupees 7,522 in assessment in the Cumbum and Markapur Taluks on account of the introduction of the settlement rates.

12. ACTUAL CULTIVATION.—Of the total holdings noticed above, 78.12 per cent. of the dry lands and 87.11 per cent. of wet lands were brought under cultivation as exhibited in the subjoined table :—

13. The cultivation in the Fasli under report was above that of Fasli 1286 by 225,617 acres assessed at Rupees 4,17,337 while it was below that of Fasli 1285 by 296,698 acres in area and 1,60,513 in assessment. The increase as compared with Fasli 1286 is no doubt attributable to the slightly more favorable character of the season, while the decrease still observable below 1285 must be ascribed to the depopulation of the district by nearly a third, the enormous loss of cattle during the famine and the impoverishment of the ryots generally.

14. SECOND CROP ASSESSMENT.—The amount charged on account of second crop assessment in Fasli 1287 was Rupees 22,319 against 18,551 Rupees in the previous year and Rupees 29,663 in Fasli 1285. The increase above Fasli 1286 is the result of a gross increase of Rupees 9,691 in four taluks due to the better supplies received by some of the tanks, and a gross decrease of Rupees 5,923 in four other taluks attributable to the inability of the ryots in their present crippled condition to carry on wet cultivation as usual. The causes of the decrease below 1285 have already been mentioned in paragraph 12.

15. WATER-TAX ON GOVERNMENT LANDS.—The water-tax charged on Government lands amounted to Rupees 9,209 or 4,118 Rupees in excess of the previous year and Rupees 18,288 below Fasli 1285. The causes of the increase and decrease are the same as those given in regard to second crop assessment.

16. TOTAL ASSESSMENT ON RYOTWAR LANDS.—The total assessment on ryotwar lands including second crop assessment and water-tax as compared with the previous two fashis is subjoined :—

20. These heavy remissions were rendered necessary on account of the large extent of land left was^{*}e in consequence of the continuance of distress, the failure of the early dry crops on the lands sown and the reduced circumstances of the ryots at large. The remissions were granted in accordance with the principles laid down by the Board in their Proceedings, dated 13th March 1878, No. 674.

22. The remissions on account of withered crops were only slightly below the amount remitted under the same head in Fasli 1286. Considering that in Fasli 1286 the dry crops had totally failed throughout the district while in the fasli under report some crop was harvested, it might be said that the remissions were overdone in the latter fasli. Such however was not the case. In Fasli 1286 no remissions were granted to people who were believed to be able to pay the Government assessment, even though they had lost the crops on their lands entirely, and it is very probable that, if dry remissions were granted in that year on the same principles as they were granted this year, the total amount remitted would have been treble what was remitted in the year under report or even more. No inference can therefore be rightly drawn from the approximate equality of the figures for the two years.

23. The sum of 3,659 Rupees remitted under the head of Tirwakammi was the difference between dry and wet assessment remitted on wet lands on which a dry crop was raised. The decrease as compared with the previous year was due to many of the tanks which in the previous year had been empty having received supplies of water which were used to raise wet crops under the tanks.

25. The first six items of remission are confined to the Cumbum and Markapur Taluks which were transferred to this district from Cuddapah. The variations in them are accounted for by the fact that the full assessment on some of the lands entitled to these remissions was remitted last year under waste or shavi while in the fasli under report the lands having been cultivated and yielded a crop, the usual fixed remissions only were granted.

26. Item No. 6 was remission granted on a piece of land given on the cowle tenure as village site to certain ryots of Banaganapalli who wished to settle in the Koilkuntla Taluk. The decrease in Item No. 7 was due to certain tope lands having been charged with full assessment on the expiration of twenty-five years. The remaining item calls for no remark.

27. DEDUCTIONS ON ACCOUNT OF LAND AND VILLAGE CESS.—In the taluks of Ramallakota, Nandial, Sirvail and Nandikotkur the assessment includes $6\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. on account of village cess and 2 per cent. on account of the land cess. The amounts due to these cesses are therefore annually deducted as remissions from the beriz and credited to their respective heads. The amount so deducted in the fasli under review as compared with the deductions in the previous two faslis is shown below :—

33. There is generally very little sugar-cane cultivation in this district, and such as exists is mainly carried on under the Cumbum and Nandial tanks. The falling off in the area under it in the year under report is attributable to the crippled resources of the ryots and to their consequent inability to carry on any expensive cultivation such as that of sugar-cane is.

34. The decrease under indigo is owing to the natural anxiety of the ryots to sow as much land as possible with food-grains in preference to any other article after a year of scarcity.

35. The increase under cotton as compared with Fasli 1286 and the decrease below 1285 must be traced to the same causes as have affected cultivation generally in the district (*vide* paragraph 12 *supra*).

36. AVERAGE RATES OF ASSESSMENT.—The average rates of assessment in force in the several taluks of the district is annexed hereunder :---- -----

37. AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS .- The usual statement showing the extent of land sown with different crops is submitted.

38. EXTRA Sources of Revenue.-The abkári demand for Fasli 1287 was Rupees 2.27,530 exclusive of Miscellaneous Revenue amounting to Rupees 186, or nearly the same as in the previous year, the farms having been sold for the same annual rent for three faslis ending 1287.

39. EARTH-SALT.-The revenue from earth-salt is derived from license fees levied in accordance with the scale laid down in Board's Proceedings, No. 1,780, dated 9th September 1873. The demand for the year was Rupees 3,637 against 3,919 in the previous year and Rupees 5,227 in Fasli 1285, the decrease being due to fewer modus being worked in consequence of the heavier license fees levied.

40. STAMPS.-The revenue realized by the sale of stamps during Fasli 1287 amounted to Rupees 84,548; of this Rupees 42,546 were derived from Court Fee Stamps and the rest from General and Non-judicial Stamps. As compared with Fasli 1286 there is falling off of Rupees 4,723 under Court Fee Stamps due to decreased litigation and an increase of Rupees 13,013 under other descriptions of stamps attributable to increased sales of land by ryots reduced to poverty during the famine.

41. ENTIRE CURRENT DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE UNDER ALL SOURCES OF REVENUE.-The entire current demand, collection, and balance under all sources of revenue are exhibited in the subjoined table :---

42. It will be seen from the above statement that the current demand under all sources amounted to Rupees 14,90,818, whereof Rupees 7,44,115 or only 49.91

per cent. were collected within the fasli, leaving a balance of Rupees 7,46,703. The subsequent collections to the end of December reduced the balance to Rupees 2,93,635 or 19.68 per cent. of the demand.

43. CURRENT BALANCES—Land Revenue.—The balance of land revenue outstanding at the end of the fasli was 46.77 per cent. and at the end of December 12.30 per cent. of the total demand. The balance was large, but it was the result of a very exceptional state of things.

44. A famine of unusual severity has swept over the district which considerably crippled the resources of the ryots. Two successive harvests were either wholly or partially lost. The district was groaning under the settlement of Fasli 1286, and arrears of that fasli, amounting to Rupees 8,26,362, were outstanding at the beginning of the fasli under report, whereof 6,50,279 or 78.69 per cent. were collected simultaneously with the current demand. The heavy loss of cattle sustained by the ryots has deprived us of a most ready means of recovering the Government dues. Add to all this, the Revenue Officers had to superintend famine relief operations which distracted their attention from their ordinary duties. Under these circumstances, I believe that the Board will admit that these were sufficient reasons for the collections not coming up to the average of ordinary season.

45. The subjoined statistics of collections in nine fashis previous to the famine will probably convince the Board that in ordinary years there was rarely any difficulty in realizing the Government dues in this district, and that the present state of things solely the result of the exceptional circumstances above adverted to :---

46. Abkari.—The balance under the head of Abkári is large. The circumstances under which this heavy balance is still outstanding have already been explained to the Board in the Revenue and Abkári Administration Reports. The securities of renters held in deposit amount to Rupees 45,000, while promissory notes of the value of Rupees 74,000 have also been attached from some of the renters to cover arrears amounting to Rupees 78,093. The remainder is owed chiefly by persons who are declared bankrupts, but who are still believed by some to have property which they have concealed.

47. DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE OF ARREARS UNDER ALL SOURCES.—The subjoined statement exhibits the demand, collection, and balance of arrears under all sources, the collections within the Fasli and those made subsequently up to the end of December being shown separately :—

From the above statement it will be seen that the arrear balance at the end of the fashi was Rupees 2,23,613, whereof Rupees 1,22,769 were collected to the end of December 1878. Of the remainder, Rupees 1,553 are arrears, remission of which has already been sanctioned, but which have not yet been written off the accounts. Rupees 98,275 are recoverable and doubtful. The balance (Rupees 1,003) is reported to be irrecoverable for the following reasons, and sanction is requested for the amount being written off the accounts as irrecoverable :--


49. CHARGES OF COLLECTION.—The charges of collection exclusive of the one-fifth debitable to Law and Justice were Rupees 1,41,657 or 9.74 per cent. of the gross receipts against 49.24 per cent. in the previous year and 7.54 per cent. in Fasli 1285. The charges of Fasli 1287 were in excess of those of the previous year by Rupees 6,608, chiefly owing to the payment of famine batta to the lower Revenue Subordinates which was debited to Land Revenue.

50. COERCIVE PROCESS.—Coercive processes were issued against 21,256 defaulters for the recovery of arrears amounting to Rupees 4,52,800, a thing quite unprecedented in this district. In 1,045 instances property was attached, the arrears involved being Rupees 33,223, but in only 517 cases, however, was there necessity for selling the property which realized Rupees 6,574 against an arrear of Rupees 1,29,111, on account of which property was sold.

51. The Madras Irrigation Canal irrigated an area of 35,099 acres in Fasli 1287 against 75,192 acres in the previous fasli, and the revenue derived by the Company amounted to Rupees 1,00,119 inclusive of the charge for water supplied to Kurnool town against Rupees 1,97,977 in the previous fasli. This large decrease was due to the fact that in Fasli 1286 Government undertook to pay the water-rate, unless a fair crop was reaped, and so water was taken everywhere where it was available.



The subjoined statement exhibits the demand, collection, and balance of the Irrigation Canal revenue for Fasli 1287 up to the end of December 1878 :---



52. Of the balance shown in the last column of the above statement Rs. 38,632 have to be paid by Government under Board's Proceedings, No. 146, dated 18th January 1877 and Rupees 6,105 for water stored in Government tanks.

53. TALUK AND VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.—The taluk and village accounts do not appear to have been kept well. The arrears account No. 28 particularly seems to be in a state of confusion; endeavours will be made during the Jamabandi of the current fashi to reduce things to order. Owing to pressure of famine work, the Treasury Deputy Collector was unable to inspect any of the Taluk Treasuries during the fashi under report.

54. LAW SUITS.—No law suits were instituted against the Government during Fasli 1287.

55. Acquisition of LANDS BY PUBLIC SERVANTS.—None of the public servants acquired any new lands during the year.

56. CONDUCT OF PUBLIC SERVANTS.—As I have only just joined the district I can say nothing about the conduct of the public servants.

I HAVE the honor to submit the Settlement Report of the Madras District for Fasli 1287, accompanied by the usual statements.

2. During the fasli under report the district received a small accession of territory. Under the orders of Government contained in their Notification, dated 26th March 1877, published at page 238 of the *Fort St. George Gazette* of the 10th April 1877, about 1,130 acres of land, lying in

1877, about 1,130 acres of land, lying in the beds of some of the Madras tanks^{*} which formed part of Chingleput, were transferred to this district. The Survey

maps and registers relating to this land were, however, received from the Chingleput Collectorate towards the end of the fasli, viz., in June, and therefore no revenue was collected from the land newly added during the fasli under report. The assessment for Fasli 1287 will be collected in the current fasli.

3. The rain-fall during the fasli was slightly in excess of that of the preceding year as will be seen from the figures given below. The rain-fall was not evenly distributed and the tanks in the district did not receive their full supply. The tanks were kept in good order by the Public Works Department :---

6. The ratio of deaths per mille of the population was 80 against 84 in Fasli 1286, but the mortality was still large in comparison with past years.

7. As remarked in previous reports the land revonue in the Madras District is collected irrespective of cultivation, owing to which no cultivation accounts are kept by the Curnams or Conicopillays. It has, however, been usual to record approximately the area planted with sugar-caue, which is chiefly planted in the suburbs of Mylapore and Nungumbakam. The extent planted in Fasli 1287 was C. 8, G. 15, square feet 443, assessed with an annual quit-rent of Rupees 46-2-2, against C. 6, G. 15, square feet 505, planted in the previous fasli and assessed at Rupees 37-3-8.

8. The different sources of revenue will now be briefly noticed.

9. LAND REVENUE .--- The current demand of Fasli 1287 under this head was Rupees 80,583 against Rupees 78,014 of the preceding fasli. This increase of Rupees 2,569 is due mainly to a sum of Rupees 2,600, the amount of oxcess sale proceeds of land sold for arrears of revenue which was kept in deposit for return to the defaulters concerned, having, under instructions from the Accountant-General, been credited to Government revenue. Out of the current demand Rupees 71,035 were collected, being 88 per cent. of the demand, while in Fasli 1286 the percentage of collections was only 82 per cent.

10. The balance of the current demand amounted to Rupees 9,548, of which Rupees 3,046 were collected up to the 30th September 1878. Processes have been issued for the collection of the remaining sum of Rupces 6,502.

11. The arrear balance at the commencement of the fasli amounted to Rupees

27,065, out of which Rupces 12,844 were collected within the fash and a sum of Rupees 2,534-8-2 was written off during the fasli under the orders specified in the margin. 12. I request sanction for writing off the sum of Rupees 475-6-9 from the domand. Deducting the above amounts there remains a further sum of Rupees 7,641 to be accounted for. Of this Rupees 6,000 forms the accumulated arrears of quit-rent for four years on what are called unknown localities, and will have to be eventually written off the accounts. The remaining sum of Rupees 1,641 is in process of collection.

14. The accompanying Statement No. 8 shows the extent to which coercive processes were resorted to during Fasli 1287. Processes were issued against 8,371 defaulters for arrears amounting to Rupees 21,058. The property of 737 defaulters, to the value of Rupees 3,930, was attached, of which property to the estimated value of Rupees 2,734 was actually sold. In the remaining cases the defaulters paid up before sale.

15. During the fasli under report demands were received from the Collectors of Chingleput, North Arcot, South Arcot, Nellore and Godavari. resident in Madras. The total demand amounted to Rupees 27,476-6-4, of which only Rupees 9,291-3-6 were collected in this district and remitted to the Collectors. The remaining amount was satisfactorily accounted for to the several Collectors concerned.

16. ABKARI.—The demand, collection, and balance on account of this source is shown below in comparison with those of Fasli 1286 :---

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17. The increased demand and collections were mainly due to the large arrears that were due by the Arrack shopkeepers at the commencement of the fasli. Of the balance of Rupees 5,098 at the close of the fasli Rupees 5,088 were collected before the 30th September 1878, and the remaining sum of Rupees 10 due by a toddy shopkeeper is likely to be speedily collected. The administration of the Abkári Department, and the revenue to Government from that source, have been fully dealt with in the special report for Fasli 1287 submitted in this office letter, No. 284, dated 10th September 1878. I will therefore refer the Board for further particulars to that report.

18. SEA CUSTOMS.—The revenue under this head during Fasli 1287 was Rupees 15,69,638, which is Rupees 1,38,884 more than in Fasli 1286. The increase is due to larger imports chiefly of cotton twist, cotton piece-goods, gold and silver lace and thread, malt liquors, spirits, woollens, and corals.

19. SALT.—Under this head is shown collections by the Customs Department of Import duty on salt. The receipts of Fasli 1287 amounted to Rupees 505 against Rupees 262 in Fasli 1286. The salt imported into Madras is mainly from the United Kingdom.

20. STAMPS.—The stamp revenue of Fasli 1287 shows a decrease of Rupecs 16,048 compared with that of Fasli 1286. The reasons for the decrease are not ascertainable. The comparative detailed table called for in paragraph 15 of Board's Proceedings, No. 2,467, dated 29th May 1877 is appended :—

The special statements called for in the Board's Proceedings marginally speci-fied are submitted. Referring to Board's Proceedings, No. 1,633, dated 15th 78 ber 1878, I beg to state that the extent and assessment of land sold under Standing Order, No. 269, for arrears of land

revenue have been shown in the statement submitted with reference to Board's Proceedings, No. 2,464, dated 5th September 1878.

23. A copy of the Settlement Report of the Deputy Collector of Madras for Fasli 1287 is submitted as usual.

SUB-COLLECTORATE.

I HAVE the honor to submit the annual settlement report on the Revenues of the Madras Taluk for fasli year 1287, with the usual statements (sent herewith).

2. There have been slight territorial changes in the Madras Taluk in the fasli under report. In G.O., No. 777, of 24th July 1873, the conservancy of all the eight tanks in Madras was placed under charge of the Deputy Collector, and a small establishment, consisting of six Nirganties, was sanctioned to prevent the waste of, and to regulate the supply of, water in them to paddy fields and gardens, &c., under them. But as it was found that no practical check could be exercised in preventing the wastage of water so long as lands within the contour lines of Mylapore, Nungumbaukam, Perambore, Modavakam, Vyasurpaudy and Chetput tanks formed part of Chingleput District, such lands were formally transferred to the Madras District from the beginning of the fasli year 1287 under Government Notification, dated 26th March 1877, published in page 238 of the Fort St. George Gazette of 10th April of that year.

3. The subjoined list shows the villages of the Chingleput District from which the aforesaid lands were transferred to the Madras District with their extents, and the particular tank within the contour line of which they are situated :---

4. Beyond simply taking charge of the transferred lands, no steps seem to have been taken in the fasli year under report to realize the assessment, &c., thereon; firstly, because that the survey maps relating to the lands were not received in this office till June 1878, and, secondly, that no land-tax could be demanded unless it become an arrear under Section 4, Act VI of 1867, which is the law for collecting Land Revenue in the Madras District. Now, above one full year having clapsed since the transfer was made, collections of Revenue on the transferred lands will be enforced without

further delay subject to any remissions which may have been conceded by the Collector of Chingleput District in other parts of the villages from which lands were transferred to this district.

5. The rainfall in the Madras Taluk during fasli year 1287 is noted below, and the statement of rain is compiled from the Meteorological statements published by the Government Astronomer in the *Fort Saint George Gazette*. Compared with

Fasli 1286 the rainfall in 1287 shows an excess of 5.03 inches, but the excess is too small to be of any appreciable value, either to agricultural pursuits or to the sanitary condition of the taluk :---

6. No remissions of any kind, under any circumstances, are given in the landtax of the Madras Taluk by reason that all the lands are taxed with light quit-rent permanently, making due allowance for adverse seasons, and that land-owners find it a profitable investment to convert cultivation land into gardens, cocoanut topes, vegetable and betel gardens with and without bungalows, and consequently even in years of exceptional drought not a single pie was remitted in the dowles of Faslis 1286 and 1287.

7. There are eight tanks in the Madras Taluk, all of which are the property of Government. At no part of the fash year under report the tanks received a full supply of water to stimulate cultivation, and what rain there fell was sufficient for securing a good supply of drinking water and pasturage for men and cattle. All the eight tanks are kept in a good state of repair by the Public Works Department, and the Nirganties attached to them seem to have been vigilant that no water was wasted.

8. The sanitary condition of the taluk in Fasli 1287 has been comparatively good, and it is a point for congratulation that it has been free from any epidemic diseases, for instance cholera. There have been however fever, small-pox, and dysentery throughout the year, but such diseases are always common in localities overcrowded with population, and just emerging from the effects of great drought and famine worthy of historical mention.

The latter part of Fasli 1287, though absolutely free from drought, has been 9. yet a year of considerable hardship and suffering to the poorer classes. The country is emerging from the greatest of visitations, but it has not quite shaken off the effects of that visitation. Madras is not an agricultural district, and it imports from the interior the staple articles of food required for local consumption, and it exports its superfluous articles to foreign ports. The superabundant population of the neighbouring districts of the poorer classes always found a home in Madras, and except when rice and ragi are sold cheap, these people always have to struggle for existence. The yield of crops in the interior having been scanty, there has not been much traffic in rice and other articles of food, and as a consequence the high prices of the necessary articles of food have been maintained, so much so that Government were obliged to keep up relief-houses in certain parts of the district. There is no prospect of the high prices falling down, unless the expected north-east monsoon in October next is plentiful and in season, and the empty granaries in the Mofussil are replenished completely.

10. The average bazaar prices of principal grains are given in Statement No. 2 under the several heads therein provided, and it is a noteworthy fact that prices of grains have risen considerably over the famine prices by reason perhaps of the utter failure of crops in the principal and neighbouring grain-producing districts. From the statements of the people, who are far advanced in age, it appears that former famines were those emanated from partial failure of crops, and the famine which is dying fastly now was founded on the utter failure of crops. Thus the present famine prices exceed those of the former years. It is to be remembered that there are great many ryots and merchants who made considerable wealth by the present famine prices.

11. Sugar-cane was cultivated in Mylapore and Nungumbaukam villages. The extent of land cultivated by this special product in Fasli 1287 was cawnies 8 grounds 15 and square feet 443, assessed with an annual quit-rent of Rupees 46-2-2, against cawnies 6 grounds 15 and square feet 505, with an annual assessment of Rupees 37-3-8. The increase in extent and assessment is very trifling and calls for no special remarks. It is perfectly immaterial in Madras what crops are raised on the soil, as the annual quit-rent on the land is a fixed charge and is always collected, whether it is cultivated with sugar-cane or any other crops, or left waste.

12. Indigo and cotton are not at all cultivated in the Madras District.

13. Subjoined is a statement showing the demand and collection in Fasli 1287 under the head Land Revenue, Miscellaneous, and it shows an increase of Rupees 2,568-6-9 under demand and an increase of Rupees 11,526-2-5 in collections :---

14. There is no variation in demand under the head Shrotriem Jodi, and no remark is therefore called for.

(a.)—Quit-rent shows a decrease of Rupees 414-14-8 in demand, and it is owing to appropriation of private lands for the Madras Junction or Buckingham Canal, the excuse or exemption of quit-rent on sites of Pagodas, Mosques, Churches, Burial and Burning-grounds, the purchase of lands by Government in auctions held for arrears of Revonue, and the reduction in rates of quit-rent on lands which by mistake were charged with enhanced rates of quit-rent.

> * Rental. (b.)—In Ground rent* there is an increase of Rupees 106-9-2 in demand owing to larger extents of Government lands having been given on annual leases to Durkastdars for purposes of cultivation and for erecting temporary sheds.

- (c.)—The decrease of Rupees 114-11-10 in certificate fees under demand is owing to a less number of indentures having been applied for and obtained in Fasli 1287 than in Fasli 1286, and this is attributable to the famine that was then raging, when every land-owner strove hard to obtain food-grains at exorbitant prices.
- (d.)—Revenue process fees shows an increase of Rupees 209-6-9 by reason of the adoption of coercive processes in realization of arrears of revenue, and the non-excuse of charges, except in cases of actual and extreme poverty.
- (e.)—The increase of Rupees 30-5-9 under the head collections after fixing demand arose from the circumstance of the quit-rent on certain lands in Egmore, given on lease to Mr. Woolley, having been left out of demand by mistake in fasli year 1286 and included in the dowle of 1287.
- (f.)—Under the head collections out of sums recommended for remission, an increase of Rupees 192-2-0 is shown, and this arose from the collection of arrears of Shrotriem Jodi on Teruvatteeswaran Pettah, under G.O., No. 1,439, of 7th October 1876, which however, under G.O., No. 570, of 3rd May 1876, had been remitted, in consequence of a portion of shrotriem lands having been taken for the widening of Pyeroft's road.
- (g.)—Grazing-rent shows a decrease of Rupees 26, and it is attributed to the great drought which prevailed in Fasli 1287.
- (h.)—The increase of Rupees 2,618-14-6 under the head deposit carried to Government credit is owing to deposits returnable to parties on account of excess sale proceeds of land having been carried to Government credit under Accountant-General's instructions, No. 10,816, of 24th January 1878, and Collector's Official Memorandum, No. 72, dated 2nd February following.
- (i).—The variations in demand under the heads excess collections, sale of survey plans, rents of fruit trees on Government lands, sale proceeds of fallen trees, commutation of Government quit-rent, and waterrate, are so very triffing that they call for no remarks.
- (*j.*)—The net increase of Rupees 11,526-2-5 under collections is the result of vigorous collections of arrears under Shrotriem Jodi, Quit-rent, Ground-rent, Revenue process fees, and credited deposits, besides a few minor items too trifling to deserve notice.

The old arrears at the beginning of Fasli 1287 amounted to Rs. 27,065-1-1, 16. of which Rupees 12,844-5-0 were collected and Rupees 2,534 8-2 remitted within the fasli, under G.O., No. 3,122, of 17th October 1877. There remained a balance of Rupees 11,686-3-11 at the end of the fasli and of this Rupees 1,989-13-3 minus Rupees 42-12-8, which sum was since collected, were recommended for remission in the Jamabandi Report for Fasli 1286, thereby reducing the balance to the still lower figure of Rupees 9,739-3-4 to be accounted for, for the collection of a part of which attachments are said to have been made, but the value of the property thus attached is not known. I gave orders to prepare an account to show the detail, and it is said that it will be ready within a fortnight. I was referred for the Ausimiwar account of the arrears of Rupees 9,739-3-4, just referred to above, to the lengthy Insert Registers, and the account will be prepared from the registers within a fort-night. Of these arrears Rupees 9,739-3-4, Rupees 2,055-12-1 inserted in the subjoined statement are recommended for remission by the Tahsildar as irrecoverable, but I could recommend now only Rupees 475-6-9 out of them for remission as irrecoverable, as Ausimiwar account for the remaining sum of Rupees 1,580-5-4 (1st item) is not ready, and it will take fifteen days more to prepare.

STATEMENT of old Arrears recommended for remission, Fasli 1287.

17. Item 1 is said to be the accumulated arrears of quit-rent of more than six years' standing, the collection of which is barred by Act XII of 1851. I could not recommend this for remission for reasons given in the sequel part of paragraph 16 of this report.

Item 2 are arrears of land revenue on a portion of Royapettah Dispensary compound. This was originally a private property, and it was afterwards purchased and incorporated with the Dispensary compound. At the time of purchase the cancellation of quit-rent was overlooked, and the mistake being pointed out to the Collector that gentleman ordered the writing off of the arrears in his Official Memorandum, No. 225, dated 1st April 1878.

Item 3 is the enhanced rate of quit-rent erroneously charged on a piece of land in Vyasurpaudy village. A certain landowner had two pieces of land, on one of which the quit-rent was conditionally reduced for a period of ten years with orders to resume the old enhanced rate at the end of that term. In lieu of enhancing the rate on one piece the quit-rent was raised on the second piece of land also. On a complaint received from the owner of the land the matter was brought to the notice of the Collector, and he ordered the remission of the arrears at the enhanced rate on the second piece of land in his Official Memorandum, No. 753, of 2nd October 1877.

Item 4 is quit-rent erroneously charged on Government land in the village of Vyasurpaudy. The mistake was detected in Fasli 1287 and brought to the notice of the Deputy Collector, who ordered the recommendation for writing off the arrears in his Takeed, No. 124, of 29th October 1877.

Item 5 is the arrears of quit-rent on a Mahomedan Mosque. The trustees prayed for the excuse of quit-rent, and on a report from this office the Collector in his Official Memorandum, No. 826, of 1st November 1877, directed the remission of the arrears.

Item 6 is accumulated arrears of quit-rent on a portion of Horticultural Garden. This piece of land was originally private property, and when it was purchased for incorporation with the garden it was forgotten to cancel the quit-rent charged on it. The oversight was brought to the Collector's notice, and he ordered the remission of the arrears in his Official Memorandum, No. 114, dated 21st February 1878.

Item 7.—A portion of the Black Town Civil Orphan Asylum compound, which is now Government property by purchase, was private property, and it bore quit-rent. The cancellation of quit-rent was overlooked, and the matter when brought to the notice of the Deputy Collector he ordered there commendation for remission of arrears in his Takeed, No. 27, of 25th April 1878.

Item 8 is the accumulation of arrears of quit-rent on lands bought by Government in public auctions held for arrears of revenue at nominal prices. The remission of arrears is necessary to prevent fictitious balances appearing in accounts.

Item 9 is triffing in amount. A piece of Government land was leased by an individual. He had a hut in the land, and during famine he pulled down the hut and went away somewhere without leaving any trace behind. The amount being irrecoverable its remission is recommended.

18. Deducting therefore the total (Rupees 475-6-9) of items recommended for remission from the arrears of Rupees 9,739-3-4 there is left a net balance of Rupees 9,263-12-7 to be accounted for.

19. A large share of the above balance, that is about Rupees 6,000, is said by the Tahsildar to be due on unknown localities, the identification of which was deemed unnecessary in G.O., No. 2,636, dated 4th September 1877. Setting off then Rupees 6,000 as due on this item there is left to recover the trifling sum of Rupees 1,683. Necessary accounts are to be prepared to show that about Rupees 6,000 are due on unknown localities. Till then the sum cannot be recommended for remission. The retention of the beriz of the unknown localities in the accounts is creating great confusion.

20. In the fasli year 1287 under report 27,355 notices, demanding Rupees 64,708-0-1, were served warning the defaulters to pay up the arrears: 8,371 warrants of second demands were issued, ordering the distraint of personal property to the extent of Rupees 21,058-5-6. Personal property in 125 cases, to the value of Rupees 912-11-9, was distrained, and of this property, to the value of Rupees 194-3-9, in 32 cases was sold in auction, the rest of the property having been cleared by payment of arrears before the dates fixed for their sale. Fifth demands, or orders for the attachment of real property, was issued in 612 cases to recover Rupees 3,017-1-11, and lands of the estimated value of Rupees 6,953 were attached. Landed properties in 42 cases were sold, Government purchased lands in 14 cases, of the estimated value of Rupees 357, for the nominal value of 14 Rupees, and in the remaining 28 cases lands, of the estimated value of Rupees 2,158, realized in sales Rupees 2,526. The rest of the attached property was redeemed by the owners after paying the arrears of revenue due on the lands before the dates fixed for their sale.

21. In Fasli 1287 demands were also received under Act II of 1864 from the districts of Chingleput, North Arcot, South Arcot, Nellore, and Godaveri for the collection of arrears due in these districts from the defaulters residing in Madras, and out of the total sum of Rupees 27,476-6-4 demand, Rupees 9,291-3-6 were collected and remitted to the respective Collectors, giving reasons in respect of those cases in which it was not possible to collect the remainder owing to payments having been made in the several districts between dates of demand and issue of processes from this office, to the absence of parties from Madras, and to the pauperism of a few others.

22. STAMPING WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.—The collections in Fasli 1287 amounted to Rupees 1,860-10-6, being Rupees 866-4-6 less than the collections in Fasli 1286. The decrease is owing to reduction in fees levied on all measures and weights brought for being tested and stamped from one anna a piece, which prevailed in Fasli 1286, to nine pies a piece, under orders of the Board of Revenue, No. 4,806, dated 22nd October 1877. The charges of the department in the year amounted to Rupees 1,127-4-0 on account of fixed establishment, Rupees 92-14-10 on account of famine batta, and Rupees 22-7-6 on account of contingencies, making a total of Rupees 1,242-10-4, and this leaves a balance of Rupees 618-0-2 in favor of the department.

23. The statement appended shows the work done in the department during fasli year 1287, compared with that in the previous Fasli 1286;—

24. The statement exhibits decrease in the number of bazaars registered and the weights and measures stamped, and the only reason which can be found for it is the breaking up of a number of petty bazaars on account of dullness in grain trades in the year 1287, which in the fasli year before 1286 was very brisk.

25. STAMPS.—The revenue under this head shows a decrease of Rs. 1,873-12-0, compared with the revenue in previous fasli. The annexed statement prepared in the form prescribed in Revenue Board's Proceedings, No. 2,467, of 29th May 1877, shows the revenue of the two years side by side :—

26. The decrease is entirely in Court Fee labels and Adhesive Receipt stamps, Foreign Bill stamps, and Share Transfer stamps, and it is attributable to the less litigious tendency of the public, and to the introduction of a uniform rate of discount of three per cent. on all sales of stamps, which in fasli year 1286 was a little over twice that rate and consequently led to speculation. Under the heads Non-Judicial stamp papers of Country and English manufacture, and Bills of Exchange the revenue shows an increase in the fasli under report, but it is too small compared with decrease of revenue under other minor heads, and therefore needs no comment.

27. ABKARI.—A separate report on this head of revenue was forwarded for Fasli year 1287 in No. 1,294, dated 24th August 1878, but I think it necessary to give a brief summary in this report of the working of this branch of Government revenue.

28. The demand under this head amounted to Rupces 11,94,179, or Rupces 2,924 less than the revenue of Fasli 1286 as detailed below. This short fall of under Rupces 3,000 in a yearly revenue of nearly twelve lakhs of Rupces is very insignificant, and scarcely deserves mention. It is, however, due to less sales in the year under report owing to slackness in grain traffic:—

30. The whole of this sum was collected since the termination of the fasli year 1287 except the triffing balance of Rupees 126 under the head Toddy, and it will also be collected very soon.

31. Besides the sources of revenue mentioned in this report there are others, such as Postage and Telegraph labels, rents of Government buildings, rents of trees on tank beds and bunds, and the like, but as revenues from them are all credited to heads other than those mentioned in the demand, collection, and balance statement, such as Government of India, Department of Public Works, and Provincial Services, they are not treated of here.

SETTLEMENT REPORT

OF

CHINGLEPUT.

I HAVE the honor to submit, with the prescribed statements, my Jamabandi Report for Fasli 1287, and to express my regret that, under the circumstances already explained (vide my letters, Nos. 405 and 49, dated 30th November 1878 and 24th January 1879, respectively) it is so much over time.

2. STATEMENT No. 1.—The marginally noted statement exhibits the usual information as regards the stations at which the Jamabandi was conducted. I made the settlement of the Ponneri Taluk, with the exception of twenty villages which had been disposed of by Mr. Barlow prior to my joining. In the Conjeveram Taluk I settled 170 villages, and whilst I was awaiting the completion of the accounts connected with the remainder my Acting Sheristadar died, the preparation of the budgets came on, and I had the questions of the Famine Commission to answer. I was finally compelled to hand the completion of the Jamabandi of the taluk over to the Sub-Collector, who also settled Madhurantakam and Chingleput. Mr. Weld, when Special Assistant Collector, did the Jamabandi of the Tiruvallur Taluk and that of Saidapet was carried out by the General Charge Deputy Collector. The four days occupied at Chingleput by the Sub-Collector in settlement work appertaining to the Conjeveram Taluk related only to the delivery of puttas belonging to villages marching on the Chingleput Taluk,

3. The average time occupied in the settlement of each taluk was twenty-eight days. Conjeveram took much longer than the others as it was the last to get rid of the Settlement Department, and the Curnams had all their Revenue accounts in disorder and not written up.

4. The Director of Revenue Settlement was particularly anxious that, during the year under report, the settlement should be introduced throughout the district, and the Board having agreed to allow the work to go on beyond the close of the Revenue year the measure desired by Mr. Puckle was carried into effect. The consequence, however, was that the Jamabandi did not begin until May and was not completed until November.

5. The following fluctuations took place in the number of villages and these are explained below :---

The decrease in Nos. 1 and 3 was due to clubbing by the Settlement Department of villages which had previously borne separate numbers, and that under Amani arose from the two villages noted in the margin Coromandel and Venbakam.

having been converted into Ryotwar.

6. PUTTAS.—The total number of Ryotwar puttas this year was 68,085 against 61,893 in the previous season, thus showing a pet increase of 6,192. This increase is accounted for by the ordinary transfers and divisions of land which yearly take place and by the usual acquisitions on Durkhast. These, owing to the impetus given to cultivation by an improved season and the decline in the famine, and to the removal of the restrictions placed upon taking up new land whilst the new settlement was in progress, were more numerous than in a normal year. In consequence of the introduction of the new settlement 57,895 fresh puttas had to be distributed.

7. SEASON.—From the comparative statement of rain-fall noted in the margin it will be seen that the season of the year under report was considerably better than that of the preceding one, and this fact will account for the large decrease in remissions granted. The large tanks of the district all received supplies, which allowed of the successful cultivation of

their ayacuts, and the river channels and springs in wells, &c., which, during the drought of the previous two years had been most seriously diminished, revived.

8. PUBLIC HEALTH.—Public health was much better than it was in Fasli 1286. The mortality from cholera was considerably less; there was a slight increase in the deaths from "fever," "small-pox," and "other causes." The increase in the loss arising from fever was no doubt caused by the accession of malaria arising from heavy falls of rain at the termination of a long period of drought. The cattle, as soon as rain fell, recovered their condition very rapidly, but towards the close of the year considerable mortality was caused by outbreaks of cattle disease of various kinds, the most fatal being Renderpest.

9. STATEMENT No. 2.—Prices of all food grains continued to rise higher than those of the preceding year. This was caused by the utter depletion of stocks arising from the prolonged famine and from the ryots, when the crops came in, being exceedingly unwilling to put anything into the market until they had laid in a sufficient stock for themselves and their dependants.

10. STATEMENT No. 3, ENCLOSURE A, RYOTS' HOLDINGS.—The ryots' holdings during the year under report amounted to Acres 546,393, assessed at Rs. 14,27,240, thus showing a net increase of Acres 25,358, assessed at Rs. 72,975. This chiefly arose from the excess discovered in the new survey in the taluks of Chingleput and Madhurantakam.

11. LANDS RELINQUISHED.—As regards the relinquishment of lands by the ryots there was a falling off of Acres 2,903, assessed at Rs. 3,967, over the extent relinquished in Fasli 1286, the reason being the more favorable nature of the season.

12. The extent of the ryots' holdings at the beginning of the fasli was Acres 521,035, assessed at Rs. 13,54,265, and had risen at its close to Acres 546,393, assessed at Rs. 14,27,240—a result due to a large extent of land having been acquired on Durkhast. It is to be observed that for some three years prior to the introduction of the new settlement the disposal of Durkhasts was kept in abcyance.

13. ACTUAL CULTIVATION.—The actual cultivation amounted to Acres 365,269, assessed at Rs. 10,50,972, against Acres 355,655, assessed at Rs. 9,53,603, in Fasli 1286, thus exhibiting an increase of Acres 9,614, assessed at Rs. 97,369, and this arose from the more favorable nature of the season as compared with its predecessor.

14. WASTE CHARGED.—The total extent of dry and wet waste charged for the year amounted to Acres 147,813, assessed at Rs. 2,75,555, against Acres 699, assessed at Rs. 1,562, charged in Fasli 1286. This enormous increase (Acres 147,114, assessed at Rs. 2,73,993) resulted principally from punjah remission not being given, but was also partly caused by the statements and accounts of Curnams and others being more closely scrutinized than they could have been during the pressure of Fasli 1286.

15. WASTE REMITTED.—The subjoined abstract shows in a comparative form the remission granted under this head :—

This decrease is, as has already been observed, due to the favorable character of the season which rendered applications for remissions on account of dry lands unnecessary.

16. ENCLOSURE B TO STATEMENT No. 3, SPECIAL PRODUCTS.—There was so little cultivation of sugar-cane and cotton in this district that these products need no special mention. The extent of indigo cultivation was less than that in the previous year by Acres 1,526, assessed at Rs. 1,505, as shown below :—

The reason for this falling off was that indigo is not the paying crop that it used to be and that the ryots found that the demand for food-grains was such as to render the raising of them the more lucrative speculation.

17. ENCLOSURE C TO STATEMENT No: 3, PROGRESSIVE COWLE.—There was no fluctuation in the extent of land held on "Progressive Cowle," although there was an increase of Rs. 6 in the assessment, which was the result of some of the lands under this head having been transferred to the head of wet during the recent settlement.

18. ENCLOSURE D TO STATEMENT No. 3.—The marginal statement shows that the amounts remitted and charged on portions of fields during the fashi were Rs. 2,744 and Rs. 55,595, respectively. These figures contrast very favorably with those of the previous fashi, viz., Rs. 55,059 and Rs. 349.

19. ENCLOSURE E TO STATEMENT No. 3.—The abstract marginally noted shows that Rs. 14,67,866 was the sum total of actual cultivation, waste charged, and the amount of water-rate derived from dry lands irrigated and wet lands cultivated with second crop during Fasli 1287. The increase, as compared with the previous year, was Rs. 4,62,807 and the cause of this has been already stated.

23. Rupees 1,957 were remitted in the taluks of Ponneri and Saidapet on lands which were assessed by the Settlement Department with the consolidated assessment, but upon which no second crop was raised.

24. ENCLOSURE TO STATEMENTS No. 4.—From Statement No. 4 it will be seen that the remission for Shavi on irrigated and unirrigated lands amounted to Rs. 54,883 and Rs. 479, respectively. The latter item was granted only in the taluks of Saidapet and Tiruvallur.

25. TOPE COWLE.—There was a falling off of Acres 485, assessed at Rs. 2,666, in the extent of land held on Tope cowle. This was due partly to the full assessment

being charged in cases where the holders had failed to plant as required by the rules, and partly to the reduction of assessment of such lands effected in the recent settlement.

26. STATEMENT No. 5.—The marginally noted statement shows that the miscellancous demand from all sources amounted to Rs. 87,287 against Rs. 80,327, thus exhibiting a net increase of Rs. 6,960 over that of the previous year. This appears under the following heads :—

The demand against Shrotriem and Inam villages amounted to Rs. 75,839 against Rs. 75,845 in Fasli 1286, showing a decrease of Rs. 6, which was the reduction of quit-rent made on account of certain lands taken up for the South Indian Railway in the Shrotriem village of Vinjiambakam—*Vide* Board's Proceedings, No. 4,115, dated 24th April 1878.

The decrease under Home and Inland sales arose from want of stock at the Madras Cotaur in consequence of the loss of salt at the pans through the cyclone of May 1877.

35. The total falling off shown under exportation is attributable to the fact that no salt was allotted for exportation at Covelong in consequence of the stock at that station being required to be transmitted to the Homes' Gardens Depôt to meet the local demand. Notwithstanding all this the result was an increase of Rs. 2,53,487 over the revenue realized in Fasli 1286. This arose from two causes, viz. :--

- (1.) The value of salt sold on credit in previous years having been realized and credited in• the accounts of this fasli as directed in the Board's Proceedings, No. 1,026, dated 13th April 1878.
- (2.) The enhancement of the selling price of salt from Rs. 2 to Rs. 2-11-0 agreeably to the Board's Official Memorandum, No. 1,931, dated 28th December 1877.

36. Stamps.—The demand on account of Stamps showed a decrease of Rs. 1,996, a fact which was probably caused by the famine having created a lull in litigation of all kinds.

38. COLLECTION OF CURRENT DEMAND.—Of the total demand of Rs. 52,85,092 as shown in No. 7 the sum of Rs. 44,47,480, or 84 per cent., was collected within the fashi, thus leaving a balance of Rs. 8,37,612 on the 1st July last. A considerable portion of this sum, viz., Rs. 5,03,774, having been subsequently realized the balance on the 1st December amounted to Rs. 3,33,838, or 6 per cent. of the total demand of the fashi. 39. The large increase of Rs. 8,86,364 under Land Revenue Collections was caused by the favorable turn which the season had taken, allowing of the adoption of steps to get the revenue in more punctually and regularly than had been before possible.

40. ABKARI COLLECTIONS.—An arrear, to the extent of Rs. 91,597, was outstanding against the Abkári Renter at the close of the fasli. Of this Rs. 74,654 were subsequently realized. The balance on the 1st December last was therefore only Rs. 16,943, and in consequence of demi-official instructions from the Secretary to the Board measures to press the collection of this amount were not taken.

41. The fluctuations in the collections of salt and stamps have been explained in paragraphs 34 and 36 *supra*.

42. ARREARS DEMAND, STATEMENT No. 8.—The arrears of former faslis as they stood at the beginning of the year amounted to Rs. 6,56,013, of which Rs. 4,07,813 were collected within the fasli and Rs. 48,564 were written off the accounts under the sanction of Government conveyed in the Board's Proceedings quoted in the

For Rs. 28,564-Vide Board's Proceedings, No. 5,136, dated 1st December 1877.

For Rs. 20,000-Vide Board's Proceedings, No. 707, dated 15th March 1878.

the Board's Proceedings quoted in the margin, so that on the 1st July last there was a balance of Rs. 1,99,636. Since then and up to the end of November last a further collection of Rs. 67,020 was made, leaving a net balance on the 1st December

following of Rs. 1,32,616. Out of this Rs. 8,916-13-9 were recommended to be written off in the last Settlement Report for which the sanction of Government was received — Vide Board's Proceedings, No. 3,209, dated 29th November 1878. The amount remaining to be accounted for is now Rs. 1,23,700. Of this Rs. 16,201-6-10 are irrecoverable, a large portion of this sum, viz., Rs. 5,927-14-10, being the arrears of Peishcush, the collection of which was suspended pending the payment of compensation due for lands taken up for the Chembrambakam Project. I request that sanction may be obtained for writing off Rs. 16,201-6-10.

43. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 8.—The number of cases in which coercive process had to be issued for the collection of revenue was 20,752 against 13,094 in the previous fashi and the value of the property sold, both personal and real, was Rupees 9,427 against Rs. 16,436. This decrease was mainly due to the suspension for a time of all such processes in consideration of the famine.

44. VILLAGE AND TALUK ACCOUNTS.—The village and taluk accounts were examined as well as the limited time which the extra work involved in the introduction of the new settlement would permit, and they were found to be on the whole fairly kept. There were, however, evidences of carelessness, such as numerous corrections not initialled, accounts particularly those of Curnams which had been recently written up *en masse* instead of being kept from day to day, &c. The famine and the work of the Settlement Department coming upon top of it, however, so disorganised the whole of the village staff that there was considerable excuse for this state of things. Steps will be taken during the current year to put matters upon a more satisfactory footing.

45. STATEMENT No. 9, GROSS COLLECTIONS AND CHARGES.—The gross collections from all sources amounted to Rs. 48,55,293 showing a net increase of Rs. 11,53,440, or 31 per cent. on the collection of Fasli 1286. As already observed this was chiefly due to a large increase in Land Revenue and Salt.

46. The charges aggregated to Rs. 20,82,667 against Rs. 5,26,526 in the previous fasli. This increase, viz., Rs. 15,56,141, was owing to the value of salt purchased by wholesale merchants under the credit system, which remained unadjusted on 31st March 1878, having been credited to the head "Advances Recoverable" and debited to Salt under Board's Proceedings, No. 1,026, dated 13th April 1878, as also to the compensation paid to the salt ryots for loss sustained by the cyclone of May 1877 and to the charges incurred for conveyance of salt from the Homes' Garden to the Madras Cotaurs.

47. The net increase in the charges under the head "Salaries" and "Expenses," viz., Rs. 3,019, arose from the large expenditure incurred during the year on account of famine batta allowed to the Huzur and Taluk Establishments.

50. Statement of abandoned tanks made over to private individuals as required in the Board's Proceedings, No. 1,633, dated 15th June 1878, and the returns of sales of land under Standing Orders, Nos. 150, 152, and 269, (Dalyell's Edition), are also enclosed.

51. As directed in Board's Official Memorandum, No. 47, dated 18th January 1879, I submit herewith the crop statement for the fasli under report.

52. CONDUCT OF PUBLIC SERVANTS.—The present Acting Sub-Collector, Mr. Weld, did not join the division until a brief period before the close of the fasli. He has shown himself to be a very energetic and zealous officer and promises well.

My Assistants have been changed three times within the year, and the period during which they have respectively been with me has been too short to allow of my saying anything very definite of them. The last, Rathnavelu Chetti, is an officer of decided ability and application.

Of my Treasury Deputy Collector I have already expressed my opinion.

The General Charge Deputy Collector, Mr. Jones, has worked well and to my satisfaction and I have formed a very favorable impression of the ability and application of the Temporary Deputy Collector, Mr. Pinto, who did excellent work whilst acting as Treasury Deputy Collector and has since been doing the same as Officer in charge of Claims for Compensation on account of lands taken up for public purposes.

Singaravelu Mudaliar, whose death in September last has been a great loss to the office, performed the duties of Acting Sheristadar in a most careful and conscientious manner.

Of the Tahsildars, &c., of the District I cannot say very much that is favorable. Seethapathi Naidu, Tahsildar of Conjeveram, is, taking him all round, by far the best, and next to him ranks N. Kistnayengar, the Tahsildar of Madurantakam, who, however, lacks the power of ruling his subordinates. He will probably improve in this respect as he is a man of ability.

I am glad to say that I have got rid of Bujunga Row, Tahsildar of Saidapet, who was a most unsatisfactory officer and who was entirely past his work. His successor, Strinivasa Row, late Tahsildar of Ponneri, is an improvement, and though of the old school works very fairly if looked after. Sama Row, Tahsildar of Tiruvallur, is a weakly man and not so strong from an official point of view as a Tahsildar should be. He does his best, I dare say, but I do not think him a satisfactory workman. He leaves too much to his subordinates. Sami Naidu, Tahsidar of Chingleput, continues to do his best to give the utmost dissatisfaction to his superiors and to involve himself in serious trouble.

The Taluk Sheristadars and Deputy Tahsildars are, as a rule, indifferent and some are positively bad. They are certainly not up to the standard that one ought to expect in a district surrounding the Presidency. Raju Sastry, Deputy Tahsildar of Uttramerur, is the only officer of that class who seems at present likely to merit promotion. Chittambara Row, Deputy Tahsidar of Poonamallee, has certainly ability, but I have more than once had reason to doubt him in other matters.

SUB-COLLECTORATE,

I HAVE the honor to submit the Jamabandi report of the Sub-division for Fasli 1857, accompanied by the prescribed accounts and statements. This report does not embrace the settlement of the Conjeveram Taluk which was partly settled by you and partly by myself.

2. PLACES AT WHICH SETTLEMENT WAS MADE.—Statement No. I shows the places at, and the dates on which the settlement was conducted. The average time occupied in completing the Jamabandi of each taluk was twenty-two days, and as a rule the settlement was conducted in more than two places with as little inconvenience as possible to the ryots.

3. PUTTAS.—The total number of Ryotwar puttas in the year was 20,502; of these 1,855 were new ones, while the rest were modified in consequence of the introduction of new settlement into the Sub-division. The total number of puttas in the year under report as compared with that of the last year shows an increase of 1,855, which is attributable partly to transfer of land by sales or other causes and partly to fe sh lands taken up by the ryots.

4. FLUCTUATION IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES.—There has been a decrease in the total number of villages as compared with the previous fashi as shown below :—

The decrease which appears under Ryotwar and Shrotriem is due to the clubbing of two or more villages into one by the Settlement Department. There was no change whatever in the tenure of villages.

5. SEASON.—The season of this year was more favorable than the preceding one, a fact which accounts for the increase in the ryots' holding and cultivation, and the decrease in the amount of remission granted on account of waste and shavi.

6. SANITARY CONDITION.—The sanitary condition of the Sub-division was tolergood. The number of deaths from cholera, fever, and other causes during the is much below that of Fasli 1286.

7. CATTLE --- The mortality of cattle from Vakkai and other epidemic diseases was large, though considerably short of that of the preceding fasli.

8. PRICES OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS.—The subjoined statement exhibits the average prices of the principal grains as compared with those of the previous year :---

The cause of the marked decrease under the Items 1, 2, 11, 12 and 13 is the favorable nature of the season; the falling off under the items from 4 to 9 is due to the fact that such permanent remissions ceased with the introduction of the new settlement. The collections on account of current demand were 54 per cent. in Fasli 1286 while those of Fasli 1287 amounted to 61 per cent. within the fasli, the collections

on account of arrears in Fasli 1286 were 79 per cent. while those of Fasli 1287 were 88 per cent., the collections up to the end of 31st December last were 94 per cent. of the current demand and 93 per cent of arrears. This so decidedly more satisfactory result is owing to the comparatively improved state of the season.

24. BALANCES.—The balance both on account of current demand and arrears outstanding at the end of 31st December last amounted to Rs. 41,453, of which Rs. 2,789-3-8 will have to be written off as irrecoverable; the net balance, viz., Rs. 38,664, would have been collected had it not been that in consideration of the disastrons nature of the season orders were issued for the suspension of collections by means of coercive processes.

25. COERCIVE PROCESS. -- Recourse to coercive process has been ordered to be held in abeyance in all but well irrigated villages till some time before the close of the fasli. Real and personal property, valued at Rs. 3,627, has been attached and sold by which a sum of Rs. 3,138 has been realized.

28. REMARKS ON THE QUALIFICATION OF THE OFFICIALS IN THE SUB-DIVISION .----The Tahsildar of Madhurantakam, Kristniengar, is a promising officer, first rate as a Magistrate, and very good as a Revenue officer; his chief failing is that he cannot altogether be depended on to keep his promises and to carry out orders. If the vigilance of his superior officer relax work is not done. The Tahsildar of Conjeveram, Seethapathy Naidu (by far the best Tahsildar in the district), is remarkable for the extent to which he can be depended on. I have only met one other (i.e., Sama Row, Tahsildar of Tiruvallur) to be compared with him in this respect. You already know the bad opinion I entertain of the Tahsildar of Chingleput, and that I am now engaged on a report on his conduct. He is utterly unfit for his post. The Sub-division Sheristadar, Ramasami Iyer, was somewhat of a square man in a round hole owing to his ignorance of English, which disabled him from attending to the major part of a Sheristadar's duties; but I think him very well qualified for a Tahsildar-ship, to which post he has recently been transferred. The Deputy Tahsildar of Con-jeveram Town is neither very bright nor very active, and his manner is disagreeably fawning. He does not know English and has, I think, climbed as high as his deserts warrant. The Deputy Tahsildar of Utramarur is a very promising officer both as a Magistrate and as a Revenue officer and will make a first rate Tahsildar. The Deputy Tahsildar of Sriperumbudur is a very good active Revenue officer. He goes about his division and knows every inch of it. He does not know English. The Deputy Tahsildar of Tiruporur is somewhat lazy, but with urging may do well; he is not by any means dull. Several of the Revenue Inspectors, particularly those of Chingleput Taluk, turn out very little and that very bad work; a few do pretty well.

NORTH ARCOT.

I HAVE the honor to submit my report on the annual settlement of the district for Fasli 1287 (A.D. 1877-78), accompanied by the prescribed statements as per enclosed list.

2. The settlement of the district was commenced in the Vellore Taluk on the 19th March 1878 by the Acting Sub-Collector, Mr. Austin, and was concluded by me in the Palmanair Taluk on the 27th June 1878.

3. The arrangements made for the settlement of the district and other particulars therewith connected are shown in Statement No. 1.

4. The number of villages under all tenures remains the same as in last fasli. The total number of villages is 3,059, of which 2,934 are on Ryotwari tenure, while the rest are Inam and Shrotriem.

5. The total number of puttas held in the whole district at the end of this fashi is 200,813, against 196,424 held at the end of the past fashi, *i.e.*, 1286. It is to be observed that there is an increase of 4,389 puttas during the fashi under report, which is attributable to the various kinds of transfers by sales, inheritance, &c., and also to the issue of new puttas for lands obtained on Durkhast. The number of fresh puttahs issued this year is 4,729, while the number of old puttas in which modifications have been made is 43,643, and the old puttas which hold good are 152,441.

6. SEASON.—Although the extraordinary drought of Fasli 1286 extended over a portion of this fasli, and the season was in consequence extremely unfavorable during the earlier part of the fasli, still it must be regarded as infinitely better than its predecessor; for, in the months of September and October there was a heavy outburst of rain which materially brightened the prospects of the ryots and enabled them to carry on their agricultural operations with renewed vigor, aided by liberal advances from State funds and by large donations from the Mansion House Fund. In spite of this happy fall of rain the year under report has been one of partial distress. A full account of the season has been given in my last Administration Report, and I deem it unnecessary to reiterate what has already been said. The following statement exhibits the total rainfall during this fasli :—

7. The health of the district was far from satisfactory; from small-pox and fever showed an increase of 3,377 and 28,811 respectively. The very large increase of mortality under fever is due to the sudden change of weather caused by the heavy burst of rain after the long-continued drought. The hard, sun-dried ground everywhere was covered with dead leaves and decayed vegetation, and as soon as cultivation began, the pent-up malaria seemed to burst forth with extraordinary virulence, and was perceived in the most deadly form in places that for years had been regarded as healthy places of residence. I am, however, glad to be able to report the great decrease of 27,881 in the death-rate from cholera, which is in a great measure due to the adoption of vigorous precautionary measures towards arresting the progress of this disease.

8. Although on the whole there was a decrease of 2,064 in mortality among the district farm cattle, yet there was an increase of 2,726 among bullocks and 2,247 among buffaloes, which arose from want of sufficient pasture during the early part of the fash and from cattle discase of various kinds. During the famine cattle-theft was rife throughout the district. The thieves in many cases stole the animals to provide food for themselves, but very frequently the skins only were taken for sale to the tanners.

9. Statement No. 2 is the return of the prices of all food-grains which ruled high during the year under review as compared with the preceding year. There has

been a gradual fall in the importation of grain from Madras since November 1877, and the general yield or out turn of crops harvested during the year was only pretty good. The stock of grain in hand lasted wonderfully, but began to run short at last, and these causes added to the unfavorable charactor of the carlier portion of the season tended to keep up the prices.

10. Statement No. 3 shows the extent of land relinquished, sold, or transferred, and also that taken up for fresh cultivation. It will be seen from the following memorandum that there was an enormous decrease of 16,554 acres assessed at Rupees 28,854 under the head "Lands given up," and 11,433 assessed at Rupees 20,648 under the head "Lands taken up," but on the whole there is an increase of acres 2,165 assessed at Rupees 4,712 under the head "Actual ryots' holding." The decrease in the "Lands given up" is partly owing to the reviving hopes of a better season on the part of the ryots and partly to the absence of a large number of petty landholders from their homes on relief works; while the decrease under the latter head is due to the adversity of the season :---

These remissions seem to have been given for the most part for wet waste under the rain-fed tanks by the settling officers after careful inquiry and scrutiny of the accounts, the dry waste remitted under the Board's Proceedings quoted in the last paragraph being only Rupees 8,918.

14. Enclosure D to Statement No. 3 gives talukwar information regarding the portions of fields left waste and lands ploughed but not sown which were charged or remitted. The remission of Rupees 2,747 on 2,148 acres dry, and Rupees 5,249 on 1,178 acres wet lands was specially granted in cases where the lands were rendered unfit for cultivation by being taken up for famine roads, excavation, &c.

15. ACTUAL CULTIVATION.—The marginal statement shows the extent actually

20. The following abstract statement shows in a comparative view the land revenue and remissions of the past and present faslis. The increase of Rs. 5,10,122 in the amount of land revenue, inclusive of miscellaneous beriz, is due to the comparatively favorable season and also to the paucity of remissions allowed as compared with the preceding fasli. The only item under which there is a large decrease in this statement is that of "land-cess." In the returns submitted by the Kalastri and Karvetnuggar Zemindars the large decrease of nearly 30,000 Rupees was set forth, and the figures shown were apparently unreliable. These returns are now with my Head Assistant for the rough examination and verification; and when the result is

communicated to me I shall be in a position to explain accurately the cause of such a large decrease. Should there be any difference under this head it will be included in the demand of the next fasli.

There has been, however, an increase of Rs. 352 under the heads "Pampoodithi" and "Payamali" in the Wallajapet Taluk, because the lands of certain villages were submerged by the water of the Caveripauk tank and channel.

"Shavi" or withered crops, from which it will be seen that the remissions granted in the taluks of Arcot, Gudiyatam, Wandiwash, and Wallajapet were larger than elsewhere owing to extensive shavi under rain-fed tanks.

23. Out of Rupees 10,579 remitted under the head of "Teerva Cammi," Rupees 8,304 were for the Wandiwash Taluk and Rupees 1,648 for that of Arcot. Wherein, on wet lands under rain-fed tanks dry crops were extensively raised by means of private wells, and there was an enormous difference between the wet and dry assessment.

24. Only Rupees 85 were remitted for "Phala Nashti" or loss of produce, against Rupees 9,583 in the last fasli, and this remission occurs only in the taluk of Wallajapet this year.

25. Rupees 44 were remitted under the head of "Cowile remission" in the Palmanair Taluk for the village of Aroonodian, which is the only village on this tenure in the district.

Total ... 10,579 26. Rupees 5,500 on account of "Fasal Commi" and Rupees 37 on account of Tirvajasti were remitted, against Rupecs 14,705 and Rupees 478 respectively in the last fasli. There is a total decrease of Rupees 9,646 under these two heads.

27. MISCELLANEOUS-Items.-The accompanying Statement No. 5 exhibits the various items of miscellaneous demands for the present fasli. Miscellaneous Items.

28. JODI ON SUNDRY INAMS.—The small decrease under personal Inam is due to the lands having been sold for arrears of quit-rent in the Chittur and Chandragiri Taluks. The increase in the Service and Dasabundam Inams is owing to the comparatively favorable character of the season. 29. ITEM No. 2.—The increase of Rupees 188 under the head "Tax on trees on assessed and unassessed lands" is attributable to a number of trees having commenced to bear fruit in this year, and to their having consequently been brought to taxation.

30. ITEM No. 6—LANDS CULTIVATED BUT NOT INCLUDED IN THE JAMABANDI.—The increase in this item of Rupees 2,657 is no doubt the result of the improvement in the season.

31. ITEM No. 41—COMMISSION ON THE SALE OF DESTRAINED PROPERTY FOR ARREARS OF RENT.—The increase of Rupees 316 in this item is due to a portion of the last year's amount of commission having been brought to account in this fasli in addition to its own.

32. ITEM NO. 47—CHARGE FOR WATER ON ZEMINDARI INAMS.—The increase of Rupees 8,258 under this head is owing to the favorable character of the season at the time when wet cultivation was commenced.

33. ITEM No. 54—SALE PROCEEDS OF WASTE LANDS.—It will be observed that no waste land has been sold in this year.

34. ITEM No. 56—PROCESS SERVICE FEES.—The increase of Rupees 7,674 shows that extensive coercive measures had to be adopted in the collection of arrears of revenue, which were not resorted to in the preceding fashi under orders of the Board of Revenue, No. 264, dated 23rd January 1877.

35. ITEM No. 60—DOUBLE CHARGE FOR WATER ON LANDS IRRIGATED.—The increase of Rupees 130 in this item is due to the prohibitory charge of water-rate levied in the Arcot Taluk.

36. The increase of Rupees 413 under the head "Other items" is owing to premium having been by mistake collected by some taluk subordinates in the exchange of silver coins for copper and credited to accounts, and also to the recovery of advances made by the Survey Department on account of village labor.

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37. The increase or decrease in the other items contained in this statement being insignificant calls for no remark.

38. A memorandum explaining the several items comprised in No. 5 account and showing particulars regarding the various items under the head "Other items" accompanies this report.

39. The net increase of Rupees 16,066 under Miscellaneous Revenue is attributable to the comparatively favorable character of the season as already noticed.

40. Enclosure A to Statement No. 5 shows the particulars of dry and wet for the items therein contained. The particulars of remissions under this head, amounting to Rupees 389, are shown in enclosure B, which also accompanies.

41, Statement No. 6 shows the demand, collection, and balance, both of arrear and current revenue, in the several Zemindaris, Polliems, Shrotriems, &c., in the district, and no noticeable change is to be perceived in it.

42. The demand, collection, and balance from all sources of revenue, both current and arrears, are shown in Statement No. 7, and to facilitate reference, a comparative abstract is given in the subjoined statement :---

13. It is gratifying to find that there is a large increase of Rupees 5,10,156 in the Ryotwari and miscellaneous demands, which is no doubt attributable to the improvement in the season as already observed.

41. The increase in the Abkári revenue is so insignificant that it needs no explanation, and the decrease of Rupees 13,998 in the Stamp revenue is due to a fall in the extent of private transactions on account of distress.

45. COLLECTIONS.—The increase of Rupees 3,39,503 under the head "Permanently Settled" arises from the collection of large outstanding balances of peisheush from the several Zemindars and the increase of Rupees 9,362 in Shrotriem Jodi; of Rupees 9,74,066 in Ryotwar, and of Rupees 24,584 in Miscellaneous is due partly to the improvement in the season and partly to the coercive measures adopted in this year in collecting the past fashi's arrears.

46. The decrease of Rupees 55,603 in the collection of Abkári revenue is due to the non-payment of arrears by toddy renters.

47. The following statement shows the balances under the several items of Land Revenue, both current and arrears, at the end of Fasli 1287, as also the considerable reductions effected therein by the end of October 1878.

48. There is a large arrear under the head "Permanently Settled," which is due to the concession shown to the several Zemindars under the marginally-noted orders :---

ments along with his kists for Faslis 1288, 1289, and 1290, and the Rajah of Kalahasti, along with those of Faslis 1288 and 1289 similarly; the Bungari Poliagar has been allowed† to liquidate his arrears in equal instalments with his kists for Faslis 1288

and 1289; and regarding the arrears under the other heads very strict orders have been issued to the taluk officers for the speedy collection thereof.

50. The accompanying statement No. 8 shows the fasalwar arrears under the heads of "Permanently Settled" Shrotriem Jodi, Ryotwar, and Miscellaneous, and also the amount of irrecoverable balances now recommended to be written off the accounts

consisting of the marginally-noted items. An explanatory memorandum showing the various causes for writing off these sums is attached to this statement. The several Settlement Officers have made careful inquiries with regard to these items and satisfied themselves as to their accuracy.

51. Enclosure A to Statement No. 8 shows the extent to which coercive measures were adopted for the recovery of arrears during this fash, from which it will be seen that processes had to be issued for Rs. 14,21,430 against 239,475 defaulters.

52. Statement No. 9 showing the particulars of gross collections and charges under the different heads of revenue is herewith enclosed. The causes of variations in the collections having been already explained in connection with Statement No. 7, I shall now proceed to explain only the items of charges.

53. The decrease of Rupces 2,056 under the head of "Land Revenue Refunds" is owing to the refund of excess collections being greater in Fasli 1286 than in 1287 as per Board's Proceedings, No. 303, dated 26th January 1877.

54. The decrease of Rupces 588 under the head of Stamps is attributable to the refund of process batta by the District Court being much less than in the preceding fasli.

55. Slight increase of Rupces 219 under the heads of Salaries and Tentage of Collector, &c., is on account of the payment of salary, &c., to Mr. Gibson, Additional Assistant Collector, who was employed in this district for a short period.

56. The increase of Rupees 3,323 under the head of Huzur and Taluk establishment is owing to the payment of famine batta during this fash as per G.O., No. 41, dated 5th January 1877.

57. The increase of Rupces 1,212 under "Saderward" is due to the high prices of oil and other articles purchased during this fashi and which, of course, was due to the famine.

58. The decrease of Rupees 512 under the head "Medical charges" is owing to the non-payment of salaries to those Hospital Assistants who were transferred from the Head Assistant and Deputy Collector's offices.

59. The large increase of Rupees 2,493 under the head of Contingencies is partly owing to the payment of travelling allowances and batta to Divisional Officers and their establishments who had constantly to move about for the inspection of relief works and camps, and partly to the purchase of stationery for the use of Special Relief Officers.

60. The increase of Rupees 542 under the head "Miscellaneous" was caused by remittance charges for conveying treasure within the district on account of emergent demands for famine relief expenses.

61. The decrease of Rupees 153 under the head "Discount" is owing to a fall in the sale of stamps in this year.

62. The increase of Rupees 228 under the head "Excise Contingencies" is due partly to the erection of huts for the Police Constables guarding distilleries and partly to the payment of fees for registering abkari muchilikas, *i.e.*, counterparts.

63. The increase of Rupees 90,205 in the revenue under the various chief

for the revenue under the various chief sources^{*} of irrigation as would appear from enclosure A is attributable to the comparatively favorable character of the season.

> 64. The accompanying Statement B exhibits the details of lands acquired by public servants during the year under report, and it is to be observed therefrom

that a certain Taluk Gumastah in the Polur Taluk has obtained from sale and mortgage nearly 5 acres of land in that taluk during this fasli.

65. Enclosure C exhibits the extent of land granted on cowle for the purpose of planting private and charitable topes, wherefrom it will appear that during the fasli under report four cowles were granted, one for charitable and three for private topes.

66. The enclosure D, one acre of hand (wet) is shown to have been transferred to dry in the Chittur Taluk. This transfer was unavoidable on the ground that the hand had no means of being irrigated from any Government source.

67. A certain ruined tank was made over for private enterprise under orders of Government, and this case is entered in a statement prepared in the form prescribed by the Board in their Proceedings, No. 1,633, dated 15th July 1878, which accomposes this report.

68. A statement showing the demand, collection, and balance of costs awarded by Civil Courts in favor of Government in suits brought against Revenue Officers in Fasli 1287 also accompanies this report, and it will be seen from it that the entire demand on account of costs, both arrear and current, amounts to Rupees 134-2-5, of which a sum of Rupees 37-9-2 has been recovered, leaving a balance of Rupees 96-9-3 yet to be recovered wherefore the necessary steps have been taken. 69. The marginally-noted Taluk Treasuries were inspected and examined by Vellore, Wallaja, and Arcot. Mr. Marjoribanks, my Treasury Deputy Collector, and the accompanying statement

shows the result of his examination. Strict orders have been sent to the Tahsildars concerned on the various shortcomings therein pointed out.

70. As no waste lands were sold during the fash under the provisions of Standing Orders Nos. 150 and 152, a blank statement as per instructions conveyed in Board's Proceedings, No. 2,464, dated 5th September 1878, is herewith enclosed.

71. With reference to paragraph 3 of the Board's Proceedings, dated 1st December 1877, No. 5,136, directing that all oldstanding, arrears shall be disposed of and that explanations given for all arrears older than five years in the Jamabundi report for Fasli 1287, I beg to state that it was almost impossible to decide at the time of the settlement what items of these old arrears were really irrecoverable, for, no steps were taken during the past fasli towards realising such arrears by attachment and sale of landed property, nor were ploughing cattle and other movables, such as agricultural implements, &e., destrained. It is an undeniable fact that most of these defaulting petty landholders were driven by the famine from their homes in quest of employment on relief works in different parts of the district, and hence a full inquiry with regard to their arrears and a satisfactory adjustment of accounts could not be effected. Every endeavor will be made to dispose of them during the ensuing settlement, and the result duly reported in the next Jamabundi report.

72. The state of the taluk and village accounts was generally satisfactory. I regret to have to forward this report without that of the Sub-Collector's which has not as yet been received. Several reminders have been sent calling for it.

73. CONDECT OF PUBLIC SERVANTS.—I have great pleasure in placing on record my hearty acknowledgement of the zealous assistance I received during the fasli under report from my Head Assistant Mr. A. F. Cox, and my Assistant Mr. Tremenheere. Both of these officers worked in a manner that was beyond praise. Amongst my Native subordinates I gladly mention the names of V. Srinevasa Charry, the Huzur Serishtadar, Varadarajalu Reddiar, Tabsildar of Wallajapet, and Chuckravarthi Nainar, Tabsildar of Chittur, and who is now acting as Huzur Serishtadar. These officials all did excellent work throughout the year.

5. The number of new puttas was almost the same as in the previous fashi. The year having been one of great distress there was a large decrease in the number of wuttas "modified" and a corresponding increase under puttas "unaltered."

6. SEASON.—The season was an extremely unfavorable one. There was an absolute failure of rain in the early part of the year, and although there was a copious fall in the months of September and October, amounting to 22 inches taking the average of the division, still the benefit naturally to be expected from such a rain-fall did not occur owing to the failure of the periodical rains after October.

8. SANITARY CONDITION .- Public health during the year was decidedly worse than in the previous year. The following statement shows that the mortality per thousand of the population was 47.6 against 30.10 in the preceding year. The principal cause of death was undoubtedly privation superinducing famme fever, diarrhœa, and dropsy. Cholera was prevalent to a small extent in the beginning of the year. Most of the deaths from famine diarrhea and dropsy occurred in relief camps :-

If the returns can be trusted there was a great improvement in Gudiyatam and Arcot Taluks, especially in the former. In Vellore Taluk there was an increased loss of 1,441 head which followed an outbreak of cattle disease in the Generally speaking early part of fasli.

11. The rise in the prices of all grains was due to the continuance of famine and to the scanty outturn of the previous harvests.

12. RYOTWARI SETTLEMENT HOLDINGS .- As regards the extent of land held on putta there was an increase of 1,208 Acres, assessed at Rupees 2,764, in the area. In other words the average taken up for cultivation for the first time was 2,476 Acres against an acreage of 1,268 Acres relinquished. This is detailed in the following statement :---

It will be observed that 87 per cent. of the lands was thus taken up for the first time and an explanation which has been offered is that many of the better class royts embraced the opportunity of the famine to secure lands to which in ordinary seasons they would not have been considered entitled.

The rain-fall in September and October having been copious as noticed above a larger extent of land under "wet" was brought under cultivation than in the previous year in anticipation of the season being a favorable one. In addition the high prices of agricultural produce tempted the royts to break up and sow as large an area as possible.

16. SECOND CROP ASSESSMENT.—The amount charged under this head in Fasli 1287 was Rupees 11,355 against Rupees 6,421 in the previous fasli. Nearly the whole of this amount was levied in Gudiyatam Taluk as in the Arcot and Vellore Taluks; fasaljasty cannot be charged except in a few villages.

18. REMISSIONS—From the figures in the margin it will be seen that in Fasli 1287 there was a considerable increase in the amount of revenue remitted on account of dry lands left waste, whilst at the same time there was an increase in the acreage of the dry lands left waste which was charged as in ordinary years. The considerable decrease under "wet" remitted was due to the stimulus given to cultivation by the rains of September and October

which, however, afforded the ryots nothing more than withered crops and a miserable outturn.

20. The remission under the first head (Shavi) exhibits a considerable decrease on that granted in the previous year. Though as a fact little remission was granted under this head still much of the crop reaped by the ryots was little better than Shavi and afforded a most disappointing yield. In the majority of cases of actual Shavi reported the Shavi was not what is termed "Hazar" at the time of Azmaish, as during the year fodder was very scarce and the withered crops were utilized as fodder for cattle, and were therefore not entitled to remission under the rules. There were a few instances in which the taluk officers were to blame for long delaying the Azmaish and all such cases were duly noticed. Hence a large decrease under remissions under this head.

21. Further, the second head (Teerwacummy) shows a large decrease, and this is accounted for by the limited extent of cultivation of dry crops on wet lands during the year.

22. There was only a slight increase under Boganashty, which calls for no special remarks. As I have pointed out above remission of this kind is chiefly given in only one (Gudiyatam) taluk.

33. Most of the processes were issued in the Arcot Taluk, which is at all times a difficult one to manage, and in which the work of collection even in ordinary years is very arduous. The attachment and sale of landed property having been suspended during the year all the processes issued relate to personal property. In this respect this year of course contrasts very unfavorably with the previous year, owing to the large outstanding balances consequent on the previous year of famine. Although remissions were granted for waste and shavi, and Tahsildars were enjoined to collect assessments only from such of the ryots as had reaped their crops, still the payments were delayed in most of the cases until processes were actually issued.

PREFATORY.---I have the honor to submit the Settlement Report for Fasli 1287 together with the prescribed statements as per enclosed list.

2. LAND REVENUE DEMAND OF FASH 1287.-- The net demand of Land Revenue for the year was Rupees 31,13,615 against Rupees 26,42,823 in the previous fash, showing an increase of Rupees 4,70,792, but it is still Rupees 3,48,916 short of the demand of Fash 1284, the last good year this district has had.

3. DISTRIBUTION OF JAMABANDI WORK, ITS COMMENCEMENT AND CLOSE.—Of the eight taluks in the district, Kallakurchi was settled by me, Tindivanam and Trinomalai by the Sub-Collector, Virudachalam and Chilambaram by the Head Assistant Collector, Tirukoilur and Villupuram by the Deputy Collector on General Duties, and Cuddalore by the late Temporary Deputy Collector Vencataramiah. The settlement of the taluks of Tirukoilur, Trinomalai, Virudachalam and Chilambaram was completed before the close of the fash, but that of the others extended beyond it in consequence of the large shavi remissions that had to be granted on account of the adverse season, and of the extraordinarily large number of deceased Puttadars whose nearest heirs had to be ascertained so that the necessary alterations might be made in the registers. The work connected with the granting of dry remissions was particularly heavy this year as a special mode of calculating the same was prescribed by the Board in their Proceedings, No. 674, dated 13th March 1878, and in certain subsequent instructions. 4. NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES AND VARIATIONS .- There was no alteration

7. The increase might have been larger if all the Swayajasti cultivation included in the accounts submitted by the village officers had been transferred to the holdings, but this was not done for reasons explained in a subsequent paragraph.

8. SEASON, PUBLIC HEALTH, AND CONDITION OF THE CATTLE.—These three subjects have been fully dealt with in my Administration Report for 1877-78, and I have nothing particular to add in regard to the last three months of the fash to which the said report does not refer. The first half of the year was characterized by severe famine and the rainfall in the months of July and August was so extremely scanty that the earlier dry crops, cumboo and ragi, with which nearly half of the dry holdings in the district are usually cultivated, failed. This failure was felt by the ryots all the more severely that these crops were also failures in the two preceding fashs, and there was no stock of dry grain in the district. The season was most disastrous also to ploughing cattle, large numbers of which perished for want of fodder.

The dry lands included in the holdings measured 940,555 assessed at Rs. 15,97,988, against 964,353, assessed at Rs. 16,24,9 previous year, showing a decrease of 23,798 acres, assessed at Rs. 26,96 due to the lands relinquished having been considerably in excess of those on durkhast and cultivated without permission.

13. The wet lands included in the holdings measured 285,747 ac at Rs. 15,18,759, against 285,153, assessed at Rs. 15,16,064, in the showing a small increase of 594 acres, assessed at Rs. 2,695.

SETTLEMENT REPORT OF SOUTH ARCOT.

17. It will be seen that in respect of waste, Trinomalai Taluk has suff most. Of the 104,829 acres of "dry" land which were comprised in the hold of this year 41,681 acres or 40 per cent. was left waste, while in the other the land so left waste bears a much lower proportion to that cultivated, 18 cent. and less. As regards wet lands included in the holdings this taluk is in the same unenviable position.

18. The proportion of the waste in the holdings in this taluk was also largest in the previous fash in which the dry waste amounted to 17 perthe holding and the wet waste to 54 per cent., facts which show very clearly this taluk suffered from the unfavorable season and famine more than any in the district. The Kallakurchi Taluk comes next in this respect.

19. The actual cultivation of dry lands included in the holdings in the district was 772,903 acres against 835,767, showing a decrease of 62,864; that of the wet was 258,819 acres against 221,691 in the previous year, show an increase of 37,128. These variations are the result of the season having favorable to wet cultivation while it was just the reverse to dry.

20. RYOTWAR SETTLEMENT.—'The result of the settlement (Ryotwar and collaneous combined) of Fasli 1287 as compared with that of the preceding detailed in the annexed statement which shows an increase of Rupees 4,52, the revenue under Ryotwar and of 18,532 under Miscellaneous, making Rapees 4,70,686 :—

23. CULTIVATION OF SUGAR-CANE.—The falling off in the cultivation of sugar-cane was the result of the failure of rain during the first two months of the fasli when the crop is generally put down. The decrease in the cultivation of cotton was brought about partly by a falling off in the demand for the article for local industry (owing to the weavers having been obliged to give up their profession on account of the severe famine), and partly by excessive rain in the months of September and October when the crop is generally sown. The variation in the cultivation of Indigo is not such as to call for any remark. The ground-nut cultivation was only one-third of that of the previous year and the decrease is attributed chiefly to failure of timely rains.

24. There was an increase of 50 per cent. over the previous year in the cultivation of rape seed as it is a crop not requiring much rain and more paying in famine years than in ordinary ones on account of the increasing demand that exists for the oil for cooking as well as lighting purposes.

25. PERMANENT SOURCES OF IRRIGATION.—The following is a list of the important sources of irrigation in the district with the cultivation and gross revenue under each source for Fasli 1287 :—

26. The decrease under the Pelandurai *anicut* is due to the anicut having been breached at the commencement of the cultivation season, *i.e.*, in September, and to its having been found impossible to close the breach during the remainder of the year.


27. The decrease of the revenue under the Vellar and Kinanur and Meimathur anicuts is attributed to several of the ryots not having ventured to raise wet crops on their dry lands in consequence of failure of irrigation experienced in provious years.

29. The progressive cowle forming the last item in the above statement was granted in Fasli 1286 for four years for nine acres of land covered with jungle situated in the village of Nandivadi in the Villupuram Taluk in consideration of the labor and outlay necessary for reclaiming it subject to the remission of the full assessment, Rs. 25, in the first year of the grant and to the charge of $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{1}{2}$, and $\frac{1}{4}$ assessment in the three succeeding years.

30. REMISSIONS.—The following account shows the remissions granted in each taluk in the fash under report. They amount to Rs. 1,72,179 against Rs. 5,92,437 in the previous year :—



31. The remission in all the taluks except Virudachalam were this year granted in accordance with the special instructions given in Board's Proceedings, dated 1st April 1878, No. 877, and in certain subsequent orders issued on the

same subject in connection with references made by the Collectors of the various distressed districts.

32. In the Virudachalam Taluk the settlement had been almost concluded when the Board's instructions were received and it was left undisturbed for reasons which will be found in the Board's Proceedings, dated 5th June 1878, No. 1,502.

33. It will be seen that the relief afforded to the ryots was very slight in the Tudivanam, Trinomalai, and Virudachalam Taluks.

34. MISCELLANEOUS REVENUE.—Particulars of the important items of the Loud Revenue Miscellaneous for the past two faslis are compared below :—

be seen that 17,179 acres, assessed at Rupees 27,922, mostly consisting of swayajasti cultivation, were not included in the puttas this year. Of this extent, 14,161*acres belong to the Sub-division, and the Sub-Collector explains that the omission to do so was due to "want of sufficient time and men to conduct the

requisite scrutiny into the accounts which were produced late and many of which were incomplete."

36. In the other taluks of the district the extent of swayajasti cultivation which was not transferred to puttas is comparatively trifling and calls for no remark.

37. The increase of Rupees 6,440 under Inam kassar is due to the season having been more favorable to wet cultivation this year than the previous one.

38. The increase of Rupees 9,730 in the fees charged for the service of revenue processes is the result of coercive measures having been resorted to this year to a larger extent than in the proceeding one.

39. RUINED TANKS.—There was only one tank called Sellanthangal which was made over to private enterprize in the district during the year under report. A statement in the prescribed form showing the ayacut, &c., of the tank is appended to paragraph 13 of the Sub-Collector's report accompanying.

40. LAND REVENUE.—The entire Land Revenue of Fasli 1287, including permanently-settled Revenue Jodi and Miscellaneous and the demand under other

42. RYOTWAR COLLECTIONS.—The amount of Land Revenue arrears outstanding at the commencement of the fasli was Rs. 11,75,814, of which Rs. 8,59,983 were collected within the year and 9,633 ordered to be written off. The balance left at the end of the fasli was Rs. 3,06,198, of which Rs. 97,897 were collected up to the end of January last, leaving Rs. 2,08,301 to be collected on the 1st February. 43. Of the current demand, viz., Rs. 31,13,615, Rs. 16,98,995 were collected within the fashi and Rs. 9,37,877 subsequently up to the end of the last month, leaving a balance of Rs. 4,76,741 on the 1st ultimo.

44. The collections under Land Revenue (arrears and current together) made within the fasli exceeded those of the previous year by about $5\frac{1}{2}$ lakes notwithstanding that the first half of the year was very unfavorable.

45. COLLECTIONS UNDER SHROTRIEM QUIT-RENT.-In paragraph 21 of his report the Sub-Collector states that for the recovery of a portion of the balance remaining uncollected under this head in six villages of the Villupuram Taluk, viz., Rs. 1,417-8-10, the shrotriem lands should be placed under attachment, and quotes two letters which he has already addressed me on the subject. In these two letters he asked me to obtain the sanction of the Board for the attachment of all the shrotriem lands, on the ground that the different co-sharers kept fighting with each other about payment, and were not at all inclined to come to terms and clear off the arrears. At the same time he stated that it was "most probable that the Shrotriemdars had movables." The shrotriems in question have been enfranchised by the Inam Commissioner, and are on the same footing as ryotwari lands. Their attachment, even if unavoidably necessary, does not seem to require the sanction of the Board. I have therefore requested him to state whether it is his wish that the shrotriem lands should be taken under Government management under Sections 28 to 33 of Act II of 1864, drawing his attention at the same time to paragraph 7 of Standing Order No. 107, which lays down that such measures should be resorted to under extremely exceptional circumstances, and that, as a rule, movable as well as immovable property should be attached and sold in satisfaction of the arrear. The fact of the Shrotriendars fighting with each other does not seem to me to be a good reason why Government should take the trouble of managing their lands to clear off their arrears outstanding against them.

46. ABKARI.—For full particulars of the administration of this branch of revenue during the year I refer the Board to my special report separately submitted.

47. SEA CUSTOMS.—Collections under this head were only Rs. 4,638 against Rupees 28,740 in the previous year, or 16 per cent. of that of the previous year.

43. The following statement compares the revenue from imports and exports during the year with the realizations of the previous one :---

49. Export.—The chief articles of export from this district are rice and paddy, and the export trade in these articles came to a dead-stop partly owing to the short production of the grain on account of the bad season which prevailed in the

two years which preceded the last, and partly owing to the high famine prices ruling in the market which rendered the export of grain less profitable.

50. Import.—The revenue from imports is chiefly derived from arecanuts imported from Acheen and other places; the import duty of this article was Rs. 493 only against Rs. 2,791 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 2,298, which is due probably to a falling off in the local demand for the article on account of the famine.

51. LAND CUSTOMS.—The variations in the collections under Land Customs, which department is entirely in the charge of the Sub-Collector, are explained in paragraphs 23 and 24 of his report. The Sub-Collector makes no remark regarding the cause of the increase of Rs. 4,832 derived from duty on liquor imported from Pondicherry. The Sayer Superintendents explain that it is due to certain merchants transporting large quantities of liquor from Pondicherry to Bangalore.

52. In paragraph 25 of his report the Sub-Collector urges the necessity of retaining the Sayer station at Thooknampakam, on the ground that although the collections made at that station have been much below the cost of the establishment for some time past, yet there is a prospect of the revenue increasing in course of time. The question of abolishing that station was mooted by Mr. Sharp in paragraph 60 of the Jamabandi Report for Fasli 1286, but under the circumstance stated by the Sub-Collector the matter may lie over till it is seen whether there is any increase in the income derived, or perhaps till the Pondicherry Railway is completed, when it may become necessary to close some of the present stations and open others instead elsewhere.

53. STAMP, NON-JUDICIAL.—The revenue from non-judicial stamps rose from Rs. 73,848 in Fasli 1286 to Rs. 78,170 in the year under report, resulting in an increase of Rs. 4,322, which is apparently due to an increase in money transactions consequent on famine.

54. The judicial stamp revenue fell from Rs. 1,37,492 in Fasli 1286 to Rs. 91,681 in the year under report, showing a decrease of Rs. 45,811 consequent on reduced litigation. The net decrease under Stamps, Judicial and Non-Judicial taken togther, was Rs. 41,489.

55. SALT.—The administration of this branch of revenue is now in the hands of the Salt Commissioner, but as during the year under report the Collector had charge of it, I subjoin as usual the following remarks connected with its manage ment during the year.

56. The collections under this head amounted to Rs. 8,04,347 against Rs. 7,53,418 in the previous year, showing an increased revenue of Rs. 50,929, due to the enhancement of the monopoly price from Rs. 2 to Rs. 2-11-0 per maund by Act XVIII of 1877, which came into force at the end of the first half-year.

57. The following statement shows separately the sales in each salt division for each half-year in this and in the preceding year :—

58. The quantity sold during the year was, however, less than in the previous one by 44,598 maunds in the Merkanam Division, while in the other two divisions the sales were 22,813 maunds more than those of the previous year, thus resulting in a net decrease of 21,785 maunds for the entire district. Statement A shows that in the first half of the year there was a falling off of 45,363 maunds, or 28 per cent. in the sales at Merkanam, notwithstanding there was no enhancement of the monopoly price during that period. The severe famine which then prevailed may have been the chief cause of this decrease, though from the fact of the sales at the other two stations, which are on the line of railway, having nearly doubled during that period, there may be reason to suppose that the falling off at Merkanam may also have been due to the fact of that station being less accessible and far away (twenty-one miles) from the line of railway.

59. Statement B refers to a period in which the pressure of famine had considerably abated, but in which the enhanced monopoly price was in force. The transactions of this period, which are shown for each month, indicate that there was a falling off in sales at all the three salt stations, irrespective of proximity or otherwise to the line of railway; that at Guddelam the sales were on the decrease throughout the whole six months, while at Merkanam the sales showed an increase in May and June. The cause of the falling off is not known unless it be owing to the enhanced price. 60. The subjoined statement shows the variations in the sales for Home and Inland consumption during the past two faslis :---

62. The above statement shows that there has been nearly as great a falling off in the salt trade with Salem and Trichinopoly as there has been an increase in that with North Arcot, Chingleput, and Tanjore. The particulars of Home and Inland consumption entered in the accounts are based on verbal statements made by the purchasers, who might have in several instances either given a false destination, or, if they had stated it correctly, might have changed their minds afterwards. The accounts kept of these variations are therefore not very reliable, and there is no register kept at the frontier of the district to show what quantity of salt actually passes out of the district by the several roads.

63. According to these accounts, the largest consignments have been taken to the North Arcot, Salem, and Trichinopoly Districts, and the quantity taken to those districts from each division is specified below :---

64. DITTAM AND OUTTURN.—The dittam and outturn for the past season (*i.e.*, calendar year 1878) is given as below by the Salt Deputy Collector, but as I have no accounts in my office showing the salt scraped after 31st May last, I am unable to verify the figures given by that officer :—

65. The season was favorable for the manufacture of salt during the first half of 1878, and for further particulars on the subject I would refer the Board to my letter, No. 330, dated 29th July last, recorded in Board's Proceedings, dated 15th August, No. 2,284.

Wastage.-The total wastage of salt found in the heaps sold in Fasli 1287 amounts to 19,790 maunds, as per accounts received at this office from the Salt Superintendents direct, but according to the statement which accompanied the annual report received from the Salt Deputy Collector for the fashi it amounts to 19,819 maunds, or 29 maunds in excess. This excess lies in the wastage entered in the Deputy Collector's statement against the salt supplied to French Government. I have requested him to explain the cause of it to the Salt Commissioner direct. The statement received from the Salt Deputy Collector shows also an excess of 282 maunds discovered in certain heaps sold in the year. Deducting this excess from the wastage of 19,790 maunds as shown by the accounts of this office, the net quantity of wastage to be written off the accounts on account of the year is 19,537 maunds, which is 5 per cent. of the quantity stored as shown in Statement No. 11. I request that sanction for writing off this quantity to profit and loss may be given and communicated to the Salt Commissioner. The wastage discovered in the heaps of Fasli 1284 sold in the Guddelam Division in the year under report is 9 per cent. This arose from the salt which was brought to the Guddelam platform from the dependent stations of that division in boats having been put into them in a loose state, which afforded great facilities for theft. As a check against such malpractices my predeceasor, Mr. Sharp, passed an order during the year under report that all salt brought from the dependent stations should be packed up in gunny bags and sealed before being put into the boats at the dependent stations. He also passed a similar order in regard to the consignments of salt annually despatched to Pondicherry.

67. The Experimental Pans at Manambadi.—These were worked under the supervision of the Salt Deputy Collector as in the previous year, the Board having in their Proceedings, dated 8th January 1878, No. 54, directed that they should continue to be worked by Government also this year; but the outturn of these pans, as reported by the Deputy Collector, was 11,952 maunds only against 15,579 in the preceding year. The cost per garce was Rs. 17-8-1 against Rs. 12-13-2 in the previous year. A sample of the salt produced received from the Deputy Collector is herewith forwarded. The cost per garce at other pans worked at Merkanam and Chunampet by the Salt Deputy Collector under "Amani" is reported by him to have been Rs. 3-6-11 and Rs. 3-14-1 only per garco. As the department is now under the charge of the Salt Commissioner, I leave it to him to make such remarks as he may deem fit regarding these experiments 68. The stock of salt on band at the end of the year appears to have been very nearly equal to two years' consumption, as required by the special order passed by the Board on the subject in regard to this district in their Proceedings, No. 2,533, dated 1st June 1877.

69. STATEMENT No. 9, CHARGES AGAINST COLLECTIONS.—The only variations of importance in the items of expenditure entered in this statement which call for explanation are what follow.

70. MAJOR HEAD SALARIES AND EXPENSES, MINOR HEAD MISCELLANROUS—Increase Rs. 6,145.—Of this increase Rs. 3,703 were owing to more batta peons having been employed this year for process service under Act II of 1864; Rs. 903 were owing to an increase on account of service telegrams submitted to Board and Government with respect to famine matters; Rs. 458 were on account of remittance charges; and Rs. 214 on account of official postage. The rest of the increase was on account of sundry items.

71. MAJOR HEAD SEA CUSTOMS, MINOR HEAD ESTABLISHMENT—Increase Rs. 327.— This is chiefly due to famine batta, the payment of which continued throughout the fasli, while in the previous one it was paid for five months only.

72. MINOR HEAD CONTINGENCIES—Decrease Rs. 737.—This is due to the extraordinary reduction in the Customs transactions during the year, by which the allowance due for extra attendance became diminished.

73. MAJOR HEAD LAND CUSTOMS, MINOR HEAD MOIETY OF THE SALARY OF THE BRITISH CONSULAR AGENT AND HIS ESTABLISHMENT—Increase Rs. 1,416.—In Fasli 1286 a moiety of the monthly salary of Rupees 250 paid to the British Consular Agent was alone debited to Land Customs, while in Fasli 1287 a moiety of his regimental pay was also debited to this head under instructions contained in Accountant-General's Result Statement No. 13,365 of 14th March 1878.

74. MAJOR HEAD SALT, MINOR HEAD PURCHASE OF SALT—Increase Rs. 8,582.— This is owing to some of the kudivaram monoy due for Fasli 1286 having been disbursed in the following fasli.

75. MINOR HEAD CHARGES FOR EXPORTING SALT—Increase Rs. 1,595.—The Deputy Collector accounts for this increase by saying that a larger quantity of salt was despatched this year to the French Government at Poudicherry than in the previous year.

76. IRRECOVERABLE ARREARS OF REVENUE.—Of the sum of Rs. 2,08,592-2-0 of old arrears which remained uncollected on the 1st ultimo, Rs. 4,457-6-1 have already been authorized to be written off in Board's Proceedings, dated 29th November last, No. 3,202. But of this sum Rs. 8-1-4 have been subsequently collected, leaving a balance of Rs. 4,454-4-9 only to be written off under the above sanction. I now request sanction to write off a further sum of Rs. 6,219-8-9 as irrecoverable as per following particulars:—

- (1.) Arrears due by Puttadars who have neither movable nor immovable property to proceed against, Rs. 4,580-6-4.
- (2.) Assessment charged on land which does not exist, Rs. 24-14-5.
- (3.) Assessment and water-rate charged on lands taken up for Railway and other purposes, and also other amounts erroneously charged and remitted on appeal, Rs. 1,614-4-0.
- 77. Thus there is a balance of Rs. 1,97,918-4-6 to be hereafter collected.

78. INCOME-TAX.— Under the head Income-tax there appears an outstanding balance of Rs. 291-2-6 relating to Faslis 1281 and 1282, of which nothing has yet been collected, nor have I received proposals from the Divisional Officers recommending that this sum be written off as irrecoverable. I have therefore recently called on them to inquire into the particulars of these balances without further loss of time with a view to ascertain whether they are recoverable or not, and shall address the Board separately as soon as I hear from them.

79. LAND REVENUE COLLECTIONS, OLD ARREARS.—Subjoined is a statement exhibiting talukwar particulars of the old balances, both recoverable and irrecoverable, from which it will be seen that the old arrears have been completely cleared off for Faslis 1275, 1276, 1277, and 1278.

COERCIVE MEASURES FOR REALIZATION OF ARREARS. --- The number of defaulters 80. against whom processes (I presume the Tahsildars refer to processes Nos. 1 and 4) were issued in the year was 268,462 against 129,603 in the previous year. The amount of arrears for which the processes were issued was Rs. 16,74,040 against Rs. 8,27,835, and the value of movable property sold for arrears of revenue was Rs. 20,602 against Rs. 5,943 in the previous year. The value of immovable property sold, however, was much less than in the preceding year, being only Rs. 5,733 against Rs. 16,507 in Fasli 1286. Thus the number of instances in which coercive measures had to be resorted to during the fasli under report was more than double those in the previous fasli, but there is nothing to be wondered at in this when it is borne in mind that almost every ryot, whether able to pay or not, is always ready to take advantage of any excuse which may present itself for not paying up what he owes. The amount of revenue voluntarily paid by the ryots was Rs. 8,84,938, or about a third of the collections.

81. VILLAGE AND TALUK ACCOUNTS .- The accounts Nos. 1, 2, 4, 5, and 16 for all the villages in the Kallakurchi Taluk which was taken up by me for settlement this year underwent a thorough scrutiny by the taluk officials assisted by the temporary establishment sanctioned in Board's Proceedings, dated 13th April 1878, No. 1,027, in connection with the dry remission work.

82. The shavi accounts of a large number of villages were also examined by my establishment, which discovered in some instances substitution of waste for cultivated fields and of crops yielding less outturn for those yielding more, with a view apparently to enhance the amount of remission due to individual ryots.

83. The accounts kept by the village officers of that taluk were on the whole fairly satisfactory.

84. In July 1877 the Treasury Deputy Collector examined the village collection accounts of certain villages in the Chilambaram Taluk and remarked as follows:---

in the margin were examined. There has been very great improvement in them since printed forms with printed instructions in the first page were supplied after my inspection of some village accounts in Villupuram Taluk. They are free from the mistakes which then attracted my attention, as the instruc-

tions and the printed headings have secured uniformity as well as accuracy."

85. The Sub-Collector, however, remarks that the village accounts in his division were not kept as carefully as could be desired, but it seems to me that this defect cannot be fully remedied so long as we cannot appoint as Curnams those competent to do the work required of them, but must confine ourselves to the claims of those having a hereditary right to the office.

S6. LANDS ACQUIRED BY PUBLIC SERVANTS. - During the year under report the number of public servants in the Revenue Department who acquired landed property was eight, and the extent of property so acquired by them was 61.32 acres.

87. Of these lands 42.54 acres were acquired by purchase, 1 by inheritance, and the rest by mortgage as shown below :---

88. SUB-DIVISION OF ENFRANCHISED INAM VILLAGES.—No Inam village was subdivided in the year under report.

S9. PROCESS SERVICE FUND.—The balance to the credit of this Fund at the commencement of the fasli was Rs. 40,879 and the receipts during the year were Rs 35,922, making a total of Rs. 76,801, from which deducting the sum of Rs. 21,949, being cost of the establishment employed during the year, the balance at the close of the fasli was Rs. 54,852.

SUB-COLLECTORATE.

1. PREFYTOR.—1 have the honor to submit my report on the results of the Revenue Settlement of this Sub-division for Fasli 1287 (A.D. 1877-78), together with the prescribed statements, the forms of which were furnished to me with your docket, No. A-10, dated 12th December last.

2. DISTRIBUTION OF SETTLEMENT WORK AND ITS DURATION—Statement No. 1.— Of the three taluks comprising my Sub-division, Trinomalai and Tindivanam were settled by myself, while Villupuram was settled by the General Deputy Collector Mr. Sribaliah. The settlement was conducted in all cases at two or more stations

within the limits of each taluk, and every facility was afforded to such of the ryots as were disposed to attend the Jamabandi. The time actually occupied in the three taluks settled was 88 days. Grave difficulty was experienced in procuring the attendance of the Curnams and Monegars, and the scrutiny necessitated by following the principles ordered* by

Government and the Board for granting wet and dry remissions caused more than ordinary labor and time.

3. VARIATIONS IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES.—A comparative memorandum of the villages under various tenures in this Sub-division is subjoined from which it will be seen that there was no variation, although one Ryotwar village, Gangaveram, was transferred from Trinomalai to Villupuram Taluk during the fasli (*ride* G.O., dated 12th April 1877, No. 1,404).

The whole of the putta land in Periakananoipatti, in Trinomalai Taluk, was relinquished prior to Fasli 1287. There are some eleven villages of this kind where cultivation is uncertain and which are covered with jungle and unsurveyed and which are "Bechiraz" or uninhabited. Of these eleven villages, ten were excluded from settlement in Fasli 1286 or prior thereto as I consider incorrectly, as the villages still exist, and if land were taken up it would not be entered in any other village. I may mention here that the Ryotwar villages according to the Census Register of 1871 were as follows:—

4. PUTTAS.—The total number of Ryotwar puttas in the fasli under report was 115,565, of which 4,748 were fresh, 78,465 were modified by additional entries chiefly caused by the grant of wet and dry remissions and by sub-divisions of puttas, and 32,352 remained unaltered as shown in Column 6 of Statement No. 1. The total number of puttas in the year as compared with that of Fasli 1286 shows a net increase of 715. There was an increase in Villupuram Taluk of 1,770 while in the other taluks there was a decrease of 1,055 puttas. The increase is attributable to sub-divisions of puttas and to fresh lands taken upon durkhast and under "swayajasti" rules in this the most fertile of the three taluks. The decrease arises from the limited extent taken up on durkhast, and the necessity of with-

holding puttas for lands entered in the margin cultivated under swayajasti system and charging them under "Sevoyjama" this year owing to want of sufficient time and men to conduct the requisite scrutiny into the accounts, which were produced late and many of which were incomplete. In cases where

5. SEASON.—The season of Fasli 1287 continued to be unfavorable for the first half of the fasli. The rainfall in the fasli under report is compared with that in the previous faslis 1285 and 1286 in the statement annexed :—

In Villupuram, cumboo crops failed altogether for want of sufficient rain in the early part of the year. The excessive rain in November 1877 damaged the cholum and ragi crops, whose outturn was only estimated at $\frac{1}{4}$ or $\frac{1}{4}$ of the average yield. In Tindivanam, cumboo failed to some extent which was not worthy of any notice, as a second crop was soon afterwards raised on the same land. Cholum was largely sown in Tindivanam Taluk and the crops were generally fair. The raising of this crop was indiscriminate both on wet and dry lands. In the Trinomalai Taluk cholum crops which were of good promise were damaged by insects called "Annapuchi." Trinomalai Taluk had rain on the whole abundant, but untimely and partial. In some parts, it was somewhat excessive, in others scanty, and in the rest there was none at all. Cumboo sown with the little rain that fell in the early part of the fasli failed totally in many cases and partially in others. On the whole the season in the Sub-division was not so unfavorable during the last half of the fasli as it was in the preceding year. As to the public health there was no epidemic or endemic discase prevailing, but during the first half-year famine diarrhœa, caused by excessive or abnormal feeding on empty stomachs, was felt much in villages and relief camps. It is gratifying to find that cattle disease was not prevalent during the fasli to any noticeable extent. The Tahsildar of Trinomalai reports that some cattle suffered from Vekkai, and roughly estimates the total loss of cattle from this cause as well as from want of pasturage and drinking water and from continual thefts as 16,214. The information regarding exact loss of cattle, however, as compared with that in the preceding fasli, is not reliable.

6. PRICES OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE.—The prices of the principal grains other than cholum were generally higher than those which prevailed in the preceding fash, and much higher than the average prices for the ten years prior to Fash 1287. As to cholum the cultivation and outturn were abundant in many parts of Tindivanam and in some parts of Trinomalai, so much so that even wet lands were cultivated with it. However, the price in 1287 of cholum was higher than the average for the previous ten years. There is no doubt that the outturn of food-grains raised in this fash was better than that of the preceding fash, but the continuance of exorbitant prices, or rather the general increase to such prices in this fash, was chiefly owing to the drain caused by demands from adjoining taluks and districts. 7. RYOTWAR SETTLEMENT.—Statement No. 3 shows the ryots' holdings at the commencement of the fash, the subsequent changes, and the results at the close of the fash. The annexed is the comparative abstract thereof :—

The result of settlement exhibits a net decrease of Acres 25, 123, assessed at Rs. 30, 168, in the holdings. This is mainly owing to limited extent of land taken on durkhast in the fasli. Under the head "Land taken on durkhast" there is a decrease of Acres 34,101, assessed at Rupees 45,711, observable, but from this Acres 14,161, assessed at Rs. 19,928, being lands cultivated under the Swayajasti rules, but not entered in puttas for reasons already noticed, should be deducted and the remainder left, viz., Acres 20,040, assessed at Rs. 25,783, will be the actual decrease under that head, which is attributable to the continuance of the unfavorable character of the season during the earlier half-year. The increase in the extent relinquished in the current fashi was mainly due to the same cause. The decrease under "waste remitted" and increase under "waste charged" speak to the fact of the season having turned favorable subsequently. Of the actual cultivation, there is an increase in assessment of Rs. 59,917 and decrease in extent of Acres 24,250. The annexed table is intended to show how these results have been arrived at. Taking separately the wet and dry cultivations it will be observed that there was an increase of 22,399, acres assessed at Rs. 1,15,435, in wet cultivation in the three taluks of this division, and of Acres 3,716, bearing an assessment of Rs. 5,801, in dry cultivation in the Villupuram Taluk, while a decrease of Acres 50.365 with an assessment of Rs. 61,319 is observable in dry cultivation in the Tindivanam and Trinomalai Taluks. All increase, both dry and wet, amounts to Acres 26,115, assessed at Rs. 1,21,236. The increase in extent has therefore to be deducted from the extent of decrease and the decrease in assessment has to be deducted from the amount of increase; and the result is as shown already 24,250 acres as net decrease with an assessment of Rs. 59,917 as net increase. The decrease is attributable in many cases to the inability of the ryots at once to follow their agricultural pursuits from want of ploughing cattle and implements. It may be added

that in several instances the lands of higher rate of assessment were taken up for cultivation in preference to those of lower assessment cultivated in the preceding season.

Of the total area 10,977 Acres taken upon durkhast and added to the holdings this year, there were 4,876 Acres cultivated without durkhast. The actual extent of cultivation without durkhast was much greater, viz., Acres 14,161, but it was not possible to include the whole in the ryots' puttas as the Revenue Inspectors and other officials had not the time requisite to examine and ascertain beyond doubt whether there was any objection to the cultivation of such lands and to issue of puttas for the same.

8. RYOTWAR AND MISCELLANEOUS SETTLEMENT COMBINED.—The annexed comparative abstract is to show the result of settlement of Ryotwar and Miscellaneous items combined for Faslis 1286 and 1287. There was a decrease under "dry" after excluding waste remitted of Acres 21,648, assessed at Rs. 24,546, and an increase under "wet" of Acres 24,539, assessed at Rs. 1,23,953. The former sum being deducted from the latter there is left a net increase of Acres 2,891 bearing an assessment of Rs. 99,407 under the head "Ryotwar." To which must be added the increase under the head second crop assessment on wet and water-rate on dry lands and miscellaneous items, amounting in all to Rs. 74,065, which raises the total net increase to Rs. 1,73,472, and this increase is further supplemented by the addition of a net decrease in the amount of remission, viz., Rs. 1,02,140. Thus the increase shown in the following abstract amounts to Rs. 2,75,612. This result of settlement at the time when ravages of famine, which continued particularly in the taluks of Tindivanam and Trinomalai for two successive years, had just commenced to disappear, will, I hope, be deemed satisfactory.

This total decrease in the cultivation of these special products is attributable to the ryots' unavoidable need of raising food-grains in preference to these. Cholum was accordingly grown in all the three taluks as mentioned before indiscriminately on both wet and dry lands.

The increase in rape seed is chiefly in Tindivanam Taluk and is due partly to the crop which takes three months only to come to maturity having been this year raised on some wet and dry lands which had been already prepared for that purpose on account of want of timely and sufficient rain. A great portion of the decrease in the cultivation of ground-nut may be attributed to extended cultivation of cholum.

11. PERMANENT SOURCES OF IRRIGATION.—The important sources of irrigation existing in this Sub-division are shown in the following list with the wet ayacut cultivation and gross revenue under each source for Fasli 1287 as compared with the results in Fasli 1286. It may be observed that there is an increase of Rs. 27,869 inclusive of tirwajasti and fasaljasti :—

The decrease of one acre under the head "Public topes" is due to the resumption of the land for failure to plant trees according to the conditions of the grant. The decrease under "Private topes" is in part Acres 21 charged with full assessment in the fash under report as the full stipulated period of twenty years expired at the close of Fash 1286. The remaining extent of ten acres was resumed for failure to fulfil the conditions imposed on lessees by the tope rules.

16. REMISSIONS.—The occasional remission granted with reference to the state of the season amounted in the fash under report to Rs. 14,871, inclusive of remissions granted on dry lands under the rules conveyed in the G.O., dated 12th March 1878, No. 387, referred to in your letter noted in the margin. There is Collector's letter of 5th April 1878 No. 493. a net decrease of Rs. 1,19,119 from the amount remitted in the preceding fash under this head as shown in Statement No. 4. A great portion of this decrease represents the favorable turn in the season of Fash 1287, as well as the strict observance of the rules laid down for granting remissions this fash. Subjoined is a statement to show the amount remitted under the several items for each taluk as compared with the beriz. This of course includes remissions granted on waste lands, both wet and dry, entered in Column 38 of Statement No. 3.

I must remark that this statement may not represent the entire loss of crops, &c., in the division, for in many instances remissions were refused on technical grounds.

17. The amount of fixed remission, viz., Rs. 971, shows a decrease of Rs. 49 from that granted in Fasli 1286, owing chiefly to some of the cowle tope lands having been resumed for default on the part of lessees, as well as to puttahs having been issued in certain cases where the full period of cowle expired.

18. Under the head "Items allowed on collection" deduction from beriz was allowed to an extent of Rs. 93,411, which sum shows an increase of Rs 17,028. This is due to the increase of allowance to the village officers following on a large increase in the demand as already noticed in paragraph 8 supra.

19. ENTIRE SETTLEMENT.—The following abstract compares the entire land revenue settlement, including miscellaneous, permanently settled, and jodi revenue of Fasli 1287, with that of the preceding fasli, and results in an increase of Rs. 2.75,613, which includes the large net decrease in the amount of remission granted in this fasli, amounting to Rs. 1,02,140, as noticed above in paragraph 8.

Comparative Abstract.

20. MISCELLANEOUS REVENUE. — Statement No. 5 shows that the demand, arrears and current, including Land Customs Miscellaneous after deducting remissions and deductions, was Rs. 73,966, of which Rs. 30,184 were collected and remitted within the fasli, leaving a balance of Rs. 43,782 which has now been reduced to Rs. 28,452 by subsequent collections up to 31st December 1878. For the realization of this arrear measures are already in steady progress.

21. BALANCE AGAINST SHROTRIEM, &c., VILLAGES.—The demand, including arrears of Muttahs, Shrotriem and Surva Inam villages, was Rs. 7,787-4-6, of which the amount collected within the fasli was Rs. 3,397-15-6, and the subsequent collection has reduced the balance of Rs. 4,389-5-0 to Rs. 2,088-3-1, for the recovery of nearly one-half of which last sum I had already the honor to recommend that certain Shrotriem lands in six villages in Villupuram Taluk should be placed under attachment—vide my letters, dated 21st December 1878, No. 1,650, and 10th instant, No. 12.

22. CURRENT DEMAND, COLLECTION AND BALANCE.—The demand of revenue underthesources of "Permanently-settled Estates" "Jodion Shrotriems," "Ryotwar" "Miscellaneous," and "Land Customs" was, as shown in Statement No. 7 Rs. 11,98,083; the collection within the fasli, Rs. 6,40,974, and the subsequent collections up to 31st ultimo, Rs. 3,57,141, reduce the balance to Rs. 1,99,968, for the recovery of a large portion of which real and personal property is under attachment; considering, however, the successive bad seasons which preceded the fasli under review, and which doubtless impoverished a large majority of ordinary agriculturists, I trust you will agree with me in regarding the collection of current demand, amounting to Rs. 834 per cent. on the demand, as satisfactory. Taking each taluk separately the percentage of collection amounts to 88 rupees in Tindivanam, $83\frac{1}{2}$ in Villupuram, and 69 in Trinomalai.

23. LAND CUSTOMS.—The demand under "Land Customs" shows a net increase of Rs. 873 in the export duty and a net decrease of Rs. 2,665 in import duty as shown in the annexed comparative memorandum.

The falling off in the duty from exports of indigo is mainly due to the diminished demand for indigo in this fasli at Pondicherry. The net decrease in the import duty, viz., Rs. 2,665 (notwithstanding the large increase under "Liquor," amounting to Rs. 4,832), is attributable to the abolition of duty during the fasli on some of the principal articles of import—vide Indian Tariff Act of 1875 and G.O., dated 19th March 1878, No. 428-A.

24. COST OF SAYER ESTABLISHMENT.—The cost of establishment at each of the Sayer stations during the fasli was as follows as compared with the receipts in this and the previous two faslis :—

25. The receipt in Madalaput is inclusive of Rs. 11,700, being the amount of duty on liquor and grain passed out by the British Consular Agent at Pondicherry. The percentage of the cost of establishment on the receipts in Fasli 1287 calls for notice as far as the Thuknampakam Sayer Station is concerned; but on the subject of reduction of establishment I have already reported my own opinion in my letter, No. 76, dated 19th July, in reply to your letter, No. 1,073, dated 6th July 1878. It appears that the enormous decrease in the receipt at this particular station for the last two or three faslis was mainly due to the total absence of demand for indigo at Pondicherry during the famine; but as a more favorable season has set in, the usual demand for indigo will probably revive in course of time, when this station will become as important as it was when the Government of India raised the salary of the Superintendent from 30 to 50 rupees-vide G.O., dated 5th March 1872, No. 387.

26. ARBEARS, COLLECTION AND BALANCE.—The demand under the head of "Arrears" on 1st July 1877 was Rs. 3,34,386 and the collection within the fasli was Rs. 2,47,206, leaving a balance of Rs. 87,180 on 30th June 1878, which was reduced by subsequent collections to Rs. 70,352 on 1st instant, vide Statement No. 8. Of this balance a sum of Rs. 2,021-5-8 was recommended in your Settlement Report for Fasli 1286, paragraph 52, to be written off, and the sanction of Government to write the same off, as communicated in Board's Proceedings, dated 29th November last,

P. the 16th instant; and asum of Rs. 629-8-7 has been now entered as irrecoverable for reasons explained in the margin, and I have the honor to request that early 536 15 11 sanction may be obtained for writing off this sum, which has been arrived at after carefully scrutinizing each individual case at the time of settlement. The number of processes issued this year, viz., 140,087, shows a net increase of 25,906 over those issued in the preceding one. This increase was in the Villupuram and Trinomalai Taluks, while in Tindivanam a decrease of 11,248 processes is observable. The fact that in Tindivanam and Trinomalai famine relief had to continue up to 31st December and 27th November 1878, respectively, reduced the number of processes in these two taluks, necessitating the avoidance of indiscriminate distraint of agricultural implements and ploughing cattle and necessaries of life in exceptional cases—vide my letter, dated 29th October last, No. 1,431, reporting on the position and collection of balance.

28. PROCESS SERVICE FUND.—At the commencement of the fasli the balance in hand was Rs. 18,390, to which was added the amount realized in the fasli under report, viz., Rs. 19,011, which raised the fund to Rs. 37,401. The cost of process service establishment amounted to Rs. 8,881, which leaves a balance of Rs. 28,520 at the close of Fasli 1287, which stands distributed as under :—

The receipts during the fasli were greater by Rs. 4,107 than those in Fasli 1286. Portion of this is due probably to a more regular charge of batta and interest on arrears as insisted on by the special returns ordered. In the cost of establishment there has been an increase of Rs. 2,357, which, as a matter of course, followed the increase in the number of processes issued.

29. ACQUISITION OF PROPERTY BY PUBLIC SERVANTS.—No landed property has been reported to have been acquired by any public servant in the sub-division during the Fasli 1287.

30. TALUK AND VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.—These accounts were examined occasionally and during the settlement and found not to be kept up, as a rule, in such good order as could be desired, especially in certain instances in which irregularities were noticed and village officers punished.

31. TALUE TREASURIES.—Those in the division were all examined in Fasli 1287 and the contents found to be correct according to the entries in the cash-books.

32. ADVANCES UNDER THE LAND IMPROVEMENT ACT.—Advances were only made in the taluks of Trinomalai and Tindivanam. They amounted in all to Rs. 13,100, of which Rs. 2,054 have been recovered, leaving a balance of Rs. 11,046, which is according to the stipulations entered in each bond executed by the recipients, recoverable hereafter, as detailed in the annexed memorandum.

SETTLEMENT REPORT OF SOUTH ARCOT.

From the above it will be seen that there is a balance of Rs. 1,980-5-4 to be recovered by the end of the current official year, and the necessary steps towards this object have been already taken. The required document in each case has been secured by registration thereof under Act III of 1878, and from the inquiries I have already instituted I learn that at present no part of the advances will become irrecoverable. As famine relief is now over, I shall take an opportunity to inspect at the approaching Jamabandi, the improvements for which the advances were made and report further if necessary.

33. ADVANCES FOR PURCHASE OF SEED-GRAINS.—Advances for this purpose were made in all three taluks of this division to an extent of Rs. 13,401-6-2, of which Rs. 2,066-14-4 has been recovered and the balance Rs. 11,834-7-10 is recoverable hereafter, as shown in the subjoined memorandum.

From the above it will be observed that a large portion of the balance, viz, Rs. 7,463-8-0, is to be collected before the close of the current official year, and measures have been taken in view to its realization. The Tahsildars report that no part of the balance will be left unrealized. Muchilkas have been taken from the ryots for such advances in Tindivanam Taluk, while in Trinomalai and Villupurum advances have been made after simply taking the recipient's signature in an individual register kept for the purpose. Detailed lists of individual advances under this head and for advances under the Land Improvement Act are kept up in each of the Taluk Cutcherries.

34. CONDUCT OF THE SUBORDINATES.—The Sub-division Sheristadar, Kanakasabai Mudaliar, was for some time on other duty and on leave, and the acting man was several times changed during the fash under report. The permanent incumbent has now returned and is doing his work well. Of the Tabsildars, Venugopaul Naidu of Villupuram has done his work satisfactorily. Gulam Khadir of Trinomalai is honest, but indolent. He has given me no serious cause for displeasure, but requires urging. Mr. Dique of Tindivanam has given cause for many complaints, and has lately been committed to the sessions on a charge of bribery.

In the course of the year one Deputy Tahsildar, Anandaroya Pillai, was reduced by order of Government to the post of Sheristadar and his magisterial powers taken away.

The nature of the past season and the additional work of famine has caused the delay in submitting this report.

3. Puttas under Ryotwari Settlement.—The total number of puttas issued under the Ryotwar Settlement during the fasli was 138,644, or 2,112 above the number in the previous fasli as the annexed statement will indicate. This net increase is due to the sub-division of holdings in the ordinary course of partition, sale, &c., counterbalanced by the absorption of some with other existing ones by the same causes as well as to the formation of new holdings for lands given on darkhast.

Of the 138,644 puttas distributed as aforesaid, 13,031 were fresh puttas, 26,945 were old puttas modified, and 98,668 were old puttas not at all altered :---

4. Number and Tenures of Villages.—During the year under report the number of villages and hamlets held on different tenures has undergone a slight change. The village of Kondikkulam with its hamlet Sydambalpuram in the Pattukotai Taluk had to be kept under amani management owing to the non-completion of accounts for fully assessing the village under Board's Proceedings, dated 2nd November 1875, No. 3,018. The village and the hamlet have, however, been fully assessed during the current fasli. The total number of villages and hamlets is shown in the following statement :—

5. Season.—The year under report may be said to have been on the whole more favorable than the year preceding it. The floods of the south-west monsoon came down the Cauvery and its branches in the month of May 1877, when there was also $3\cdot50$ inches of rainfall in several parts of the district, and cultivation operations were commenced in the Delta with favorable prospects. But about the latter part of July and the beginning of August 1877 the freshes in the rivers fell and the rain failed and fears were entertained that the agricultural operations would be impeded especially in the Mayavaram, Shiyali and Tiruturaipundi Taluks. The freshes, however, began to rise in September and subsequent months, and the hopes of the ryots again revived. They looked forward for a bumper harvest with the aid of the heavy north-east monsoon; but unfortunately that monsoon brought down such heavy rains in November and December, that standing crops were either submerged or washed away by floods in the northern and south-eastern parts of the district. The cultivation in the upland parts, *i.e.*, Pattukotai and parts of Tanjore and Mannargudi Taluks was commenced only after the north-east monsoon had set in, and the standing crops there also suffered from excess of water, besides having been injured from blight. The general outturn was, therefore, below the average.

6. Rainfall.—The aggregate rainfall during the year under report was as shown below, 53.18 against 29.60 inches in the preceding year. This quantity was almost equally distributed over the agricultural season as shown in the annexed table :---

7 Rain Gauges and Registers.—The rain gauges kept at the several stations are reported to be in good order. The measuring glasses in one or two stations were, however, broken and steps have been taken to replace them with new ones. The Registers were all found to be properly kept.

8. Sanitary Condition.—It will be observed from the annexed table that the public health during the year was bad, the mortality being 74,426 against 58,534 in the previous year, or 37.71 against 29.66 per 1,000 of the population (19,73,731). Deaths from small-pox and fever have enormously increased while those from cholera have considerably fallen :—

9. Health of Cattle.—The health of cattle was on the whole bad. They suffered much from want of both water and pasturage at a time. They were as usual affected * This is for the official year 1877-78. by the mouth and foot diseases. The mortality during the year amounted to

10. STATEMENT No. 2-Prices.-The marginal table gives the average of whole-

sale bazaar prices which obtained during the Fasli 1286 and the one under report. From this it will be seen that the prices of all grains, wet and dry, (varagu excepted) were considerably higher during the year under report than in the one preceding it. These high prices of grain were brought on by famine in other districts which drew away large quantities of grain from this district. The prices which obtained during the fasli were the highest known for the last eighteen years. In fact the Railway authorities with all their exertions found it very difficult to transport grain as quickly as it was brought. Owing to the above cause and to light freshes in the rivers and the scanty rains in the commencement of the cultivation season on account of which the Mirassidars delayed disposing of their stock of grain, and owing also to the large concourse of

wanderers who were driven by famine from their districts, the prices continued to rise, and on the 20th August 1877 paddy was sold at Tanjore at seven Madras measures per rupee, which is the highest mark which prices ever reached during the year. This state of things lasted till the 15th October, and it would have continued to do so but for the heavy October rains. The prices gradually fell from the 15th October till the end of the fasli at which paddy was sold at Tanjore at the same rate as it did at the beginning of the fasli.

11. Taking the average of the whole year, the price of the 2nd-sort paddy, which constitutes the food of the masses, was 23 per cent. and that of the dry grains (varagu excepted) from 1 to 42 per cent. in advance of the preceding year.

12. The retail prices at which the staple produce of the district, viz., paddy was

sold in the rural parts, give an average of Rupees 1-12-5 per Tanjore Kallam or Rupees 206-0-4 per Madras garce. Though the average of the year has fallen below that of the year previous by 11.20 per cent. still it has risen by 268 against 314 per cent. in the previous year above the commutation rate (viz., 7 Annas $8\frac{3}{4}$ Pies per Kallam) by which the Government share of the gross produce for wet lands was converted into money assessment.

13. Wages of Labor.—There was never any lack of employment for the laboring classes in Tanjore. Notwithstanding high prices, Ceylon and the Straits have continued to be an inviting market for

the laboring classes. The agricultural laborers did not feel the heavy prices in any appreciable degree as they received their wages in kind, and as the Mirassidars had been very free in making advances and in many cases presents in consideration of their faithfulness and attachment to their employers. In the case of non-agricultural laborers it cannot be denied that the presence of a large number of paupers from the adjacent districts had the effect of rendering labor cheap. This, however, did not pross the resident laborers in any considerable manner, as their wages always kept pace with the value of food-grains. It must be observed also that a large body of ablebodied paupers were freely employed by the well-to-do Mirassidars in the improvement of their lands which during this year was done at considerable cost.

14. STATEMENT No. 3—Ryots' Holdings.—Annexed is an abstract showing the ryots' holding for the year under report as compared with that for the previous year. The extent and assessment are 1,048,007 acres and Rupees 40,04,532 in the former against 1,045,026* acres and Rupees.

* Exclusive of the extent and assessment of holdings brought to Amani. 39,98,521* respectively in the latter year. In other words there was an increase of

2,981 acres assessed at Rupees 6,011. This net increase is the result of 13,770 acres assessed at Rupees 52,858 in lands given up and of 16,751 acres assessed at Rupees 58,869 in lands taken up. The lands given and taken up during the year are less than those of the previous fasli by 15,615 and 15,885 acres assessed at Rupees 56,970 and Rupees 57,231 respectively—a result due to the more favorable character of the season. Exclusive of the transfers made from one individual to another by sale, &c., the extent of land really given up or which became useless or was appropriated for some public purposes is 1,182 acres assessed at Rupees 2,416, while the land taken up on darkhast is 4,163 acres assessed at Rupees 8,427 :—

15. Waste remitted.—The extent of waste land for which remission has been granted during the year is 7,378 acres, bearing an assessment of Rupces 25,964 against 24,615 acres assessed at Rupces 92,305 in the year previous. The favorable character of the season reduced the extent of waste and rendered the grant of remission of assessment on portions of fields left waste undesirable.

16. Waste charged.—The extent of waste charged during the year is 122,468 acres, bearing an assessment of Rupees 2,66,479, or 880 acres with an assessment of Rupees 3,568 below the previous year's figure.

17. Actual Cultivation.—The extent actually cultivated during the year is, therefore, 918,161 acres with an assessment of Rupees 37,12,089, or 20,824 acres with an assessment of Rupees 75,602 over the preceding year.

18. Settlement of Land Revenue under Ryotwar.—The Ryotwar settlement is formed by adding to the assessment of holdings (1) the second-crop assessment, and (2) water-tax on Government lands, and deducting therefrom (1) the assessment on waste remitted, (2) occasional remissions, and (3) deductions on account of fees for the village service establishment and adding to the remainder the miscellaneous revenue. The result of this settlement during the year is Rupees 41,02,742 against Rupees 38,68,224 in the previous year as detailed in the subjoined comparative statement. The increase of Rupees 2,34,518 is made up of an increase of—

19. The increase on the assessment of settled area has been explained in paragraphs 14, 15, 16 and 17.

20. Second-crop Assessment and Water-tax.—From Statement No. 3 it will be seen that the second-crop assessment and water-tax during the fashi have aggregated Rupees 1,17,652 and Rupees 1,46,326 against Rupees 83,780 and Rupees 1,41,777 respectively in the previous year. The increase is the result of the favorable character of the season.

21. STATEMENT No. 4—Remission.—The subjoined abstract shows in one view the extent of remission granted in the fasli. Under the head of "Shavi" or withered crop the revenue remitted aggregates Rupees 33,805, which is less than one-third of the amount remitted in the previous fasli. Remission of assessment under the head of "Teervakummi" or the difference between the wet and the dry assessment occurs entirely in the Tanjore Taluk where the state of the irrigating channel of the villages of Ambayagaram and some others has become worse, rendering wet cultivation of the lands during the fasli impossible. The loss of revenue on this account being heavy, I have addressed the District Engineer on the subject of the channel. The remaining heads of remission are Faslikummi and Manavari Nunjah, the amounts under which are Rupees 512 and Rupees 175 respectively. These are for obvious reasons very much below the like remissions granted in Fasli 1286 :—

The assessment on waste remitted amounts to Rupees 25,964, thus making a total remission of Rupees 64,513 against Rupees 2,42,203 in the previous year under all the items.

22. STATEMENT No. 5—Land Revenue, Miscellaneous.—Under this head the revenue derived from a variety of sources is exhibited. In fourteen of these items the variation is either nil or a triffe. There is an increase of Rupees 14,087 in twelve and a decrease of Rupees 1,052 in four items. The principal items of increase requiring explanation are—

The increase in Item No. 1 is due to increased plantation of fruit trees which have become productive and therefore liable to tax. In No. 2 it is due to a village and its hamlet in Pattukotai Taluk having been changed from Ryotwar into Amani tenure during the fasli. In Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 it is owing to favorable character of the past season. In No. 9 it is attributable to a larger amount of arrears demand at the commencement of the fasli, and in No. 10 to extended renewal of old puttas in some of the taluks. The only item of decrease which needs explanation is Government commission on private estates; and this is due to want of funds in the Vettangudi Estate which prevented the commission due for 1286 being adjusted in the year under report. Further the commission collected in Fasli 1286 was that due for Faslis 1284 and 1285 from the two estates of Shiyali and Vettangudi as well as the arrears commission due from Agarayarayangudi and Agraharam Estates.

23. Special Products.—An abstract showing the special products cultivated during the fash as compared with its predecessor is annexed. Cultivation in these products being very limited in this district no special notice is called for thereon :—

28. Land Revenue.—The cause of variation in the two component heads of Land Revenue, *i.e.*, Ryotwar and Miscellaneous, has already been explaineds in paragraph 18.

Jodi on Shrotriem and Inam Villages.—As for the Jodi on Shrotriem and Inam villages it will be remembered that in Fasli 1286 some of the Government villages had no assets from which to pay the Village Service Establishment, and Shrotriem Villages had to bear the cost in addition to their share. This additional charge had reduced the receipt on account of Jodi from such Inam and Shrotriem Villages in that fasli. During the fasli under report, however, the additional charge upon the Inam and Shrotriem villages was less. Hence the increase of Rupees 392 in the receipt under Jodi.

29. Excise on Spirits and Drugs.—The decrease of Rupees 8,653 under this head is due to the smaller quantity of arrack consumed and consequently issued during the fashi owing to high prices.

30. Sea Customs—There is a decrease of Rupces 96,182 under Sea Customs, and this is due chiefly to the smaller importation of Railway materials and to the diminished exportation of rice and paddy; the former owing to the completion of the Northern Extension of the South Indian Railway, and the latter to the provalence of famine in the Presidency.

31. Land Customs.—The revenue under Land Customs has also fallen off by Rupees 53,920. This is the result of less exportation of rice and paddy owing to prevalence of famine as already stated.

32. Salt.—The Salt revenue during the year has been on the increase by a sum of Rupees 84,244, which is the result of enhancement in the price of salt under Act XVIII of 1877 and the abolition of the discount system.

33. Stamps, Judicial and Non-Judicial.—The general depression caused by high prices and the operations of the Registration Act have had the effect of reducing litigation, and, as a necessary measure, the Revenue under Judicial Stamps by Rupees

14,139. On the other hand, larger monitary transactions in connection with the rice trade swelled the Revenue from sale of Non-Judicial Stamps. The accompanying comparative statement gives the information called for in paragraph 15, Board's Proceedings, dated 29th May 1877, No. 2,467 :---

34. STATEMENT No. 7.—Demand, Collection, and Balance of all sources of Revenue Current.-As exhibited in the general abstract appended to paragraph 27, the entire demand for the fasli from revenue of all sources aggregated Rupees 68,94,146; of this sum Rupees 66,01,269 were collected during the fasli. The balance, therefore, amounted to Rupees 2,92,877 under the two main heads of Land Revenue (Rupees 2.86,792) and excise on Spirits and Drugs (Rupces 6,085). Subsequent collections up to 31st October reduced the Land Revenue arrears to Rupees 89,787 and the Abkári arrears to Rupees 9 both now in the course of realization. The small balance of Rupees 9 under Abkári is the duty payable on the arrack supplied to the late Revd. Mr. Kearns, as already reported in this office letter, dated 21st June 1878, No. 2,053, printed in Board's Proceedings, dated 3rd July 1878, No. 1,841, and steps are being taken to collect the same from the late arrack renters as directed by the Board.

35. STATEMENT No. 8.—Arrears of former years' Land Revenue.—The arrears under Land Revenue of previous fashis were Rupees 3,81,663 at the commencement

of the fasli under report. After deducting the collections up to 31st October last as also a sum of Rupees 771 directed* to be written off as irrecoverable, the arrears amount to Rupees 33,882, extending over a period of seven years as shown in the margin. Out of this sum Rupees 1,625⁺ being irrecoverable as explained in Enclosure B to Statement No. 8 for this and the previous fasli require to be written off with the sanction of Government. The remaining portion of the arrears balance is in the course of collection. With reference to Board's Proceedings, dated 1st December 1877, No. 5,136, I beg to add that the arrears of the Faslis 1280 and 1281, which are more than five years

old, amount to Rupees 360 and Rupces 145, respectively, exclusive of the amount recommended to be written off as irrecoverable. There is some prospect of these arrears being collected during the current fasli. At all events it cannot be said with any degree of certainty just now that these arrears are altogether irrecoverable, and they are therefore retained in the accounts.

36. Excise on Spirits and Drugs.—The amount of arrears under this head as it stood at the beginning of the fasli was Rupees 8,632, the whole of which has been collected during the fasli.

37. Coercive Process.—Owing to the more favorable character of the season, the extent to which resort was had to coercive process in the collection of revenue was smaller during the year as compared with the year previous as will be seen from the comparative statement given in the margin. The arrears on account of which processes were issued were, however, larrge as the arrears demand was heavier during the year.

38. ACTUAL COLLECTIONS UNDER ALL HEADS OF REVENUE BOTH CURRENT AND ARREARS.—The actual receipts under each head of revenue is shown in the annexed comparative table. The total receipts from all sources aggregated Rupees 69,47,466. This is in advance of the previous year by Rupees 3,92,301, being the net result of a gross increase of Rupees 5,56,680 under Land Revenue, Salt and sale of General Stamps, and a gross decrease of Rupees 1,64,379 under excise on Spirits and Drugs, Sea and Land Customs, and sale of Court Fees stamps. The increase in Land Revenue, Rupees 4,60,582, appears both under arrears and current and is due to the season. The collection under the other heads are same as the demand, the variations in which have been already explained :—

Items (a), (c), and (d) under increase and (c) under decrease are of a fluctuating nature and call for no special remarks.

The increase under (b) is due to batta having been paid for a larger number of months in Fasli 1287. The principal items under the head of Miscellaneous are batta to establishment and purchase of furniture. The increase in the former is due to the more frequent travelling of Revenue officers in connection with famine operations, and in the latter to more furniture having been made during the year owing to the budget provision having been utilized to a limited extent in the previous year. The decrease in Item (a) is due to a 2nd-Class Deputy Collector having been employed in Fasli 1286 in the place of a 3rd-Class Deputy absent on privilege leave, and to a 3rd-Class Railway Deputy Collector having remained in the district for eleven months in that fasli against two months in Fasli 1287, as also to the appointment of a temporary Deputy Collector in that year in place of an Assistant Collector.

The decrease under (b) is attributable to the salary of clerks, &c., on leave having had to be disbursed in the subsequent year.

41. Other Heads of Charges.-The remaining heads of charges are Sca Customs, Salt, and Stamps.

42. Sea Customs.—The net decrease is Rupees 261 made up of a decrease of Rupees 488 under pay of Establishment, Saderward, and Contingencies, and an increase of Rupees 227 under famine batta. The decrease referred to is owing to there having been a smaller amount of pay to be disbursed at the commencement of the fasli and to smaller payment of fees for out of office hours duty. The cause of increased payment of famine batta has been explained in its place under Land Revenue.

43. Salt.—The charges under this head amount to Rupees 1,49,133. This is Rupees 8,178 above the last year and due on the whole to an increase of Rupees 18,719 in eight items and a decrease of Rupees 26,897 in seven items. The only items of increase calling for notice are—

the entertainment* of additional Police guard to guard the additional platform at Negapatam and to the inclusion of double famine batta in this item. The increase under Temporary, Establishment, Item (2), has been caused by the entertainment of additional hands at Vedarniem for storing† and at Negapatam for weighing‡ salt. As for Item No. 3 it will be remembered that in Fasli 1286 the manufacture of salt

at Vedarniem was limited as there was then a large quantity on hand. In the fasli under report, however, there was no limit placed on the manufacture. Hence the increase. The only remaining item of increase to be explained is Petty Construction and Repairs, in respect of which it is enough to state that financial pressure had prevented any expenditure on a large scale in Fasli 1286. The only items of decrease calling for remark are—

During the year under report there was no spontaneous salt collected on account of the adverse season. Hence there was no charge on that account. The decrease under Item No. 3 is due to there having been no new weighing machine bought during the fisli.

44. Stamps, Judical and Non-Judicial.—The charges under the two heads of judicial and non-judicial stamps have fallen off in the case of the former by Rs. 313 and increased in the case of the latter by Rupees 336, according to the ebb and flow in the sale of the respective descriptions of stamps.

45. Refunds.—The variations in the actual charges under each head having been explained above, those under refunds will be noticed hereafter.

46. Abkári.—The decrease under Abkári refunds is due to the absence of the refund of the difference between the guaranteed Revenue and the duty on actual assues in Fasli 1287.

47. Sea Customs.—Under this item there is a decrease of Rupees 27,202. In Fasli 1286 a large amount of duty collected on locomotive engines and machinery was refunded to the South Indian Railway Company. In the fasli under report there was no such refund. Hence the decrease under Sea Custom refunds.

48. STATEMENT No. 11 -- Wastage of Satt.-The Statement No. 11 shows the extent of wastage on salt sold during the year under report. Excluding 600 maunds

destroyed * on account of its impurity, the actual wastage on heaps sold amounts to 36,162 and odd maunds. The wastage was heaviest in the salt divisions of Arasanagiri and Nedavasal. At the former station it was as high as 18 per cent. in this year against 12 per cent. in the previous year. In Nedavasal the wastage is above 14 per cent. and is confined to heaps stored in 1284. The excessive wastage is attributed to some extent to careless covering and chiefly to the unusually heavy rains which fell in November and December 1877. The writing off from the accounts of the wastage of 8,673 maunds of salt having the unusually heavy rains which fell in G 0, \pm No. 783, dated

Communicated in Board's Proceedings, Miscellaneous No. 5,602, dated 6th June 1878. been sanctioned in G O.,[†] No. 783, dated the 24th May last, there remains a wastage of 28,089 maunds to be written off.

49. Landed property acquired by Public Servants.—The subjoined table shows the extent of landed property acquired by public servants on the Revenue Establishment during the Fashi 1287 as compared with the previous one. The figures call for no remark. The rules on this subject have been complied with :—

50. Village and Taluk Accounts.—The Divisional officers' reports about the state of the taluk and village accounts are generally favorable. The Head Assistant Collector Mr. Spencer has taken a personal interest in the examination and verification of village accounts and this led to the discovery of concealed extra water-cess to the extent of Rupees 18,000 above the average collections of the three preceding fashs in his division. The registers of births and deaths are also reported to have been kept up with neatness and accuracy. In connection with the grant of remission in the Mannargudi Division the Village Accounts Nos. 1, 4, and 5 were sent for and examined and the discrepancies noticed between the entries in those accounts have been pointed out to the Divisional officer.

51. Examination of Taluk Treasureis and Cash Accounts.—The Taluk Treasuries of Mannargudi, Tiruturaipundi and Pattukotai were inspected and the cash accounts examined. The accounts of Tiruturaipundi Taluk have been favorably reported on and steps have been taken to rectify the irregularities pointed out in regard to the two remaining taluks.

52. Costs awarded in Civil Suits.—The statement showing the Demand, Collection, and Balance of costs adjudged to Government in Civil suits in which the officers of Government have been either plaintiffs or defendants is submitted. From this statement it will be noticed that the amount of costs awarded during the fasli aggregates Rupees 532. This being added to the balance Rupees 2,659, which at the commencement of the fasli remained to be collected, the gross demand for the year amounts to Rupees 3,191. The amount collected during the fasli is Rupees 117 and the balance at its close Rupees 3,074, which is being collected.

53. Remarks on the conduct of Subordinate Officers.—As I have only lately joined I have no remarks to make on the conduct of subordinate officers.

A hamlet in the Nannilam Taluk was in Fasli 1286 leased out, and in the year under report was managed under the Amani system. This accounts for the difference between the number of villages unaffected by the selling price of the last year and that of the fasli year under report.

4. PUTTAS.—The total number of puttas under ryotwar settlement was 28,356 against 27,903 in the previous year; the net increase of 453 being the result of division of property by partitions and private and Court sales, as well as the acquisition of lands by purchase, durkhast, or otherwise. Of the total number of puttas above specified 11,424 are fresh puttas, 5,874 are old puttas modified by additions or alterations, while the rest 11,058 are old ones which remained unaltered. There has been an increase of 2,527 puttas since Fasli 1281.

5. SEASON.—The season was on the whole tolerably good. The freshes in the river and rain-fall were sufficient as far as the cultivation was concerned. The following table will show how the rain-fall was distributed throughout the year. The rain gauge in Nannilam Taluk wants repair :—

It will be observed that the prices of all grains were considerably higher than the previous year owing to the fact that a large quantity of grain was exported to famine districts.

7. SANITARY CONDITION.—The number of deaths from cholera reported during the year is 946 against 2,553 of the last year. The number of deaths from small-pox is 2,099 against 524 of the previous year. There was sufficient fodder for cattle.

8. Ryors' Holdings.—The extent of ryots' holdings at the commencement of the Fasli was 231,324 against 231,131 acres of the preceding year, assessed at Rupees 10,89,976. During the year 3,900 acres, assessed at Rupees 18,278, were reliaquished against 11,421 acres (mostly dry), assessed at Rupees 52,976, for the preceding year; while 4,464 acres, assessed at Rupees 19,887, were taken up. Thus we have 231,888 acres, assessed at Rupees 10,91,584, as the ryots' holdings at the close of the fasli. The annexed statement shows that there has been an increase of 564 acres, assessed at Rupees 1,608, over the previous year :—

In the assessment of the area of lands in the ryots' holdings there is an increase of Rubees 1,608 as observed above. In second crop assessment there is a large in ∞ of Rupees 7,747. The decrease of Rupee 1 in the additional assessment is in ∞ derived. There is an increase of Rupees 1,041 in water tax and Rupees 4,689 in the adscellaneous items. These several items, with the decrease of Rupees 3,164 in realision, make up the increase of Rupees 18,248, as exhibited in the table.

The increase of assessment in the ryots' holdings and in second crop and water tax on the one hand and the decrease of the remission on the other hand was no

doubt owing to the favorable character of the season, and from the statement of the rain fall above given it would be observed that the rain-fall of the year under report is double that of the previous year.

There was no necessity for granting any remission in the Nannilam Taluk, whereas in the Negapatam Taluk remission to a considerable amount was given to the Merassidars of Karapidagai. It is a deplorable fact to observe year after year that the irrigation and drainage of this particular village is in a very unsatisfactory state. The Public Works Department Officers do not seem to have taken any steps to remedy this standing evil.

The cause of so large a decrease in the general revenue is owing to the limited export of grain to Foreign countries, the rice all having been consumed within the Presidency. The decrease in stamps is attributable to the fall of litigation which is a necessary consequence of the high prices of food grains.

13. DEMAND, COLLECTION AND BALANCE.—Of the total demand of Rupees 17.49,398, Rupees 16,89,136 have been collected within the fasli. Deducting Rupees 43,668 collected subsequent to the fasli there still remains a balance of Rupees 16,594 as shown in the annexed statement :—

At the commencement of the Fasli 1287 Rupees 1,12,012 were in arrears. Of this Rupees 1,01,565 were collected within the fasli. The subsequent collection up to 30th of September 1878 amounts to Rupees 3,860, leaving a balance of Rupees 6,587. Of this amount Rupees 587 have been recommended to be written off as irrecoverable. Rupees 21, arrears of Faslis 1284, 1285, and 1286 in the Negapatam Taluk are not likely to be realized as the defaulters have emigrated leaving neither real nor personal property. Subtracting these two items from the total of the balance outstanding we have 5,710 Rupees as the amount recoverable. I regret to have to observe that the greater portion of this amount, viz., Rupees 5,282, are arrears of kist which have been left uncollected in the Negapatam Taluk ever since Fasli 1282, and the rest of the amount, viz., Rupees 428, are arrears due in the Nannilam Taluk, only Rupees 14 being the arrears of Fasli 1285 and the other of 1286. Inclusive of the arrears of the past faslis Rupees 23,181 are still due. Of this total Rupees 17,542 are the balance of the Negapatam Taluk and Rupees 5,639 of the Nannilam Taluk.

15. COERCIVE MEASURES.--The extent to which coercive measures were employed in the collection of revenue during the fasli under report is detailed below :---

From this it will be seen that property worth Rupees 6,896 was sold this fasli, while property worth Rupees 4,931 was sold last year; the increase in the coercive process is owing to the negligence of the Monigars in not collecting the revenue at the time of harvest. At the time of Jamabandi the late Mr. Pearse fined several of the Monigars for not collecting the arrears; it was found that within a fortnight after the close of the Jamabandi thousands of rupees up to that time uncollected were at once realized. This fact plainly shows that a little exertion on the part of the Tahsildars to bring to notice the remissness of the village officers in the course of the year would have a beneficial effect in the realization of the arrears.

17. VILLAGE AND TALUK ACCOUNTS.—The village accounts of the Nannilam Taluk were fairly kept, though a large number of decrepit Curnams should be weeded out before any perfection can be attained. The Tahsildar is making great exertions to improve the existing state of things, and I am confident that the next Jamabandi will show that he has not worked in vaiu.

18. No ruined tanks were made over this year to individuals during the fasli under report.

TRICHINOPOLY

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I HAVE the honor to submit my Settlement Report for the revenue year 1287 (1877-78), together with the prescribed statements.

2. STATEMENT No. I.-In this statement the names of the officers who conducted the settlement of the several taluks, the stations at which and the dates on which the destribution of puttas took place in each taluk, are shown. I settled Perambalur and Trichinopoly Taluks, Mr. Moore, the Acting Head Assistant Collector, Musiri and Kulitalai, and the Acting Deputy Collector Duraisami Aiyer, Udiarpolliem.

VARIATION IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES .- In the year under 3. review their have been no changes in 1,255 Government Villages... the number and tenure of Government, Istimirar and muttah villages 233Zemindari or Inam villages; neither 156were there any transfers of these villages from one taluk to another. 1,644 Total ...

4. PUTTAS.—The total number of outtas issued this year was 141,118 against 142,225 in the preceding year. The decrease of 1,107 puttas is ascribable to large relinquishments in the Udiarpolliem Taluk. Of the above number, 2,956 were new puttas and 35,249 were such as required alterations, consequent upon changes and additions in the holdings. The rest 102,913 remained unaltered.

5. RAINFALL.-A statement showing the fall of rain during the fasli as compared with that in the preceding fasli is given below :---

The total quantity that fell was 40.5 inches against 22.1 in the previous year, and, i.c., about 4 inches over the usual average. Owing to the heavy fall at the end of the previous May, the ryots cultivated large extents, which, together with the cultivation in the following month (June), both wet and dry was nearly thrice the extent usually cultivated at the season. But, as the rains held off till the end of August, the standing crops, both dry and wet, suffered seriously, and a large proportion were lost. Wells and tanks dried up, and the supply in them was insufficient even for the ordinary requirements of men and cattle. The river-irrigated portion alone formed an excep-tion to this disastrous state of things. Prices rose very high, the famine became intense, relief-camps and poor-houses were crowded by laborers and the poorer class of ryots, who left their homes with their families in quest of employment. Many huts in the villages were unroofed to feed cattle. Even well-to-do ryots ran short of their stores of grain. In the Manaparai and Illupur Mahanams the people suffered most. There were, however, copious falls of rain later on which began in the middle of September and continued steadily till December. This rain, although a little too heavy in October, improved matters and brightened the prospects of the ryots. In the dry parts throughout the district the ryots were so much disabled from famine that they could not avail themselves of this rain to the full extent. The distribution of Mansion House relief money to the poorer classes of rvots at this crisis was very opportune and was highly appreciated by them, especially in the Manaparai and Illupur Mahanams. This charity money helped many a poor ryot to purchase seeds and cultivate his fields, which, but for this timely aid, must have remained waste. The cultivation was necessarily indifferent, being late in the season and having been carried out in great haste. The excessive rain in some parts and locusts in others seriously damaged the crops. The yield was far below the expectations of the ryots. The wet and dry crops yielded an average of 10 and 6 Annas respectively. Prices continued high throughout the year, and the ryots did not altogether recover from the effects of famine.

6. SANITATION.—This has been a peculiarily bad year for the health both of men and cattle. The previous year was considered to be the worst within the recollection of the oldest inhabitant in the district, and yet the deaths in that year were only three-fifths of those of the year under review. This was chiefly owing to the intensity of the famine. The total deaths amounted to 62,312 against 37,031

in the preceding year, showing an increase of 25,281. The deaths from cholera were, however, less than in the preceding year. But those from fever, small-pox, and other causes far exceeded those of any of the previous years. When the famine was at its worst stage, *i.e.*, from August to December, the deaths in each month numbered from 7,000 to 9,000. No pains were spared to save life and render relief to sufferers. All possible arrangements were made with as much promptitude as was practicable under the circumstances. Relief-camps were opened in the town where there was a very large gathering of famine-stricken people from all parts of this and neighbouring districts, and in Manaparai, Illupur and Musiri. The Municipal Dispensaries both in the town and at Srirangam were worked to their utmost extent. Medicines, with instructions for their use, were furnished to all the Tahsildars, Deputy Tahsildars and Police Stations, and towns and villages were cleansed in order to check epidemics as far as possible.

7. But, with all these arrangements, people died in numbers, as they were driven from famine to live upon all kinds of unwholesome food, such as prickly-pear, banyan, and other wild fruits, and leaves and roots.

8. BIRTHS AND DEATHS.—The birth and death rates this year were respectively 17.9 and 49.4 against 27.2 and 29.3 per mille in the previous year. The severity of the famine accounts for this unprecedented state of things. The vital registers are being carefully kept, and may, I think, be taken to be tolerably correct.

9. HEALTH OF CATTLE.—The loss of cattle has been on the increase during the

11. EMIGRATION.—Although the number of emigrants registered in this office does not exceed 207 for the whole year, yet it is a fact that a very large number of the laboring class have left the district during the famine.

12. As most of the emigrants travel by rail and get themselves registered in the sea-port towns of the neighbouring districts, the village officials were instructed about five years ago to keep a register of all those that leave the village for emigra-

tion, and to submit an annual return of them to the Tahsildar. The number of emigrants, according to these returns, are given in the margin. The above figures, I think, fully represent the approximate number, although I do not think that the registers could have been very carefully kept because of the famine.

13. STATEMENT No. 2.—The average prices of all food-grains throughout the year, as compared with those of the preceding year, are shown in this return. The prices

were exceptionally high, in fact the highest ever known in the district. For the first six months of the fashi year, *i.e.*, from July to December, the prices continued very high. In January, however, the prices fell a little and continued steady till the end of the year. The prices even after this fall were nearly three times the normal rates.

14. STATEMENT No. 3.—The extent of wet and dry cultivation in the year and the assessment thereof, as compared with that of the preceding year, are shown in abstract statement given below :—

The increase of Rupees 1,07,544 is due (1) to bringing to account the whole of the extent of wet waste remitted in Fasli 1286, (2) to second-crop cultivation and water-tax, and (3) to sale proceeds of Railway B. class lands restored and cultivation of dry lands without formal application. The only wet remission allowed amounted to Rupees 163. The rest of the remission exhibited in the statement comprise the road and village-cess which are included in the rates of assessment and which are usually deducted from the land revenue every year.

15. ENCLOSURE TO STATEMENT No. 3—Ryots' Holdings.—The total extent of lands held under putta at the beginning of the year was 965,189 acres, assessed at Rupees 13,45,282. Of this, 12,766 acres, assessed at Rupees 10,987, were relinquished, and there remained 952,423 acres, assessed at Rupees 13,34,295. Add to this 23,722 acres, assessed at Rupees 23,530, which were taken up for cultivation during the year; the total extent under occupation for the year thus amounts to 976,145 acres, assessed at Rupees 13,57,825.

16. The only case in which wet waste was remitted occurred in the village of Abishegapuram, Trichinopoly Taluk. An extent of 76 acres of wet, assessed at Rupees 196, was so much flooded by the breaching of the Koraiyar river bank, that it was not possible to cultivate it, and as a special case the assessment was remitted. In no other case was remission allowed wet or dry.

17. The extent of waste charged, both wet and dry, amounted to 191,129 acres, assessment Rupees 1,51,369, against 193,854 acres, assessment Rupees 1,70,912 in the proceeding year, *i.e.*, 2,725 acres less. The proportion of waste to cultivated extent of lands under occupation had been much above the usual average in the two preceding years from partial failure of monsoons. The proportion has been almost the same this year also, notwithstanding the fact of copious rains that fell from Sep-

extents of the cultivation of the special products sugar-cane, cotton and indigo. There has been some improvement both in cotton and indigo cultivation this year, though

there is a fall in the sugar-cane cultivation. The cultivation of these special products was falling off year by year, and it is encouraging to find some improvement this year. The small difference between the figures in this return and those in the statement that accompanied the Administration Report arose from some omissions in the Administration Report having been included in this.

19. ENCLOSURE D TO STATEMENT No. 3.—This return shows the total extent of fractions of fields, both wet and dry, laid waste during the year, and it is about one-sixteenth less than in the preceding year. As great care is taken to ensure correctness, the figures in this return may be relied on.

20. ENCLOSURE E TO STATEMENT No. 3.—The extents of the various kinds of dry lands for which Government water was taken, as also those of the purely wet and dry lands, are shown in this return.

21. STATEMENT No. 4.—In this return are shown all the remissions during the year. The actual remission granted amounts to Rupees 163 only. The rest of the remission shown in the return represents the road-cess and village-cess that have been included in the rates of assessment and which are therefore deducted every year to be added to those funds. They are not, therefore, remissions actually granted. The solitary instance in which the above sum Rupees 163 have been granted occurred in the Trichinopoly Taluk where the crops were thrice planted and thrice destroyed by flood as mentioned above.

22. Although under the Board's Proceedings, No. 674, dated 13th March 1878, dry remission was sanctioned under special rules, I did not consider it necessary to avail myself of the permission. The Jamabandi, moreover, was almost completed before the said Proceedings were received.

23. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 4.—This statement shows remissions grouping them under each head. The figures in it call for no explanation.

24. STATEMENT No. 5.—In this statement are shown the demand, collection and balance of Land Revenue Miscellaneous as compared with the previous year. The Board will observe that there is a net increase of Rupees 1,07,544. The increase occurred principally in the following items. Lands newly taken up: second-crop assessment, lands cultivated without durkhast, Inam water-cess, and second-crop assessment, and sales of Railway B. class lands. 25. The increase under the first five items is due to the copious fall of rains from September to December and full supply in the tanks. Large extents of lands were taken up for cultivation, a second crop was raised on single crop fields wherever water was available, and water was taken to dry fields wherever it was wanted. An abstract statement comparing the results of this with those of the preceding year under all items of revenue is appended :---

26. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 5.—This return shows what portion of the revenue of all the items in Statement No. 5 is derived from irrigated lands and what portion otherwise. In the foot-note of the return are shown the extents of (1) Sundry Inams Mamool wet, (2) Sundry Inams dry but irrigated, (3) Zemindari and entire Inams, and (4) the water-cess due on the two latter items.

27. STATEMENT No. 6.—The demand, collection, and balance of Zemindaris, Muttahs, Shrotriems, and other Inams are shown in this return. The demand, current and arrears, amounted to Rupees 78,705-11-0, of which Rupees 64,012-14-6 was collected within the fasli and Rupees 8,404 since. Measures are being adopted for the early realization of the balance Rupees 6,288-12-6.

28. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 6.—This return shows the particulars of Inam lands which pay quit-rent. The entries therein require no explanation.

29. STATEMENT No. 7.—The demand, collection, and balance under all sources of revenue, current and arrears, are detailed in this return. The total demand of land revenue inclusive of arrears was Rupees 20,37,867; of these Rupees 18,75,451 were

collected within the year and Rupees 70,212 up to the end of August. Arrangements have been made for the early collection of the balance, Rupees 92,204. The following is an abstract statement showing the collection within the year under all the items of revenue :—

30. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 7.—This return shows the demand and collections of all items of revenue in each taluk.

31. STATEMENT No. 8.—The aggregate amount of old arrears under all sources of revenue was Rupees 1,66,099-4-4 at the commencement of the fasli. Of this amount Rupees 1,26,580-11-3 have been collected within the year, a sum of Rs. 5,022-4-1 has been remitted—vide Board's Order, No. 5,136, dated 1st December 1877. There thus remained a balance of Rupees 34,496-5-11; of this Rupees 3,924-6-3 have been collected since. The balance still to be collected therefore is Rupees 30,571-14-9.

32. The amount of old arrears which after careful inquiry was ascertained by the settling officers to be irrecoverable for this year is Rupees 467-11-11. This amount has to be written off the accounts, as also that recommended for Fasli 1286, viz., Rupees 2,170-8-1, and for which sanction has not as yet been received. Of this Rupees 1-5-0 have been since collected. I request sanction for writing off these irrecoverable arrears both for Faslis 1286 and 1287, which amount in all to Rupees 2,636-15-0. A list of the several items of irrecoverable arrears for Fasli 1287 is given below :—

33. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 8.—The total number of defaulters against whom coercive processes were issued during the year under report was 100,906 for arrears amounting to Rupees 5,93,601. The number of defaulters whose property was attached was 9,690 for arrears amounting to Rupees 1,13,641. It was, however, in 946 cases only that property was actually sold for arrears of Rupees 19,339. The sale proceeds of real and personal property amounted to Rupees 17,484, of which the former fetched Rupees 12,822 and the latter Rupees 4,662.

34. STATEMENT No. 9.—This statement shows the particulars of the gross collections and charges under all heads of revenue. There is a decrease of Rupees 14,695 in the receipts under stamps, and this is due to limited litigation consequent upon the prevalence of famine.

35. The increase under land revenue receipts has been explained already in its proper place. The increase under salaries of Collectors, &c., of Rupees 5,283 is owing to the appointment of an additional Deputy Collector, to Mr. Sharp drawing a month's salary as Sub-Collector, and to Appaji Row, Deputy Collector, drawing his salary while on leave here. The increase under Huzur and Taluk establishments and Miscellaneous of Rupees 2,207 and Rupeees 1,314, respectively, are due to famine batta to servants drawing less than Rupees 16 a-month and to the purchase of seven money weighing scales for the use of the Treasury.

This amount does not however appear in the Domand Collection, and Balance Statement under the item "Inam watercess" in consequence of a clerical error committed in the 'trichinopoly Taluk Demand, Collection, and Balance ecturn some two or three years ago. But the arrears still appear under its proper head in the Individualwar arrears list kept in the talak for all the villages. The total amount of arrears according to this list tally with that in the Demand, Collection and Balance Statement. The only difference is that the total under the item "Ryotwar" in the Individualwar according list is less by Rupees 95-6-6.

36. IRRIGATION AND CHANNELS.—The following statement shows the principal irrigation channels, and the revenue depending upon each of them :—

37. UNSURVEYED WASTE.—The extent cultivated during the year out of unasassessed waste available is 3,634 acres, assessed at Rupees 3,705.

38. TALUK AND VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.—In the Perambalur and Trichinopoly Taluks which I settled, the accounts kept by the Curnams are in fair order. I myself inspected some of them and caused others to be examined by my subordinates. The Divisional officers who settled the other taluks give a satisfactory account of them.

39. ACQUISITION OF LAND BY PUBLIC SERVANTS.—There was but a single case in the year of purchase of land by public servants. A Gumasta on the Huzur establishment has purchased 10 acres of land in the Trichinopoly Taluk.

40. CIVIL SUITS.—There was a balance at the commencement of the year of Rupees 36-7-0 of costs awarded to Government in civil suits. The amount of costs awarded during the year was Rupees 37-8-2, making a total of Rupees 73-15-2, of which Rupees 24-9-6 were collected during the year and Rupees 19-11-6 since. There remains a balance of Rupees 29-10-2 still to be collected. Measures have been adopted for early recovery of the same.

42. RUINED TANKS MADE OVER TO PRIVATE INDIVIDUALS.—No ruined tanks were made over to private individuals during the year under review, and therefore a blank statement is submitted herewith, as directed in Board's Proceedings, dated 15th June 1878, No. 1,633.

43. EXAMINATION OF TALUK TREASURIES.—The treasuries of the Kulittalai and Perambalur Taluks were examined during the year by the Deputy Collector in charge of Treasury. The balances on hand in the treasuries were correct. Some of the accounts were not kept in proper form and some irregularities in making the entries were also noticed in the examination. The Deputy Collector's remarks were forwarded to the Divisional officers concerned to take steps to prevent any such irregularities for the future.

44. CONDUCT OF PUBLIC SERVANTS.—The conduct of public servants has been good on the whole. My Huzur Sheristadar and the majority of the Tahsildars and Deput y Tahsildars have worked well. The only exceptions are (1) Sambamarti Aiyer, Tahsildar of Kulittalai, who is a well meaning and respectable man but is getting old for his work and must retire shortly; (2) Daniel Pillay, Tahsildar of Perambalur, who has suffered for some time from a kind of paralysis of the hand which interfered seriously with his writing powers. He is in other respects far from efficient. He has now been under medical treatment for some time and is reported to be cured. I am giving him a fresh chance of redeeming his character, but I doubt much whether he will avail himself of it. (3) Virasami Pillai was Deputy Tahsildar and Sub-Magistrate of Manaparai. He was apparently a hard-working officer but was so slow in getting through his work that business in his division, which was heavy during the famine, fell greatly in arrears. With the sanction of the Government conveyed in their Proceedings, No. 352, dated 7th March 1878, he was transferred to Perambalur Taluk as Sheristadar where the work is lighter.

I HAVE the honor to submit my Report on the Annual Settlement of the District for Fasli 1287, together with the usual statements.

2. STATEMENT No. 1.—The settlement was commenced on the 16th April 1878 and completed on the 29th June 1878. Mr. Stokes settled the taluks of Madura and Periyakulam, I as Sub-Collector conducted the settlement of Dindigul and Pulney Taluks, and the General Duty Deputy Collector and the Assistant Collector of Tirumangalam and Melur Taluks respectively.

3. PUTTAS.—A statement is subjoined in which the number of puttas distributed in the fasli under report and the preceding fasli is compared :—

8. SEASON.—The state of the season, though better than in the last year, was yet a very bad one. The fasli commenced at a period when famine was at its height and relief measures were kept up on a large scale.

9. There were very slight showers in July and August when rain was most needed for dry cultivation, but the favorable rains in September and October enabled the ryots to carry on wet cultivation extensively and the poorer classes of ryots were enabled by assistance from the State and Mansion House Funds to avail themselves of the same opportunity.

10. But these favorable showers were followed by deluges of rain and destructive floods in November and December to an extent that had not been seen for many years. The result was that many of the tanks and roads were breached and punjah crops greatly destroyed.

11. This was a very serious blow to the ryots after their resources had been drained by a year's severe famine and the speedy end to the distress which was hoped for was deferred. Damage to the crops caused by floods was aggravated by the ravages of innumerable locusts and other insects.

12. Many of the breached tanks were, however, repaired and a little water was saved under them so that the latter part of the fasli showed an improvement. Though the year did not close in famine $i\bar{t}$ was not a very favorable one.

13. SANITARY CONDITION AND PUBLIC HEALTH.-Cholera and fever were prevalent

70. DOUBTFUL ARBEARS.—The bulk of the amount classed as doubtful arrears relates to the hill village of Thandicudy in Pulney Taluk as stated in paragraph 66 of the Settlement Report for Fasli 1286. The Sub-Collector reports that "the item has not yet been finally adjusted and the Tahsildar has been directed to expedite his report," but a greater portion of it, it appears, will have to be written off under the circumstances stated in paragraph 77 of the Settlement Report for Fasli 1285.

71. IRRECOVERABLE ARREARS.—Ryotwar, Rupees 3,206-14-3—Miscellaneous, Rupees 716-3-4.—The irrecoverable arrears are composed of the following items, the remission of which is now sought for—

(1.) Ryotwar, Rupees 1,737-1-3 — Miscellaneous, Rupees 627-4-0.—Amount due by defaulters, the sale proceeds of whose property have not met the demand in full.

(4.) Ryotwar, Rupecs 995-4-0. — Teerwahjasti erroneously charged on certain nunjah lands on which punjah cultivation was permitted on account of the adverse character of the season.

(5.) Ryotwar, Rupees 39-1-6-Miscellancous, Rupees 9-3-11.-Amount of tax erroneously charged on certain land.

(6.) Ryotwar, Rupees 1-0-11.-Teerwah on land occupied by Relief Camp.

(7.) Ryotwar, Rupees 11-7-7—Miscellaneous, Rupees 4-5-4.—Teerwah on lands found deficient in the ryots' holdings.

(8.) Miscellaneous, Rupees 62-11-5 .-- Penal assessment remitted on appeal.

(9.) Miscellaneous, Rupees 3-11-8.—Penal assessment charged on certain lands by mistake on the ground that they were irrigated with Government water, while it was not so.

74. ENCLOSURE A.—The extent to which coercive measures were resorted to during the fasli under report is shown in Enclosure A, from which it will be observed that 121,797 processes were issued for an arrear of Rupees 10,74,377. But the property actually sold, which was estimated at Rupees 6,051, fetched only Rupees 4,608, of which the personal property realized 1,774 and the real property 2,834. 75. STATEMENT No. 9.—The gross collections of the year from all sources of revenue amount to Rupees 25,77,021 and the charges aggregate to Rupees 2,32,481, or 10,649 more than in the previous fash. The net savings is Rupees 23,44,540, or 6,69,475 more than in last year.

76. CHARGES, REFUNDS AND STAMPS—Decrease Rupees 1,494.—The decrease is due to the refund on account of spoiled non-judicial stamps being not so great as in last year.

77. The other variations under this head call for no special remark.

78. SALARIES AND EXPENSES, SALARY OF COLLECTORS, &C.—Increase, Rupees 9,719. —The increase of Rupees 9,719 is attributable to the disbursement of full salary to Mr. McQuhae as permanent Collector and Mr. Stokes as permanent District Judge and Acting Collector for six months each in the fashi under report, while full pay was disbursed to Mr. McQuhae only for six months during the preceding fashi.

79. FIXED TENTAGE—Increase Rupees 582.—The increase is due to the abovementioned cause.

80. HUZUR AND TALUK ESTABLISHMENT—Decrease Rupees 1,110.—The saving effected in the pay of the public servants deputed to famine duty, the substitutes drawing acting allowance, accounts for the falling off in the item.

81. MEDICAL CHARGES—Decrease Rupees 362.—The disbursement of pay to three Hospital Assistants at Rupees 40 per mensem in this fasli against Rupees 60 in the last fasli explains the decrease.

82. CONTINGENCY—Decrease Rupees 5,398.—The decrease is mainly owing to no payment having been made in this fashi on account of deputation allowance, Mr. Stokes having held a permanent appointment.

83. MISCELLANEOUS—Increase Rupces 1,628.—The increase is due to the entertainment of additional Batta Peons in all the taluks for the speedy collection of kists largely outstanding on account of the late famine.

84. SALT-SALARY OF SALT DEPUTY COLLECTOR-Increase Rupees 582.—The increase is chiefly due to the disbursement of salaries for two months to the permanent and Acting Deputy Collectors in the fasli under report, the former being on privilege leave.

85. PREVENTIVE ESTABLISHMENT—Increase Rupees 1,729.—The increase is chiefly due to the payment of famine batta to the Police Guard.

86. PURCHASE OF SALT, &c.—Increase Rupees 5,490.—The payment of the arrears of price due to the salt manufacturers in this fasli was the cause of increase in this item.

87. GATHERING AND DESTROYING SPONTANEOUS SALT—Decrease Rupces 827.—This decrease is due to the less payment on account of gathering and destroying spontaneous salt for reasons stated in paragraph 48.

88. PETTY CONSTRUCTION AND REPAIRS-Decrease Rupees 855.-Fewer repairs were required.

89. STATE OF VILLAGE AND TALUK ACCOUNTS.—The village and taluk accounts were examined and found to have been fairly kept.

90. From the statement of agricultural statistics and acreage of crops for the Fasli 1287 it will be seen that $67\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. (888,843 Acres) of the cultivable area (1,316,098 Acres), excluding Inam villages in six taluks, is under holdings, or $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. less than in last fasli.

5. The decrease of two villages under the head of Ryotwar is due to the amalgamation of villages sanctioned in the Proceedings of the Board of Revenue, Miscellaneous No. 646, dated 18th January 1877.

6. SEASON.-The early part of the season was very unfavorable. The drought of the preceding year continued more or less till the end of August in this year. In consequence of this many Puttadars emigrated. Fourteen thousand, five hundred and seventy-five Acres of dry and wet lands, assessed at Rupees 13,999, were relinquished; and 118,184 Acres of dry and wet lands, assessed at Rupees 1,26,199, were left waste. The crops sown with the aid of the showers in July proved a general failure. Contrary to expectations famine and general distress assumed the most alarming proportions. Fortunately, however, during second week of September, the season took a most favorable turn and there was an abundant and general downpour of rain throughout the

division. This was followed by the north-east monsoon which set in about the beginning of October, and the rain-fall in the months of October, November, and December was far more copious than the preceding years. When the rains set in in September most of the Puttadars who had emigrated had not returned. Of the resident Puttadars many were without the capital necessary for cultivation. However, with the help given them by Government by means of advances for seed-grain, supplemented by liberal grants from the Mansion House Fund for seed and ploughing hire, a large extent of dry and wet lands was cultivated but the unusual heavy downpour of rain in November and December was quite unfavorable for the dry crops which in consequence suffered a great deal and the result of this was that their outturn was reduced to far below the average in all cases, pulses included. The wet crops, however, yielded a fair average outturn, although affected by insects here and there to some extent.

7. SANITARY CONDITION.—The season as might be expected was very unhealthy until the rains set in. Cholera and fever prevailed in many places in the division. The former was very virulent in the Pulney Taluk in the months of July to September. The cattle also suffered much during this time and there was a great mortality among them.

14. The actual cultivation falls short of the extent of the preceding year by Acres 31,710, assessed at Rupees 25,965, on dry, or there is a decrease of 8.40 per cent. In wet lands there is an increase of 8,147 Acres, assessed at Rupees 34,170, or 36.35 per cent. The reason of this increase in one and decrease in the other is obvious and calls for no explanation.

15. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 3 requires no remark.

16. ENCLOSURE B TO STATEMENT No. 3.-The increase in cotton cultivation is due to a copious fall of rain in the months of September, October, and November, favorable for its cultivation.

23. The increase in No. 40 is due to the large number of sales of defaulters' property conducted in the Zemindaries in the Sub-Division, especially Kannivadi and Ammayanayakanur.

24. In No. 43 the increase is chiefly attributable to the punishment of fines inflicted under Regulation IX of 1822 on certain Nattamgars who had embezzlod the funds entrusted to them for gratuitious relief in connection with the famine.

25. The increase in No. 51 (b) is accounted for by the fact that a larger number of coercive processes were issued during this year than in the last.

27. STATEMENT No. 6 .- This statement shows the demand, collection, and balance of Peishcush, &c., of Zemindaries and Inam villages. At the end of the fashi there was an arrear of Rupees 63,002-5-2 against all the Zemindaries in the division. The Zemindar of Velur, Edayacottai, and Mambarai have since paid their arrears in full.

28. The lessce of the Kannivadi estate still owes an arrear of Rupees 5,067-13-9. For the recovery of this and the arrears due by him for land-cess and interest, amounting in all to Rupees 9,319-14-7, the management of the estate under attachment has been taken out of the hands of the lessee and placed under a special managing Clerk supervised by the Tahsildar. It is expected that the arrcars in the Zemindari will be cleared off by the end of December.

29. The arrears in Ammayanayakanur Zemindari have been reduced by subsoquent payments to Rupeos 1,943-14-1, for the early collection of which orders have been sent to the Tahsildar.

30. With regard to the arrears due by the Zemindar of Ayakudi and Rettayampadi you are aware that the estates have been attached by the Subordinate Court of Madura and the Receiver appointed by the Court has been paying his collections in liquidation of the Government arrears. He has paid, under this arrangement, Rupees 7,852-11-2 and Rupees 12,999-2-3 still remains in arrears.

31. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 6 shows the apportionment of quit-rent of Inams to irrigated and unirrigated lands.

32. STATEMENT No. 7.—In this statement the demand, collection, and balance of all sources of revenue are exhibited.

SETTLEMENT REPORT OF TINNEVELLY.

6. The increase in the number of Inam villages in Fasli 1287 was due to the formation of eleven hamlets into separate Inam villages, which had been, until the recent Revenue Settlement, treated as minor Inams in the Nanguneri and Srivilliputtur Taluks.

7. INTRODUCTION OF PERMANENT PUTTAS.—The total number of puttas issued in Fasli 1287 was 169,145. It will be seen from the subjoined statement that there was an increase of 5,260 in the total number of puttas issued, and of 62,027 in the number of fresh puttas. The increase in the former was due to the sub-division of holdings and to issue of puttas for lands newly taken up, as also to the issue of more than one putta for the holding of the same individual in large villages which were divided into smaller ones; while the increase in the latter was due chiefly to the completion of the Revenue Settlement in the four northern taluks, when owing to numerous changes in the rates, &c., fresh puttas had to be issued :—

9. The season during the year under report, so far as the amount of rain is concerned, may be considered to have been favorable, the south-west monsoon having set in early; but the rainfall during the north-east monsoon having been unprecedentedly heavy was attended with two unparalleled floods which caused serious damage to irrigation works and the country generally. For merely closing breaches in thirteen river channels and 145 tanks the estimates so far amount to 2,00,000 Rupees; and though the abundance of rain did certainly tend to increase cultivation both of wet and dry land during the fasli under review in comparison with Faslis 1285 and 1286, yet, owing to its excess in the dry taluks, and to floods in the river valleys, the crops generally suffered considerably.

10. Large tracts of rice land in the Nanguneri and Tenkarai Taluks under the irrigation works so damaged were either washed away entirely or completely buried in silt, rendering the lands in the latter case unfit for cultivation except at very considerable expense to the owners.

11. The kar cultivation (summer crop) in the river valley yielded woll; but during the peshanam (winter) season the wet crop was attacked with a sort of fungus and a peculiar kind of fly. Added to this, locusts, hitherto unknown, made their appearance in immense swarms throughout the district and devastated all the cultivation they came across. To these causes are to be ascribed the short crop generally, and the total failure in some places.

12. A very small proportion of the dry crops that were raised somewhat early in the season and were ready for harvest before the advent of the locusts and before the excessive rains of November set in yielded a fair outturn; while the rest of the dry crops cultivated later on, from which the ryots were anxiously expecting compensation for their losses in the previous years, were a complete disappointment, as it was found impossible from the excessive moisture of the ground to cultivate them properly after sowing. In some places where they did arrive at maturity in spite of the above disadvantages they were destroyed by locusts so completely that the ryots got nothing out of them even for fodder. 13. The cotton crops, however, escaped for the most part the ravages of locusts and yielded, though very late, a bumper crop in the second picking, thus enabling the ryots in the dry taluks to sustain themselves and to pay the Government assessment from the profits derived therefrom. Unfortunately, however, the price of cotton fell very much later on, and it is now almost a drug in the market.

14. To compensate for the losses thus sustained by the ryots, those holding lands under rain-fed tanks and minor rivers were allowed, as a special case, to cultivate any second crop on such lands free of charge (vide Board's Proceedings, No. 605, dated 7th March 1878).

15. Some slight concession was also made to the ryots in the dry taluks for the loss sustained on dry lands by partial remission of the assessment according to the principle laid down in G.O., No. 387, dated 12th March 1878.

16. The calamitous famine which commenced about the beginning of the Fasli 1286 continued till the 16th of March 1878 when all famine expenditure was stopped. During its prevalence gratuitous relief of all kinds was liberally given and relief works were opened under the supervision both of Civil Officers and those of the Public Works Department.

the health improved as the intensity of the famine decreased, but there was a slight increase in the number of deaths during the year as shown in the margin. Cholera, which was at its worst about the beginning of the fasli, began to disappear in October, and totally disappeared in February. But fever succeeded it vigorously in October when cholera began to decrease especially in the dry taluks and all along the foot of the hills. The mortality under this head alone increased 56 per cent. as compared with that for Fasli 1286. On

the whole the rate of mortality was 31.78 per mille of the population against 30.63 ir Fasli 1286. In both years there can be no reasonable doubt that the excessive mortality was largely due to famine.

19. PRICES OF GRAIN.—The average retail prices of the staple grains during the year under report are compared below with those of the previous fasli as well as with the averages of the last ten years :—

28. The increase in the area and assessment under both wet and dry in the Tinnevelly Taluk is due to a large extent of waste lands having been taken up on darkhast and to the issue of puttas for unauthorised cultivation under the orders of the Board of Revenue.

29. In Nanguneri the increase under dry is partly due to the waste lands made over on darkhast and partly to the resale of lands which were purchased on behalf of Government at a nominal price, while the increase in the *area* under wet is due to the fact that the extent under a tank which has been made over for a lump assessment and which had not been shown in the taluk accounts in the previous fasli has been brought to account this year; and that in the assessment is due to the compounding of the assessment of certain single erop lands for double erop.

30. In Ambasamudram the increase in drv is due to the grant of waste lands on darkhast, and that under wet to the resumption of certain Inam lands relinquished.

31. In Tenkasi the increase under dry is due to fresh darkhasts, and that under wet is partly due to certain Inam lands having been relinquished by the Inamdars, who preferred the light settlement rates to the heavy quit-rent formerly imposed; and partly to the assessment on a large extent of single crop lands having been compounded for double crop.

32. In Tenkarai the increase under "dry" and part of that under "wet" is due to new darkhasts and to the issue of puttas under the Board's orders for unauthorised cultivation; while the remaining increase under wet is partly due to the transfer of certain dry lands charged with water-rate for more than two years to the head of wet, and partly to the charge of full taram assessment on certain lands which were hitherto subjected to baling or half assessment, and which were improved so as to admit of a direct flow of water.

33. The increase in the area and the increase and decrease in the assessment in the taluks of Sankaranainarkoil, Srivilliputtur, Satur, and Ottapidaram are all due to the introduction of survey area and of new rates of assessment, as well as to the inclusion of the palmyra tax compounded for during the settlement.

34. ACTUAL CULTIVATION.—The annexed statement shows the area cultivated in Fasli 1287 as compared with that in the previous fasli.

Of the holdings noticed in the foregoing paragraph 25, 68 per cent. of dry and 88 per cent. of wet lands were cultivated, against 62 and 78 per cent. cultivated respectively in Fasli 1286; and on the whole the proportion of cultivation to the holdings was 70.8 per cent., which exceeds that of Fasli 1286 by 6.3 per cent.

36. The large increase both under wet and dry appears in all the taluks except in Nanguneri, where there is a decrease on dry as shown in the margin.

37. The increase under wet is owing partly to the increased second crop cultivation in all the taluks, and partly to the increased cultivation under minor rivers and under rain-fed tanks where a large extent was left waste in the previous fasli owing to the failure of the north-east monsoon.

38. The increase under dry in eight taluks is due partly to the increased cultivation consequent on the favorable character of the season and partly to the introduction of survey areas in the four

northern taluks. The slight decrease in Nanguneri docs not call for any remark.

39. PRINCIPAL SOURCES OF INRIGATION.—The following statement details the extent of wet cultivation and waste under several sources of irrigation, *i.e.*, Tambrapurni, minor rivers, and rain-fed tanks. The favorable character of the season has brought about the increase of cultivation and decrease in waste under all the sources.

41. The large increase under wet, which appears in all the taluks (except in Ambasamudram, where there is a slight decrease,) is due partly to the favorable character of the season and partly to the indulgence (allowed in Board's Proceedings, No. 605, dated 7th March 1878, referred to above in paragraph 14,) under which a second crop was raised on lands under minor rivers and rain-fed tanks; while the disproportionate increase in the assessment charged therefor is due to the charge of three-fourths of the first crop assessment instead of half according to the previous practice, after the introduction of the settlement in the four northern taluks. The decrease under dry is owing to the abolition of the imposition of the second crop charge on garden lands merged with dry after the new settlement.

52. The total occasional remissions granted during the fasli under report were Rupees 1,44,946-8-0 against Rupees 7,15,079-13-5 in the previous year. Besides the remissions usually given under the instructions conveyed in Board's Standing Orders remissions of assessment were specially granted this year for wet crops damaged by the action of floods and locusts (Items 3 and 13), for second crop raised under rainfed tanks in consideration of the total destruction of the first crop by locusts (Item 11), and for dry waste and withered crop on the principles laid down in G.O., No. 387, dated 12th March 1878, (Item 12).

53. The introduction of the new settlement in the four northern taluks put a stop to Chaturbogam and other similar indulgences. Hence the decrease in Items Nos. 17, 19, and 20. But this decrease was more than counterbalanced by the increase in Item No. 15, viz., the deductions of the Tusdik allowance to pagodas from the village beriz, and thus caused a net increase in the customary remissions.

67. The increase in Items 1 and 4 is due to increased cultivation owing to the favorable nature of the season.

68. The increase in Item No. 2 is due to the fact that the assessment on certain Inam lands resumed by the Inam Deputy Collector in the Ettiyapuram estate has been brought to account this year.

69. The increase in No. 3 is due to the realization of the sale amount this year of the shells collected last year.

70. In No. 5 the increase is owing to the issue of a large number of processes during the year under report, even though the rate of fees was reduced by 50 per cent.

71. The Items Nos. 6 and 7 are both new and appear this year in the Srivilliputtur Taluk, the former being the assessment on excess found on the survey of Inam lands which were newly brought to account, the charge thereon being calculated by the Tahsildar of his own accord, although this duty lies within the province of the Settlement Department under G.O., No. 968, dated 18th July 1876, and the latter being the assessment on lands held on putta beyond the demarcated boundary of the villages and therefore excluded from the settlement.

72. The decrease in Item No. 8 is due to the relinquishment of Inams and to the transfer of quit-rents to those of entire Inam, as pointed out in paragraph 65; while that in No. 9 is owing to the failure to collect the commission on estates under the Court of Wards during the fasli under report.

73. EXTRA REVENCE.—The subjoined statement shows the demand on account of extra sources of revenue for Fasli 1287 as compared with that of Fasli 1286 :---

74. Abkári. — The slight increase does not call for any remark.

75. Sall.—The large increase under this item is due partly to the enhancement in the rate of the retail price from Rupees 2 to Rupees 2-11-0 per maund and partly to more extensive purchases, especially for exportation by sea and by rail.

76. Sea Customs.—The increase in this item is due chiefly to the large exportation of grain to Colombo.

77. Stamps, Judicial.—The decrease is owing to diminished litigation on account of the impoverished condition of the ryots consequent on the famine in Fasli 1286 and

to the destruction of crops by locusts and heavy rains during the fasli under report.

78. Stamps, Non-Judicial.—The decrease is said to be due partly to the fact that the people were relieved from the necessity of borrowing so much as usual owing to the liberal aid granted from the Mansion House Fund, but much more, I imagine, to the poor condition of the people, their circumstances being such as to incapacitate them from either borrowing or leading money.

79. DEMAND ON LAND AND EXTRA SOURCES.—The demand on land and extra sources of revenue for Fasli 1287 amounts, as shown in the following abstract, to Rupees 48,24,219, or 6,97,058 in excess of the demand for Fasli 1286 :—

84. Of the balance in Tenkarai Taluk Rupees 15,180-8-0, being the assessment on lands damagod by floods, &c., have been remitted with reference to G.O., No. 1,819, dated 13th November 1878. Strict orders have been issued for the collection of the balance in Tenkarai and in the other four river irrigated taluks. The collections in the four northern taluks are necessarily very slow owing to the reduced

condition of the people consequent on the successive failure of crops, and also because they have had to pay last year's arrears which were suspended. The Tahsildars concerned have been directed to use their best endeavors to clear off the arrears as soon as possible, and it is hoped that there will be no unusual balances outstanding by the end of the current fasli.

89. No explanation is necessary in the first two cases; and in the third case a Revenue Inspector of the Tenkarai Taluk was charged with having reported against a claim for remission, (whilst it was proved that the Peshanum crops in a certain village had really withered), because the ryots had refused to comply with his and the Curnam's request for a doucear. The case was enquired into by me on the spot, and I sanctioned the prosecution of the Revenue Inspector. The Joint Magistrate who tried the case convicted him and sentenced him to pay a fine of Rupees 51, and though the conviction was quashed by the Session Judge on appeal, on grounds which appear to me to be inconclusive, I am satisfied that the ryots did lose their crops and are consequently entitled to remission, so that the assessment has been shown as irrecoverable.

- 91. Item No. 7 comprises the following :---
 - (1.) Deductions made before the beriz was struck, and deduction of palmyrahs on account of village officials and of religious institutions in the Tenkarai Taluk. At the settlement in Fasli 1284 all these were discontinued and included with the demand; but when the orders of Government, dated 6th December 1875, No. 1,760, and 18th March 1876, No. 389, were received only such sums as had been deducted from the gross beriz were allowed to continue. But before the settlement was completed in Fasli 1284 the village officials and the trustees of several institutions had enjoyed their Inams before they were aware of their discontinuance, and it was considered very hard to recover the amount from the poor working officials and from the trustees who had spent the Inam in support of those institutions.
 - (2.) This forms the subject of my letter to the Board and their Official Memorandum, No. 1,046, dated 29th August 1878. The case is this—Beriz deductions of Rupees 268-2-0 were being made in favor of the ryots of Arumugamangalam in Tenkarai. This amount was being utilized by the ryots for the repair of certain channels and other sundry repairs to irrigation works that could be conducted by the ryots under the superintendence of one of the Government Merassidars of the village who used to get 7 Rupees a month. This deduction was discontinued at settlement (in Fasli 1284) and formed part of the settled demand of the same fasli. But before the settlement was closed this sum was drawn from the collections and spent on the works which were carried out as usual. As it was considered unreasonable to collect the sum from the ryots it was recommended to be written off :—

94. The arrears in Nos. 1 and 2 are due on the estate of Mannarkottai and the Inam village of Darukapuram belonging to the Zemindar of Talavankottai, respectively, and both of them are under the attachment of the Court and managed by Receivers appointed; while the arrears against Items Nos. 3 and 6 appertain to all the taluks and are due for Faslis 1283 to 1286. Strict orders have been issued to the Tahsildars concerned to get these small sums collected without further delay.

95. WASTAGE OF SALT.—The wastage on 690 heaps of salt, weighing 819,650 Indian maunds sold in Fasli 1287, was 72,226 maunds or 8.11 per cent. The prime cost of the wastage was Rupees 6,395-0-2 at Rupees 10-10-0 per maund.

96. Of the 690 heaps 43 were stored in Fasli 1284, 441 in 1285, and 206 in Fasli 1286, and the wastage in the heaps that were stored in Faslis 1284 and 1285 was 6.12 and 6.29 per cent. owing to the salt having remained in store for a long time; while in the heaps that were stored in Fasli 1286 the rate of wastage was 14.69 per cent., which is due to the heavy rains and floods of 1877.

97. I request sanction to write off the amount of wastage from the accounts.

110. Item No. 23.—Decrease due to the manufacture of a smaller quantity of salt on account of the damage done to salt works by the floods of 1877.

111. Items Nos. 27 and 28.—Increase due chiefly to the execution of emergent salt works which were rendered necessary by the floods.

112. Item No. 26.—Decrease due to the purchase of salt weighing-machines in the previous fashi.

113. IMPORTATION OF SALT.--- No salt was imported into the district during the fasli.

118. It is in fact the highest revenue ever collected in the district, and even the land revenue is considerably in excess of the ten years' average.

119. REMARKS ON THE CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATE OFFICERS.—I have nothing special to say on this subject beyond what I said last year. As pointed out in the Memorandum alluded to in paragraph 114 there is great room for improvement in the conduct of business in the taluk offices, especially with reference to the scrutiny of village accounts by the Taluk Sheristadars. The present Divisional Officers and the Huzur Sheristadar are all very efficient assistants, and the Tahsildars are, as a rule, quite competent to conduct the duties of their office when properly kept up to the mark.

120. DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE OF COSTS OF SUITS.—The following statement shows the demand, collection, and balance of costs, &c., awarded in Civil suits :---

SETTLEMENT REPORT

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I плук the honor to submit my annual Jamabandi Report for Fasli 1287, accompanied by the prescribed statements.

2. SETTLEMENT.—The Jamabandi was commenced by the Acting Sub-Collector Mr. McWatters in the Erode Taluk on the 28th January 1878. He settled all the three taluks of his division. The Acting Head Assistant Collector Mr. Tremenheere conducted the settlement of the Pollachi Taluk while the other two taluks of his division, viz., Palladam and Udamalpetai, were settled by me. The Coimbatore and Collegal Taluks were settled by the Acting Sub-Collector Mr. C. D. Maclean and the Additional Deputy Collector Mr. C. A. Mackenzie, respectively. The remaining two taluks of Bhavani and Satyamangalam were settled partly by the permanent Deputy Collector Mr. A. M. MacGregor and partly by the Acting Deputy Collector Mr. A. Pinto during the absence on privilege leave of the former. The Jamabandi settlement was completed by the 30th June 1878.

- 3. VILLAGES.—During the fasli the following territorial changes took place :—
 - (1.) The villages of Arakkode and Mokkode were transferred from the Nilgiri District to the Coimbatore Talux under the orders of the Madras Government, dated 19th February 1878, No. 260, Revenue Department, communicated with the Revenue Board's Proceedings of the 4th March 1878, Miscellaneous No. 2,198.

- This caused an increase of two villages in the district. The total number of villages in the district is therefore at present 1,579 against 1,577 in Fasli 1286.
- (2.) The village of Kadinamalla, which till Fasli 1286 belonged to the Satyamanagalam Taluk, was, during the fasli under report, transferred to the Coimbatore Taluq, under the sanction of Government in their Proceedings quoted above.
- (3.) With reference to G.O., dated 12th January 1877, No. 102, an extent of acres 689 of the Soondaputty village and acres 45 of Nellitoray were struck out of the ayacut of this district and transferred to the Nilgiri District.

4. PUTTAS.—Of the total number of puttas for the year 235,119, 145,627 puttas remained unaltered, 32,392 were modified, and 57,100 were renewed. There was a net increase of 2,325 puttas in Fasli 1287 over those of Fasli 1286.

From a comparison of the above figures with those for 1876-77, it will be seen that on the whole there is an increase in the total rainfall for the district of inches 12.03. But the early rains were very scanty and ill distributed; many wells throughout the district failed, and water even for drinking purposes became scarce. The high east winds in the hot weather, unaccompanied by rain, choked many wells, especially in the Udamalpetai Taluq, with drift sand. The famine reached its height in August and the early part of September 1877. But the rains which set in in the latter portion of September soon effected a change for the better. The rainfall in October 1877 was $9\frac{3}{4}$ inches, which is much above the usual fall in that month. After the fall of rain in September, lands were cultivated and the crops were promising well, but the heavy rain in October seriously damaged them, and this, together with a superabundance of insect life, resulted in a very deficient outturn. Pasture and water-supply, however, were abundant. The season throughout the year cannot, therefore, be said to have been favorable.

6. SANITARY CONDITION.—An abstract of deaths during the year as compared with the preceding year is subjoined :—

The mortality during the fasli under all the heads was 46.9 per cent. more than in the preceding fasli, and is to be ascribed to the prevailing distress which told severely on the lower classes, who were much reduced by privation and were thus more subject to disease.

Cholera prevailed throughout the year except in the last three months of the fasli, during which there was a total absence of the disease. The number of deaths from cholera in July 1877 was 2,725 and rose to 4,060, the highest number in September, when the distress had reached its height. After the October rains there was a change for the better, and the numbers fell to 1,804, and kept gradually falling until March when only 28 deaths occurred, and then the disease ceased.

The mortality from all causes bears to the total population a ratio of 44.82 per mille. Of the four deaths by wild animals, three are said to have been caused by tigers, and it is doubtful whether the other was caused by a tiger or a leopard.

Subjoined is a comparative abstract of mortality amongst cattle :---

The mortality on the whole is in excess of that of Fasli 1286, in consequence of the high death-rate amongst sheep. In other respects the figures compare favorably. The condition of the cattle which was very bad during the trying period of distress began to improve in October, and the improvement continued, the cattle at the end of the fasli being in excellent condition. The high rate of mortality amongst sheep occurred chiefly in the taluks of Coimbatore, Satyamangalam and Palladam, and is attributed to the severe drought and want of pasture in July and August 1877. Some losses occurred during the heavy rains of October and November. Disease was also reported in some places.

On the whole the condition of the cattle may be said to have been much better in Fasli 1287 than in the year preceding.

7. PRICES.—Statement No. 2 shows the average prices of grain for Fasli 1287, the following being a comparative statement of the prices of the principal staple grains :---

The abnormal prices which ruled in the famine year of 1286 did not fall during the fash under report, but on the contrary continued to rise owing to the almost entire tailure of the harvest of October 1877, in consequence of the excessive rain which induced a superabundance of insect life which seriously damaged the crops.

It will be seen from the above statement that there is a net increase in the ryots' holdings, amounting in the aggregate to acres 1,494, assessed at Rupees 1,872, being the difference between a gross increase of acres 2,096, assessed at Rupees 2,364 in seven taluks and a decrease of acres 602, assessed at Rupees 492 in three taluks.

Items Nos. 1, 2, 4 and 5 are of usual occurrence and call for no remarks. Item No. 3 consists of lands taken up for public purposes, and therefore struck out of the puttas and transferred to the head "Poramboke." Item No. 6 is the result of the rectification of errors committed by the Curnams when the Survey areas were entered in the accounts in Fasli 1281 when Government waste lands were by mistake entered in puttas. These mistakes were discovered by the Settlement Department, and according to their registers have now been rectified by deducting the lands from puttas and transferring them to Government waste. Item No. 7 consists of lands transferred to the Nilgiri District from the Soondaputty and Nellitoray villages in the Combatore Taluk under the sanction of G.O., No. 102, of 12th January 1877. Item No. 8, "Transferred to other taluks," is the extent of lands in the holding of ryots in the village of Kadinamalla in Satyamangalam, transferred to the Coimbatore Taluk under the orders of Government, dated 19th February 1878, No. 260. Item No. 9 is the extent of lands applied for on durkhast by certain ryots in the village of Chennumputty in the Bhavani Taluk in Fasli 1285. But as the lands were situated in the vicinity of the forests, no puttas were given for them in that year, pending a reference to the Forest Department. Just before the Jamabandi of Fasli 1286 the Deputy Conservator of Forests expressed his opinion that the lands might be given for cultivation. This was brought to the notice of the settling officer for orders as to the issue of puttas at the Jamabandi. The settling officer, however, directed that as the lands were waste, puttas should not be issued. But the lands and their assess-ment were by mistake included under the head "Ayen," although no puttas were granted. This mistake was rectified in the fasli under report by the retransfer of the land to Government waste. A recommendation for writing off the assessment which has not as yet been collected will be made in the appropriate place in this report.

10. Under the head " Lands taken up" are comprised the following items :---

Items Nos. 1 to 4 call for no remarks. As regards Item No. 5, certain nunjah hands, originally assessed at a reduced rate in consequence of their being situated on too high a level, to be directly irrigated from Government sources, and which were usually in consequence watered by means of mechanical appliances having been in Fasli 1287 directly irrigated from channels were charged with the appropriate nunjah rate; hence the increase in assessment. Item No. 6 is the extent of lands in the holding of ryots in the villages of Arakkode and Kokkode on the Nilgiri transferred to this district on G.O., dated 19th February, No. 260, already quoted.

11. RYOTWARI LANDS BROUGHT UNDER CULTIVATION.—The extent under actual cultivation shows a net increase of acres 1,351, being the result of a decrease of acres 5,254 in dry and an increase of acres 6,605 under wet as shown below :—

Under the head "Dry" there is a decrease of acres 5,254 in extent, while in assessment there is an increase of Rupees 15,040, due probably to highly assessed lands having been brought under cultivation, while a portion of those assessed at lower rates was left waste.

12. RYOTWARI LANDS LEFT WASTE.—The aggregate extent in the holding of the ryots during the fashi was acres 2,316,779, assessed at Rupces 26,39,441, from which the extent under cultivation, acres 1,872,883, assessed at Rupces 21,68,267, being deducted, the remainder actually left waste was acres 443,896, assessed at Rupces 3,71,174. Of this extent the assessment on acres 61,999, assessed at Rupces 50,720, was remitted, and the remainder acres 381,897, assessed at Rupces 3,20,454, was charged. Of the 381,897 acres charged, acres 30,171, assessed at Rupces 23,360, were customary waste held on the favorable "Ayen" grass tenure under the Hukumnamah Rules of the district.

13. LAND REVENUE SETTLEMENT,—The total Land Revenue Settlement of the district, comprising the Ryotwari, Miscellaneous, Inam and Zemindari for the fasli under report, amounted to Rupces 25,86,901 against Rupees 23,33,532 in Fasli 1286, showing an increase of Rupces 2,53,369. Remissions of assessment on dry lands on a large scale in accordance with the Board's instructions quoted above were granted only in the taluks of Satyamangalam, Bhavani, Palladam and Udamalpetai. Mr. McWatters did not consider dry remissions necessary for the three taluks of his division and had settled them prior to the receipt of the Board's instructions on the subject of dry remissions. In the Coimbatore, Collegal and Pollachi Taluks no dry remissions were given as the state of the taluks did not warrant the grant of any. In several cases small puttas were wholly 'eff waste, and in others in calculating the value of the ryot's share of the produce of the cultivated lands as directed in the memorandum, there was nothing left after making a deduction on account of the assessment of cultivated lands, to cover the issessment of those left waste. In such cases the full assessment on the waste had

Item No. (1.) The small remission of Rupees 176 under wet shavi was granted in the taluks of Coimbatore and Bhavani. Under "Dry Shavi" the whole of the remissions was granted in the Bhavani Taluk. During the last Jamabandi no remissions for short produce were as a rule granted, but on a special report from the Acting Deputy Collector, Northern Division, an exception was made in the case of Kavaripuram and the adjacent villages in the Bhavani Taluk, where the crops were reported to have almost entirely failed, owing to the excessive rain and insects, and remissions were granted as per Board's general instructions.

The decrease under the head of "Cowle" is due to some of the lands having been charged with full assessment according to the prescribed terms.

The decrease under the head "Nunjah lands cultivated with dry or garden produce" is due to a less extent of lands having been cultivated with dry crops, as the water-supply, unlike that of Fasli 1286, was ample for nunjah cultivation. The increase under the head "Three-fourths remission to jungle tribes" is due to the grant during the fasli of some additional lands to the jungle tribes, in the Coimbatore and Udamalpetai Taluks, under the Lanction of the Board of Revenue, dated 6th December 1873, No. 2,496.

Item 5 is a fluctuating item and calls for no remarks.

The decrease under the head " Punchum Hissa grass " is due to some of the lands held under this tenure having been cultivated and charged with full assessment. Item No. 8. In Fasli 1286 a percentage remission of assessment was made under the Revenue Board's sanction, dated 6th January 1877, No. 58. But in the year under report the remission took the shape of a proportionate reduction calculated according to the estimated yield of produce as per instructions in the Board's memorandum already quoted.

Item No. 3 is the amount paid by the Dasabandum Inamdar of the Collegal Taluk to whom nunjah lands, assessed at Rupees 1,000-10-11, were originally granted in the days of the Hindoo Government as Inam for the repair of four tanks at Collegal. The Inam was continued up to the time of Tippoo. From Fasli 1209 to Fasli 1225 the Inam was under attachment ("Zuft") and in the latter year the then Collector instituted enquiries and restored the Inam to the amount of Rupees 274-0-9. The repairs were never properly carried out, and in Fasli 1230 the Inamdar entered into an agreement binding himself to pay Rupees 150 a year. The amount of Rupees 750 collected for the five years ending 30th June 1878 was kept in deposit. The Accountant-General directed the adjustment of the amount, and it was credited in the accounts under Item No. 3.

Item No. 6 (Rupees 9,255 for Fasli 1287) consists principally of the assessment of lands adjoining forests which the Tahsildars gave for cultivation without reference to the Forest Department. The assessment has been held under Sevoy Jamma pending reference to the Forest Department.

Item No. 7 is the assessment of waste lands cultivated without durkhast kept under Sevoy Jamma, pending further enquiry.

The decrease in Item No. 42, "Commission on Private Estates," is nominal as the amount of commission for the management of the Samattoor and Kottamputty Polliputs for Fasli 1286 was credited in July 1878 instead of within the 30th June.

For Item No. 54—vide remarks in paragraph 31 of this report.

The increase in receipts under the head "Process Service Fees," Item 56, is due to the appointment of a great number of process servers for the collection of the arrears which were much larger in Fasli 1287 than in the previous year.

The decrease under "Other items" is chiefly due to the fact that in Fasli 1286 a large amount was received on account of the rent of the Railway C. Class. There were no receipts under this item during the fasli under report.

Fasli 1277 was a bad year when punjah remissions had to be granted owing to the failure of the crops. Fasli 1286 was even worse. In Fasli 1287 there was not much improvement as the crops failed owing to the excessive October rain as already noticed.

The amount of guaranteed revenue for the fasli was Rupees 2,70,000, but under the orders of Government the duty was collected on actual issues. The decrease during the fasli is due to the decreased issue of arrack. The indulgence allowed by Government of paying duty on the actual issues of arrack instead of the guaranteed minimum ceased with the fasli under report.

The entry under the head "Court Fees Miscellaneous" is nil. because under the Revenue Board's Proceedings, dated 7th September 1878, No. 2,492, the collection on account of deficient stamp duty and penalty hitherto entered under this head is shown under the similar head of "Stamps, Non-Judicial." There is a decrease of Rupees 14,187 under the head "Court Fees." In Fashi 1286 a large amount of stamp duty on certificates of heirship was collected, the duty on a single certificate amounting to as much as Rupees 5,108, *vide* my letter to the Board of Revenue, dated 13th July 1878, No. 131. This and the fall in litigation as evidenced by a fall in the number of civil suits owing to the bad season account for the decrease in the revenue from "Court Fees."

Under "Non-Judicial" the increase is due to increased private transactions owing to people having had to borrow money in consequence of the prevailing distress.

45.83 per cent. of the revenue was collected within the fasli, 17.02 was collected subsequently and up to the 30th September 1878, leaving 37.15 per cent. uncollected on the 1st October 1878. This unsatisfactory state of the collections is due to the very exceptional character of the season which was one of severe trial to the agricultural classes. The south-west monsoon during the fasli was a failure, and the excessive October rains were almost as injurious as the want of the earlier rains. Under these circumstances, it was not possible to collect the revenue. Steps are, however, being taken to collect the arrears from all who are able to pay, and my subordinates have received instructions to push on with the collections. As the season has improved I hope soon to be able to collect a great portion of the arrears.

In the cases of Items 1, 2 and 3 the lands were sold for arrears of revenue; in some cases the sale proceeds did not cover the whole amount of the arrears, and no other property could be found, and in the other cases the lands were bought in on behalf of Government.

The sum of Rupees 157 in Item 4 is made up of the following :---

- Rupces 87.—Assessment of certain waste lands in the Chennumputty village in the Bhavani Taluk. On this subject, vide remarks for Item 9 in paragraph 9 of this report.
- (2.) Rupees 35.—This sum is the difference between the nunjah tarum punjah and ayen punjah rates of assessment on certain putta lands in the village of Kuniamoottoor, in the Coimbatore Taluk, for Fasli 1286. At the Jamabandi the lands were charged with the full rates. But on a petition being presented by the ryots concerned objecting to the charge of full assessment on the ground that Sirkar water was not used, a detailed inquiry was made, and as it was found that the non-irrigation of the lands was due not to the carelessness of the ryots but to causes beyond their control, the lands being on a high level and the water supply scanty, I directed the charge of punjah rates. Hence the difference of Rupees 35 is recommended for remission.
- (3.) Rupees 35.—This sum is the assessment of certain nunjah lands in the Kalikinaikumpolliem Village in the same taluk.

In Fasli 1286 the lands were left waste, and at Jamabandi, under the misrepresentation of the Curnam that they were not cultivated through the ryots' fault, full assessment charged. On the complaint of the ryots an inquiry was ordered, from which it was found that the land was on a high level, that the water supply in the channel in Fasli 1286 was low, and that for these reasons the lands were left waste. I have therefore directed that the amount should not be collected, and now recommend that it should be ordered to be written off.

Subjoined is a comparative statement of charges :---

The increase under the head "Salaries and Allowances" is chiefly due to the payment of famine batta to the establishment for ten months, whereas in Fasli 1286 it was paid only for five and-a-half months.

The increase under the head "Other Charges" is due chiefly to increased expenditure on account of service telegrams, service labels, remittance of treasure, batta to establishment, and to the increased number of process servers employed for the collection of Land Revenue arrears.

28. COERCIVE PROCESS.—Processes under the Revenue Recovery Act were issued in respect of arrears amounting to Rupees 7,14,087 in 70,801 cases, but only in 69 cases was property sold. The sales of land and movable property were resorted to in respect of arrears amounting to Rupees 1,034, of which Rupees 970 were realized by the sale. In consequence of the unfavorable character of the season and inability of the ryots to pay their dues sales were ordered in only a few instances.

29. INTEREST ACCOUNT.—The interest collected on arrears amounted to Rupees 4,561 as shown below :—

The increase in interest is due to a greater collection of arrears during the fasli under report.

30. Costs AWARDED IN CIVIL SUITS.—A statement showing the costs awarded and the amount collected and the balance to be collected accompanies.

Of the total demand of Rupces 2,478-3-2, the amount collected is Rupces 84-3-6, and Rupces 2,393-15-8 have to be realized.

A greater portion (Rupees 2,234-13-0) of this balance is due by Kaliyappa Gounden, the defaulting purchaser of the Samalapuram tank bed land. On this subject, vide Revenue Board's Proceedings, No. 1,189, of 5th May 1876.

The recovery of this sum as well as a further portion of the said balance is doubtful.

On this subject I will address the Board separately.

31. SALE OF UNASSESSED WASTE LANDS.—During the fasli an extent of acres 0.30 of oorkut poramboke in the Chittravoothumpolliem village in the Dharapuram Taluk

was sold by public auction for cultivation and Rupees 65 were realized by the sale. The land was a portion of the site of the old Huzur Cutcherry at Dharapuram.

On the report of the Dharapuram Tahsildar that the building was in a ruinous and dangerous state, the Sub-Collector ordered the building to be pulled down and the site sold. There were no other sales of unassessed waste lands during the fasli.

32. SUB-DIVISION OF JOINT TENURE INAMS.—No such sub-division as that referred to in the Board's Standing Order No. 15 of 1868 has taken place during the fasli.

34. VILLAGE AND TALUK ACCOUNTS .- During the Jamabandi of the taluks which I settled I examined the village accounts. Generally they were properly kept, but in some cases corrections were not initialled, the accounts connected with the collection of the revenue were not prepared, the entries of the crops given in the cultivation and adangal accounts did not agree. There was also a want of punctuality in entering payments of revenue in the Kachat receipt books, &c. A principal reason for the existence of these faults and omissions is that the Revenue Inspectors are not confined to their principal legitimate duty of inspecting and checking the village accounts and cultivation. They are in many cases employed in inquiries that should be conducted by the Tahsildars. In fact, they perform work that formerly was the province of the "Revenue Peshkars." The Tahsildar's time is at present so much taken up with magisterial work and routine that he is not able to travel about as much as he should do, and in consequence cases that require personal investigation on the spot are transforred to the Revenue Inspectors for inquiry. I do not see how this can be remedied under the present system. The work must be done and the Tahsildar cannot do it himself, so it falls to the Revenue Inspector to the detriment of his own proper duties. At the same time Revenue Inspectors should invariably inspect the accounts of every village they visit, and I have specially warned them that any neglect to do so will be severely noticed. I propose to issue diglot printed slips containing the headings of the village accounts, and this will facilitate the checking of them by the settling officers at the Jamabandi.

During the fash under report, my Treasury Deputy Collector did not examine the taluk accounts as he had no time to do so owing to the press of famine work. Mr. Cole had also the revenue and magisterial charges of the cusbah taluk in consequence of which he was not able to leave head-quarters. I have since relieved him of both the revenue and magisterial charges of the taluk. 35. CROP STATISTICS.—As directed in the Proceedings of the Board, No. 3,417, of 26th November 1874, the returns of crop statistics are herewith forwarded, from which it will appear that 1,806,875 acres were cultivated with food-grains and 438,617 acres with other products.

The estimated outturn of the staple grains are :---

The extent cultivated with wheat is acres 2,040 and produce garces 138 against an extent of 1,661 acres and a produce of 81 garces in Fasli 1286. Drupire (cocoa and areca nut trees) cover an extent of 3,434 acres. The extent planted with sugar-cane was acres 1,204 against 2,853 acres in Fasli 1286 and that cultivated with cotton acres 156,190 against 140,393 in Fasli 1286. Plantains were cultivated on 1,797 acres against 3,323 acres in Fasli 1286.

The entire estimated value of the outturn is Rupees 2,40,58,900.

The crops were damaged by the excessive rains of October 1877 and the outturn was not as favorable as it would otherwise have been. It is, however, necessary to observe that this estimate of outturn is most unreliable, and is prepared without actual reference to the state of individual crops, but solely with reference to the extent of land cultivated and the condition of the season. The Curnum who prepares the returns for his village does not even know whether a crop (except cotton) is obtained on a particular field. This subject is engaging my attention.

36. SUB-COLLECTOR'S REPORT.—The Sub-Collector's report on the Jamabandi settlement of his division is herewith forwarded.

37. REMARKS ON THE CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATE OFFICERS.—Mr. MacWatters, my Sub-Collector, has as usual worked with zeal and efficiency and has been of the greatest assistance to me and my predecessor Mr. Wedderburn. Mr. Gordon Mackenzie, Head-Assistant Collector, who left the district on sick leave in May, is an able and painstaking officer. He was succeeded by Mr. Tremenheere who takes an interest in his division and with experience promises to be a valuable officer. S. Rungacharry, my Sheristadar, has given me entire satisfaction and has been of the greatest assistance to me. He has had very hard work as on him devolved the general supervision of the famine correspondence which of itself was sufficient work for one man. He has performed it thoroughly well in addition to his ordinary duties. Of the Tahsildars, C. Seetharamiah, Tahsildar of Palladam, and M. R. Venkataramanicr, Tahsildar of Erode, have as usual worked hard and given me satisfaction. The other Tahsildars and Deputy Tahsildars have with a few exceptions worked with a will and efficiently during the late trying season.

NILGIRI.

I HAVE the honor to submit a report on the Revenue Settlement of the Nilgiri District for Fasli 1287 (1878-79) accompanied by the prescribed statements.

2. TERRITORIAL CHANGES.—By G.O., No. 260, dated 19th February 1878, the villages of Arokode and Kokode were transferred to the Coimbatore District, and by G.O., No. 102, dated 12th January 1877, the lands on the southern slopes of the hills which had belonged to the Coimbatore District were transferred to the Nilgiri District. The putta lands thus transferred were 693.34 acres in extent as per village accounts, but on survey were found to measure 2,421 acres. On the transfer the increased area was therefore charged for and fresh puttas issued to the owners.

3. VILLAGES AND STATIONS AT WHICH THE SETTLEMENT WAS MADE.—The whole settlement was conducted by me. The following statement shows the places and dates on which the different divisions of the district were settled :—

Of the 430 fresh puttas issued during Fasli 1287, 305 were distributed for lands taken up under the Darkhast Rules in South-East Wynad and the villages of Sigur and Musnagudi in the plains; 69 puttas to heirs of deceased ryots; 49 owing to transfers; 32 to the ryots on the Mekunad slopes near Thaimallai transferred to this district by G.O., No. 102, dated 12th January 1877; 13 for lands granted as compensation for the Kodanad road (*vide* Government Order communicated with Board's Proceedings, No. 12,762, dated 15th September 1877); 10 were renewals for the Kurumber holdings beyond Kotagiri made under Board's Proceedings, No. 598, of 4th June 1872; 8 were issued owing to excess discovered by survey measurement, and 5 for lands previously assessed at grazing rates, but which were brought under cultivation and hence liable to increased tax.

The average rainfall for Fasli 1287 was 62.46 inches against 41.69 inches for the previous year, but it will be observed that in the latter year the rainfall at Gudalur for the nine months preceding the annexation of the South-East Wynad to the

Nilgiri District was not included as no statistics were available. Omitting Gudalur, therefore, from comparison, the statistics recorded at the other stations show that a greater quantity of rain fell in Fasli 1287 than in the previous year.

7. SEASON AND SANITARY CONDITION OF THE DISTRICT.—The remarks in my Administration Report for the past official year may be repeated here :—

"The rainfall was not evenly distributed and in parts it was either very scanty or too copious, thus retarding agricultural operations to a great extent.

"The season of the year was on the whole not favorable for agricultural operations although the fall of rain was above the average of the past few years. The south-west monsoon was a failure and the north-east monsoon commenced early and continued late. Some damage to the standing crops was occasioned thereby, but not to any considerable extent.

"Native cultivation yielded on an average a three-anna crop. In some villages there was total failure.

"The season was disastrous to coffee planters in the greater part of the district. The rainfall of March and April 1877 brought out a heavy blossom, which the drought that succeeded those months destroyed. The outturn was unusually light. The tract known as the Ouchterlony Valley in South-East Wynad does not come within the scope of the above remarks. The season there appears to have been particularly favorable to coffee. Mr. Rohde of the Balmadies estate writes ' that the weather in the different months was exceedingly favorable for our coffee crop, which was the largest that has been gathered since the estate was opened.'"

BIRTHS AND DEATHS.—The number of births registered in Fasli 1287 was 1,162, of which 591 were males and 571 females, against 647 males and 541 females registered as born in Fasli 1286. The deaths registered during the year numbered 2,925, of which 1,674 were males and 1,251 were females, against 2,350 in Fasli 1286. The heaviest mortality occurred among persons of the age of twenty to fifty years, and the principal diseases were fever, bowel-complaints and diarrhea, due to insufficient diet owing to the pressure of famine. There would seem to have been an increase under both the birth and death statistics during the year, but the return for the South-East Wynad for Fasli 1286 embraced the statistics for only three months subsequent to the annexation. A statement is appended to this report giving further details of information.

9. CATTLE.—The mortality among cattle during Faslis 1286 and 1287 was as follows:—

The large number of deaths was due to the deficiency of pasture until the southwest monsoon set in in the beginning of 1878.

During the fasli under report cattle-disease broke out in six hamlets. The number of cattle attacked was 188, of which 51 died and 137 recovered. The number of cattle attacked with disease during Fasli 1286 was 1,996, of which 1,457 died. The large numbers affected in this fasli was due to scarcity of fodder for cattle owing to the unfavorable season, but I have reason to believe that the statistics of Fasli 1287 are deficient and that many affected cattle as a rule escape the observation of Revenue officials. Cattle-disease Manuals, both in English and Tamil, have been extensively circulated.

10. DEDUCTIONS IN CONSEQUENCE OF TRANSFERS.—The particulars under this head are shown in the statement subjoined. In the previous reports the area and assessment on lands transferred from one person to another by purchase, &c., were shown under this head, but the course seems to me to be incorrect, and I have omitted such figures in tais statement :—

11. INCREASE IN THE RYOTS' HOLDINGS.—Lands transferred from one individual to another by purchase are similarly omitted under this head (*vide* paragraph 10) though it has been the practice to include such in previous reports. There was an increase in the area occupied during the year of 250 acres as compared with the previous year. The total assessment on the increased cultivation, however, was Rupees 3,509-6-7against Rupees 4,963-14-0 in the previous year. The reason for this apparent discrepancy is that the 2,421 acres transferred from Coimbatore to this district under G.O., No. 102, dated 12th January 1877, bore an exceptionally low rate of assessment. The original grantees of lands in this locality were Kurumbers, but most, I might say all of them, have now passed into the hands of coffee planters, Europeans and Hindus. The different items which contributed to the increase in the holdings are explained in the subjoined statement:—

This large decrease under the head of remission, amounting to Rupees 3,065, arises from two items. Lands entitled to five years' exemption have this year become taxable (vide Item 2) and no famine remission (Item 4) was given in this fash. The small increase of Rupees 110 under Item 3 was of course owing to more land having been taken up during the year which was entitled to the exemption. Taram Cummee of Rupees 1,998 (Item No. 5) is a fixed remission consequent on the reduced rate for grass land allowed in G.O., No. 1,656, of 22nd September 1871. This item was first shown in the accounts of Fashi 1283 and has continued to appear every year subsequently under, I understand, the authority of Board's Proceedings, No. 1,769, dated 26th October 1875. I gather this from quotations in former reports, but no copy of the same is forthcoming in the office, and I request that one may be sent to me with the Board's instructions, as it seems to me that as it is a permanent remission it may be omitted and a corresponding alteration made in the assessment on lands concerned.

15. PARTICULARS OF LAND REVENUE MISCELLANEOUS :----

The miscellaneous revenue shows, according to the above statement, a net falling off of Rupses 2,807.

The falling off under Item No. 2 was due to the circumstances that the sexennial instalment of arrears payable on the Karteri estates under G. O., No. 1,353, of the 11th August 1871, terminated with Fasli 1286. The sum of Rs. 28 entered under Fasli 1287 was previous assessment on lands the title-deeds for which were only issued to the purchasers during the year.

The demand on account of quit-rent on bungalows and gardens shows a decrease of Rupees 60. This falling off is due to the remission of quit-rent on a portion of Mr. Campbell's holding in Ootacamund (as per Board's Proceedings, No. 7,790, dated 2nd August 1878), which in previous years had been erroneously incorporated and charged for with another plot of that gentleman's property, and to the purchase of the Upper Norwood property by Government, on the site of which the present Government House has been built.

Sale proceeds of waste lands (Item No. 6) fetched Rupees 8,585, or Rupees 1,013 in excess of the amount for Fasli 1286. The increase under this item during the last few years was due to competition at auction sales owing to the rise of tea and coffee in the market and the consequent stimulus to the investment of capital in the cultivation of these products, and to realizations of instalments of purchase-money which the purchasers have elected to pay under Title-deed Form Y annexed to the Waste Land Rules. The particulars of the sales held during the fasli under report will be noticed further on.

The ryotwar revenue of Fasli 1287 appears thus in excess of the average of the past ten years by Rupees 27,587-3-9, but the statistics for the nine years preceding Fasli 1286 given above do not embrace the figures for South-East Wynad. Compared with the revenue of Fasli 1286, the figures for the year under report really only show an increase of Rupees 3,399 as explained in previous paragraphs.

The extent under wet cultivation on the Nilgiri during the year under report was the same as the previous year, but in South-East Wynad the figures for the year were respectively acres 1,227 and 2,258. This large difference arises from the fact that in Fasli 1286 the Wynad measurement of "Pothi" was taken to be equivalent to four-ninths of an acre upon information furnished by the lateSub-Magistrate of Vyteri, who was in employment in this office when the report for the previous year was under preparation. Subsequently, however, the "Pothi" measure has been ascertained to equal four-fifths of an acre and the area is so shown in the statement above. The decrease of Rupees 2,955 was due to the falling off in sales. The decrease under "Miscellaneous Abkári Revenue" was due as regards beer to the same cause, owing to the heavy duty imposed on its manufacture; this, however, has lately been bessened by the reduction of the duty from 4 Annas to 1 Anna when the beer issued for sale does not contain more than 6 per cent. alcohol.

The increase under Non-judicial Stamps was due to the large transfers of properties during the fashi under report.

The arrears on 1st December last under both Ryotwar and Miscellaneous were considerable. The large uncollected balance which remained on that date was, 1 need hardly say, owing to the distressed condition of the ryots during the previous two years from the failure of cultivation and the consequent heavy rain on their private resources for bare necessaries. The season of the year under report having been far more favorable than the three years which preceded it, the majority of the ryots are now in a position to clear off their obligations to Government. Since 30th November last a large sum of money has been recovered and credited, and I hope ere long to obtain payment of the residue.

The arrears under Abkári Revenue are due from the brewers whose short sales rendered their payments unpunctual.

The arrears recommended to be written off pertain to coffee estates in Southhost Wynad, where in almost all cases the tax is levied on the cultivated area only in the end of three years. The area taxed was estimated by the Deputy Collector of Wynad before the transfer of the tract to the Nilgiri, but the estimate has often been disputed by the owners and the tax reduced from time to time on production of the Survey plans showing the correct area under cultivation or on remeasurement by the Revenue establishment. The sum of Rupeos 1,099-4-1 given in the statement represents the overcharges on the estates concerned. I give below the particulars of the amount and the years to which they relate :---

A refund of Rupees 424 from Land Revenue was made under sanction of Board's Proceedings, No. 506, of the 25th February 1878, to the ryots in the Orange Valley, &c., who suffered from the drought.

The increase under "Salary of Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner" was due to the circumstance that Mr. Johnson officiated as Commissioner in March 1878, in the interval between Mr. Webster's departure to Coimbatore and my taking up charge of the district, and to the fact that in Fasli 1286 Mr. Comyn, who was Officiating Commissioner for about a month only, drew a reduced rate of salary of Rupees 1,200 a month.

The increase under "Tentage and House-rent" was owing to more frequent travelling by the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner, on account of the Forest Reserve and Cinchona Commissions, and to visit the benches of Magistrates at Kotagiri, Gudalur, and Devala.

The increase under "Huzur and Taluk Establishment" was owing to the charges for the Taluk establishment in South-East Wynad for the whole of the year being debited to this district, whereas in Fasli 1286 the figures quoted embrace only the charges for three months, the tract having been part of Malabar during the first nine months of the year.

The increase under Miscellaneous charges was due to the greater number of telegrams despatched during the year than in Fasli 1286.

The bulk of the increase under Abkári charges was due to payments for the construction of huts for the Police guards employed at the distillery at Mettapolliem and the depôt at Ootacamund—*vide* G.O., No. 2,497, dated 15th August 1877, and to payment of famine batta to them.

31. EXAMINATION OF THE VILLAGE AND TALUK ACCOUNTS.—The accounts produced at the settlement were found to be fairly kept, but the accounts and registers prescribed are not properly maintained in all the divisions. I hope to report more tayorably on this point next year.

32. LANDS HELD BY PUBLIC SERVANTS IN THE DISTRICT :---

33. CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATE OFFICERS.—Mr. Davis, Sheristadar and Manager of the office, resigned his post and the service towards the close of the fash. From my short experience of him, I consider him an officer of great ability, and from the certificites in his service register, he appears to have enjeyed the confidence of former Commissioners. Filling up this post entails peculiar difficulties, and the Board appointed my English Head Clerk S. Ramaswamy Iyer on probation for six months under the explanation given in my letter, No. 111, dated 19th August 1878. He has done exceedingly well, and in my letter, No. 9, dated 24th January 1879, I have requested a further extension up to the close of this year to enable him to pass at the next Special Test Examinations. Pressure of office-work alone has hitherto prevented his doing this.

The Fahsildars of Gudalur and Coonoor have both done fairly well; the former, I may say, particularly so. Of the Taluk and Village establishment I will say briefly that their conduct has been unsatisfactory, but, as the Board are aware, their emoluments are utterly inadequate. I am only waiting till I have a little more experience of the district to submit the revised scale of establishments ordered at paragraph 17 of Board's Proceedings, No. 2,373, dated 24th August 1878, with reference to my No. 96-A, dated 31st July 1878. Considering the responsibilities and duties of Monigars on 2 or 3 Rupees a month, personally interested in every land question, and checked only by a few ill-paid Revenue Inspectors, who, in their turn, have to perform many of the duties of Tahsildars and Deputy Tahsildar, the only wonder to me is that matters have not been worse, but as it is the frauds and loss to Government have been bad enough. The Curnam of Merkanad has escaped a criminal prosecution by his death, The Revenue Inspector and Curnam of Kundahs are both under suspension, and their cases are awaiting the order of Government—vide Board's Proceedings, No. 2,373, dated 24th August 1878, above quoted.

34. WASTE LAND RULES.—During the year nine sales of waste land took place at my office. The number of lots sold was twenty-three, aggregating acres 827.98. The price realized was Rupees 6,908, of which Rupees 782-13-8 were Survey charges, or at the rate of Rupees 8 and odd per acre. Subsequent sales show a decided tendency to a rise in the prices of lands.

Of the outstanding balance of Rupees 2,303 given in the foregoing statement, Rupees 68 and odd pertain to the sum of Rupees 1,099 recommended to be written off in paragraph 27 of this report. Sanction to write off the land cess of Rupees 68 will be requested in the Local Fund Report for the current year in accordance with the instructions of the Board.

36. EXAMINATION OF SUB-TREASURIES.—During the year the Coonoor Deputy Tahsildar's Treasury was examined once by the late Acting Assistant Commissioner Mr. Lewis McIver, and that of the Deputy Tahsildar of Gudalur by my predecessor Mr. Webster and the late Assistant Commissioner Mr. Knox. The result of these examinations was that the "stamps and balance of each in hand found correct."

37. The delay in submitting this report was explained in my No. 2, dated 8th January 1879.

I HAVE the honor to submit a report on the Revenue Settlement of the Nilgiri District for Fasli 1287 (1878-79) accompanied by the prescribed statements.

2. TERRITORIAL CHANGES.—By G.O., No. 260, dated 19th February 1878, the villages of Arokode and Kokode were transferred to the Coimbatore District, and by G.O., No. 102, dated 12th January 1877, the lands on the southern slopes of the hills which had belonged to the Coimbatore District were transferred to the Nilgiri District. The putta lands thus transferred were 693°34 acres in extent as per village accounts, but on survey were found to measure 2,421 acres. On the transfer the increased area was therefore charged for and fresh puttas issued to the owners.

3. VILLAGES AND STATIONS AT WHICH THE SETTLEMENT WAS MADE.—The whole settlement was conducted by me. The following statement shows the places and dates on which the different divisions of the district were settled :—

6. RAINFALL.—The rainfall during Faslis 1286 and 1287 is given in the following statement :—

सन्यमेव जयते

The average rainfall for Fasli 1287 was 62.46 inches against 41.69 inches for the previous year, but it will be observed that in the latter year the rainfall at Gudalur for the nine months preceding the annexation of the South-East Wynad to the

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Nilgiri District was not included as no statistics were available. Omitting Gudalur, therefore, from comparison, the statistics recorded at the other stations show that a greater quantity of rain fell in Fasli 1287 than in the previous year.

7. SEASON AND SANITARY CONDITION OF THE DISTRICT.—The remarks in my Administration Report for the past official year may be repeated here:—

"The rainfall was not evenly distributed and in parts it was either very scanty or too copious, thus retarding agricultural operations to a great extent.

"The season of the year was on the whole not favorable for agricultural operations although the fall of rain was above the average of the past few years. The south-west monsoon was a failure and the north-east monsoon commenced early and continued late. Some damage to the standing crops was occasioned thereby, but not to any considerable extent.

"Native cultivation yielded on an average a three-anna crop. In some villages there was total failure.

"The season was disastrous to coffee planters in the greater part of the district. The rainfall of March and April 1877 brought out a heavy blossom, which the drought that succeeded those months destroyed. The outturn was unusually light. The tract known as the Ouchterlony Valley in South-East Wynad does not come within the scope of the above remarks. The season there appears to have been particularly favorable to coffee. Mr. Rohde of the Balmadies estate writes ' that the woather in the different months was exceedingly favorable for our coffee crop, which was the largest that has been gathered since the estate was opened.'"

BIRTHS AND DEATHS.—The number of births registered in Fasli 1287 was 1,162, of which 591 were males and 571 females, against 647 males and 541 females registered as born in Fasli 1286. The deaths registered during the year numbered 2,925, of which 1,674 were males and 1,251 were females, against 2,350 in Fasli 1286. The heaviest mortality occurred among persons of the age of twenty to fifty years, and the principal diseases were fever, bowel-complaints and diarrhea, due to insufficient diet owing to the pressure of famine. There would seem to have been an increase under both the birth and death statistics during the year, but the return for the South-East Wynad for Fasli 1286 embraced the statistics for only three months subsequent to the annexation. A statement is appended to this report giving further details of information.

The large number of deaths was due to the deficiency of pasture until the southwest monsoon set in in the beginning of 1878.

During the fasli under report cattle-disease broke out in six hamlets. The number of cattle attacked was 188, of which 51 died and 137 recovered. The number of cattle attacked with disease during Fasli 1286 was 1,996, of which 1,457 died. The large numbers affected in this fasli was due to scarcity of fodder for cattle owing to the unfavorable season, but I have reason to believe that the statistics of Fasli 1287 are deficient and that many affected cattle as a rule escape the obsorvation of Revenue officials. Cattle-disease Manuals, both in English and Tamil, have been extensively circulated.

10. DEDUCTIONS IN CONSEQUENCE OF TRANSFERS.—The particulars under this head are shown in the statement subjoined. In the previous reports the area and assessment on lands transferred from one person to another by purchase, &c., were shown under this head, but the course seems to me to be incorrect, and I have omitted such there in this statement :—

11. INCREASE IN THE RYOTS' HOLDINGS.—Lands transferred from one individual to another by purchase are similarly omitted under this head (vide paragraph 10) though it has been the practice to include such in previous reports. There was an increase in the area occupied during the year of 250 acres as compared with the previous year. The total assessment on the increased cultivation, however, was Rupees 3,509-6-7 against Rupees 4,963-14-0 in the previous year. The reason for this apparent discrepancy is that the 2,421 acres transferred from Coimbatore to this district under G.O., No. 102, dated 12th January 1877, bore an exceptionally low rate of assessment. The original grantees of lands in this locality were Kurumbers, but most, I might say all of them, have now passed into the hands of coffee planters, Europeans and Hindus. The different items which contributed to the increase in the holdings are explained in the subjoined statement :—

SETTLEMENT REPORT OF NILGIRI.

This large decrease under the head of remission, amounting to Rupees 3,065, arises from two items. Lands entitled to five years' exemption have this year become taxable (vide Item 2) and no famine remission (Item 4) was given in this fash. The small increase of Rupees 110 under Item 3 was of course owing to more land having been taken up during the year which was entitled to the exemption. Taram Cummee of Rupees 1,998 (Item No. 5) is a fixed remission consequent on the reduced rate for grass land allowed in G.O., No. 1,656, of 22nd September 1871. This item was first shown in the accounts of Fashi 1283 and has continued to appear every year subsequently under, I understand, the authority of Board's Proceedings, No. 1,769, dated 26th October 1875. I gather this from quotations in former reports, but no copy of the same is forthcoming in the office, and I request that one may be sent to me with the Board's instructions, as it seems to me that as it is a permanent remission it may be omitted and a corresponding alteration made in the assessment on lands concerned.

The miscellaneous revenue shows, according to the above statement, a net falling off of Ruppes 2,807.

The falling off under Item No. 2 was due to the circumstances that the sexennial instalment of arrears payable on the Karteri estates under G. O., No. 1,353, of the 11th August 1871, terminated with Fasli 1286. The sum of Rs. 28 entered under Fasli 1287 was previous assessment on lands the title-deeds for which were only issued to the purchasers during the year.

The demand on account of quit-rent on bungalows and gardens shows a decrease of Rupees 60. This falling off is due to the remission of quit-rent on a portion of Mr. Campbell's holding in Ootacamund (as per Board's Proceedings, No. 7,790, dated 2nd August 1878), which in previous years had been erroneously incorporated and charged for with another plot of that gentleman's property, and to the purchase of the Upper Norwood property by Government, on the site of which the present Government House has been built.

Sale proceeds of waste lands (Item No. 6) fetched Rupees 8,585, or Rupees 1,013 in excess of the amount for Fasli 1286. The increase under this item during the last few years was due to competition at auction sales owing to the rise of tea and coffee in the market and the consequent stimulus to the investment of capital in the cultivation of these products, and to realizations of instalments of purchase-money which the purchasers have elected to pay under Title-deed Form Y annexed to the Waste Land Rules. The particulars of the sales held during the fasli under report will be noticed further on.

The ryotwar revenue of Fasli 1287 appears thus in excess of the average of the past ten years by Rupees 27,587-3-9, but the statistics for the nine years preceding Fasli 1286 given above do not embrace the figures for South-East Wynad. The extent under wet cultivation on the Nilgiri during the year under report was the same as the previous year, but in South-East Wynad the figures for the year were respectively acres 1,227 and 2,258. This large difference arises from the fact that in Fasli 1286 the Wynad measurement of "Pothi" was taken to be equivalent to four-ninths of an acre upon information furnished by the lateSub-Magistrate of Vyteri, who was in employment in this office when the report for the previous year was under preparation. Subsequently, however, the "Pothi" measure has been ascertained to equal four-fifths of an acre and the area is so shown in the statement above. The decrease of Rupees 2,955 was due to the falling off in sales. The decrease under "Miscellaneous Abkári Revenue" was due as regards beer to the same cause, owing to the heavy duty imposed on its manufacture; this, however, has lately been to seened by the reduction of the duty from 4 Annas to 1 Anna when the beer issued for sale does not contain more than 6 per cent. alcohol.

The increase under Non-judicial Stamps was due to the large transfers of properties during the fasli under report.

The arrears on 1st December last under both Ryotwar and Miscellaneous were considerable. The large uncollected balance which remained on that date was, 1 need hardly say, owing to the distressed condition of the ryots during the previous two years from the failure of cultivation and the consequent heavy rain on their private resources for bare necessaries. The season of the year under report having been far more favorable than the three years which preceded it, the majority of the ryots are now in a position to clear off their obligations to Government. Since 30th November last a large sum of money has been recovered and credited, and I hope ere long to obtain payment of the residue.

The arrears under Abkári Revenue are due from the brewers whose short sales rendered their payments unpunctual.

The arrears recommended to be written off pertain to coffee estates in Southhast Wynad, where in almost all cases the tax is levied on the cultivated area only of the end of three years. The area taxed was estimated by the Deputy Collector of Wynad before the transfer of the tract to the Nilgiri, but the estimate has often haven disputed by the owners and the tax reduced from time to time on production of the Survey plans showing the correct area under cultivation or on remeasurement by the Revenue establishment. The sum of Rupees 1,099-4-1 given in the statement represents the overcharges on the estates concerned. I give below the particulars of the amount and the years to which they relate :--

A refund of Rupees 424 from Land Revenue was made under sanction of Board's Proceedings, No. 506, of the 25th February 1878, to the ryots in the Orange Valley, &c., who suffered from the drought.

The increase under "Salary of Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner" was due to the circumstance that Mr. Johnson officiated as Commissioner in March 1878, in the interval between Mr. Webster's departure to Coimbatore and my taking up charge of the district, and to the fact that in Fasli 1286 Mr. Comyn, who was Officiating Commissioner for about a month only, drew a reduced rate of salary of Rupees 1,200 a month.

The increase under "Tentage and House-rent" was owing to more frequent travelling by the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner, on account of the Forest Reserve and Cinchona Commissions, and to visit the benches of Magistrates at Kotagiri, Gudalur, and Devala.

The increase under "Huzur and Taluk Establishment" was owing to the charges for the Taluk establishment in South-East Wynad for the whole of the year being debited to this district, whereas in Fasli 1286 the figures quoted embrace only the charges for three months, the tract having been part of Malabar during the first nine months of the year.

The increase under Miscellaneous charges was due to the greater number of telegrams despatched during the year than in Fasli 1286.

The bulk of the increase under Abkári charges was due to payments for the construction of huts for the Police guards employed at the distillery at Mettapolliem and the depôt at Ootacamund—*vide* G.O., No. 2,497, dated 15th August 1877, and to payment of famine batta to them.

31. EXAMINATION OF THE VILLAGE AND TALUK ACCOUNTS.—The accounts produced at the settlement were found to be fairly kept, but the accounts and registers prescribed are not properly maintained in all the divisions. I hope to report more tavorably on this point next year.

32. LANDS HELD BY PUBLIC SERVANTS IN THE DISTRICT :---

33. CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATE OFFICERS.—Mr. Davis, Sheristadar and Manager of the office, resigned his post and the service towards the close of the fash. From my short experience of him, I consider him an officer of great ability, and from the certiticates in his service register, he appears to have enjeyed the confidence of former Commissioners. Filling up this post entails peculiar difficulties, and the Board appointed my English Head Clerk S. Ramaswamy Iyer on probation for six months under the explanation given in my letter, No. 111, dated 19th August 1878. He has done exceedingly well, and in my letter, No. 9, dated 24th January 1879, I have requested a further extension up to the close of this year to enable him to pass at the next Special Test Examinations. Pressure of office-work alone has hitherto prevented his doing this.

The Tahsildars of Gudalur and Coonoor have both done fairly well; the former, I may say, particularly so. Of the Taluk and Village establishment I will say briefly that their conduct has been unsatisfactory, but, as the Board are aware, their emoluments are utterly inadequate. I am only waiting till I have a little more experience of the district to submit the revised scale of establishments ordered at paragraph 17 of Board's Proceedings, No. 2,373, dated 24th August 1878, with reference to my No. 96-A, dated 31st July 1878. Considering the responsibilities and duties of Monigars on 2 or 3 Rupees a month, personally interested in every land question, and checked only by a few ill-paid Revenue Inspectors, who, in their turn, have to perform many of the duties of Tahsildars and Deputy Tahsildar, the only wonder to me is that matters have not been worse, but as it is the frauds and loss to Government have been bad enough. The Curnam of Merkanad has escaped a criminal prosecution by his death. The Revenue Inspector and Curnam of Kundahs are both under suspension, and their cases are awaiting the order of Government—vide Board's Proceedings, No. 2,373, dated 24th August 1878, above quoted.

34. WASTE LAND RULES.—During the year nine sales of waste land took place at my office. The number of lots sold was twenty-three, aggregating acres 827.98. The price realized was Rupees 6,908, of which Rupees 782-13-8 were Survey charges, or at the rate of Rupees 8 and odd per acre. Subsequent sales show a decided tendency to a rise in the prices of lands.

The arrears of this cess were due to the causes mentioned in paragraph 23. Of the outstanding balance of Rupees 2,303 given in the foregoing statement, Rupees 68 and odd pertain to the sum of Rupees 1,099 recommended to be written off in paragraph 27 of this report. Sanction to write off the land cess of Rupees 68 will be requested in the Local Fund Report for the current year in accordance with the instructions of the Board.

36. EXAMINATION OF SUB-TREASURIES.—During the year the Coonoor Deputy Tahsildar's Treasury was examined once by the late Acting Assistant Commissioner Mr. Lewis McIver, and that of the Deputy Tahsildar of Gudalur by my predecessor Mr. Webster and the late Assistant Commissioner Mr. Knox. The result of these examinations was that the "stamps and balance of each in hand found correct."

37. The delay in submitting this report was explained in my No. 2, dated 8th January 1879.

I HAVE the honor to submit my Revenue Settlement Report for Fasli 1287 (1877-78) with the prescribed statements.

2. STATEMENT No. 1.—This statement shows the places where and the Officers by whom the settlement was conducted. I took up the two taluks of Namkal and Trichengode forming the General Deputy Collector's Division, the late Sub-Collector (Mr. Wilkinson) settled the taluks of Oosoor and Kristnagiri, and the Head Assistant Collector, Mr. LeFanu, the Tirupatur Taluk and the Shervaroy Hills Division of the Salem Taluk. The Special Deputy Collector, P. T. Rajagopala Chariar, conducted the settlement of the Salem (except Shervaroy Hills) and the Sub-Division Taluk of Dharmapuri, while the Acting General Deputy Collector, Vencatasubbayer and the Temporary Deputy Collector, Mr. Dawes, settled the taluks of Atur and Utankarai, respectively.

3. NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES.—In my report on the quinquennial statements for Fasli 1286, paragraph 2, I remarked that the total number of villages which appeared in the reports and statements of all the previous years did not represent the actual number of villages existing. The basis of the numbers so entered was the number in a statement originally furnished to the Board about Fasli 1230 where each range of a Curnam in the Talaghat Taluks of the district, which generally consisted of more villages than one, was entered as a single village. During the recent survey these ranges were not taken into account, each independent village being treated as such by the department, who, however, clubbed a number of small ones in view to facilitate the preparation of settlement accounts and maps. As the settlement rates and accounts have been in force for the last seven years the practice of entering the total number of villages on the old basis of Curnam's ranges serves no useful purpose, and I have therefore entered in Statement No. 1 the number of villages recognised by the Survey maps and Settlement Registers and proceed to institute comparisons below with reference thereto. सत्यमेव जयत

4. There is an increase of 331 in the total number of villages as compared with the previous fasli. This increase is the net result of an increase in the item Ryotwari (as above explained) and a decrease of (1) in the items Rented villages which is due to the surrender of the Chinnakalroyen hill jaghire village to the Puttagar under instructions contained in G.O., No. 402, dated 14th March 1878. The numbers under the remaining kinds of tenures are unaltered.

5. PUTTAS.—The number of puttas distributed in the fasli amounted to 188,467 showing a decrease of 342 puttas as compared with the previous fasli. The fluctuation being small does not call for any remark.

Looking to the details of the puttas there is an increase of 774 under "Fresh puttas issued," an increase of 14,842 under "Puttas modified," and an increase of 13,726 under "Puttas unaltered." The increase in fresh puttas is small, but the decrease in the puttas modified and the increase in puttas unaltered are due to the smaller amount of remissions granted in the fasli under report. 6. SEASON.—The season was favorable for wet cultivation, but not so for dry cultivation. The rains of April, May, and June, though partial and scanty, encouraged cultivation of the early dry crops, but the crops perished to a large extent by the failure of the rains of July and August. A small portion, however, revived by the copious rains which fell from September to December, but which being excessive the pulse crops materially failed and the later sown dry cercals returned but a poor outturn. The ravages of insects also contributed to decrease the yield of the dry crops. The wet crops, though they fared better suffered from blight. The average dry yield was a little less than quarter and the wet seven-sixteenths, the average all round for both dry and wet being five-sixteenths.

7. The following is an abstract of the average rain-fall in the district from April 1877 to March 1878 :---

9. There was a marked increase in all grains owing to the famine. The prices rose in July and August, but the rains in September and following months checked the upward tendency and since then prices have been either stationary or falling.

10. COMMUTATION PRICES.—The prices of grains have been very much in excess of the commutation rates, which are Rupces 91-10-8 for the upland or northern taluks and Rupees 100 for the lowland or southern taluks.

11. WAGES OF LABOR.--Like prices of grains the wages also increased or fell in proportion till the end of September. Labor was scarce except on relief works where the wages consisted of the money value of a certain regulated quantity of grain (rice) supplemented by a fixed money payment for condiments, &c. Since the rains of September when agricultural employment was resumed vigorously field labor was available, but there was no sensible diminution in the rates of wages in consequence of higher wages on Government relief works. The above refer to unskilled labor. Skilled labor was never at any time affected by the state of the season.

12. HEALTH.—As in the previous year the health of the people was sensibly affected by the prolonged famine. In the early part of the fashi large number of

Puttadars unable to hold out any longer resorted to Government relief and the number of emaciates increased and mortality also rose, but from October the number on Government relief, as well as the death-rate, decreased gradually, so much so that at the close of the fasli the numbers under both heads were reduced to their normal figures. The subjoined statement presents in one view the numbers on State relief and of deaths in the several months as contrasted with similar figures for the previous fashi :---

13. The chief causes of mortality have been fever, cholera, small-pox, and famine diarrhea. According to the death registers fever shows the highest number, 46,216; next in order come small-pox 12,662, cholera 8,920, and bowel complaint 8,699. The largest number is from miscellaneous causes, 52,956. The special census, however, taken in March gives a higher mortality.

14. CATTLE.—The sufferings and mortality amongst cattle were great in the commencement of the fasli owing to want of sufficient pasturage, but this did not last long as copious rains fell early in September when the mortality greatly diminished and their condition steadily improved.

15. REVENUE SETTLEMENT.—The operations of the Revenue settlement, which consisted of re-demarcation and fixing of Mitta boundaries were in abeyance owing to the impoverished condition of the ryots consequent on famine, and the subordinates of the department were therefore employed on Famine Relief duty.

16. RVOTS' HOLDINGS.—The area under occupation at the commencement of the fasli under report was 1,229,861 acres, assessed at Rupees 18,11,589; of this 23,554 acres, bearing an assessment of Rupees 29,338, were relinquished or transferred; while lands to the extent of 17,562 acres, assessed at Rupees 27,429, were newly taken up or received by transfer, &c., so that the total holdings at the end of the year amounted to 1,223,869, yielding a revenue of Rupees 18,09,680 and resulting in a net deficit of 5,992 acres in extent and of Rupees 1,909 in assessment. The above extents, both under "Lands surrendered" and "Lands newly taken up," are very much below the average of ordinary years. The decrease in the former was due to ryots' inability to pay up the Government demand in order to entitle their relinquishments to be accepted, while that in the latter has evidently arisen from the gloomy prospects at the commencement of the year and from the poverty-stricken ryots' inability to bear additional liabilities.

17. ACTUAL CULTIVATION.—The total area under actual cultivation during the fasli amounted to 938,466, bearing an assessment of Rupees 15,08,079, being 160,612 acres, with an assessment of Rupees 1,01,822 less than in the previous fasli. The decrease is due mainly to the impoverished condition of the ryots; but in some cases deaths and desertions contributed to this result. Looking to the details of dry and wet there is a decrease of 173,161 acres, assessed at Rupees 1,65,451, in the former and an increase of 12,549, with an assessment of Rupees 63,629, in the latter. This is accounted for by the fact that the rains were more seasonable for the wet than for the dry crops.

The area left waste was 285,403 acres, assessed at Rupees 3,01,601, as per margin, of which acres 3,297, with an assessment of Rs. 15,413 (being entirely wet), were remitted under the ordinary rules. The extent of waste shown under "Wet charged" was 8,947, bearing an assessment of Rupees 37,299, while that under "Dry charged" amounted

to 273,159, with an assessment of 2,48,889. All dry and wet waste, the assessment of which was wholly or partially remitted with reference to the instructions conveyed in Board's Proceedings, No. 921, dated 4th April 1878, is included in the above with mamool and other waste which was excepted from such remission.

19. FINAL SETTLEMENT.—The annexed statement contrasts the cultivation and settlement of revenue of the fasli under report with those of the previous fasli :—

It will be seen from the above that there is a decrease in dry and an increase in wet, the causes of which have been above explained—*vide* paragraph 6. The seasonable rains for wet cultivation account for the increase in water-tax, Rupees 5,848. The revenue from land-cess has risen from Rupees 1,68,098 to 1,69,630, the combined result of (1) the revision of the demand of the Permanently Settled estates and Jodigai Agraharams which showed a decrease on account of famine, and (2) of an increase in the demand of the cess on Ryotwari and Minor Inams including Miscellaneous, as the usual percentage deduction on account of village establishments has not been made this year from the same in consequence of the entire sum of Government contribution towards Village Service Fund having been deducted from Ryotwari revenue alone. No Village Service Cess was charged in the fasli under report, the collection being suspended until the accumulated balance of the cess in hand is expended—*vide* G.O., No. 1,584, dated 28th April 1878. There is an increase of Rupees 30,359 in the amount contributed to the Village Service Fund, which is due to a lump amount having been fixed at Rupees 1,20,000 by G.O., No. 47, dated 9th January 1872, instead of the varying annual percentage deduction which is calculated on the demand and which consequently in the previous year amounted only to Rupees 89,000 on account of large remissions granted for failure of crops.

20. ENCLOSURE B TO STATEMENT No. 3-SUGAR-CANE, COTTON, AND INDIGO.-The annexed is a comparative abstract of the cultivation of the special crops :---

The cultivation of these special crops shows a decrease in the two former and an increase in the latter. The decrease is due to the ryots having raised food crops on most of the lands usually cultivated with these crops on account of the high prices of the former, while the increase under indigo is to be attributed to the impetus given by the rise in the price of the article over the previous year. The difference between the figures in this statement and those appearing in the Administration Report is due to the fact that in the latter the acreage under these crops in Mittas was omitted as the information was not then available, whilst the same has been included in the former.

21. STATEMENT No. 4.—The subjoined statement exhibits the particulars of the remissions under all heads excepting wet waste remitted under the ordinary rules which has been already disposed of :—

Item 1.—The remissions were regulated by the rules in force and show a very considerable reduction as contrasted with the previous fasli due to the copious and seasonable rains.

Item 2 shows an increase over past fasli, the cause of the difference being that in Fasli 1286; a percentage remission was granted under this head on dry lands alone, while in the fasli under report the remissions included wet lands which yielded a short crop and were left waste on account of the impoverished condition of the ryots. The remissions were granted in strict accordance with the instructions contained

Board's Proceedings, No. 921, dated 4th April 1878. in the marginal Proceedings according to the yield of crops in the several tracts, each individual Landholder or Puttadar

being dealt with separately with reference to his holdings.

Item 3.—The decrease of 50 per cent. is due to the sufficiency of water-supply in several of the tanks which were dry in the previous year.

Item 4.—This occurred in the taluk of Namkal where the floods that came down the Tirumani river during the rains of September and October injured some of the wet cultivation on its banks.

Item 5.—The reduction in cowle remissions is due to certain lands over-grown with prickly pear in the Dharmapuri Taluk, and which were granted on cowle having been charged with full assessment.

Item 6.—The increase of 70 per cent. in "Teervacummi" or dry crop on wet lands, the water-supply to which is destroyed, is due to the breaching of certain irrigation works, especially in the Atur Taluk.

Item 7.—The Rupees 6 entered against "Fixed cowle" relates to a land not settled and on which a favorable assessment was charged on account of the unhealthiness of the locality.

Items 10 and 12.—The increase in Shrotriem and Dasabundam shares arises from the increase of demand consequent on extended cultivation in the villages to which they relate.

Item 11.—The cause of the enhanced contribution on account of village establishment has already been adverted to.

22. STATEMENT No. 5, MISCELLANEOUS REVENUE.—The aggregate miscellaneous Revenue of the fasli under report amounted to Rupees 90,139 as against Rupees 87,362, being an increase of Rupees 2,777 as indicated below :—

The increase in land revenue is due to the fact of no percentage deductions ou account of village establishment having been deducted as used to be done in the previous years, and also to the large receipts on account of commission for sale of lands in permanently settled estates under Act VIII of 1865. The increase would have been still greater but for the decrease in certain items, of which the following call for remark.

23. REVENUE FROM HILL VILLAGES.—There was an actual decrease under this by the surrender from the commencement of the fashi of the Chinnakalroyen Hill villages to the Pattagar with reference to G.O., No. 402, dated 14th March 1878, though the same (decrease) is not apparent from the statement consequent on the usual deductions on account of village establishment being omitted this year. 24. COMMISSION ON PRIVATE ESTATES UNDER CIRCAR MANAGEMENT.—No commission was deducted on account of management of the two estates under the management of the Court of Wards, as the available funds of the estates in the fasli did not admit of any payment for the same. The decrease and increase in other items of land revenue being small does not call for special explanation.

25. The increase under Abkári is due to a greater number of licenses having been granted for sale of European spirits than in the previous fasli. The decrease in stamps is due to the smaller collection on account of penalty on unstamped and unexecuted documents.

26. STATEMENT No. 6.—PERMANENTLY SETTLED ESTATES.—There is an increase of four in the number of Mittas and Poliputs as contrasted with the previous year. The increase occurs in the Dharmapuri, Krishnagiri, and Tirupatur Taluks. In the Dharmapuri Taluk the Velampatti Mitta was divided into two portions, one of which was brought to sale in the fasli under report for arrears of revenue due. In the Tirupatur Taluk the Kakankarai Mitta was divided into two divisions on the application of the proprietors concerned. In Krishnagiri the Kuntharapalli Mitta was made into three divisions, two of which were sold for arrears of revenue.

27. STATEMENT NO. 7.—DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE OF ALL SOURCES OF REVENUE.—The subjoined statement presents in a comparative view the particulars of the demand of all sources of revenue of Faslis 1286 and 1287 :—

There is a decrease of Rupees 8-6-7 in the demand of Mittas and Poliputs owing to the deduction of the assessment of certain lands taken up for the Tirupatur and Pudupett road in the Tirupatur Taluk from the Peishcush of the Mittas to which the lands respectively belonged—*Vide* G.O., No. 4,175, dated 26th June 1877, communicated in Board's Proceedings, No. 3,331, dated 17th July 1877. The demand of Shrotriem Agraharams is unaltered, but there is an increase of Rupees 63,328 in Ryotwari and of Rupees 3,219 in Miscellaneous. The increase in the former

is due to improvement of the season this year. The increase in Miscellaneous has already been accounted for. The difference of Rupees 267 in Ryotwari and of Rupees 11 in Miscellaneous between the demand as entered in the demand, collection, and balance statement for June, and the accompanying No. 7 statement is the result of an erroneous deduction in the

former from the beriz of certain villages of the above sums on account of Village Service Fund in excess of the fixed Government contribution.

28. ABKARI.-As in the previous faslis arrack and toddy were separate, the former was managed on the excise system, whilst the latter was farmed out. The quantity of arrack issued by Messrs. Wilson and Co., the renters, during the fasli was 60,705 gallons inclusive of milk punch, and the duty thereon exclusive of the allowance of 5 per cent. for wastage amounted to Rupces 1,44,171. Deducting the amount over-paid by the renters during the preceding fashi, viz., Rupces 939, the amount due by them for the fasli was Rupees 1,44,171, of which Rupees 1,35,286 was paid within the fasli which has been taken as the demand, the balance being included in the demand of the current fasli (1288). In their Proceedings No. 1,858, dated 30th May 1877, Government permitted the renters to pay duty on the actual quantity of arrack issued instead of the amount guaranteed by them, which amounted to Rupees 3,41,000 per annum. The sum of Rupees 1,115 shown against Miscellaneous includes the amount contributed by the renters on account of the Gauging and Police establishments attached to the distillery together with contingencies, as well as the fees realised for licenses granted for the sale of European spirits.

29. TODDY.—The rent of toddy was unaltered.

31. Permanently Settled Beriz.—The collections on account of current beriz amounted to Rupees 2,73,243 up to end of June, and to Rupees 3,40,674 up to end of September, leaving a balance of Rupees 1,07,758. The arrears of previous faslis amounted to Rupees 1,97,419, of which Rupees 1,59,293 were either collected or remitted within the fasli and Rupees 6,140 were subsequently collected by the end of September, leaving Rupees 31,986 to be collected on 1st October, so that the total sum outstanding against Mittas on the above date amounted to Rupees 1,39,744. This is distributed over all the taluks excepting Atur. The taluks against which the arrears are greatest are Namkal and Utankarai, the arrears in other taluks not being so heavy. Some of the estates most in default are under Government management, viz., Yerumapatti, Paliapoliem, Kadathur, and Bagalur. In respect of others division accounts are being prepared in view to selling portions in satisfaction of the arrears.

In the case of Kammenellur Mitta, against which Rupees 15,000 are outstanding, Government have permitted a suspension of the issue of coercive process till the end of Fasli 1288. Steps are being taken to sell the Kadathur Mitta against which there are similar arrears which have accumulated, potwithstanding the estate has been placed under management for two years. The chief cause of most of the estates falling in arrears is famine, in consequence of which the proprietors were not able to recover their rents.

32. Shrotriem Jodi.—The collections of current demand from Shrotriem Agraharam amounted to Rupees 15,670 within the fasli and to Rupees 5,204 from the end of the year up to end of September, leaving a balance of Rupees 21,159. The arrears of previous fashs, which amounted to Rupees 35,492 at the commencement, were reduced by collections and remissions to Rupees 14,725 at the end of the fash, and still further to Rupees 13,159 on 1st October, miking a total (including the bilance of current demand) of Rupees 34,318. Steps are being taken to realize these arrears by sale of the Agraharams concerned.

33. Ryotwari.—The collections within the fashi on account of current demand for Ryotwari amounted to Rupees 3,04,284, which with the subsequent collections up to September, viz., Rupees 2,94,770, left a balance of Rupees 7,10,437. The arrear collections amounted to Rupees 6,84,258, which added to the remissions, 17,234, and to subsequent collections up to September, Rupees 1,01,373, reduced the arrears to Rupees 4,07,090 out of 12,09,955, the amount outstanding at the beginning of the fashi on account of previous fashs. The total balance, including arrears and current, on 1st October was Rupees 11,17,527.

34. Miscellaneous.—Out of a demand (current) of Rupees 87,405, in Miscellaneous items of Land Revenue Rupees 21,262 were realised in the fasli and Rupees 14.396 in the three months following up to September, making a total of Rupees 35,598 and leaving a balance of Rupees 51,747. As regards arrears in these items, out of Rupees 86,710 outstanding on 1st July 1877, Rupees 30,212 were collected, Rupees 724 remitted in the fasli, and Rupees 5,751 collected subsequent to the close of the year up to September aggregating in all Rupees 36,687, and leaving a balance of Rupees 50,023, which added to the balance under "Current" results in Rupees 1,01,770. The total balance on 1st October under Ryotwari and Miscellaneous, including both current and arrears, was Rupees 12,19,297, or 45 per cent. of the demand.

35. The whole of the demand against arrack excise was collected, but as regards toddy out of a current demand of Rupees 1,27,730 and an arrear demand of Rupees 85,755, or a total of Rupees 2,13,485, Rupees 86,832 were realised before the end

of June, and Rupees 4,457 subsequently by the end of September; while Rupees 5 82,071 were remitted, so that the balance on 1st October was Rupees 40,125.* 5 Steps have been taken to realize this arrear, of which Rupees 16,700 are recoverable :

the remainder, Rupees 23,425, which is due by Velayadam Pillai, the ex-renter of the Salem Taluk, is not recoverable except by the sale of the Government Promissory Notes deposited by him, which will cover only a portion of the arrear-Vide paragraphs 16 and 20 of my Report on the Administration of Abkári revenue.

36. The receipts from Abkári, Miscellaneous, amounted to Rupees 1,115, the full amount and the demand.

38. The collections in all items (excepting arrack and stamps) show a marked improvement over the past fashi due to the comparatively improved state and prospects of the district in the fashi under report. In arrack there is a decrease owing to the demand being less than in the previous fashi. The small reduction in stamp receipts is due to the effects of famine on litigation.

39. STATEMENT No. 8.—The arrears of previous fashs on 1st October were Rupces 5,25,682, of which Rupees 22,078 are reported to be irrecoverable and are now recommended for remission; the remainder, Rupees 5,03,604, being either recoverable or doubtful. The sum now recommended for remission is only Rupees 9,317; the remainder, Rupees 12,761, having been already recommended for remission in the report for Fashi 1286. Out of the latter sum, Annas 6, has since been recovered.

41. I regret that the old arrears, however small, dating from Fasli 1276, still continue to appear in the accounts, and though I have no doubt they are all irrecoverable. Owing to press of other work I have not been able to go into the matter, but I have called on Tahsildars to furnish information regarding the same and hope to be able to clear them off within the end of the current fasli.

42. ENCLOSURE A TO STATEMENT No. 8 gives particulars of the coercive processes issued and the arrears in respect of which they were issued, together with those realised by sale of property.

43. The number of processes issued was more than double that in the previous fashi owing to the large arrears outstanding and to the improvement in the condition of the ryots.

44. The number of persons against whom processes were issued was 205,153 and the amount realised by sale of property was Rupees 23,254. The decrease in the realization, notwithstanding increase in the number of processes, was due to the fact that in the majority of cases arrears are paid directly the demand is produced and before attachment or sale.

45. INTEREST.—The amount realised as interest is considerably in excess of that in the previous fash. The increase is due to the extensive arrears outstanding, especially against Mittadars, and the large collections made and occurs only in Land Kevenue and Abkari.

46. There was no interest on general collections. which in the previous fashi consisted of interest on instalments under Y deed of purchase money of lands sold under the Waste Bules on Shervaroy Hills.

47. Rupees 410.7-0 was collected as interest on loans under the Land Improvement Act, but no interest was collected on account of advances for seed grain.

48. COLLECTIONS AND CHARGES.—The gross collections amounted to Rupees 19,00,820 and the gross charges to 2,21,062 as against Rupees 11,14,997 and 2,22,982, respectively in the previous fash. The increase in the former has already been accounted for. The variations in the minor items constituting the latter in comparison with Fashi 1286 do not call for special notice, excepting (1) Refunds, and (2) Charges on account of Collector, Sub and Head Assistant, Assistant and Deputy Collectors. In the former (Refunds) the decrease is due to the fact that in Fashi 1286 the sale proceeds (Rupees 12,500) of the Thorapalli Agraharam in the Oosoor Taluk were refunded to the purchaser, whilst in the latter (Charges) the employment of two Assistant Collectors throughout the fashi under report, and the confirmation of the Acting Sub-Collector contributed to the increase.

50. CROPWAR STATEMENT.—The statements relating to agricultural statistics are enclosed. The taluk and village accounts were scrutinized and were on the whole satisfactorily kept.

51. DEATH AND BIRTH REGISTERS.—The rate of mortality being abnormally high and that of births very much below the average, owing to famine, no efficient check could be exercised over the entries in the registers with reference to the rates furnished by the Sanitary Commissioner which are applicable only to ordinary years.

52. The revision of the village establishment having been completed a material improvement in the maintenance and reliability of these registers may be looked for so far as Government villages are concerned.

53. INSPECTION OF TALUK TREASURIES.—Owing to the pressure of work in the Huzur the Treasury Deputy Collector was not able to inspect any of the Taluk Treasuries during the year under report.

The decrease in number of puttas is owing to the relinquishment of lands on account of the bad season.

5. SEASON.—The fashi commenced in the height of famine. Prices were unusually high. Drought was experienced everywhere and wells, tanks, and all reservoirs failed to supply water sufficient *even* for domestic purposes, the consequence being that agricultural operations were entirely at a stand-still.

The early rains of May and June were light and partial, and it was not until September and October that there was a good downpour. The rainfall is contrasted below with that of Fasli 1286.

No erop yielded any appreciable outturn. There was a total failure in dry erops for want of scasonable, or owing to excess of unseasonable, rain.

Relief-works were in progress for the able-bodied and camps were open and gratuitous relief given in villages for the sick, infirm, and old. The Madras Famine Committee also helped the ryots of the Sub-division to a great extent in buying bullocks, seed-grain, &c.

The extent of land in the ryot's holding at the beginning of the fasli was Acres 394,622 assessed at Rupees 4,77,388, of which Acres 9,839 bearing an assessment of Rupees 10,507 were relinquished during the fasli against Acres 14,397 in last year, which was also a year of distress. The decrease under the head of relinquishment was owing to the inability of ryots to pay up the arrears due on the lands which they wished to relinquish. The land newly brought under cultivation is Acres 6,028 assessed at Rupees 8,905, showing a decrease of Acres 13,569 assessed at Rs. 12,220, which is attributable to the bad season.

Under the head "waste remitted" there is a decrease of Acres 7,718 assessed at Rupees 33,517 over the past fasli.

The item "waste charged" amounts to Acres 51,566 assessed at Rupees 49,685.

I HAVE the honor to submit the annual report on the settlement of the revenue of this district for Fasli 1827 (A.D. 1877-78) accompanied by the prescribed statements.

2. STATEMENT No. 1.—*Places at which the Settlement was made.*—The places at which the Jamabandi was held and the period taken up for the settlement of each of the five taluks in the district are detailed in Statement No. 1. The taluks of Cassergode and Kandapur were settled by me between 1st March and 30th April, those of Udipi and Mangalore by the Acting Head Assistant Collector Mr. Wynne between 6th February and 4th March, and the inland taluk of Uppinangadi by the Assistant Collector Mr. Hebbert between the 7th and 13th February 1878.

3. Pattas.—The total number of pattas held during the year under report was

39,445 against 39,082 in the preceding year, being an increase of 363, which consists of pattas issued for lands newly taken up for cultivation as well as those furnished to purchasers of old holdings and successors of deceased pattadars.

4. Rainfall.—The rainfall during the year was more copious than in the preceding year and amounted to inches 134.06, being an inch more than the average of the last five years. It was also seasonable, being fairly distributed except in the months of September and October when a heavy and continued downpour interfered with harvesting operations and caused some damage to the first crop.

5. Season.—The season was very favorable for cultivation, and the outturn of all the crops was satisfactory throughout the district except in parts of the Kundapur Taluk where the second rice crop was injured to some extent by insects. The excessive rain in September and October, though unseasonable for first rice crop, was favorable to the second and third crops as it contributed to keep up an ample supply of water and was most useful in renovating the cocoanut and areca gardens which had suffered from want of rain in the preceding two faslis. 6. Sanitary Condition.—The sanitary condition of the district was far from satisfactory. Cholera carried off nearly four times as many victims as it did in the preceding fash, notwithstanding relief was given by deputing medical subordinates to the localities most affected and distributing cholera medicines through the Police. As soon as cholera ceased fever of a severe and fatal type made its appearance, and instead of confining itself to the interior as usual extended to the sea coast. The mortality from this disease was nearly treble that reported last year. Relief was given to the sufferers by obtaining a large quantity of einchona bark and powder and distributing it to the affected localities, by which it is believed many lives were saved. Small-pox, however, was less virulent, and the mortality shows a considerable falling off, being a fifth of what it was in Fashi 1286. This may partly be ascribed to the immunity obtained by vaccination to which the people had submitted in great numbers during the fatal outbreak of small-pox in the preceding fashi. The number of deaths from other causes was also greater owing to the prevalence of dysentery and bowel complaints to an unusual extent.

9. Exports of Rice by Sea.—The quantity of rice exported by sea during the year was 55 per cent. in excess of the exports of the preceding fasli. 15. STATEMENT No. 4—Temporary Remissions.—The remissions of a temporary nature granted during the year amounted to Rupces 70,531, or Rupces 163 less than in Fasli 1286. The decrease is due chiefly to fluctuations in the following items :—

Item No. 9—Shamilat Banjar.—The increase under this head is owing to a certain extent of land returned as unoccupied last year having been partly brought under cultivation and transferred to this head during the fasli.

Item No. 11—Lands unoccupied.— The decrease in this item is due to certain wargs which had remained fallow, having been either wholly or partly brought under cultivation.

16. Cultivation of Special Product.—The only special products raised in this district are sugar-cane and cotton. The extent of land occupied by these crops is shown in the margin. It slightly differed from the figures for the preceding year.

17. STATEMENT No. 5—*Miscellancous Demand.*—The total demand on account of miscellaneous items of Land Revenue amounted to Rupees 65,978, being Rupees 16,194 less than that for Fasli 1286. This result is due chiefly to the falling off in the two items shown below :—

effect of discouraging this sort of destructive cultivation in Government jungles. The extent cultivated this year was consequently less, and the receipts which last year were swelled by the collection of the penal rate hardly came up to half the amount for Fasli 1286.

Item No. 51-Revenue derived from Coir, the produce of Amindivi Islands.— The decrease appearing in the revenue under this item has not arisen from the quantity of coir sold on the prices realized having been less this year, but is due chiefly to the receipts of Fasli 1286 having been enhanced by the adjustment in that year of the value of a consignment of coir (133 candies) made to Calcutta at the end of Fasli 1285:—

20. Excise on Spirits and Drugs.—The difference, Rupees 80, between the demand for the two fashis being small calls for no notice. The collections, however, on account of current and arrears amounted to only Rupees 92,573 during the year against Rupees 1,24,873 in Fashi 1286, being a difference of Rupees 32,300. This was owing to the failure of the arrack renter of Mangalore and toddy renter of Udipi Taluks to pay up their kists regularly on the plea of loss in their business.

21. SALT .- The revenue under this head has continued to decline, and during the year under report there was a further Fasli 1286, Fasli 1287. falling off of Rupees 1,09,322. This, IN. MDS. IN. MDS. 90,412 Salt imported 189,201 however, is to be attributed partly to the Do. sold by Government. 106,162 19,536 discontinuance of the Government sales (by which the difference between the duty Total ... 196,574 208,737 and the price was lost) and partly to the importations of a larger quantity of Bom-

bay salt upon which duty is prepaid at the port of exportation.

22. Wastage of Salt.—The information on this point is contained in the subjoined statement. The total wastage during the year amounted to Indian Maunds 885. The percentage was somewhat less than what it was last year. I have the honor to request the Board's permission to write off the accounts the above wastage as well as that for Fasli 1286, which amounted to 7,291 Indian maunds. Sanction was solicited in the Settlement Report for that fasli for striking off the latter quantity, but it has not been yet received :—

would be premature to express an opinion on its merits or demerits. An abstract of the licenses granted during the fasli is shown in the margin. Out of the 138 pans worked last year licenses were taken out for 114, of which, however, only 96

pans were worked. The manufacture having been commenced at a somewhat later period than usual, and the character of the season having been adverse the outturn amounted to only Indian Maunds 28,827 against Indian Maunds 118,328 in the proceeding fasli and Indian Maunds 63,756, the average of the past five years.

24. Sea Customs.—The revenue under this head shows considerable improvement. Though the amount of import duty fell off in consequence of the importation of a smaller quantity of Europe liquor this year the loss was made up by a large increase in export duty. The latter is chiefly due to large quantities of rice having been exported to dutiable ports, particularly to Goa.

25. Stamps.—There is an increase in the sale proceeds of both judicial and non-judicial stamps. The improvement in the former is small and cannot be ascribed to any particular cause, while the increase in the sale of non-judicial stamps is attributed to the greater number of loans and mortgages rendered necessary by the scarcity which prevailed during the fashi.

26. THE TOTAL REVENUE FROM LAND AND SUNDRY SOURCES shows a decrease of Rupces 1,05,626 compared with the figures for the preceding year as shown in the annexed statement, which, as already explained, is attributable to the falling off in the receipts under Land Revenue, Miscellaneous, and Salt : —

28. THE DEMAND, COLLECTION, AND BALANCE OF ARREARS are shown in the following abstract :---

Out of the balance of Rupees 6,550-12-0, Rupees 5,074-9-5 are recoverable and Rupees 1,476-2-7 irrecoverable. The former, which will be realized as early as possible, includes arrears of more than five years, amounting to only Rupees 4-1-11. Of this sum Rupees 3-6-1 was realized long ago, and through a misunderstanding in the taluk held in deposit as excess returnable to the parties, but the mistake has lately been discovered and the amount will be carried to the credit of Government. The balance, Annas 11-10, is the beriz due on Hackle cultivation by certain individuals who had left the village, and who after a long absence have returned and paid the amount lately :---

In last year's report the nature of the former sum was explained and sanction was solicited for striking off the same, but no orders having been received it has been entered in this report. the faslis noted in the margin, and as the defaulters concerned possess no real or personal property the amount is irrecoverable. Rupees 175-14-4* is the sum misappropriated by the Shanbogue of Manchi Tarf out of the collections made by him. The Shanbogue was tried and convicted under Regulation IX of 1822 and ordered to make good the amount, but being destitute of all means has undergone imprisonment. There is no prospect of this amount being realized.

The remaining sum of Rupees 33-0-7 is Kumeri assessment due by certain individuals for Fasli 1284. The defaulters are men of straw and are unable to pay the amount. Sanction may therefore be accorded for striking off the total of these items, amounting to Rupees 1,476-2-7, as irrecoverable.

8

29. COERCIVE PROCESSES.—Movable and immovable property, of the value of Rupees 7,906, was sold during the year for the realization of arrears of revenue, amounting to Rupees 40,247, against property of the value of Rupees 1,133 sold for arrears of Rupees 1,471 during the previous year. The increase is chiefly under Abkári and is due to the default of the Mangalore arrack renter.

30. COLLECTIONS AND CHARGES.—The collections and charges of the fasli under cach major head compared with those of the preceding year are shown in the subjoined abstract. The result is a net falling off in the collections of Rupees 1,58,811 and in charges of Rupees 32,438. In both cases the deficiency is due to fluctuations in the item of salt, although there were slight variations in the other items which will be noticed below :—

31. Land Revenue.—The charges under this head show a net decrease of Rupees 2,460, which is owing to the rice supplied to the Islanders in part payment of the price of coir having been purchased at Rupees 145-8-0 per corgi instead of Rupees 186 paid last year.

32. Sea Customs.—The net increase under this item amounted to Rupces 7,055, and is chiefly due to the whole of the cost of the amalgamated Customs and Salt establishment having been charged to this head.

33. Salt.—The monopoly system having been abandoned no purchases of salt were made during the fash, nor was there any occasion for transfer of salt from one depôt to another; no charges were therefore incurred on this account. The salt establishments in all places where there is no local manufacture were incorporated with Sea Custom establishment, and their cost charged to the latter head. All these causes contributed to the net decrease of Rupees 37,219 appearing under this item.

34. LANDED PROPERTY ACQUIRED BY PUBLIC SERVANTS.—During the fasli under report twenty-three public servants acquired landed property, assessed at Rupees 978-11-2, by purchase, inheritance, &c., and twenty public servants parted with landed property, assessed at Rupees 541-2-5.

35. Cost of Civil Suits.—A statement of costs incurred in civil suits for and against Government is enclosed.

36. TALUK AND VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.—The village accounts are kept in the new forms in pretty good order, and as the Village Accountants have become better acquainted with these forms fewer mistakes have been noticed.

37. EXAMINATION OF TALUE TREASURIES.—All the Taluk Treasuries were examined during the year. Those of Udipi and Kundapur by the Acting Head Assistant Collector Mr. Wynne, that of Kassergode by myself, and of Upperangadi by the Assistant Collector Mr. Hebbert. The Treasury of Kassergode and the accounts of the Mangalore Taluk were also examined by the Treasury Deputy Collector Mr. Leggatt. The accounts were, on the whole, found to be correctly kept. 38. AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS of the district will be submitted separately. The returns from some of the taluks not having been received complete information on the subject is not at present available.

39. CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATE OFFICERS.—Satisfactory.

I HAVE the honor to submit my report on the Revenue Settlement and Collections of this District for the past Fasli year 1287 (1877-78), accompanied by the usual statements as per accompanying list.

2. The Settlement of the district was commenced on 28th January and concluded on 21st May. The taluks of Palghat and Cochin were settled by me; the former

The places at which the distribution of puttahs took place and the period occupied in the Jamabandi of each taluk will be found on reference to Statement No. 1.

3. PUTTAHS.—The puttahs for the year numbered 174,400 in all, and, compared with those distributed in the previous year, show an increase of 976, which is the result of ordinary causes. In the number of fresh puttahs issued during the year there occurred a slight decrease of 174.

4. CHANGES IN THE NUMBER AND TENURE OF VILLAGES .--- No change whatever took place during the year in the number or tenure of villages. They are 428 in number, and are all of a Ryotwary nature.

5. SEASON.—The average rainfall of the year amounted to 123.47 inches, and in point of quantity contrasts favorably with that of the preceding year. The following

prior to my leaving the district on privilege leave, and the latter soon after I rejoined it. The Acting Collector, Mr. Buick, conducted the Settlement of the taluks of Kurambranad and Calicut ; while the Acting Head Assistant Collector, Mr. Underwood, attended to this work in the Valuvanad Taluk. The remaining taluks were settled by their respective Divisional Officers as shown in the margin.

abstract statement, exhibiting the average rainfall of the district for each of the past five years, shows that the rainfall of the period under report was, with one exception (1874-75), above that of the preceding four years :---

The season was a very peculiar one. The south-west monsoon seemed to be failing altogether in July, the month when there is usually the heaviest rainfall. Fortunately rain came in the end of the month, just in time to save the withering Kani crop. The season then changed its character completely, and the scanty rainfall in July was followed by excessive rain in August, September, October, and November. The harvesting of the Kani crop in September was thus interfered with, and there was a considerable loss. The Magarom crop reaped in January was however a good one, and the garden cultivation, which had suffered very severely from long-continued drought in Fasli 1286, was much benefited by the copiousness of the late rains in the year under report.

6. SANITARY CONDITION.—The health of the district was decidedly bad; the mortality from smallpox and fever having been very great. The want and occasional starvation caused by high prices, added to an unusually late and heavy monsoon, contributed to such excessive mortality. The following statement indicates the number of deaths from cholera, smallpox and fevers for each of the past five fasli years :—

Cholera appears to have been prevalent to a greater extent in the taluks of Cherakal, Kurambranad, and Palghat than in the other parts of the district. Towards the latter part of the year it made its appearance within the limits of the Tellicherry Municipality; but, fortunately, its progress was effectually arrested before it had had time to commit any serious destruction. The mortality from this disease shows a decrease compared with the two previous years. And, on the other hand, as it almost invariably happens, the mortality from smallpox manifests a corresponding increase.

7. PRICES.—The annexed figures show that the prices of food-grains ruled higher than in the previous year, which itself was an exceptional one, owing to the famine

in Eastern Districts. The adverse character of the early part of the season and the great demand for food-grains in Eastern Districts fully explain the cause of the rise in prices :---

The result of the year's Settlement will, on reference to the above statement, be found to be an increase of Rupees 22,931 under Ryotwary demand, and of Rupees 3,806 under Miscellaneous. Nearly one-half of the former is attributable to the fact that the remissions granted in the fasli under review were, unlike those of Fasli 1286, comparatively small, while the remaining half is owing to nunjah lands, coffee estates and gardens having been brought under assessment during 1287 for the first time and to increase in upland cultivation. The latter is due to the collections on account of escheat land having been larger than in the previous year. 9. WASTE REMITTED AND CHARGED.—A sum of Rupees 1,869 was remitted in the year on 1,347 acres of wet land left uncultivated, and an assessment of Rupees 3,561 was charged on 3,687 acres of dry and 1,343 acres of wet land.

10. GRANT OF COWLES.—The number of cowless granted during the year for the reclamation of land was 16, of which 13 were for 92 acres of wet land charged with an assessment of Rupees 190 and three for 21 acres of dry land.

11. REMISSIONS.—The exceptional character of the latter part of the season in Fasli 1286 necessitated the grant of heavy remissions in that year, but the same necessity having fortunately not occurred in the year under report the total remissions allowed only aggregated Rupees 8,113. This sum of Rupees 8,113 is made up of fixed remissions amounting to Rupees 4,104, and of temporary remissions amounting to Rupees 4,009, the details of which are contained in Statement No. 4.

12. COLLECTIONS.—Subjoined is a comparative abstract statement showing the collections under Land Revenue and sundry sources of revenue for the past two years:—

It will be perceived from the above statement that the total collections of the year amounted to Rupees 32,02,717 and exhibit a net decrease of Rupees 1,03,312 when compared with the receipts of Fasli 1286. The causes for variation under each head of revenue are briefly explained below :---

13. PERMANENTLY SETTLED.—The large increase of Rupees 55,250 observable under this head is due to the fact that, besides the compensation payable by Government to Sultan Ali Rajah on account of the Ameni Island for the three years ending with Fasli 1286 having been withheld and carried to the credit of Government in reducing the arrears of peishcush due by him, a further sum of Rupees 50,000, being the net income of the Rajah's Laccadive Islands held under Government attachment and management, was also realized and carried to the credit of Government.

14. REFERENCE MISCELLANEOUS.—The increase of Rupees 31,282 under Ryotwar is due to the prompt realization of the current demand as well as of arrears of previous years' kists and that of Rupees 3,571 under Miscellaneous to better collections of the sale proceeds of escheat lands.

15. ABRARI.—The revenue under Abkari exhibits a satisfactory increase of Rupees 46,844 which is due to the realization of the large balances which were outstanding at the close of Fasli 1286.

16. SALT.—The decrease under this head swamped the increase under all other heads and left a net decrease of over a lakh of rupees as compared with Fasli 1286. The introduction of the excise system, the consequent cessation of sales of monopoly salt from 1st November 1877, and the prepayments at Bombay and Madras of the duty leviable on supplies sent to this district, fully account for the large decrease. There was however no real loss, but a very large gain, to Government by the changes; for 443,785 Indian maunds of duty-paid salt were sold from the stores or imported by sea and rail into the district in place of 299,109 Indian maunds sold from the Government warehouses in the previous year. The introduction of the Excise Act made it at last possible to deal effectually with illicit manufacture of salt. The consumption of duty-paid salt was thus increased.

17. SEA CUSTOMS.—The Sea Customs revenue of the district resulted in an increase of Rupees 19,364. This is due to larger importations of liquor, oilmanstores and metals having been made in the year under review than in that preceding it.

18. LAND CUSTOMS AND STAMPS.—The decrease observable under the head of "Land Customs" and the increase under "Stamps" are triffing and call for no special notice.

19. COERCIVE PROCESS.—Processes were issued against 26,069 defaulters for a total arrear of Rupees 2,53,738; but recourse to further coercive measures was only found to be necessary in 322 cases for an outstanding of Rupees 19,606. Compared with the previous year, both the number of processes issued and the amount of arrears involved were in excess; but this could not be avoided.

20. BALANCES.—The balances outstanding at the close of the year aggregated only Rupees 71,407, of which Rupees 54,295, occurring under the heads of Land Revenue and Abkari, appertain to the period under review. Of the latter amount a sum of Rupees 23,619 has been realized since the year closed, thus reducing the year's arrears to Rupees 30,676, half of which is owing by Sultan Ali Rajah of Cannanore.

The arrears of previous years remaining uncellected amounted to Rupees 17,112, of which a small sum of Rupees 782 was recovered after the year had terminated. More than three-fourths of this balance is due by Sultan Ali Rajah whose Laccadive Islands still continue to be held under sequestration for the liquidation of his arrears to Government.

In my last Settlement Report, a sum of Rupees 1,757-13-0 was recommended to be written off the accounts as irrecoverable in Fasli 1286. Of this amount Rupees 1,055-6-11, being the assessment leviable on the three Amshoms of the Wynad Taluk transferred to the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of the Nilgiris, has already been removed from the accounts, leaving a balance of Rupees 702-6-1 as to which the orders of Government are still awaited. To this is to be added a sum of Rupees 26-14-7 found irrecoverable in the year under report. The particulars of both these sums are noted below:—

I request that the sanction of Government may be accorded to the amount of Rupees 728-14-7 being expunged from the accounts.

21. CHARGES.—The total charges of the year amounted to Rupees 3,39,950, and, contrasted with the proceeding year's outlay, exhibit a net increase of Rupees 13,238. This rise in the expenditure occurs under several heads and its chief causes are that, under the orders of Government dated 28th June 1877, No. 2,142, a large sum of money, collected in previous years as Import duty on Laccadive coir, had to be refunded, while the appointment of a higher-paid Deputy Collector to this District, as Treasury Officer, and of an extra Assistant about the middle of the year contributed to swell the charges.

Another cause which also led to the increase above referred to is the entertainment of the preventive establishment lately sanctioned for guarding against infringements of the Salt laws.

The charges bear a percentage of 10.61 to the gross collections of year, viz., Rupees 32,02,717.

23. EXAMINATION OF TALUK AND VILLAGE ACCOUNTS.—The Taluk and Village accounts were examined by the officers conducting the Settlement and found to be kept generally correct.

24. EXAMINATION OF TALUK TREASURIES UNDER BOARD'S STANDING ORDER, No. 8 of 1874.—The Taluk Treasuries at Ponani, Cochin, and Palghat were examined by the Treasury Deputy Collector in the month of April last, and everything was found correct.

25. REMARKS ON THE CONDUCT OF SUBORDINATES.—Two of the most experienced Revenue Officers, M. Kuni Ramen Vydhiar, Huzur Sheristadar, and S. Rama Kini, Tahsildar of Ponani, retired from the service at the close of the fasli, and I wish here to place on record my high appreciation of the value of the services which they rendered to the State during a long series of years. They, as well as all other subordinate officers, did their duty well throughout what proved to be a very trying year.

SUB-COLLECTORATE.

I HAVE the honor to report, as customary, on the Jamabandi Settlement of the Subdivision for Fasli 1287.

2. Before the usual season for commencing the Settlement it had been arranged by you to take up the Jamabandi of Kurambranad Taluk, leaving Cherakal and Kotayam to me. Accordingly, I made the usual Settlement of Kotayam Taluk as Sub-Collector and of Kurambranad Taluk, during your absence, as Acting Collector. Cherakal Taluk was settled by Mr. Overbury, who had charge of the division temporarily.

The Settlement was commenced by me at Kanoth, in the Kotayam Taluk, on 28th January, and was terminated by Mr. Overbury at Taliparamba, in Cherakal Taluk, on the 28th March.

3. The following are the places at which puttahs were distributed, and the time occupied in distributing them in each taluk :---

The number of puttahs issued during the year was 3,756 against 3,918 in the preceding year, showing a decrease of 162. Of these, 934 were new ones, and the remainder 2,822 were old ones, in which alterations were found to be necessary owing to the death of Puttadars, transfers, remissions, and resumptions of temporary remissions of the assessment.

4. The rainfall of the year as compared with that of the previous fasli is given below :---

Taking the division as a whole the fall was 20 inches more than in Fasli 1286. It was heavier in the north than in Kurambranad, but no portion of the division had reason for complaint on account of the season which was decidedly a good one. Excellent Kani and Magarom harvests were secured, and the former particularly was decidedly above the average. As a consequence, no general remission of assessment was necessary. Only those occasional and temporary remissions, usually given in consequence of assessed trees having passed out of bearing, were required.

5. The public health was much the same as in the previous year. Cholera, which commenced in Fasli 1286, continued epidemically during the greater part of the year, and 2,474 persons fell victims to it. Smallpox was also prevalent, but only in a sporadic form. As was to be expected from the progress from south to north, which has been well marked during the last three years, Cherakal Taluk suffered most. The casualties registered under Cholera and Smallpox in the three taluks are—

12. The three-years' Abkari lease ended with the fasli. The Contractor for Kurambranad Taluk allowed during the fasli a large arrear of Rupees 9,550 to accrue, in consequence of which his farm was resold at his risk for the remaining period of his lease, viz., three months from April to June 1878. 14. The interest on the arrears amounts to Rupces 49 against Rupees 732-1-10 for the last fash. This very noticeable decrease was principally owing to the strict collection of the revenue as it fell due. Balances were not allowed to accumulate, and so the collections were the more easy.

15. The total demand for the fasli, under all heads, was Rupees 6,76,503-11-7. Of this, Rupees 6,58,717-10-5 were collected before the close of the fasli. The balance outstanding was Rupees 17,786-1-2. Of this sum, Rupees 15,000-0-11 represent the peshcush due by Sultan Ali Rajah of Canuanore, the collection of which, since the sequestration of the Laccadives, I am not considered responsible. Rupees 786-0-3 was due by the Avinjat Family in Kurambranad Taluk. The remainder Rupees 2,000 was nominally due by the Arrack Contractor of Cannanore being covered in full by his deposit, the adjustment of which is now being arranged for.
