SIR,

I am directed to submit, for the consideration and orders of the GovernNo. 60, dated the 18th November ment of India, a letter from the Commissioner of Berar cited in the margin forwarding Major Garrett's report on the revision of the existing settlement of the Daryapur taluk of the Ellichpur district.

2. I am to express the Resident's concurrence in the proposal made by the Director of Land Records and Agriculture, and which the Commissioner supports, that the entire taluk should be placed in a single group instead of in three groups as was done at the original settlement. On the question of the maximum rate to be applied to this group, the Resident thinks that the Daryapur taluk, like the Akot taluk, could well bear a higher rate than Rs. 2-12-0 per acre. As, however, the Government of India for the reasons stated in your letter No. 214-29, dated the 20th July 1897, have decided that Rs. 2-12-0 per acre is an adequate rate for Akot, Mr. Chichele-Plowden recommends that the same rate be fixed for Daryapur. The revision settlement should continue in force for the periods specified in paragraph 35 of Major Garrett's report. The favour of early orders is requested.

I have the honour to submit for the orders of the Resident the Revision Settlement Report of the Daryapur taluk of the Ellichpur district by Major R. V. Garrett, Officiating Director of Land Records and Agriculture, Hyderabad Assigned Districts.

- 2. The Deputy Commissioner of Ellichpur has forwarded it without a remark.
- 3. The Daryapur taluk as at present constituted consists of 273 villages originally settled as follows:—

69 villages in 1868-69, 5 villages in 1871-72, 4 do in 1872-73,

so that the current settlement of 69 villages expires on July 31st, 1898, and the introduction of the new rates in these villages requires to be made before that date in order to recover the revised rates in the year 1898-99. In the remaining villages the revised rates will be recovered in subsequent years as the period of settlement falls in.

4. Owing to transfer from Akot and Ellichpur the taluk has increased from 185 villages to 273 during the period now expiring. The taluk adjoins the Akot taluk of the Akola district on the west boundary, and is in almost every respect similar to it in character. On the north it is bounded by the Melghat taluk and the Satpura chain of hills, on the south by the Purna river and the Murtizapur taluk of the Amraoti district, and on the east by the Amraoti and Ellichpur taluks.

Its greatest length from north to south is 28 miles and its greatest width is 26 miles, and it has an area of 505 square miles.

- 5. It is now well wooded with mange groves and other trees, and in this respect has improved upon its condition as reported by Major Elphinstone in 1869, and this may, perhaps, be taken as a sign of its prosperity as indicated by that officer in paragraphs 5 and 6 of his report.
- 6. The average rainfall of the last ten years is 35½ inches, or a little above that of Akot, and is particularly favourable to the agricultural character of the soil, which is rich black soil, particularly suitable to cotton and jowari cultivation.
- It is well watered by the Purna, Chandrabhaga, Shahnur, and Bordi rivers, and is in every respect equal to the Akot taluk in its natural advantages for cultivation, as will be seen from the fact that only 12 acres remain unoccupied, available for cultivation.
- 7. There is a good road metalled and bridged from Daryapur, the chief town to Murtizapur on the Great Indian Peninsula Railway, distant 14 miles. The river Purna is unbridged, but presents no difficulty, except occasionally in the rains, when a flood comes down. A good country road runs from Daryapur to Amraoti and another to Anjangaon, a large bazar on the north on the road between Ellichpur and Akot. Communications throughout the taluk by good fair weather roads are ample and easy.
- 8. There are no very large towns in the taluk, but there are 25 markets, of which Anjangaon is the chief. There is a considerable timber trade in bamboos and poles from the Melghat forests. There are no manufactures to speak of, the tract being purely agricultural.

- 9. The statistics given in paragraph 13 of the Director's report show steady progress and prosperity. An increase of 26 per cent. of population, 13 per cent. of houses, 34 per cent. of carts, and 38 per cent. of wells speaks for itself. The only items that show a decrease are agricultural cattle and horses, and this is easily explained by the entire absence of grazing and fallow land. Only just sufficient cattle for agricultural purposes are kept in the taluk, while the large grazing areas adjoining in the Melghat supply such as may be kept in reserve.
 - 10. The number of schools has risen from 7 to 79 in 30 years.
- 11. In paragraph 15 et seq the statistics regarding the value of land show that it sells for nineteen times the Government assessment at compulsory sales, and sublets for three times the Government assessment. These figures are much the same as have been ascertained in the taluks already assessed.
- 12. As regards prices, the figures given in paragraph 24 show but a slight rise with very trivial fluctuations, excluding the year of high prices which has just elapsed.

The revenue of the taluk is shown to have been collected without the slightest difficulty, and cultivation has reached its extreme limit, no more land being available.

- 13. On the facts shown the Director of Land Records considers it impossible to doubt that the past settlement period has been one of increasing wealth and prosperity.
- 14. As in previous reports, the old and proposed rent-rate groupings are illustrated by coloured maps, which show the comparative results.

This grouping followed that of the Akot taluk, and for the reasons given in my report on the revision settlement of that taluk seems anomalous and unsatisfactory, and the reasons given for it by Major Elphinstone in paragraph 71 of his report are scarcely sufficient. Major Garrett has followed his own proposals for Akot in making only one group for the whole Daryapur taluk, leaving the soil classification to adjust local differences of production and value. I don't think there can be any question but that he is right. I will not repeat the reasons I have already stated at length in my forwarding letter on the Akot report, but simply express my entire concurrence in the conclusion arrived at by Major Garrett that it is impossible to sub-divide the taluk into groups without inequalities which would be unjust and irrational. As the single group has been accepted for Akot, there is no reason why any other treatment should be accorded to Daryapur.

- 16. The future group rate for this single tract has presented a difficulty to Major Garrett, which seems to me rather unnecessary in view of the fact that he himself proposed Rs. 2-12-0 for the Akola taluk; and his reason that the Murtizapur taluk, which comes next under revision, can scarcely be rated lower than Daryapur, though it adjoins Akola, is not a good one. For the tract north of the Purna, which comprises Akot and Daryapur, differs in many respects from the southern country which comprises Akola and Murtizapur.
- 17. There can be no doubt in my opinion of the superiority of the Akot and Daryapur taluks over Murtizapur and Akola. They differ in natural advantages, and I shall be much surprised if Major Garrett in his inspection of Murtizapur does not find it somewhat inferior to Daryapur, except that portion which lies between the Purna and the railway—a narrow tract.

The past year of famine has much confirmed my opinion as to the relative value of land north and south of the Purna river. Without any noticeable variation in the amount of rain that was registered, the crops north of the Purna were infinitely superior to those south of that river, and the people of Daryapur and Akot were much better able to meet the distress than those of Murtizapur and Akola. I should have no hesitation in putting Daryapur and Akot on a higher level than Akola and Murtizapur, and I believe the higher rate of Rs. 2-12-0 has received justification from the facts of the past year.

18. Major Garrett has no doubt not proposed Rs. 2-12-0, the rate sanctioned for Akot, which he admits is likely to be the accepted rate, because he wishes to be consistent with his previously expressed views; but I think that with the reasons given for the higher rate before him in the orders on Akot he would have done better to accept the higher rate.

One of those reasons was that in Daryapur, as in Akot, a higher rate could be imposed, and I have therefore no hesitation in recommending that Rs. 2-12-0

be the rate for the single group in Daryapur.

- 19. The percentage of increase at Rs. 2-10-0 per acre gives an enhancement of 22-1 per cent. on the present revenue, while Rs. 2-12-0 would give an increase of 27-9 or Rs. 1,32,416 per annum, which in no way transgresses the rule regarding increased assessments.
- 20. The whole of the Daryapur taluk is in my opinion quite on a par with Akot. Its soil and agricultural capabilities are quite as good, and its accessibility to the Great Indian Peninsula Railway is perhaps superior. The Murtizapur railway station is a large station with every facility for the transport of goods and only 24 miles from Akola, which railway station is about the same distance from Daryapur as it is from Akot.

Under the circumstances I see no reason for applying a lower rate to Daryapur than that sanctioned for Akot, and I therefore recommend the same rate of Rs. 2-12-0 per acre.

21. In order that the assessments may be published before the 31st July early orders are requested on this report.

I have the honour to submit herewith, for the consideration and approval of the Local Government, my Revision Settlement Report on the Daryapur taluka of the Ellichpur district.

2. Daryapur is the first taluka of the Ellichpur district to come under revision settlement. It consisted originally of 178 khalsa villages, 6 palampat villages, and 1 jagir village.

Since the settlement, however, Anjangaon has been separated, and its eight khels taken as separate villages, numbered from 194 to 201 on the taluka map; Kumbhargaon has been divided into Kumbhargaon Buzruk and Kumbhargaon Khurd, numbers 144 and 145 on the taluka map; Pohi has been divided into Pohi and Shekapur, numbers 220 and 221 on the taluka map; and Khirgowhan has been divided into Khirgowhan and Samsherpur, numbers 234 and 235 on the taluka map. This adds 10 villages to the 178 khalsa villages, making a total of 188. Besides this, during the period of settlement, the taluka has received 71 villages transferred to it from Akot; and 9 villages, including Dahigane with its four khels, transferred to it from Ellichpur. Two villages have been transferred from Daryapur to Murtizapur. The taluka has thus been increased by 78 villages in transfers, and now consists of 273 villages as follows:—

266 khalsa villages.
6 palampat villages.
1 jagir village.

Dates of settlement.

3. These villages were originally settled as follows:—

69 villages in 1868-69. 188 villages in 1870-71. 5 villages in 1871-72.

4 villages in 1872-73.

In the first batch of 69 villages the settlement will expire on the 31st July 1898, and in the second batch of 188 villages it will expire on the 31st July 1900. The last two small batches of five and four villages will complete their period of settlement in 1901 and 1902 respectively. The introduction of the new rates requires to be made before the 31st July 1898 in order to recover the revised rates in the first batch of 69 villages in 1899.

4. Six villages were entirely remeasured, and the classification in nine villages was personally tested by mys elf; the old work was found to be perfectly relia ble, and was therefore confirmed. The field was commenced in October 1896 and concluded in March 1897.

5. Daryapur taluka lies to the east of the Akot taluka. On the north it abuts for a short distance only on the Melghat. Ellichpur and Amraoti talukas bound it on the east, and Murtizapur and Akola on the south. From the last three mentioned talukas Daryapur is separated by the river Purna.

From the Melghat to the Purna, Daryapur is some 28 miles from north to south. Its greatest breadth from west to east is 26 miles, but this diminishes both northward and southward, especially in the former direction, where the breadth of the taluka on the Melghat boundary is only some 10 miles. The area of the taluka is 505 square miles. The general aspect of the country is 8.682-[G.C.F.]

typical of the valley of Berar; it is a level open fertile plain of rich productive soil. The scarcity of trees noticed by Major Elphinstone in his settlement report of 1869 does not, I think, now exist. All round Daryapur itself the country is well wooded; the eastern portion of the taluka in the neighbourhood of Adul, Zewde, Wadner is amply covered with trees, while in the north the country, like Akot taluka, is beautifully wooded.

- 6. The Purna river bounds Daryapur taluka on part of its eastern and the whole of the southern border, flowing westward. The Chandrabaga flows southwest past the towns of Khallar, Daryapur, and Wanosa, and joins the Purna at Dhamne Khurd. The Shahnur and the Bordi rivers flow through the length of the taluka from the north southward; they join close to Adul, and effect a junction with the Purna in Akot taluka. These rivers all hold water throughout the year. Their chief characteristic is their liability to floods during the rainy season, which sometimes causes damage to property on their banks.
- 7. The average registered rainfall for the past ten years shows Daryapur somewhat above Akot on the west, and a little below Amraoti on the cast. The highest recorded rainfall in the decade was 59 inches 71 cents in 1887, followed by 54 inches 54 cents in 1892. The lowest was 20 inches 79 cents in 1888 and 25 inches 41 cents in 1896. The average for the ten years is 35 inches 53 cents. As regards rainfall and the quality of the soil, the prosperity of Daryapur taluka seems assured.

8. I give below a summary taken from appendix B showing the details of the cultivation of the crops in the taluka:—

The cotton cultivation occupies 112,519 acres and jowari 75,075 acres; the two together account for 65.4 per cent. of the area under cultivation; 42,724 acres are devoted to wheat and 28,494 acres are under linseed; these two absorb 24.8 per cent., leaving only 9.8 per cent. for all other crops, of which tur is the most important, occupying 7,913 acres, or 2.8 of the whole. Gram and lakh account for 5,603 acres and 4,293 acres respectively. The rest are insignificant. The area under grass or fallow is very small indeed, being only 2,892 acres, or 1 per cent. of the whole. The small amount of land allowed for fallow was remarked on by Major Elphinstone in his settlement report in 1869.

9. There is one good made road under the Department of Public Works running from Daryapur due south to Murtizapur, an important town on the railway, with which there is large traffic. This road has a length of 7 miles within the taluka.

A good local fund road connects Daryapur with Amraoti with a length of 14 miles within the taluka. Another road runs from Daryapur northwards to Anjangaon, a distance of 18 miles, and Anjangaon is connected with Ellichpur. Besides these, the fair-weather roads all over the country are numerous, and communication throughout is perfectly easy.

10. Markets are held at 25 different villages in the taluka, which give an average of one market town to about 11 villages, or one market to every 20 square miles.

The most important is at Anjangaon in the north, where all kinds of commodities, including grain, groceries, clothes, timber, live-stock, and pottery, are

obtainable. The value of the trade is estimated at Rs. 4,650 weekly.

Wanosa in the south close to Daryapur supplies all wants, and has a weekly trade estimated at Rs. 2,927. Four other markets, namely, Kokarde, Chandrapur, Adul, and Kodatkhed, have a weekly trade varying from about Rs. 550 to close upon Rs. 1,000.

In nine others the trade varies from Rs. 200 to nearly Rs. 400, and the

remaining ten are small markets with trade below Rs. 200 weekly.

The weekly markets are well scattered over the taluka, and one or more of them are within easy reach of all.

- 11. There are no manufactures of any importance in Daryapur taluka.

 Common country clothes are made in small quantities sufficient for the wants of the lower classes.

 There are four steam cotton gins and 1,311 hand-gins working in the taluka.

 The particulars regarding these, and with the shops, oil presses, &c., are given in appendix D.
- 12. There is only one annual fair in Daryapur taluka; this is held at Wadner in the month of April. It is not a large fair, attracting only some 1,100 people. The trade is estimated at Rs. 2,330.
- 13. The figures for the agricultural statistics are given in appendix E, from which the following table is compiled to show the condition of the taluka in 1867-68 as compared with the present day. The figures have been taken from the records of the Daryapur tehsili; the figures for the present population are those of the census of 1891; while under the head of cultivation the figures for 1872-73 (that is, the last date on which the original settlement was made) are compared with those of the present day:—

Pepulation has increased 26.3 per cent., and gives a density of 243 souls to the square mile. In the adjoining taluka of Akot the density is 266 to the square mile, and the average for the whole of the Akola district is 216 to the square mile, while for the province, excluding the Melghat, the average density of the population is 177 to the square mile. It will be seen that Daryapur taluka is above the average.

Cows and buffaloes have increased 13:3 per cent. and carts 34:8 per cent. These two items are signs of prosperity and increasing trade and traffic. Wells have increased 38:7 per cent., which is very satisfactory from an agricultural as well as from an economic point of view.

There was but little scope for the increase of cultivation. Now, however,

practically all the available land is taken up.

The decrease of agricultural cattle seems to be due to the fact that the number in 1867-68 were somewhat excessive, and have now been reduced to a more proper proportion to the land; for instance, in the adjoining taluka of Akot, where the cattle increased during the period of settlement, there were at the close of that period 25,685 head of agricultural cattle to 296,187 acres of cultivation. The present figures in Daryapur are on a very even level with those, namely, 23,261 head of agricultural cattle to 285,415 acres of cultivation. These figures give one pair of bullocks to every 24.8 acres of cultivated land compared with one pair of bullocks to every 22.8 acres in Akot taluka as shown below:--

14. There are 44 Government boys' schools in the taluka with an average attendance of 1,610. There are 3 Government girls' schools with an average attendance of 47 pupils, and 32 private boys' schools with an average attendance of 555. There are thus 79 schools in the taluka, which gives an average of as nearly as possible one school to every three and a-half villages.

Of these 79 schools, only 7 were established at the time of the introduction of the original settlement. In the first decade of the period of settlement 21 schools were opened; in the second decade 16; and in the third decade 35, so that 72 new schools have been opened during the 30 years—a very satisfactory

advance.

- 15. Appendices H to L show the statistics regarding the value of land; they were collected as heretofore in 10 per cent. Value of land. of all the villages in the taluka.
- 16. There were seven cases of sales by the decree of the Civil Court, in which 67 acres assessed at Rs. 108, or Rs. 1-9-9 Appendix II. per acre, were sold for Rs. 2,065, or Rs. 30-13-7 per acre, equivalent to nineteen times the Government assessment.
- 17. There were 224 cases of sales by private contract, in which 2,209 acres assessed at Rs. 3,746, or Rs. 1-11-2 per acre, were Appendix I. sold for Rs. 63,132, or Rs. 28-9-6 per acre, equivalent to seventeen times the Government assessment.
- 18. There were 159 cases of simple mortgage, in which 2,745 acres assessed at Rs. 4,767, or Rs. 1-11-9 per acre, were mort-Appendix J. gaged for Rs. 48,632, or Rs. 17-11-6 per acre, equivalent to ten times the Government assessment.
- 19. There were 73 cases of mortgage with possession, in which 665 acres assessed at Rs. 1,176, or Rs. 1-12-4 per acre, were Appendix K. mortgaged for Rs. 15,007, or Rs. 22-9-1 per acre, equivalent to thirteen times the Government assessment.
- 20. There were 236 cases of subletting, in which 2,972 acres assessed at Rs. 5,310, or Rs. 1-12-7 per acre, were leased for Appendix L. Rs. 13,657, or Rs. 4-9-6 per acre, equivalent to three times the Government assessment.
- 21. The subletting value of land has averaged three times the Government assessment in every taluka hitherto brought under revision. This, I think, may be accepted as showing that the land is of much the same value all over the country. Accidental causes may operate to vary the amounts realized by sales

or mortagages, but the actual value of the land as compared with the Government assessment is much the same in all talukas.

22. As in former reports, the figures in appendix M-1 are taken from the publication Prices and Wages in India. To these I have added the figures for the last three years taken from office records in order to bring the information given in this appendix up to date. According to the figures given in Prices and Wages in India for the Ellichpur district, the prices appear to have undergone but little change. In 1864 the price of wheat was 10.71 seers per rupee; in 1867, the year of introduction of the settlement, it was 9.11 seers per rupee; and in 1893 it was 12.39 seers per rupee. Jowari has been just as steady; in 1867 the price was 17.14 seers per rupee; in 1893 it was 15.94. There have, of course, been considerable fluctuations during the time, and during the last decade the rise has been steady, though slow.

23. Turning now to appendix M-3, which gives the local prices for wheat and jowari for the three decades from 1867 to 1896, we find the averages as follows:—

The prices in the last decade have been a little higher generally than in the first two decades, but the average of the last decade has been much increased by the abnormally high prices of 1896.

24. With regard to price of cotton, appendix M-2 gives the price of Berar cotton in Bombay as taken from the reports of the Chamber of Commerce. It will be seen that during the 13 years 1884 to 1896 the price of "good" Berar cotton has varied from Rs. 186\frac{3}{4} per khandi to Rs. 179\frac{3}{4}. The highest price was in 1888 Rs. 288\frac{3}{4} per khandi, and the lowest in 1892 Rs. 161 per khandi. The average for the last decade from 1887 to 1896 is Rs. 201 per khandi.

No prices are given in the original settlement report on this taluka, and I do not think it altogether safe to go back to the prices given in Jalgaon previous to the settlement, as has been done in other reports. We shall be able to form an estimate of the fluctuations in the price of cotton from the figures given in appendix M-4, which shows the local prices collected in the taluka. It will be seen that the period of settlement opened in 1867 with cotton at Rs. 180½ per khandi; the price rose in 1869 to Rs. 222 per khandi, and fell at the close of the decade to Rs. 150¼ in 1876.

The second decade opened with Rs. 157 per khandi in 1877. In 1885 the price rose to Rs. 183, but with this exception the tendency in this decade was somewhat low, and the price in 1886 was Rs. 149.

In 1887 it rose again to Rs. $189\frac{1}{2}$: 1890, 1891, and 1894 were years of low prices, and in 1896 the price was Rs. $143\frac{3}{4}$, but the average of the third decade was higher than either of the two previous ones.

Taken as a whole the price of wheat and jowari show a slight increase, and cotton is about the same. The fluctuations cannot be taken as showing any material or permanent increase. The price of food-grains is exceptionally high just now on account of the failure of the crops last season, but this is an unusual circumstance which cannot be taken into our present calculations.

25. Appendix N-1 to N-4 show the revenue history of the taluka during the period of the settlement. Taking the year 1872-73 as the first year from which we have full records for the whole taluka, we find that there were then 285,193 acres of occupied land bearing an assessment of Rs. 4,73,972. In 1896-97 these figures were 285,415 acres and Rs. 4,74,419 respectively. Again, in 1872-73 there were 158 acres of unoccupied arable land assessed at Rs. 116, which small amount of available land has now fallen to 12 acres assessed at Rs. 29.

There was but little possibility of increase during the period of settlement; almost the whole of the available land was cultivated, and the small margin of uncultivated assessed land has now been reduced to practically nil. The cultivated area has increased by 222 acres and the revenue by Rs. 447.

26. The following table shows the number of cases in which notices have had to issue for the collection of land revenue during the last three years:—

This gives an average of 384 notices a year among the 266 khalsa villages of the taluka, less than an average of one and-a-half notices a year in each village, and only one case of restraint in the three years. The ease with which the land revenue is collected is amply proved by these figures.

27. Sufficient has now been said to show that the period of the last settlement last settlemen

I now proceed to revise the old grouping and rates and to consider what modifications are desirable for a new period of settlement.

28. The 266 khalsa villages which now form the Daryapur taluka were at the original settlement divided into three groups, and rated as follows:—

Group I ... 99 villages rated at 2 4 0 Group II ... 134 do do 2 0 0 Group III ... 32 do do 1 12 0

The one remaining village, Husenpur, on the Chandrabaga river, about three miles north-east of Daryapur, has hitherto borne a group rate of Rs. 1-13-0; this village is distinctly in the second group; it is surrounded by villages all rated at Rs. 2, and its different rate is evidently a mistake.

The first and second groups are at present divided by a line running west and east through the taluka, south of Yewda, north of Umri-Itbarpur and Kumri, between Nimbari and Ganeshpur, north of Songaon, south of Ratna-

pur, and north of Chincholi, Gowhan, and Saidapur.

All villages north of this line are in the first group and rated at Rs. 2-4-0, except Dahigaon and its four khels and four other villages in the north-east that were transferred to Daryapur from Ellichpur taluka, and also the villages of Nababpur and Ratnapur; these are rated at Rs. 2.

Most of the villages south of the line above mentioned are in the second group rated at Rs. 2. Daryapur, Wanosa, and a few surrounding villages are

rated at first group rate Rs. 2-4-0.

The third group consists of certain villages in the south-cast and south-west, which according to paragraph 31 of Major Elphinstone's report are either inconveniently far from bazars or badly supplied with water. The distance from bazars is certainly not now a consideration whatever it might have been in 1869. The villages in the south-cast are within easy reach of Daryapur and Wanosa and also Kholapur in Amraoti taluka; those in the west have Adul and Yewda close by and Wanosa within easy reach.

A reference to the map marked A attached to this report will make the

grouping clear.

29. The anomaly noticed in the Akot taluka appears again in Daryapur; the villages in the south nearer to the railway and to the trade centre of Murtizapur, which lies only 7 miles south of the Purna river, are placed in the second and third groups, and rated lower than the villages in the north, which are further from the railway. This manifestly calls for modification. The circumstances of Daryapur taluka are very similar to those of Akot, except that there is not so much difference between the north and south of the taluka. The country about Daryapur, Wanosa, Ganeshpur; thence westward to Adul and its neighbourhood, is as rich and well wooded as anywhere in the north.

The salt tract need scarcely be considered here. Major Elphinstone mentions it in paragraph 14 of his report, saying that it extended over half the taluka; but his third group was not rated lower than the others merely because they were in the salt tract, and he placed the villages around Daryapur in the first group notwithstanding that from his paragraph 14 above quoted one would have expected to find these villages suffering from the effects of the saline water. As a matter of fact, I found no villages that appeared at all inconvenienced from this evil. The soil is rich and fertile; water generally plentiful. Daryapur is a flourishing centre of local trade, and the railway and large trade centre of Murtizapur is within easy reach. The southern portion of Daryapur taluka therefore cannot be placed in any but the first group.

Turning now to the northern portion of the taluka, we find the soil unsurpassable in richness and fertility; the country open, but well wooded; water pure and plentiful. The large town of Anjangaon has the largest market in the taluka, and is a flourishing trade centre in itself. Although, of course, further from the railway, communications are so easy in the open level country that even these northern villages must still be considered within easy reach of it.

They were placed in the first group at the original settlement, and there is no

reason for placing them lower now.

The villages in the north-east transferred from Ellichpur are no exceptions to the rest, and are close to Anjangaon. I therefore propose to make no group divisions in this taluka, but to include all the villages without exception into one group.

30. The arguments put forward in the revision settlement report on Akot taluka under the heading of proposed rates as a further reason in favour of the proposed one group apply equally here. It would be practically impossible to subdivide the taluka into two or more groups without either lowering the rates of the villages in the north or leaving them at their present level, neither of which courses would be fair to Government.

I find no small difficulty, however, in proposing the future group rate for the whole taluka. When I proposed Rs. 2-12-0 as the maximum rate for the first group in Akola, it was overruled and Rs. 2-10-0 applied. In Akot taluka across the Purna, and away from the railway, my proposed rate of Rs. 2-10-0 has been altered to Rs. 2-12-0. I therefore gather that Rs. 2-12-0 will possibly be the accepted rate for Daryapur, the two talukas being very similar. But if this is done, we shall have difficulty with Murtizapur taluka. This taluka can scarcely be rated lower than Daryapur. The railway runs through it, while Daryapur is separated from the railway by the unbridged Purna river liable to floods. But again if Murtizapur taluka be rated at Rs. 2-12-0 in order to keep it at least on a level with Daryapur, then the comparison between Murtizapur at Rs. 2-12-0 and Akola at Rs. 2-10-0 will appear somewhat anomalous. Under these circumstances I can only propose the maximum rate that I consider correct and leave the final decision in the hands of Government. Rs. 2-10-0 having been the highest maximum rate sanctioned on the railway, should not, I think, be exceeded off it. Ordinarily speaking, the rates should be lowered as we get further from the railway, but admitting the exceptional advancement and prosperity of Daryapur, it can with ease bear the rate sanctioned for the railway, and therefore I propose a maximum dry crop rate of Rs. 2-10-0 for the whole taluka. This rate would give an enhancement of 22.1 per cent. on the present assessment of Daryapur.

- 31. Garden land irrigated from wells made before the original settlement will according to the orders we are following be assessed at the maximum dry crop rate of the group in which it is situated. Land irrigated from wells excavated since the original settlement will be treated as dry crop land and no extra assessment levied. No further proposals under these heads are required.
- 32. There is no pathastal bagayat land in Daryapur taluka, and therefore no proposals are necessary.
- 33. There is no rice land in Daryapur taluka, and no proposals are required.
- 34. The following statement shows the revenue which it is estimated will accrue under the proposed rates:—

The increase amounts to Rs. 1,04,836, being 22.1 per cent. in excess of the present demand.

35. In no village is the percentage of increase according to the proposed rate up to 66 per cent. There is therefore no case in which special sanction is needed, nor is there any reason for the application of the principle of progressive enhancement. I would therefore suggest that the full new rates be levied on the expiry of the original settlement, and that the proclamation of the new settlement be made before the 31st July 1898 for a period of 30 years for the first batch of 69 villages, 28 years for the second batch of 188 villages, and 27 and 26 years for the third and fourth batches of 5 and 4 villages respectively, and I trust that the orders of the Government will be obtained as soon as possible.


